To Rev. Melvin Snyder, presiding General Superintendent, friends and Delegates to the Seventh Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings.

We meet today on this hallowed spot, made so by the many manifestations of Divine presence, the tears of penitent sinners, and the shouts of rejoicing saints. We meet with great appreciation and deep gratitude for the mercy and Grace of our God which has been extended our way since last we thus met. The time at which we meet today is a time of deepening world tension, approaching despair. Men and nations have lost their way and a sickening world gropes on toward eternity in gathering darkness. Crisis after crisis leaves men's powers dissipated in the constant climb of military strength. Fear grips the very souls of men until in frenzied confusion they know not which way to turn. Left in delusion, men grasp in desperation at the idealogies of other men, hoping for a saving virtue, only to be disappointed. Peace tables have been left without achieving their goals. At best, the world is only seeking for a way of peace. Happiness has so fled from the earth that men spend their lives, and sell their very souls, in the pursuit of its cheap and transcient imitation, pleasure.

Once, sincere hearts swept with the purifying essence of Revival Fires and Gospel Glory, gave themselves without reservation to saving the lost. Now under the stupor of materialism, a paraletic church stumbles feebly to promote a material organization in order that men may through the channels of the church, serve God without sacrifice. The true Church is not thus built, and we dare not be caught in this deadening influence. The church of Jesus Christ has always been, and will always be, built by men of unfeigned faith, complete devotion, courage and persistance.

Because some would see fit to leave our ranks for other apparently more promising fields, some would tend to discouragement. This is not new, Paul faced this throughout his ministry. When in prison for the final time, he named those who had turned away, yet his course was fixed, and real purpose, based on a conviction of truth, characterized his life. For this, he knew, and we know, there is a crown that outshines the acclaim of men. Zeal consumed every fiber of his being. His strength was not in the evident success of his ministry, the faithfulness of his followers nor in the acclaim of men, but in the truth for which he stood. We are often tempted to evaluate our strength, and success in the same scales of material and physical evidence as the nominal church. This too is a mistake. Our strength is not and will not be in the material or even numerical aspects of the work, but in the soundness of our Doctrines, dedication of holy men and the unity and charity that characterized such exemplary followers of The Master.

We believe the Message and emphasis of The Pilgrim Holiness Church has a unique place of importance in God's plan. Our plea is for more of a holy compassion for lost souls, greater dedication, and a greater display of christian charity without compromise of principle. We should ever emphasize higher standards of Spiritual, moral and ethical principles, not lower external and visible standards, but be more consistent and exemplary in spirit, attitude and good works. A consuming sense of Divine Commission gripped and characterized every move of the early church, so let it be with us.

With deepest gratitude we recall the cooperation and fellowship of the Assistant Superintendent, Rev. O. E. Rutledge, The Secretary Rev. M.H. Robbins, The Treasurer, Rev. G. E. Stace, The Entire District Council, and every Committee and board with whom it has been our privilege to work during this year. Western Ohio has some of the finest ministers and most loyal, cooperative and devoted laity of the church. He who understands all things will see that each receives proper credit in that day.

We rejoice greatly in God and His Marvelous Grace. We have not the least complaint, because of His boundless Mercy. We would purpose, by His power, to go forth to serve him in a more worthy manner, and do greater exploits in His Name.

PROMOTION

This year has been marked by some of the finest in promotional and inspirational help. Rev. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent, was with us for three very profitable days of promotion last fall. Well attended services were held at Springfield First, Elmwood and Lima Market St. Churches. His positive leadership and rich ministry, based on a background of experience, plus the anointing of God, makes Rev. Snyder a practical leader. He is deeply appreciated by our ministry and laity, alike.

The Sunday School Institutes led by Rev. Garvin Sheridan, Promotional Secretary, were held at West Carrollton and Lima First early in November. Rev. J. D. Abbott and Rev. and Mrs. Joe Brown, all gave inspiring and practical ministry in Sunday School promotion.

The Ministerial held at Hamilton, with Rev. Paul Thomas as guest speaker, challenged every minister to higher and more noble goals for his ministry.

We believe these times of group meetings to be indespensible, both from the stand-point of promotion and the general morale and encouragement of leadership. I would recommend Zone or regional Seminars for pastors for the purpose of the study of many specific matters about which there are question, and the sharing of ideas. With this we would also recommend a time of informal fellowship, that would contribute to better understanding and the building of morale and loyalty.

MATERIAL PROGRESS

Some very fine material progress has been made this year.

Madisonville is now in the process fo erecting the superstructure of their sanctuary. Arches are in place and walls are being laid as this Conference is in session. This is the fulfillment of dreams and prayers for several years. We rejoice with the Madisonville Pilgrims as they build this edifice for The Glory of God.

Dayton Westwood has relocated the parsonage, and tentative plans are under study now for relocating the church.

A very attractive brick front, added Sunday School facilities, and modern rest rooms has been constructed at Pleasant Valley.

Property has been purchased for the proposed new church at Hamilton, in the very fine new residential community of Fairfield.

Maud is now negotiating for a property ideally located for a proposed new church. A growing attendance here is making building imperative.

New Miami has contracted to purchase adjacent property to their present location. Said property has a lovely new home for a parsonage, and an additional lot for a proposed new church, to be constructed as soon as finance will allow.

North Bend-Addyston has relocated at Cleves, and purchased a church building that gives adaquate facilities for an expanded program and growth in this new field.

The parsonage is now being completed at Piqua, and we expect it to be ready for occupancy within a few weeks.

West Carrollton has the basement unit of their new church structure nearing completion. This large addition affords greater opportunity for this growing congregation.

Excellent building plans are being developed in other areas also, as our people realize the need, and rise up to build as soon as funds are available.

WESTERN OHIO CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING, TUESDAY, JULY 18, 1961, CONVENING AT 7:00 P.M.

The Seventh Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order by the District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe. Rev. M. H. Robbins led the congregation in singing "When the Roll is called up Yonder," and "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." At the request of the superintendent, the congregation also sang, "He Lives."

