A GREATER SPIRITUAL FERVOR IN 1958

A growing conviction that there is a need for a Divine infusion in our church that will induce a greater spiritual fervor is upon us. We have much light, but little heat that is generated by the love of God in the Lord.

Spiritual temperature and spiritual activity have always correlated. The greater the heat, the greater the motion. Spiritual prophecy equals spiritual inspiration. Acts 2:4 "They were all filled . . and began to speak . . . as the Spirit gave them utterance." Spiritual temperature is no mere option. It is a life or death matter. Rev. 3:15 "I would thou wert cold or hot . . ."

Spiritual fervor has to do with the question of ethics, not just the higher stages of Christian experience.

Christian morals have to do with directing one's desires and one's emotions of love and hate and the intensity of the same. The fervor of abhorrence of wrong and adherence to right marks moral rank in character. "Men are responsible for not only the feelings they have, but also for not having the feelings they lack." ("Lectures on Moral Science" by Mark Hopkins). Throughout its whole range, the emotive part of our nature is excited by an object adapted to excite it, and not by direct acts of the will. It is a point of ehtics that I feel right, but also how much I feel. The degree, as well as the quality, is fixed by law. Luke 10:27 "Thou shalt love . . . with all thy heart . . . thy strength, thy mind, and thy neighbor as thyself." This law requires both extreme action and extreme fervor. Spiritual fervor has been indicated in Divine manifestation from the beginning. To Moses "a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush." Ex. 3:2. Mount Sinai "altogether on a smoke, because the Lord descended upon

it in a fire." Ex. 19:18. The Christian Church has been characterized by Divine fire. Isa. 61:1,2. The coming of the glorified Christ into a purified and Spirit-filled believer's consciousness will greatly increase his spiritual temperature. The human becomes by the Spirit transformed so transparent that Christ glorified within becomes visible to the beholder. It was this which convinced the Jews on Pentecost. Luke 3:16.

This burning love-radiance of the glorified Christ manifest by the Spirit's indwelling is not something done by Christ, it is no act or work of His. It is the essential glory of his Divine personal presence It is God's personal presence which manifests into a flaming fire of love. It is not anything which God creates or gives apart from Himself. It is God in us.

Our people need to know God. I am praying that God will fire my own soul until I become a more persuasive minister of the Word. I need to be able not only to enlighten but to minister in such a manner that will warm, kindle and enlarge the affection, and awaken the Divine sense in the soul for the love of God.

"Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire, And lighten with celestial fire. Thou the annointing spirit art, Who dost thy sevenfold gifts impart. Thy blessed unction from above Is comfort, life, and fire of Love."

GIVE TO RECEIVE

E. Charles Rundell wrote:
"Is thy cruse of comfort wasting?
Rise, and share it with another,
And through all the years of famine
It shall serve thee and thy brother."

Elijah gave the widow a powerful lesson that she did not easily forget! Desperate and hungry, her cruse of bread-oil down to a mere spoonful, the mother in Israel found that in giving her best that she became the recipient of manifold blessing and comfort from the hand of Elijah's God.

And ever it is that the ones who most desperately need comforting find that solace quickest in ministering to the needs of others. To illustrate, again, I remember a letter from a friend who spent some time with the U. S. Marines in Korea. While being assailed by the discouraging winds of loneliness, the Lord revealed to him the dreadful soul needs of the Korean natives. That same afternoon he trudged eight miles through the snow and cold handing out tracts and witnessing to everyone he met. He returned to camp rejoicing. His cruse of oil was completely replenished!

"COME UNTO ME"

Jesus said, "Come unto me," and all through the pages of holy writ that are used to depict His life story we find men and women heeding His command, and gathering to Him.

Our Lord had about Himself a magnanimous aurora of capitivating beauty that attracted followers. But more than that, He had that which men needed, and they flocked to hear His words and partake in His miracles. They found in Jesus a completeness, a calmness, and an immutabil-

ity unknown in the tempest-torn atmosphere of their subjected world.

The all-sufficiency of Christ has not been dimmed nor diminished a whit since the time of His earthly sojourn incarnated. He still exhorts "all men everywhere" to come to Him and find all they have need of. The wisest thing that men can do is to rally to the side of Jesus, and put themselves in His care.

A WORD ABOUT CHRISTIAN GIVING from the editor

Jesus said, "But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal; for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:20 21). These words were not spoken directly to rich men, but to the almost entirely poverty stricken multitudes that flocked around Him seeking a handout of some kind. To those people who had very little and to some who had nothing but the clothing on their backs these words were addressed.

Today, as in Jesus' day, there is the tendency to be overly concerned about physical welfare and personal preservation. These mundane elements are receiving now as then the supreme place in the lives of children of God. To coin the words of James, "My brethern, these things ought not so to be." We should be seeking first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness. We should be trusting the Lord more keenly, yea—implicitly—for our physical needs and our preservation, while we ourselves are busy caring for the kingdom work committed to us by Him.

Perhaps one of the foremost reasons that Christians are not better trusting the Lord and manifesting a better trust by their giving is the lack of a system of giving. The words of the New Testament on the subject of giving are a benediction upon systematic giving. For example, read 1 Corinthians 16:1,2. In that scripture Paul urges that a system of giving be used, each man to "lay by him in store on the first day of the week, as God hath prospered him." The Word is clear in its teaching that the tithe (i.e., the first one-tenth of one's income) is the Lord's, and that we do not give, but that we pay it; the tithe is not to be considered a gift to the Lord, but is reckoned out of the income as already belonging to the Lord. Christian giving is the love offering of God's dear child to Him that His kingdom might be furthered here on earth, and such a gift is truly treasure layed up in heaven, drawing compounded interest with every passing minute. From the tenure of scripture, I take it to mean that no interest can be drawn until the tithe is paid. But interest must come upon the gift.



NOTES OF INTEREST

The second quarter of our conference year has passed and the third is well under way. It is with gratification we look over the report cards from our pastors. Nineteen pastors of the twenty-eight reported as of January 21. These reports are sent to our general superintendent along with my personal report. I will pass along some of the high points from these reports. Paul Miller reports 1,300 personal calls; Robert Rogers reports 825, and John Newby 323. The Riverside Church reports 26 new members since the conference; East Los Angeles reports 7 and Santa Ana 6. Other churches reported 20 new members, making a total gain of 59. This number, less 6 reported lost, leaves a net gain of 53. El Monte reports the largest Sunday average attendance of 174, Rees Memorial 145, and Fresno 100. The Sunday School report has been reviewed elsewhere by our Promotional Secretary. There were 11 churches of the 19 reporting that have paid the budget in full since conference. We should give this matter our prayerful and careful attention. The District and the General Church can not operate without the budget. It is the basic support. Do not let your church get too far behind. "Pay as you go."

INDIANAPOLIS CONFERENCE

It was my privilege to attend the church leaders' conference in Indianapolis, Indiana. This conference was planned for the purpose of bringing information and inspiration to the church leaders. I can report that the meeting was a success.

