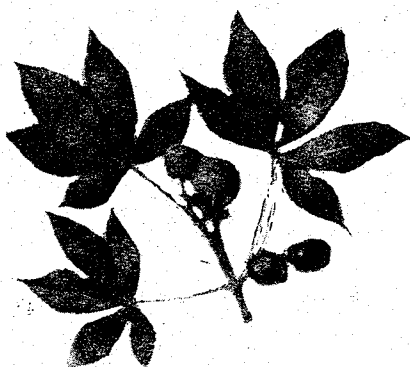

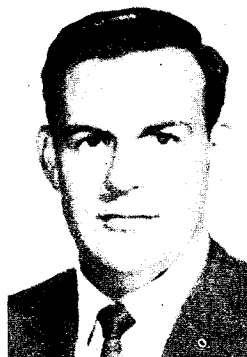

TWELFTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE WESTERN OHIO DISTRICT PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

The twelfth annual conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at West Milton, Ohio at 2:00 p.m. July 18, 1966 with District Superintendent, Rev. Charles Felsburg calling upon Rev. Robert Ferguson to lead the congregation in song.

The opening song, "Blessed Assurance" was lifted Heavenward with the congregation standing. The congregation then sang, "He brought me out."

Rev. R. A. Beltz, Director of Pilgrim Pension Plan, led the congregation in prayer.

District Superintendent Rev. Felsburg presented the presiding officer, General Superintendent Dr. Melvin Snyder who spoke briefly, reserving his main address for the coming morning session.

Dr. Snyder called the conference to order.

The roll of Ministerial and lay delegates was called. A motion to make the conference bar to include the middle and south section of seats to the center aisle and including the platform, was seconded and carried.

Revs. Max Williams, Harold Colen, Clifford Richardson and Ronald Travis were recognized by the Conference as having transferred from other Districts and were seated within the Conference Bar upon motion. Upon motion Rev. Willis Clock was also given this recognition and invited to take his place within the Conference Bar.

The District Superintendent's report read in three divisions: first the report of Material progress, then his personal report and finally, a Pastoral letter which he closed by calling the Ministerial and lay delegates to prayer for revival.

The Superintendent's report was accepted upon motion with a hearty "Amen."

The Assistant Superintendent's report was read and accepted with an "Amen."

The Auditing Committee report was given by Mrs. O. E. Rutledge and accepted upon motion.

The District Treasurer presented a detailed report and called attention to various items, making the total report a quite clear presentation with the oral highlights. The report was accepted upon motion with a rising vote of thanks.

The Chairman at this point, gave time for Rev. R. A. Beltz to speak on the Pilgrim Pension Plan. He called to attention the fact that over a period of some thirty years under the plan a minister at retirement might receive in pension checks 15% from his own contribution, 30% from the churches' and 55% from earnings of his accumulated pension fund.

The Sunday School Promotional report was presented by Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Dale Rummel. Representatives from the churches with highest gains were invited to the platform to receive awards. The report was accepted upon motion.

A summary of the Statistical Report was presented by Mr. James Booher. The report was accepted upon motion.

The afternoon session closed by expiration of time and was dismissed with prayer by Rev. M. H. Robbins.

Second Sitting — Tuesday, July 19, 1966

8:30 A.M.

The Tuesday morning session of conference was opened with Rev. Verl Light leading the congregation in singing, "O, for a Thousand Tongues," accompanied by Mrs. Melvin Snyder at the organ and Mrs. Charles Felsburg at the piano.

Rev. Ted Wilson was called upon to lead in prayer. The service was immediately turned over to the chairman, Dr. Melvin Snyder, who addressed the conference. He called our attention to the two main thrusts of the Pastoral letter: (1) the admonition to pastors to endeavor to deepen the spiritual lives of their people, which is the most basic need for church growth; and (2) the admonition to each church to endeavor to establish at least one branch Sunday School in a needy community during the quadrennium.

