This conference year is more than half This conference year is more than half over. What of our achievements? The high-lights are the dedication of a new church at South San Gabriel, the dedication of a new parsonage at Fresno, and the dedication of our new Administration and class-room building at P.B.I. Many of our churches have made major improvements and some are still in the process of building and beautifying their places of worship. To mention all would require more space than has been allotted to me in this issue of the news. to me in this issue of the news.

It is gratifying to see the response that our pastors and churches are making with regard to the new budget system of the District. Let us make it 100% this year.

Some of our churches are showing outstanding growth in the Sunday School, while others have experienced heavy losses. It is not enough merely to build our Sunday School average attendance; we must stabilize our work by training teachers and by winning our children and their parents to Christ and to the Church. The failure to hold our Sunday School and church attendance should disturb us to the extent that something will be done to correct the losses. We must build for stronger individual churches.

Special prayer is asked for our home missionary churches; namely, Coolidge, South Phoenix, Dixon and Yucaipa. It is still necessary for the District to carry part of the financial load for each of these; thus, it handicaps future projects unless we go farther in debt. Our new works at Tucson and Carlsbad have not as yet been any expense to the District. Tucson Second has been self supporting from the beginning and the Carlsbad work being sponsored by the Santa Ana urch. We have Pilgrims living in a Church. number of Northern California cities who have contacted us with regard to promoting Pilgrim work. From eight to ten thousand dollars is needed to buy the required amount of land and build a first unit building in most of these cities. We must have the blessing of God and the coopera-tion of His people. Let us go forward! Lundy Hill

acclaimed the winner, and received the achievement Bible, a lovely reward for her diligent efforts.

For learning the most scriptures, Miss Anna Hooker will have her name engraved on the beautiful trophy that will be placed in the lobby of the new administration building. The Athenian Society, whose members quoted the most scriptures, will have its name engraved on a bronze plate also to be placed in the new building.

The Scripture Contest was followed by an action-filled football game in which the Trojan society won over the Iconians, 19 to 12, making them the football champions of P.B.I. this year.

Much in the way of produce was brought in during the day and each church had a table displaying its offering. Twenty-five churches responded: East Pasadena, Rees Memorial, Pomona, Ojai, Lynwood, Bell Gardens, South San Gabriel, Tucson First, San Dimas, El Monte, Santa Ana, Corona, San Diego, South Gate, East Los Angeles, Buena Park, Redondo Beach, Los Angeles First, Long Beach, Rosemead, Oakview, Chino, Adams Memorial, and San Fernando

The climax of the day's activities was the evening dedication service of the new Administration Building. There was a film showing the story of the building from ground-breaking to occupancy, after which Dr. Arnold Hodgin brought the dedicatorial message, emphasizing that if people build with a purpose, God will be present, He will perpetuate the work and his people will have the protection of the presence of the Holy Spirit. This dedication brought to a climactic peak the realization that a twenty-year ideal has at last become a tangible reality.

A DREAM COME TRUE

In the fall of 1932, the Holiness Evangelistic Institute, as Pilgrim Bible Institute was then named, opened with Rev. Ray W. Carter as president, and Rev. James R. Adams, the school's founder, as vice president.

At that time the only buildings on the grounds were the tabernacle, the cafeteria, the three cottages east of the present girls' dormitory, the two rows of cottages west of the tabernacle, and a few walled tents that were used as sleeping quarters for some of the boys.

The local church, now meeting as the Pilgrim Holiness Church on Klingerman Avenue, met in the west wing of the tabernacle.

At the beginning of the second year of operation, Reverend Adams was elected president. He immediately saw the need of more buildings. The students and faculty began to pray and talk about the much needed additions.

Finally, in the summer of 1935, a basement was dug and the foundation laid in the site of the present football field. The plans called for a two story combination classroom and dormitory building. But the depression had just begun to swing into full force and the desperately needed funds to complete the building failed to come in.

For the next few years the building was forgotten by the majority of the district. Then in 1945 and 1946 enough funds were raised to erect the two present high school buildings.

In 1948, Clifford Thomas, who, along with Martin Horine, had worked so hard to help dig the basement, became president of the school. The following year he had the heartbreaking task of asking Mr. Miner to use his bulldozer to push the decayed and cracked old foundation in. But the need of a building was still very much upon the heart of President Thomas.

