



JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, June 26, 1952

The Thirtieth Annual Conference of the California-Arizona District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at El Monte, California, at 9:00 A.M., Thursday, June 26, 1952.

Motion carried that these be accepted into the Conference.

A letter was read from our Mexican Conference in Valles, San Luis Potosi, Mexico, expressing their heart-felt appreciation and gratitude for the help given them from this district, in forwarding the work of Christ in Mexico.

A motion carried that the District Secretary be instructed to properly acknowledge this letter.

Rev. L. W. Sturk presented a chart representing the value of the Pilgrim Dollar and its distribution, which was very helpful.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

June 26, 1952

To the Thirtieth Annual Conference of the California-Arizona District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at El Monte, California, June 26, 1952.

Greetings, in the name of Jesus who loved us and purchased us with his own blood:

God, in His great providence, has allowed us to meet in another Conference to do business for Him.

As we look over the past year, we wish to thank God for grace, strength and help He has given us for his work. While the problems have been many, the Lord has been a very present help in time of need. With God's help we submit the following report.

Spiritual Progress

God has blessed a number of our churches with Spirit-filled revivals. For this we are thankful, for we realize the spiritual life of the church depends on an outpouring of the Holy Ghost upon us.

Ministers

We thank God for the ministers of the California-Arizona District. We believe God has given them a burden for the work, and, for the most part, they are striving to advance the cause of Christ.

One of our active pastors, Rev. James M. Dooley, was called home to be with the Lord shortly after Conference last year. Brother Dooley had served this District for fifteen years as pastor and evangelist. He also served as Assistant District Superintendent, and for many years as a member of District Councils, School Boards and in other places of responsibility. He is missed greatly from our midst, but is enjoying the things that God has gone to prepare for those who love him. Rev. D. T. Grout and Nellie Foss, both retired ministers and members of the Rees Memorial Church were also taken home. My God bless their memory to our hearts.

New Buildings and Maintenance

The Oak View Church is coming along well with their new church auditorium. They are paying as they build and expect to have this fine edifice completed by this Fall.

San Dimas is in the process of building Sunday School units. This will be a real improvement to the church property. The church building itself has been re-

plastered inside and redecorated.

The Tucson Church has built a small, but very nice, parsonage which will be enlarged later. This has been done with very little indebtedness. They are also in the process of building a new church. This will be an excellent building when completed, and the people have a mind to work, and expect to be using one unit of the

building by early Fall of this year.

The property owned by the Ventura Church has been purchased by the School District, and a corner lot across the street from the present building has been pur-

chased, and they will be starting a new church and parsonage soon.

Our churches as a whole are doing a splendid job of improving their property

with new paint, plaster, lawns, shrubbery and so forth.

A considerable amount of improvement has been made on our District Conference Grounds, which is quite noticable. This has been done by the combined efforts of the School and District. Included in this is the cafeteria, which has been painted inside and out. New curtains for the dining hall, and tile on the kitchen floor, and new ranges have just been installed. New lawns have been planted on a good part of the grounds.

District Home Missions

The ground work had been laid before last Annual Conference for the starting of two new churches. One in Yucaipa, California, and the other in South Phoenix, Arizona. The two churches just mentioned, started services the same day, July 22, 1951. Yucaipa was privileged to start in their own building which was dedicated the afternoon of the opening services. This work is doing well under the leadership of Rev. and Mrs. T. L. Willingham. It is not organized but has wonderful prospects. They are making plans for a parsonage. This property is valued at \$7,500.00 with an indebtedness of about \$2,450.00.

South Poenix, under the capable leadership of Rev. C. J. Meyers, is doing well, and has the prospects of becoming a strong church. While they are still worshiping in a rented building, they have made some definite progress, as they were organized May 4 and have 11 members.

The folk in Coolidge, Arizona, worshiped in a rented building for fifteen months; but have been in their own building since January 1, 1952. The foundation for the church was poured the first week of October, 1951, and with much hard work wasnear enough completed for use within three months. This building is made of pumice stone blocks and is 30x50 feet in size, besides the vestibule. It is furnished with new pews that any church would appreciate. The property with its furnishings was recently appraised at over \$16,000.00, with an indebtedness of less than \$3,000.00, beside the amount due the District. The Coolidge church was organized April 5, 1951, with eight members and now has thirteen. The new building was dedicated April 6 of the same year.

