

CALIFORNIA ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Journal of Proceedings

First Sitting, June 25, 1959

The thirty-seventh conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at El Monte, California at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, June

Conference opened with congregational singing conducted by Ellis Morrell, after which Thomas Lee led in prayer.

The District Superintendent introduced General Superintendent Dr. William H. Neff, presiding officer of the conference. Brother Neff's brief heart talk to the assembled group was edifying and encouraging. From the manual, Dr. Neff reviewed the duties and purposes of meeting together in annual district conference.

Dr. Neff called the conference to order at 9:40 a.m. The District Secretary proceeded with the roll call, to which 44 ministerial, 13 deaconess, and 27 lay delegates responded.

The first ten rows of seats were designated as the conference bar.

Recommendations of the District Council that the following be accepted by the conference were read:

Virgil Hogarth, ordained minister from the Idaho-Washington District,

Mrs. Virgil Hogarth, ordained minister from the Idaho-Washington District.

These ministers were welcomed and accepted by the conference.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. Guinn, Arizona District Superintendent, and Rev. Vaughn Drummonds, pastor from Michigan, who were welcomed by Dr. Neff and granted honorary seats within the conference bar.

The District Superintendent presented to the conference the new 18 member church at Solana Beach, represented by the pastors, Russell and Daisy Johnson and alternate delegate, Charles Horton. The new church was warmly welcomed and received by the conference.

Dr. Neff read Section 92, Article 4 of the manual relative to churches that have failed to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason being denied a voice in the conference. The chair proposed two questions for consideration: 1. Can a pastor be said to have made a good conscientious effort to raise the United Stewardship Fund who has paid nothing at all? 2. Can a pastor who refused to fill out and sign the questionnaire sent out by the General Superintendent be considered worthy of conference privileges?

Motion was made and carried that all pastors and delegates from churches that have made a conscientious effort to raise the United Stewardship Fund be granted a voice in the conference.

The District Superintendent's report was read and accepted by rising vote. The Assistant District Superintendent gave a brief oral report which was received.

The District Treasurer's report was presented and received.

Report of the President of Western Pilgrim College was read by Dr. Deal and received.

Motion carried to grant Dr. Deal a seat within the conference bar.

Report of the District Young People's Secretary was read and accepted.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. P. W. Thomas, Rev. R. C. Hawkins, and Rev. J. R. Mitchell. These ministers were welcomed by the chair and responded with personal words of greeting and testimony.

Rev. Mrs. Alta M. Adams was presented by Dr. Neff and gave her testimony.

Conference adjourned at 11:45 a.m.

District Council nominations for members of the Missionary Society Committee were: Ione Hall, Helen Larson, Ruth Hocking, Ruby Tschinkel, Gertrude Beck, Mary Alderson. Ione Hall withdrew her name. Ballots were cast for Missionary Society Committee.

Motion carried to adjourn at 9:40 p.m.

In Memoriam

MRS. EDNA MAE NEFF

Mrs. Edna Mae Neff was a Godly woman, well known and greatly loved, the wife of Dr. William H. Neff, a General Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

At the age of sixteen years, Mrs. Neff came under the influence of holiness ministry, was deeply convicted and was gloriously born of the Spirit. Later she

sought and obtained the gracious blessing of entire sanctification.

In 1924 she became the wife of William H. Neff and together they served acceptably as pastors in Virginia, Michigan and California. For nine years they were beloved pastors of Rees Memorial Pilgrim Church in Pasadena, California.

Mrs. Neff was a talented and versatile woman; a person with a fine mind and charming personality. The Spirit of the indwelling Christ found expression in her service for others.

Mrs. Neff went to her heavenly reward from her home in Indianapolis on the morning of June 27, 1958.

MRS. FRIDA MARIE REES

Frida Marie Rees was born in Sweden, February 3, 1872, and departed this life on July 28, 1958. She was the widow of Seth Cook Rees, who was the founder of Pilgrim Tabernacle, now known as Rees Memorial Pilgrim Church, Pasadena, California.

Mrs. Rees, along with her husband, preached a great gospel. They both believed and taught that God can deliver people, old and young, from the curse of committed sin and the inbeing of sin itself.

At the time of her death, Mrs. Rees was an ordained minister of the California District, and had been since its inception. Physical weakness took her out of the public service, but as long as she had strength she actively participated in the work of God. The influence of her beautiful, consistent Christian life will remain throughout the years to be a blessing to all who were privileged to know her.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our beloved general superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, fellow ministers, delegates and friends of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings!