There were a number of papers written on various subjects that had to do with the pastor's relationship with God, his relationship with others, to visitational work, to organizational work, to the total church program. There were other very helpful and inspirational additions to the

EDITORIALS

OUR FAULTS ARE OFTEN REFLECTED BY THOSE OF OTHERS

Have you ever driven along a super highway with your thoughts a million miles away and the darkness of the night enveloping your vehicle with only the piercing beams of your auto finding contact with the outside world? And have you ever had your thoughts shattered by the sudden appearance of another car approaching you with its headlights flashing brightly in your eyes, bringing a state of near blindness? Then no doubt you remember the irateness you felt as you suffered the annoyance, and the subsequent strange feeling of stupidity as you realized your own headlights were glaring into the eyes of the other driver.

In the same way, the faults of other people often seem to be so glaring, but we only see through one set of eyes. How brightly do our faults glare in the eyes of others? It's something to think about. Yes, the other fellow's faults, like his carlights always seem more glaring than our own.

READ GOD'S HOLY WORD

St. Paul admonished Timothy to ".. give attention to reading." Jesus said, "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life." Joseph Addison commented on this theme when he said, "Reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body."

Medical men say that one of the greatest causes of physical sleepiness is the lack of exercise. A mind that is never to be exercised in the deep things of the Word cannot be expected to be spiritually alert enough to be taught by the Spirit, nor to be led in paths of growth. Only by

spiritual exercise can one grow spiritually, so let us see that our minds do their "spiritual calisthentics" each day, by reading diligently God's holy Word.

THE EASY ROAD TO HELL

Some one very sagely observed, "The man who cannot be angry at evil lacks enthusiams for good." Perhaps this answers the big and assuming question of why the church is currently lying dormant as far as the great fight against that gigantic monster, Vice, is concerned.

The insidious monsters that shocked our Christian parents and those who remember earlier days seem no longer to possess shocking qualities. In fact, it begins to seem that the church has reached that sad place where her collective conscience has become "unshockable." A startling variety of worldly vehicles is transporting millions of immortal souls down a mile-wide freeway to hell, while the church that dares to call itself by the name of God is bothered not a whit. INDUSTRIOUSNESS SUCCEEDS

Benjamin Franklin said, "Plough deep while sluggards sleep, and you shall have corn to sell and to keep." The implication that stands out is that industriousness breeds success, and that is very, very true, generally speaking. With religious things, that holds true three ways.

First, the successful Christian must plough deeply if he would be deeply spiritual, for very little of the Christian's blessing is found near the surface; the scriptures speak often, tho', of the "deep things of God." Second, a successful congregation must plough deeply, earnestly contending for the precious faith once delivered to the saints; she has no time for the shallow hypocrisy of liberalism and worldliness that stops miles short of God's real goal. Third, a successful denomination must plough deeply if it would fulfill the place in God's kingdom for which it was raised up—the reconciliation of God and man; all other purposes, grand as they may be, must be set aside or at least minified. God's people must "plough deep."

News From the Churches

CORONA

Construction is under way for the renovation of the present church building. Since the present facilities are adequate in so far as room is concerned, the Lord has led the people here to set forth their efforts in an all-out physical improvement program. On the exterior, plans call for erection of a steeple, one new side exit door with a porch which will have steps on one side and a ramp on the other side providing access to the church for baby carriages and wheel chairs, and stuccoing in terra-cota of the entire building. In addition to that, contracts have already been let for the paving of the parking lot.

On the interior, plans call for two rooms to be built in the front of the church to provide a nursery with a glass front, and two restrooms. Also, the platform will be revised to provide for a more adequate pastor's study, and a duplicating room. The entire floor will be tiled, and new carpets will be laid on the platform.

Spiritually and materially, the church is making great progress. Altar services are frequent, souls are being saved, believers are being sanctified, finances are better than ever, and the Spirit of the Lord is leading. In one service this month the Lord set the order of service completely aside while He allowed the saints to shout around the sanctuary, and then He climaxed the service with nine souls at the altar of prayer. For the fourth straight month, the Sunday school attendance has been nearly twenty above the correspanding month one year ago. To God be all the praise.

Our Treat — Retreat

On December 27, twenty-five young people from the Yucaipa and Chino churches arrived at Mile High Pines for an overnight camping trip. Shortly after arriving we hiked to the frozen lake, returning just in time for a good chicken dinner. The evenings are long in the mountains now, so we had lots of time for games, visiting, moon light hiking and a good youth service. At the close of the service eight young people sought the Lord for the first time in their lives and gave radiant testimonies of their newfound peace.

The outstanding feature of Saturday was answering the questions dropped into our crude question box by the new converts. All the questions revealed that our young people were profoundly interested in spiritual things, and it was thrilling to see how attentively everybody listened as the questions were discussed. As

EDITORIALS

THE IMPORTANCE OF POSSESSION

"He that hath the Son hath life, and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life." (I John 5:12). All important to us is the possession of the Son of God. Upon that factor hinges everything that is of lasting importance to us. Possession of life—that is, the life that consists in the renewed presence of God within one, and a present stock of immortality—is contingent upon the possession of Jesus Christ.

But, what is meant by "the possession of Christ? Much more than meets the eye (or heart) from some of the highest plat-forms of Christianity. True, it is the reception of Him into one's consciousness. True, it is the result of a crisis experience wherein one realizes a need of a "higher power," and accepts that One. But, it is more—infinitely more. It is the conscious, intentional reception into one's innermost being of the resurrected Son of * God, that is, His Spirit.

This possession is highly conditional. The way must be prepared for it in the heart of man, which heart is not normally prepared for the reception of such a holy guest as the Spirit of God. The natural heart is bent toward evil, and that continually. They that are natural are "none that doeth good, no, not one." Before the regenerating influence of Christ can kindle life in such a heart, it (the heart) must be emptied of its guilty content. Its sins are hideous, and thus it is incompatible with the Spirit of Christ. Necessary to initial reception of Christ is that godly sorrow for sin, that worketh repentance. Far too many today attempt to receive Christ without renouncing the world. It cannot be done, for, ". soever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God" (James 4:4).

This possession is entirely possible.



REMODELING UNDERWAY AT CORONA CHURCH

The above picture is an artist's conception of the finished product of the Corona Pilgrim Holiness Church, which is at the present time under process of remodeling.

The steeple is built and the cross is in place, at the time of this writing. In addition to the erection of the new tower and steeple, plans call for a new side exit door (pictured), a covered porch with steps on one side and a ramp for wheel-chairs on the back side, and stuccoing of the exterior of the entire church in terra-cotta.

Interior plans call for nearly complete renovation, although this work will be undertaken on more of a long range plan than the exterior, which will be completed in about a month. At the present time, the extent of the interior work consists in the pastor's study, which is being painted, carpeted, and enclosed for better privacy. In the near future, it is hoped that the remainder of the interior of the church will be repainted, the floor tiled, and the platform carpeted.

The young people's class has assumed the responsibility for redecoration of the Sunday school annex, which they will repaint and tile the floors. They will also put one or two new doors in. In addition, the youth are planning and raising money for a recreation area, which will be set up

on the remainder of the lot west of the parking lot. When the parking lot is surfaced, it will also be used for recreational activities.

raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." That is part of what Jesus meant when He spoke of keeping His words. Jesus taught that His continued presence with one is contingent upon keeping the divine mandates. "He that committeth sin is of the devil" (1 John 3:8), and Christ has no part in him.