A very splendid building has been rented on the main highway going through Tucson, Arizona, with Rev. G. L. Keene in charge, who is endeavoring to open a Second church in this growing city. Brother Keene has announced a sixty-day revival for the months of June and July, and reports the prospects are encouraging and new people are attending as the meetings progress.

Membership

We had anticipated a good increase in membership for this year, and while we do not have the complete report at this time; the gain will be very small; however, a number of churches report prospective members. We have lost quite a number on the District by death the past year.

Youth Work

Our Young People's Executive Secretary, Brother Martin Horine, has worked hard to see the Young People's work go forward. Some from the various churches have worked with him at Mile High Pines, to improve the Youth Camp. Rallies, both Zone and District, have been well attended and blessed of God.

Sunday School

Rev. David E. Olson, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and the Sunday School Committee have endeavored to keep something before the churches to increase the interest and attendance. Some of the Sunday Schools have made splendid gains; some have suffered losses and others have remained about the same.

We feel that if the Church and Sunday School goes forward, the laity as well as the ministry must get a fresh vision of the importance of the work of Christ, and

recognize the responsibility that is theirs.

Pilgrim Bible Institue

We believe our School is a real benefit to the District and has produced some excellent ministers and is continuing to do so. Our President, Rev. C. W. Thomas, and Dean, Rev. Paul D. Beck, along with the splendid faculty, are putting their very best into the School. We are greatly in need of more facilities and are working and planning toward an extensive building program. We would like to see many of our older people remember the School in their wills.

Finances

We appreciate the way the Lord has blessed financially. We are thankful for the effort most of the churches have made to meet their budget. Some of the churches have been unable to pay their budget, but we are praying they shall make definite plans to do so the coming year.

Personal Report

During the past year I have visited all of the churches several times. I have spent considerable time in Home Missionary effort and feel the harvest is white. I have preached 121 times with 38 seekers, also visited most of the churches during revival meetings and other services. We held two revival meetings, besides week-end meetings; Conducted, with the help of Brother Hill, one Ministerial Meeting; Conducted 28 Annual Meetings, 60 board meetings, 3 school board meetings, 18 District Council meetings; took care of district correspondence; organized 2 churches; dedicated two churches; preached two funerals; officiated in one wedding and assisted in another; worked several days on church buildings at Yucaipa and Coolidge; and travelled in the interest of the District, 23,345 miles. I received in love offering at the 1951 camp meeting, \$124.00; for one revival and other special services conducted, \$115.00. My salary and travelling expenses are paid in full.

I appreciate so much the help and cooperation of our good Assistant Superintendent, Rev. Lundy Hill, who took our place at the Superintendent's Meeting in Indianapolis, and helped in other places as needed.

We appreciate the splendid District Council with whom we have had the opportunity to work; also the good pastors and laity of the District.

We cannot say we are satisfied with the accomplishments of the past year but we are in His hands and thank Him for what has been done.

Personal Report:

I have served as president over the three departments of the school. In addition to the usual administrative duties of the president, I have acted as the business manager for all three departments, as high school principal, and have taught 15 hours per week. I have traveled almost every Sunday with the Gospel Team doing deputational work, visiting every church, but two, in this district and in the Northwest District. I attended the Ministerial Conference of this district and that of the Northwest District, and the Superintendents' and Presidents' Conference in Indianapolis. In all. I have traveled over 15,000 miles in the interest of P.B.I. By permission of the school board, I held two revival meetings in this district.

As a salary I received \$2,000 in cash, plus my house, utilities, tuition and meals,

estimated at \$1,000.

Building Plans:

Because of the growing need of more classrooms, and administrative offices, the Administration of the school feels that we must build a new administration building to adequately accommodate the serious and pressing need which we are now facing. The school board has given permission for this building to be planned for, for funds to be raised, and a building committee has been appointed to administer in this respect.

They have stipulated that we have in cash at least \$10,000 before we begin to build. We realize this is only a part of what it will take to construct this building. But we are praying that God will lay it upon the hearts of the business men of our church, upon the laity at large, and upon all who may be interested in Christian education, to help in a substantial way that this building may be erected in this

coming year.

