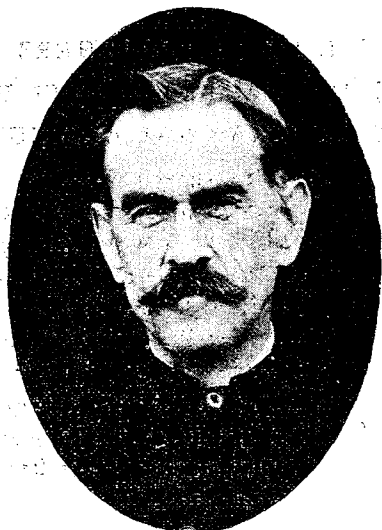

Journal of the Session

Moved and seconded that Edward J. Haug be elected for the term of two years as trustee of the Bethel Holiness Orphanage. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that D. C. Shearer be elected as trustee of the Bethel Holiness Orphanage for the term of five years. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that four District Home Missionaries be elected. (Carried.) (See classified record.)

Moved and seconded that Conference buy tent from O. C. Myers for \$100. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that Conference pay balance on Jackson tent, and it be used on Southern Indiana District. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that tent purchased of O. C. Myers be used on Northern Indiana District. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that Conference elect a Publishing Committee. (Carried.) (See classified record.)

SEPTEMBER 13, 1911,—NIGHT SESSION.

After devotional services Conference was called to order with P. E., C. C. Brown in the chair.

After roll call the minutes of the last session were read and adopted.

Moved and seconded that one thousand copies of the Minutes be printed. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the Conference Secretary and his assistant publish the Minutes. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that Chairman appoint the Apportionment Committee. (Carried.) (See classified report.)

Moved and seconded that each pastor preach one or more sermons each quarter and take an offering for Home Missionary work. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the Conference pay the traveling expenses of the presiding elders. (Carried.)

Moved and carried that a free will offering be received for the retiring Conference Treasurer, W. G. Bogue. An amount of \$9.28 was received.

Moved and seconded that report of Apportionment Committee be received. (Carried.) (See classified report.)

Moved and seconded that Camp Meeting immediately precede Conference. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the date of Annual Camp Meeting and Conference be left to Camp and Confer-

ence Committee. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the Conference and Camp Meeting Committee select a suitable location for next Annual Meeting in some other city. (Carried.)

Adjournment: Benediction by W. G. Bogue.

SEPTEMBER 14, 1911,—MORNING SESSION.

After devotional services Conference was called to order with P. E., G. C. Middleton in the chair.

After roll call the minutes of last session were read and adopted.

Moved and seconded that Ed. Cornelius act as delegate for St. Louis, Mo., during the absence of Ethel Lee. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that an order be drawn on Conference Treasurer and signed by at least two trustees before the payment of any bill, the presiding elders traveling expenses excepted. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the ministerial members of the Conference be requested to pay fifty per cent of their tithes into the Conference treasury for church extension. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that Elmer Hanna be received as an ordained preacher on trial for one year. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that each District Home Missionary act as agent for "A Voice from Canaan". (Carried.)

Moved and seconded to take pledges to get subscribers for "A Voice from Canaan". (Carried.)

Memorial services conducted by W. G. Bogue at 10:45 A. M. in memory of those who died during the year.

Adjournment: Benediction by C. C. Brown.

SEPTEMBER 14, 1911,—AFTERNOON SESSION.

After devotional services Conference was called to order with P. E., E. J. N. Bradshaw in the chair.

After roll call the minutes of the last session were read and adopted.

Moved and seconded that we elect a delegate and alternative to Pennsylvania Conference. (Carried.)

W. G. Bogue was elected delegate and C. C. Brown, alternative.

Moved and seconded that delegate be instructed to convey greetings from Indiana Conference, and ascertain what steps can be taken to reunite these two Conferences, and report at next Annual Conference. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the Conference pay the delegate's traveling expenses. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that three Conference trustees be elected by acclamation for one, two, and three years, respectively. (Carried.) (See classified report.)

Moved and seconded that each pastor appoint three committees of three to represent the Bible School, Orphanage and Rescue Work. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that each class furnish at least two comforts for Camp Meeting. (Carried.)

Moved and carried that the Presiding Elders and a committee of five appointed by the Presiding Elders constitute the Camp Meeting Committee.

Moved and carried that each class appoint a solicitor for Camp Meeting.

J. W. Clark tendered his resignation as Conference Treasurer in favor of Albert Ewing who was elected.

REPORT OF THE EXAMINING COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

(See table.)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS.

