Have it. Drink it, inhale it, bathe in it, live in it and let it live in you, until you breathe it out as naturally as Saul of Tarsus breathed out threatenings and slaughter. This is the first, indispensable qualification for preaching either entire sanctification or justification. St. Augustine's "Confessions" have stirred the souls of thousands for fifteen centuries

Let us, as far as possible, have sound theology, but first let us have the indwelling Christ. Better would it be to have the life in God enjoyed by a Thomas a Kempis, even though we believed in transubstantiation, and the life enjoyed by Bunyan, even though we were advocates of Calvin's "horrible decree," than to be as clear as crystal in the doctrine of holiness, while as cold as ice, or as grasping as Nabal, or as frothy as yeast and as unreliable as quicksand. Real experience has a tongue of fire and a heart of love. The Conference Council authorized the ordination of Brother Millan in its September meeting, and on September 25th at the Rees Memorial Church Reverend Robert I. Millan (already called of God to His service) was ordained to the Gospel ministry. He gave his farewell address on October 6th at the regular missionary meeting.

When you read this news item of your missionary, your personal representative will have taken up his duties across the border. Hold him up in prayer as you would wish to be if you were in his place.

#### THE ADULT DEPARTMENT

We wish to share with you some gleanings and a few ideas pertaining to the adult department of the Sunday school.

The Sunday school was first founded by Robert Raikes of England, in the 18th century, for the purpose of teaching children only. At that time the movement was opposed by the clergy. Today, however, the pendulum has swung to the other extreme-clergy and laymen alike favor christian education for the child, and everywhere we turn there are helps and more helps-but so far as we have been able to observe, very little is being done even yet for the adult Sunday school. The adults are not Sunday school minded, and we as Churches have become "caretakers" of children for a short time on Sunday-only to lose our pupils during the teen age.

What is wrong?

"Get the sheep, and the lambs will follow." In other words, win the parents to the Sunday school and you will have the children.

How can this be done?

What do we have to offer when the parent arrives at our Sunday school? In answer may we say in the smaller churches, usually nothing!

First impressions often are lasting ones, and sometimes first impressions are not so good. It is a new innovation for our first timer, so he loads the family into the family chariot and arrives ahead of time, or at least on time. The superintendent and teachers have not yet arrived. The opening exercises are geared to the needs of

the Primary department, so our first timer is asked to sing "Climb, Climb Up Sunshine Mountain,' and also to "please do the motions." At last the opening exercises are over and our first timer moves over to the Bible class where the ages range from 12 to 90. The teacher begins by saying, "Has anyone studied his lesson?" After some pause he puts his pupils at ease by saying, "Well, neither have I. We will read the lesson over and study it together." Our first timer longs for class to end. At the door they say, "See you next Sunday." He thinks, "Not if I see you first." Once outside, he takes a deep breath, throws his hat into the air and shouts, "Hurrah!" Believe me, you will never see him again!

No, I have not had an attack of indigestion! I am merely giving you some first-hand observations and relating conditions that obtain in *most* smaller churches of *all* denominations.

It is my considered opinion that every church can have at least two or three departments in their Sunday school:

1 to 8	Beginner and
	Primary
8 to 12	Junior
12 to 15	Junior High
15 and above	Young People
	and Adult

The first step in planning to win your adults is to have a separate department for your Beginners and Primary children. Even if there is only a door between the departments, arrangement should be made to have separate opening exercises for the smaller children.
