


IN MEMORIAM

1908 **Rev. Mark Henry Bowman** 1965

The sudden death of the Rev. Mark H. Bowman on November 23, 1965, shocked Pilgrims across the church. He suffered a heart attack while working on the camp ground with several other ministers at Denton, Maryland. Rev. Bowman had been Superintendent of the Eastern District since July, 1960. Besides his widow, Anna, he is survived by two sons, Luke of Blue Ball, Pennsylvania, and John of Greensboro, North Carolina, and two sisters, Rev. Miss Ruth Bowman of Grand Cayman, British West Indies and Mrs. George Christman of Tamaqua, Pennsylvania.

Memorial services were held November 26 and 27 in the churches at Denton, Maryland and Reading, Pennsylvania. Some of his long-time friends shared in the services. Dr. R. D. Gunsalus gave the message at Denton, and Dr. Melvin H. Snyder at Reading. Expressions were made on the behalf of Eastern Dis-

trict, Pennsylvania - New Jersey District, and the General Church by Rev. H. Grier Baker, Rev. J. R. Mitchell and Rev. J. D. Abbott.

Bural was in Laurel Dale Cemetery near Reading, Pennsylvania.

Rev. Bowman was born in Bowmanstown, Pennsylvania, February 28, 1908. He was converted at the age of sixteen and sanctified four months later. For forty years he was a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church - the original affiliation being at the church in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, and at death he was a member of the Cambridge, Maryland Church.

Rev. Bowman was ordained by Rev. Seth C. Rees in 1931, and thereafter, with solemn commitment and earnest dedication gave himself to the ministry in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

He was a brother dearly beloved, a churchman, a Christian leader with a true pastor's heart. He is now with the Lord. The ministry of his influence survives and will continue to make its impact upon the lives of those who knew him.

His Early Life

Mark Bowman was born in Bowmanstown, Pennsylvania, a small town named for his great-grandfather, John Dieter Bowman. He was born in a God-fearing home, and was blessed with a sacred heritage. Mark was carried to the church from his infancy, the church which his father helped build. Mark grew up around camp meetings. His father was secretary and treasurer of the Bowmanstown Evangelical camp for more than forty years.

Outstanding holiness preachers from across the country, were frequent visitors and guests in the Bowman home. Mark's father had a vital interest in the founding of Beulah Park Bible School, and was a supporter of the school until his death.

His parents were much concerned about his Salvation. Ruth was one of the first students and the

following year Mark was sent there, after much entreating of the board, since he was not a saved boy. Rev. Russell Gardner, a close friend of the family sought his admittance, and earnestly prayed for his Salvation. During the opening convention and before classes had begun, Mark was genuinely and marvelously saved, in the dining room of Old Main.

Mark spent 7 years there, taking a business course at Dorney Business College, his high school and Theological training, also college work at Muhlenburg. During these years he worked hard to help grade the grounds and did many other things around the school.

He toured the zone with a quartette representing the Bible School, and doing whatever his hands found to do in promoting the school, which he dearly loved.

Soon after Mark's conversion, he with his father and sister attended an all day Holiness Meet-

ing, in the West Penn Evangelical Church. Rev. C. W. Ruth, a national holiness preacher of the Methodist church, expounded the Word of God. While preaching a great message, he said he felt God had called a young man, and laid his hand on him for the ministry. Mark was definitely called and referred to it many times, also telling how Rev. C. W. Ruth laid his hand on his head, which influence he felt through the years. He was true to that call throughout his life.

He graduated from Beulah Park Bible School in 1929, was ordained in 1931, took his first pastorate the same year.

After returning to school for the second semester of that first year at Beulah Park Bible School Mark was sanctified. He promised the Lord during his Christmas vacation he would seek the fullness of the blessing. He did so in the very first service. Cont'd. Page 3

On Nov. 28th we ended our revival with evangelist Rev. LeRoy Fetteroff and song-evangelist Mrs. Ruth Rimmer.

On the first day our Pastor, Rev. Braden Shrieves, suffered a heart attack and was taken to the hospital in an ambulance where he remained the duration of our twelve-day revival. Then our Evangelist developed "walking" pneumonia and was confined to bed for three days. During this time we had the tragic news of Brother Bowman's death and it seemed there was nothing to do but close our revival.