And that leads to the statement that this possession is highly practical. Only the indwelling Spirit of the Lord is able to keep us from falling. Only His constant abiding gives an individual victory over Satan and his inexhaustible wiles. To lose that presence for a moment is to court disaster. Conversely, to enjoy that presence in a constant way is to enjoy the constant blessing—yea, the constant protection of the Lord. For He says that none is able to pluck His own out of the Father's hand.

The text is present tense. So is the quality of possession. Yesterday's presence is not adequate, nor is tomorrow's hope a safe alcove. All that will suffice is to know now that Jesus abides within, for, "He that hath the Son hath life, and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life."

EDITORIALS

THE RICHES OF THE RESURRECTION

At Easter time, we think of the living Christ, who lives because He had the power to take again His life from among the dead. We also think of the blessings which are ours because He did in fact rise from the dead, according to His own promise. And there is much to be considered in that respect, which we shall call The Riches of the Ressurrection.

I. There are the riches of Redemption.

"... and was raised again for our justification" (Romans 4:25b). As Dr. Adam Clarke says, "... it appears that the death of Christ was an atonement or expiation for the sin of the world ... so His resurrection was the proof and pledge of our eternal life."

Paul makes it clear that the Christian claim to being justified by faith in the atoning merits of the blood of Christ is contingent upon the truth of the resurrection, for "... if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain: ye are yet in your sins." (1 Corinthians 15:17).

II. There are the riches of Righteousness. "That as sin hath reigned unto death, even so might grace reign through righteousness unto eternal life by Jesus Christ our Lord' (Romans 5:21). This verse demands that, to the same extent to which sin has wrecked lives through its influence both of transgression and impurity, grace shall reign, to eternal life. Unrighteousness makes men aliens from God. Only righteousness imputed and imparted is able to change that.

III. There are the riches of **REVELA- TION.** "... that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the

Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection" (Romans 6:4, 5). Referring again to Clarke, we find that in his opinion this is a beautiful metaphor, taken from grafting, or making the scion grow together with a new stock. Thus, through the merits of the atonement, proved by the resurrection, "... we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Corinthians 3:18).

One of the most beautiful songs ever written proclaims this truth, "Changed from glory into glory, Till in heav'n we take our place, Till we cast our crowns before Thee, Lost in wonder, love and praise."

-- "Love Divine," by Charles Wesley.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL REVIVAL

Guest Editorial by Rev. Paul E. Miller "Let him know, that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins." James 5:20.

The mere reading of the above verse should put every one of us under conviction. As we consider the great task which is ours and the great possibilities of that task—the holding of eternal life or of eternal death for those Sunday scholars who attend our Churches; we shall begin to see how miserably we are failing.

Every wide awake person has been shocked by the recent increase of horrible crimes being committeed by our young people and chidren. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, recently made this statement, "There is only one thing that will stem the tide of juvenile delinquency and crime in general; that is for every mother and father in America to take their children to Sunday School and Church regularly. It is our only hope."

The degenration of the home and the lack of Bible and moral teaching in our schools has descended a great load of responsibility upon the Church. We have the sole job of Christian education. We must face the problem squarely; we must shoulder the responsibility; we must put forth every ounce of effort at our disposal. We have been greived to learn that only a third of our Sunday Schools are putting forth a planned, concentrated, revival effort in their Schools. The Sunday School revival should receive a greater measure of our attention than even the regular fall and spring campaigns. Here is a golden opportunity which we have

been allowing to slip through our fingers. Children are easy to reach for the Lord—let's reach them before they grow up.

EDUCATION DAY—MAY 4

God's work is a work of crises. He seems to intend it that way, often using crises to test our faith in Him, supplying the needs one at a time, and seldom any more than the need. Once again the school administration is coming to us with the presentation of the needs of the school—this need to be presented in all of the California Pilgrim churches on Sunday, May 4.

This need is coming at a time that finds our beloved W.P.C. in direct of financial straits. We of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, cognizant that we must look to this college not only for the Christian training of our Pilgrim Youth but also for the bulk of the training of the ministry which will grace our pulpits in years to come, cannot afford to let the school down at this time.

Some pastors and people may be tempted to say, "How can we afford to give heavily to the school at this time, when there are so many things we need?" We will do well to ask instead, "How can we afford **not** to give, when the vary life and future of our church depend so vitally upon the school?" Certainly, friends, to deny the school and ultimately close its doors (YES, it could be that serious) is tantamount to catastrophe for our church.

Brother Thomas and the instructors at the school have labored diligently for the salvation and instruction in Christian faith of hundreds of our California Pilgrim youth, always doing so at great personal sacrifice and self denial. They have spared themselves nothing to afford our youth the best in Christian education. We We can do nothing less than sacrifice and give heavily May 4 to show these Godly, consecrated workers that we are 100% behind them in their labor of love for us.







Bickmore; District Treasurer, Rev. Bruce Chamberlain; Council Advisory Members Rev. Max Greene, Rev. C. L. Morgan and Rev. Thomas Hamon; District Young People's Executive Secretary, Mr. Martin Horine.

The following officers were appointed by the District Council: Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Gene Daffern; Editor, PILGRIM NEWS, Rev. Rob-

ert Rogers.

For the other various offices which were filled both by election and by appointment consult your new District Conference Minutes.

From the standpoint of finances, many things were discussed. Several plans for raising the district budget were discussed, and finally the plan which was agreed upon calls for \$1.75 per month or \$21.00 per year per assessable member. In addition to that, the conference voted to set as a goal that each church raise \$10.00 per member for Western Pilgrim College. At a glorious service on the first Sunday afternoon at the Camp meting, nearly \$5500.00 in cash and pledges was raised for the college.

The ministry of Rev. R. G. Flexon to the conference, and his able supervision and council were deeply appreciated.

EDITORIALS

THE SURE CODE OF SERVICE

A favorite sermon text of most preachers is found in John's Gospel, where the story is told of Christ's first miracle wherein He transformed water into wine. The mother of Jesus instructed the servants thus concerning her Son. "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it". (John 2.5).

That is still the only sure code of service for us today. Listening for the voice of God is so important to a correctly aligned personal ministry. We must not allow ourselves to listen to outside voices, which tell us to obey our personal desires, for our desires might be foreign to that which God has planned for us. But rather we should listen carefully to the voice of the Holy Spirit, and hearken diligently to the words given as in the Bible, both of which are given to instruct us as to the right way to walk, and the right avenue of Christian service for us as individuals.

It is not enough just to know what to do, and what is right to do. It is also necessary to do it. Had the servants disobeved Jesus by leaving the waterpots empty of water, no miracle would have been wrought. By this same token, it is useless to expect a host of fruit if one is not doing that which one knows to do. No pastor expects people just to walk in the church door because he wishes for it and knows they should come to church. He knows he must go and invite them to Jesus. And that holds true in any field of Christian work. Some unknown writer has penned words which illustrate the right attitude: "Oh Master, Master, these sayings of Thine,

Help me to make them doings of mine."

WHITHER PERFECTION?

Eugene Delacroix said, "The artists who seek absolute perfection in everything are

those who can reach it in nothing."

