District Superintendent's Report

To General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, Delegates and friends of the Eighth Annual Conference of The Western Ohio District of The Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings.

Our common faith, experience, and interests bring us together again to review the past, and plan for future endeavor in building The Kingdom of God. This has been a year of intense effort and activity, and we are happy to report one of the finest years in program, fellowship, cooperation, unity, vision for progress and growth.

Beginning last fall the National Sunday School Institute, with its fervor and enthusiasm, served as an impetus, and set the pattern for six District Sunday School Institutes to be held November 6 through 11. Rev Wayne Goldsmith, promotional Secretary, and the Sunday School Committee presented an excellent program with Rev. Ray Martin, Jr. from Indianapolis as the guest speaker. Teacher Training Courses were later held in several areas.

Reference was made last year in the Superintendent's report to the need and desire for Pastor's Seminars. These were carried out in each of the seven zones, with most gratifying results. A meal and time of fellowship was followed by a detailed study of the entire program of the church, with instructions, suggestions and admonitions. Through these meetings, the cooperation, love and dedication of the ministry of Western Ohio was clearly revealed. Pastor's wives were included in these meetings, and their interest and dedication was no less fervent than that of their husbands. It is our desire to see similar meetings again this year with a portion of the time specifically devoted to the pastor's wives.

Our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, met with us in area meetings in September, at Liberty Center, Cincinnati First and Miamisburg. As always, his messages gave a real sense of perspective, that caused us to thrill at the grand call to the Ministry, then dedicate ourselves to be true to this call, and be used of God to bring the lost into the fold.

The Ministerial Convention was held in February with Dr. George Failing as the guest speaker. His fresh and inspiring ministry, together with many other helpful features, sent our ministers out into the field with the faith that we are the emissaries of God commissioned to proclaim His Glorious Gospel to a lost world.

Youth Institutes were held this year in six of the seven zones, two zones being combined for one of the meetings. These were with the specified purpose of giving practical help to the various officers of the local societies, and to stimulate the forming of Youth Societies, where we were previously without them. Rev. Ted Wilson and the entire Youth Committee was new this year, but nevertheless gave us excellent leadership and are to be commended.

The Youth Camp held June 25-29 with Rev. Bob Nelson as the evangelist, was attended by 184 boys and girls, with 18 enrolled workers, making a total of 202. It was most rewarding to see approximately half of this number bowing at the altar for prayer. This is, without question, one of the finest ministries of our District Program.

The Graduation Banquet held May 19 at the C. A. C. Building in Dayton, honoring our High School Graduates, was a new feature of interest in youth. Dr. Elliott and a Quartet from Owasso College were with us for the occasion, which we trust was only the first.

The bus trip to Owasso College, sponsored by Rev. and Mrs. M. H. Robbins was also a new, thrilling and profitable experience for our youth. It is my conviction that we need to do more to save our youth. With the temptations and pressures of our day dragging them farther from God and the church, it behooves us to rise up and be counted in their defense.

Material Progress

This has been a good year of material progress, with several churches making great forward steps to meet the need of their community for better facilities of worship.

AFTON—The Afton church has purchased a lovely parsonage near the church, enabling the pastor to live in this fine growing community.

MADISONVILLE—Dedication services were held on November 5th for the beautiful new sanctuary that has long been anticipated. The pleasing architectural effect tying the new structure to the old Southern Colonial edifice, complimented by artistic painting, has made this a beautiful and inviting place of worship, with adequate facilities for the growing need.

CLEVES—This church has installed a new furnace, together with many other improvements on the building. This community, nestled in the hills just southwest of Cincinnati, offers a real challenge, and the Pilgrims there are striving to meet it.

DAYTON FIRST—Purchase has recently been made of an excellent location on Troy Pike in North Dayton. The site has an adequate parsonage, (which will be used temporarily for worship), and land on which to build their proposed new church. Transactions have now been completed and the congregation met at the new location for the first time this past Sunday, July 15. Construction is scheduled to begin very soon.

DAYTON WESTWOOD—This church will now be known as Dayton Riverdale, having relocated in the Riverdale area on North Main Street in Dayton. Their new location includes a relatively new brick church building with full basement and an adjacent parsonage. The transition has been effected very smoothly with a beautiful spirit of cooperation and an excellent growth in interest and attendance.

MAUD—A new location has been purchased, including a home for parsonage, and land on which to build their proposed new church. Their lovely new parsonage, built only a few years ago, was sold in order to place their equity in a new church with better facilities by which to minister the Gospel in that area.

MIAMISBURG—Negotiations are now in progress for the sale of their old building and the purchase of a beautiful brick church on Kircher St. in Miamisburg. This represents a move of faith and vision on the part of the local people, and a grand addition to our District.

SPRINGFIELD FIRST—Property was purchased and a sorely needed parking lot constructed.