Rev. Melroy Ward was called to the platform to lead the congregation in prayer. Rev. Monroe introduced to the conference the General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, to bring the opening address and preside over the conference.

Dr. Snyder read from Sec. 93 of the manual concerning the duties of the conference, and stated that some items which have been neglected in past years are being revived, with particular reference to individual reports of pastors and churches.

In his introductory remarks, Dr. Snyder stated that we are living in one of the most perilous periods in human history. Confusion and revolt are rampant- revolt against lawful authority, against God, is everywhere. We really need the help of God in times like these. We are not going to make it unless we are prayerful. Whatever else we need, he stated, we need God in our lives, in our churches. We have tried many methods, gimmicks and programs to win people to Christ and the Church, now let us try God. He related the incident of an evangelist, who in cancelling a meeting, merely wired the pastor, "Can't come – Send for God." This thought provoking challenge sent the pastor and his people to their knees, and brought a Holy Ghost revival to the church.

Rev. Snyder read from Matthew 5 and spoke on the subject, "The Miracle of the Centurion." He stated that the miracel in this story was not in the healing of the servant of the Centurion, but in the marvelous faith which this man possessed. The faith he possessed was so great that even Christ marvelled at it and told the people about that he had not seen such great faith in all Israel. There are some important things to note about the faith of this Centurion. Remember, when Jesus said that his faith was greater than any in Israel, He included the faith of Mary, the mother of Jesus who had faith great enough to bring her through the stigma of bearing her child, greater than the faith of John the beloved, a member of the inner circle, and many others of Jesus close friends and edsciples. First, this was a faith that was exercised in humility. Although the centurion was a man of authority, commanding many soldiers and servants, he felt himself unworthy to have the presence of Christ arace his home to perform a service for him. His faith was humble enough to state his unworthiness, but strong enough to believe Christ could heal his servant some twenty miles away. Second, he had a faith that worked in love. He came to Christ, not for a selfish reason. It was not his need of a servant that caused him to plead for the man's healing. He had wealth and power enough to obtain all the servants he needed. But he loved the man, he deplored seeing him "greviously tormented" with his illness, and it was for him alone that he made a request and exercised his great faith. Third, the centurion's faith was one that recognized constituted authority. He was under authority, he was in authority over others. He realized that authority could be used or misused, and he knew that Jesus had authority over the disease that possessed his servant, and that he would use his authority properly. The centurion further had a faith that knew how to exercise authority. If we learn how to submit to authority, God will then be able to trust us to exercise authority. The centurion recognized all the facets of authority and its uses, and he recognized that Jesus was the Authority of all Authorities. His faith was great enough to claim the right to expect Jesus to use this authority in behalf of his servant. Fifth, the centurion's faith was a faith that gets things done. When we can have this kind of faith, the things we ask for will come to pass, for we will ask for the things that are in God's plan for us. If we will prayerfully develop a humble, loving faith that recognizes and exercises authority, we, too, like the Centurion, can get things done, and bring joy to the Master's heart.

Rev. Snyder closed his remarks with prayer for the blessing and guidance of God over the conference.

The conference heard the roll call of ministers, deaconnesses and Lay Delegates. The District Superintendent's report was given, and was accepted by the conference. with a rising vote of appreciation.

The Assistant District Superintendent's report was given, and was accepted with a hearty "Amen."

Inasmuch as none of the committees were ready to report, motion to adjourn was carried, and the conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Ward.

Second Sitting, Wednesday a.m.

The morning sitting was called to order by the District Superintendent. Rev. Gary Spriggs led the congregation in singing, "When we all get to Heaven," with Rev. Robert Hiler at the piano. Rev. O. E. Rutledge offered prayer.

Rev. Harold Monroe presented the General Superintendent, who in turn presented to the conference Rev. C. P. Pridgen, a former Superintendent of the Ohio District. He gave words of commendation for Rev. Pridgen's faithful service to the

church, and spoke of giving honor to whom it is due. We are only here as a Pilgrim Holiness Conference because of the faithfulness of others in the past..

Rev. Pridgen read II Timothy 2:1-15. After the scripture reading, Rev. and Mrs. Pridgen were given a rising vote of appreciation.

The Reception Committee then presented Rev. James Hertel, President of Frankfort College, along with Rev. & Mrs. Pridgen. Each gave a testimony. A motion prevailed to give these visitors an honary seat within the conference bar.

A motion to dispense with the roll call for the remainder of the conference was seconded and carried.

Minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

A motion from the floor to seat Virgil Shingler as lay delegate for Springfield First Church was seconded and carried.

Rev. G. F. Sheridan, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, was called to the platform to report on the Sunday School work of the District during the past year. Rev. Sheridan commented on certain phases of the printed report and presented Certificates of Award for highest numerical and percentage gains. Ribbon awards were also presented to pastors and delegates of other churches with noteworthy achievements. Rev. Sheridan stated that what we do now in our Sunday Schools is of vital importance, and will determine their outcome in the future. Rev. Sheridan's report was accepted with words of praise.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read by Mrs. L.R. Roberts and accepted by the conference.

The District Treasurer, Rev. G.E. Stace, presented his report which was accepted with a rising vote of appreciation.

Rev. Goldsmith of the Reception Committee presented Mr. A. D. Ragan, a representative of Unified Church Structures of Mt. Clemmons, Michigan. He explained their package church building service.

The report of the Conference Statistician was read.. A motion prevailed to supplant on future reports the line reading "Pastors receiving at least \$50.00 a week and parsonage," with the line reading "Pastors receiving a Living Minimum Wage." The Ways and Means Committee to study the circumstances and determine what this amount should be in various cases. Motion was seconded and carried to accept the Statistical Report.

Dr. Snyder commented on the overall picture presented by the statistical report. He encouraged pastors to show confidence in young converts by accepting them as probationary members soon after conversion.

Time was devoted to the hearing of pastors' reports, nineteen ministers reporting in this session.

The sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. James Hertel.