Rev. Snyder then spoke from I Timothy 4:16, emphasizing the fact that we cannot save others unless we save ourselves. It is true, that from the standpoint of merit and power, we are saved only through the Grace of God. Even repentance is of no value unless used as a means of making faith possible. However, if this faith is genuine, it will manifest itself in good works, and it is through this means that we may bring about the salvation of others. Rev. Snyder emphasized that salvation is a past thing, having occurred at a particular time and place in each recipient's life; it is a present, or continuing thing, not alive because of what it was yesterday, but because the blood continues to be efficacious in our lives at the present moment; it is a future thing, bearing the promise of the time to come when in our complete salvation we shall know and be known by sight, for faith will no longer be needed when we reign with Christ. He closed with the challenging statement that we cannot do anything for the world today unless we have a vibrant, bubbling manifestation of salvation in our own lives. God's ability to work is as great in this generation as in those generations past—the question is whether we place ourselves in the mainstream or sit on the sidelines. The word of our own testimony, vibrant and real, is the end of all arguments in favor of spirit led life. Four essential requisites to spirituality concluded Dr. Snyder's address. They are: more time with the Word of God in open hearted study, a deepened and more significant prayer life, maintenance of a regular family altar, and an outlet for witnessing to God's power, which can be found in our daily living.

Following the address of the Superintendent, the regular order of business was resumed. Mrs. Charles Felsburg, District Missionary Society President, was added to the roll of conference members. Mrs. Melvin Snyder was given an honorary seat in the conference bar. By motion, the roll call of delegates was dispensed with.

The minutes of the first sitting of the conference were read and approved.

The report of the District Missionary Society President, Mrs. Charles Felsburg, was read and accepted with a hearty amen. The same action was taken on the report of Mrs. L. T. Brand, District Missionary Society Treasurer.

Rev. M. H. Robbins gave the report of the District Church Extension Committee, and spoke briefly on some phases of this work not brought out in the statistics of the report. The report was received.

Rev. Charles Felsburg, District Superintendent, gave some comparative statistics on the financial phase of our district reporting, comparing the past two fiscal years. Rev. Snyder commended the conference on its high rate of per capita giving, and stated that we have consistently been one of the top three protestant denominations in per capita giving.

Following a short recess, Rev. E. E. Leadingham introduced to the conference Rev. and Mrs. Glen Jones, Rev. Harold Colen, Rev. Clifford Richardson, Rev. David Kushman, and Mrs. John Blann. A humorous note was inserted into the conference upon the introduction of Mrs. Melvin Snyder, who indicated that she was not a long-winded speaker.

Rev. John Blann, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College, and Rev. Randall Schenkel, registrar and Dean of Admissions, were introduced to the conference, and presented a dialogue illustrating the value of Christian College education versus the teaching the secular college has to offer, after which Rev. Blann made a brief appeal for the support of the conference for our Zone school. A ladies trio from F.P.C. was presented and beautifully sang "Wonderful Savior," accompanied at the organ by a member of their group.

Rev. Stanley Booher, secretary of the Resolutions Committee, began the committee's report with the presentation of a Joint Resolution of that committee and the Ways and Means Committee. This concerned the sale of the present district parsonage at Springfield, and the purchase or building of a more suitable parsonage in the Dayton area. A motion to table the resolution pending final settlement of the merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church was lost. An amendment was offered to change the phrase "to be financed" to read "to be paid with the money from the sale of the District Camp Ground." After considerable discussion, the motion seemed to be lost in a voice vote. A division of the house was called for, which resulted in a loss of the amendment by a vote of 46 for and 47 opposed.

By expiration of time, the sitting adjourned with prayer by Rev. L. R. Roberts.

Third Sitting — 2:00 P.M., July 19, 1966

Following an organ and piano prelude by Mrs. Melvin Snyder and Mrs. Charles Felsburg, Rev. Verl Light led the congregation in singing "I Will Praise Him." Rev. G. F. Sheridan led in prayer, after which the ladies trio from Frankfort Pilgrim College sang "Jesus, Wonderful Lord," and "Unworthy."

Rev. Snyder took the chair and gave a few words of admonition concerning the spirituality of doing business for the Lord.

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved by motion.

An amendment to the motion before the house was offered. This was to amend the motion concerning the district parsonage to read "at a price of approximately \$28,000.00, with a \$35,000.00 ceiling." The amendment lost. A further amendment was offered, which would give specific instructions to the Council and the appointed committee to "give precedence to the consideration of buying property which would be suitable for the district needs." This amendment also was lost. A motion to table the entire resolution until next year was carried.

The Committees' second joint resolution, which would add a provision for negotiations on a new lease for the camp grounds, was tabled.

The conference proceeded to the report of the Resolutions Committee. Resolution No. 1, providing a correction in stating manner in which various monies are to be handled by the local treasurer, was carried. It was ruled by the Chairman that this should have been an editorial matter, and that any other resolutions of such nature would be so ruled by him, and would properly be handled by the editorial staff.