WASHINGTON C. H.—Dedication services were held on Easter Sunday for the new Sunday School unit, which was made necessary by their growing attendance. The steady growth and development of this relatively new church, has been most gratifying. The fruitful ministry of Rev. and Mrs. L. R. Roberts has again given us an excellent church, adding to their great contribution to the Western Ohio District.

District Missionary Projects

The major project this year has been the work at Piqua. Backed by the contributions and prayers of the District, the pastor, Rev. Kilwy, reports a steady growth of interest and attendance, with vision for a bright future for a strong church there.

Rev. Gilbert DeLong also reported excellent progress this year in the Leipsic Church.

Appreciation

From the deep of my heart, I can say that this has been one of the finest years of fellowship and cooperation.

The District Council, whether in regular meetings or special sessions, has been most cooperative to attend and faithful and willing to work until their obligations were discharged. The December meeting, held at the District Parsonage and followed by the evening meal and fellowship, together with the wives attending, was only characteristic of the fellowship of these men who carry the administrative responsibility of the District. To them I am most grateful and wish to express my sincere appreciation.

Rev. O. E. Rutledge, Assistant Superintendent, has been ready to help and give council whenever needed. His understanding cooperation and help have often lifted a heavy load, and for this we are most grateful.

The Future

My first vision and prayer is for revival to be born in my own heart and in the heart of every minister of Western Ohio, until we can see a real spiritual awakening, and the fruits of a genuine pentecost in our district. The past year has been filled with good programs and many good things, but if we can have more of God and less of men in these mechanics, we can see more accomplished.

My vision is for a stronger youth work, including an active Youth program in every church. This need not always be a strictly formal organization, but if we do not do something more for our youth to counteract the evil of our day, we will lose another generation, for which we will be held responsible.

We are thankful for a net gain of 89 in membership over last year. This is a step in the right direction. Church membership is a means to the end of establishing Christian character and influence, and more should be done to promote it. May each church give serious consideration as to how they can effectively tie their people to the church, where they can grow and build a lasting spiritual influence in the community.

We have the finest in dedicated men, who are ready and willing to give their all for the advancement of the Kingdom of God, however all of us are striving to be

more effective. Proposed plans for the coming year will furnish new and fresh ideas, sources of help, new methods of procedure, etc. We are extremely grateful for what God has done for us, but not satisfied with what we have done for Him and others.

Better facilities is a must for a number of churches. We urge them to build as soon as possible, in a practical and economical manner, with an eye to the future expansion as God enables them.

Our plea is for an all-out effort in the Work of God. Part mobilization is not acceptable. Holiness in its basic principal is founded on complete surrender and submission to the full will of God. This also involves complete dedication of all talents and possessions. Half-hearted professionalism will never bring revival. Rashness is never a virtue, neither is complacency acceptable to pentecostal standards. "Arise, let us be going."

WESTERN OHIO CONFERENCE
JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, Tuesday, July 17, 1962 Convening at 7.30 P. M.

The Eighth Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the pringfield Camp Ground at 7:30 P. M., July 17, 1962, with District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe calling the conference to order. Before the song service, Rev. Monroe called upon the conference to reverence God in a stand- ing silent prayer.

Rev. M. H. Robbins led the congregation in singing, "When the Roll is Called up Yonder." Rev. Raymond Simpson was called upon to lead in prayer. Rev. Monroe then introduced the Presiding Officer, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, General Superintendent, who brought greetings from the various areas of the church.

In his opening remarks, Dr. Neff duscussed the four things that will make for a good conference. First, good thinking. He urged us to bring to bear upon this conference the best thinking of which we are capable—plenty of good sanctified thinking will help us to carry out the command to love God with all our minds. The power of prayer is also an important phase of having a successful conference. There are many important jobs to be done here—preaching, singing, committee work, cooking—and some body

must do the praying. There is a great reward for the intercessor. The third thing we need is the Disposition of Jesus—a disposition of divine love; a love that does not look for false motives, cast aspersions, innuendos and insinuations, that saves us from office seeking and fault—finding and carnal criticism. This kind of love will make a good conference. The presence of the Holy Spirit will provide us with the longsuffering, fellowship and the ability to make the right decisions we need to make to have a worth—while conference. Let us remember that the business of this conference is just as spiritual as the camp meeting services will be later. God grant us this power for this conference.

Rev. Monroe responded briefly to the General Superintendent's address, and immediately turned the service to the Chairman.

The Roll Call of Ministerial and lay delegates was taken. In the absence of both the delegate and alternate of the Troy church, the delegate appointed by the church board was seated in the conference. The pastors were asked by the Chairman to have delegates arriving later to report to the secretary upon their arrival.

The standing rules concerning the conference bar and the time of sittings were read.

The report of the District Superintendent was read by Rev. Monroe and was received with a rising vote of thanks.

The report of the Examining Board recommended the following: Clyde Waites, Gilbert Delong, and Miss Leavinia Walston for ordination; for acceptance in his status of ordained minister, Rev. Sidney Lambert from the Church of Christ in Christian Union; and Rev. Verl Light for First Year District License. The report was accepted by the conference.