We earnestly feel, that if we are to advance in the proportion and respect that God wants us to advance, we must not hesitate to take this step, but must diligently seek to do our best to build buildings that will house our classes and administrative offices in a respectful way; that we may well be proud to send our children to P.B.I., that we may recommend it to every young man who seeks to enter training for God's work. We must train our men to be loyal Pilgrims, to love God and the church. P.B.I. can help do this very thing. "Let us arise and build."

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE SECRETARY PILGRIM YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETY

To the Annal Conference of the California-Arizona District, held June 26, 27, 1952, at El Monte, California.

Greetings, in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

This has been a very peculiar and amazing year in many respects. From the comments we have had, some of the best district rallies were enjoyed this year that have ever been held in our district; but when the services were over and we had made our way home, it seems as though the most of our people forgot the pleas that were made for support of our youth work, financially, physically, and spiritually.

We feel that without question if it had not been for six churches and ten or twelve faithful workers we would not have our Youth Camp today. This is a shame and ought not to be. I think it would do each of us good to stop and ask ourselves the question, How much have I contributed to the work? and then pledge ourselves by the grace of God we will do better.

We have visited every church that we have been invited to and a number that we didn't receive an invitation to.

We traveled a little over 7,000 miles in the interest of the Youth work. This does not include the mileage to the National Youth Convention.

We have received \$130.00 in love offerings.

The activity at Mile High Pines has been very gratifying. We had a spelndid group of workers for Junior Camp. 91 Juniors registered and 43 of this group knelt for prayer, accepting Christ as their Saviour.

Our Young People's Labor Day camp registered over 200, with the largest first-night registration in the history of the camp. 14 of these knelt in prayer, making a total of 57 through our summer camps.

We have had many Youth groups and Sunday School classes to use the facilities of Mile High Pines through the winter months, for which we are very thankful. We urge every church, Sunday School and Young People's Society to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity.

We wish to report on the improvements at Mile High Pines.

During the Christmas holidays, a large wood heating stove was purchased and installed in the dining room. Also, real windows, with real glass, were purchased and installed. The siding was finished on two cabins. One more was built and the floor was laid down for another, and piers were laid for the third. Cement floors and steps were laid in the rest rooms. Two large combination work and table-tennis cement tables 5x9 feet were completed and the third nearly finished.

We also purchased a much needed generator. This was a government surplus item valued at \$2,000.00. We bought it for \$500.00.

Many other improvements were made, which are too numerous to mention.

The house project has been held up, waiting for the sale of several other houses that were built by the same party. Let's pray the Lord to help in the sale of this property, so that our house can be built. This should mean at least \$3,000 for Mile High Pines.

We have received a good deal of money from outside sources. One man, not of our denomination, made us an offer of dollar for dollar, for every dollar we raise over \$100, up to \$200, on a given Sunday. We have already collected \$100 from him. The offer is still open, so let's do our very best when these opportunities come our way.

May the Lord bless you as Pilgrim Youth and help you to March On.

- All Sunday School birthday and thank offerings go to District Home Missions. 12% of regular Tithes and Offerings, after deducting building funds, rents, or (4) (5) purchase payments on church buildings: same to be distributed according to Standing

District assessment of \$2.00 per member per year, to be distributed according

to Standing Resolution No. 38.

Resolution No. 42.

NOTE: Assessments are to be prorated to a monthly basis and remitted each month. Assessments are based on total membership, with exemptions provided for those regularly engaged in Christian work, such as active Missionaries and Evangelists, and for all non-voting members; but in no case shall the exemptions exceed 10% of the reported membership. Ministers Retirement Plan:

If your pastor is participating in the Retirement Plan, you will deduct 2% of his salary and send in each month. Along with this your church will contribute the equivalent of 4% of his salary (or twice the amount he paid) and send along with the 2%, keeping each percentage separate on your remittance sheet. Please include two copies (original and duplicate) of the Pension Plan Remittance Sheets, and keep the third copy in the book for your own record. Be sure that the form is clearly and correctly filled out.

All District and General Funds should be paid through the local church Treas-

urer and then forwarded to the District Treasurer.

(9) Do NOT send Young People's Society funds to the District Treasurer. Send them to the District Young People's Treasurer.

All churches should use the budget system. Obligations should be met weekly and sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All offerings should be mailed so that they will reach the District Treasurer by the 10th of the month. This will make for easy and prompt handling of all accounts.

