REPORTS—District superintendent read his report which was accepted by the assembly standing, being as follows:

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 29t Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of West Virginia District in session at Huntington, West Virginia, August 29th and 30th, 1938.

Greetings:

"Let brotherly love contine, Heb. 13:1. Giving thanks unto the Father, which hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light. Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear son: In whom we have redemption through his blood, even the first born of every creature. For by him were all things created that are in heaven and that are in earth, visible and invisible. Whether they be thrones, or dominions or principalities or powers, all things were created by him and for him. And he is before all things and by him all things consist. And he is the head of the body the church: who is the beginning the first born from the dead: that in all things he might have the preeminence."

We are gathered together again for another annual assembly. The Lord has been very good to us as a district this year in various ways too numerous to mention. I have been very busy. I have held four revivals namely: Nine Mile, Mount Hope, Vanceburg, Ky., and Cedar Grove, Del., with 34 seekers. I have preached 212 times, held 80 quarterly meetings and twenty-two annual meetings. I visited all the churches four times except Williamson and Rawl, which I visited three times. My assistant, Bro. Phillips, visited Williamson and Rawl for me once. I have traveled 13,735 miles. We have been able by the aid of others to organize four missions, namely: Cinderella, eight members; Buchannon, ten members; Pax, ten members; and Fairmont, eight members. Total mission members: 36.

We have organized five churches, namely: Mount Hope, seven members; we now have 32; Eskdale, ten members; Accoville, 22 members; Printer, fifteen members; Putney, fifteen members; total members of new churches are 69. Grand total of missions and churches, 105. There has been an increase in the average attendance of the Sunday School in the district.

FINANCIAL:

Our foreign mission budget was set at \$1,532.32. We have paid \$1,607.53, making \$75.21 more than our quota. Our general and district budget was set at \$1,938.00. We have paid \$1,549.10, a deficit of \$388.90. This does not look so well for us as a district. I hope we will endeavor to raise our budget next year as this is very important in order to carry on our home and general work.

We have paid pastors this year \$12,398.33, last year \$12,307.45. This is an increase of \$90.88 over last year.

There has been turned in for home missions \$424.76.

The district superintendent is paid in full the maximum salary which is \$1,500. I call the attention to the ways and means committee that on account of all the budget not coming in there is a deficit of about \$200.00 on general assembly expense that provisions will have to be made in this assembly. It will cost us approximately \$300.00. I also call to your attention that the provisions to finance our camp and assembly was not made permanent last year and that there should be some provision made in this assembly.

And again on account of increased expense of printing bulletins quarterly we do not have enough money appropriated for this need. We should make provisions for this.

REPORT of Assistant District Superintendent given and accepted, being as follows:

To the Annual District Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District.

Greetings in Jesus' Name!

We are praising the Lord for keeping us through this another year. It has been one of battles for us since our health has not been so well at times and it has also been one of victories for the Lord has given us more souls this year than for many previous years.

Our District Superintendent, Rev. J. C. Baynum, has been blessed with health, making it possible for him to keep his work up in the district; so it has been necessary for me to conduct but two quarterly meetings, one at Rawl and one at Williamson, also to fill in by preaching for Bro. Baynum at Cinderella, a mining town, where we later conducted a revival and as the result a mission has since been organized. We have received as appreciation for our services \$4.75. While we feel this most too small to report, we do feel encouraged to say "grace has brought us safe thus far and we believe it will lead us on."

REPORT of Home Missionary Rev. Hattie Hickman given and accepted, being as follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSIONARY WORK, W. VA. DISTRICT, FOR YEAR ENDING AUGUST 26, 1938

To the Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Huntington, W. Va. Greetings. I hereby submit the following report.

The first tent meeting of the assembly year was from August 26 to September 19, 1937, at Mt. Hope, W. Va.