Rev. Sidney Lambert, coming to us from the Church of Christ in Christian Union, and Rev. Verl Light from the Christial Nation Church, were welcomed to our fellowship and given a seat within the Conference Bar.

Rev. B. Ivan Williams, Rev. Frederick Baker and Rev. Armond Calvert, who were already settled in the district, were also welcomed to a seat within the Conference Bar.

Mrs. Wm. H. Neff was introduced to the conference and after giving words of testimony, was extended the courtesy of a seat within the conference bar.

The sitting was adjourned with prayer by the District Secretary.

Second Sitting, 8:30 P. M., July 18, 1962

The second session of conference was opened at 8:30 a. m., Wednesday, July 18th, with Rev. Garry Spriggs leading the congregation in singing, "It is Mine." Rev. B. Ivan Williams was at the piano. Rev. D. R. Close led in prayer.

Dr. Neff addressed the conference briefly, but pointedly concerning the importance of planning programs in a prayerful spirit. He spoke as follows:

"We know that nothing worthwhile in this life comes to us by accident. Our homes, our farms, our possessions, our travels, all are the products of planning. My mother used to say she must plan her day if she wished to accomplish anything during that day. There are sometimes good men who think that we are wrong in adopting programs and having goals and obligations. These good men are mistaken. They tell us that programs are not spiritual. You will get no where and reach no worthwhile ends without planning ahead for them. Good, but mistaken, preachers often complain about adopting the conference goals and plans. They adopt a "let us alone" attitude. Likewise, there is a great cry for less activism and more spirituality, as though they were enemies of one another. This is not necessarily so. We are warned that more prayer is needed, and fewer campaigns. May I observe that we need more of both? Jesus prayed in the night, but in the daytime, he was in the crossroads where there was the most need, in the market-places, trying to reach men. So you see that programs

are not enemies of spirituality. We need more prayer, and at the same time, we need more clearly planned and positively carried out sound programs.

In my nearly forty years of attending conferences, I have come to this conclusion: The brethren that complain about programs are impressive neither in their personal lives nor their ministry. Their ministry is often carried out in just as hap-hazard manner as their personal lives. Look at a man's car, his garage, his shoes, and you can usually tell whether or not he is a planner. Let us be done with the false doctrine that to plan a program is carnal. Let us stop sanctifying insincerity and looseness as being holy. The man that has neither personal nor spiritual planning, I repeat, has nothing impressive about his life. Programs are not a substitute for spirituality and faith, but neither are they enemies of it. Great power is in great movements. A movement of sixteen women in England started one of the greatest missionary movements of modern times. This was not done by one woman alone, but by all of them, working together according to a plan. Look what Communism does with organized planning. Even the John Birch Society, short lived as it was, carried a great influence due to its organization. Unless the Pilgrim Holiness Church has a vision of large needs and the courage to adopt great plans PRAYED OVER, our day is done. People will pass us by as totally irrelevant to the needs of the world like we have today. In World War II President Roosevelt asked for 40,000 planes in a prescribed time. The people said "impossible"—they could furnish only half that many. But the need was realized, and then the need was met, and more. So every Pilgrim Church of this Western Ohio District should adopt a large and worthy goal and ask God to give the courage to strive for and ability to plan for reaching that goal successfully. To the congregation and pastor who are willing to merely take things as they come, may I say, you may soon find yourselves presiding over your own demise. Results will be realized with pre-planning and hard work. Set goals for revivals, for calls, for new improvements, for membership gains, and if you do it honestly and prayerfully, you will find that a program, under God, will be the means of grace to you and a blessing to your congregation."

The motion to include the Superintendent's remarks in the minutes was carried. Minutes of previous sitting were approved.

Rev. O. E. Rutledge, Assistant District Superintendent, gave his annual report and added an earnest personal testimony. Bro. Rutledge mentioned his retirement and his wish to remain a blessing and an asset to his pastor and the church. A motion was made and carried to give Bro. and Sr. Rutledge a rising vote of appreciation for their years of faithful service to the District.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, Director of the Pilgrim Pension Plan, was introduced to the conference.

Rev. G. F. Sheridan, District Treasurer, gave his report and elaborated on a few of the items. The report was received with a rising vote of thanks.

Rev. Clyde Waites gave the District Statistician's report, which was accepted with a rising vote of thanks, also.

After a fifteen minute recess, Rev. Beltz spoke to the conference concerning the Pilgrim pension plan and the Ministerial Benefit Association. He explained the plans clearly as pertains to both the minister and the church, and mentioned that the church is obligated to help educate and train our ministers, which we do through our schools; to support the minister during his years of service; and to help care for our ministers during their years of retirement when they are no longer able to serve us. He urged that the non-participating churches consider their obligations along this line.

It was suggested by the chairman that a motion to include the payment of the Pension Plan by the churches be included in considering eligibility for Gold Star church be deferred until the report or the Resolutions or Ways and Means Committee be given.