Through the manifold mercies of our loving Lord we are privileged to meet again on this beautiful camp grounds to do business in the interest of the church.

We are in a critical period of world history. The subtle clutches of Romanism and Communism are finding an easy way into the hearts of the masses that have been prepared by Satan through unbelief and sinful practices. These are indeed perilous days, days of unsettled and unstable conditions the world over. Let us be sure that the living Son of God is crowned Lord of our hearts by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, that we may not be effected in any way by this changing world or diverted from doing the whole will of God in kingdom building.

I. CONFERENCE ACTIVITIES

A. Gene Daffern, our Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and his committee arranged for special teacher training classes to be held in each zone. This was a very timely and helpful project. Rev. Paul Beck did an excellent job conducting these classes and the results were very gratifying.

job conducting these classes and the results were very gratifying.

B. The Ministerial Meeting was one of the best I have attended. It was a privilege to have Dr. Neff and Rev. P. W. Thomas as our workers.

C. The Mile High Youth Camps last fall were very well attended and much good came as results of these camps.

D. Western Pilgrim College has had a good year spiritually. The old problem of finance has caused much prayer and concern, although Dr. Deal and his staff have done commendable work in cutting expenses. Our district as of June 15 paid into the school \$9,533.13, which puts this district over our \$10.00 per member goal in the light of accessible members and just short of a total membership giving of \$10.00 per member. A larger student body would solve much of the school's financial problem.

II. CHURCH EXTENSION

A. The work at Solana Beach was organized with 16 members, The pastor, Rev. Russell Johnson, and his wife have worked faithfully and hard to reach this achievement. The district has given some financial help each month during the year to this work.

B. The work at Sacramento under Brother and Sister Schletewitz is progressing. This church is in desperate need of a bus; pray that the Lord will

supply this need.

C. The Glendora project is nearly completed. This unit will have room for at least nine Sunday School classes, a chapel that will seat nearly 200, a pastor's study, three bedroom parsonage, off-street parking, and sufficient area to build a larger auditorium later. Some of our pastors and laymen have donated a number of days on this project. A detailed report will be given in the Pilgrim News at a later date. Let us pray that God will lead us in establishing a strong church in this growing area of Glendora.

III. MATERIAL PROGRESS

A. The El Monte Church has completed the first unit of their proposed enlargement program. The pastor and people have done an outstanding piece of work. The recently completed unit, having a capacity of 22 classes and 250 children, is certainly an asset to the Local, District and General Church.

B. Sylmar has completed a very fine church. Both church and parsonage will be dedicated in the near future. This has been a large project for a small

group; however, they are growing and the future is brighter.

C. Fresno Pilgrims have finished and dedicated a beautiful chapel plus two Sunday School units. The good folk are united and behind their fine pastor. Certainly Fresno's greatest days are ahead.

D. Ojai Church is in the process of building a new Sunday School unit. They have also redecorated the church sanctuary and added new platform

furniture.

- E. Long Beach has renovated the auditorium of the church and made other improvements.
- F. Rees Memorial has remodeled the interior of the parsonage and is making plans to remodel the church sanctuary.
 - G. The Lynwood group has purchased a new rug for their church. H. Pomona has nearly completed the second Sunday School unit.
- I. Rosemead has redecorated the exterior of their church and has made other

J. Dixon is making progress with a new parsonage.

K. Chino has made definite improvement in the church sanctuary.

L. Other churches have made improvements in many areas, which should

enable them to minister more effectively.

M. The District Tabernacle has been improved with new drapes and platform rugs—thanks to the District Missionary President and the local missionary societies.

N. The cafeteria and lunch stand have new tables and cabinets. Brother Wells and Brother Park have worked long hours on this project.

IV. PERSONAL REPORT

Sermons and addresses, 131; church board meetings, 34; annual meetings, 29; youth rallies, 3; District Council meetings, 12; Western Pilgrim College Board meetings, 2; other committee meetings, 10; ministerial meeting, 1; dedication of churches and Sunday School units, 2; funeral, 1; General Board meetings, 2; youth conference and camp, 1; Owosso School Board meetings, 2. I have traveled 24,648 miles in District work during the conference year. Also, I have done my best to keep up with the office duties and have worked 74 eight hour days on the Glendora Church, and a few days on the conference grounds. I can truthfully say this has been the busiest and the best year of my life. I am deeply in love with my Lord, delighted to have a part in His great work and I do feel comfortable in the center of His will.