A resolution setting aside the Tuesday evening sitting of conference for the Ordination service was carried.

A motion to change the convening of the District Youth Convention from Thursday to Friday evening was carried. Motion to delete the words, "its normal schedule" from No. 3-A(5) was carried. A motion to delete No. 5-B, and add No. 3-A(6) to provide children's services during conference was approved. Motion to change the reading of No. 3-C to read "**General** Church Extension" and District Church Extension" services was approved. A motion carried to delete the words "and that he be paid for his services," from No. 3-D.

Motions concerning the study courses for local ministers and the reporting of licensed ministers, Nos. 13-B and C, were approved.

Resolution No. 15, concerning the duties of the District Church Extension Committee, was carried.

A recommended deletion under No. 24, Salaries, was approved. A further recommended revision under No. 25, Standards, Paragraph D was approved.

Resolution No. 24, "Minister's Hospitalization Plan," was approved as amended.

A motion to delete the words "with regular services until Monday noon" from No. 3-A(1) was approved.

No. 3-A(2) concerning camp and conference schedule was revised to read: "That our district conference begin on the first Monday-of camp at 9:00 a.m., the first sitting concluding at 12:00 noon; succeeding sittings to be: Monday, 1:30 to 5:00 p.m.; Tuesday, 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:30 to 5:00 p.m.; Ordination Service, 7:30 p.m. If business cannot be completed by the close of the Tuesday afternoon sitting, it may be concluded with an additional sitting on Wednesday morning. The resolution was adopted.

A resolution authorizing the District Council to effect a standardized membership record and a standardized financial record, with report blanks to correspond, was adopted.

The report of the Examining Board was given by Rev. Ted Wilson, and the following action approved:

For Ordination—Revs. Walter Hicks, Eden Johnson and Ralph Shope.

For Transfer as Ordained minister from Church of Christ in Christian Union—Rev. Howard Johnson.

For Third Year License—Revs. Paul Berridge, Otis Dinkins, and Frank Thompson.

For Second Year License—Revs. Joseph Martin, William Salley and Floyd Thomas.

For First Year License—Revs. Clayton Coulter, Esther Elliott, Paul Frank, Beulah Hicks, William Johnson, David Kushman, Leonard Longfellow, Orus Moore and Cecil Preston.

For Song Evangelist—Mrs. Sara Culpepper.

Tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent, and the conference was admonished by the General Superintendent to be prayerful and thoughtful in the matter of electing district officers. The election proceeded with the casting of ballots for the District Superintendent. Further ballots were cast for two members of the Examining Board, one member of the Educational Board and the C.Y.C. Director.

Rev. and Mrs. William Gilkerson and daughter were introduced to the conference, and gave their testimonies.

A motion to extend the time of the sitting until the supper hour was approved.

The report of the tellers on the first ballot for District Superintendent resulted in no election, and a second ballot was cast.

The first ballot for members of the Examining Board resulted in the election of Rev. Melroy Ward. A second ballot was cast for the remaining member of the Board.

There was no election on the first ballot for a member of the Educational Board, and a second ballot was cast.

The balloting for C.Y.C. Director resulted in the election of Rev. Ted Wilson.

There was no election on the second ballot for District Superintendent. Rev. Felsburg asked that his name be withdrawn. However, upon expressions of confidence by numerous members of the conference, a motion prevailed to cast another ballot, with Rev. Felsburg's name still under consideration.

There was no election on the second ballot for Educational Board member, and a third ballot was cast.

The third ballot for the office of District Superintendent resulted in the re-election of Rev. Charles Felsburg.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time, with prayer by Rev. L. R. Roberts.

Ordination Service — 7:30 P.M. — Tuesday, July, 1966

The ordination service opened at 7:30 p.m., with Bro. Harold Longfellow leading the congregation in singing, "Tis so Sweet to Trust in Jesus," and "He Hideth my Soul." Rev. Melroy Ward, Assistant District Superintendent, announced the absence of the Superintendent, Rev. Felsburg, due to sudden illness of his daughter, and requested prayer. The offeratory prayer was offered by Rev. Robert Ferguson, with the offeratory being played by Mrs. Snyder at the organ. An inspiring solo, "They that Sow in Tears," was sung by Bro. Longfellow.

