### MORNING SESSION, MONDAY, AUGUST 21, 1922.

The Third Annual Assembly of the I. H. Church convened in the Tabernacle of the Camp Ground at Frankfort, Ind., Monday, August 21, 1922, at 9 o'clock.

After devotional service conducted by Rev. John W. Williams and prayer by Rev. W. A. Frye, the State Superintendent Rev. A. M. Ewing, read a scripture lesson from the 21st chapter of St. John and then he addressed the Assembly after which we proceeded to business, with the District Superintendent, Rev. A. M. Ewing, in the chair.

First in order was the reading of the Assembly roll call with the revision of the same.

Moved and seconded that the names of E. M. Cornelius, Charles Harrel, Floyd Honschel, H. L. Holden, E. D. Miller, E. O. Prather, Charles D. Brown, S. E. Cordey, Ira Lundy and Edward Mullens be dropped from the Assembly roll since they have united with other churches, and that the name of Kyrie Klepher be dropped as he is no longer in the ministry and that the name of Ivan Hedrick be dropped by request. Carried.

Moved that we accept the transfers of Miss Jean E. Pound and Bro. Frank Myers, coming to us by transfers, (Sis. Pounds as a Licensed and Bro. Myers as an Ordained preacher) in good standing in the Illinois-Missouri District of the I. H. Church. Carried.

Bro. and Sis. Seth C. Reese from Pasadena, Calif., Bro. and Sis. Clyde Shearer from the Illinois District; Bro. Stone, Superintendent of the Bible school in St. Louis; Rev. C. R. and Mrs. Virginia Spear, from the Idaho District; Bro. L. W. Stanger, from the Kansas District, and Bro. Howard Beecher from the Oklahoma District, were at this time introduced to the Assembly as Advisory Members by a motion. The Assembly received them and extended greetings by a rising vote.

Moved that we accept no Licensed preachers as lay delegates. Carried.

Moved that the Annual Assembly Bar be fixed the same as last Assembly, i. e., three sections of seats, ten seats back with the first section of seats in the right wing of the Tabernacle. Carried.

Moved that we adopt the rules of government that were used last year for this Assembly. These rules were the rules contained in the Manual, P. 95, pp. 215. Carried.

Moved that we have dinner at 12 o'clock and supper at 5 o'clock P. M. Carried.

Moved that we have a night session from 7 to 9 P. M. Carried.

Moved that all important motions made on the Assembly floor be presented in writing. Carried.

At this time Secretary read the names of those on the different committees and the Chairman appointed Bro. W. E. Bradley and Bro. Harvey Guthrie to fill the vacancy on the Auditing Committee made by the absence of C. P. Pridgen and H. W. Cornelius.

Moved and supported that the Ordination Council which served last year shall serve this year. Carried.

Moved that the reading of the Pastoral reports and the Evangelistic reports shall be left until the more important business of the Assembly shall be transacted. Carried.

Moved that all reports shall be turned over to the Statistical Committee as soon as possible to be copied and then returned to the reporters to be read later. Carried.

Moved that the name of Lillian Roberts be referred to the Examining Board for investigation. Carried.

Bro. Chatfield's report as Conference Treasurer was read and accepted.

Moved that the Conference Treasurer give an itemized report. Lost.

Motion made that the names of Howard Beecher, C. F. Beitzel, Frank Myers, Aaron McNeil, L. W. Stanger, C. R. Spears, Virginia Spears, Cora A. White, John Doll, Edith Stearns, Francis Porter, Elmer Klopfenstein, T. R. Theobald, and Elias O. Harbison be referred to the Examining Committee. Carried.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION, MONDAY, AUGUST 21, 1922.

After Devotional Service conducted by E. J. Clem, the Assembly was called to order with A. M. Ewing, District Chairman, in the chair.

The roll call was dispensed with and the reading of the Minutes from the Morning Session was adopted.

