PENNY-A-DAY

The Santa Ana Pilgrim Young Peoples' Society has come to the front by having the best Penny-A-Day offering per average attendance for the month of August The Rosemead Church was in the lead for the month of July.

Perhaps some are wondering just what the Penny-A-Day offering is and what it is for. The purpose of this system is to help each one to have an interest in home missionary work and this affords them a simple way to give.

The Penny-A-Day Offerings should be sent to the Young Peoples' District Treasurer immediately after the first of each month for the previous month's offering. Be sure and designate that it is for Penny-A-Day and for what month and Church it is from. This offering should be sent in promptly and regularly in order to keep up our payments.

A system for collecting the Penny-A-Day which has proved to be an excellent one, is to have calendars (one for each person who wishes to give) posted on a large board in the church where it will be a constant reminder. Also, have a small offering box near the board and when a person drops an offering into the box, he can check off the number of days for which it pays. When he completes a month, he can tear that month from the calendar. This helps each person to keep track of how much he owes or has paid in ativance.