A motion was made by the District Superintendent that Rev. Virgil Miller, from

the Ontario District who is accepting a pastorate in this district, be given a seat and the status of delegate in the conference, pending receipt of his transfer. Motion carried.

The Sunday School report was given by Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, and awards presented to the churches with the highest numerical and percentage gains. A rising vote of appreciation was given to both groups, and motion prevailed to receive the Secretary's report.

A rising vote of appreciation was given to Rev Armond Calvert, whose 11 month record on the Report did not justify recognition, but whose full 12 month record would show otherwise.

There was an attendance gain of 110 for the conference year, in spite of losses by a number of churches.

The reception committee presented Rev. E. E. Leadingham of the Eastern Ohio District, who gave a few words of greeting and testimony, and dismissed the sitting with prayer.

Third Sitting, 2:00 P. M., July 18, 1962

The afternoon session of the conference was opened with Rev. Charles Felsburg leading the congregation in singing, "Glory to his Name." Mrs. Felsburg was at the piano. Rev. L. T. Brand led the conference in prayer.

An announcement was made of the children's service to be conducted by Mrs. Brand. Minutes of the previous sitting were read and accepted.

The recommendation of the council to accept Rev. Cedric Wilson, ordained minister transferring from the Kentucky District, was approved by the conference and he was given a seat within the conference bar. Rev. E. E. Leadingham was also given an honorary seat in the conference.

Rev. Robert Ferguson gave the report of the Resolutions Committee, with the following results:

Motion to delete the the preamble and part (1) from No. 10, District Program, and to amend part (2) concerning a goal for membership gains was carried.

A preamble to Resolution No. 14, Missions, and a substitution for 14A concerning the reorganization of the District Home Missionary Committee was recommended for adoption. An amendment was offered to place the disbursement of funds in the hands of this committee. This amendment lost. A further amendment was offered, designating that this committee present their program to this conference, or to the District Council within three months time, for the approval of the council. The amendment, with the main motion, carried.

After some discussion on the motion concerning No. 18, Pastors' Calls, a substitute motion was offered to the effect that each call to a home and each person ministered to in a hospital or elsewhere be recorded as a pastoral call. The substitute motion carried.

Recommendation that D & C under No. 22, Standards, be deleted, was lost.

Recommendation to delete No. 24-C under Superintendent, inasmuch as it is covered by the manual was approved by the conference.

Motion to adopt the committees resolution concerning a new schedule for Camp and Conference, to be shown in the minutes as No. 3-A, was carried.

Resolution No. 3-C, concerning time given for special services to various departments of the General church during the Camp, was amended, and approved as amended.

Motion carried to delete "B" from No. 4, Conference, was carried.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was given by Rev. Wm. Salley, and the following were the results.

Motion to revise No. 11-A, Stewardship Funds, to conform with new plans made

by the General Conference was carried.

Consideration of an amendment to No. 11-B(3) concerning funds for Frankfort Bible College was postponed.

An amendment to No. 11-B(5) concerning the budget for camp ground maintenance was adopted.

Rev. and Mrs. Chester Wilkins from the Indiana District, who are entering the evangelistic field, were introduced by the Reception committee, and both gave a few words of testimony, after which they were given honorary seats within the conference bar.

Motion that the District Secretary send a letter of condolence to Mrs. J. R. Siders and family after the death of Rev. Siders was carried.

Rev. A. T. Adams gave his testimony and words of appreciation for the prayers and help of friends in the District during his illness, and reported he is now able to enter the work again. Rev Raymond Simpson also expressed appreciation for prayers and kindness of friends during his illness and hospitalization.

Election of officers being the next order of business, tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent as follows: Rev. L. R. Enlow, chairman; Revs. Wayne Goldsmith, Clyde Waites, Garry Spriggs, Virgil Miller, William Salley, Paul Berridge, Donald Bassham, Robert Hiler, James Adams, and James Miller.

Rev. Melroy Ward was elected as Assistant Superintendent on the third ballot.

The Council presented nominations for District Secretary, and Rev. L. R. Enlow was elected on the third ballot.

Rev. G. F. Sheridan was elected District Treasurer on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for five councilmen, and the sitting adjourned by expiration of time with prayer by Rev. Chester Wilkins.

Fourth Sitting, Wednesday, July 18th, 7:00 P. M.

The fourth sitting of the 1962 conference opened with an ordination service at 7:00 p.m., with Rev. Charles Felsburg leading the congregation in singing "A Charge to Keep," and "Rock of Ages." The Ordination Committee consisted of the General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. Neff, and Revs. Harold Monroe, M. H. Robbins, G. F. Sheridan, O. E. Rutledge, and Melroy Ward. The following scriptures were read by members of the committee: I. Timothy 3:1-9, II Timothy 4:1-8, Titus 3:1-11, and Mathew 25:31-45.