Moved and seconded that the letter of greetings from Lillian Rodgers of California be accepted by the Assembly. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Assembly now receive new churches that come for admittance to the Assembly. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we receive the church at Lafayette, a church of 80 members, into the Assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the church of 26 members of New Carlisle be received into the Assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the church at Rochester, Ind., be received into the Assembly. Carried. This church has 28 members.

Moved and seconded that we receive the church at Marble Corner, "Morris Chapel", a church of 23 members into the Assembly. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the church at "Hillside," Indianapolis, be received. Carried. This church of 60 members will be Indianapolis, 4th church.

Moved and seconded that the church at Gentryville, Ind., be received. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Sis. Laura Cook be admitted into the Assembly Bar as an Advisory Member. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the letter from Rev. J. L. Thornton be received and that we have special prayer for him. Carried. Rev. A. M. Ewing offered a strong prayer in his behalf.

The Ways and Means Committee gave a report which was read by the Secretary of the Committee, Rev. Erea Montgomery. The report is as follows:

#### Article 1.

We recommend that Article 1 of the 1921 Minutes be adopted. Carried.

(Article 1, of the 1921 Minutes: We recommend that each local church that has not already decided on the salary of the pastor for the coming year meet immediately after the Annual business meeting and decide on the minimum amount to be paid for the year. And that in the future each church shall decide on the preacher's salary at the Annual business meeting to be held just prior to the District Assembly. We further recommend that each

church calling or changing preachers shall pay all transportation charges on household goods and the car fare of the pastor and his family and when the church has no parsonage the Advisory Board shall provide a suitable house for him.)

#### Article 2.

We recommend that the District Secretary be paid \$25 for editing the Assembly Minutes. Recommendation adopted.

#### Article 3.

We recommend that the District Secretary have 700 copies of the Assembly Minutes printed. Recommendation adopted.

#### Article 4.

We recommend that each local church in the District make two comforts and donate them to the Camp Meeting Committee. Recommendation adopted.

#### Article 5.

We recommend that the Assembly elect or the Chairman appoint a Board of Home Missions consisting of three or five members who shall have charge of all Home Missionary property and work. Recommendation carried.

Moved and seconded that the Chair appoint the Home Missionary Board. Carried. (See official report.)

#### Article 6.

We recommend that our pastors do not hold evangelical meetings this year outside their own fields of labor. Recommendation carried.

#### Article 7.

We recommend that the State Assembly precede the Annual Camp Meeting next year. Recommendation lost.

#### Article 8.

We recommend that we, the International Holiness church pay into the State Treasury 15 per cent of our gross collections to be distributed: 50 per cent to the State expenses, one-fifth of the remainder to be for Home Missions; one-fifth for Foreign Missions; one-fifth for educational institutions; one-fifth for Orphanage and one-fifth for Rescue work.

Moved and seconded that the recommendation in Article 8 be amended by striking out 15 per cent and substituting 10 per cent. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that a substitution be passed stating that: We recommend that each member of each local church above the age of 16 years pay the sum of \$1.50 each this year to the State Budget to be used for State expenses and that all of our institutions be excluded and their representatives be invited to visit our local churches. And that this amount be paid by monthly payments and sent to the State Treasurer. Motion lost.

Moved that we adopt Article 8 as amended. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that every church open their doors to all of our institutions and missionaries. Motion carried.

#### Article 9.

We recommend that the State Superintendent be paid \$2,300 this year, said amount to include traveling expenses. Recommendation carried.

#### Article 10.

We recommend that the District Superintendent make two rounds this year. Recommendation carried.

#### Article 11.

We recommend that each month one-tenth of the gross collections of each church be sent to the State Treasurer to be distributed as provided by this Assembly. Recommendation carried.

Moved we adjourn.

## NIGHT SESSION, AUGUST 21, 1922.

The devotional services of the Night session were led by Bro. E. P. Schrock and Bro. C. D. Shearer offered prayer. The State Chairman, Rev. A. M. Ewing, called the Assembly to order.

\*The Minutes of the afternoon session were read and adopted.

The Ways and Means Committee reported three more recommendations at this time.