Third Sitting, Wednesday p.m.

The third sitting of the 1961 conference was opened with Rev. G. F. Sheridan leading the congregation in singing "My Faith Looks up to Thee," Mrs. M. H. Robbins at the piano.

A prayer request was made for a member of Elmwood church who has been critically injured, and for Rev. Dean who had to leave the conference and is enroute to the lady's bedside. Rev. William Salley led in prayer.

The Reception committee introduced Rev. Eugene Sohn, Rev. & Mrs. Hugh Mosher,

Rev. Roy Bellomy and Rev. William Gilkerson. All gave words of testimony and were granted honorary seats within the conference bar.

The General Superintendent gave time at this point for Rev. James Hertel, President of Frankfort College, to speak in the interest of the school. Rev. Hertel mentioned the ministry of the college choir during the past school year and invited slatings for them in the coming year. He also announced night classes in pastoral counciling. He reported on the finances of the school. At the end of the fiscal year there were no accounts payable, and since that time, funds have come in for the purchase and installation of the heating plant for the music building. He also reported an increased enrollment in the offing for this coming year, based on applications already received. He distributed catalogs of the school, and invited every member of the conference to become a representative for our Zone School.

Minutes of the morning sitting were read and approved, after which reports of pastors was resumed.

After a ten minute recess, individual reports of pastors were completed for all churches which were represented.

A motion was made and carried, after the reading of the Leesburg report, that the conference take an offering for Rev. Adams who has been seriously ill for some months. We were requested to continue to remember the Adamses in prayer, and the conference is to send to Rev. Adams greetings with the assurance of these continued prayers. The motion carried with a hearty "Amen."

Rev. W. L. Fisher presented the report of the Examining Board, recommending:

Rev. Donald Bassham, Rev. Leslie Fuller for ordination.

Rev. Eugene Sohn, Rev. Ralph Haines for restoration of ordination credintials upon their return from other churches.

Rev. Hugh Mosher, to receive ordination status, coming to us from another denomination.

The committee further recommended: for advancement - 4

for retention in present status - 11 for restortation - 1

for acceptance and advancement from local-l

for demotion - 2

for correction of secretarial error - I

With the exception of the two recommended demotions which were ruled out by the chairman in accordance with the Manual, the report of the committee was approved.

Rev. Hertel announced two ministerial institutes which will be held at Frankfort, and which will be of aid to licentiates in completing their studies for advancement.

The sitting was adjourned as the congregation sang "We're Marching to Zion" while giving a march offering for Rev. Adams.

Fourth Sitting, Wednesday Evening

Rev. Monroe opened the session by introducing Rev. Charles Felsburg who led the congregation in singing, "I Know Whom I Have Believed," and "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. L. R. Roberts led in prayer. The congregation sang, "Rock of Ages."

Rev. Monroe presented, to the General Superintendent, the two candidates for ordination, and Rev. Snyder presented them to the conference.

Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev. O. E. Rutledge and Rev. G. E. Stace gave the scripture readings from 1 Timothy 3:1-7, 11 Timothy 4:1-8 and Titus 3:1-11

Rev. Snyder stated that in these passages, Paul instructed ministers of the gospel not only on how they should preach, but also what to preach and what to avoid. He read from 11 Chronicles 16, and used verse 16 as his text: "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to shew himself strong in the behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him." Another passage quotes God as saying, "I sought for a man. " Rev. Snyder continued on the theme of "The Man God Wants." He referred to a statement by Gen. LeMay to the Senate Defense Committee: "I want men," he said, "men who know God, men who know how to pray." If this is true in defense and in government, then it is certainly true in the church. God is in great need of men, men with specific qualifications. The basic qualification for these Men of the Hour is a perfect heart, for it is in behalf of these men that God will shew himself strong. Training, education, standards are all important, but they will follow according to God's plan when the heart is perfect. God has called us all to be a success for Him. How can we be men of perfect hearts as He desires? First, we must get quiet in order to hear God speak to us. There are many distracting voices, and compelling activities, the din of which may drown out his voice. We must be quiet to get his message for the people, for he has ordained that men be saved through the foolishness of preaching. We cannot even understand his book without being quiet before him, much less interpret it for a congregation. Second, God wants men courageous enough to preach his message. It takes just as much courage today to preach God's message as it ever did in the past. God's message always has been and always will be in opposition to this world. Next to a definite call from God, the prime qualifications of a minister of the gospel is Holy Courage. There are many things that we may know as truth, but it is not always God's message for the moment to tell these things. We must know what not to say as well as what to say. Jesus practiced this in his ministry, for He said, "I have many things to say unto you, but you cannot bear them." God's message may expose many things, and only a man with courage can present all that God wants the congregation to hear. Third, God wants a man honest enough to live his message. The world will remember what you were long after it has forgotten what you said. To be God's man, keep pure, live above reproach, be honest with yourself as well as with the people. Acknowledge your error and ask forgiveness for mistakes as quickly as you expect your laymen to do so. You must rise above your people - never let them become a test to you. You will not be faultless, but you can be blameless. You can have a spirit, a heart, that is perfect toward God, and you have his promise that he will be with you in power and inspired works. God has called us to a tremendous task and we have no sufficiency in ourselves - only in God. If you get quiet before him, he will make you courageous enough to preach his message and demonstrate what you preach. That is success; that will win souls. He who called you has not called in vain. He will honor your perfect heart.

The ordination service was read by the Superintendent, with the candidates responding to the questions. Prayer was offered by Rev. Monroe and Rev.Roberts, and the ministers were ordained by Dr. Snyder and the ordination committee, consisting of Rev. Harold Monroe, Rev. O. E. Rutledge, Rev. M. H. Robbins, Rev. L. R. Roberts, and Rev. Melroy Ward. Credentials were presented, and the newly ordained were greeted by the ministers and the congregation.

Dr. Snyder introduced the "Kings Crusaders" quartette from Owosso College. The conference enjoyed their message in song.