No. 5. BE IT RESOLVED, that the Conference instruct the District Treasurer to send quarterly to all pastors a report of monthly remittances from local churches to the District Treasurer. This report is to be posted in a conspicuous place in the

church.

No. 6. BE IT RESOLVED, that the following Ways and Means Resolutions from the 1951 Conference be deleted:

No. 7. BE IT RESOLVED, that the following Standing Resolutions be deleted:

Standing Resolutions from Previous Conferences

Be it resolved that the California-Arizona District purchase all the books listed in the Manual for the study courses, that are not in the Pilgrim Bible Institute Library. All books in the School Library to be available to ministerial candidates of the District on a circulating basis of a two weeks' period with privilege of renewal. District Council to work out all details.

Whereas the stress and strain of the times in which we live are such as to tax the strength of the busy pastors of our district, be it resolved that each church of the district give their pastor a two weeks' vacation with pay.

(3)

Resolved that love offerings be taken monthly for pastors of each church and that the delegate sees that this is done.

(4

Be it resolved that the local churches pay the traveling expenses and entertainment of their delegates for the Conference business sessions. This does not include camp meeting.

(5)

Whereas, the General Conference has made provision that newly organized churches in established districts assume one-fourth of their General Budget obligations the first year after being organized; one-half of their budget the second year; three-tourths the third year, and beginning with fourth year pay in full;

Therefore be it resolved that on this district we apply the same percentages in

regard to our district budget.

(6)

Be it resolved that the following items be paid out of the District Expense Fund.

1. Utilities for the home of the District Superintendent.

2. Publication of the Pilgrim News.

3. District office expense.

(7)

Be it resolved that the cafeteria and lunch stand be considered part of the camp meeting operations and all monies pertaining thereto be held in the Camp Meeting fund.

(8)

Be it resolved that ministers coming to this district from other denominations be interviewed by the District Council before their credentials are presented to the Conference.

(9)

Whereas in the past important papers have been lost and a considerable loss of time and finance were necessary to secure new papers, therefore be it resolved that all local churches of the district forward to the District Council, for filing, all legal papers pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.

(10)

Whereas the District owns shares in the Lexington Blvd. Mutual Water Co., therefore be it resolved that the following five district officers, by virtue of their office, be appointed to represent our shares in the Water Co.: The District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Treasurer and Secretary, and the President of the Board of Trustees. And be it further resolved that the representatives vote the shares as a block as instructed by the District Council on matters of policy.

(11)

Be it resolved that the School Board for the Grade and High School shall be comprised of five members. One elected for 4 years, one for 3 years, one for 2 years, and two for 1 year. And be it further resolved that all subsequent elections be for a full three years.

(12)

Whereas the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Coast is in need of a more adequate Bible School, where our young men and women will receive recognized Bible training within our church, thereby retaining them for our denomination, be it resolved that the District Council and the School Board make plans to expand our present Bible School facilities, either by a building program on our own beautiful campus, or by investigating some worthy project elsewhere in the immediate future.

(13)

Be it resolved that the District Council and following committees and boards meet one day prior to the annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand. The Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees, and the Educational and Examining Boards.

(14)

Be it resolved that each church on the district be responsible to furnish at least two man days labor in preparation of the grounds for camp meeting, subject to the call of the District Council.

(15)

Be it resolved that the emphasis being placed on the work among the children of the Sunday Schools shall not be lessened, but that a greater stress shall be placed on the work among our young married folk and adults, thus building into our Sunday School program a definite place for the family as a complete unit.

(16)

We recommend that each self-supporting church put forth a home missionary campaign and try to establish at least one new church.

(17)

Be it resolved that all plans for the construction or remodeling of church buildings be presented to a committee on which there shall be an architect, a builder, and a financier for their suggestions.

(18)

Resolved that no pastor employ an evangelist without the endorsement of the District Superintendent.

(19)

Resolved that before licensed or ordained ministers coming from other churches shall be received into the local churches, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and Council regarding said minister.

(20)

Be it resolved that each pastor be granted the privilege of holding at least one revival each conference year.

(21)

Be it resolved that our district Educational Board be instructed to secure a set of questions covering the course of study prescribed by the manual and make the same available to those desiring to take the Study Course.

(22)

Be it resolved that the reports of the Examining and Educational Boards be included in the body of the minutes.

