CONFERENCE MINUTES

The 55th Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the district camp grounds at Culloden, W. Va., Wednesday at 2:00 P. M. with Rev. Parker Husselton, District Superintendent, in Charge. Rev. Alan Ledford, pastor at Baileysville, led the conference in singing the opening song, What a Friend we have in Jesus. Rev. L. K. Davis led the conference in prayer. Dr. Melvin Snyder, presiding officer, was introduced to the conference by the District Superintendent.

Dr. Snyder told us that we are wealthy when we have people praying for us. Dr. Snyder read to us from Saint Matthew the eighth chapter and the fifth thru the thirteenth verses. His text was from Hebrews, the eleventh chapter and the first and second verses. He told us of the miracle of the centurian's faith. This was an unusual faith which was so great that it caused Jesus to marvel. This faith produced love. Christ declared that the centurian had more faith than his mother Mary or the apostles John and Peter. Christ stated that, "I have not found so great faith".

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be it resolved that lease holders of lots on Campground be urged to plan to build on them in the next three years, so improvements can be made on camp ground. Be it further resolved that all future lease contracts contain a clause that building must be begun within three years. Extension of time may be granted by District Council.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved that the dead line for receiving a deposit on rooms be set at May 15 and in event no deposit on rooms is received the Registrar be authorized to advertise the room for rent on June 15, and the first \$2.00 deposit secures it. Be it further resolved that in the event a lock is placed on a room an identifiable key must be filed with the Registrar in order that the room may be used if necessary.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Be it resolved that we work toward a closer relationship and colaboration between the District Sunday School and youth work. (a) That each zone have one meeting quarter especially designed for Sunday School promotion. (b) Zone chairmen visit each church in their respective zones in interest of Sunday School and youth work at least once during the year.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Be it resolved that Mother's Day be designated as District Sunday School Rally Day.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- No. 1. We recommend that the United Stewartship Fund be based on \$8.00 per member.
 - No. 2. We recommend that the District Minutes be sold at 25¢ per copy.
- No. 3. We recommend that each church, upon the official visit of the District Superintendent, raise the following amounts: Churches who have under forty members, \$6.00; with forty or over, \$8.50 per visit.
- No. 4: We recommend that the District Budget be set at \$4,000.00 and be divided as follows:

District Printing	
District Secretary	100.00
District Treasurer	200.00
District Home Missions	500.00
Incidental and general Conference	200.00
District Camp and Conference	400.00
District Sunday School	100.00

- No. 5. We recommend that the District Budget and the United Stewardship Fund be raised in the following manner; Each church shall send to the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all World Missionary Offering, Y.P.S. offering and Eyangelist pay.
- No. 6. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$4,200.00 per year plus traveling expenses at the rate of .06 per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner: \$2,200.00 as provided for in the budget; offerings taken when he visits the churches; half-tithes of all District pastors and and evangelists, except evangelists who are members of the Pilgrim Pension Plan; also \$12.00 a year from tithes of other district and local preachers except those of the age of 65 or over.
- No. 7. We recommend that the Superintendent's full ministerial tithes be placed in the Incidental and International Conference Expense Fund. These Ministerial tithes to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.
- No. 8. We recommend that each voting member be assessed \$1.00 per year. This money is to be sent by the local church treasurer and be divided equally between the district parsonage and district camp and conference accounts.
- No. 9. We recommend that the District Parsonage payment be obtained by taking \$80.00 per month out of the over-all budget.
- No. 10. We recommend the continuation of the District Home Missions Calendar offerings.
- No. 11. We recommend a charge of 6.00 for all rooms except the rooms with $4 \cdot \text{beds}$ these are to be \$10.00. We further recommend a charge of \$3.00 per person in dormitories for the entire camp and 35ϕ for one night.
- No. 12. We recommend that a charge for meals for the entire camp be as follows:

18 yrs. and over	1.00
Under 18	2.00
Under 2	
Single Meals	

No charge shall be made for ordained and licensed ministers from other Districts.