Prayer was offered by Rev. G. F. Sheridan, after which the congregation sang "A Charge to Keep I have."

Rev. Ward presented the ordinands, Revs. Ralph Shope, Walter Hicks and Eden Johnson, to General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder. Portions of scripture, I Timothy 3:1-10, II Timothy 4:1-8 and Titus 3:1-11, were read by Revs. E. E. Leadingham, L. R. Enlow and M. H. Robbins.

From II Chronicles 16, Dr. Snyder read the story of the failure of King Asa and took as his text the 9th verse, "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to shew himself strong in the behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him."

Dr. Snyder brought out the truth of the prophet's warning even in our time. The world is looking for leadership, and God is searching throughout the earth for the men he can use as leaders. He is looking for men with perfect hearts, that have been made so by a touch of divine grace. He wants men who will get quiet enough to hear His voice and receive His message. God still uses human agents to spread His gospel. To be effective, your message must be Christ-centered to the extent that it will cause men to forget the instrument and remember only the Christ. God is looking for courageous men to preach His message, and for honest men who will live the message they preach. He is looking for men who continually keep the assurance that God's hand is on their lives.. Constantly remember the words of the old song, "If your heart keeps right." He is looking for men who are not looking for glory unto themselves, but that He may show Himself strong. Quit yourselves like men and be strong!

Following this challenging message, Dr. Snyder charged the ordinands that as they were being ordained, they should accept the challenge to serve God with a perfect heart. The questions of the Ordination Rites having been answered by the candidates, they, with their wives knelt. Following a special prayer offered for each of the ordinands, by Revs. Melroy Ward, M. H. Robbins and E. E. Leadingham, they were ordained by Dr. Snyder. A brief charge was then given to the companions by the General Superintendent. The newly ordained ministers were then presented with their Certificates of Ordination. The service closed with the singing of "Blest be the Tie", as the congregation greeted the ministers and their wives.

Fourth Sitting Wednesday Morning, July 20, 1966, 8:30 A.M.

The Wednesday morning sitting of the conference was called to order by Rev. Charles Felsburg, District Superintendent. Rev. G. F. Sheridan led in singing "My Jesus, I Love Thee" and "My Faith Looks up to Thee." Prayer was offered by Rev. Melroy Ward, after which Dr. Melvin Snyder took the chair. He introduced Dr. Paul Graham, a representative of the National Association of Evangelicals to the conference.

Dr. Graham spoke briefly of the work of N.A.E., stating that 43 denominations, including the Pilgrim Holiness Church, are now members. There are more than 30,000 member churches, making more than 2½ million Christians. The basic reason for N.A.E. can be found in the difficult times in which we live. The unrest and dissatisfaction throughout our own nation and the world make self-evident the fact that Christian Evangelicals must marshal efforts to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ. The mission of the church, as commissioned by Jesus Christ himself, is evangelism. The reason evangelism is at such a low ebb is not because we do not believe in it, but because we do not seem to know how to implement it. We can no longer depend on protracted meetings. Even week end meetings are ineffective it seems. There must be an answer, and this is the reason for the coming together of so many people who feel the need—that we might find God's will for our time in the reviving of evangelism throughout the world. Dr. Graham gave some information on pertinent literature and film on the subject, that is available to any who are interested.

A motion carried to give Rev. Graham an honorary seat within the conference bar.

Minutes of the Tuesday afternoon sitting of the conference were read and approved.

The exact count of the third ballot for District Superintendent was given. It had been announced at the close of that sitting that Rev. Charles Felsburg was elected.

The third ballot for a member of the Educational Board was reported. It resulted in the election of Rev. L. R. Enlow. The report of the second ballot for the final member of the Examining Board resulted in no election, and the third ballot was cast.

A ballot was cast for the election of Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. Felsburg was asked to give his response to his re-election as District Superintendent. In his gracious acceptance of the office, he made the significant statement that it is no small task that is before us in the days ahead, but we have no small God to do it! He closed with a request for prayer in his behalf as he leads the conference.

It was suggested that inasmuch as the District Superintendent had not yet given his response when the ballot was cast for Assistant Superintendent, his answer might had some bearing on the balloting. A motion to declare this ballot out of order, therefore, prevailed, and a second ballot was cast, the first ballot being destroyed without counting.