The Reception committee introduced Dr. P. F. Elliott, president of the college, and Rev. Beecher from Des Moines, lowa. They were given honorary seats within the conference bar.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved with one correction. One remaining pastor's report was submitted.

Mrs. A.T. Adams expressed appreciation for herself and on behalf of her husband for the offering given them by the conference, and requested a continuation of prayers for Rev. Adams.

Four evangelists were presented to the conference.

Rev. Robert Ferguson presented the report of the Resolutions Committee. The following action was taken.

Changes in D and F of Resolution No. 2, Building Committee, were referred by the chairman to the morning session for a ruling on their legality according to the manual.

No. 13 (C) concerning the location of the Ministerial Convention was adopted.

No. 18 concerning the method of counting pastoral calls was adopted.

No. 16 (B) regarding the time of the ordination service at conference was adopted. An addition to No. 24, Sunday School promotion, to be added as Section "E", and concerning the reporting and program of the Sunday School Board, was adopted.

A new resolution concerning voting for pastors and the giving to the Dist. Superintendent advance information concerning changes in pastorates. An amendment to the resolution, calling for a History of available ministers being provided to the churches, was moved and seconded for adoption. Some discussion was held on the amendment until the sitting was adjourned by expiration of time. Dr. Elliott dismissed with prayer.

Fifth Sitting, Thursday a.m.

The morning session was opened with the congregation singing, "Blessed Assurance," led by Rev. Ted Wilson. At Rev. Snyder's request, a number of scriptures were quoted, after which Rev. Charles Marshall led in prayer.

Rev. Dean reported that the lady who was so seriously injured yesterday had, in answer to prayer, and to the doctor's amazement, recovered sufficiently to be dismissed from the hospital. The congregation joined in singing the Doxology in praise to God for this answer to prayer.

Motion was made and seconded to dispense with the reading of the minutes for the remainder of the conference, in order to give more time to the expediting of business matters, minutes to be approved by the District Council. Motion carried.

A motion to make the election of officers at 11:00 a.m. the order of the day was seconded and carried.

A motion to set aside the standing rule in order to reconvene the afternoon session at 1:00 p.m. was seconded and carried.

Discussion of report of the Resolutions Committee was resumed, with Rev. Ferguson reading the report. The amendment under discussion at the time adjournment of the previous sitting was re-read. The amendment carried, after which the main motion, concerning voting for pastors, was approved by the conference.

Rev. M. L. Bogard read the report of the ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 2 (G), Camp and Conference, regarding charges for rooms at camp, was approved.

No. 9 (B) to raise the salary of the conference stenographer was approved.

No. 10 (C) raising the salaries of the District Treasurer and District Secretary was approved.

Changes in Nos. 2, 3 and 5 under No. 11 (B) concerning the District Budget were approved.

Resolution No. 14 (c) was amended to charge a registration fee for the youth convention with the exception of delegates.

Resolution that No. (9) be added under Resolution 11-B, District Budget, to have a chart showing district obligations included in the minutes, was approved.

A resolution outlining a plan for administration of Piqua Church as a Home Missionary Project was presented to the conference. Motion to refer this back to the Home Missionary Committee, to be acted upon at their discretion, was seconded and carried.

Report of the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference was read by Rev. Charles Felsburg.

Four Memorials were approved. They concerned the location of the National Sunday School Convention, requirements for local church voting, method of choosing nominees for Youth Society president, and claims to the Ministerial Benefit Association. The fifth memorial, concerning the Pilgrim Pension Plan was not approved.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers to serve during theelection of officers: Revs. Stace (Chairman), Bellomy, Hiler, Waites, McKelvy, and Brand, and Bros. Knaus and Booher.

Rev. Snyder made some remarks concerning the importance of God's guidance in the election of officers. He stated that this is not a personal thing to be done according to our likes and dislikes, but since it is in God's plan for his work to be administrated through men, it is imperative that we select His men to do the job. We will be answerable at the judgment if we allow Satan to have our vote, just as if we allow him to control any other action of our lives. Only one motive should compel us in this, as in any other decision – that motive is the will of God. Rev. Snyder offered prayer, asking the leading of the Holy Spirit in this election.

The first ballot cast for District Superintendent for a term of two years resulted in no election, 97 votes being cast. Rev. Harold Monroe was elected on the second ballot.

Due to the necessity of the departure of the Miamisburg delegate, the conference seated Murlyn Enlow as delegate from that church, for the remainder of the conference.

There was no election in the first two ballots for Assistant District Superintenty dent. A motion to vote only on the three names receiving the highest number of votes in the previous ballot was carried. After casting the third ballot, the conference adjourned for lunch, the tellers remaining to count the vote.

Sixth Sitting, Thursday p.m.

The afternoon sitting opened by singing two choruses, led by a member of the King's Crusaders, an Owosso College quartet. Dr. Snyder introduced Dr. P. F. Elliot, president of Owosso College, who spoke of the need of higher learning and the importance of our Pilgrim youth fitting themselves for success in this age. He stated that young people can maintain a high spiritual standard and still obtain a higher education. He then introduced the quartet, who inspired the congregation with their singing of "I Don't Mind my Sorrow," and "The Old Country Church."

Rev. Elliott then gave an interesting and enlightening report of the school, its accomplishments, its aims, its future. Pilgrims should be proud to have a Liberal Arts College listed in the "Blue Book" of colleges whose credits are accepted by any college or university in the United States. Two new buildings are being erected at the present. The enrollment has increased for the past two years. The school is not

a zone school, but is owned, operated and controlled by the entire denomination. He requested the continued support and prayers of Western Ohio Pilgrims.

Two additional evangelists were introduced to the conference by the Reception Committee.

Report of the third ballot for assistant superintendent resulted in no election.

Announcement was made of the death of Rev. Walter Daugherty of Huntington, Indiana. Motion to have the conference secretary send a message of sympathy to the family carried.

The fourth ballot for assistant district superintendent also resulted in no election, but on the fifth ballot, Rev. O. E. Rutledge was elected.