Dr. Neff addressed the congregation, and particularly the candidates for ordination, concerning the life of St. Paul, and his example for those already in or just entering the ministry. He stressed that Paul said, "I am made a minister." One cannot become a minister in the proper sense without first being chosen and ordained as such by the hand of God. Paul also spoke often of self-discipline. He said, "I keep my body under subjection," and "in nothing give offence." Men of God are disciplined men. Paul also said, "I have neither coveted any man's silver nor apparel. It does not become the man of God to always use the materialistic approach. It is important to bear in mind that we are the servants of God and of men. Good, spiritual laymen will not take advantage of this attitude in their minister, but will make sure that the man who is their spiritual leader is enabled to enjoy some of the finer things of life. Dr. Albert Schweitzer, the owner of five earned degrees and one of the greatest minds of our time, gives his life to the natives of Africa. To some this seems a waste, inasmuch as he would be welcomed in most of the palaces of Europe and in our own White House, as well as the great educational and social circles. He was asked in an interview, "Dr. Schweitzer, why do you do this—why are you here?" His answer was, "Jesus sent me." The man of God must consistently live as a servant of God and of the people. He must have respect for himself, and for the word of God. He must never go into his pulpit in a spirit of defeat, for he has to present to the people Balm of Gilead and the 30,000

No. 9 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 10 DISTRICT PROGRAMS

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following conference, for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work, Local, District and General.

Be it further resolved that we set a goal, for membership gain, of 116 members per year for this Quadrennium.

No. 11 MINISTERS

A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.

B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.

C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 12 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

A. Be it so resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.

B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 13 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.

B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.

C. The location of this convention should be under the direction of the District Council.

No. 14 MISSIONS

Whereas, we do not have a report in our District Minutes from the District Home Missionary Committee, that would serve to set District Home Missions before our people in clear perspective,

A. Be it resolved that we reorganize our District Home Missionary Committee, and that it be composed of five members, consisting of the District Superintendent, two members of the District Council (to be appointed by the council), and two members to be elected by the Conference from outside the council.

B. Further, it shall be the responsibility of the committee to present to this con-

ference, or to the District Council within three months time, a District Home Missionary Program to be approved by the Council. This committee shall also report annually to the District Conference and shall be responsible for the execution of the Home Missionary program.

C. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.

D. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.

E. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.

F. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.

G. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.

H. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer.

No. 15 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 16 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

A. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.

B. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night after the first day of Conference.

No. 17 PASTORS

A. Calling of :

(1) Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.

(2) To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.

(3) Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.

(4) Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.

(5) Because the present setup in voting on the recall of pastors covers a considerable length of time, making it difficult for the superintendent to make a recommendation when a pastor is not recalled:

(a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent set a date when all churches in the District, wherever the pastor hopes to continue, shall vote on the recalling of the same, and notify the District Superintendent of the results of the vote. This ruling need not apply where the pastor had notified the District Superintendent and the church that he expects to move, or when the pastor has a call for two or more years with unexpired time.

(b) That the District Superintendent make available to the changing churches a list of all of the ministers who are changing, and who will be available to accept pastorates.

B. Support of:

(1) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.

(2) Inasmuch as moving pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchas-

ing new heating equipment for the parsonage, due to varied facilities: Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church owned parsonages.

(3) Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastor a two week vacation with pay, and that time for pastor to take said vacation be decided by the Church Board and pastor.

No. 18 PASTORS CALLS

Be it resolved that each visit to a home, and each person ministered to in a hospital or elsewhere be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 19 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 20 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.

No. 21 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 22 STANDARDS

A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.

C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic, exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.

D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 23 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONS

A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends that the state conferences provide for a District Sunday School committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee, and,

B. Whereas the "Decade of Progress" is the Sunday School program of our church, and whereas the program is so practical in many areas for every church school, and since it is unfair to the future leaders of our churches and schools for the present leaders to fail to co-operate, Be it resolved that the conference urge our churches to participate.

C. Inasmuch as our District annually has some type of Sunday School convention, and since it is generally held some time in the fall, therefore, be it resolved that we designate the first week of November as District Sunday School Promotion Week; further, be it resolved that the District Sunday School Convention be held during that week.

D. Since it is difficult to have a convention which draws a crowd sufficient to merit obtaining an outstanding speaker, therefore be it resolved that all churches be asked to plan their revivals in the future so as not to conflict with the Sunday School week; further, that the District Superintendent remind the church boards of this resolution when he meets with them relative to their local plans.

E. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Rally be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.

F. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our District Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.

G. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

No. 24 SUPERINTENDENT

A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.

B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.

C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 25 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 26 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 27 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

No. 25 APPRECIATION

A. Be it resolved: That we extend to our General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.

B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Grounds Committee, Educational Committee, cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.

C. That the District Secretary send a letter of appreciation for their many years of service to the district, to Rev. and Mrs. L. R. Roberts and Rev. and Mrs. O. E. Rutledge.

D. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun for the splendid co-operation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference in the form

of a letter from the District Secretary, and that we express our appreciation to Rev. Ted Wilson for his labors as a reporter.

E. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to relieve the financial obligations of the Camp Meeting.

