MINUTES OF THE SECOND ANNUAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PENNSYLVANIA AND NEW JERSEY DISTRICT OF THE I. H. CHURCH

On the morning of March 8, 1921, the Second Annual Assembly convened at the hour of 9 o'clock in the splendid little auditorium of the first International Holiness Church of Sunbury

The opening session was called to order by the State Superintendent, Rev. H. A. Saneholtz, of Reading, Pa. The devotional exercises consisted of singing, Scripture reading, and prayer. The first song was "Near the Cross," the Scripture lesson from 1 Tim. IV, was read and expounded by our General Superintendent, Geo. B. Kulp, and prayer offered by the same.

The Conference bar was fixed at the first five rows of seats. Registration followed, and the appointment of committees by the General Superintendent, who was now asked to preside, and authorized to appoint committees.

The Auditing Committee follows: S. J. McIntyre, C. C. Rose, Paul Ford.

Resolution Committee: J. L. Sutton, Chas. L. Slater, W. J. Crider.

Reports of Standing Committees were heard and accepted.

Bro. C. C. Rose reported for the Committee on Incorporation, and showed no new charter gotten out on account of the exorbitant charges made for the same in Allegheny County, and the advisability of having it issued in the original county of Northumberland.

Following this report a motion was put and carried to the effect that the chair appoint a committee to revise the old charter. The committee follows: W. E. Straub, Paul Ford, Bro. Zimmerman.

The minutes of the last session of the previous convention were then read and accepted.

The Assembly hours were fixed by motion at from 9 o'clock to 11.30 o'clock for the forenoon session and from 2 to 5 o'clock for the afternoon.

J. R. Gardner reported for the Minute Committee, showing a publication of 400 copies at a cost of \$60.00. Report accepted.

The encouraging report of our missionary to the West Indies, Rev. R. W. Ives, was then read by the Secretary, and most heartily received by the Assembly. It showed not only a year of tireless activity on the part of the laborer, but also a year of signal blessing and victory vouchsafed by the Master of the harvest.

The report of Bro. Wm. G. Miller was next read and followed by a hearty commendation of his work by the General Superintendent. Befitting his splendid work of securing the Incorporation of our Church in Canada, the Assembly likewise passed a special vote of Credit to Bro. Miller for the same. Bro. Miller is now at Powosson, Ont., Canada.

Bro. Slater was called to the floor by the chair to report for the church paper, The I. H. Advocate. He bespoke a hearty effort on the part of the General Assembly to place the paper on a successful basis, and assured the Assembly of a promising future for the same with the splendid editorship of Bro. Taylor of Owoso, Michigan.

Bro. Paul Ford was elected as press reporter for the Assembly.

Election Day was fixed at Thursday P. M., 2 o'clock.

The reports of the following preachers were then read and accepted: Bro. J. P. Miller, Edmund Cortez, Sister Adlena Bahrent, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Hankins.

A motion was made to adjourn at this juncture in order to give the State Council time to finish up necessary business before the afternoon session. Seconded and carried.

While the ballots were being counted, the place of holding the next year's Assembly was presented and discussed. Such cordial invitations coming from so many different points, it was difficult for the Asembly to decide just which one to accept; but finally out of the five different churches considered: viz, Sunbury, McKeesport, Bethlehem, Philadelphia, and Glassboro, the latter received the highest number of votes, and Glassboro, N. J., was fixed as our next Assembly grounds.

Bro. T. L. Wieand next spoke of the need of giving prompt attention to the sale of Beulah Park Bonds, and the necessity of keeping after the financial up-keep of our property in general. A number of bonds were sold before the Assembly closed.

After an earnest discussion of the Bible School project, a motion was made relative to the same, but was afterward expunged by vote from the records.

A motion was made to have the Home Mission Board immediately investigate concerning the needs of the work at Colyer, Pa., but lost.

A motion followed that we pledge the churches again to the support of the district work. Carried. Proceeding immediately with the same, pledges were taken to the amount of \$720.00.

Resolution No. 7 presented by Committee and adopted by Assembly. $\,$

The Statistical Committee reported through its chairman, Bro. Ford. Accepted.

A motion was made relative to the getting out of a new report blank for our preachers for 1922 convention which will cover the ground of work done. Seconded and supported.

Resolution No. 8, submitted, amended, and adopted.

The Missionary Board-elect reported. Same was accepted and ordered on the minutes.

Reports of Bros. Ford, Sension, Mapes, Clarke, and Gorman heard and accepted. The report of Sister Carrie Fergueson covering her evangelistic work was read and accepted. Sister Davis reported as delegate for the Philadelphia Church.

Resolution No. 9, tendering the convention's deepest sympathy to our beloved Bro. Wagner in his great sorrow was unanimously adopted, and a copy of the same ordered to be presented to him.

Resolution No. 10 adopted.

