JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Session

The Second Annual Conference of the Wisconsin District opened by gathering around the altar for prayer with Rev. Lloyd George leading.

Rev. R. C. Hawkins was introduced to the conference and read from Acts 15:1-11.

It was moved and seconded that we receive into the Wisconsin District the following ministers: Rev. R. A. Pegram, North Carolina; Rev. Lloyd George, Northern Indiana; and Rev. Edsel Goins, Each Michigan. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the first six seats in the center section and the platform constitute the conference bar. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the hour of sittings be from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and from 1:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Carried.

Miss Ethel Jordan, a missionary, was introduced to the conference. It was moved and seconded that she be granted an honorary seat within the conference bar. Carried.

The report of the District Superintendent was read. A motion and second that it be accepted. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the conference instruct the Resolutions Committee to bring in resolutions of the Superintendent's recommendations.

Carried.

It was moved and seconded that we accept the Auditor's Report of the Treasurer. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that we accept the Treasurer's Report. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that we accept the Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that we accept the Executive Youth Secretary's report. Carried.

Rev. Floyd Dunn gave an oral report on the Wisconsin Pilgrim Journal. Motion and second to receive this report carried.

It was moved and seconded that we recess until 1:30 p.m. Carried.

Second Session

The second session of the Wisconsin Conference opened by singing "Redeemed" led by Rev. Edsel Goins; Rev. R. C. Hawkins led the devotions. He read Colossians 3:12, speaking about Christian mercy, kindness and humbleness of mind. Rev. John Eastburn led the conference in prayer.

The conference minutes of the first session were read and approved.

The pastor's reports were given with the glow of their victories in their given fields. Their faith in God has been strengthened and He has blessed their labors. A hearty "Amen" was given to receive these reports.

The Educational and Examining Board recommended that fourth year license be given to Rev. Lloyd George and Rev. John Dunn, and third year license be given to Rev. Edsel Goins. It was moved and seconded that these recommendations from the Educational and Examining Board be accepted. Carried.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read. Motion and second to accept this report carried.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was read. Motion and second to accept this report carried.

Third Session

The third session of the Wisconsin District Conference opened by singing "Blessed Assurance" led by Rev. Emery. Rev. Loyd Montgomery led in prayer. Rev. Hawkins led in devotions reading from Colossians 1:21.

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.

The District Statistician's report was given. It was moved and seconded that the report be accepted. Carried.

The election of officers was the next order of business. Rev. O. D. Emery, Superintendent, appointed tellers, Rev. Edsel Goins and Rev. Lloyd George.

Rev. R. A. Pegram was elected to the Educational and Examining Board to fill the expired term of Rev. Loyd Montgomery.

Rev. John Eastburn was elected ministerial dele-

gate to the General Conference of 1958. Rev. Clinton Woods was elected alternate delegate. Mr. William Blann was elected lay delegate to General Conference. Mr. Ivan Eastman was elected alternate lay delegate.

The District Council appointed Rev. John Dunn as Executive Youth Secretary.

Mrs. Elsie Bradley gave a report of the Memorial Committee. It was moved and seconded that we accept this report. Carried.

The secretary was instructed to include in the Memorial Report words of appreciation for the gractions work of the Milwaukee Missionary Society in giving birthday gifts to the ministerial workers of the Wisconsin District.

Miss Ethel Jordan related some of her experiences in opening new works in foreign fields, and expressed appreciation for the work being done within her home state of Wisconsin.

The conference adjourned with prayer by our presiding officer, Rev. R. C. Hawkins.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Second Annual District Conference of the Wisconsin District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings:

Thanks be unto God for His manifold blessings wherewith He has blessed us. As I submit this report to you, it marks the end of the first year of service as your full time District Superintendent. As I reflect back over this past period of fourteen months, I rejoice that God has continued to bless us and lead us forward. I think if God had not in His mercy given some increases and allowed a measure of growth, I could not consider continuing in this capacity in our district. If this field of battle ceases to be one where we are wrenching territory from Satan and his forces of evil, I for one, will be looking for another place to serve my God who delights to see His banners lifted on the defeated ruins of Hell's strongholds. If we ever become content at merely holding our lines, I shall then seek a place where the attack is on. If we cease to be on the offensive. we shall surely find ourselves on the defensive. Wars are seldom won by defensive methods. Nor will we ever be what God intended us to be if we cease to engage the enemy in his territory.

But our gains are entirely too small. In spite of very good gains the last quarter of the year in District Sunday Schools, the low average in the first part of the year has largely offset the gain. In membership the Statistician's Report will show we are about at the same membership level at which we found ourselves last conference. This has been a severe disappointment to me since we have opened three new works and in some churches have added new members. Let us determine that this next year will be one of marked increases in all departments. past year, we have been able to open three new works. We also purchased seven pieces of church property. One new parsonage has been constructed and one church is under construction. Thank God for these developments. Since our last conference, our camp meeting program has been launched with fine success.