V. A WORD ABOUT THE FUTURE

A. I trust that all of our churches will adopt an organized visitational program for the purpose of

1. Regular contacting of non-resident members and inactive resident mem-

bers. We are too quick to drop people from our membership roll,

2. Strengthening our influence in our sphere of service. We are usually known for what we are against rather than for what we are for.

B. I pray that we may strengthen the quality of our district loyalty and

fellowship. We must have a deeper sense of belonging and oneness.

C. May we endeavor to strive to put the proper emphasis on the District and General Stewardship Fund. They are not taxes, as some think, but lifegiving streams of the church.

D. May we purpose to establish our new churches and start at least 1 more

this coming year.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUNG PEOPLE'S SECRETARY

To the thirty-seventh annual Conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at El Monte, Calif., June 25, 1959.

We have had a very fine Youth Committee to work with this year. Youth

interests seem to be on the increase again for which we are very thankful.

I have attended 6 zone rallies, 3 district rallies, 10 Youth Council Meetings, and 7 Committee meetings, I have visited most of the churches on the District once and several of them two and three times. We conducted 21 Sunday evening services and 2 week night services. The pastor and people of each of these churches have been very kind and cooperative. We have had part in organizing 2 Youth Societies, however, we are sorry to report we have only four charter societies to date on our District. Some of the Youth Societies are very interested and enthusiastic about our National Youth Quiz. We wish more had taken part in this fine project.

Mile High Pines

We made 27 trips to Mile High since last conference, traveling a little over 4,300 miles. Our camp was rented last summer to four other denominations with a total of 324 campers, or a little over 2500 camper days.

Our own camps were very good with over 300 in attendance in all camps. The Teen age group was the largest in enrollment that it had ever been with 100% participation.

Those directing our camps were Rev. Bruce Chamberlain, Rev. John Fox,

Rev. Gene Daffern and the Rees Memorial Church.

We believe the prospects of the usefulness of Mile High Pines are more promising now than ever before. Many of our Youth Groups, S.S. Classes, etc., have used the camp this year.

The District S.S. Committee also sponsored a District Christian Workers

retreat at Mile High. It was very well attended and beneficial to all.

Many improvements have had to be made by order of the health department. The improvements have been completed but very little progress has been made on the Edna Neff Memorial Hall. We trust this coming year will see the hall completed and ready for service.

It will be of interest to all to know that Mile High Pines will soon be incorporated. There are several advantages in this, one is that it will lift the liability from the California District and the Churches in case of fire, or serious accident. Too, it will open doors to government surplus materials and equipment. Such things as stoves, beds, refrigerators, we can get at 10% of regular cost. We feel that this is a real step forward.

Thank you for the privilege of serving you this past year.

In spite of this very poor statistical report, the Sunday School Committee has taken some very important steps during this last year to stop this ever recurring Sunday School leakage in our District.

The committee has attacked this problem at its very roots—in giving the District more qualified teachers for this very important task of building the

Sunday School.

A "Teachers' Training Course" was launched in September, with our beloved professor Paul D. Beck instructing. It was set up on the zone level, and was offered at no expense to the students other than the cost of materials. Each course extended for twelve weeks, and no student was permitted to miss more than two sessions. Western Pilgrim College very graciously recognized the value of this program and offered 1 hour of college credit to those successfully completing the course.

Out of our District, 156 students were enrolled in this course. Fifty six of these students were already teachers in our District. Eleven were Pastors, and seven were Sunday School Superintendents. The rest were potentially new teachers to our District Sunday Schools. Certificates will be given to those who successfully completed this course July 4th at 1:30 p.m. here in the District

Tabernacle.

In addition to the "Teachers' Training Course," the Sunday School Committee in co-operation with the District Council, sponsored a "Christian Leaders' Retreat" at Mile Hi Pines, this last April. It was a time of real inspiration and informal relaxation when Christian leaders of our different churches could become better acquainted with one another. Rev. Mrs. May Heck was our speaker, and she challenged our hearts, and our Sunday Schools with her vibrant, sincere message.

We wish to express our sincere gratitude first of all to Bro. Paul D. Beck, who gave many hours of his time, and even of his means that the Teachers'

Training Course might fulfill its objectives.