Article I. We recommend that all preachers, local preachers, evangelists and home missionaries secure a copy each of "God's Financial Plan" by Shaw, and "The Victory of Mary Christopher" and that they be required to read same.

II. We recommend that each class adopt the tithing system according to church discipline and that each pastor form into an association those that desire to tithe. The money to be placed in church treasury, to be paid out for Apportionment and other expenses as the official board may decide. We further recommend that each presiding elder explain the plan at the first Quarterly Meeting and urge the classes to adopt it at once.

III. We recommend that in place of the regular Foreign Missionary Offering taken in the Sabbath School, the offering be taken alternately for the Rescue Home, Bible School, Orphanage and Foreign Mission.

IV. We recommend that these offerings be sent to their respective places quarterly.

V. We recommend that we dispense with all special services with the exception of Foreign Missionary Day.

VI. We recommend that each pastor hold one or more special Foreign Missionary services and that an offering be taken for the work.

VII. We recommend that the Foreign Missionary Board be instructed by this Conference to take steps to use the money taken for foreign missions down to the reserve.

VIII. We recommend that this Conference set the amount of this reserve to be held in trust for emergency purposes.

IX. We recommend that immediate steps be taken to collect and replace all money belonging to Foreign Missionary Treasury.

X. We recommend that each class do its own beneficiary work and that it elect a special beneficiary board as soon as convenient before the first quarterly conference.

XI. We recommend that the amount per member be left to the discretion of the board.

XII. We recommend that inasmuch as our work is sadly in need of tents for the field we create a tent fund and that each pastor take an offering for same.

XIII. We recommend that this Conference appoint a committee of five to raise money for and to secure tents.

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Memoirs.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER HOWARD.

Rev. William Alexander Howard was born in Ross County, Ohio, February 22, 1842. In 1867 he was "born again" and united with the M. E. Church, and thus started in on a long and successful career for God. Three years later he chose one of his neighbor girls, Miss Susan Hyer, to be his life's companion and helpmate. For two years they remained in their native state and then emigrated to Delaware County, Indiana where they resided for three years. They then moved to Madison County and located in Summitville at which place they made their permanent home during the greater portion of the remainder of his life until the breaking down of his health three years ago. They also lived a few years in the southern part of the state. They were blessed with two sons and three daughters, the sons having preceded him to eternity's shore.

After coming to Indiana he obeyed the divine admonition, "Be ye holy" and was sanctified by God, the Father and became a member of the Holiness Christian Church. In 1901 he was admitted into the Conference as an ordained elder and remained faithful unto the end. His fatherly advice and godly council was

always felt on the Conference floor and "Uncle Billy" always received a hearty welcome when his smiling face appeared on the scene of action.

Upon the breaking down of his health they removed to Eureka Springs, Arkansas, hoping that he might regain it, where he patiently endured his sufferings awaiting the final summons which came February 9, 1911, at the age of 68 years, 11 months and 17 days. He had fought a good fight, finished his course and best of all he had kept the faith. "Thou shalt come to thy grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn in his season." Job 5:26.

WILLIAM B. PULLEN.

Rev. William B. Pullen was born in Franklin County, Indiana, March 20, 1841. When twenty years old in the month of August, 1861, as he rode into Cincinnati, Ohio, on a load of hay he heard martial music and followed it to a recruiting station where he enlisted as a soldier in the Union army as a member of the Sixth Ohio Independent Cavalry and was mustered into the service a little later as Company L Third, New York Cavalry when he had a most exciting and gallant career. After being engaged in a number of hard and important battles with numerous, miraculous and narrow escapes he was taken prisoner and soon had an opportunity to test the stern realities of prison life at the much dreaded and earthly hell, Andersonville. Six weeks later he with several comrades escaped but were recaptured by blood hounds. For eight months he endured the indescribable horrors of this living death, until he was more dead than alive, losing in weight until he dropped from one hundred seventy-five to one

hundred pounds. During the months of July and August the death rate reached from eighty to one hundred twenty daily until at least thirteen thousand lives of Union soldiers were sacrificed upon the shrine of this altar of hatred as a toll for the sin of warfare.