Since there had been some further changes in the recommendations of the Examing Board, the entire list of licentiates was read by Rev. Fisher, and was approved.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Rev. M. H. Robbins was elected on the second ballot.

Rev. G. E. Stace was elected as District Treasurer on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for five advisory members of the district council. The tellers counted the vote while the conference proceeded with other business. Ballots which were cast for two members of the Examining Board were also counted privately as other business was conducted. Additional tellers were appointed to assist with the counting. Ballots were cast for a member of the Educational Board.

After a ten minute recess, Rev. Darrell Rotz led the congregation in singing, "I Know Whom I have Believed."

The reception committee presented Rev. Hessy of the United Missionary Church of Springfield, who gave a brief testimony and was granted an honorary seat in the conference bar.

Rev. Hannan mentioned that Rev. I. J. Snider, who had been previously introduced, might be known as the "father of the Springfield Camp," since it was he who held tent meetings on "the hill" in 1907 and 1908, and the first camp in 1909. He compared him to Caleb, who said when he was 85 that his strength was as great as when he was 40.

Reports of the voting was given by the tellers as follows:

Elected to the Educational Board for a term of three years – Rev. L. T. Brand Elected to the District Council on the first ballot – Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev.

G. F. Sheridan

A second ballot for members of council resulted in the election of Rev. L.R. Roberts, Rev. L. R. Enlow and Rev. Charles Felsburg.

Motion to approve the Superintendent's nomination for trustee was carried. Rev. M. H. Robbins was re-elected to a term of five years.

The District Superintendent recommended that inasmuch as matters of transferring the Frankfort Bible College to the Zone are pending, and when completed, will affect the number of trustees from this District to the School Board, that the district council be given power to appoint such trustees after all pertinent matters are settled. Motion to approve the recommendation was seconded and carried.

Ballots were cast for election of District Statistician, also for ministerial delegates to the General Conference. Motion carried to use a plurality vote. The ten receiving the highest number of votes to be delegates, the next five to be alternates, in order of number of votes received.

Rev. Clyde Waites was elected as District Statistician.

A motion was made to have nominations for lay delegates to General Conference to be made from the floor, the nominations not to exceed twelve in number, the four

with the highest number of votes to be delegates, the succeeding four to be alternates.

The name of an additional recommendation for district license was presented by the Examining Board, along with the names of evangelistic workers recommended by them. The recommendations were approved.

Rev. G. F. Sheridan read the report of the committee appointed from last year's conference to study the matter of changing the conference fiscal year. The committee did not recommend the original resolution, but offered a substitute, with an amendment. A motion was made, after the amendment carried, to table the main motion until next conference. The motion carried.

The chairman of the tellers gave the report of balloting for delegates to General Conference, as follows: Ministerial Delegates - Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev. G. F. Sheridan, Rev. William Hannan, Rev. Richard T. Powell, Rev. Charles Felsburg, Rev. Ted Wilson, Rev. L. R. Roberts, Rev. Stanley Dean, Rev. L. T. Brand, Rev. D. R. Close. Ministerial Alternates - Rev. W. L. Kilwy, Rev. L.R. Enlow, Rev. Raymond Simpson, Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, Rev. Robert C. Ferguson.

Lay Delegates - Mr. Robert McCoppin, Leesburg; Mr. Clifford Ward, Mulberry; Mr. Arthur Booher, Cincinnati First; Mrs. C. M. Smack, Hamilton. Lay Alternates - Mr. Foster Ferryman, Springfield First; Mr. E. T. Riegal, Lima Market St., Mr. Harry Shafer, Bradford; Mr. Melvin Kessen, Madisonville.

A motion to continue the time of the sitting until completion of business was carried.

A report of the Memorial Committee was given by Mrs. E. M. Maddox, and was accepted.

A resolution from the floor, concerning the Decade of Progress program for Sunday Schools was adopted.

A motion was made to refer the matter of the District Building Committee to the District Council, that the resolution be revised to conform with provisions of the manual so that the committee will not be dissolved but will still continue to function, acting in an advisory capacity. The motion carried.

Motion carried to authorize the District Council to take care of any unfinished business of the conference.

The Resolutions Committee presented a Resolution of Appreciation to all officers and workers, who made possible the success of the conference. It was approved.

The District Superintendent gave a personal word of appreciation to the district for cooperation, and states the aims for the coming year. Announcements of the Youth Convention and Conference were made, after which Rev. Monroe gave a personal word of appreciation to Rev. Snyder for his help and guidance in the conference and through the past two years as our general Superintendent. A love offering was taken for Rev. Snyder.

Rev. Snyder expressed his appreciation, and closed the conference with words of encouragement. Requests were made by the District Secretary and Treasurer for proper mailing address of General Conference delegates and Local Church Treasurers.

Motion to adjourn carried, and Rev. Snyder dismissed the conference with a prayer of praise to God for his past blessing and a plea for his continued guidance.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General Interests,

- and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

"Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to the standard required by the state, therefore be it resolved that:

A Committee of three, two of whom shall not be members of the District Council, be appointed by the District Council to act as a Building Committee whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. To study the State Building Code and learn all requirements.
- B. To study methods of financing and have knowledge of best and cheapest ways.
- C. Check with church boards as to the deed and type of mortgage.
- D. This Committee shal be sent by the District Superintendent to each building project in an advisory capacity before a church proceeds to buy, sell or build a major church property.
- No. 3 CAMP AND CAMP SCHEDULE
- A. Be it resolved that any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Registrar, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.
- B. Further, that all who rent a room or a cot at camp, furnish their own linen.
- C. That our camp schedule be arranged to provide one afternoon service for Foreign Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions.
- D. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district, or, otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically be dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp registrar.
- E. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- F. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.
- No. 4 CONFERENCE
- A. Conference Bar to consist of three section of seats at the right of the platform, to the back center aisle, and the platform.
- B. Conference timeschedule to be: 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 Noon; 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p. m.; 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- C. Be it further resolved that we provide for services for children during Conference.
- No. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR
- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 5th.

- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.
- No. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

 Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.
- No. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE
- A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a vaucher.
- B. Be it further resolved that all ministers' phone numbers be carried in the Ministerial Directory.
- No. 8 DISTRICT COUNCIL
- A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a guorum.
- B. Be it resolved that our entire District Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.
- C. Be it further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.
- No. 9 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 10 DISTRICT PROGRAM

In the light of God's blessing on the last General Conference, where faith and vision took precedent over problems and circumstances, and whereas Divine leadership was evident, Be it resolved that the General Church program as adopted by the General Conference and entitled "Toward Tomorrow" be continued in its entirety.

Be it further resolved that in conformance with this program, the following District goals be continued:

A net gain of two churches this year.

A net gain of 112 members each year (2 per church.)

Annual pastors' conference.

Accentuated Holiness Evangelism.

Establishment of Prayer and Fasting Leagues. (Pledge people to fast and pray at least one meal each week - suggested Friday morning.)

To promote this program we propose in addition to existing District and General procedure that:

- (1) Our General Superintendent in cooperation with District Superintendent and council, be asked to meet with our people in special promotional meetings on Zone and local, as well as District level.
- (2) That the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following Conference for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work Local, District and General.

No. 11 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard too their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 12 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

above action and send application blanks.

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Associatin and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 13 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.
- C. The location of this convention should be under the direction of the District Council.

No. 14 MISSIONS

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two persons to serve with the District Superintendent as a Home Missionary Committee.
- B. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.
- C. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- D. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.
- E. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.
- F. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.
- G. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer.
- No. 15 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 16 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- B. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night after the first day of Conference.

No. 17 PASTORS

A. Calling of:

- (1) Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- (2) To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- (3) Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.
- (4) Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue untill and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- (5) Because the present setup in voting on the recall of pastors covers a considerable length of time, making is difficult for the superintendent to make a recommendation when a pastor in not recalled:
- (a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent set a date when all churches in the District, wherever the pastor hopes to continue, shall vote on the recalling of the same, and notify the District Superintendent of the result of the vote. This ruling need not apply where the pastor had notified the District Superintendent and the church that he expects to move, or when the pastor has a call for two or more years with unexpired time.
- (b) That the District Superintendent make available to the changing churches a list of all of the ministers who are changing, and who will be available to accept pastorates.

B. Support of:

- (1) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.
- (2) Inasmuch as moving pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage, due to varied facilities: Be it relolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church owned parsonages.
- (3) Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastor a two week vacation with pay, and that time for pastor to take said vacation be decided by the Church Board and pastor.

No. 18 PASTORS' CALL

Be it resolved that each person visited in a hospital, home, or elsewhere may be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 19 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it relosved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

- No. 20 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

 Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.
- No. 21 SALARIES

 We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after the election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.
- No. 22 STANDARDS
- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilarim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic, exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and
 - very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.
- No. 23 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONS
- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends the state conference provide for a District Sunday School committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Rally be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- C. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our District Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- D. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General

Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

E. Whereas the "Decade of Progress" is the Sunday School program of our church, and whereas the program is so practical in many areas for every church school, and since it is unfair to the future leaders of our churches and schools for the present leaders to fail to co-operate, and further, since only 15 schools of this district have reported, therefore: Be it resolved that the conference urge our churches to participate, and further that for this conference year only, the churches be given until the end of August to get in their reports, and that the school to receive the "Decade of Progress" ship for this conference year shall not be determined until the end of the extended time for reporting.

No. 24 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.
- No. 25 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 26 VOTING
Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclaimation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by

No. 27 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

No. 28 APPRECIATION

secret ballot.

A. Be it resolved:

That we extend to our General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.

- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conferende Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our District Secretary, and that we express our appreciation to Rev. Ted Wilson: for his labors as a reporter.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to relieve the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dinning room.
- D. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. That all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives.
- F. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimburse their delegate for traveling.
- G. That the charge for rooms for camp and conference be as follows:
 (1) Rooms at the rate of \$8.00 for the entire time or \$2.00 for the first and \$1.50 for each additional night.
- (2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time or \$1.00 per day.
 (3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; in list throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give three days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$20.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by the district council.

No. 5 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting church extension within the district.
- B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.
- C. No loan may be made for longer than five(5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.
- D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of five per cent (5%).

- E. Be it resolved that we substitute the PENNY-A-MEAL offering with an increase in the District Budget of \$4.00 per member. Said money shall be dispersed as follows; the minimum payment of principal and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp ground fund and District Church Extension Fund.
- F. Realizing the cost of interest, we propose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

WHAT THE LOAN FUND CAN DO

- (1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.
- (2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.
- (3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.
- (4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus giving them funds with which to operate.
- (5) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.
- No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The Imoney will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a milage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

- No. 8 MINISTER DUTIES
- A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their Local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.
- No. 9 MINUTES
- A. Be it resolved that the price of the mimutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.
- Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$75.00 for these services.
- No. 10 SALARIES
- A. District Superintendent.
 - (1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$90.00 per week, 6 cts. per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
 - (2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6 cts. per mile traveling expense.

- B. District Council Resolved that 6 cts. per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized District work.
- C. District Treasurer and Secretary.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurers' Salary be \$600.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$250.00.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 11 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund (Formerly General Budget)

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provisions as follows:

20% or \$1.60
36% or 2.88
14% or 1.12
21.4% or 1.71
3% or .24
2.6% or .21
3% or .24
100% or \$8.00

B. District Budget

- (1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interest of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offering received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.
- (2) Be it resolved that we raise 50 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.
- (3) Be it resolved that at the time the legal technicalities regarding the zoning of Frankfort Bible College are worked out, \$1.00 per member per year shall automatically replace our present budget of 50 cts.
- (4) Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.25 per member per year to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.
- (5) Inasmuch as there is an indebtedness of approximately \$750.00 on the modernization of the rest rooms on the camp ground, be it resolved that we ask each church to raise \$1.00 per member per year to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, to be applied on this indebtedness, and when this indebtedness is paid, that the \$1.00 per member shall be continued as Camp Ground Budget.
- (6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.
- (7) Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths for the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.
- (8) Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their district obli-

gations without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

- (9) Be it resolved that the following chart be used as a guide for local church treasurers in paying the district budget:
- 1. District Home Missions \$1.25 per member per year
- 2. Promotional Budget 4.00 per member per year
- 3. Camp Ground...... 1.00 per member per year
- 4. Zone School 1.00pper member per year
- 7. Youth Convention & Conference. 10.00 per Church per year TOTALS 7.75 per member per year

8. Plus, District Tithes 10% of Regular Offerings

No. 12 SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE

Be it resolved that each church raise \$5.00 per year for the financing of our Sunday School Institute. We urge each church to take care of this before the time set for the Institute.

