Journal of the Session

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

THE twenty-first Indiana Annual Conference, of the Holiness Christian Church, convened on the Holiness camp ground, at Frankfort, Ind., Monday morning, August 28, 1916.

Song service, followed with prayer by J. W. Trout and G. C. Middleton. The 2 Cor. 6 chap., was the lesson which was read by Washington Sherman. The General Superintendent, W. G. Bogue, then delivered the annual conference address.

Conference was called to order with W. G. Bogue, in the chair. The conference roll was then called and revised.

Moved and seconded that the names of P. Belew, Versa Hyman, Bertha de Croes and U. T. Hollenback, be dropped from the conference roll, inasmuch as they had united with other denominations; and that the secretary be instructed to write a letter of recommendation for the latter in accordance with his request.

The minutes of the last session of the last annual conference were then read by the secretary and accepted.

It was agreed that the chair appoint all standing committees.

The General Superintendent brought greetings from the Illinois and Missouri Conference.

The following rules to govern this conference were adopted:

RULES GOVERNING CONFERENCE.

CONFERENCE BAR-First five rows of seats.

Hours of Session, 8:30 a.m., to 12. 1:30 p.m. to 5. Each session preceded by fifteen minutes devotional service.

No member leave the conference bar without permission of the chair.

Reports to be read without comment.

All members tardy at roll call give reasonable excuse for absence.

No member make more than one speech until every member had spoken who desired to do so, and then not without consent of the chair.

Roberts' Rules of Order were adopted.

R. L. Hollenback was chosen reporter for "A Voice From Canaan," and for the city papers.

On motion it was decided to have a committee on Reception appointed by the chair. A. M. Ewing, E. J. Clem, and P. Brichetto were appointed.

The reception committee introduced Rev. C. M. Emmerson, of Weatherly, Pa.; Rev. W. A. Frye, of New Carlisle, O.; Rev. J. H. Garretson, of Alexandria, Ind.; Rev. F. B. Wininger, of Watson, Ill., to the conference. They were given the right hand of fellowship by the chair and admitted into the conference as advisory members.

The following new classes and missions were received into the conference: Westport, North Anderson, Bicknell, Irvin, Gray Ridge, West Liberty and Terre Haute.

Moved and carried that we adjourn; Carried.

Benediction by Rev. Garretson.

FIRST DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

After devotional service the conference was called to order with W. G. Bogue, the General Superintendent, in the chair.

The first in order was the calling of the roll after which the minutes of

last session were read and accepted.

The following names were referred to the examining committee: Les Thornton, Marion French, Chas. W. Lamar. W. A. Garrett, W. A. Frye, E. F. Leffel, B. F. Wininger, Emory Clark, Oliver Barker, G. W. Chamberlin, Grover Colter, J. O. Eacret, Wayne Minton, S. Moore, Clarence Dye, Sam. W. Bland, O. W. Barnes, E. W. Wright, W. S. Adams, A. Holcondo, Jas. Pursley, Katie Nehmyer, E. Fulkerson, Lula Bowman, R. L. Hollenback, Martha Chancellor, Della Bowser, Charles Eddy, B. S. Cole, J. W. Ross and Bruce Benjamin.

The Pastoral reports were then taken up. (See tables).

After hearing the report of Hope class, conference, by an unanimous vote, showed their appreciation of the labors of E. J. Clem there, and of the members who assisted him.

Washington Sherman gave verbal reports for Bloomington, Midland, Diamond, North, and Mount Carmel. At the latter place he had dedicated the church, but there was no class there.

It was moved and seconded that the Mount Carmel church be received into this conference, as conference property. Carried.

I. J. Snider gave a verbal report for London, O.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Benediction by E. C. Rhoades.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The usual devotional service was held, after which conference was called to order by the General Superintendent, W. G. Bogue, who presided.

The next in order was the calling of the roll, after which the minutes of last session were read and accepted.

Moved and seconded that Rev. Brower, a local preacher of the Nazarene church, be received into this conference as an advisory member. Carried.

The class at Piedmont, Ala., was received into conference. It has 19 members, church building valued at \$1200, with only \$425 indebtedness.

Moved and seconded that Covington, Ky., be received into this conference as a mission. Carried.

The pastoral reports were continued. (See tables).

Moved and seconded that the church at Jackson Park, Indianapolis, be left with the P. E. Carried.