Moved and seconded that each local church shall instruct their lay delegates the amount the church will give for Foreign Missions. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the matter of abandoned churches be placed in the hands of the State Council. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Sparksville church be declared abandoned. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock be set aside for the election of State officers. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we conduct the Ordination service Tuesday night at 7 P. M. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we enter into new business. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the seats in the Tabernacle shall not be loaned. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that the seats in the Tabernacle shall not be loaned without the sanction of the State Council. Motion carried.

Motion to adjourn.

## MORNING SESSION, TUESDAY, AUGUST 22, 1922.

After devotional service conducted by Rev. E. P. Shrock and prayer by Rev. W. A. Frye, the Assembly was called to order with the State Superintendent, Rev. A. M. Ewing, in the chair.

After roll call the Minutes of the previous session were read and adopted.

Moved and seconded that the names of B. J. Whitner and Mrs. B. J. Whitner be referred to the Examining Committee. Carried.

The report of the State Superintendent was read and accepted.

Under the head of New Business a number of Recommendations were read to be presented to the General Assembly and were acted upon at this time.

Article 1 offered as a substitution to pp. 91, P. 39 of the Manual, was read and moved and seconded that this Article be presented to the General Assembly. Motion carried. This recommendation deals with the divorce question.

Article 2 in regard to the calling and dismissing of pastors as a substitute to pp. 75, P. 36 was read. Moved we adopt this Article and present it to the General Assembly. Motion lost.

Article 3 in regard to the calling of pastors was read. Moved and seconded that this Article be adopted to be presented to the General Assembly. Motion carried.

Article 4, offered as a substitute for pp. 132, P. 51 of the Manual and pertaining to Class Meetings and Class Leaders was read. Motion it be accepted and recommended to the General Assembly. Motion carried.

Article 5 offering a substitute to pp. 111, P. 43 in regard to the Dismissal of members was read. Moved and seconded that this Article be adopted. Motion lost.

Article 6, recommending to the General Assembly that we have two General Superintendents was read and it was moved and seconded that we adopt it as a recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 7, recommending that the words "and having the sanction of the General Council" be stricken from pp. 36 on page 24 of the Manual. Moved and seconded we adopt this Article and it be presented to the General Assembly. Motion carried.

Article 8 was read and a motion made to adopt it. Motion lost. This motion dealt with the trial and dismissal of ministers as a substitute for pp. 163, P. 60 of the Manual.

Article 9, recommending that the local churches shall pay traveling expense of pastors when moving on a charge and that they provide a suitable house for him was read. Moved and seconded that we receive this Article and it be presented to the General Assembly. Carried.

Seven paragraphs dealing with the trial and dismissal of preachers were read. Moved and seconded that these paragraphs be adopted and that they be presented to General Assembly. Motion carried. These paragraphs constitute Article 10.

Article 11, read recommending to amend Art. 34, P. 22 of the Manual by changing the word "quadrennially" be changed to word "biennially." Moved and seconded that this recommendation be adopted. Motion carried.

Article 12 recommending to change Art. 40, P. 25 of the Manual was read. Moved and seconded that we adopt this Article. Carried.

Article 13 recommending a substitute for Articles 165, 170, 171 and 173 on pages 62, 63 and 64 of the Manual read. Moved and seconded we adopt this Article. Carried.

Article 14 read and moved and seconded that we adopt it. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the Resolution Committee bring in a Resolution covering the adultery question. Carried.

Moved and seconded that this Assembly recommend to the General Assembly that we have a Board of General Conference Trustees which shall hold in trust all General Conference property. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we recommend the General Assembly that all our local churches be required to deed all property from the Apostolic Holiness church and from the Holiness Christian church to the International Holiness church. Motion carried.

Motion to adjourn.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION, TUESDAY, AUGUST 22, 1922.

After devotional services by Frank Myers and prayer by Rev. Arthur McQueen the Assembly was called to order with Rev. A. M. Ewing in the chair.

Minutes of the morning session were read and adopted.