No. 13 TREASURER

- A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books—Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.
- B. Insuring of the Treasurer We recommend that the council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.
- No. 14 YOUTH
- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in the budget statement as "Youth Convention and Conference"
- C. Be it resolved that the young people who receive free entertainment at our District Youth Convention and/or Conference be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fund to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Delgates to the Youth conference are to be excluded from the payment of this fee. Be it further resolved that the monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

NATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Be it resolved that the National Sunday School Convention be held at Winona Lake, Indiana, if possible, and if it cannot be so arranged, that it be held in a central logical churchwise.

LOCAL CHURCH VOTING

Be it resolved that no member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be permitted to vote in any church business meeting, if such person has not attended the regular Church services at least twice each month during the preceding six months except in case of a prolonged illness, or that such member or members reside at such a distance from the church so to make it impossible to attend or that they are actively engaged in evangelistic work.

3. ELECTION OF YOUTH PRESIDENT

Under Section 85, par. 9, of the manual, we recomment the following change in the third sentence, "They shall nominate one or more candidates to the various offices, with the exception of the youth president, which shall be nominated by the local church board, and names shall be presented to the members of the Pilgrim Youth Society at a meeting called for the special purpose of conducting an Annual election."

4. MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

Inasmuch as there is an apparent wide-spread dissatisfaction about the recent change in the Ministerial Benefit Association, Be it resolved that the Ministerial Benefit Association be restored to the policy of its status prior to the change of 1960. Be it further resolved that the wife be privileged to remain as a member for life after the death of her husband and that she be eligible for full benefit.

Be it further resolved that no further changes be made in the Ministerial Benefit Association unless they are first approved by the General Conference.

YOUTH CONFERENCE Journal of Proceedings 8:00 a.m.-July 22, 1961

The seventh annual Youth Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgram Holiness Church was opened with a piano prelude by Bonnie Kilwy. Rev. Darrel Rotz, District Youth President, led the congregation in singing "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow." Rev. Rudolph Moore led in prayer.

Rev. Rotz introduced Rev. John D. Abbott, General Secretary of Pilgrim Youth, to the conference Rev. Abbott stated that there are 19,000,000 teen agers in the United States today, creating a great challenge and opportunity toward education, evangelism, fellowship and guidance, in an area that should be worked with all diligence and sincerity, if we expect to have a future in our church. Our future is tied up in our youth. Rev. Abbott read Luke 9:23-26, and spoke a few minutes from the text, "Whosoever shall save his life shall lose it, and whosoever shall lose his life for my sake, shall save it." We must realize that the youth is not separate from the church, but a part of the church, and youth has certain obligations toward the church. Briefly, they are: (1) Attend your church that we may flourish, and because the coming of the Lord is near. (2) Defend your church against false doctrines and heresies, against worldliness and complacency. (3) Expend your church; use the young people, use their lives, their testimonies, their time and talents to save lost souls. (4) commend your church by what you are, by what you do, by what you say. (5) Extend your church. No one can reach young people as well as other young people. Let it always be said that our young people are loyal to Christ and loyal to the church.

The conference was called to order by Rev. Abbott and the secretary read the roll call of churches. There were 14 pastors, 15 youth presidents and 27 delegates present. A motion setting the conference bar was carried.

The chairman was asked to explain the basis for determining the number of delegates to the youth convention, and explained that there should be one delegate for each 15 members, or major portion thereof, these members to be active and associate, but not honorary.

Dr. P. F. Elliott was introduced to the conference and brought greetings from Owosso College. Rev. Elliott was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The report of the District Youth President, Rev. Rotz, was given, and was accepted with a rising vote of thanks. Rev. Abbott stated, that from the president's report, the Western Ohio Youth Camp may have been the largest in the denomination, with 197 young people being registered. He told us that this is significant, since out of a survey of 1100 Christian young people, the greatest percentage testified that they found the Lord at a youth camp.

We were unable to hear the treasurer's report, as he became ill and had to return home from the conference. Motion to give the District Youth Council authority to examine and approve his report in order for it to be incorporated in the minutes of the proceedings, was carried.

Reports of Zone Presidents were tead, and were accepted by the conference. Rev. Abbott commended the district on the high percentage of attendance under age 35. He urged each zone to strive for 10 rallies per year.

The reports of the Youth Presidents were read, and were accepted by the conference. Fifteen societies reported, and an exchange of ideas for promoting interest among the youth was an interesting and profitable time for all present.

Following a ten minute recess, Rev. Armand Colvert Family from Indiana was introduced and asked to give brief testimonies, after which they were given honorary seats in the conference bar.

Report of the Youth statistician was read and accepted. Rev. Abbott encouraged us to strive for a gain in membership for the coming year.

The report of the resolutions committee was read by Rev. Wayne Goldsmith. Section "C", to be added to No. 7, YOUTH CAMP, concerning the investigation by a committee to determine whether better facilities for our youth camp may be obtained, was approved, as amended.

Motion to approve No. 10 C YOUTH SOCIETIES, providing for a training class for district youth leaders and held on Zone levels, was carried.

