

REVIVAL REPORT

O, yes, there were struggles, but victory, glorious victory came. Methinks heaven bent very low at that moment. All gave victorious testimonies. As we took our seats, the glory descended. One after another began to testify. Some twice. Confession fell from the lips of some and the glory lingered on. I looked at the pastor, evangelist, and singer and their faces seemed transfigured. Personally I felt that I could have stayed all night, for were we not in the "Holy Mount" with God? Why cannot we see and feel more of this? Whether it be by the shouting of trumpets, or the old fashioned Quaker si-lence, "sitting in His presence," let us invite and expect Him. Let all that is of the flesh and self be kept in the background. "Come Holy Ghost, for thee we call. Spirit of burning come."



"LET US ARISE AND BUILD"

With the enrollment of the school increasing as it has been each year the need for more space is quite evident.

The School Board fully realized this when they met in 1951 and appointed a building committee. The plan to build was then presented to the Student Body of P.B.I. With a burst of enthusiasm and an eagerness to have a part in the new building, the students started making plans of their own. A work day was inaugurated in which the students were given a day out of school to work and give their wages to the Building Fund. This plan was used successfully for three-years and over \$3,000 was raised by the student body alone.

It might be interesting to note that in the 1953 District Conference \$10,000 was raised in offerings and pledges in one service. And then again at the Phoenix First Church last month in a service with the School's Gospel Team another \$1,000 was promised. Other churches all over the district have sent in offerings and pledges for which we are very thankful.

The cost of the building is estimated to be \$40,000 if enough labor and materials are donated. Many have already donated much of their time. Bro. Mason came from Arizona to give a week of his time, and Robert Huhn put in all the plumbing. Roy Morgan, Stanley Tice, Paul Anderson, David Olson, Stanley Miller, John Newby, E. W. Hall, Victor Klein, Alex Thomson, Stanley Weins, John Stuart, John Grissel, Paul Bufkin, George Teskey, C. W. Thomas, Edward Layton, B. C. Struble, and Roy Justus spent many long hours working faithfully for the completion of our building. Also a stranger that was passing by stopped and worked for several hours. The students have a part in the work, too Many spend their free periods pounding nails.

Actual work began during the 1953 Christmas vacation. What a thrill it was for the students to come back from their various homes to see the work already begun on the long anticipated new school building.

The building, when it is completed, will contain six large classrooms, four of them 22 feet by 25 feet and the other two, 33 feet by 23 feet, and a council room, 16 feet by 30 feet, also to be used as a classroom. There are five main offices. Offices for the president, the registrar, the dean of instruction and a general office are each 12 feet by 14 feet.

The business manager's office is 10 feet, 16 inches by 16 feet. Also there are two rest rooms, two heater rooms, and two supply rooms. There will be a lobby in the



SPECIAL RULES: To equalize the high percentage that a few smaller churches already have to start the contest with, the following rule will apply.

Small churches with a high average Percentage gain over last year's average attendance will be limited to basing the percentage gain during the contest to no more than 20% above last year's average.

EXAMPLE: Average for 1953 ... 30. Presently Averaging ... 50

(Jan.-Feb.-March)

Percentage gain to start the contest would be 66% - which would not be fair to other churches. Take 20% of your present average (Jan.-Feb.-March) and add that figure to last year's average and you will have the last year's average you must use in the Contest.

EXAMPLE: 20% of 50 = 1030 + 10 = 40, which is the figure this church would use as its last year's average in-stead of the real average of 30.



If there has been any thought expressed as to the fact that the Foundation has any connection with the Pilgrim Holiness Church other than that the Board of Direcors is made up of members of said church is purely presumption and groundless. The Articles of Corporation of said Foundation may be read by request of any group or responsible individual. The Foundation has been set up and is operating on the same pattern as other duly chartered Foundations in the State of California.

If and when there is a profit made by this Foundation, the money can be channeled into ANY charitable or needy field at the vote of the Board of Directors.

To avoid possible further misunderstanding, steps are being taken by the Foundation to change the name under which it is chartered with the State of California; however, retaining the corporation and its purposes. Dr. Claude Watson assisted in setting up the Foundation and served as Secretary for a period of time. He is still retained as the attorney for the Foundation.