No. of sermons, 24; services in shop, 2; children's services, 7; Bible study, 9; visits, 10; miles traveled, 1,214; seekers, 85; annointed for healing, 1; subscriptions to Advocate, 8; foreign mission services, 1. Amount of offerings: Received from district \$15.00; offerings \$135.49; total \$150.49. Paid out: Paid to workers \$130.58; to incidentals \$19.91; total \$150.49. At this place we organized a church, with 7 members, borrowed the money, paid cash for a church building, and under the efficient leadership of our young Brother Watts have doubled their membership and having great victory.

Next meeting was at Pax, W. Va., from Oct. 16 to Nov. 7, 1937. This meeting was in a hall. Number of sermons 20; children's services 1; seekers 30; miles traveled 982; subscriptions to Advocate 3; offerings received \$21.00; paid to workers \$21.00. Here we organized a mission. Left Bro. Percy Roberts. Have not heard from it, if it is dead or alive. At this time we had a breakdown and had to check off for awhile.

Next meeting was in our struggling mission at Mullens, W. Va. Number of sermons 30; visits 49; seekers 29; miles traveled 486. Offerings received: From district \$50.00; offerings \$24.93; total \$74.93. Paid out: To rent and miscellaneous repairs \$10.38; room and gas \$11.04; workers \$16.00; total \$37.42. Balance \$37.51. Condition of mission, bad, but could be a good work with a competent leader. The townpeople want a mission.

Next meeting in tent, beginning May 28 to June 26, 1938, at Accoville. Number of sermons 34; foreign mission services 1; prayer services 29; children's services 9; Bible study 13; anointed for healing 5; seekers 401; miles traveled 1,203. Offerings received: From district \$50.00; brought forward \$37.51; offerings received \$174.82; total \$262.33. Paid out: For groceries \$14.74; song books \$6.65; gas \$9.91; piano \$5.00; car repairs \$8.50; moving tent \$13.60; workers \$154.35; uncashed scrip \$4.11; foreign missions \$9.07; total \$225.93. Balance \$36.40. This was a wonderful meeting. Brother Baynum organized a church with 22 members. To God be the praise.

The next meeting was at Fairmont, W. Va., July 16 to August 7, 1938. Number of sermons 27; prayer services 23; children's services 9; seekers 55; visits 10; Bible studies 10; street meetings 1; miles traveled 421. Offerings received: Amount brought forward \$36.40; received from district \$200.00; offerings \$57.10; total \$293.50. Amount paid out: For song books and bills \$10.10; tuning and hauling piano \$8.00; stolen \$11.00; hauling tent \$30.00; incidentals \$64.41; workers \$49.00; total \$172.51. Balance \$120.99. This place is about fifty-fifty Catholics and of course a hard place but the Lord helped us to clear up some misunderstandings in regards to our church in the past. We organized a mission and have arranged for as much as \$75.00 per month for expenses, and the prospect for our church that was lost six or seven years ago is that they may get it back. Let us pray to that end.

Last meeting, Mannington, W. Va., Aug. 11 to 25, 1938. Number of sermons 15; Bible studies 10; children's services 2; seekers 17; miles traveled 52; prayer services 23. Money received: Brought forward \$120.99; from district \$50.00; offerings \$28.05; total \$199.04. Paid out: To workers \$55.00; truck and lot \$20.00; incidentals \$22.45; lights \$6.18; truck \$35.00; piano \$5.00; other purposes \$37.49; total \$181.12. Balance \$20.14. Here we started a Pilgrim prayer meeting and they are wanting if possible the Fairmont pastor to help them at this place.

Moved and carried to adjourn until 2 P. M. instead of 1:30.

SECOND BUSINESS SESSION

Moved and carried we dispense with the roll call for the balance of the assembly.

Minutes of last session read and approved.

Resolution No. 4 taken from the table, discussed and adopted.

The following resolution from the Ways and Means Committee adopted:

"Whereas it is not practical for a number of preachers in addition to the regular evangelist to carry the burden of the camp meeting preaching, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council call two evangelists to labor alternative in the 1939 camp."

