



CONFERENCE MINUTES

FIFTY-SEVENTH CONFERENCE OF WEST VIRGINIA DISTRICT OF PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

Opened by singing "All Hail the Power", led by Rev. Alam Ledford. Conference stood while Rev. R. E. Grindstaff lead in prayer. District Superintendent, Rev. Parker Husselton in charge. Dr. P. F. Elliott, General Superintendent introduced to Conference by District Superintendent, who brought us Christian greetings from the board of General Superintendents. Dr. Elliott informed us the conference message will be given at the evening sitting.

After conference instructions, roll call of ministers and lay delegates completed conference time 1:30-5:00, 7:00-9:30 Wednesday; 8:00-12:00 Thursday. Conference bar set first 10 seats in east section including the platform.

Motion supported to seat Rev. Dennis Guile from the New York District, as a member of this conference, and Rev. Hez Shelton seated from the Gulf States District.

Report of Rev. Parker Husselton, District Superintendent read and motion to receive indicated by conference standing with a real hearty Amen.

Oral report of Assistant Superintendent, Rev. H. H. Harrison received. Report of Auditing Committee received. Report of District Treasurer, Rev. J. Franklin Lint, read and accepted. District Statistician reported. Rev. H. H. Harrison read the totals and after explanations as to the proper manner of filling out report blanks. Report was received with thanks.

Motion supported council prepare a financial statement of district property and it be included in minutes.

Report of Rev. Edward Miller, Sunday School Promotional Secretary accepted.

District Missionary President, Mrs. Parker Husselton reported.

Recessed for ten minutes.

Memorials read by District Secretary, conference stood with bowed heads in memory of departed loved ones. Prayer by Dr. Elliott.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION 7:00 - 9:30

Opened by singing "Blessed Be the Name" led by Rev. Edward Miller. Prayer by Rev. Hez Shelton. Scripture Romans 1-16.

Highlights from Dr. Elliott's message:

Call of the Ministry is the greatest call of all.

CAMP AND CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

(WAYS AND MEANS)

- No. 1. Be it resolved that the deadline for receiving a deposit on rooms be set at May 15 and in the event no deposit on rooms is received the Registrar be authorized to advertise the room for rent June 15, and the first \$2.00 deposit secures it. Be it further resolved that in the event a lock is placed on the room an identifiable key must be filed with the registrar in order that the room may be used if necessary. This \$2.00 deposit is to hold the room till the first Saturday night of Camp at 6:00 p.m.
- No. 2. We recommend a charge of \$6.00 for all rooms except rooms with 4 beds these are to be \$10.00. We further recommend a charge of \$3.00 per person be made for lodging for the entire camp and .35 for one night.
 - No. 3. We recommend a charge for meals for the entire camp be as follows:

2 years thru 12 years\$	2.00
13 years thru 18 years	
19 years and over	4.00
Single meals (2 thru 12)	.20
Single meals (13 and over)	

No. 4. We recommend that each church send to District Treasurer for District Conference Expenses: \$2.00 for each delegate and licensed and ordained ministers and ordained deaconesses.

Meals for Conference member's children as follows:

Under 10 years	Ме	eals	free

No. 5. Whereas, The camp ground has been laid out in streets and lots, and

Whereas, leases to these lots have been offered for sale over a number of years, and

Whereas, many of the leases have been sold, and

Whereas, some leases have been built upon, and other cottages are in the planning stage, therefore

We recommend that permission in writing be granted by the District Council for retired and disabled ministers to live on the camp grounds.

We further recommend that the lease holder be required to pay for utilities and, We further recommend that the District Council set the rate of payment and that the council be guided in rate setting by the size of the cottage and the number of persons occupying it.

And be it further recommended that if at the demise of the lease holder, the heirs or assigns be judged by the District Council to be persons not in harmony with the spirit, intents, and purposes of the camp, the property shall be sold as follows:

A notice shall be caused to be posted on the building by the District Council for a period of six months of intentions to sell. The property to be sold at the best available price and the proceeds of the sale to be turned over to the heirs

or assigns. The council shall be required to notify the heirs or assigns at the time of posting the building, of intent to sell, by registered mail. No more than \$50.00 shall be retained by the District Council for the expenses of the sale.