I thank God for the Pilgrim Holiness Church of which we are each a part. It is gratifying to feel the stirring of revival which seeks our response.

DISTRICT SUPT. REPORT (Continued)

The Forward Movement, current within the program of the Church, can propel us out into the channels of revival power where God the Holy Ghost is at work in our generation. It remains to be seen whether we will insist on being loyal to our traditions above all else, or loyal to God, the God of Revival. Are we so afraid of offending our doctrines that we will be content to stand by in a dead orthodoxy and let God move on with revival within the ranks of those at doctrinal odds with us? The conviction has seized me that God, though He does not desire the prevailing of doctrinal error, may reach the lost through the efforts of those who do not teach the wonderful truth of "Holiness", simply because we will not move into His channels. Our position of latitude and longitude with respect to theological north and south poles does not alone assure us an automatic place in God's program of Revival. The Holy Ghost is taking a bride out of the world for Christ -- this through revival. Let us have a stimulus to revival, let us foster the Forward Movement Program. Though it does not pertain specifically to us, we yet can have our own Forward Movement in Wisconsin. As Rev. P. W. Thomas, our General Church Editor, recently stated in the editorial under the title, IF YE HAVE FAITH, "In these last days there is a stirring in the ranks. The end time with all its attendant evils is upon us, but there is gracious victory for the dedicated follower of the Lamb. The Prophet Daniel said, 'But the People that do know their God shall be strong and do exploits'."

Our district might well reach forward to the attainment of some goals as we face the new year. Let us stir ourselves to the following accomplishments under God.

- 1. 20 churches and preaching points by General Conference of 1962.
- 2. 6 fully organized churches by General Conference of 1958.
- 3. 100 Advocate subscriptions by General Conference of 1958.
- 4. 300 average District Sunday School attendance by General Conference of 1958.

DISTRICT SUPT. REPORT (Continued)

I have presented these goals to the Council and they recommend that you adopt them.

In the interest of the spiritual progress of our churches, let us also set the following standards for our local church programs.

- 1. No less than two revivals in every church and preaching point this year. Why not determine to have a specific Holiness Convention? A series of services for indoctrination of the laymen in the "Holy Life".
- 2. Cottage prayer meetings in the interest of local revivals.
- 3. A systematic study of the Word of God in prayer services or other times.
- 4. The use of probationary membership accompanied by membership classes.

These matters will do much to give us progress under the Holy Ghost.

REPORT OF PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

a. Report

It has been my honor to work the Kingdom this conference year in the capacity of Promotional Secretary. After assumption of these duties, a tentative plan of action was adopted in conference with Superintendent Emery.

In the prosecution of this plan, four Sunday School Conventions were conducted, two in the fall and two in the spring. The two fall conventions were held at Milwaukee and Hillsboro. These were attended by the churches of the eastern and western zones respectively. Dr. Charles Gibson, Superintendent of the Wisconsin District of the Church of the Nazarene, was the speaker for these conventions. His ministry proved a great inspiration and challenge to those in attendance. The two spring conventions were held at Milwaukee and Sparta. Rev. Wm. S. Deal was the convention speaker for these conventions

tions. His ministry also proved to be of great benefit to the Wisconsin Pilgrims.

The bulk of the rest of the secretary's work consisted in receiving, compiling and mailing out the monthly reports and in doing such correspondence and other duties as were incident to this office.

While it is true that the statistician will present the statistics of the Sunday Schools for the year, it might be of interest to mention a few of the most interesting facts with reference to these statistics.

The Green Bay Sunday School won the state contest banner as a result of the greatest percentage of growth during the Sunday School Revival. There has been a very gratifying growth in attendance during the last two months. Three of the Sunday Schools will be awarded 10% Ribbons during the conference.

b. Recommendations

- From experiences of last year, it would seem wise to recommend that every pastor take positive and definite steps to insure the prompt and regular mailing of the reports to the Promotional Secretary.
- 2. It is recommended that each Sunday School set some local goals for attendance toward which it may work.
- 3. It is recommended that a friendly contest be entered between the churches of comparable size for the purpose of generating and stimulating more interest in Sunday School growth.

It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve the Master and the District in this capacity. The help-ful suggestions and wise counsel of Superintendent Emery as well as the cooperation of the pastors and laymen have been deeply appreciated. To God be all the Glory.

After moving to the district, we considered having a Youth Camp. It was thought because we were limited in numbers, it would be best to cooperate either with the Free Methodist or the Wesleyan Methodist in a youth camp. These plans did not materialize, therefore we have not had a youth camp, as yet. We were happy to have a youth time set aside for us at camp, though.

There is only one purpose for having a youth camp. That purpose is to bring boys and girls to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. A youth camp lends itself to this purpose in a most excellent way. A camp with a forceful evangelistic appeal will reach some of our youth who are seemingly untouched and unmoved at home.

As we provide activity, create interest and keep our young people busy doing things in the interest of God and His Church, we are saving them from the very hands of the Evil One and preparing a people who will carry on for God after we have gone to our reward.