#### DEDICATION



#### **RECORD BREAKING YEAR?**

Dear Pastor and Sunday School Leaders:

We are grateful for the success you have achieved in the past year, but past successes will not take the place of present growth. This year can be a "record breaking year" in your church and thus in the District if every pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, teacher, yes, every person in the church "has a mind to work.

We are anxious to see a 10 per cent gain in each local church this year. The District Sunday School Committee is making plans to help the churches in every way possible to accomplish this goal, however, we recognize the fact that if your church attains this goal it will be largely because you have a Sunday School vision.

Statistics tell us that Sunday School attendance has decreased 27 per cent in the last fifteen years while the population has constantly increased. Truly the harvest is plenteous, but the laborers are few. Let us accept the challenge before us.

We are also concerned that our Sunday School sessions carry an evangelistic emphasis. We are told that the Jews devote about 325 hours to the religious training of their children; the Catholics devote about 250 hours per year, while the Protestants devote only about 26 hours per year to the religious training of our children. Also consider that only one out of every eight attends Sunday School and you see there is no time to waste.

#### "DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL CONTEST"

We have all learned by experience that we do better work and more of it when we have goals set to attain. The Apostle Paul mentions the goals of his life.

The District Sunday School Committee feels that a reasonable goal for our Sunday school to strive for is that of a 10% growth in each local church over last year. In other words each church is qualified to enter this contest. This is not an effort to beat some other church in attendance, but rather an all-out endeavor on the part of each Sunday School to have a ten per cent gain over last year's record. By this method your church will realize a steady but tangible and genuine growth.

By this time each church should have received two Sunday School attendance charts. The one entitled, "Class Attendance Chart" is to be used in the Contest. The other one is for the Monthly Averages for a five year period. We hope each church will make use of these charts. Display them where your people may observe your progress.

The rules of the Contest are as follows: 1. Every church is a contestant.

- 2. Each church that attains a 10% growth over last year's monthly average will be placed on the Contest honor roll—"The Ten Percenters."
- 3. Any individual that brings one person three consecutive Sundays (until he becomes a regular member), during the month shall have his name placed on an Honor Roll prepared by the church and posted in a conspicuous place.
- 4. The individual that brings three new members to the Sunday School, by the above mentioned method, during the quarter will have his name printed in the Pilgrim News under the title, "District Contest Honorary Society."
- 5. The local church is to keep tally and send information to the Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

If there are any questions please drop us a line. We sincerely hope that each church will do its best to accomplish this 10% goal. If you lack for ideas to accomplish this please drop me a line and I will do my best to help you.

### STOPPING THE LEAKS IN THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

By Rev. Wm. A. Reading, Member of District Sunday School Committee

#### Introduction:

Possibly no subject could be of greater importance; and of greater interest than the one under consideration, "Discovering and Stopping the Leaks in the Sunday School," for indeed, the Sunday School holds the key to the future of the Church.

To have leaks in the Sunday School is to lose to Christ and to the Church those who might be won to the Kingdom, and who might under the Spirit's guidance be used to enhance the Kingdom of God.

Yet, we cannot deny the fact that many are slipping through the Sunday School and are being lost to Christ and to the Church. Some of these might be won; this is a challenge to us all. Let us, therefore, view the various contributing causes of leakage in the Sunday School, and seek to discover the remedies, that we may put them into operation, and thereby stop this leakage.

Among the causes there will be found:

- 1. Weakness in the Teaching Staff.
- 2. Lack of Holy Spirit Inspiration.
- 3. Failure to Win the Pupils to
- Christ.

Let us consider these in the order given.

#### I. WEAKNESS IN THE TEACHING STAFF

Possibly no calling is of greater importance than that of teaching a Sunday School class. It matters not whether such a class be composed of children, young people, or adults. The teacher of such a class is a pastor of a church within a church, and is helping to mould the character of those he or she is teaching. That care should be taken in preparation of the lesson there can be do doubt. If those who minister to the physical and intellectual needs of mankind must be

well trained for their tasks, and are constantly seeking for better methods, and greater knowledge, and skill in their fields; should not those whose calling in life it is to minister to the spiritual needs of mankind be as well trained? By all means those who teach a Sunday School class should not only be saved and sanctified and well trained, but also should have a great passion for the lost. Is not every Sunday School pupil a potential Christian? Are they not possible trophies of grace? The challenge to every Sunday School teacher then, is to seek to encompass the salvation of his or her pupils. To win them to Christ before they become hardened by sin. This can be done, but it will take hard work. And it is worth all it costs. To see those of our c'asses being won to Christ, and growing up into the Church, to find a place of service for the Master - what could pay greater dividends for our labor than this?