No. 13. We recommend that each church send to District Treasurer for District Conference Expense: \$2.00 for pastor and \$2.00 for each delegate and licensed and ordained ministers and ordained deaconesses.

Meals for Conference members' children as follows:

Under 12 yearsMeals free
Over 12 years25¢ per meal
(or work under direction of committee to be appointed by council)

No. 14. We recommend that one-half of the Mother's Day Sunday School offering be designated for District Sunday School Department.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

RESOLUTION NO. 4.

Whereas, The camp ground has been laid out in streets and lots, and

Whereas leases to these lots have been offered for sale over a number of years, and

Whereas, many of the leases have been sold, and

Whereas some leases have been built upon, and other cottages are in the planning stage, therefore

Be it resolved that permission in writing be granted by the district Council for lease holders to live on the camp grounds.

Be it further resolved that the lease holder be required to pay for utilities and.

Be it further resolved that the District Council set the rate of payment and that the council be guided in rate setting by the size of the cottage and the number of persons occupying it.

And be it further resolved that if at the demise of the lease holder, the heirs or assigns be judged by the District Council to be persons not in harmony with the spirit, intents, and purposes of the camp, the property shall be sold as follows:

A notice shall be caused to be posted on the building by the District Council for a period of six months of intentions to sell. The property to be sold at the best available price and the proceeds of the sale to be turned over to the heirs or assigns. The council shall be required to notify the heirs or assigns at the time of posting the building, of intent to sell, by registered mail. Not more than \$50 shall be retained by the District Council for the expenses of the sale.

The resolution was ammended that paragraph five read as follows:

Be it resolved that permission in writing be granted by the District Council for retired and disabled ministers to live on the camp grounds. Ammendment to the resolution carried, resolution as ammended carried.

- 1920-Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treas, monthly. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.

- 1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

- 1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolutions Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.
- 1944-Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.
- 1946-Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for for our camp. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an agressive Home Missionary Program in this District.

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west and crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U.S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amenable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board of Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

- 1946-Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp. calling the people to prayer, and that everyone everywhere on the camp grounds kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.
- 1947-Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESLOVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not to be applied to his present salary.
- 1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meetings, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951-

No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4-Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

- No. 5—That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.
- No. 6—That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.
- No. 10—Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room, Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.
- No.14—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preference being given to a family with children.
- No. 7—We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 7% into pension fund.

1954-

No. 2-Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to superivse weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

1955-

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and ½ of the profits go into the District Youth treasury.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year.

1956 -

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that our district use the report blanks that are provided by the general church. Adopted.

Resolution No. 2—Be it resolved that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3—Be it resolved that the local church treasurer send copies of the financial report to the district treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 4—Be it resolved that lunch the stand and registration office remain closed until altar invitation is over. Adopted.

Resolution No. 6—Be it resolved that our district conference convene on Wednesday at 1:30~p.m. through Thursday 5:00~p.m. preceeding the camp meeting. Adopted.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To General Superintendent Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, Delegates, Pastors and friends of the Fifty Fifth Annual Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings in the Name of our Lord.

We look back over the past conference year, and try to evaluate, and report at least some of the many mercies, and blessings God has given us as a District. We desire to bow our head and give Him all the Glory for His presence and leadership. This has been a good year. Many battles have been fought and victories won. Souls have been saved and several of our Churches have enjoyed gracious revivals.

This Conference year started out with a visitation of the Holy Ghost on our Camp and Conference. I should like to mention this first, because for us as Pilgrims, this is the most important. All other accomplishments fade and loose their value unless we have a moving and drawing of the Blessed Holy Spirit. God was pleased to give us a visitation of His Spirit last Camp meeting time. Several of the young people who prayed through at that time have attended Bible College this year, have returned home to be a blessing in their local Churches and in the District. This revival spirit was felt throughout the District in our Churches and Sunday Schools and several of our faithful pastors rejoiced to see new people added to God's Kingdom and the Churches Membership. Spiritual revival in our Sunday School and Churches is the answer to the most of our problems. As your District Superintendent and Brother, I join you in your prayers and efforts to promote such a revival in our Zion.