Perhaps this seems rather distant from pertinence. I do feel, though, that it has an application for many "artists" of another kind. I speak now of the person (or persons) who goes from one congregation to others in search of perfection—that is, a perfect church. I do not know of a soul that has succeeded in finding a congregation which was without fault in many respects from its membership to its organization.

One person I knew said he was not going to join any church until he found one that was perfect. I pressed the point a bit further, by asking him whether or not he actually thought he would find a perfect church in which he could eventually place his life and energy. I received an affirmative answer. But, I could not help wondering to myself just how long any church which he joined would remain perfect. I doubt that it would be for long.

Another person I knew told me that the reason he'd remained unsaved was that he had always found a great many hypocrites in each of the churches where he had attended. His definition of a hypocrite was, one who believes something, but doesn't practice that in his life. So. I asked him if he believed a person should live a **Christian** life, that is, should a person make a definite committment to Christ through a confession of sin and faith in the divine atonement at Calvary's cross. He answered with an emphatic "yes." Then, I drew the conclusion that, after all, he was the greatest hypocrite of all, not living his convictions.

From the Desk of the DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

Let Us Build Our Church

The first prerequisite for successful building in kingdom work is a right motive. We are not to seek to make a name for ourselves. Our efforts must be motivated from a deep love for God and lost souls. Many times when the worker has lost himself in the great work of soul winning he unconsciously is building a reputation that sets him apart from others as a successful builder of the Church of God.

There must be fervent prayer going up to God without ceasing. Prayer, accompanied by venturing faith and a willingness to work at the job, will add much to the element of success in kingdom building.

Also in kingdom building there must be a good measure of "stick-ability." There may be the feeling of disappointment when we do not get our way every time, when we are ridiculed, or when there are problems confronting us. Instead of running away from these things, we can use them as opportunities to prove our love for God and the people.

Pastors and workers must ever set right examples in all things, including Godliness and self-denial. We cannot lead the people any higher or deeper than we ourselves

are.

The foundation that is steadfast and sure is still Jesus Christ. There can be no other for there is no other. It is Christ and His philosophy of life—"other foundation can no

man lay.'

We are told to take heed how we are to build; the right material must be used. There are many things that are not sinful but which certainly are not good material with which to build for eternity. "Let every man take heed how he buildeth thereon." "Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God."

There must always be proper and right attitudes and enthusiasm. Fairness to the whole program of the church is a must. If we regard our local church as our own, the denominational budget will appear as taxes to be endured. If we consider our local

church as a part of a great world-wide movement, the budget will be ours and our people's part in a great cooperative program for preaching the Gospel to the lost. If we maintain right attitudes, the budget will not appear as taxes, but as part of a great life stream supporting various parts of the mission of a great church.

General Conference Highlights

Four hundred thirty-five delegates from both foreign and home lands gathered at Winona Lake, Indiana for the twenty-third quadrennial conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, a conference which was marked by an unusual manifestation of the presence of the Holy Ghost.

A merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church was received with a strong favor-

able vote.

A gain of 7.8% in church membership was reported for the past four year period.

There are now three General Superintendents, by action of the conference—Wm. H. Neff, R. G. Flexon, and M. H. Snyder.

For a complete report of the conference see July 12 issue of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate—a very interesting report written by Rev. P. W. Thomas.

The California Conference and Camp were indeed times of blessing. We who attended can surely never be the same. Attendance at both conference and camp was record breaking. The day is not far away when we will have to enlarge our present tabernacle to meet the needs of Sunday and evenings crowds.

I was called by our General Superintendent, Brother Neff, to minister at the Idaho - Washington camp. Brother Wolfe, the engaged evangelist, cancelled the camp due to the serious illness of his mother. The camp was initiated with an all night prayer meeting. Each zone had charge of certain hours. Evidently the people prayed for God to blot out the preacher, for I certainly felt that the Lord had charge of every service. There were old fashioned victories both for regeneration and sanctification. The Glory of the Lord fell on both the speaker and people. Brother and Sister Canary expended every effort to make the

GUEST EDITORIAL

"THAT THEY MIGHT LIVE" (Rev. Mrs. May Heck)

That who "might Live": Boys and girls! The answer is Sunday School Evangelism. That boys and girls might know and feel the sacredness of the Saviour; the gracious privilege of Sunday School and church attendance. To know the joy and ecstasy of sins forgiven, the gladness of heart purity early in their lives. It is all too true that boys and girls are dying for want of the One Who died that they might live. Crime is taking its toll, the price being paid in youth is staggering.

The crying need of the hour is Sunday School Evangelism! There is and ever will be the need of adult evangelism in our churches, times of reviving, refreshing, an extended effort to reach beyond our borders for those who need salvation. And yet our boys and girls come and go, drift from us at an alarming early age; the majority will be swept into the swirling torrents of sin with rescue virtually impossible. "Lost" to God, the church and humanity, yet they might have lived if the effort had been made in their direction. made in their direction. Boys and girls need repeated revivals.

Sunday school evangelism has a two fold purpose. It not only reaches the children, but the parents also. It brings into our churches adults, who otherwise could be totally disinterested. We search desperately for ways and means of enticing the unsaved that the gospel may reach their bar-ren hearts and lives; yet the solution is, at least in part, within our grasp. "Reach the parents through their own children," is an old statement, but none the less true. Adult Evangelism requires special prayer, special speaker, special singers, special advertising, special finance. In fact it is a specialty, geared to reach all ages. Sadly enough, comparatively few take advantage of the effort put forth in their behalf. Exactly, what might the results be, if all or part of these specials were turned into the channels of Sunday School Evangelism? If like an unseen army, these specials were to invade every home in an all-out effort to evangelize boys and girls; the results could mean the salvation of parents and their children.

Our boys and girls need to become acquainted with the hushed quietness of the church sanctuary, should learn to cherish and reverence the hour of worship; to feel the Presence and glow that should permeate the atmosphere, as we gather after the Sunday School hour. It is pathetic in-

deed, that many boys and girls never enter the sanctuary; they go directly to the classroom, and leave the same way. Unless the parents are Christians, church has no particular meaning to them. The church habit and worship in the sanctuary should be a vital part in Sunday school training.

The church is built around the Sunday school, and boys and girls should be taught at an early age, to feel and know that they are an important part of the church; eagerly looking forward to that privilege of being a part of the church service, which in turn could influence their parents.

In a recent Sunday School revival, seven to eighteen parents attended the daily evangelistic services held in the church, after school. The majority of them were unsaved, but they, too, heard the gospel in a simplified manner. Why were they there each day? To be counted as visitors for their children. Many under school age came, accompanied by a parent (a must). This resulted in several new families that had never attended the church. Unsaved parents attended on Sundays, to be counted for their children.

Every effort and dollar put into Sunday school evangelism will pay great dividends. Our scope is boundless, the need is vital and the harvest is thousands of unsaved boys and girls. LET US REDEEM THE TIME, WHILE THERE IS TIME TO RE-DEEM.