B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.

C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.

D. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.

E. That all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives.

F. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimburse their delegate for traveling.

G. That the charge for rooms for camp and conference be as follows:

(1) Rooms at the rate of \$8.00 for the entire time or \$2.00 for the first and \$1.50 for each additional night.

(2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time or \$1.00 per day.

(3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; enlist throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give three days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$20.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by the district council.

No. 5. DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

A. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting church extension within the district.

B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.

C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.

D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of five per cent per annum.

E. Each church shall pay a promotional budget to the District in the amount of \$4.00 per member per year to be dispersed as follows: the minimum payment of principal and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp ground fund and District Church Extension Fund.

F. Realizing the cost of interest, we propose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

WHAT THE LOAN FUND CAN DO

(1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.

(2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.

(3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.

(4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus giving them funds with which to operate.

(5) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The money will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a milage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 8 MINISTERS DUTIES

A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 9 MINISTERS' INSURANCE PLAN

Inasmuch as there is a need among the ministers of the district for an effective plan of health and life insurance, be it resolved that the District Council make the necessary investigation into various plans of group insurance, and at the earliest practicable time, call the ministers of the district together to present to them their recommendations concerning such a plan, at which time a representative of the insurance company will be present to give explanation and answer questions.

No. 10 MINUTES

A. Be it resolved that the price of the minutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.

B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$75.00 for these services.

No. 11. SALARIES

A. District Superintendent.

(1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$90.00 per week, 6c per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.

(2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

B. District Council

Resolved that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized District work.

C. District Treasurer and Secretary.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurers' Salary be \$600.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$250.00.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 12 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund (Formerly General Budget)

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provisions as follows:

B. District Budget

(1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interest of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offering received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

(2) Be it resolved that we raise 50 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.

(3) Be it resolved that we raise 50 cts. per member per year for the Frankfort Bible College, to be revised at the next conference provided the rezoning of the school is completed satisfactorily.

(4) Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.25 per member per year to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.

(5) Be it resolved that we ask each church to raise \$1.00 per member per year for Camp Ground maintenance.

(6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.

(7) Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths for the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

(8) Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their district obligations without good reasons shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

(9) Be it resolved that the following chart be used as a guide for local church treasurers in paying the district budget:

1. District Home Missions	\$1.25 per member per year
2. Promotional Budget	4.00 per member per year
3. Camp Ground	1.00 per member per year
4. Zone School	.50 per member per year
5. General Conference	.50 per member per year
6. Sunday School Institute	5.00 per church per year

No. 13 SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE

Be it resolved that each church raise \$5.00 per year for the financing of our Sunday School Institute. We urge each church to take care of this before the time set for the Institute.

No. 14 TREASURER

A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books-Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

B. Insuring of the Treasurer-We recommend that the council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 15 YOUTH

A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.

B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in the budget statement as "Youth Convention and Conference."

C. Be it resolved that the young people who receive free entertainment at our District Youth Convention and/or Conference be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fund to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Delegates to the Youth conference are to be excluded from the payment of this fee. Be it further resolved that the monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

YOUTH CONFERENCE

Report of the District Youth President

TO OUR GENERAL YOUTH CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THIS 1962 YOUTH CONFERENCE:

The scriptural admonition, "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth..." (Ecc. 12:1a) is very familiar to most of us. The emphasis of this past year's youth activities has been directed toward helping the youth of the Western Ohio District to meet the challenge of this scripture verse. The fleeting days have served well in reminding us who are older that soon our youth will stand where we stand in service to God, and the church. We have deeply felt, that if the young people we serve are to remember God, then the church and leaders of our church dare not forget them.

Your District Youth President attended a Youth Institute in another district in partial preparation for our own Institutes.

One of the highlights of the year's activities was the District Senior banquet which was held at the Christian Activity Center in Dayton Ohio. Dr. P. F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, brought a timely message on the theme "Fear" to those present. The King's Crusaders quartet from Owosso College sang, and a very fine meal was appreciated.

The District Youth Camp, held June 25-29, was well attended. There were 184 registered, and the great joy was to see over half of these seeking help from the Lord at this altar. Rev. Bob Nelson of Michigan, brought some of the most practical, yet convincing messages that I have heard preached to young people. We praise and honor the blessed Holy Spirit for His presence throughout the camp.

The theme of the Youth Camp was "Youth Balanced for Life." The Youth Camp staff did a wonderful work in teaching and carrying out the other duties necessary for the success of the camp.

Rev. Ivan Williams and Rev. and Mrs. Roy Ankrum have been used of the Lord in this Youth Convention, to help our youth to advance spiritually. The outstanding preaching of Bro. Williams, and the wonderful singing of the Ankrim's has been deeply appreciated.