- No. 6. We recommend that each local church pay the expenses of their pastor and delegate to the district conference.
- No. 7. We recommend that all Ordained and Licensed ministers and their families other than those from our district be given free meals at our camp, however, the regular charge shall be made for rooms.

WAYS AND MEANS

(DISTRICT)

- No. 1. We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be based on \$9.50 per member.
 - No. 2. We recommend that the District Minutes be sold at 25¢ per copy.
- No. 3. We recommend that each church, upon the official visit of the District Superintendent, raise the following amounts: Churches who have under forty members, \$6.00; with forty or over, \$8.50 per visit.
- No. 4. We recommend that the District Budget be set at \$4,810.00 and be divided as follows:

District Home Missions	500.00

District Camp and Conference	400.00
District Sunday School	100.00

- No. 5. We recommend that the District Budget and the United Stewardship Fund be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send to the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all World Missionary offering, Y.P.S. offering and Evangelist pay.
- No. 6. We recommend that District Superintendent's salary be set at \$4,200.00 per year plus traveling expenses at the rate of .07 per mile on all official business. This money to be raised in the following manner: \$2,900.00 as provided in budget. Offerings are to be taken when he visits the churches, half-tithes of all District pastors and evangelists. Also \$12,00 a year from tithes of district and local preachers, except those age 65 and over.
- No. 7. We recommend that the Superintendent's full ministerial tithes be placed in the Incidental and International Conference Expense Fund. These Ministerial tithes to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.
- No. 8. We recommend that the District Parsonage payments be obtained by taking \$80.00 per month out of the over-all budget.
- Na. 9. We recommend the continuation of the District Home Missions Calendar offerings.

- No. 10. We recommend that one-half of the Mother's Day Sunday School offerings be designated for District Sunday School Department.
- No. 11. We recommend that all district assessments be sent to the District Treasurer monthly.
- No. 12. We recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and wife.
- No. 13. We recommend that the district pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit.
- No. 14. We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay 4% into the pension plan and the district pay 4% out of the Incidental account.
- No. 15. We recommend that the Youth Society of the district run the refreshment stand, during Youth Camp. We further recommend a capable manager be appointed by the district council to run the refreshment stand during conference and camp and the profits be divided equally between district and youth.
- No. 16. Whereas, our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin. Be it resolved that all money received from the estate be placed in the fund known as the "Conklin Fund". The fund is to be used for the sole purpose of constructing new churches. Loans from the Conklin Fund are to be handled under the same plan as the Church Loan Fund.
- No. 17. We recommend that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer.
- No. 18. We recommend that the District Superintendent on each official visit to the church sit down with the pastor and the church board to see that the budget is paid in full and that the half tithes of the pastor is paid to the District Treasurer.

RESOLUTION OF THE DISTRICT ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF W. VA. DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

WHEREAS, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this District, that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

The above resolution was adopted by the West Virginia District Conference at Culloden, W. Va., on August 20, 1956.

No. 20. BE IT RESOLVED: a church loan fund be established by appropriating \$4,000.00 from the special account for this purpose.

Be it further resolved that the loan fund operate as follows:

(1) The executive members of the council shall be a committee to pass on all loan applications and authorize loans.

- (2) Loans shall be made to establish churches for new construction of church or parsonage for the repairs and or the improvement of the same.
- (3) Loans are not to exceed \$1,000.00. The interest rate shall be 5% and payments must be made monthly on the first day of the month...payments made after the 15th of the month will be charged an extra months interest as a late charge.
- (4) Monthly payments will be figured at 2% of the face of the note as a minimum, however, no payment shall be less than \$5.00 per month except the last payment. This amount is to cover interest and payment on the principal. The minimum interest charge shall be 50¢ per month.
 - (5) No loan will be granted for any amount under \$100.00.
 - (6) Monthly payments shall be made to the district treasurer.
- (7) The local church shall give the district a note covering the amount of the loan, signed by the trustees.
- (8) The amount above the regular payment will be received at payment due time. Not more than one payment will be received in a given month, except that the note may be paid in full at any time.