On motion Rev. A. H. Plunkett was received into the conference as an advisory member.

It was moved and seconded that Lizzie Jones be granted a letter of recommendation. Carried.

On motion it was decided that where the pastor failed to bring in a report the trustees must do so.

The evangelistic reports were then taken up. See tables.

At this juncture conference entered into a special season of prayer on behalf of B. H. and Anna Hines, Lillie Oliver and A. L. Whitcomb.

The treasurer's foreign missionary report was read and on motion it was received and referred to the auditing committee.

Beulah Rescue Home report was read and on motion it was received and referred to the auditing committee.

The report of Presiding Elder W. G. Bogue was received and referred to the statistical committee.

Rev. Thomas Baker, president of the Wesleyan Methodist Conference, and their fraternal delegate to this body, was received into the conference as an advisory member.

The general superintendent spoke concerning the church paper, "A Voice from Canaan."

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Benediction by Rev. Thos. Baker.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

After devotional service conference was again called to order by the General Superintendent, W. G. Bogue.

The roll was called and the minutes of the last session read and accepted.

Rev. Thos. Baker, the president and fraternal delegate from the Wesleyan Methodist conference, then addressed the conference. His excellent speech was much appreciated by the conference.

The general superintendent responded. He called attention to the good relations that existed between the two bodies and hoped they would continue.

The examining committee brought in a partial report.

They recommended, 1: That Marion French be granted first year itinerant license.

- 2: That Charles L. Eddy be granted first year itinerant license.
- 3: That W. A. Frye be received as an ordained elder for one year on trial.

These brethren came forward and after answering the questions required by the discipline, retired.

On motion the recommendations of the committee were adopted. After

these three brethren returned they were received into the conference by the general superintendent and welcomed by the whole assembly.

Moved and seconded that chair appoint a committee of five on Elders and Districts. Carried.

Chair appointed Joe Berry, Sam Stevenson and W. H. Barnes, lay, and G. C. Middleton and Geo. Huff, ministerial.

The report of the Burial Association was read by the treasurer.

On motion this was received and referred to the auditing committee.

Evangelistic reports continued. See reports.

Pastoral reports continued. See reports.

The committee on Elders and Districts reported 1st: We recommend that there remain as now two districts, and that there be two presiding elders elected for them, one for each district.

Moved and seconded that this recommendation be adopted. Carried.

2nd: We recommend that each Presiding Elder make annually two calls to each class and mission, viz, on the first and fourth rounds, and that the other two quarterly meetings be held by the pastor.

Moved and seconded that we accept this recommendation. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we enter into the election of officers for the ensuing year. Carried

The following nominations were made for the office of Presiding Elders: George Huff, Edward Schoeff, John W. Clark, Washington Sherman and A. M. Ewing.

George Huff and Edward Schoeff received the highest number of votes.

On motion, conference made their election unanimous. George Huff, P. E., for the South district, and Edward Schoeff, P. E., for the North district.

N. Bradshaw was unanimously re-elected conference secretary and W. E. Bradley was again chosen as assistant secretary.

A collection was taken up of \$16.05 cash, and \$4.00 in pledg's, to help pay the amount borrowed by the publishing office from the Conference.

Moved and seconded that this conference go on record as favoring the removal of "A Voice From Canaan" from Carlinville, Ill., to Frankfort, Ind. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the two presiding elders and the secretary be a committee to confer with the General Conference trustees as to the removal of the publishing office. Carried.

Sam W. Bland was re-elected conference treasurer by acclamation.

Moved and seconded that we extend the time till supper bell rings. Carried.

W. G. Bogue resigned his office as conference trustee and A. M. Ewing's time had expired. A. M. Ewing and J. W. Clark were chosen, by acclamation, to fill the places.

Moved and seconded that this conference ratify the election of Alice

Hart, as president of the Woman's Prayer Band. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Lost.

Katie and Hattie Dunkelberger and Lillian Rodgers were unanimously

elected as members of the Foreign Mission Prayer Band.

Moved and seconded that the annual conference trustees be empowered by this annual conference, to sell all vacated church property when there is no chance for reviving same, and purchase Gospel tents with the proceeds. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Benediction by Edward Schoeff, P. E.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

After the usual devotional service, W. G. Bogue, Gen. Supt., again presided.

The first in order was the calling of the roll, followed by reading of the minutes, which on motion were accepted.

