

reap. Too often, because of poor sowing and lack of spiritual interest on the part of the teacher, class-bell rings for dismissal does my responsibility as a teacher end? No! I should be alert at all times, and do my best to lead my scholars to Christ. We are to lead and not order. Ann Felrath says, "Teaching is the expression of our relationship and attitude to God and the Bible."

1. The teacher must have a personal, warm, vital, relationship with God. God should be reflected to the class through the teacher.

2 The tracker must think of

whole lesson outline for the quarter. Find the most appropriate lesson (preferably toward the last part of the quarter) that can be used to make a personal appeal. Each week build towards that lesson. When the iron is hot, then strike! The results may surprise you. If we plan and expect nothing we will receive nothing. This plan may not be practical. The wise teacher will observe the working of the Spirit. Whenever the pupil is moved, regardless of which Sunday, let the teacher be quick to use the opportunity to lead the child to the Saviour. This class-room appeal should not be out of order. Many are reluctant and embarrassed in public, and a personal talk after class might help him feel you are not trying to "put him on the spot," before the other members of the class.

5. A Sunday School revival service once a quarter is also good. After a brief class period, a short message in the Spirit, with a special appeal to the Juniors and the Young People, has proved a real blessing in many places. The sad part is that many Sunday Schools and teachers have not "thought" evangelism, and only few have attempted it.

It is with much praise in our hearts to God that we greet you from the island of Jamaica. We arrived here Saturday, Dec. 28th, and unpacked. The nett day (Sunday) the Constant Spring Church, where our Bible School is located, conducted a blessed welcome service for us which touched our hearts. We sang as a family in this meeting, and I brought the morning's message.