Rev. Snyder gave a few stirring remarks on the necessity of good leadership and of cooperation and teamwork in promoting the program of the church. The Spirit does not tell us to do anything that is out of line with God's ordained authority in the organization of his church. The Holy Spirit recognizes his church and expects his people to recognize its authority, and let it keep us from straying to the right or left, but keep in the middle of the road. A true Pilgrim allows a wide latitude of thinking. We have many different backgrounds and cultures, and the Holy Spirit can fit into all of them. He does not necessarily change the cultures; He just takes the Devil out of them.

A report on the ballot for Assistant District Superintendent resulted in no election. There was no election for a member of the Examining Board. A motion to vote on the two highest for Assistant Superintendent lost, and the second open ballot was cast. A fourth ballot was cast for Examining Board member, after a motion prevailed to vote for one of the two highest. The nominees for District Missionary Society President were read, and a ballot was cast. They were Mrs. Willis Clock, Mrs. Ted Wilson and Miss Irene Tanier.

The election of Rev. Melroy Ward as Assistant District Superintendent was announced.

Nominations for District Secretary were Revs. M. H. Robbins and Dale Rummel,

and ballots were cast. The election of Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz as the final member of the Examining Board was announced. Ballots were cast for District Treasurer, the nominees being Revs. G. F. Sheridan, Robert Ferguson and Stanley Booher. The conference also voted for the PELT Director; the nominees were Revs. Wayne Goldsmith, Dale Rummel and D. R. Close.

Rev. M. H. Robbins was elected District Secretary on the first ballot, and Mrs. Ted Wilson was elected as District Missionary Society President. The council nominated Revs. Dale Rummel and M. L. Bogard as District Trustee, and the ballots were cast.

It was announced that Rev. G. F. Sheridan was elected District Treasurer on the first ballot, after which ballots were cast for the five remaining council members.

Result of balloting for PELT Director resulted in no election; however, both Revs. Close and Goldsmith withdrew their names, and motion to declare Rev. Rummel elected by plurality as PELT Director was approved.

Nominees were announced for District Statistician. They were Mr. James Booher, Rev. Ted Wilson and Rev. Stanley Booher.

Rev. M. L. Bogard was declared elected as District Trustee.

Dr. Snyder spoke briefly on the proposed merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, outlining some of the changes that it will entail, and stating that it would probably be the first of 1967 before we would have the final results of their voting. He asked that the conference pray for them as they give consideration to this important step.

Mr. James Booher was elected as District Statistician, but asked that he be allowed to withdraw. Rev. Stanley Booher was elected on the second ballot.

The first ballot for council members resulted in the election of all five. They were: Revs. L. T. Brand, Ted Wilson, Earl Wachenschwanz, D. R. Close and Robert Ferguson.

A motion carried to elect the two members of the Church Extension Board by a plurality vote, and the ballots were cast.

A percentage gain ribbon which had been overlooked at the previous presentation was presented to the Troy church, Rev. E. E. Leadingham, pastor.

Evangelists Rev. Virgil Miller and Wm. Whitmore, and Song Evangelist, Mrs. Sara Culpepper, were introduced to the conference. Rev. Snyder spoke concerning the need to provide better support for our evangelists.

Revs. Wallace Marshall and E. E. Leadingham were elected as members of the District Church Extension Board.

Announcement of Mrs. Ted Wilson's withdrawal as District Missionary Society President was made, and a motion carried to name the second highest to that office. This elected Mrs. Willis Clock.

The Examining Board reported the name of Rev. Clair Bailey whom they recommended for third year license. The recommendation was approved.

Additional resolutions of the Resolution Committee resulted in the following action:

Motion to revise No. 11 (B) concerning a membership gain in churches was carried.

A revision of No. 11 (C) concerning the honor roll system was approved.

A resolution concerning the payment of Youth Camp rent was approved.

A resolution of appreciation was approved with a hearty "Amen."

A resolution was presented from the floor concerning the District Parsonage. An amendment was presented, followed by a substitute amendment. The substitute, adding \$1.00 to the budget to cover the cost of the project, was approved by a standing vote of 37 for and 30 against.

A second substitute motion to lease a parsonage, after selling the present

property, was lost. The main motion, authorizing the District Council to remodel the parsonage at a cost not to exceed \$5,000, if they deem it advisable; if not, to bring to conference next year plans and specifications, along with building bids, for a new parsonage, with the amendment providing the funds through budget, was adopted.

Motions for the District Council to take care of all unfinished business and to read and approve the minutes of the last two sittings were approved.