The pastors and the people have been wonderful to wife and me as we travel over the District this year. All of our time and strength have been given to our District Work. We held several revivals among the smaller churches. Two Revivals were conducted in our home missionary Churches with some encouraging visible results in each church. We gave our personal attention and ministry under God to try to encourage the faithful pastors and enter into their problems and burdens. Reports of this nature fail to reveal a complete picture of the need, the faith, the courage, of the pastors and the faithful laymen in our two Home Missionary Churches.

In the District Work no church, regardless of how small it is has been neglected. Every Church we visited we found some of God's true Saints holding the standard of true Bible Holiness. This is important. I sometimes think that it is not always how much grain we have or how many bushels we have that is the most important, but does the grain or the seed we do have contain life in it. Is it alive? If it is it will grow and multiply. A small amount of seed filled with real life germ is more valuable than many bushels without any life. The work of our District will grow and prosper and develope as pleases God if we will keep ourselves and our people in contact with the Author of this Life.

HOME MISSIONARY CHURCHES

Bluefield-has shown a gain in finances and spiritual developement. The future of this work looks brighter and better than it has for sometime. We all rejoice with the faithful pastors, Bro. and Sis. Miller, because of a definite moving of the spirit in the last few months.

Morgantown—this work has about held its own this year. Several fine improvements have been made on the property; this has added to the appearance and value of the same. Bro. Davis, the pastor, spent many hours of manual labor to see this accomplished. We plan to put our best again this year into the development of a soul saving center in Morgantown. Please pray for the Home Missionary Work in your District. Thanks and appreciation from myself and these Home Missionary Workers for your faithfulness in prayer and giving for this important work of these Districts.

PROPERTY AND IMPROVEMENTS

Bramwell—Bro. L. K. Davis and his fine members have done a great job of remodeling and redecorating the Church Building. New seats have been installed, a fine garage erected on the parsonage property. Everyone in Bramwell knows there is a Pilgrim Holiness Church in town. The growth in Sunday School and Church membership will be revealed in the statistical report. God has really blessed Bramwell this year.

Baileysville—Bro. Ledford and his people really caught the vision this year. The Church Building has been redecorated inside and out; new floors and seats installed. This has been done for God's glory, and He has honored them. The Sunday School has purchased a very good Bus at an almost unbelievable low price. All this has made a definite contribution to the wonderful increase in Sunday School attendance and Church Membership.

Lorton's Lick has done well this year although they have been without a regular Pastor most of the time. New concrete steps have been added to the entrance of the Church, which shows a marked improvement.

Mount Hope Church also installed new front concrete steps. Bro. Hankins is pastor.

The Church at Logan, which was flooded last year, has gone through a period of real testing. After many weeks of investigation and checking on possible new locations out of the flood zone, a vacant Church and parsonage was purchased at a very reasonable price. The seats and pulpit furniture were included. This equipment is worth half the price paid for the entire property. This property is being remodeled and redecorated; most of the work is being done by the pastor and the people.

Wayne Church has done something this year few churches ever do. Most Churches put their roofs up; Wayne Church took theirs down. The ceiling and roof of the church was much too high. The entire roof was lowered several feet, and a new ceiling installed. All this has made a great improvement. Here again the pastor and the people took a major part.

Nine Mile Church remodeled Sunday School rooms in their basement. All the Church was redecorated. New windows installed in the basement Sunday School room. General improvement is shown on the entire property.

Parkersburg First purchased a fine large Sunday School Bus. This bus is now in operation and is making a real contribution to the attendance of the Sunday School.