The following persons were accepted upon recommendation of the Council for license to preach: Bros. James Parkins, Lawrence Neff, Willard Fitch and Sr. Edna Carr from McKeesport; and Bro. J. E. Wolf, of Fisher's Ferry.

The following had their licenses renewed: Sister Adlena Bahrent, Edmund Cortez, Jas. Clarke, David Gorman, Mrs. Raymond Hankins, Mrs. Bessie Hatcher, Frederick A. Mapes, J. P. Miller, Wm. G. Miller, Charles Minor, Frank Rabuck, Harry E. Sension.

For Deaconess License the following were passed upon: Sarah Jane Davis, of Philadelphia; Miss Florence A. Young, of Bethle-

hem; Miss Minnie Zimmerman, of Sunbury; Mrs. Willard Fitch, of McKeesport, and Carrie P. Young, of Trenton, N. J.

Bros. Daniel Dubendorf, John Hankins, and Paul D. Ford were ordained.

Following was a motion to reconsider the Bible School matter taken up in a former session. It was carried.

By motion the records were cleared of a previous motion made at Thursday P. M. session concerning the same. As a substitute for the motion expugned, the following was made, That we as a convention stand unanimously in favor of opening up a Summer Bible School at Beulah Park for the ensuing year. Seconded and discussed. An amendment was offered substituting the words "in the near future" as the time of opening instead of the words "for the ensuing year." The amendment was lost and the motion was carried.

Sister Keister was excused upon request for the rest of Assembly.

Saturday Forenoon Session, March 12, 1921

Opening song, "Oh How I Love Jesus."

Prayer by Bro. Rabuck.

In absence of the Secretary, Bro. McIntyre was elected Secretary pro tem.

The Resolution Committee came forward with another new and important resolution at this time. It was to the effect that we hold a Ministerial Holiness Convention next Fall at one of our churches, the same to be for the helpful presentation and discussion of subjects assigned previously to the ministers throughout the State. The resolution was adopted. By vote, the place fixed upon as the first place of meeting was Philadelphia, Pa. All who expect to attend are instructed to notify the pastor in charge at least ten days ahead.

The subjects for discussion are to be assigned to the several ministers by a committee consisting of the State Superintendent and two others appointed by him.

The date was fixed at the first Tuesday in November and running over the following Sunday. The Resolutions appear in full elsewhere on the minutes.

The Secretary being now present, the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Resolution No. 12, extending our appreciation to Bro. Kulp for his assistance, and our invitation for his return next year was earried unanimously by a rising vote.

The 13th resolution embodying a hearty vote of thanks to our former District Superintendent, Bro. Saneholtz, was also carried by a rising vote.

As Resolution No. 8, provided for the equalizing of the delegates' and preachers' carfare to the next Assembly a motion was put and passed that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Assembly in favor of W. J. Crider to serve as Railroad Secretary, to whom shall be handed a statement of fares upon arrival at the Assembly.

The Trustee Board-elect reports their organization.

The number of minutes to have printed was fixed at 300.

The time of next Assembly was next considered by motion. The first motion "That we hold it on the first Tuesday in April" was lost. The second, "That we begin the last Tuesday in March" was carried.

The State Council next submitted to the Assembly for their ratification the following important propositions:

1. A Bible School Board consisting of five members, three of whom shall be members of the Council, and two of whom may be

laymen outside the Council, shall be elected by the Council, and endowed with full power to effect all business requisite to the opening up and maintaining of a Summer Bible School at Beulah Park, consisting of a course in Bible, and a separate course in common or High School subjects.

The proposition was carried.

2. In order to facilitate the sale of Beulah Park Bonds, the Council recommends the name of C. C. Rose to the Assembly as our official bond agent for 1921, and that we as ministers and delegates to the Assembly pledge him our hearty co-operation in inviting him to our churches, and assisting him in securing sales wherever possible.

Carried.

3. Mrs. Carrie P. Young, of Trenton, N. J., is recommended by the Council for deaconess license.

Accepted.

The Committee on Minutes for 1921 was appointed at this time—Paul Ford, S. J. McIntyre, J. R. Gardner.

A motion was made to reconsider the time of our next Assembly. Carried.

It was moved and carried, That our nextAssembly begin on the second Tuesday in March, and continue over the following Sunday, or from March 14 to 19th, 1922.

A motion bassed relative to leaving the purchase of a new tent in the hands of the Council.

By motion and vote. Bro. J. E. Wolf was re-elected as our State Colporteur, and Home Mission worker.

Closing address by Bro. Kulp.