Memorial to the General Assembly offered relative to no one being eligible to hold the district offices of superintendent, assistant superintendent, secretary and treasurer except ordained ministers actively engaged, considered

and tabled.

Brother and Sister Close, home missionaries, presented to the assembly and given a seat on the platform by invitation of the chair.

Moved and carried that the secretary write the names of our actively engaged ministers who will be eligible for election as delegates to the General Assembly on the blackboard.

Moved and carried that each pastor submit the name of a layman as delegate to the General Assembly to be placed on the blackboard.

Moved and carried that we ask Sister Close to sing at the opening of next session.

Moved and carried we adjourn until 7:00 o'clock P. M.

THIRD BUSINESS SESSION

EVENING-AUGUST 29, 1938

Opened with devotional. Prayer by L. W. Andre.

Minutes of last session approved.

Moved and ordered that the district superintendent appoint 5 tellers.

Trustee Bible Holiness Seminary—Moved and carried we elect J. C. Baynum by acclamation.

Lay delegates elected in same manner with the following results: K. G. Lawrence 44, Mrs. J. C. Baynum 34, Mrs. E. W. Miller 26, Mrs. B. L. Hankins 22, Mrs. Virgie Sexton 16, O. O. Baldwin 5, Mary Caldwell 5.

Moved and carried to adjourn until 9 A. M. tomorrow morning.

The part of the District Superintendent's salary not provided for in the budget shall be raised by offerings taken as he visits the churches for quarterly meetings and revivals, half tithe of all preachers in this district actively engaged, and \$8.00 per year of those not actively engaged in the ministry.
- No. 3. We recommend that the foreign missionary budget be \$1,732.00, general budget \$866.00, district budget \$912.00.

RESOLUTIONS OF THIS ASSEMBLY

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Inasmuch as too much legislation is against deep spirituality, according to the teachings of Jesus Christ during his ministry, and the time intervening between our District and the General Assembly is too short to get memorials to the Polity Committee in time for consideration,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the West Virginia District consider no memorials whatever for the General Assembly during this conference period.

Without recommendation—LOST.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Whereas the camp meeting held at Huntington, West Virginia, annually is called the District Camp of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of West Virginia and is governed by District Assembly and District Council, it should be supported by the entire district.

Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED: That pledges be taken at the camp each year for the expense of the camp and district assembly for the following year, and that the Ways and Means Committee estimate the approximate cost, add 15 per cent thereto and this amount be apportioned to each church and mission according to their financial and numerical strength, each church and mission to get credit with pledges made by individual members of their church while at the camp meeting and the pastor shall raise the balance of their apportionment (or cause it to be raised) from the members of his or her

church and see that it is paid into the local church treasury and then sent by the church treasurer to the district treasurer by the time of the camp meeting. That standing assessment for the assembly expense be rescinded. Adopted.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Because of the former legislation (when the West Virginia district was much smaller than it is now) that the District Superintendent should raise part of his salary by holding evangelistic meetings, our District Superintendent has felt obligated to accept calls for evangelistic meetings in other districts and by so doing has been absent from his own district at times when he was much needed and the district has suffered thereby. And whereas, this district is now large enough to support a District Superitnendent,

Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation each year with pay at such time as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; and that he shall devote all of the rest of his time on the West Virginia District by holding meetings in the interest of Home Mission and helping weak churches when not engaged in holding quarterly meetings, and that all remuneration he may receive from these meetings shall be reported to th District Treasurer and applied to his salary. And be it further resolved: That all former legislation conflicting with this resolution be rescinded. (Recommended.) Adopted.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Whereas, many of our churches make little or no effort to get a good offering for the District Superintendent at the quarterly meeting,

Therefore BE IT RESOLVED: That each pastor shall announce a week before the coming of the District Superintendent and urge the members to bring a good offering and after the offering is taken the pastor shall obtain information as to the amount of the offering and if it is not sufficient he shall make it his business to raise the amount needed before the closing of the meeting.