To Mrs. Paul Barefoot for many splendid suggestions, and for much of her time that was used in assisting with Sunday School Promotion.

To each member of the Sunday School committee for their work and cooperation.

To each pastor or Sunday School Superintendent who faithfully mailed in his report each month, May God bless you each one.

Our attendance has not been as high as we desired but on the whole we have had a fine student body. We have registered for the year 58 in high school and 33 in college. Naturally, we did not carry this level all the way through the year but we held up very well by all general standards of attendance. We graduated 12 from the high school and three from the college departments this spring.

Finances have been our greatest problem. We are grateful to God and the churches of the zone and our many friends, however, for standing by us as they have this year. California District tops the list with a total of \$9,481.33 given according to our business office reports, as of June 15th. Next comes Pacific Northwest District, with \$1,964.45, according to our reports. Idaho-Washington follows with \$1,911.09 given. This places them in a percentage bracket above Pacific Northwest as they have a considerably lower number in membership. Arizona District gave about \$1,400 as reported by the business office. This brings zone giving up to well over \$14,000. Their official goal was lower but they gave almost in ratio with the districts to the Northwest. All this is most sincerely appreciated, as we could not possibly have functioned this year without it.

We must also say our students did most nobly in giving over \$1200 in morning chapel offerings. Of this \$500 was applied on the capital debt and the rest is to be applied on the Fire Alarm System demanded by the state to be installed on the campus. Any above this demand will be applied toward the indebtedness. The students also raised between \$600 and \$800 on work day projects for campus improvements.

Besides this our special day letters brought in about \$550 which has gone toward operational expenses or special projects which had to be cared for. Friends of the school have also donated several hundreds of dollars to the cause.

In addition to operating the school we have paid off almost \$5,000 on the main indebtedness this year, besides paying off a \$600 loan which was given to us for \$400 by meeting it on deadline, and \$655 on current and back taxes. Each of the districts graciously gave us special offerings on this latter item, for which we are truly grateful, as well as to friends who helped with it likewise.

We have kept our local bills paid up fairly well so that as of now we have only about \$7,600 outstanding, as of June 15. It has not been so well with our staff and faculty members, however, for which we are deeply regretful. We have been forced to pay them far behind time much of the time. Last fall we had to catch up the slack of over \$3,000 back bills with our first tuition and board money as we began the year. This placed us at a disadvantage to start with. As the year proceeded some students and parents ran behind with their bills which made for more difficulties in paying faculty members. Accounts receivable have been reduced to just about \$3,000 now, which is far better than we had in mid-spring. We regret, though, that we still owe around \$6,000 to our faithful faculty members. These people have sacrificed uncomplainingly with

a devotion seldom seen these days. But it is not right that they should have to do this. Several have worked on the side to maintain their homes. However, we cannot continue to do this. When one teaches five days a week full time and works besides he cannot be at his best. Certainly, God will undertake for this need.

My personal report: I have taken care of all duties incident to the office, conducted 65 school services, preached 100 times, traveled 7,890 miles for the school. Have visited all four districts within the period twice, but covered only part of the churches in those outside California. It has been a gracious year in the Lord. We are grateful to all pastors and people for such wonderful hospitality and support.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1959 CONFERENCE

Resolutions Committee

No. 1—Be it resolved that resolution No. 2, page 33 of the 1958 Minutes be amended to read: Be it resolved that members of all standing committees shall be members of the annual district conference with voice and vote.

No. 2—Be it resolved that resolution No. 10, page 33 be adopted as a standing resolution with the ommission of the word "Semi." $\,$

No. 3—Be it resolved that the District Secretary give written notification to all appointees to standing District Committees within thirty days after District Conference.

Be it further resolved that the chairman of each standing committee be

notified by the district secretary sixty days prior to District Conference to activate his committee.

No. 4—Be it resolved that resolution 41, page 39, be amended to read, "Therefore be it resolved that those attending Sunday School who arrive for at least 15 minutes of class participation be counted in reports to the District Conference or to any of its committees or officials."

No. 5—Whereas the report of the Statistical Committee consumes much time, and gives more detail than can be readily understood or appreciated, therefore be it resolved that the chairman of the Statistical Committee present orally only the following highlights from the report: total number of seekers; membership; Sunday School attendance; and the financial summary of totals by departments.