Aside from the personal preparation which the teacher must make there is also the presentation of the lesson. Some thought must be given to this. Teaching the lesson involves more than reading the lesson over. Above all the presentation of the lesson must be *interesting*. The pupils' interest must be won from the very outset. Also the teacher should show a decided interest in the pupi's. Follow up contacts must be made concerning absentees.

#### II. KEEPING THE SCHOOL SPIRITUAL

The school that fails to move along the line of Holy Spirit inspiration is destined to failure in its real mission of building a Christ honoring Sunday School. Proper housing, and equipment and proper administration are important, but these within themselves cannot insure success. Above these there is the consideration of the entire school moving forth by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. Do the opening exercises create a Divine atmosphere? They can be brief and be full of the Holy Presence. The teaching of the lesson should be a time of presenting the truth in a soul captivating manner, so that the people present will associate with Christ all that is worthwhile and will consider Christianity as the highest attainment in life.

#### III. WINNING THE PUPILS TO CHRIST

Finally, the weakest of all points is the failure to win the Sunday School student to Christ. For Christ is the only attraction the Church possesses. If those who attend Sunday School lose interest in Christ, they will soon lose interest in the Church, and all of its activities. A very large percentage of those who are Christians testify that they made their start in a Sunday School class. Brethren, we must win these boys and girls, and these young people who come to Sunday School. They must be built into the Church. In order to do this we must win them to Christ.

We must keep the teaching staff strong. We must keep the school spiritual. We must win the pupils who come to us to Christ, and build them into the Church. These things if followed earnestly, and prayerfully under the guidance of the Spirit, will insure that the leaks in the Sunday School will be stopped.



#### OBITUARY

Robert Amsy Manuel was born May 22, 1892 in Bolivar, Missouri, and passed to his eternal reward from his home in Oak View, California, October 11, 1954. Brother Manuel was converted at the age of 17 and later sanctified, living for the Lord most of his life. He invested about 25 of the best years of his life in the ministry, preaching the gospel of full salvation. The field at Oak View was the scene of his labors for 21 of those years, and the very building in which the memorial service was held is largely the work of his hands; but the crowning handiwork which he has wrought in this life is of more infinite value than temporal things built of lumber and plaster. It is to be found in the never-dying souls of those who came under the influence of his life and ministry.

#### MENDING THE GOSPEL NET

The Sunday School is challenged today by the tremendous responsibility for the religious education of our Protestant children. There are many important phases of the Sunday School program, but perhaps one of the greatest problems that faces our modern Sunday School system is the Absentee problem. While this seems like an incurable malady, we dare not let it go on unattended.

Marion Lawrence says that this is the weakest point of the Modern Sunday School. More scholars are lost to the Sunday School because absentees are not followed up, than from all other sources combined. He further states, that the personnel of the Sunday School changes 25% annually because of this failure to solve the absentee problem.

The title for this article is borrowed from Rev. Joshua Stauffer, who says that the absentee problem is no doubt one of the largest holes in the Gospel Net. We are endeavoring to catch individuals for Christ, but we cannot be efficient when there are holes in our nets.

One glance at our report for the month of September would reveal very vividly that this startling fact is true. We dare not go on indifferently and not try to cope with this great problem. Twenty-two out of thirty-five of our churches show a loss, while 9 of this number show a loss of ten or more. The District Sunday School Committee has asked each local church to strive for a ten per cent gain over last year, but it seems that we are rather progressing in the opposite direction.

rather progressing in the opposite direction. T feel it is high time that we sit down as it were, and talk this problem over and see if we can't come up with some helpful suggestions.

If we can be successful in mending our nets we are sure to realize a substantial growth.

WHAT CAN WE DO TO COPE WITH THE ABSENTEE PROBLEM?

If people would be as faithful to the church as they are to their job much of our problem would be solved, but since this is not the case we must take the attitude of the Gööd Shepherd who, while he had ninetynine in the fold, went out o seek for the one that was lost. According to Mr. Lawrence 99 per cent of the absentees, are never visited once.