Coal Branch Heights has redecorated the floors in their Church, and also installed several feet of much needed concrete side walk.

Cuzzart Church has redecorated inside and outside. Some much needed repairs have been made. A large new furnace was installed. All this makes a definite improvement.

Terra Alta has remodeled their Church basement making several nice, well arranged Sunday School rooms. This work has been done mostly by the pastor and the people.

Barboursville installed a complete new roof and ceiling on their Church. This is much appreciated by all.

Nellis Congregation is in the process of building a new Church at this time. The pastor and his people have taken time off to come to Camp Meeting. This new Church building is located near the center of the town of Nellis. It is of masonary construction, will have about ten Sunday School class rooms, and a fine auditorium 34x60 feet in size. The entire building will be heated with two forced air furnaces. This makes our third new Church constructed in the District in the last three years; not including the new basement Church built last year at Morgantown.

Several other Churches have made minor repairs to their Church buildings and parsonages. This all seems to indicate that the Lord is helping in West Virginia.

CAMP GROUND IMPROVEMENTS

First: New floor in kitchen. New storage space and cupboard for equipment. New exhaust fan installed in kitchen. Redecorated the kitchen; and new tableware equipment.

Second: New siding on the Prayer Chapel.

Third: New roof on the Tabernacle.

Fourth: A complete new sanitary system, including twenty complete showers

and eight toilets, four lavoratories and four hot water heaters, and a 3,000 gallon septic tank.

Many other fine improvements too numerous to mention. We now have a fine and adequate supply of pure fresh water, provided by the Culloden Water Works. For all this we thank God.

YOUTH WORK

The Youth Camp this year was well attended and the teaching staff was one of the best the young people have ever had. The Gospel was presented each evening in the Evangelistic Services, and a goodly number of our young people sought the Lord. We plan for and look forward to another great Youth Camp next year.

The Zone work was carried on by the Zone Leaders this year, and interesting rallies were conducted.

The District Youth raised and paid for the following improvement on the Camp Ground: \$200.00 on new Tabernacle roof; \$150.00 on new floor in kitchen. Western Zone gave \$20.00 on new tableware for the dining room. Our District Youth President, Bob Kincaid, will no doubt give us a full review of the Young People work of the District in his report.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Our Sunday Schools have been a real source of inspiration and encouragement this year. Almost every pastor has a real vision of the possibilities of a growing Sunday School. Some Sunday Schools have gone away over the top. Others have made some gains. The actual condition of our Sunday Schools will be revealed in the Report of the District Sunday School Board. Rev. Grindstaff is Chairman.

We have enjoyed the fellowship and cooperation of our fine brethren on the District Council. Without the faithful labors of the dedicated pastors and laity of the West virginia District, our hands would have been tied. It has been through your work of faith, and labor of love and patience of hope, that we have been able to make some progress.

To Bro. Snyder, our General Superintendent, and members and friends of the West Virginia District.

Due to the fact that we were not appointed to this office until after camp meeting last year has hindered in planning, and progressing as we would like to have done. We do thank the Lord for His blessing and the good response to our efforts.

We spoke briefly, in the interest of Missions, both home and foreign in a number of churches, and several zone rallies. Also one service in the Ministerial Meeting was scheduled for that subject, especially on the District level. Several churches are endeavoring to get Missionary Societies started, and established, among their people. We greatly appreciate the interest, and regret that we have not been able to give more personal encouragement.

When the Health Inspector visited the grounds, during the Youth Camp, he was well pleased with all, except for the cracked and chipped dishes which he emphstically insisted "they must go." All surplus funds will be applied to the purchase of dishes.

At the last meeting of the Western Zone a gift of \$20.00 was given toward the purchase of spoons which were much needed. We want to extend our thanks for this gift of love.

As your District Missionary Society President, I thank you most sincerely for your response to the projects, on the District level. Also I greatly appreciate your interest in World Missions.