Bt it further resolved that the entire report be posted before the fourth sitting of the conference.

No. 6—Be it resolved that the names and addresses of the following officers of each local church be submitted to the Editor of California Pilgrim News for publication with or in the August issue of each year: Sunday School superintendent; Youth Society president; Missionary Society President.

No. 7—Whereas we have an obligation as Christian citizens and members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church to oppose legislation detrimental to evangelical Christianity and whereas lobbying is a most effective method of influencing legislation, be it therefore resolved that the governmental committee of the Sacramento Holiness Association be authorized to speak for the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on all legislative matters that are of vital interest to Christian citizens.

No. 8—Whereas our District Superintendent has untiringly given himself to the work of building the District, therefore be it resolved that we give Rev. Lundy Hill a rising vote of appreciation and thereby pledge him our prayers and support for the ensuing year.

No. 9—Be it resolved that the Conference give its presiding officer, Dr. William H. Neff, a rising vote of thanks for his labor of love among us.

No. 10—Be it resolved that this conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Wells, Rev. Park and to the kitchen and dining-room crews for the magnificent manner in which they have entertained this conference.

No. 11—Be it resolved that greetings be sent to all the Missionaries now serving under appointment abroad, who hold membership in this District.

Ways and Means Committee

No. 1—Be it resolved that standing resolution #2 on page 35 of the 1958 District Minutes be amended to read as follows: Be it resolved that all school offerings for Western Pilgrim College shall be paid to the District Treasurer. The District Treasurer shall keep an individual account for each church, and shall make remittances and reports to the school treasurer monthly, and to the annual conference.

No. 2—Be it resolved that the words "Western Pilgrim College" be deleted from standing resolution #29 on page 38 of the 1958 District Minutes.

No. 3—Be it resolved that the standing resolution #5 on page 36 of the 1958 Minutes be amended by the addition of the words "and Western Pilgrim College Stewardship Responsibility" to the second paragraph.

No. 4—Be it resolved that standing resolution #33 on page 38 of the 1958 Minutes be amended as follows:

- A. That the following words be deleted "payable monthly to Western Pilgrim College."
- B. That the following words be added "Membership to be based on District budget membership responsibility and shall be paid monthly to the district treasurer.
- No. 5-Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$4,200.00

per year in addition to his residence, utilities, traveling expenses, and automobile mileage at 7 cents per mile.

No. 6—Be it resolved that the Ways and Means resolution #6 on page 35 of the 1958 Minutes be amended to read as follows: Whereas there is an urgent need for further education on the subject of tithing and whereas many of our people are contributing all or part of their tithe to other areas of Gospel work, within and without the church, and whereas Section 69 of the Manual specifically stipulates that the tithe should be paid into the treasury of the local church, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent, the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the District Young People's Executive Secretary, and the President of the District Missionary Society be appointed, by virtue of their office, a permanent committee to investigate and provide material for the education of our people in this area of tithing and that they make a report of their activities to the Annual Conference.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS FROM PREVIOUS CONFERENCES

(1)

Be it resolved that the District Council shall be informed of all matters of major legislative change prior to presentation to the conference.

(2)

Be it resolved that all school offerings for Western Pilgrim College shall be paid to the District Treasurer. The District Treasurer shall keep an individual account for each church, and shall make remittance and reports to the school treasurer monthly, and to the annual conference.

(3)

We recommend that Section 92, paragraph 4, and Section 149, paragraph 8, of the 1958 Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, which reads as follows, be enforced:

"Any church or pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference."

(4)

Be it resolved that the local churches pay the **traveling expenses and entertainment** of their **delegates** for the Conference business sessions. This does not include camp meeting.

(5)

Whereas, the General Conference has made provision that newly organized churches in districts assume one-fourth of their United Stewardship Fund the first year after being organized; one-half of their budget the second year; three-fourths the third year, and beginning with fourth year pay in full:

Therefore, be it resolved that on this district we apply the same percentages in regard to our district budget, and Western Pilgrim College stewardship

responsibility.

(6)

Be it resolved that the following items be paid out of the District Expense Fund:

- 1. Utilities for the home of the District Superintendent.
- 2. Publication of the Pilgrim News.
- 3. District office expense.

(7)

Be it resolved that the cafeteria and lunch stand be considered part of the camp meeting operations and all monies pertaining thereto be held in the Camp Meeting Fund.