Recommendation of the District Council to combine Defiance and Lima Zone into one zone to be known as the Northern Zone, and to divide Hamilton Zone, creating both a Hamilton and a Cincinnati Zone was approved.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee could not be given, inasmuch as the treasurer is also chairman of this committee. Motion to give the youth council, in conjunction with the District Superintendent, authority to consider and approve or reject the report of the Committee was carried.

Tellers for the election of officers were appointed by the Youth President. They were John Whalen, Murlyn Enlow, Bob Lloyd and Paul Ingram.

Rev. Ted Wilson was elected on the first ballot to serve as District Youth President. He gave a brief accept ance speech.

Rev. Wayne Goldsmith was elected Vice President on the first ballot, and Rev. Donald Bassham was the choice of the conference for District Youth Treasurer. Rev. L. T. Brand was elected as secretary, but stated that he would be unable to serve. Rev. James Lynch was then elected as District Youth Secretary.

The conference was divided into zones for the election of zone presidents. The results were as follows: Northern Zone, Rev. Roy Bellomy; Dayton Zone, Rev. Robert Ferguson; Washington C. H. Zone, Rev. Leon Cook; Mulberry Zone, Rev. Donald Bassham; Greenville Zone, Rev. G.F. Sheridan; Cincinnati Zone, Mr. Arthur Booher. Inasmuch as there was small representation of the newly created Hamilton Zone, it was moved and carried that the election of the Hamilton Zone president be taken care of in the first organizational meeting of the zone.

A resolution of appreciation was submitted by the Resolutions Committee, and a rising vote of thanks was given to Rev. Abbott for presiding so efficiently over the conference.

Motion to authorize the youth council to approve the minutes of the conference and make any necessary corrections was carried.

Rev. Abbott gave a few closing words of encouragement and challenge to Western Ohio Youth, and following a motion to adjourn, Rev. Harold Monroe dismissed the conference with prayer.

Report Of Young People's Resolutions Committee

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone Chairman, be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolution Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

No. 3 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develope a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather news for the youth page of the WESTERN BUILDER.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 STATISTICIAN

Whereas the Manual in Section 86, Part 2, provides for each local youth president to give a report at the annual youth conference, be it resolved that we have a youth statistician and that said statistician be appointed by the Youth Council; and this report will not conflict with the present District report.

No. 7 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Campshave been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program - plans, dates, and administration to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

- A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp will begin the last Monday of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.
- C. Inasmuch as the site of our present youth camp has inadequate facilities, be it resolved that the District Youth President appoint a committee to investigate the possibilities of renting a campground. This committee shall be authorized to study further this change and to make the change, if possible, for this coming youth camp.

No. 8 Youth Council

Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times this year, and the officers of the District be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.

No. 9 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone annually.

No. 10 YOUTH SOCIETIES

- A. Inasmuch as the General Conference has outlined new organizational procedures for Youth Societies, be it resloved that the Youth Conference adopt the provisions.
- B. Be it resolved that the presidents of the local societies submit a written report of their local society, highlighting the activities, special services, and projects. This report is to be submitted to the secretary of the annual Youth Conference next year.
- C. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council plan this year to have a special training class for local youth society officers. These will be given in each zone. The purpose fo this training class will be to give encouragement, ideas, and a working plan for local societies.

No. 11 YOUTH TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed July 5, and the youth council appoint an auditing committee.

No. 12 ZONE PROGRAM

In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.

No. 13 ZONING

Be it resolved that the Hamilton Zone consist of the following churches: Hamilton, New Miami, Maud, Mason and Auburn Churches, and that the remaining churches, namely Cincinnati First, Elmwood, North Fairmount, Bevis, Cleves, and Cumminsville Mission, constitute a new zone known as the Cincinnati Zone.

Be it further resolved that the Lima and Defiance zones be combined to constitute a new zone to be known as the Northern Zone.

No. 14 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we give Rev. John Abbott, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, a standing vote of appreciation for his capable leadership over this conference.

Report Of Young People's Ways and Means Committee

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

- A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.
- B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$5.00 a year to maintain the fund.
- C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed sixcents (6 cts.) per mile for traveling expenses.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special project approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.00 to be paid by each church.
- B. Be it resolved that our youth project for this year be the buying of some permanent teaching aids, recreational equipment for the youth camp, and the purchase of stainless steel dinnerware for the dining room.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

Be it resolved that each zone raise the equivalent of \$7.00 per church for the District Youth Council and the District Youth Project Funds.

No. 4 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that the price of the Youth Camp be \$8.00 for the coming year, if held on these grounds.

At the request of Rev. G. E. Stace, District Treasurer, we have examined the cash receipts and disbursements of the Pilgrim Holiness Church-Western Ohio District for the period July 6, 1961 to July 6, 1961 which included the 1960 summer camp operation.

Although our examination was limited to such tests of receipts and disbursements as the records would permit, cash receipts were traced to bank deposits and disbursements

Although our examination was limited to such tests of receipts and disbursements as the records would permit, cash receipts were traced to bank deposits and disbursements were evidenced by cancelled checks. Confirmation of cash on deposit at the Milford National Bank disclosed that a recorded deposit of January 5, 1961 in the amount of \$1062.80 was not made. The misplaced items of receipts were found and deposited on July 12, 1961, consquently total funds at July 6, 1961 are represented by \$12,942.74 on deposit with the Milford National Bank and \$1062.80 of undeposited receipts. Transactions in the Pilgrim Holiness Church Extension Loan Fund were traced and found to be in order. The savings account balance of \$2321.99 was confirmed by correspondence from the Milford National Bank, Milford, Ohio.

A seperate checking account was maintained for the summer camp operation, however some camp disbursements were made from the general fund account. Therefore a combined cash receipts and disbursements statement is presented. Rev. G. E. Stace has indicated that all camp operations will be recorded seperately in the future. recommendations have been made to Rev. Stace for changes in procedure that would help to give better financial records.

It was impractical to verify recorded contributions received. However, from the extent of the examination it is our opinion that the accompanying statement correctly reflects the cash received and disbursed during the period under review.