Moved and seconded that the church at Shoals, a church of 18 members, be received into the Assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the church at Davis School House, a church of 12 members, be received into the Assembly. Motion carried.

At this time an offering was taken to pay Assembly expense after which Bro. W. A. Frye offered a prayer of thanks.

Moved and seconded that each local church take a free will offering at the close of the year to pay expenses of the Annual Assembly. Carried.

Moved and seconded that each local church, prior to the Annual Assembly, elect a lay delegate to the Annual Assembly and an alternate and that the local church furnish car fare for their delegate. Motion carried.

Moved that we have two Ministerial Conventions this year, one about Christmas, the other in April. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that we have one Ministerial Convention this year to be held at Indianapolis near Christmas time. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we recommend that each local church take an offering to pay the traveling expense of their preacher to the Ministerial Convention. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that the recommendation blanks now used for the preachers be adopted by this Assembly after correction. Motion carried.

Resolved that we, as an Assembly, go on record as favorable to a union with the Pilgrim Church of California, and to this end recommend that our General Council invite the Pilgrim Church to send Fraternal delegates to the General Assembly empowered to act to this end. Moved we adopt this Recommendation. Motion carried.

Bro. Seth Rees at this time extended to us greetings from the Pilgrim Church.

Moved and seconded that the By-Laws of the I. H. Burial Association be amended by striking the words, "to next of kin" from Article 6, pp. 1, and substituting the words, "to the estate of said member." Motion carried.

Moved we hear the report of the Examining Committee. Carried.

The Examining Committee gave a partial report as follows: We recommend that C. E. Beitzel, and L. W. Stanger be received into the Conference as Ordained preachers. We recommend that Sis. Core White be received into the Conference as a Licensed preacher. We recommend that C. R. Spears and Frank Myers be received into the Conference as Ordained preachers and that Sis. Virginia Spears and Sis. Laura Cook be received in the Conference as Licensed preachers. Faithfully submitted:

Moved and seconded that we accept this report and that the candidates to be admitted now take their places inside the Assembly Bar. Motion carried.

Moved we proceed to the election of officers. Carried.

While the ballots were being passed two more motions were entertained. Moved and seconded that we recommend that each church make one straw tick, size 36x80 inches and send in with the comforts and that they be sent prepaid to Rev. A. M. Ewing, Chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee. Motion carried.

The tellers appointed by the Chair to distribute and collect ballots were: R. W. Chatfield, Frank Myers, Lowell H. Coate, John W. Williams, A. H. Plunkett, George Huff and E. J. Clem.

The first officer to be elected was the State Superintendent. The election was by ballot and no nominations were made. Rev. A. M. Ewing was elected State Superintendent on the first ballot. On the first ballot for the Assistant State Superintendent no majority of votes were cast sufficient to elect. On second ballot Rev. W. S. Dean was elected the Assistant State Superintendent.

The State Trustees elected to hold in trust all State property were: A. M. Ewing, George E. Huff and R. W. Chatfield.

The Assembly had a ten-minute recess before the report of the ballot of the other officers. After the recess the report of the ballot for the Camp Meeting Committee and the election of the State Secretary and the State Treasurer was read.

The Camp Meeting Committee elected by ballot who shall serve together with the State Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent are: W. A. Frye, R. W. Chateld, Edward Schoeff, George E. Huff and O. W. Barnes.

The State Secretary elected was Rev. E. J. Clem. The State Treasurer elected was R. W. Chatfield.

Moved and seconded that in case the Assistant Superintendent is called during the year to serve the assembly that his traveling expenses be met by the State fund and the matter of his enumeration be left with the State Council. Motion carried.

Motion to adjourn.

#### NIGHT SESSION, TUESDAY, AUGUST 22, 1922.

The night session opened with devotional services conducted by Rev. C. D. Jester. Prayer was offered by Bro. A. M. Ewing and the Assembly was called to order with the State Superintendent, Rev. A. M. Ewing, in the chair. Sisters Minnie Snyder and Miriam Auxier sang a special song entitled, "The Sweetest One of All Will Be Jesus." The following names were recommended for Ordination.