(8)

B it resolved that ministers coming to this district from other denominations be interviewed by the District Council before their credentials are presented to the Conference. (9)

Whereas in the past important papers have been lost and a considerable loss of time and finance was necessary to secure new papers, therefore be it resolved that all local churches of the district forward to the District Council for filing, all legal papers pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.

(10)

Whereas, the District owns shares in the Lexington Blvd. Mutual Water Co, therefore be it resolved that the following five district officers, by virtue of their office, be appointed to represent our shares in the Water Co.: The District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Treasurer and Secretary and the President of the Board of Trustees. And be it further resolved that the representatives vote the shares as a block as instructed by the District Council on matters of policy.

(11)

Be it resolved that the **District Council** and following **committees** and boards, meet one day prior to the annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand. The Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees, and the Educational and Examining Boards.

(12)

Be it resolved that the following sums be allowed to the District Secretary and the District Treasurer for their services:

District Secretary-\$25.00 per quarter.

District Treasurer-\$85.00 per quarter.

(13)

Be it resolved that all plans for the **construction or remodeling of church buildings** be presented to a District Building Committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder, and a financier for their suggestions.

(14)

Resolved that before licensed or ordained ministers coming from other churches shall be received into the local churches, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and Council regarding said minister.

(15)

Be it resolved that our district **Educational and Examining Boards** be instructed to secure a set of questions covering the course of study prescribed by the manual and make the same available to those desiring to take the Study Course.

(16)

Be it resolved, that each pastor be granted the privilege of holding at least one revival each conference year.

(17)

We recommend that, whereas we now have a standing Statistical Committee to function during the conference year, be it resolved that all **reports** be made in full and sent to **the Statistical Committee** not later than one week before the conference date.

(18)

Be it resolved that the use of our **District Camp Grounds** be limited to the activities of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

(19)

Resolved that when recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference the candidate be present, or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.

(20)

Be it resolved that the part of the **District Superintendent's** and other district officers' expense, relating to the propagation of district home missions, be so designated and paid for out of district home mission funds.

(21)

Whereas, the school has operational control of the Conference grounds the greater part of the year; therefore we recommend that the matter of maintenance man for said grounds be left to the consideration of the District Council and the School Board.

(22)

Be it resolved that the Conference form a committee of four which shall have charge of the Old Folks' Home buildings and grounds, said committee to be comprised of the District Superintendent, the pastor of the El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church, the President of the Board of Trustees, and one member to be appointed by the District Council.

(23)

Be it resolved that the **District Superintendent** be given an annual **vacation** with pay, not to exceed two weeks.

(24)

Be it resolved that each local church be urged to raise a subscription list to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate equal to its total membership.

(25)

Be it resolved, that the **Conference Minutes** be sold at 75c per copy. Be it further resolved, that each church remit from local funds for the minutes ordered, and then sell them to the members for the stipulated price.

(26)

Be it resolved, that there be a Camp Meeting Grounds Committee appointed by the Council to improve and prepare the Camp Ground for Camp services.

(27)

Be it resolved, that in lieu of the Annual District Home Missions offering received the last Sunday of Camp, we adopt a system known as the **District Home Missions Reserve Call System** to operate as follows. The District Superintendent be privileged to ask for a special offering toward the needs of any mission project, not to exceed the equivalent of three \$5.00 calls to each voluntary member per year.

(28)

Be it resolved that our pastors be urged to secure Pilgrim Holiness Evangelists as much as possible. And be it further resolved that evangelists from other denominations be secured under the District Superintendent's approval.

(29)

Be it resolved that the **financial records of all departments** of the District be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least THREE days prior to the District Conference. This includes District Treasurer, District Youth, Sunday School Committee, and Western Pilgrim College.

(30)

Whereas in order that the pastor may be at his best and the church may be served better by the pastor receiving an annual vacation, therefore, be it resolved that each church of the District give its pastor a two weeks' vacation with pay.

(31)

Be it resolved that the **time of sittings of future Conferences** be set as follows: 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon; 2:00 p.m. - 4:30 p.m.; and 7:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m., respectively.

(32)

Be it resolved that the first order of business of the afternoon sitting of the second day of District Conference be that of the ordination service. (33)

Be it resolved that each and every church in this conference shall take an offering each and every month during a major Sunday service for Western Pilgrim College.