I wish to express my gratitude to Bro. Monroe, the Youth Council, and all who have been such a real blessing and help throughout the year. The prayer of my own heart is that God would so move on the hearts of the youth of this district, that the efforts of those who have labored for their spiritual welfare will not be in vain. How glorious to see young people, on fire for God, with good standard, and high and holy ambitions to serve Christ in this their day.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

9:00 a. m., July 21, 1962

The eighth annual Youth Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was opened with Rev. M. H. Robbins leading the congregation in singing "Sound the Battle Cry."

District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe, led in prayer.

Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth president, introduced Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Pilgrim Youth, to the Conference.

Rev. Emery spoke of the changes in regulations in youth work which were formulated by the General Conference. Pilgrim Youth Societies will be organized in the following age groups: Junior Society, through age 12; Teen Age Society, ages 13 through 19; Adult Youth, ages 20 to 35. Junior Society members under 12 years of age shall be classed as Honorary members.

Youth societies in the local churches shall contribute an amount equal to 5% of their total receipts for the operation of the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth.

Rev. Emery read Psalm 1:1-4 and spoke a few minutes from a text taken from verse 3. He spoke about life being like a tree, and compared it with a brush pile. He stated that a tree has life, purpose and organization. A brush pile has none of these. A person who would but cannot is pitiful; a person who could but will not is contemptible; a person who can, who will and who does is most admirable. He concluded by quoting St. Paul who said, in Philippians 4:8, "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."

The Conference was called to order by Rev. Emery and the secretary read the roll call. The following officers were present: Rev. Harold Monroe, District Superintendent, Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President(and Rev. Donald Bassham, District Youth Treasurer. The following Zone Chairmen were present: Rev. Robert C. Ferguson, Rev. M. H. Robbins, Rev. Donald Bassham, Rev. Paul Berridge, and Mr. James Booher. Also, 17 pastors, 11 youth presidents, and 28 delegates answered the roll call of churches. A motion setting the conference bar was carried. Adjournment time of the morning session was set for 12:00 noon.

The report of the District Youth President, Rev. Ted Wilson, was read and accepted with a rising vote of thanks.

The winners of the snapshot contest sponsored by the District Youth Camp were announced by Rev. Wilson.

The report of the District Youth Treasurer, Rev. Donald Bassham, was accepted.

Reports of the Zone Chairmen were read and accepted by the Conference. Rev. Emery urged each zone to conduct ten rallies this year.

Dr. P. F. Elliott was introduced to the conference and brought greetings from Owosso College. He gave an encouraging report concerning progress at the school relative to its building program. Rev. Elliott was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

Motion carried to dispense with hearing Local Youth Society Presidents' reports. Our chairman ruled that the current youth presidents are to report this year's activities. Local presidents' reports are to be read during next year's conference.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read by Rev. William Salley.

The request that the District Council return the now Northern Zone to its original Lima and Defiance Zones because of the great distance to be traveled was referred to the District Council and the Pastors of the Northern Zone.

Under No. 12, Zone Program,

A tug-of-war contest was presented, and after certain revisions was adopted. A copy of the rules of the above contest as adopted will be distributed to the various zone chairmen by the District Youth Executive committee.

An amendment to Resolution No. 10-C, Youth Societies, was offered, with regard to the training classes for youth leaders. The morning session adjourned by expiration of time before the completion of the discussion.

The conference reconvened at 1:15 p. m. with Rev. Calvert leading in prayer. The chairmen of the resolutions committee re-read the amended resolution concerning training classes for youth leaders, and it was adopted as amended.

A new resolution concerning the adoption of a Youth Project was presented, and approved by the conference.

Sections (B) and (C) were read, to be added to No. 8, Youth Council. They were relative to the promotion of an annual tour to one or more of our colleges, and the planning of two senior banquets, both to be planned by the District Youth Council. Both additions were adopted.

A motion concerning the use of Camp Savings Stamp books was lost.

The Report of the Ways and Means Committee was read by Rev. M. H. Robbins.

A motion that the Youth Camp registration fee be \$10.00 was lost.

No.3, Method of Raising Executive and Project Funds, was amended to include specified dates by which zones are asked to pay the amount raised.

Tellers for the election of officers were appointed by the Youth President. They were Rev. Clyde Waites, Rev. Lewis Daniel, Rev. William Salley and Mr. Herbert Robinson.

Rev. Ted Wilson was elected on the first ballot to serve as District Youth President. He gave a brief acceptance speech.

Rev. Emery read the duties of the District Officers as formulated by the General Conference.

Rev. Robert Ferguson was elected vice president on the third ballot, and Rev. Donald Bassham was elected youth treasurer on the first ballot. Mr. James Booher was elected District youth secretary on the second ballot.

The conference was divided into zones for the election of zone chairmen. The results were as follows: Cincinnati Zone, Mr. James Booher; Dayton Zone, Rev. Robert Ferguson; Greenville Zone, Rev. W. L. Kilwy; Hamilton Zone, Rev. M. H. Robbins; Mulberry Zone, Rev. L. T. Brand; Northern Zone, Rev. Gilbert Delong; Washington C. H. Zone, Mrs. A. T. Adams.

A motion to authorize the Youth Council to approve the minutes of the conference and make any necessary corrections was carried.