The reading of the minutes of the afternoon session was dispensed with and we proceeded to the Ordination service. The candidates for Ordination



took their places on the front seat and the members of the Ordination Council came to the platform.

Rev. Seth C. Rees of Pasadena, Calif., delivered the Ordination address. He spoke from the text, "Thou therefore endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ."

He especially emphasized the fact of the ministers being soldiers and called to hardness, sacrifice and "to suffer with Him." This address was inspiring and also one that will be remembered by many when they meet with hardness in the service of the ministry.

After the singing of the hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have" prayer was offered by Rev. W. S. Dean and a scripture lesson from I Tim. 3rd ch. was read by Rev. Edward Schoeff, a scripture lesson from 2 Tim. 4:1-8 by Rev. W. A. Frye and a lesson from Titus 2nd ch. by Rev. D. C. Shearer.

The candidates knelt at the altar and by prayer and the laying on of hands by the Ordination Council the following were duly Ordained:

Miriam Auxier, Kate D. Lacey, Edith Stearns, Martha Noggle, Ordained Deaconess; Rhetta Baughman, Frank Wheeler, Arthur McQueen, Clarence D. Jester, William P. Rice, Howard Beecher.

After which we sang "Blest Be The Tie That Binds" while the Assembly extended to those Ordained the right hand of fellowship.

Moved and seconded that we extend the time of this session for the election of delegates to the General Assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the vacancy on the list of delegates to the General Assembly be filled in. Carried. The number of Ministerial delegates and the number of lay delegates.

Moved and seconded that we ratify the list of delegates with the vacancies filled. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the delegates to the General Assembly meet at Lawrenceburg on Monday afternoon, October 2, for a service from 3 to 5 for instructions before going to the General Assembly at Cincinnati. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that if any of the delegation be lacking when we meet at the session in Lawrenceburg before going to the General Assembly that the vacancy be filled from the number of members of the Assembly who shall be present at the meeting in Lawrenceburg who were not previously elected as delegates. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that this Assembly elect two more lay delegates to the General Assembly and that John Payton and R. Lewis be elected as the delegates. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we invite the Illinois-Missouri delegation to meet with us at Lawrenceburg for the session from 3 to 5 p. m., October 2. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we have 200 copies of the Recommendations to the General Assembly printed. Motion carried.

Moved we adjourn.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION, AUGUST 23, 1922.

The devotional service of the morning session was conducted by Bro. Frank Myers and Bro. E. J. Clem offered prayer.

The State Chairman, Rev. A. M. Ewing called the Assembly to order. The roll call was dispensed with and the Minutes of the Tuesday afternoon session and night session were read and accepted.

Moved and seconded that the Recommendation to be presented to the General Assembly be copied and read. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the matter of the Home Missionary work in the South be referred to the Home Missionary Board. Motion carried.

The Home Missionary Board appointed by the Chair at this time is: W. S. Dean, E. J. Clem, Donald Snow, George E. Huff, and John W. Williams.

Moved and seconded that we elect the Assistant State Superintendent as State Evangelist. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that we receive the action taken on State Superintendent as to his two rounds and abide by the Manual. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we again take up election of officers. Motion carried.

The first vote was for three to serve as Advisory members on the State Council. The State Superintendent, Assistant State Superintendent, the State Secretary and State Treasurer serve on this Council by virtue of office according to Manual. The three elected to serve on this Board with the State officers are: W. A. Frye, George E. Huff and Edward Schoeff.

### THE REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE WAS READ AND RECEIVED.

Their report follows:

Resolution 1. In as much as our Assistant Superintendent, Rev. Edward Schoeff has been bereaved of his father, be it resolved that we extend our sympathy by a rising vote.

Resolution 2. In as much as the Lord has blessed us with a good Camp and especially favored us with such Spirit-filled evangelists and workers, be it resolved that we show our appreciation by rising and singing the Doxology.