Be it further resolved that each and every church in this conference accept a stewardship responsibility to Western Pilgrim College of a goal in the amount of \$10.00 per member per year, membership to be based on district budget membership responsibility and shall be paid monthly to the district treasurer.

(34)

Be it resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, or his representative, shall have the privilege of holding two services annually in each of the churches of the District in the interests of the work of the District Sunday School Committee and that an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the District Treasurer being specified as an offering for the District Sunday School Committee.

(35)

Whereas, the **funds** received by the District from pledges for construction of a **camp dormitory** are not sufficient to cover the costs of construction, and whereas, these funds could be of a great help in developing churches in our district, now therefore be it resolved that the District Council shall continue to promote the raising of funds for a campgrounds dormitory, and be it further resolved that until such time as sufficient funds are received to cover the costs of construction of a campgrounds dormitory that the District Council be authorized and is hereby authorized to use said funds for short term loans on properties for the development of our district.

(36)

Be it resolved that the District Secretary be informed immediately upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the District, and that he notify by telephone all pastors in the District and that proper notification be given to the editor of the District publication.

(37)

Be it resolved that the Conference adopt the following method of pastoral recall:

- 1—That each church shall vote during the last full week of March on the recall of its pastor.
- 2—That each local church secretary shall forward to the District Superintendent the results of such vote within five days following the time of voting.
- 3—That each pastor shall forward to the District Superintendent his reply relative to his recall, within 15 days of the time of voting. (See 1958 Manual, Section 53, Paragraph 3).
- 4—That each pastor who does not plan to be a candidate for recall shall notify the District Superintendent on or before the 15th day of March.

(38)

Be it resolved that the District Conference follow the method prescribed in the Manual, Section 45, which reads as follows: "Each delegate shall be provided with a certificate of his appointment, signed by the pastor and secretary."

Be it further resolved that a Conference registrar be appointed by the District Council, the registrar to assume his duties at the entrance to the district tabernacle one hour prior to the opening of each session of the Conference, and further that the duties of the registrar shall be to register all members of the conference and all duly certified lay delegates, presenting each member or delegate with a badge admitting him within the Conference Bar.

That the Conference registrar shall receive and record the certificates from the lay delegates, and shall present the list of registered delegates to the conference secretary prior to the opening of each session of the conference. (39)

Whereas there seems to be considerable misunderstanding relative to the listing of inactive ministers,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Conference adopt the interpretation of

the General Board with reference to Section 178 of the Manual.

"We understand by the term 'actively and regularly engaged in the work of the ministry,' to mean pastors with a regular appointment and full time evangelists and to ministers who are under special appointment. With reference to the aged ministers we suggest that only those above 65 years may be so classified."

(40)

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent call a meeting of all District leaders and pastors for the purpose of introducing the programs of the various departments for the coming year, this meeting to be held during the month of October.

(41)

Whereas it seems necessary to have a uniform method of computing Sunday School attendance in the District so as to make the comparison of statistics on an equal basis between each and every Sunday School, thus permitting the enjoyment of equal opportunity in said comparisons,

Therefore, be it resolved that only those attending Sunday School who arrive for at least 15 minutes of class participation be counted in reports to the District

Conference or to any of its committees or officials.

(42)

Whereas the projects and information in regard to the Foreign Missionary Department could be better co-ordinated and better results could be achieved within our individual churches and within our District as a whole through the help of a **District Missionary Society Committee**,

Therefore be it resolved that the District Council shall nominate and the District Conference shall elect from the nominations of the District Council a Missionary Society Committee of not less than three members whose number and terms shall be for such periods as the District Council shall provide.

Be it further resolved that from among those elected the District Council shall appoint one to serve as District Missionary Society President. It is intended that this Missionary Society Committee shall operate under the same rules and organization as the District Sunday School Committee.

(43)

Be it resolved that 1. the responsibility for the preparation of the district camp grounds for annual conference and camp meeting be delegated to the district Camp Meeting Board; 2. the secretary of the Camp Meeting Board shall be responsible for notifying all pastors and all other ministers of the District as to the dates for any work days set for the preparation of the grounds; 3. the camp meeting board be empowered to hire such help as is necessary to have the delegates' accommodations properly arranged and cleaned.

(44)

B it resolved that each church be responsible to furnish two man days labor or \$25.00 for preparation of the Camp Meeting buildings and grounds at least three days prior to Camp Meeting upon the call of the District Superintendent.