From the Desk of the DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

Intercession

The people of the Bible who were a praying people were intercessors. Paul was an intercessor, "that supplication, prayers, intercession, thanksgiving be made for all men." Christ prayed for the disciples, and He made special prayer for Peter. Samuel prayed all night for Saul. Abraham made intercession for Sodom and Gomorrah. God's delivering mercy depends upon intercessors. There is a great need in the church of our day for people who are willing to put their shoulders under the burdens of others in real, intercessory prayer. "I sought for a man among them, that should make up the fence and stand in the gap before me for the land, that I should not destroy it, but found none" (Ezekiel 22:30). It is a normal function in prayer to make intercession with God for the needs of others.

1. Intercession is a mystery. The first prerequisite to intercessory prayer is to know how to pray for ourselves. If we do not know how to pray for ourselves, how can we know how to pray for others? That we may pray for others is a deep mystery and is indeed a crowning glory. Prayer must be personal, however, it cannot be isolated. Prayer must not stop at personal need. Life is relative, and certainly interdependent. "For none of us liveth unto himself" (Romans 14:1). In the law of prayer each stands alone in His presence and yet every one bears the burdens of others. Moses made the cause of Israel his own. In Matthew 14:21-28, we read where the mother of a devil-possessed daughter made the affliction of the child a personal matter. So it is with us today. We bear the burden of those for whom we pray.

2. There is intercession in Heaven. The ministry of our great High Priest is in Heaven. "He ever liveth to make intercession..." (Heb. 7:25). The resurrected and ascended Christ is the Priest-King at the right hand of God. As a High Priest, He represents man before God; as King he is representing God to man. Because He so lives to make intercession, He is able to

save to the uttermost all who come to God by Him. Having entered by His own blood (offering himself as a sacrifice for sin), He became the one mediator between God and man. The King-Priest takes the prayers of the earthly altar and adds to them the fires of the heavenly, thus making them acceptable and effective through His wonderful and glorious name. It is a revealed fact that the redeemed cannot be excluded from the ministry of intercession. 3. There is the intercession of the spirit.

3. There is the intercession of the spirit. "The spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for; but the spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered; and He that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the spirit, because He maketh intercession for the spirit, according to the will of God" (Romans 8:26-27). The Holy Spirit intercedes within the temple of the consecrated soul, and the High Priest intercedes for that soul in heaven. The unity of purpose and method of the High Priest and the Holy Spirit is so harmonious that the two are one. What is prayed by the intercessor on earth is also prayed by the intercessor in heaven.

It takes a saint to carry on the ministry of intercession. There must be a spirit-filled temple. The carnal mind can never know the mind of the spirit. The pure in heart see God. The heart must be sensitive to the light and obedient to the heavenly vision. There are services that can be rendered that make no demand upon spirituality for success. Preaching may be an art in which there is no power of the spirit. Church music can be the kind that does not call for travail in prayer. Social activities can make a fair show without any demand upon spirituality. The man who travails in anguish of intercession must be a man of God.

God waits to answer. He is always willing and able, but there are many adversaries. Paul speaks of being in travail, striving and laboring in prayer. The answer to Paul's prayer on the high sea, in a storm-tossed, splintering, sinking vessel, came only after a long absence from the crowd, in prayer before God. Daniel's prayer was delayed three weeks by a conflict in the realm of spirits. Some times the answer comes immediately, at other times the answer is delayed, but the one truth in which faith

Editorials

God Uses Prepared Men

I recently read an editorial by Bishop Charles V. Fairbairn, of a sister denomina-

tion, which I quote herewith.

"God wants and uses prepared men. If they are not 'equipped for His work, when He gets them, He lets the work wait while He takes time to equip them.' John the Baptist had his time of brooding, studying and praying in the desert. Jesus Himself went through the silent years of Nazareth. The apostles had their years with the greatest Teacher of the ages, hearing His words, seeing His works, marking His ways, imbibing His Spirit, taking on His attitudes, and finally at Pentecost being filled with His Holy Spirit, before He released them to go to their great work."

The doors will open at Western Pilgrim College for registration of new students on Wednesday, September 3. It will be the beginning of another year in which Pilgrims will be given the opportunity to prepare for their future vocations in our own denominational college. Everyone who plans to enter any field of Christian work should plan to enroll. In addition, all persons who plan to enter secular labor—in whatever field—should plan to enroll for at least the basic junior college Associate Arts Course.

It would be a mistake of the highest magnanimity for any person to attempt to enter the Lord's work without adequate preparation. There is no better place than one's denominational college for one to gain that preparation. By the same token, it could, conceivably, be catastrophic for one to enter into a study of secular interests in a non-Christian college without first securing a Christian foundation at a Christian col-

lege.

Western Pilgrim College this year is planping for an outstanding year, both academically and spiritually. The pastors and churches of the district have taken a great step in furthering this plan by promising to stand squarely behind the college both in finances and in prayer. The administration of the college is doing its best to provide a faculty and staff that are competent academically, sound doctrinally, and deep spiritually. All of this is being done for two reasons. First, denominational leaders recognize the need of providing an avenue wherein our young people may learn of Christ. Secondly, they also recognize that if we are to build a strong denomination, and by that process help build the Kingdom of God, there must be an institution of higher learning where the denominational program is framed into the building of the Kingdom of God.

Finally, the world is calling for full-time Christian workers to carry the Gospel to its sin-sick millions. It is also calling for staunch Christian men and women who are not afraid to testify for Christ and have been trained to testify for Christ in the secular fields of labor. Young friend, include in your plans adequate preparation for your life's work. Plan to enroll this fall in Western Pilgrim College.

CHRIST TRIUMPHANT

At least three times we find Christ experiencing triumph. All three of these occurences are recorded in the Gospel According to Mark.

In Mark 1:12, 13, Jesus is sorely tempted by the devil. According to the Apostolic writer, the Lord was tempted for a period of forty days—Matthew, a contemporary of Mark, writes of the same incident in greater detail, and informs us that Satan used three types of temptation to tempt Jesus—hunger, His deity, and power. The Master answered each of the three temptations with the Word of God. And it is recorded in the concluding words of the incident—"... the devil leaveth him." He was triumphant over the devil.

In Mark 5:25-34, we read of a woman who was diseased with "an issue of blood." It is not necessary to discuss the nature of the illness, but Matthew and Luke agree with Mark on the facts that she had spent all of her money on trips to the doctors of the age, had found no healing, and was growing steadily worse. By a marvelous act of faith (manifested in touching the hem of Jesus' garment), the woman received instantaneous healing. Jesus was triumphant over disease.

Then, in Mark 5:21-24 and 35-43, a man named Jairus came to Jesus to inform Him that his daughter was near death, at his home. As Jesus joined with the man to go to his home, and as they were nearing Jairus' home, some people came to meet the entourage with the sad news that the girl had expired. In spite of the pathos of the hour, Jesus comforted Jairus with the words, ". . . only believe." Taking with Him only Peter, James and John, Jesus went on to the home of Jairus, took the hand of the damsel, and restored her life. He was triumphant over death.

Now, then, can this Jesus have significance for us today? The Scripture saith, concerning Him, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8).

- 1. "For in that he himself hath suffered being tempted, he is able to succour them that are tempted" (Hebrews 2:18). In Him, we can be triumphant over the devil.
- 2. "And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness" (2 Corinthians 12:9). In Him, we can be triumphant over disease.