Resolution 3. In as much as Bro. and Sis. Rassian and other outgoing missionaries are leaving us in November for an indefinite period and, perhaps until Jesus comes, Resolved: That we express our loyalty to them by a rising vote and grant five minutes to give us a farewell address.

The Foreign Missionary Treasurer, Sister Alice Hart, read the Foreign Missionary report. Moved and seconded that it be received. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the State Superintendent set the dates for the four Quarterly meetings. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we refer the matter of a Children's Catacism to the Educational Board and recommend that they bring in a Recommendation. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that all the Ministerial Delegates leave the Tabernacle and that the Lay Delegates meet with the State Superintendent to station preachers. Motion carried.

The Ministerial delegates left the Tabernacle and were out until the time of the evening session. Motion to adjourn carried.

#### MORNING SESSION, THURSDAY, AUGUST 24th, 1922.

After devotional services conducted by Rev. E. J. Clem the Assembly was called to order with the State Superintendent, A. M. Ewing, in the chair.

The roll call was dispensed with and the Minutes of the last session were read and accepted.

The Educational Board reported recommendations to be presented to the General Assembly in regard to the course of study. Moved and seconded that we adopt their recommendation. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that Article 11 passed on as a recommendation to the General Assembly be changed to correspond with the recommendations brought in by the Educational Board. Carried.

Moved we amend the Recommendation in regard to Children's Catacism. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we adopt the Recommendation as amended. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the Educational Board frame and present to the Assembly a Recommendation in regard to Lecture Course by Bro. G. C. Middleton. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that each preacher of the District be assessed \$1 to pay expense of clearing of the Camp Ground after the Assembly. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that the next Ministerial Convention shall devote at least two hours to Parliamentary practice of Robert's Rules of Order. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we rescind the part of the Recommendation by the Ways and Means Committee that was passed in regard to the division of the Budget for the different institutions and instruct the Committee to bring in another Recommendation covering this matter. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we re-wire the Camp Ground. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that the buildings on the Camp Ground be insured. Motion carried.

Moved and supported that the consideration of buildings to be insured be left in the hands of the State trustees. Motion carried.

The following Recommendation was presented by the Educational Board and adopted by the Assembly: We recommend that the Lecture course on the "Second Coming of Jesus" and "Bible Studies on the Second Work of Grace" by G. C. Middleton be sanctioned by this Assembly and all our preachers be urged to call him for a ten-days or two-weeks meeting.

A recommendation in regard to the apportioning of the Budget was presented by the Ways and Means Committee and adopted. The recommendation is as follows: We recommend that the Budget provided by this Assembly be divided: 50 per cent to State expenses, the remaining half as follows: Home Missions, 50 per cent; Foreign Missions, 12½ per cent; Rescue work, 12 1-2 per cent; Orphanage, 12 1-2 per cent, and Educational Institutions, 12 1-2 per cent.

Moved and seconded that, as Bro. John W. Williams is soon leaving for California, that the Secretary write him a letter of recommendation. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that, in as much as Bro. E. J. Clem has received communication in regard to Home Missionary work in Tennessee, that he

take up the matter with the General Home Missionary Board. Motion carried.

The Auditing Committee read a report which was accepted.

"We, the Auditing Committee, have examined the books of the District Foreign Missionary Treasurer and find them to be correct."

## **RECOMMENDATIONS TO BE PRESENTED TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.**

### **Article 1.**

#### **DIVORCE.**

Substitute for Paragraph 91, Page 39.

We are opposed to the great divorce evil as it now exists and no divorce, except for the cause of Adultery will be regarded by the church as legal. We hold that persons who have been divorced by civil law, where scriptural grounds for divorce did not exist, and have subsequently remarried are living in adultery and are therefore unworthy of membership in the church.

Our ministers shall not perform the marriage ceremony in any case where there is a divorced husband or wife. But this shall not apply to divorced parties seeking to be remarried. Matt. 5:32, Mark 10:1-12, 1 Cor. 7:10-11, and Luke 16:18.