RESOLUTIONS

(DISTRICT)

- 1. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp.
- 2. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint a Sunday School board of four, including the Sunday School Promotional Secretary.
- 3. Be it resolved that this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage."
- 4. Be it resolved that "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds.
- 5. Be it resolved that we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp.
- 6. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation pay each year, and that he have the privilege of holding two revivals off the District.
- 7. Be it resolved that each pastor endeavor to secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership families.
- 8. Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work on the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches at least twice each year.
- 9. Be it resolved that our District Council meet at least once each Quarter.
- 10. Be it resolved that all ministers in the District be considered for pastoral placement before any one out of the District is considered.
- 11. In as much as many ministers of the District have long distances to travel to ministerial conventions thus finding it expedient to leave after the last afternoon services, be it resolved that the time in the week for ministerial conventions be as follows, the first service beginning on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 and the last service concluded at noon Thursday and be it further resolved the date of our District Ministerial Convention be the last week in March.
- 12. Be it resolved that the district Sunday school banners be awarded to the schools having the largest percentage and numerical gains over the previous year.
- 13. Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committees meet with applicants on Tuesday before Conference at the following time:

14. Be it resolved that the pastors be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Resolution No. 1 - (as amended) Since there is such a wide variation in age and abilities in our youth camp group, BE IT RESOLVED, that we divide our youth camp into junior and senior divisions, to be held as one camp. The junior division age span would range from 9-13 years of age, and the senior age group from 14-35. Carried.

Resolution No. 2 - BE IT RESOLVED, that youth camp registration begin at 9:30 A.M. on Monday, the first day of camp, and that from 2:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. of the same day be designated as the "get acquainted" period, at which time teachers and counselors shall be introduced and the whole group familiarized with the camp program and regulations. Carried.

Resolution No. 3 - (as amended) BE IT RESOLVED, that a recreational director and committee be appointed by the **executive** Youth Council early in the year, for the purpose of promoting and guiding an enthusiastic recreational program that would involve all campers, and that the recreational facilities be made ready for the first day of youth camp. Carried.

Resolution No. 4 - Whereas it is the obligation of the youth to manage the lunch stand, BE IT RESOLVED, that a manager be appointed by the Youth Council, now, or as soon as possible, and that this manager be responsible for the purchasing of needed supplies so that the same would be ready to sell on the first day of youth camp. Carried.

Resolution No. 5 - Inasmuch as the General Youth have set up a Bible quiz program. BE IT RESOLVED, that we, as a District, adopt the same program. Carried.

Motion for District youth to donate \$200, the means of which shall be left to the discretion of the Executive Youth Council, for the purchasing of tools for the campground by the District Council. Motion for District Council to elect supervisor over these tools.

Motion that the youth department purchase an American flag, to be flown on the Campgrounds during Conference and Camp Meeting. The location and installation of the flag shall be left to the discretion of the Executive Youth Council. So Ordered.

Motion to instruct the Youth Council to invite the Sunday School Council to a joint meeting, to form a committee for the purpose of sponsoring a District-wide "work-shop" conferette under the direction of this committee and subject to approval by the District Council. So Ordered.

Motion to delete Resolution No. 2, page 21 of the 1965 Conference Minutes. So Ordered.

Motion that the youth camp be scheduled at a date which will not interfere with July 4th. So Ordered.

Motion that the date of Youth Conference be prior to Annual Camp Meeting and that such date be under the jurisdiction of the District Youth Council. So Ordered.

Motion to have afternoon evangelistic service from 1:30 P.M. to 2:30 P.M. during the youth camp, and the remainder of the afternoon for recreation. So Ordered.

Motion to authorize District Treasurer to Disburse amount needed for each page of Youth Minutes published in the District Minutes. So Ordered.

District Youth President's report and resignation given. This was received by a standing vote of appreciation for his service, and regret at his resignation.

Motion to recess at 12 o'clock noon and convene at 12:45 P. M.

Conference convened at 12:45 P. M. with singing of "When I See The Blood," led by Bro. Stanley Hess.