Let Us Keep the Faith

Paul testified at the close of his life in words like these, "I have fought a good fight . . . I have kept the faith." In the cause of Christ we work with resolution grounded in hope. There are many visible and invisible fces that are always near at hand. They will loom up in a distance and often are entrenched in fortifications constructed with most consummated skill. He who goes to war against sin must be prepared for a struggle. The ground of the enemy must be taken inch by inch. The victories won will have to be defended with a vigilance that never wearies. Every instrument known to be honorable or dishonorable warfare will be used to defeat the Christian's purpose. The Christian will be forced to surrender unless he is certain in the rightness of his cause and possesses an unbounded confidence in the captain of his salvation.

Faith that is true will never know defeat. Faith will triumph in every seeming defeat. The triumphs of faith are not like the world's victories. When faith is overpowered, it conquers; when killed, it comes to life; when buried it rises again. Let us observe Paul's experience: at Damascus, the Jews laid wait to kill him; at Antioch the chief men expelled him from their coasts; at Lystra, the people worshiped him and later, after hearing him preach, stoned him and left him for dead. These are just a few of his experiences. More of his seeming defeats may be discovered by following his footprints through the inspired pages of the Word of God. Let us hear what he says:

"Now, thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ" (2 Cor. 2:4), Paul was sustained by faith. We too can triumph through faith. We must have and keep faith if we are to work with Christ.

NOTES OF INTEREST

Vacations: The California District has experienced the usual summer slump in most of the churches; but we are not alone in this respect. More and more of our Pilgrims all over the denomination are vacationing during the summer months. Such times are good, providing the spiritual aspect of life is not neglected. Vacation in the right sense should leave us very anxious to get back into our

church to apply ourselves afresh and anew to the work of kingdom building.

Pastoral Quarterly Reports. Each quarter the local pastor is required to fill in two report cards and send to the District Superintendent. One of these cards from each pastor is forwarded on to the office of the General Superintendent, along with a personal report of the District Superintendent's activities. As of this date, all reports are in but Bell Gardens, Buena Park, E. Los Angeles, Lynwood, and Rees Memorial. From the twenty-four reports sent in these items of interest are taken: The church having the largest membership gain is El Monte, Rev. Greene, Pastor, with 22 new members during the first quarter. Second is Los Angeles First, Rev. Meyers, Pastor, with a gain of 8 new members. The paster reporting the largest number of personal calls is Rev. Bruce Chamberlain, 324; next are Rev. E. R. Snook, 178 and Rev. R. W. Josey, 175. All but two of the churches reporting have paid their budget.

Budget. A word about the budget perhaps would be in order. The budget is based on the voting membership as reported in the 1958 Conference Minutes. If there is a mistake or misrepresentation in the Minutes, the chairman of the committee having to do with church budgets, Rev. Thomas Lee, should be informed as to the error. The California District is required to pay to the General Church an amount based upon membership showing in the conference minutes.

Buildings and Improvements. The Fresno Church is encouraged. The building program has again taken on new interest. A loan has been processed to finish the new unit, and the Fresno Pilgrims hope to be in their new building before Christmas of this year.

Sylmar Pilgrims will finish their new building before many months.

Pomona is building a new much-needed Sunday School unit, and are paying as they

El Monte is building a very commodious Sunday School unit. This new building will certainly be a great asset to the grounds at Pilgrim Headquarters.

The Rosemead Church has been completely renovated with a new coat of paint and other improvements.

The Ojai Church has made progress on their proposed new Sunday School plant. The church has appreciated the new air coolers which have been installed.

These churches mentioned are making improvements and also are paying District and General obligations, which should be a normal procedure.

Editorial

PROPOSITION 16

Slithering back from a narrow defeat suffered in previous California Statewide elections comes a slightly revised but generally unaltered legislative tax bill, for which a certain group of politicians will be endeavoring to persuade the California citizens to vote. The bill spoken of here is the one which will be listed on ballots as "Proposition 16," and will provide that parochial (private) schools be denied further tax exemption, and that said schools will hereinafter be taxed.

This bill will be voted on in the upcoming November elections. If passed, it will force the taxation of Western Pilgrim College, and similar private educational institutions all over the state. Such taxation would force many of those schools to close their doors; others, in order to remain in operation. would be forced to raise tuition rates measurably. Raising of tuiton rates would almost certainly force many withdrawals of students which - in turn - would force closure of schools.

In the opinion of the editor, Proposition 16 is an extremely dangerous piece of proposed legislation, both to patrons of the private schools, and to California citizens in general. It is so for these reasons:

- (1) It would place a double tax burden on constituents of private schools; parents of students who attend private schools already pay taxes—they should not pay them twice.
- (2) Private schools more than make up for their tax exemptions by their functions, as they lift a huge load (340,000 students) from the public school systems. In this connection, it might be said that were private schools to be taxed—and thereby to be forced to close all of those 340,000 students would be forced into public schools; the public school financial load would be increased thereby, and no financial aid would be gained because closed schools cannot be taxed. There is no doubt but that taxes would have to be raised to care for those students.
- (3) Nearly every metropolitan newspaper has taken an editorial stand against Proposition 16, clearly stating its dangers both to the schools and to the general citizenry.

In conclusion, it is also the editor's opinion that the defeat of Proposition 16 should in itself be sufficient impetus to get all California Pilgrims (and all other California Christians) to the polls. We cannot stand idly by, and allow this insidious, unjust proposition to be imposed upon us. A resounding "No' vote is in order, and is our obligation. For our own protection—and for justice—we must defeat Proposition 16!

TEACHERS AND TEACHING

N. Redondo Beach 10

One problem facing our Sunday Schools is the securing of qualified teachers. The need is for real teachers, teachers of power and devotion who are able to leave their imprint on young lives. To be a real teacher is a commendable achievement.

There are three types of teachers. Two types are remembered—one to be forgiven after years have softened resentment; the other to be thought of with honor and gratitude as long as memory lasts. Between these two is the third—teachers who are forgotten, because they failed to stamp a lasting impression on their pupils. These teachers are not bad enough to be actively forgiven, nor good enough to claim a place in gratitude and remembrance.

All teaching has two objectives—subject taught and person taught. When we teach Bill the Bible, we teach the Bible, of course, but we also teach Bill, and the greater objective is to teach the child. In fact, modern philosophy of education would certify that one has not taught until another has learned. Anyone with a given amount of intelligence can master subject matter sufficiently to present it to a class, but it is far more difficult to understand the class before you, to learn the secrets of the mind, the heart, and the inner springs of action of the individuals of that class and to be able to stimulate those individuals to learn. As the acorn contains the whole of the mighty oak tree enfolded in its heart, so the child has hidden within all the powers of the heart and mind which later reach full fruition.

Our teaching must be made meaningful. The lessons that we remembered and later dwelt upon were ones that finally were built into our lives and helped shape our thinking and acting. Truths dimly felt or only partially grasped soon fade away. In view of these facts, it is evident that the responsibilities placed upon teachers are great, and require unusual devotion and skill.