However, with the encouragement of Brother Fetteroff and the ability of Sister Rimmer to take his place in the pulpit for three services, we held on and the Lord greatly helped us in our predicament. After three days in bed, Brother Fetteroff resumed preaching under physical disadvantage. A number found the help they sought at the Altar and the revival went the full course of twelve days.

Our thanks and appreciation go to Brother Fetteroff and Sister Rimmer for the wonderful help they were to us. Sister Rimmer did so much more than she was called to do. She played both piano and accordion, sang, preached and gave both Scene-o-felt and Flannelgraph lessons as well as helped with the cooking and work in the parsonage in our Pastor's absence. May the Lord bless her and Brother Fetteroff for helping us through a trying time.

Brother Shrieves is still hospitalized and not doing as well as we had hoped. We solicit your prayers for him and for our church in the absence of our Pastor. Brother Belcher from Baltimore 2nd Church has kindly agreed to preach for us temporarily until we can make other arrangements.

Our Pastor will not be able to fill the pulpit until some time after the New Year.

Our church recently started holding Sunday afternoon services in a Nursing Home for the elderly. This has brought much joy to the "shut-ins" and has been a source of blessing to those who are giving up their Sunday afternoons for this ministry. Soon another Home will be opened to us for similar services for "shut-ins". If the Lord makes the way we will eventually hold services in jails also.

Our Missionary Society recently sent four boxes to Africa, three with Christmas gifts and one of used clothing for natives.

Incidentally, we are keeping our Pastor on full salary for the duration of his illness. At the close of our revival a Love offering of more than a hundred dollars was taken in for him. His son, Sammy and his nephew are being cared for by Sister Wilson at the Parsonage and Brother Elijah Sterling is doing all he can to see to

The Rev. Mark H. Bowman, 57, superintendent of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, died last Tuesday, November 23, after a heart attack on the grounds of the church camp at Denton.

Rev. Bowman had joined several men of the district in tidying the grounds when he was stricken. His widow, Mrs. Anna Mae Bowman and two other women prepared lunch for the workers. He had been called to lunch, waved his hands in answer to the call and slumped to the ground.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two sons, Luke who is a teacher in the public schools of Blue Ball, Pa., and John an instructor in music at the Southern Pilgrim College of Kernersville, N.C., and two sisters, Rev. Miss Ruth Bowman of Grand Cayman, B.W.I., and Mrs. George Christman of Tamaqua, Pa. Also one grandchild, Duane Bowman of Blue Ball, Pa.

Services were held Friday afternoon from the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Denton, conducted by Dr. Melvin Snyder and Rev. John D. Abbott of Indianapolis, Ind., assisted by Dr. Russell Gunsalus of Alexandria, Va. A further service was held Saturday at 2 p.m. in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Reading, Pa. Interment was in Laurel Dale Cemetery near Reading.

During the years Mark was a student at Beulah Park Bible School, he supplied the Pulpit, at both Pocono Lake, and Cherryville, Pa., Pilgrim Holiness churches, during his summer vacations. After his ordination in 1931 he became pastor of the Warren Pilgrim Holiness Church. Following a 4 year pastorate there, he accepted a call to the Pittsburgh District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, serving both the Elizabeth and Belle Bridge Churches, then giving his full time to the Elizabeth Church for three years, after serving both congregations for 6 years. In 1944 he was called to the Pittsburgh church, serving until 1946, when he accepted a call to the Washington, Pa. Church. From there he

went to the Cherryville, Pa. Church in the Penn-N.J. district. He pastored there until 1953, when he became pastor of the Cambridge, Md., Church until 1960, when he was elected to the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as District Superintendent.

While serving the churches across the years, Rev. Bowman served in many other capacities for his beloved church. While in the Pittsburgh, Pa. district, he gave 10 years as District Secretary and Assistant District Superintendent. He served 4 years each, as District Treasurer for both Penn-N.J. and Eastern districts. He has also served as Treasurer and Vice-President of the Board of Directors of Eastern Pilgrim College, and served as a board member for about 14 years. He also, at the time of his death was a member of the Board at Owosso College, Owosso, Michigan. He also served as Sunday School Promotional Secretary, on Home Missionary Boards and Youth organization, both zone and District. Rev. Bowman, certainly gave of himself, in anything his beloved church, asked of him to perform, until the day of his death.