In the fall of 1951, about 1:00 o'clock in the morning, President Thomas was in his room praying about the building. He was scared and uncertain about the possibilities of a new building, but he put a fleece out. It was that if they should build, that they should receive \$1,000 in the school service at Rees Memorial Church the next morning. After the service they had \$250.

That afternoon a very depressed and dejected President Thomas sadly resigned himself to the fact that he had just been wistfully thinking about the time of building.

The following morning, Paul Bufkin. then a student in the school, gave President Thomas a note from Mr. Barber asking him to come to his home in Altadena. When President Thomas arrived, Mr. Barber presented him with a note for \$1,000. Although Mr. Barber was not wealthy. from his modest savings he gave his money in accordance to God's will.

Then in January of 1952 President Thomas presented the building project to the school board. They encouraged him to go ahead but said that he must raise \$10,000 before he could begin to build.

In less than two years the necessary amount was raised, but the board decided the building should be built without incurring a debt. The plans were drawn and presented to the county for their approval, but this approval was not received for over a year.

In the spring of 1953 the trenches were dug and thus the actual construction of the much needed building began. Mr. Martin Horine was in charge of construction.

For the rest of the school year and throughout the summer the work continued and on September 15, 1954, the building was occupied with only a few finishing touches to be completed.

As it now stands, this long-planned, long-awaited building is a modern U-shaped combination administration and classroom structure, complete with forced air ventilation, pastel walls, and completely new furniture.

There were many contributors of time materials, and money. Among these were:

Mr. Victor Klein, roofing; Mr. Hewin, plumbing; Mr. Snoddy, building materials. Of course a great many others, too numerous to mention here, donated both time and money. Plans have been made to dedicate some parts of the building to outstanding individuals, such as: Mr. Brown. Reverend Dooley and Reverend Adams.

The school now has a building valued at \$75,000 that was built for approximately \$33,000, and there is only a very small debt of \$7,000

And so ends the story of 20 years of prayer and struggle by the faithful people to erect a building in which to train young men and women to "Go—into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" which makes it a monument for eternity.

OPEN DOORS FOR THE SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHER

The Sunday School teacher is much more important to the Kingdom of God than perhaps is realized. The teacher will be able to enter homes that the pastor of the church will never be able to enter. The teacher's ministry of the Word of God is listened to from Sunday to Sunday by many, some of whom will listen more intently to the teacher than to the pastor. The teacher stands before those each Sunday in the class who need Christ, those who need the Word taught to them in such a way as to impress upon their hear's the desire to know more about the Master. They need to know what sin is, how it affects an individual's life, how it will completely destroy them socially from the realm of Christian fellowship. How it will separate them from God, keep them from entering Heaven forever - yes, sin is a destrover. Teachers, teach the Word in the same manner as you would want it taught to you and as the Sunday School scholars to you and as the Sunday School scholars take the message and teaching home with them they will also be taking a part of you; yes, your teaching should be a part of you. Teaching comes from the heart, and a study of the Word, with much prayer and meditation in preparing the lesson. Teachers have a welcome to each home represented in their classes. Enter that home with the thought in mind of winning the members of that home to Christ and to the Church.

A growing Sunday School will mean a growing Church. If the teacher is not faithful to his or her class in all respects of a Christian, how can we expect the Sunday School to grow? The Sunday School worker should be a burden-bearer for each member of the class. The teacher with a burdened heart for the lost is a teacher whom God will be pleased with. Tarrying in secret before God for souls will be rewarded openly. Keep faithful; keep looking up; God remembers His own. Blessed are they who are faithful in the work of the Kingdom. Let's go forward in the Sunday School.

She passed away peacefully at the Mission Home in Pasadena, December 29, 1954. She was a saint and her child-like faith in her wonderful Saviour was firm to the end.

ARIZONA MINISTERIAL MEETING

MINISTERIAL MEETING of the ministers and visitors of the California-Arizona District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was a meeting with God through the Holy Spirit, even though all the ministers could not attend. The Meeting was held in the First Pilgrim Holiness Church of Phoenix, Arizona, where Rev. and Mrs. C. J. Meyers labor; the pastor and the Phoenix folk most graciously welcomed and cared for their guests in a beautiful way all through. We are grateful to God for them all.