And be it further resolved: That all offerings taken for the District Superintendent in his quarterly meetings and revival meetings, also the half tithe and assessment of the preachers and deaconesses be paid direct to the District Superintendent and he shall give a receipt for the same and report it each month to the District Treasurer to be credited by the treasurer to the church or preacher paying the same. And be it further resolved: That all legislation conflicting with this resolution be rescinded.

ADOPTED.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Whereas, some of our struggling churches have borrowed money from the Church Extension fund in order to keep the church in existence and to keep it from being disgraced in the eyes of the public.

And whereas, these churches have been unable to repay this indebtedness and are greatly embarrassed by having to report this indebtedness each year.

And whereas, there is no longer any provision made to continue the Church Extension fund.

BE IT RESOLVED: That Resolution No. 2, Pages 21 and 22 of the Minutes of the District Assembly of 1924, which reads as follows, "No money from the Church Extension Fund shall be loaned without the approval of the District Council, and then only when notes are given to be paid back at a given time, the money to go back to the treasury to be used only for building purposes," be rescinded.

Be it further resolved: That churches who have money borrowed from the Church Extension Fund be forgiven this debt and that the District Treasurer be authorized and instructed to destroy all notes given for money borrowed from the Church Extension Fund and that the debt be cancelled. Recommended. Adopted.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

Inasmuch as our manual and the Word of God both call for a "modest" standard of dress but does not legislate any particular color or texture, be it resolved that our District Examining Board and District Superintendent instruct all our preachers that they are not at liberty to make their personal convictions as to color and texture of dress a standard of membership or rule of dress. Be it further resolved that no church board or body be permitted to hold any pastor or evangelistic workers to preach or hold to any such convictions against said worker's protest. Remembering our church motto, 'In essentials unity; in non-essentials liberty; in all things charity," let us all strive for unity and advancement of the Kingdom of God. Not recommended. TABLED.

Laws Governing the West Virginia District—(Res. No. 3, 1927)

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY:

W&M No. 1—1938.

Minimum \$1300, maximum \$1500 per year and traveling expense at the

rate of 3c per mile.

W&M No. 2—1938. That part not provided for in the budget, all pastors and evangelists shall pay through their local church treasurer one-half of their tithe, and all licensed and ordained preachers who are not actively engaged in the work shall pay \$8.00 per year direct to the superintendent.

Each pastor shall take up a free will offering at each of his visits to the

church, and all monies the superintendent may receive for his services as a minister of the gospel shall be reported to the District Treasurer monthly.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT—SPECIAL DUTIES

He shall preside over annual church meteings. Res. 11, 1924. He shall pay expenses of the assistant district superintendent where it becomes necessary for the assistant to supply in his stead. 1930 minutes, page 10.

He shall give four quarterly meetings and preaching services to each

church during the year. Res. No. 8, 1935.

He shall make out quarterly reports and send a copy to each church after each quarterly round, showing spiritual, numerical and financial condition of each church. Res. 10, 1935.

He shall take up pledges on his second quarterly round from each church for Home Missionary work to be paid in six months. W&M No. 7, 1936, as revised 1937.

He shall be permanent chairman of the Ministerial Convention. Page 8, 1936 minutes.

He shall give his entire time to the district. See Res. 3, 1938.

MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

Adopted—See Res. No. 3, 1935.
Place—Invitations to be received at each Assembly and voted on by secret ballot. See Res. No. 7, 1936.
Arrangements For—The District Superintendent as chairman shall appoint three members of the ministerial delegation to serve with him in preparing for this convention. See Res. No. 4, 1936.

Expenses of-That all preachers and churches over the district bring an offering either in cash or provisions, and that an offering be taken during the convention to cover any deficit. See W&M Recommendation No. 13, 1936.

DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

Time—To follow immediately after our district camp meeting. See Res. No. 2, 1936. Also No. 5, 1937.