The chair read a telegram from C. C. Brown, announcing the decision of the Illinois Administration Board to renew the Orphanage license, on condition that the trustees make some improvements on the property.

Moved and seconded that this conference go on record as favoring the continuation of the Orphanage, and that we move it to a more favorable location as soon as possible. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we instruct Bro. Brown that this conference goes on record as favoring the necessary improvements to retain the Orphanage, and that the board of trustees put a second mortgage on property to pay for the expenses. Carried.

On motion, it was decided to have a Foreign Missionary Committee of five members.

The following were unanimously chosen to serve on the committee: G. C. Middleton, I. J. Snider, J. Higginbotham, J. W. Clark and Alice Hart.

Moved and carried that the Camp Meeting Board be a committee of nine, three of whom shall be lay members, and that they serve without fail and without pay.

The following were chosen for the committee: G. W. Kelley, Frank Percy, and O. S. Sheets, lay, and O. W. Barnes, P. Brichetto, I. J. Snider, A. M. Ewing, Sam W. Bland, and C. A. Fouts, ministerial

On motion, P. E. Edward Schoeff was elected by acclamation as fraternal delegate to the Wesleyan Methodist conference.

Moved and carried that the general superintendent carry greetings from this conference to the Kansas and Oklahoma conference. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we give our General Superintendent a hearty invitation to attend our next annual conference. Carried.

The treasurer read his report, which was accepted and referred to the auditing committee.

Rev. A. L. Whitcomb was admitted to the conference as an advisory member.

The Examining Committee reported. See reports.

Moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to send a letter of greetings to the Pennsylvania conference. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we have a recess of five minutes before entering into the ordination service. Carried.

After recess a blessed ordination service was held when Sam W. Bland was duly ordained.

Moved and seconded that J. W. Clark be financial agent to raise money for the Tabernacle. Carried.

Moved and seconded that he be allowed 20% and he pay his own expenses. Lost.

Moved and seconded that he be allowed 25% and pay his own expenses. Carried.

On motion it was decided that I. J. Snider be granted the exclusive use of the tent 35x56 that is now being used in Covington, Ky.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Benediction by A. L. Whitcomb.

THIRD DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

After devotional service, the Gen. Supt., W. G. Bogue, presided.

The roll was called and minutes were read and accepted.

Examining committee reported further. (See reports).

Statistical committee reported. See table.

Ways and Means committee reported. See reports.

Moved and seconded that chair appoint a committee of 3 to apportion the new classes. Carried.

Chair appointed C. A. Fouts, K. H. Jackson and W. H. Barnes.

Moved and seconded that all the preachers who are members of this conference shall have their membership in the annual conference and not in the local church. Carried.

Moved and seconded that where pastors are not eligible to hold quarterly meetings, they call in one that is eligible to hold the second and third quarterly meetings.

It was decided that when a class, or mission, calls on the P. E. to make a special trip, it must pay his expenses and remunerate him for his services.

On motion the ways and means committee was directed to meet and bring in further recommendations concerning Burial Association and Home Missionary work.

Moved and seconded that the vacancies on the Burial board be filled by the re-election of the same officers. Carried.

Committee on Resolutions reported. See reports.

On motion conference showed their appreciation of the Gen. Supt.'s faithful services, as conference Presiding Elder, by a rising vote.

Moved and seconded that each class make a comfort for next camp meeting. Carried.

The auditing committee reported.

Moved, seconded, and carried that it be received.

Moved and seconded that we pay the amount due the Assistant P. E., Washington Sherman. Carried.

Moved and seconded that next year's camp meeting commence on Thursday night. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the management of the tents be left to the presiding elders. Carried.

On motion it was decided to extend the time till supper bell rings.

On motion it was decided to carry on the Beneficiary work the same as last year. The pastor, class leader, secretary and treasurer of each class constitute the beneficiary board of each class. Each member pay 10 cents monthly to the steward of the board, to help our worthy needy.

Moved and seconded that we hold a night session commencing at 7 o'clock. Carried.

Ways and Means Committee recommended:

1st. That each pastor be an agent for the Burial Association.

2nd. That each pastor preach a sermon and take an offering for Home Missionary work.

On motion these recommendations were received.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn. Carried.

Benediction by George Huff.

THIRD DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

After devotional service conference was called to order by the Gen. Supt., who presided.

Moved and seconded that we dispense with the roll call and the reading of the minutes. Carried.