It was while in this awful place that Brother Pullen found the Lord. Boston Corbett and other Christian young men would hold prayer meetings and sing old fashioned religious songs and while thus engaged, singing "Am I a Soldier of the Cross," he gave his heart to God and was gloriously converted, and as he said, "All the gloom of prison life passed away and hope was kindled on my breast." While starved and famished for water, their Christian soldiers prayed earnestly for God in some way to quench their awful burning thirst and to their great satisfaction in the morning found the celebrated Providential Spring bubbling up out of the dry and parched ground, furnishing them with plenty of good, pure, cold water in answer to the prayer of faith, and according to reports it still flows on. Brother Pullen's war record is fully set forth in a book he published entitled "Eight Months in Andersonville." He effected his release by assuming the name of a comrade and was exchanged barely in time to save his life. He was married to Elnora Beck, of Indianapolis, in 1867. Unto them were born a son and a daughter, who with his wife survive him.

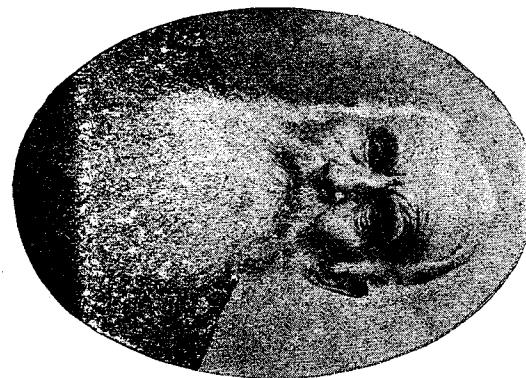
At the close of the war he became much interested in Christian work. He was afterward sanctified wholly and for about twenty years was one of the best known and most earnest workers in the holiness ranks at Indianapolis, being a charter member and the first President of the Young Men's Holiness League of

that city. In 1907 he received his credentials as an Iternant preacher in our church, but shortly prior to his death he was obliged to sever his connections with us for legitimate reasons. He remained faithful to the end. After a long illness the end suddenly came at the home of his son, 913 Germania Ave., Indianapolis, March 11, 1911; aged sixty years, eleven months and twenty-one days.

Brother Pullen was a holy man of God whose life and testimony were an inspiration and blessing and his death a personal loss to all who knew him. The large funeral was the scene of blessed manifestations and demonstrations of Holy Ghost fire not usually seen at such times.

Servant of God, well done!

Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last.

REV. DANIEL EVANS.

Rev. Daniel Evans was born in Ripley County, Indiana, Jan. 10, 1843, where he spent the greater part of his life. The Spirit arrested him in early life and when but a boy he gave his heart to God and was converted. In after years he was sanctified wholly and was conscious of the indwelling of the blessed Holy Ghost. Although engaged in the busy activities of farm life he found time to assist in revivals whenever opportunity presented and finally united with the Holiness Christian Church, and at the Conference of 1901 received his credentials as an ordained elder, which position he held until called home to be with God, at 7:30 A. M. on Thursday, June 15, 1911, at his late

home in Benton County, Mo., aged 68 years, 5 months and 5 days.

He was married February 23, 1862 to Evaline Dillman who with two sons and three daughters survive him while eight children preceded him to the great beyond. Brother Evans was indeed a man of God and lived to better this old world. He realized the joy of the Lord was his strength and often manifested it in the holy dance much to the edification and uplifting of his co-workers of the cross. After several years of impaired health in which he displayed the courage and patience of a true Christian he died triumphant in the faith.

GRANT EWING.

Grant Ewing, son of George W. and Sarah Elizabeth Ewing was born June 14, 1867 and departed this life November 11, 1910; aged 43 years, 4 months and 27 days.

He was united in marriage to Dell Louise Smith, August 4, 1888. To this union were born ten children, all of whom are living except one son who preceded his father to the glory land.

In the year 1893 they moved from Tipton County to Elwood, where he resided at the time of his death.

Not quite two years ago he was soundly converted and united with the Holiness Christian Church. A few weeks later he received the blessing of entire sanctification and lived a godly life among his fellowmen, admonishing those he met to live not for this life only but for the life eternal. Just the night before his

death he attended the revival services at the M. E. Church and gave a bright testimony for Christ.

He was a kind, loving husband and father, true to his family and the church, scarcely ever being absent from any of the services and at the time of his death held the office of Trustee in the church and was also teacher of the Bible class. We do not understand why God permitted the accident at the mill where he was working and had been employed for sixteen years, but He whose thoughts are high above our thoughts knows what is best and sometime we will understand. He leaves to mourn their loss, a wife and nine children, two of these being married; also a father, mother, two brothers and one sister: Rev. Albert Ewing, of Frankfort, Lee Ewing, of Elwood, and Mrs. Lizzie Level, of Summit City, Mich., with a host of relatives and friends.

He will be greatly missed from his home, the community, the church and the mill. Truly an armor bearer has fallen, but our loss is his gain.