One great burden of the Meeting was concerning the question of how the Church can ADVANCE most, and the possibility of the Arizona congregations forming a Home Missionary District as a means of advancement. The problems involved in this, and the advantages were ably presented by Rev. R. C. Hawkins, General Secretary of Church Extension. In his message, he emphasized the fact that the Church expects the congregations to ADVANCE in every way: in the volume of prayer, in the adding of new members, not only in Sunday-School, but to the Body of Christ, the Church.

Freedom in the Holy Spirit was characteristic of the Meeting and it was manifested as several gave us beautiful special musical numbers. They were Rev. Paul Miller, Rev. and Mrs. Sheets, Mr. and Mrs. Denzel Clouse. Rev. and Mrs. E. W. Hall cooperated happily in the music, and our souls were blessed. Rev. Hall had already given us a review of the matter of the Holy Spirit as set forth in the ministry of Paul.

Rev. and Mrs. Wm. A. Reading of Chino, California, presented a full program showing how the Sunday-School work may advance by using methods directed by the Holy Spirit. The responsibility of the Sunday-School Teacher was presented in a special paper by Rev. Reading.

Following this, Rev. R. C. Hawkins brought a forceful message on the necessity of AD-VANCEMENT IN THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL, presenting his famous forty-seven points conresenting his famous forty-seven points con-cerning the building of the Sunday-School. Among the poignant ideas presented, some of these are forthwith given. "There must be a vision: TIME must be expended; there must be ADVANCEMENT in intercessory prayer; "prayer is a MUST if we are working for ETERNITY"; "we can't afford not to build; we build churches for sinners; you must get people in; you can't convert benches; there MUST be consistent lay visitation; there is no substitute for this."

Rev. Sheets of California, presented the Young People's Work, the District Bible School, as a Youth leader. Testimonies concerning this phase of the work encouraged the

Another timely message based on I. Chronicles 19 was given with the power of the Holy Spirit, and the church full of people, rejoiced in the challenge that the CHRISTIANS have a vision, that they encourage the Christian to keep a clear testimony and live a holy life. SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

The annual Sunday School Convention of the California-Arizona District convened at El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church, February 24, 25 and 26. The District Sunday School Committee, under the efficient direction of the Promotional Secretary, Rev. John M. Newby, had a full, well-planned, beneficial program, and each participant proved well his ability in and familiarity with the area about which he spoke.

The District Superintendent's keynote address aimed at urging the churches and workers to greater spirituality through concentrated prayer. The need for programs and plans is in no way minimized, but plans without God can

be of no eternal value.

The unlimited possibilities of the Daily Vacation Bible School were ably presented by Mrs. E. W. Hall. An excellent demonstration of "Enriching the Class Through Scene-o-felt" was given by Mrs. Wm. Reading. A paper "Using the Object Lesson in Sunday School" by Miss Ila Miller contained excellent ideas and suggestions in this field.

Dr. Henry G. Brubaker ably contributed a wealth of practical as well as technical points on "The Adolescent" and also many sure "Factors to Failure

Dr. Clifford Thomas forcibly, by theory and example, portrayed the feasibility and importance of "Making the Sunday School Class More Interesting." Mrs. Thomas competently presided over classroom scenes in a practical demonstration of the right and wrong methods of conducting a Sunday School Class.

Qualified leaders were in charge of six classes which met Friday afternoon for

The convention closed as it had opened, with the recognition of the need of God's divine blessing upon all our plans, methods, and programs. The group of pastors, teachers, leaders and laity present gathered around the altar for a time of prayer, seeking God's blessing and guidance, before departing for their respective fields of labor.



YOUTH NOTES

Another Camp Meeting is past and it is one that will be remembered by the young, as well as the old, as one of the greatest we have had. Now we must turn our efforts toward our Youth Camp and the opportunities it affords of reaching even more of our young people.

This year's Labor Day Camp is to be unique in that our Young People's Conference will be held at Mile High Pines on Monday, September 5. This is also the first year that our delegate system has been in effect. Every society now has the privilege and duty to select delegates for our Youth Conference. Delegates are to be selected on the following basis: every functioning society shall have at least one delegate. If a society has more than 25 active members (members who attend the society, are voting members of the church and less than 35 years of age) it shall have two lay delegates. The Young People's Committee has also requested that each local society bear the expense of \$8.50 for sending its delegate to Labor Day Camp. This arrangement will assure every society of a representative at our camp and every society will then be able to obtain from its delegate complete details of our Young People's Conference. It should also be noted that every pastor is automatically a delegate and so everyone may rest assured that the Conference will he scheduled so as not to interfere with the traditional Preachers vs. Laymen softball game.