Moved and seconded that J. R. Oldham and wife be recommended to this conference's Foreign Missionary Board, as missionaries to Central America. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the secretary be paid \$15 for his services the same as last year. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that inasmuch as this camp meeting is conference camp meeting, that none of our preachers make any engagement that will conflict with camp meeting date. Carried.

Moved and seconded that this conference order the secretary to pay the Burial Association \$15 as soon as possible. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Assistant P. E., Washington Sherman, have a seat on the stationing committee. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet after preaching service. Carried.

Adjournment.

Stationing committee retired.

Rev. C. M. Emmerson, of Weatherly, Pa., preached to the congregation. On re-assembling, the Gen. Supt. again presided.

Moved and seconded that W. A. Garrett be referred to his P. E. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the names of W. E. Ketchum. Bruce Benjamin and J. W. Ross be referred to the P. E.'s Carried.

Moved and seconded that J. H. Overmyer's name be stricken from the conference roll, inasmuch as he has joined the M. E. church. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Emory Clark's name be dropped from the conference roll. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the apportionment committee report through Voice. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we send a letter of greetings to the Illinois and Missouri conference. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we release D. L. Sailor for the amount he was behind, as Treasurer of the Beneficiary fund, at last year's conference. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we take up a collection for last year's treasurer. Carried.

Collection amounted to \$1.89.

The report of the Stationing committee was then read by the secretary, Mary St. Clair.

The Gen. Supt. gave a few words of advice.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

EXAMINING.

We further recommend that:—Samuel W. Bland be duly ordained.

Leslie Thornton be granted first year itinerant license, after passing examination and answering questions by the P. E.

W. S. Adams, Samuel Moore, O. W. Barnes, J. Pursley, Oliver Barker, Clarence Dye, and Albert Holcomb be granted second year's itinerant license.

E. W. Wright, G. W. Chamberlin, Grover Colter, J. O. Eacret, E. Fulkerson, be granted renewal of itinerant license.

Inasmuch as Frank Wininger has held itinerant license in our church for three years, that he be received back into this conference with renewal of second year's itinerant license.

Inasmuch as Chas. W. Lamar has held itinerant license in our church and is coming back to us from the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene, he be granted renewal of itinerant license.

Lulu Bowman and Roy L. Hollenback be granted second year evangelistic license.

Della Bowser and Katie Nehmyer be granted renewal of evangelistic license.

Edward F. Leffel, coming to us from the Brethren In Christ church, be received as an ordained preacher on trial for a year after being duly examined by his P. E.

Martha Chancellor be received into the conference as an ordained preacher after answering the questions.

Wayne Minton be referred to his P. E.

The name of B. S. Cole be stricken from the conference roll.

WAYS AND MEANS.

- I. We recommend inasmuch as tithing is Scriptural and according to our discipline, that each pastor preach, practice, and urge his members to tithe, and with pencil and paper, keep account with God, said money to be paid into the local church treasury.
- II. Inasmuch as we have launched our own mite box plan for our missionary work and have our own missionaries to support, we recommend:
- 1st. That each pastor assist in launching the mite box plan by acting as secretary on his charge or appointing a secretary.
- 2nd. That the pastor report a minimum amount to be raised for foreign missionary work during the year.
- III. That each member of the local church over 18 years, be assessed 50c as a membership fee. (Apportionment).
- 1V. That each member of the conference pay into the conference treasury at least ¼ of his or her tithe, said tithe to be used as an extension fund.
- V. That the minimum amount of \$500 on the Northern District and \$600 on the Southern District be given our Presiding Elders. said money to

be raised by apportioning the local class according to its ability and to be paid in equal quarterly amounts. In case the above amounts are not raised on the districts, the conference will make up the deficiency.

VI. A rousing free will offering be taken the first Sunday morning of

the camp meeting for the general superintendent.

VII. Inasmuch as the support of many of our pastors in the past has not been sufficient, that the P. E. see that each class promise a minimum amount to be paid weekly, monthly, or quarterly, and that we use the envelope system.

VIII. That each pastor and evangelist act as agent for the "Voice From Canaan," take new subscriptions, secure renewals, and inform the edi-

tor of those who wish the paper discontinued.

IX. That each class give at the rate of one cent a week each member for the publication of "Voice From Canaan"

X. If any church give the elder an extra call they must pay his expenses and give proper remuneration.

XI. In organizing a mission, the pastor, or evangelist, appoint a superintendent. The latter to keep the names of all members and see that the pastor and P. E. be paid.