The child's training in religion can advance no faster than the expansion of his grasp of thought and comprehension, the deeping of his emotions, and the development of his will. The child's feelings must be reached, his emotions stirred, his intelligence appealed to. He must think. Trust and faith must be intelligently grounded. Not only must the spirit of worship be cultivated, but the child must know whom and why he worships. Not only must loyalties be secured, but these must grow out of a realization of the cost and worth of the cause or object to which loyalty is attached. The emotions, the will, the power of thought, imagination and memory are stimulated to make truth vivid, real, and lasting, thereby laying the foundations for spiritual feeling and devotion.

The Price Of The Gospel

One day, not long before our Lord went away. He called His disciples apart to a mountain in Galilee to announce the plan of campaign for the extension of His kingdom. It was a small company. Matthew says there were but eleven. When the Lord saw the little band and remembered how they had left Him in the days of His suffering, one might expect Him to instruct them to remain together in Jerusalem, that they might strengthen one another in the faith, and finally build up a strong center from which the surrounding country might be evangelized. Humanly speaking, the last thing He would be expected to do would be to send them out to die one by one at the hands of their enemies. The Master, as He looked down through the centuries, knew the need of the church, and He knew the dynamic power of His Gospel, so He scattered the little band like sheep in the midst of wolves. His last command to them was, "Go ve into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." The apostles understood Him to mean what He said. They were absolutely indifferent to life or death, except in so far as either affected the progress of the Kingdom of God. Arrayed against them was the ecclesiastical authority, the wealth, and the political power of the world. Bitter persecution was inevitable, and it is probable that all but one of the eleven died a martyr's death. So completely were the outward signs of the early church obliterated that according to Diocletian he was justified in making a medal bearing this inscription: "Diocletian has everywhere abolished the superstition of Christ, the name of Christ be by him extinguished.

In spite of the persecution and apparent failure, the kingdom expanded with rapidity which astonished even those Christians who

were strongest in the faith.

Not long after the ascension of our Lord, the young man Saul witnessed the death of another youth who was giving his life for his faith. Saul heard Stephen pray for his enemies and noted that his face shone as if it had been the face of an angel, when he looked up into heaven and saw the glory of God. He beheld Stephen fall asleep under the shower of stones, rejoicing in the privilege of making the sacrifice for his Lord.

Saul left this scene with a new light dawning in his heart, and one day when he was old, he was led out beyond the gates of emperial City of Rome to die a triumphant death as a minister of the Gospel. The Christian Church, by the death of Stephen, was baptized once for all in that blood which has been the seed of the church. The martyr's spirit was pre-eminently the spirit of the early church. The church today would profit by recapturing this spirit. Men of God, resolve to devote your lives to the cure of the souls of men. It is not to win numbers to the church, but to win men to the Savior who otherwise will be lost. Let us leave our all and go forth to reap the field that is now white to harvest. False religions are making tremendous headway. The church of Rome is rushing in with her salvation by sacraments, and religion of carnal ordinances. We want men who will preach Jesus Christ and the wonderful deliverance from sin that can be found through the merits of the blood of God's dear Son. God is a Spirit and the world needs to know how to worship Him in spirit and in truth.

The price of the gospel ometime seems high. Paul as he went to Jerusalem, not knowing the things that should befall him there, but very certain that bonds and afflictions were awaiting him, said, "None of these things move me. Neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish

my course with joy."

May the Lord help us to be willing, and ready to pay the full price in spreading the glorious gospel.—Lundy Hill.

Editorial

Herewith is presented first of three parts of an editorial

A Summary of The Meaning of Sanctification

The word "sanctification" has many different meanings in its scriptural use. While the two main meanings of it are (1) to set apart, or dedicate, and (2) to make holy, or cleanse, these two connotations are varied in several different ways. The variation of the use of the term is almost without exception seen to be in the object which in the exclusive passage is said to be 'sanctified."

The non-moral significance of sanctification.

Frequent application of the word "sanctify" and its derivatives is made in Old Testament writing to mundane articles, such as mountains, altars, beasts etc., with no vital moral significance attached. In these cases, the sanctified article was "set apart," even made "holy" in the respect that it was for some sacred use; yet there was no moral cleansing or purification involved. In many cases the article required washing, thus mundane articles were used to typify spiritual truths.

A. There was one time when even people were "sanctified," yet there was no moral significance. In Exodus 19:10, Moses was instructed to set the people apart from mundane living and prepare them for the arrival of the Lord in their midst. This was a case of typology pointing to future works of grace.

B. Another case, in Exodus 19:23, found Moses being instructed to sanctify a mountain. In this instance he set boundaries around it and made it a place whereon none could trespass. There was no cleansing involved, but rather a dedication. For the time Sinai was forbidden territory to Israel.

C. The third case was the altar in Exodus 40:10. Here the altar was set apart and hallowed for God. Unclean beasts were not to be offered upon it, nor were unclean persons to come near it, but the priests and sons of the Levites.

D. In Exodus 13:2, God ordered all first-born creatures set apart for Him. No moral significance was attached here, for no demand was made upon the object. It was the owner or parent of the object upon which the demand was made. This did not make the object morally holy, but objectively set apart.

An unavoidable delay in my returning resulted from a strike at the General Motors plant which affected the delivery date of the car I was scheduled to drive home. I appreciate the kindness of the pastors who have had to change the date of my visits to the churches. Thank you, my brethren.

At this General Board Meeting, I was impressed with the additional strength of leadership the three General Superintendents have brought to our church. A voice of direction was given the church on some items

The General Treasurer, Rev. R. A. Beltz, presented some interesting statistics, tabulated by the Bureau of Research and Survey of the National Council of Churches, concerning 51 churches and their membership 13 years of age or over. A total membership of 37,013,368 was reported this year, as compared with 36,190,377 last year. A total of \$84,102,030 was reported given for foreign missions this year. PILGRIMS TOP NATION'S CHURCH GIVERS

The editor is in receipt of a United Press International release which states (in part) as follows: "When the National Council of Churches recently issued its annual compilation of church giving, the Pilgrim Holiness Church was at the top of the list of

per-member contributions."

According to the release, Pilgrims give an annual total of more than six million dollars to the world-wide work of the denomination. It went on to point out that the average per-capita giving for 1957 was \$206.85. The article continued by giving two reasons for the high figure, as stated by General Treasurer R. A. Beltz: "The secret of why our people are so generous in their giving is the fact that we teach and practice tithing our income into the church. We believe it is the scriptural way of supporting the church and spreading the gospel."

The article continued to quote Mr. Beltz, "Perhaps another reason why our church ranks high in the statistic of church giving is because we hold more strictly to our membership requirements and a much larger per cent of our membership is active in

the church because of this."

The article then concluded with five paragraphs highlighting our general church work, and telling many of the details concerning the work, including the extent of our work, size of it, history of it, and purpose of it. In the editor's opinion, the article was one of the most splendid pieces of publicity a church could possibly be offered. And it was entirely free; and it was nation-wide (perhaps even world-wide) in scope. All because Pilgrims were faithful in doing one of the simplest but most often ignored commands of scripture! Also, it was a fine commentary on the fact that we Pilgrims practice what we preach. The people of our denomination are to be congratulated.