### **Article 2.**

#### **CALLING A PASTOR.**

Substitute for Paragraph 75, Page 36.

An Ordained or Licensed minister may be called to the pastorate of a local church by a three-fourths vote of all the members present and voting at the annual business meeting.

### **Article 3.**

#### **CALLING A PASTOR.**

Substitute for Paragraph 75, Page 36.

When a pastor is called the church shall decide on the minimum salary to be paid him and shall make provisions for his traveling and moving expenses and, where the church has no parsonage they shall provide a house for the pastor.

### **Article 4.**

#### **CLASSES AND CLASS-LEADERS.**

Paragraph 132, Page 60.

Each local church shall hold weekly one or more class or prayer meetings, which shall consist of all the members of the church who can possibly attend. A Class Leader shall be elected at the Annual business meeting and, under the pastor, he shall have charge of the class or prayer meetings.

**Article 5.**  
**TWO GENERAL SUPERINTENDENTS.**

We recommend that the General Assembly elect two General Superintendents, instead of one General Superintendent and two Assistant Superintendents, and that they be paid a minimum salary so that they can devote their time more freely to the interest of the church in general.

We further recommend that one General Superintendent devote his time to the interest of our Foreign Missionary work.

**Article 6.**  
**AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE 36, PAGE 24.**

We recommend the amendment of Paragraph 36, Page 24 by striking out of the last line of the paragraph.

**Article 7.**  
**REINSTATING THE MINISTRY.**

Pp. 1. The General Superintendent, neither his assistant shall have the power to reinstate or renew the credentials of any preacher, in any District, who has been rejected, deposed or suspended for any cause, without the sanction of the State Superintendent and a majority vote of the State Council of the District where he or she was rejected, deposed or suspended.

Pp. 2. Any preacher, accused in writing of indiscretion or conduct unbecoming a minister, shall be investigated by the State Council who shall have power to suspend, pending the decision of the Annual Assembly. The accused shall have the right to an appeal to the General Assembly providing the appellate shall appear in person and present his grievance to the General Assembly in writing.

Pp. 3. If the offense of the minister be that of adultery the one making the accusation shall furnish the State Superintendent with a copy of the charges in writing, who shall bring the matter to the attention of the State Council, who after hearing the evidence in the case shall have the power to exonerate or suspend the accused until the Annual Assembly.

Pp. 4. If the accused shall be the State Superintendent the charges shall be made to his assistant or to the State Secretary, who shall proceed as in pp. 3, except that the General Superintendent shall be called to act as judge in the matter.

Pp. 5. In case the accused be the General Superintendent, the charges shall be presented to the Superintendent of the State where the misdemeanor was committed, who shall bring the matter to the attention of his assistant, or assistants, whose duty it shall be to call the General Council to hear the evidence in the case. The General Council shall have the power, if the evidence in the case is considered sufficient to suspend the accused from all his official functions. The accused shall have the right to an appeal to the General Assembly providing he, or she, appear in person and present their grievance in writing.

Pp. 6. Any minister, self confessed, or proven guilty of the act of adultery shall have his license revoked and be suspended from all his official duties and ministerial functions for the period of four years, and may, according to the judgment of the General Assembly, be permanently suspended. However, this does not deprive the appellant the right to an appeal to the General Assembly and, if in the judgment of the General Assembly, it is thought that permanent suspension is too severe they may reverse the decision of the Annual Assembly and fix such penalty as they deem just to the accused.

Pp. 7. Any Minister, convicted or suspended from his official duties shall not only be required to cease from his ministerial functions but shall be debarred by our churches from the use of their pulpits.

**Article 8.**  
**AMENDMENT OF PARAGRAPH 34, PAGE 22.**

We recommend the amendment of Paragraph 34, p. 22, by changing the word, "quadrennially" for word "biennially."

## Article 9.

### AMENDMENT OF PARAGRAPH 40, PAGE 25.

We recommend the amendment of the Manual by removing Par. 40, Page 25, from Chap. 6, dealing with the duties of the General Council to Chap. 5, dealing with the duties of the General Assembly.