A resolution of appreciation was submitted by the Resolutions Committee and a rising vote of thanks was given to Rev. O. D. Emery for the Godly spirit manifested and the splendid way in which he has conducted this youth conference.

Rev. Emery gave a few closing remarks stating his feelings concerning the fine spirit of this conference and of his desire to return next year.

Rev. Elliott made announcements relative to Owosso College.

The conference was adjourned at 2:55 p. m. with prayer by Rev. Harold Monroe.

Report Of Young People's Resolutions Committee

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone chairman, be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolution Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

No. 3 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develop a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather news for the youth page of the WESTERN BUILDER.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 STATISTICIAN

Whereas the Manual in Section 86, Part 2, provides for each local youth president to give a report to the annual youth conference, be it resolved that we have a youth statistician and that said statistician be appointed by the Youth Council; and this report will not conflict with the present District report.

No. 7 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program-plans, dates and administration to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp will begin the last Monday of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.

B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.

C. Inasmuch as the site of our present youth camp has inadequate facilities, be it resolved that the District Youth President appoint a committee to investigate the possibilities of renting a campground. This committee shall be authorized to study further this change and to make the change, if possible, for this coming youth camp.

No. 8 YOUTH COUNCIL

A. Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times each year, and the officers of the District be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.

B. Be it resolved that the Youth Council promote an annual tour of one or more of our colleges.

C. Be it resolved that a Northern and a Southern Regional Senior Banquet be planned by the Youth Council. The council shall set the time, place and price per person. Seniors shall be entertained free.

No. 9 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone twice annually.

No. 10 YOUTH PROJECT

Be it resolved that this conference elect a committee to secure prices on stainless steel silverware for the dining room, and that this committee report its findings to the Youth Council on or before September 15th. The Youth Council shall in turn present its recommendation to each zone to determine what amount of silverware we shall purchase this year as a youth project.

No. 11 YOUTH SOCIETIES

A. Inasmuch as the General Conference has outlined new organizational procedures for Youth Societies, be it resolved that the conference adopt these provisions.

B. Be it resolved that the Youth Council plan at least two regular Young People's Institutes for the training of Youth Presidents and officers.

No. 12 YOUTH TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed July 5th, and the Youth Council appoint an auditing committee.

No. 13 ZONE PROGRAM

A. In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved

that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.

B. Be it resolved that the District hold a Tug-O-War contest between the zones, with rules to be set up by the Youth Executive Council and distributed to the zone chairman and pastors as soon as possible.

No. 14 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. O. D. Emery for the Godly spirit manifested and the splendid way in which he has conducted this Youth Conference.

Report of Young People's Ways and Means Committee

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.

B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$5.00 a year to maintain the fund.

C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed six cents (6cts.) per mile for traveling expenses.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special project approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.00 to be paid by each church.

B. Be it resolved that our youth project for this year be the buying of some permanent teaching aids, recreational equipment for the youth camp, and the purchase of stainless steel dinnerware for the dining room.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

Be it resolved that each zone raise the equivalent of \$7.00 per church for the District Youth Council and the District Youth Project funds.

Be it further resolved that each zone endeavor to send at least one half of the amount to the District Youth Treasurer not later than November 1st, and the final one-half not later than February 1st.

No. 4 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that the price of the Youth Camp be \$8.00 for the coming year, if held on these grounds.

We have examined the records submitted by Rev. G. F. Sheridan, District Treasurer of the Pilgrim Holiness Church - Western Ohio District - for the period beginning

July 6, 1961, and ending July 5, 1962, including the summer camp operation. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and included such tests of accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary under the circumstances.

We were pleased to find that recommendations made a year ago are being followed, especially the use of disbursement vouchers and receipts. It is suggested that all records be made available to the auditor at the close of the third quarter of the conference year thereby permitting the first three quarters to be audited in late April. This would allow more time between the close of the conference year and the annual conference for the use by the district treasurer to close the books before presenting them to the auditor.

At this date 88% of the local treasurers have responded to the auditor's letter of verification. Efforts will be continued to secure a response and to reconcile any differences, however, time does not permit further delay. The responses of the local churches were in agreement with the records of the district treasurer except where a mission treasurer or someone other than the church treasurer had remitted funds. The total difference was insignificant to the total contributions per the district treasurer's records and in all cases the district reported more than the local treasurer.

The balance of \$61.98 in the summer camp fund and \$4,732.06 in the church extension fund savings account were confirmed by The Arcanum National Bank, Arcanum, Ohio. The general fund balance as of July 5, 1962, included \$8470.35 on deposit at The Arcanum National Bank and undeposited receipts of \$2179.74 evidenced by a July 6, 1962, deposit.

The Western Ohio District records have been kept in fine order due to the capable services of the district treasurer.

In our opinion, with exception of certain verifications referred to above, the accompanying statements reflected the cash received and disbursed during the period beginning July 6, 1961, and ending July 5, 1962, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.