It would almost be out of order to close without saying that it is significant that the article mentioned the Wesleyan Methodist Church, with whom the Pilgrims are considering a merger, as being second in per-capita giving with an average of \$204.97. Their reasons for being second would, no doubt, be virtually the same as the reasons stated by Mr. Beltz for the Pilgrim total. Constituents of both denominations can look forward with extreme delight to the prospect of the force their combined efforts could project upon the battlefield for God.

A Summary of The Meaning of Sanctification

Second of Three Parts

II. The non-spiritual significance of sanctification.

There were times in the Old Testament and in the new Testament when persons were set apart for specific reasons in various ways, with no spiritual—that is saving or cleansing significance.

A. Jeremiah was sanctified or set apart to be a prophet of God before his birth, according to Jeremiah 1:5. This did not mean that he was saved or cleansed thus, because after God called him he had to choose whether to serve God or go along with the world. God set him apart in His mind, but left the choice to Jeremiah.

Jesus, according to John 10:36 was set apart to do the Father's will by coming to earth to save men from sin. There was no spiritual change implied here, for Christ was without sin. He set himself apart in John 17:19 for this same purpose in the same way.

B. Unbelieving persons could even become "sanctified" by having loved ones who were God's children. They were set apart by the constant prayers and supplications by these believing relatives to the convicting power of the Holy Ghost. God answers the prayers of His children as best He can; thus an unbeliever can be grateful if he has saved relatives to pray for him.

III. Sanctification as related to the new birth.

On its moral side, sanctification is inseparably related to the new birth, or the work of grace wrought in the heart of sinners which in Theology is termed regeneration.

A. First, the spiritually reborn are initially sanctified, literally, made holy. The work of entire sanctification is begun in their hearts when they are made free from the penalty of sin (I Cor. 6:11). Initial sanctification is the beginning of the spiritual restoration of one who has plunged himself into sin.

B. Secondly, the born-again are sanctified in the sense that they are "in Christ Jesus," and set apart for God to follow the world no longer (I Peter 1:2). They have sanctified themselves, that is, they have set themselves apart to God's work, and He has sanctified them also.

From The Editor RECRUITING FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH

The Church of Jesus Christ has been aptly described as a mighty army, moving ever forward in her conquest of the world for her King Jesus. The entire army is grandly united in one marvelous goal—that of evangelizing the world.

The army of Jesus approaches her task of evangelization much as a regular, worldly army approaches its task of conquering nations, by person to person contact and occasional great sweeping strokes of mass evangelism. The difference between a worldly army and the Christian Army is that the worldly army subdues and subjugates the objects of its conquest, while the army of Jesus seeks to conquer the enemies of God with the story of His love, and then to recruit them into His service to capture others for Christ; to recruit them for the local church.

This business of recruiting for the local church, then, is actually the summation of the Plan of God for the evangelization of the world. Wherever a group of Christian believers gather for worship regularly a local church is formed, and the process of recruiting is continued, if God's commands are ful-

However, the task of recruiting for the local church is a difficult one, and in the carrying out of this great plan there are many things to be considered. Let us consider these aspects from the standpoint of the pastor.

I. First of all, the pastor, or the "recruiting officer," must be sold on his job before he can either interest others in recruiting service, or (Continued on Page 4)

News and Activities of California Pilgrim Youth

All youth must cooperate with zone officers, as well as the leaders of the district, if all of the various functions and activities are to be the great successes that they can be, and that they must be.

successfully persuade recruits to join with the cause of Christ. Those who have been approached by military men interested in enlisting their services for their particular branch of the service will admit that the individual was keenly interested in his job, and

eager to find new recruits.

It is absolutely futile to attempt to win others to a cause with a disinterested approach. A soulwinning pastor will be one so enthused with his holy calling that no one will ever refuse his invitation because of his indifference or insincerity. Well does the writer remember the hours spent in the recruitment office while a zealous marine sergeant pleaded with him to re-enlist. A persuader must first be persuaded.

II. Secondly, the pastor must have subordinate recruiting officers or recruits that are interested in recruiting for the local church. Pastors plead from their pulpits for Christians to help them in their programs of visitation evangelism, but on calling night it is usually the faithful few who show up. The pastor must use these few to the best advantage, for it is those who are keenly interested in soulwinning who will do the most good. This does not mean that pastors should not try to interest others in visitation; but that he should use immediately those who are im-

mediately willing.

Every legitimate means of arousing interest in the visitation program should be used. Some persons will become interested through preaching; others will become interested through contests; still others will become interested through the praise that is lavished upon the busy visitation workers by the pastor. One method used by the Marine Corps was the giving of a seven day extension of leave of absence to those marines who enlisted a new recruit while on furlough. The response in many areas was tremendous. But, whatever means is used, the pastor must gain an enthusiastic corps of recruiters from his

congregation.

III. The third consideration is that the paster must have a working file of prospective recruits. Every time a new guest signs a church register or is greeted by the usher or pastor a new name should be added to a systematic file, so that the individual or family will receive a call from either the pastor or a calling band while the memory of the visit to the worship services is still fresh in his mind, preferably during the week follow-

ing the visit.

In addition to this, every good outside contact (the pastor must determine for himself what constitutes a "good" contact) must be recorded for reference and use. The pastor will normally meet many people, and members of the congregation will meet many people, who are unchurched and unsaved, and who can be won to Christ and the church with visitation evangelism. Above all, remember, it is much easier to interest people in the church when the pleasant memory of a friendly congregation is still fresh in their minds, and sometimes this part of the memory fades quickly.

IV. Again, there are certain fundamental qualities that a pastor must possess if a recruitment program for the local church is to

succeed.

The group that are to form the visitation team must be organized into well-rounded, cooperative groups, and the pastor must have the discernment to realize who of his team can better work with another so that every group will be as nearly equal as possible with regard to leadership and driving influence. A minister who is not alert along this line could send forth teams that might fail completely because of lack of leadership and drive.

Further, nearly every calling group will need instruction as to proper methods of approaching the visit, carrying on the visit, and closing the visit. The giving of this instruction usually falls to the preacher, and so he must be competent to give this instruction. Except in possibly a few rare cases, the only way a pastor can come by this quality is through the study of visitation evangelism,

and its many ramifications.

V. One more thought along this line is that visitation evangelism, though the best means of recruitment, is not the only means. Advertisement via radio, television, newspaper and bulletin will bring in a rich harvest of souls. The harvest may not be as abundant, but there will nearly always be some positive results from this approach. And these people will usually be those with whom you could never otherwise make contact.

If there is one person in the congregation who is peculiarly qualified for performing the task of writing advertisements, by all means use him. Many pastors of smaller congregations that cannot afford a paid secretary prevail upon some lady in the membership to fill the capacity of advertising director. Often the minister feels he should carry on this part of the work. The important thing is —advertise!

VI. Finally, we must consider that which is likely to be the most important part of the pastor's job in this great business of recruitment for the local church. It is the pastor's job to keep the recruits interested in the church, and in winning other recruits for Christ. He must also be able to inspire his calling hand to keep winning recruits.

Therefore, a pastor must preach. Through the exposition of the Word of God can the blessings to be found in soul winning be told abundantly. Through the preached scriptures can the commands of God to continued Christian service be taught. Through the preaching of the saving power of Jesus Christ can sinners be transformed into soul-winning saints of God.