Any church that fails to provide the labor or funds set forth above, the active ministers of that church shall be denied their usual camp discount privileges.

Each individual who at the call of the District Superintendent works three man-days or more preparing the grounds and buildings for Camp Meeting shall be entitled to free board during Camp Meeting.

(45)

We recommend that the following system of finance be adopted: a. The combined General and District Budgets shall be computed on the basis of \$1.75 per member per month, or a total of \$21.00 per year. The budget responsibility of each local church shall be determined by the District Council by deducting 10% from the total membership of the church, then, providing the number of non-voting members (under the age of 14 years) exceeds 10% of that number, then, in that event, the number that is in excess of 10% of that number, is to be deducted. The resulting number will be the local church's membership for budget responsibility.

To enable the District Council to determine this responsibility, each and every local church shall, during the first week in June of each conference year provide the District Council with a list of names and addresses of each and every member on the rolls of the local church as of the 31st day of May. Each member shall be listed under one of the following categories: (1) active members, (2) non-voting members.

- b. The special Rally Day, Thanksgiving, and Easter offerings, plus offerings taken by representatives of the various departments of the General Church, shall be in addition to the budget.
- c. This system of finance shall be designated as the District Unified Stewardship fund and each and every church in this district shall pay monthly to the District Treasurer for the account of said Stewardship Fund their proportionate monthly budget responsibility.
 - d. Specified funds are not to be considered as part of the budget,
- e. The District Treasurer shall distribute within 30 days after receipt the funds received in the Stewardship Fund as follows:

 - (2) 38% to General Budget; and if the said 38% shall exceed the annual General Budget responsibility of this District, then, in that event, the amount received over and above our annual General Budget responsibility shall be used for District Home Mission Work.

(46

Be it resolved that members of all standing committees shall be members of the annual district conference with voice and vote.

(47)

Be it resolved, that licensed ministers and deaconesses be notified in advance of conference concerning their Ministerial standing and the necessity of meeting with the Educational and Examining Boards on the day previous to Conference and in event it is impossible to do so, they shall notify these boards in writing. If there is no response it will indicate to the Educational and Examining Boards that the licentiate is not interested in his, or her, credentials.

(48)

Be it resolved that an honor system for recognition of churches who pay their budget be established and that a chart shall be compiled by the District Treasurer and displayed at the District Camp and Conference.

(49)

Be it resolved that an annual Pastors' Retreat be established and that the Listrict Superintendent arrange for such meetings,

(50)

Whereas some resolutions have far reaching ramifications and thus demand the careful attention of the delegates, therefore

Be it resolved that the Ways and Means and Resolutions Committee meet 30 days prior to Conference, and

Be it further resolved that mimeographed copies listing all resolutions with committee recommendations be placed in the hands of all delegates no later than 10 days prior to said District Conference,

And be it further resolved that each local church be limited to two resolutions each to be sent to the chairmen of the respective committees no later than the 15th of May.

(51)

Be it resolved that the **president of Western Pilgrim College** prepare and give a **report** of the general conditions of the zone college together with a full personal report each year to the district conference. We further recommend that this report be sent to the other Districts of the School Zone.

(52)

Whereas the manual states—"any church or pastor failing to raise the budget without good reason shall be denied a voice in annual conference," and whereas a number of our churches have failed to raise their budgets for the past year, now therefore be it resolved that this Conference authorize the District Council to appoint a committee from its membership to visit these churches early in the fiscal year for the purpose of counseling and assisting them in working out their budget problems.

(53)

Be it resolved that local and district youth finances or monies given for youth activities be listed separately in district and local reports.

(54)

Be it resolved that the **District Young People's Executive Secretary**, or his representative, shall have the privilege of holding **two services annually in each of the churches** of the district in the interest of the work of the District Young People's Committee and that an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the District Treasurer, being specified as an offering for the District Young People's Committee.

(55)

Whereas there is an urgent need for further education on the subject of tithing and whereas many of our people are contributing all or part of their tithe to other areas of Gospel work, within and without the church, and whereas Section 69 of the Manual specifically stipulates that the tithe should be paid into the treasury of the local church, therefore be it resolved that the District Superintendent, the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the District Young People's Executive Secretary, and the President of the District Missionary Society be appointed, by virtue of their office, a permanent committee to investigate and provide material for the education of our people in this area of tithing and that they make a report of their activities to the Annual Conference.