May we take this opportunity to thank each of you who pledged on our bunk beds. You will remember that money was to be in by July and much of it is in and we are certain the rest is coming in. Remember also that there are only a few Saturdays left as work days before our camps begin. There is much work yet to be done so make it a big project for your society on the day you have promised to work.

LET US GO FORWARD!

I. Into a deeper spiritual program. Our goal should be and must be the conversion of sinners and the sanctification of believers. We must have a program. I trust we will not settle down to a routine of the expected, usual program. We should strive to make, and expect each service to be, better. Why not work toward having the most inspiring services in town? Let us plan our services with an ultimate view of winning the unsaved to Christ and the Church. Regardless of the size of the church there can and must be a spiritual depth to the whole of the church program that will be a drawing influence to both the unsaved and to the Christian. The church leaders must spend more time in prayer and planning for a deeper spiritual program.

II. Into a greater drawing power. Our church reports reveal this need very clearly. Over half of the churches show a loss in membership. The Lynwood Church shows a gain of 16, which includes a goodly number of children taken into the church. Tucson First is second in line with a gain of 9. San Dimas and Fresno are third with a gain of 8 each. Los Angeles First is next with a gain of 6. The fact that the General Church and the District have set up a budget system based on membership has brought about a house-cleaning which resulted in a loss of membership in some churches. This was expected; however, we must rise to the job of replenishing our ranks with new members. The job of making Christians out of sinners is a big task. Could we not profit by putting more of Christ into our efforts? The promise is "If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto me."

III. Into a more loyal working unit. This can only be done when there is complete confidence in the leadership of the church. The church board has a wonderful privilege as well as a tremendous responsibility. The pastor and board must cooperate with and abide by the proceedings of its District Conference, as the District Superintendent and District Council must abide by the General Conference and General leaders. We all must strive together under the leadership of the Holy Spirit to build a more stable, more spiritual, stronger Pilgrim Holiness Church.

I am calling you again to cooperate with your District leaders, and to be faithful, as much as it lies within your power to be, to every local, district and general church interest.

WHAT KIND OF CHURCH WOULD YOU LIKE TO PASTOR? TO ATTEND?

Would you like to pastor a large church, a spiritual church, a prosperous church, a friendly church, a growing church, a community-esteemed church?

Whatever ideal you cherish as to the kind of church you would like to serve, it is possible to make the church you are pastoring the church you would like to pastor.

Would you like to pastor a large church? What could possibly be more gratifying to your own soul and more pleasing to our Heavenly Father than to see your present church grow into a large church? Don't be discouraged if this does not happen the first month, or even the first year. Permanent works that stand the test of the years are not the result of an over-night mushroom growth, but rather of a steady, solid, substantial increase brought about by untiring, ceaseless, sincere effort on the part of pastor and people.

There are numerous methods and means to this matter of building churches, all of which spell W-O-R-K.

The greatest means at every Christian's disposal is prayer. There are countless unexplored, inexhaustible possibilities offered the church through the medium of prayer. Too glibly many times we say "Prayer Changes Things," and go on our way unsatisfied with existing conditions, yet unwilling to sacrifice the time and expend the effort necessary to pray earnestly and sincerely to God to "change things." The Bible teaches us that some things come not about except by prayer and fasting. Many of our churches on the Calif-Ariz. District will never be any larger than they are today unless someone is willing to fast and pray in their behalf.

Too much cannot be said about this all-important means of church building which supersedes *all* other methods ever conceived or employed. Dare to trust God for your church. Stay in the place where you can "cash in" on prayer's golden resources.

Keep at the job, every day, every week, every month, every year; use every other means that you honestly believe God can bless; and you will be rewarded abundantly.

Would you like to pastor a spiritual church? One has said that a group can be no more spiritual than its leader. A thoughtful consideration of his responsibility should drive every leader to his knees. The pastor is not only a leader in building programs, visitation campaigns, Sunday School promotion, etc., but he is the spiritual leader of his people. May he never become too busy or too negligent to be an exemplary spiritual leader, directing his flock into rich green pastures where their souls may feed and become

fat. May he give them the precious Word as a steady diet and never stoop to waste valuable worship time with joke-telling or unprofitable discourse.