Every individual in the Sunday School can have a part in the mending of the Gospel Net. We must work as hard to hold the students as we do to win them in the first place. Everyone who is interested in his Sunday School will be concerned and want to help if the proper program is presented

The pastor needs to be vitally interested in his Sunday School program if it is to grow and prosper. He must feel his responsibility as the Shepherd of the Sunday School. He should make the absentee feel he was missed. He must work with the Sunday School Su-

He must work with the Sunday School Superintendent and the Sunday School Board to plan an interesting program for the child when he comes. It is disastrous to get children to come to Sunday School and then have nothing to offer to interest them. This has caused failure for many a Sunday School. We must do all within our power to hold the pupils that come our way.

the pupils that come our way. 2. The Sunday School Superintendent

The Sunday School Superintendent is a key man in the Sunday School. He is to be the leader and thus carries the over-all responsibility for the whole program. He must serve as a co-ordinator for the Sunday School. He must see to it that the opening and closing exercises of the Sunday School are not cut and dtied. A varied program adds interest.

He should also be vitally interested in the

absentees. He must work with the teachers to determine if possible the cause and then do something about it.

He should co-operate 100% with the pastor in carrying out the policies he is promoting.  $\vec{h}$ 

3. The Teacher

Perhaps the person nearest to this absentee problem is the Sunday School teacher. She should be the first to deal with the absentee. She should develop the art of missing those who are absent and mention them to the class. The teacher who realizes the value of the souls of her pupils will be much concerned, for it is one of her sheep that is missing.

ing. It will pay the teacher to take enough time from the class to notice who are absent from the class for the sake of those present. This instills the feeling that if they are absent they will be missed too. This will pay off in a psychological way and will help to build up the class.

The teacher should also strive to have an interesting program for the class. Plan to use some variety. Avoid getting in a tut. Keep the students guessing what to expect next Sunday. Each pupil should be made to feel he is an important part of the class.

Inspire as much class participation by the class members as possible. Strive to get each one to contribute to the lesson.

It is a proven fact that ideals which the pupil has had a part in formulating under the leadership of a competent teacher have a more lasting and direct effect upon his life. 4. The Scholar's Responsibility.

While he is many times considered as having the least responsibility, in this problem, yet if properly educated he can greatly aid in its solution. Each scholar should be taught the art of missing those who are absent and should be inspired to contact the absentees. Their influence can be helpful. The growing class is usually the one in which all are participating.

There are many other points that could be made and are possibly as valid or more so than the above mentioned in regard to this problem, but space is limited for further development.

The next question that arises is: HOW SHALL THE ABSENTEE BE CONTACTED?

Here again there are many possible methods but we desire to suggest a few which we feel are helpful.

1. Personal Call

Nothing will take the place of a personal call on the absentee. The effort exerted will be well repaid. The teacher should visit every pupil at least once a year. Especially if the pupil is sick he should be visited. Endeavor to find the reason for the absence.

2. Telephone Calls or Pérsonal Letter If it is impossible to make a personal call, they should be contacted by phone, if they have one, if not by a personal letter from the teacher. These should not take the place of the personal call.

3. Absentee Cards

These have their place. The secretary can send out cards each week to all absentees to let them know they were missed. People all like to get mail. However, this by itself is not sufficient.

4. Class members make Contacts.

Many churches use all of these methods to a good advantage. The method is not as important as the results produced. It sometimes varies with the class.

If the individual members of the class will co-operate this method can work beautifully. To let the absentee know he was missed they can plan to have a different member of the class contact him each day starting with Monday on 'til Saturday.

By Saturday he will keenly feel that he?

was missed the Sunday before and no doubt put forth a special effort to come out the following Sunday.

Scholars have the right to be looked up, and teachers neglect this part of their work to their peril. It should be the rule in every Sunday School that no absence should ever go unnoted.

If your Sunday School Gospel Net has holes in it you will never be efficient in catching boys and girls for Christ and the Church. It is indeed a serious matter, and one which should force us to our knees. In these golden days of opportunity, with a constant increase in population all around us, I wish you could feel as your Promotional Secretary feels as he notes that the District shows a loss in Sunday School attendance as compared with last year.

I dare not hope less than that each Pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, teacher, yes, each reader, will be challenged to soart mending the Gospel-Net and help our Sun-or day Schools to progress forward, for if toar's Sunday Schools fail-our churches will fail our