(23)

We recommend that our District Superintendent or his Assistant shall when possible, conduct quarterly meetings at each church, at which time he shall preach a gospel sermon and administer the sacraments.

(24)

We recommend that, whereas we now have a standing Statistical Committee to function during the conference year, be it resolved that all reports be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than one week before the conference date.

(25)

Be it resolved that the use of our District Camp Grounds be limited to the activities of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

(26)

Resolved that when recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference the candidate be present, or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.

(27)

Whereas the devastating influence of the liquor traffic in America is gaining such momentum, be it resolved our church and ministry take a more militant stand against the sale of the same.

(28)

Be it resolved that our District Superintendent appoint an editing committee comprised of the District Secretary and one or two other members to expedite the editing and publishing of our District Minutes.

(29)

Inasmuch as the ministerial directory in the district minutes does not defferentiate between missionaries in foreign lands and ministers in the homeland, therefore, be it resolved that in the future these be shown in two separate lists.

(30)

Be it resolved that the necessary data for the General Statistician be placed in our District Minutes.

(31)

Be it resolved that the part of the District Superintendent's and other district officer's expense, relating to the propagation of district home missions, be so designated and paid for out of district home mission funds.

(32)

Be it resolved that the District Young People's and the Sunday School Committee's financial reports be submitted as a yearly report to the District Conference.

(33)

Whereas the local churches have been paying for the pastor's traveling and housing expenses during camp meeting and conference, and whereas some of the pastors have to leave full time or part time secular work to attend such camp and conference, thereby cutting off part of their source of income and creating a financial problem; therefore be it resolved that each church assume the responsibility of seeing that the local pastor's temporal needs are adequately supplied during this time.

(34)

Whereas the school has operational control of the Conference grounds the greater part of the year; therefore we recommend that the matter of a maintenance man for said grounds be left to the consideration of the District Council and the School Board.

(35)

Be it resolved that the number of the District Board of Trustees be reduced from seven to three, one to be elected for three years, one for two years, and one for one year, same to be put into operation as the terms of the present trustees expire.

(36)

Be it resolved that the Conference form a committee of three which shall have charge of the Old Folks Home buildings and grounds, said committee to be comprised of the District Superintendent, the pastor of the El Monte Pilgrim Holiness Church and the President of the Board of Trustees.

(37)

Be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to establish a Revolving Loan Fund to be known as the "District Building Loan Fund" for the benefit of the churches in this District which want to borrow money at a low rate of interest for building purposes. Such funds, to be solicited from private parties who want to invest money and from wills and bequests.

(38)

We recommend that the 10% of the Sunday School offerings be divided as follows:

50% General Sunday School and Young People's Work.

50% District Sunday School Committee.

No. 8 We recommend that the District Assessment remain at \$2.00 per member per year, to be divided as follows:

\$0.15 General Conference Expense.

.85 Camp Ground Maintenance.

1.00 General Administration.

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be given an annual vacation with pay, not to exceed two weeks.

(40)

We recommend that the District Secretary and the District Treasurer be alloted the sum of \$25.00 per quarter for their services, and the District Treasurer be allowed \$20.00 per month for secretarial assistance.

(41)

We recommend that we take offerings for the Departments as follows:

Foreign Missions in August.

General Church Extension in September.

District Home Missions in October.

and every third month thereafter in sequence.

(42)

We recommend that the 10% of the regular church tithes and offerings be raised to 12% and that this amount be distributed as follows:

30% to District Conference Expense.

60% to District Superintendent Fund.

10% to District Home Missions.

(43)

Whereas, the General Conference has set as a goal for church extension, 200 new churches within this quadrennium, be it resolved that the California-Arizona Conference set as a goal the establishing of at least three new churches per year for the four-year period.

(44)

Be it resolved that each church take one offering each month for Pilgrim Bible Institute. Be it further resolved that the present "Mite Box" system be continued in behalf of Pilgrim Bible Institute and that the goal of a penny-a-day per member be raised through this system.

(45)

Whereas, our present rest-room facilities have become a source of constant trouble and expense, and whereas, it may become necessary during this fiscal year for the District Council to arrange to connect our facilities with the proposed sewer system for this district:

Therefore, we recommend that the Conference authorize the District Council to provide for this connection, and also to purchase and install the necessary equipment to place our facilities in first class condition.