## Article 10.

### ELECTION OF BOARDS.

Paragraph 35, Page 24.

We recommend the amendment of Art. 35, P. 24 of the Manual by adding a pp. 5 to Art. 35 as follows: It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to elect the following Boards, representing all the Districts:

1. General Board of Publication.
2. General Board of Education.
3. General Board of Home Missions.
4. General Board of Trustees of Kingswood College.
5. General Orphanage Board.
6. General Foreign Missionary Board.
7. General Rescue Board.

## Article 11.

### COURSE OF STUDY.

Substitute for Paragraph 163, Page 62.

(1) Habits of study, together with Biblical and other knowledge secured through them are invaluable to the preachers of our church. Therefore, to promote the same the General Assembly requests our denominational school, now located at Kingswood, Ky., to incorporate in their curriculum the course of study outlined in our Manual and adopted as the Course of study for our ministry.

(2) We urge all candidates for the Ministry to pursue the course of study in our denominational school if possible, if not, to take the same under the jurisdiction of their District Board of Education.

(3) The principal of our school shall furnish questions for examination to the Board of Education of each District.

Substitute for Paragraph 167, Page 62.

The examination of candidates shall be in the hands of a District Board of Education to consist of, at least, 3 members, one of whom shall be elected for 3 years, one for 2 years and one for 1 year.

The said Board shall be elected by the District Assembly and shall conduct examination for the benefit of those who are not able to take the course of study or its equivalent in school or by correspondence.

Substitute for Paragraph 170, Page 63.

Amending the pp. by striking out of the words, "the Superintendent of the Correspondence Department" and inserting the words, "their District Educational Board."

Substitute for Paragraph 171, Page 63.

The Licentiate pursuing the course of study may enter upon his work at once and examinations will be given at the completion of each study except those attending a school. A yearly report of the amount of work completed each year by the Licentiate attending our school will be sent by the Principal of the school to the Chairman of the Educational Board of their District before the yearly Assembly of that District. Yearly reports of all Licentiate will be a factor in deciding upon their fitness for advancement.

Substitute for Paragraph 173, Page 64.

When the course of study is completed a certificate of standing from the faculty of our school, or the Educational Board of their respective District shall be given each Candidate which shall be presented for consideration in deciding upon the fitness of the candidate for Ordination.

Substitute for Paragraph 191, Page 73.

**Course of Study for Deaconesses.**

Preliminary examination of the candidate in reading, writing and spelling.

**Article 12.**

We recommend that the General Assembly elect a Committee of not less than three to revise the Course of Study provided in the Manual, Paragraph 176, P. 64-65, especially providing for the study of the Bible, (not only books about the Bible) and other books which will promote the greatest spiritual, doctrinal and educational efficiency.

**Article 13.**

We recommend that the General Assembly adopt a Primary Instructor in the nature of a Catechism for use in the Primary and Intermediate Departments of our Sunday Schools in connection with the I. H. C. Sunday School literature.

**Article 14.**

Amendment to Paragraph 190, Page 72, Manual.

We recommend a regulation uniform for all Ordained Deaconesses of the I. H. church and that the uniform be a coat-suit and cap of navy blue.

**Article 15.**

**LICENSE OF DEACONESSSES.**

We recommend that the State Superintendent be empowered to grant Local Deaconess License.

**Article 16.**

Paragraph 94, Page 40.

We recommend that the 5th section of Paragraph 94, Page 40 be changed to read, "Do you believe in and practice the Bible teaching of tithing and will you cheerfully support your local church by this method?"

**Article 17.**

**DUTIES OF LOCAL PREACHERS.**

Paragraph 164, Page 61.

We recommend the amendment of pp. 164, p. 61, by inserting the words, "Perform the marriage ceremony, administer sacrament or baptise."

**Article 18.**

We recommend that the following paragraph be added to our Manual:

The District Council shall have power to declare vacant the office of any District Official who is proven untrustworthy and said District Council shall also have power to appoint some one to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unfinished term.