Financing—Provided for in budget. See Res. No. 3, 1938.

Expenses—Pastor's and delegates, secretary and treasurer to be paid. See Res. No. 4, 1924 and 1930.

Reports-All yearly reports to be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee immediately after the fourth quarterly meeting. See Res. No. 8. 1936. (This is important.)

DISTRICT CAMP MEETING

Date—First Thursday after second Sunday in August. Res. No. 5, 1937. Financing—Ways and Means Committee to apportion the churches. See Res. No. 2, 1938.

PASTORS

Shall not build or repair without consent of District Superintendent where amount involved is more than \$1,000.00. Res. No. 2, 1927. Expenses paid to District Assembly. Res. No. 2, 1930.

Salary paid while at District Assembly. Res. No. 4, 1930.

SUNDRY RULINGS, ETC.

Resolution, 1921-"That we, the 12th annual assembly of the IHC of Va. urge our churches to give preference to preachers of the IHC when

calling workers for their revivals and camp meetings."

Res. No. 2, 1934—"That all our churches set aside one Sunday service in each month for missions, at which time an offering be taken for same."

Res. No. 10, 1929—"That as individual churches, we pay into the District Treasury the full amount of our monthly apportionment at or as near the end of each month when due as possible."

"That this district supply local preachers with study books who are not able to buy them, and that they answer to the Examining Board the same Res. No. 3, 1936. as licensed preachers."

RESOLUTION NO. 1, 1932

ORGANIZATION OF LOCAL MISSION STATION

This Mission shall be known as the Pilgrim Holiness Mission of West Virginia, until such a time as it can be organized into a Pilgrim Holiness Church. It shall be under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the District Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District.

OFFICERS

The officers of this Mission shall consist of a Pastor, Secretary, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent and three Advisory members, which shall be called the Mission Board. They shall be elected annually at the annual business meeting which shall be held one month preceding the District Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

The Pastor shall preside at all business meetings, and shall have the spiritual oversight of the members of the Mission.

The Secretary shall record all proceedings of Mission meetings and Mission Board meetings.

The Treasurer shall have custody of the finances of the Mission and make disbursements as directed by the Mission Board.

The Sunday School Superintendent shall have charge of the Sunday School, consult with the Pastor in selecting the teachers in the Sunday School and shall present these names to the Mission Board to be confirmed by them. No one shall be selected to teach as a regular teacher in the Sunday School who is not in the experience of regeneration or who does not believe in the doctrines of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

The Advisory members of the Mission Board shall give special attention to the spiritual interests of all members of the Mission and shall feel the responsibility of the oversight of the flock with the Pastor.

RECEPTION OF MEMBERS

Any person desiring to become a member of this Mission shall first be accepted by the Mission Board then in the presence of Mission, affirmatively answering the following questions:

Have you forsaken and renounced the devil and all his works, the vain pomp and glory of the world with all covetous desires of the same and do you refuse to be led by them?

Have you received the witness of God's spirit to your regeneration?

Do you believe in the doctrine of entire satisfaction as a second, definite, instantaneous work of grace, subsequent to regeneration and that it is the privilege and duty of every believer to seek and find the experience as soon as they receive light concerning it?

Are you willing that all your faith and practice shall be governed by the Word of God and the Holy Ghost?

Will you contribute of your means toward the support of the Lord's cause as you are taught by the Word of God?

Will you abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating liquors, tobacco, and other harmful drugs in all forms?

Will you shun and have no association or membership in secret societies and lodges which are oath bound?

These persons having satisfactorily responded to these questions are entitled to recognition as members of this Mission. We therefore extend to them the right hand of fellowship.

BUSINESS MEETINGS AND BOARD MEETINGS

No one shall be elected on the Mission Board who is not a member of the Mission.

The Mission Board shall have power to call a pastor by a two-thirds vote of the Board. A three-fourths vote shall be required to dismiss a pastor.

No pastor shall be called without consultation with and the consent of the District Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District.