Words of appreciation and a definite request for daily prayer were offered by Dr. Melvin Snyder, after which he adjourned the conference with prayer.

MATERIAL PROGRESS REPORT BY DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

CINCINNATI—NORTH FAIRMOUNT

New concrete foundation walls have been poured to replace the very badly weather damaged, original walls. The Contractor faced the walls on the interior with brick. Pastor Cecil Preston and his people are highly pleased with their new basement.

DELPHOS

New windows were installed in the Sanctuary and considerable other remodeling was done on the church. Pastor Hugh Mosher is to be congratulated for spearheading this work.

GRAND RAPIDS

A lovely Sanctuary and Educational Unit was completed during the winter. The building is brick veneered, supported by laminated arches and trusses. The old church has been remodeled into a three bedroom parsonage under the able leadership of Rev. M. H. Robbins.

GREENVILLE

Last Fall the Church, of brick construction, was sandblasted, re-pointed and the bell tower partially rebuilt. Pastor Kenneth Whitescarver and his people are to be commended.

MAUDE

Last summer, Maude Pilgrims completely redecorated their parsonage and did considerable remodeling. New built-in cabinets were installed in the kitchen, the dining room, living room and three downstairs bedrooms, stairway, hall and study were carpeted. The church parking lot was enlarged and both church and parsonage lots were completely re-landscaped. Much credit is due Pastor Willis Clock for these improvements.

NAPOLEON

Almost immediately after camp meeting last summer, a ground breaking service initiated the building of a new Sanctuary and Educational Unit. The building is brick construction with laminated arches and truss roof support. Within a few weeks the building will be completed. Pastor Cedric Wilson deserves a great deal of credit inasmuch as he has done much of the labor himself. The new church sets on one-fourth of a city block across from the new Elementary School. Recently an adjoining one-fourth

block was willed to the church with a house and money to remodel it for the parsonage by Mr. Curdes. It is with sorrow I announce the home going of Brother Curdes about three weeks ago.

WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE

Soon after conference last summer, a three bedroom parsonage, with a double garage, was purchased. Prior to the purchase of this property, the church has not owned a parsonage. We rejoice with them as they have taken such a step of progress.

WHITE OAK

Four Sunday School rooms, which also serve as an overflow to the Sanctuary, a new Foyer, Furnace Room and completely remodel Sanctuary are nearly completed. All new aluminum windows replace the old wooden windows in the original structure. Aluminum siding was installed on the old church and new addition. It gives the appearance of an entirely new building. Pastor Walter Forrester has accomplished this with a total indebtedness of only 1,000.00.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S PASTORAL LETTER

General Superintendent Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, Delegates to the Twelfth Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, friends: Greetings.

I have chosen to give a Material Progress report and Personal report, then to read a Pastoral Letter.

By this time most, if not all of you have heard that Sugar Grove Camp Ground was sold just prior to International Conference for the sum of \$27,500.00. After paying the total balance due Eastern Ohio Conference and the mortgage on the District Parsonage, which was a part of our settlement with Eastern Ohio for Sugar Grove, realtors fees, etc., we have a net balance of \$22,040.45. The District Treasurer will give a more detailed financial report of the sale in his report.

Most of you have known that this property has been very difficult to sell. This was due to two factors. Financial Institutions were reluctant to loan the amount of money needed by prospective buyers. If a prospective buyer had been able to

borrow the money, we would have been faced with an attempt to have the property re-zoned, because it was zoned for residential only.

We thank God for sending us a buyer who paid cash and did not request a change in zoning.

Last year the Conference instructed the District Council to select an Insurance Company and initiate a Hospital Insurance Program for the Ministers of the conference. After a careful study, Blue Cross and Blue Shield was selected and April 10, 1966 the program went into effect. The Blue Cross Insurance provides 365 days, Comprehensive Coverage and the Blue Shield provides for a \$400.00 Surgical schedule. The total cost per month for the Minister and his entire family is \$19.00.

Most of our Pastors joined the Group Plan and have this wonderful coverage. Many of our Churches have already taken the opportunity to pay this nominal sum for their Pastor and family. I'm confident the remaining churches will follow this example.