- No. 1. Whereas, There is a letting down in these days among so-called Holiness people, be it

 Resolved, That we as the Asembly of the I. H. Church of Pennsylania and New Jersey go on record as forever opposing the uniting with any other body of men or churches until we are sure they are clean, clear and straight along the four-fold Gospel lines.
- No. 2. Whereas, It is the custom of the States of these United States to grant a clergy permit on the different railroads, be it Resolved, That we as the ministers of the Annual Assembly at Sunbury March 8-13, 1921, appeal to the State Legislature of Pennsylvania that they extend the same courtesy in this State.
- No. 3. Whereas, Some of the Brethren reorted from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, and others from Assembly to Assembly, be it Resolved, That from this Assembly on, we all report from March 1st to March 1st, allowing those who reported from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 this year to add the past two months to their report for next year.
- No. 4. Whereas, It is almost impossible to secure proper dedication blanks for our children who are dedicated, be it Resolved, That the Chair appoint a committee of three to draft a proper form of blank for said purpose.
- No. 5. Whereas, The local congregation of the International Holiness Church at Reading, Penna., has requested authority from the District Assembly to borrow a sum of money not in excess of \$6,000, for payment of indebtedness of the congregation incidental to the erection of a new church building, at Mulberry and Washington Streets, said city of Reading, Now, therefore

Be It Resolved, by the District Assembly, assembled at Sun-

bury, Pa., on this 9th day of March, A. D. 1921, that authority be given to, and the said International Holiness Church of Reading, Penna., through its trustees, be authorized and empowered to mortgage the real estate of such congregation, situate in the city of Reading, Berks County, Penna., in a sum not exceeding Six Thousand Dollars, for the purpose of payment of obligations assumed by said congregation in the erection and furnishing of their new church building.

- No. 6. Wheeras, There is a real need of a Home Missionary Board, be it

 Resolved, That the three advisory members of the District Council constitute such Board. Their duty shall be the investigating of new and needy fields, and the presentation of bills covering needs of the same to the State Council.
- No. 7. Whereas, At our last General Assembly at Cincinnati, it was decided that each of our ministers should give 20% of their tithe money toward the expenses of our General Treasury for the expenses of our General Superintendent and his assistants, be it Resolved, That we follow this action and send said offering to our District Superintendent, who will forward it to our
- No. 8. Whereas, Some of our brethren live so far away from the Assembly as to make their carfare exceptionally high in pro-

portion to the others, be it Resolved, That we have an equalization of carfare for our next Assembly, and that a Railroad Secretary be appointed for that purpose. Upon arriving at the Assembly each preacher and delegate shall hand in a statement of his fare to and from the Assembly to said secretary, who shall then compute the average, and report, the resident pastor and delegate being exempt.

No. 9. Whereas, Our beloved Bro. Wagner and his sainted wife have for these many years been so closely associated with our work, having it very closely upon their hearts, be it

Resolved, That this Assembly extend our most hearty and tender sympathies to our brother in his bereavement, and pray God to bless and sustain him in this hour of sorrow.

- No. 10. Whereas, The Preachers and Delegates of this Assembly have been so royally entertained by the members and friends of the Sunbury Church, be it Resolved, That we by a rising vote extend to them our hearty thanks, and pray God to bless each and every one, this token of our appreciation to be read at a night service.
- No. 11. Whereas, So many of our churches are desiring our next year's Assembly, and we can accommodate but one, be it Resolved, That we hold a Ministerial Holiness Convention once each year, beginning the first Tuesday in November, and continuing over the following Sunday, and that the weekly offerings of the same go to defray the expenses of the attending preachers.
- No. 12. Whereas, Our beloved Bro. Kulp has rendered such faithful and valuable services to this Assembly and Church, be it Resolved, That we extend to him by a rising vote our most hearty thanks, praying that his life may be lengthened long to preach the Word, and extending to him an invitation to meet with us again next year.
- No. 13. Whereas, This Assembly and the State work in general feel deeply indebted for the services rendered by our departing State Superintendent, be it

 Resolved, That we manifest our sincerest gratitude to our Bro. Saneholtz by a rising vote of appreciation, praying the while that God will bless and reward him for his services.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Another year is history in the work of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey district of the International Holiness Church. Permanent progress is being made, and the blessing of the Lord is resting upon the churches. There are fifteen organized societies in the district. Thirteen of them are worshipping in their own buildings. Six of them have their own parsonages. Two church buildings were built during the last year, and another building has been purchased and converted into a meeting place and a parsonage on the second floor. Our membership is increasing and one pastor has come to us from another denomination.

Tent meetings have been held during the summer months, and revival meetings going continually. New fields are opening and workers are kept busy. There were four Camp Meetings in the district with good results.

We are indeed very conscious of the fact that the superintendency of the work is being sadly neglected. It is a very difficult matter to serve a pastorate and be superintendent at the same time. Something should be done to remedy this matter in this Assembly. All the churches have been visited once and most of them twice during the past year by the Superintendent or his assistant.

The hope of the work for the future is built upon the truth of seeking quality rather than quantity. Experimental religion should be our keynote, and not to be engulfed by the wave of popular so-called professed holiness that is all about us. The church is ordained to victory and we need to work in harmony so that the blessing of the Lord may continue to rest upon us.