If you would have a spiritual church, pray with your people more than you play with them. Be sociable, of course, but don't become "common" to the place of sacrificing your position as a spiritual leader.

If you will, you can make the church you are pastoring the spiritual church you desire to pastor.

Would you like to pastor a community-esteemed church? Then widen your interests to include those of the community. Become civic-minded as well as church-minded. Cooperate in any civic endeavor which you can conscientiously favor. By so doing you may be able to help in numerous civic reforms. As you become a part of your community and are known, esteemed and respected, so will your church be esteemed and respected.

A church esteemed in the community is an attractive, neat-appearing one. Keep church properties neat, clean, and in good repair inside and out. It is amazing what transformations can be wrought with a little soap and water, paint and varnish, flowers and shrubs, etc., all of which help to make your church respected in the community.

Do not be guilty of idle day-dreaming about the kind of church you would like to pastor *some* day, but begin today to ask God to make the church you *are* pastoring that kind of church.

Layman, what kind of church would you like to attend? A large church? Then begin now to invite your friends, neighbors, relatives, everyone you contact, to attend your church. Speak well of your church, of your pastor. People expect the minister to invite them to church. They consider that his business - to invite everybody to church. But if you invite your acquaintance, he knows that you are interested in him personally. Note any growing church. You will find that not only is the pastor calling in the interest of the church, but also the laity is calling in the community. The day is almost past when sinners go to church of their own volition or even at the request or invitation of the minister. Those who attend our services today, for the most part, and are saved, are "hand-picked fruit," plucked by a layman, who has conscientiously lived a holy life before that person, shown a sincere interest in that soul's welfare. prayed for him, and brought him to church. The laity has a job to do which the pastor can never do. If the task is not pursued faithfully and regularly, our churches cannot prosper as they ought.

Would you like to attend a spiritual church? The church can be spiritual only as individuals in that church are spiritual. We can be just as spiritual as we want to

be, but it requires time and effort, and often times, sacrifice. A truly spiritual person will inspire others to be likewise.

Would you like to attend a church that is esteemed in the community? You can do your part in making Your church respected in the community by always living an exemplary, Christian life, free from the very appearance of evil. At home, on the job, at the grocery, in the school, wherever you are, strive to be as much like Jesus as is humanly possible. Be honest, be fair, be courteous, be kind, be sympathetic, be friendly, be explicitly careful and conscientious in speech, in appearance, in deportment, in all relationships and dealings with your fellowman. As the community respects you, so will it respect your church.

Would you attend a friendly church? A church is friendly only as individuals are friendly. Cultivate the habit of welcoming visitors whom you observe in the services. Secure their name and address and hand it to the pastor. He may not have had the opportunity to secure it. If the visitors are potential members, visit them within a few days, or telephone them if a personal call is not possible. The more you practice this ministry, the more you will enjoy it.

If there is someone in your church with whom you feel you do not have the closest fellowship, strive to get better acquainted. Perhaps it is just that you do not understand each other. When we really get to know people, many times, our opinion of them is entirely changed. Invite that person and his family to dinner. Have prayer together. Pray for each other, for your church. 

REPORT OF DISTRICT WORKERS' MEETING

The first meeting of the pastors and district leaders, for the purpose of preparing a Calendar of coming events for the balance of the fiscal year, convened at El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church October 14, 1955, at 2:00 p.m.

Approximately forty adults were in attendance.

Rev. Paul Miller led the congregation in singing "Work For the Night Is Coming," and "There Shall Be Showers of Blessing."

Rev. Joy Doane, pastor of San Dimas, was introduced as a new minister on the district, and gave a word of testimony. Rev. Clinton Jones was introduced and expressed his desire to boost in the work of the district.

Rev. Thomas E. Lee, pastor of the local church, gave some opening remarks of welcome and called upon Bro. Jones for a special number in song. Rev. Jones sang effectively, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Rev. Lee then presented Rev. Lundy Hill, District Superintendent, who challenged all present with a short message concerning the characteristics, the challenge, and the price of true leadership.

Rev. Hill called upon Rev. C. W. Thomas to present the work of Western Pilgrim College, as the first department to be heard from. Rev. Thomas called upon Rev. Clinton Jones to speak first. 