XII. The conference pay the traveling expenses of the presiding elders.

XIII. That each pastor be an agent for the Burial Association.

AUDITING COMMITTEE.

We, the auditing committee, have examined the reports of the Foreign Missionary treasurer, and Beulah Rescue Home, and find them correct.

W. G. Bogue, P. E.'s traveling expenses we find a mistake of 3 cents on the second round. Balance due to him of \$10.70.

W. S. Bogue P. E.'s salary due \$500, received \$473.65; balance due \$26.35.

Washington Sherman, Asst. P. E.'s salary, due \$600, received \$546.67. Balance due \$53.33.

We find the treasurer's book correct.

The Holiness Christian Burial Association received \$85.50, paid out \$15.00; balance in treasury \$70.50.

Therefore, be it resolved, That we as a conference express to Sister Julian our heartfelt sympathy by addressing to her a letter of condolence and a suitable memoir be inserted in the conference minutes.

H.

"Grateful to Almighty God for the rising tide of public sentiment which is sweeping toward national and world-wide prohibition of the liquor traffic, rejoicing at the rapidly changing tone of the public press, the closing of its

columns to liquor advertisements, the emphatic pronouncements of medical science, the entrance into the prohibition ranks of the manufacturing and business interests of the nation, and the increasing recognition by the industrial classes of alcohol's menace to the workers' safety and welfare; we denounce the traffic as a grave and imminent national peril.

"It is the one most prolific cause of insanity, crime and poverty; the most insidious despoiler of legitimate business; the most corrupt and demoralizing influence in politics, and the most dangerous enemy to human

welfare in all our civic life.

"Statesmanship, ecclesiastical and civil. has denounced it; science has condemned it; business is arraying itself against it; politics is struggling to be freed from its grasp; labor seeks to escape from its degrading, merciless bondage, and the embattled nations of half a world find it a more deadly foe than any they have met on war's red fields.

"The expansion of religion and the preservation of civilization require

its overthrow—its complete and utter annihiliation.

"To the consummation of this high achievement we do now and here solemnly covenant with each other and with God, our Father, and pledge ourselves to fight and spare not until the end shall have been attained."

III.

Inasmuch as the reform movements relative to the liquor traffic and social reform are taking the time and talent of the church and whereas there is a failure on the part of the church in bearing the burden of souls.

Therefore, be it resolved that our brethren be careful to be not entangled in the reform movements to the sacrifice of the soul agonies that should characterize the people of God."

Therefore be it resolved that we express our appreciation of his service by a rising vote and thereby pledge our prayers for his speedy recovery and continued usefulness in the ministry.

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN H. JULIAN passed away to be with Jesus, October 6, 1915, at his home in Elwood, Ind., aged 64 years and 3 months, having been born in July, 1851.

Brother Julian was a good Christian at the time he joined the Elwood class in 1906. His life from then on proved him to be a consistent follower of Jesus, always active in the Master's service, commanding the respect and confidence of his fellow citizens. He served his time as a local preacher, and, in 1908, on the recommendation of his class, was admitted into the Indiana annual conference, as an Itinerant preacher.

Continuing to be faithful and zealous, conference, in 1909, selected him as their Home Missionary, ordained him the following year, and in 1913 elected him to its highest office, viz, that of Presiding Elder; the Northern District being the one he labored in. He served in this position one year, his health not permitting him

to continue longer.

Brother Julian was a successful evangelist, a faithful holiness advocate, and a firm believer in divine healing. He was a humble man, sweet spirited, went about doing good, and won many friends.

A good evidence of his Christian character and the influence of his godly life was the large concourse of people, fully 1800, who attended his funeral to pay their last tribute of love and respect. It took place in the large Union Meeting Tabernacle at Elwood. The discourse was preached by W. G. Bogue, P. E., from Daniel 12:3. He was assisted by Elders J. W. Clark, J. W. Trout, A. M. Ewing, Ed. Schoeff, and others. The pastors of the different city churches acted as pall bearers.

A beloved and faithful widow, Sarah Julian, and the son, Edgar Julian, survive him. May the Comforter console the bereft.

Those who were at the 1915 conference will never forget his farewell to them: "Brethren, good-bye, if we never meet here again, we will meet just inside the Eastern Gate."

He was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery at Elwood, Ind. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."