Soon after assuming the duties of this office, three years ago, I made an indepth study of Pastor's Salaries in the conference. The District Statistician reported to the 1963 conference that only **Twelve** churches paid a salary of \$50.00 plus parsonage and utilities. Knowing the most important asset we have is Pastoral Leadership, I knew this picture had to be changed if we expected to build and maintain a strong Ministry. We have many dedicated Pastors who are willing to sacrifice with their congregations but very few are willing to do most, if not all the sacrificing while their Parishioners enjoy the luxuries of our time. Pastor's families have financial needs like every average family. The cost of living is rising sharply but too many salaries have remained static. You expect your Pastor to make a proper presentation of himself in the community. You want him to drive an acceptable car. His children face the extreme cost of a college education, in due time. Our full time Pastors are entitled to **at least** the average wage of their congregation.

Through District gatherings, in the "Western Builder" and when meeting with the individual Church Boards, a presentation of these needs was made. The response to this has been very gratifying. There is still much room for improvement but I take this opportunity to thank the many thinking, concerned laymen of our conference who have accepted the challenge and have greatly changed the total Pastoral Support of the conference.

Three yars ago, the Statistician reported a conference total for Pastoral Support in the amount of \$110,225.59. Each of the past three years have shown a very gratifying increase. For an Eleven Month conference year, total Pastoral Support this year, was \$125,811.58. A Twelve Month conference year should have yielded \$133,248.99. This is a net gain over the past three years of \$27,023.40. It is a percentage gain of 24.5%.

I am aware that part of this is due to better reporting, but also feel sure that the increase is at least 20%. Let us thank God for this increase.

It is no secret that there is a very great shortage of Ministers in our time. This gives me great concern. Without men, we cannot carry on the work, Closely related to this need is the need for a strong Ministerial Training Institution. The Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College, our Zone College, has voted to dedicate itself to the training of Ministers. This summer Rev. James Hertel completed a seven year term as President of the College. The Board has selected Rev. H. John Blann to succeed him. Brother Blann is a stalwart, dedicated, Christian Brother with a keen vision for the training of our Youth for the Ministry. I am asking this Conference to give it's full support to Frankfort Pilgrim College as we face the future together.

Last month, delegates from around the world met at Winona Lake, Indiana for the

25th General Conference and the first International Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. I believe this to be one of the most, if not the most Historic Conferences in the history of our Denomination. National leadership from around the world added greatly to the Spiritual atmosphere of the conference. Newspapers across the Nation carried the affirmative vote of the Wesleyan Methodist General Conference in session in Houghton, New York, to merge with the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the vote taken the following day in the International Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church to merge with the Wesleyans. This move seems to be ordered of the Lord. When such momentous steps are taken, there is always a minority who have reservations. It is no dis-honor to be among the minority. In this particular case, I had some very strong reservations. I felt too many have expected too much from the merge. This merge, if and when consummated, will not change human nature and is no assurance to greater success. On the contrary, if we expect this merge to do for us what only Spiritual Revival can do, then we are apt to see less success than in the past.

While the merge will be effected Organizationally within a relatively short time, the merging of minds will take the greatest part of a generation. However, both of these great bodies have voted to join their forces and in this union we can find an enlarged fellowship and in many areas can serve our Lord more effectively. The effectiveness of this union can be greatly damaged if we do not give it our full support, individually and collectively.

If the Wesleyan Methodist Church confirms their General Conference action in their district conferences and local churches, then I believe we should immediately plan for and support wholeheartedly joint meetings with our Wesleyan Brethren in the bounds of our conference and beyond. Let us remember that some of the Wesleyan Brethren have reservations about us. If we can lay aside any personal prejudice and seek under God to render greater service to our Lord, we may well see a mighty spiritual awakening and revival. Let us not say because of this merge or in spite of this merge, but in conjunction with the merge, Lord, grant us revival.

We live in the Laodicean age. John the Revelator gives a vivid picture and a burning warning of the Laodicean Church. Revelation 3:14-20. "And unto the Angel of the Church of Laodiceans write: These things saith the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of the creation of God; I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou wert cold or hot. So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked: I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and a white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see. As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore and repent. Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him and he with me."

We have prospered financially but we have shown steady decline in many churches in Sunday School attendance, loss in membership, and in too many churches have not seen dynamic, spiritual revival, in the past several years, more years than we want to face up to. No longer is the community stirred to conviction by revivals. Seldom, too seldom are sinners gloriously converted, and believers positively filled with the Holy Ghost.

When we fail to meet these needs, no longer are we needed. When our community is no longer touched by our ministry, it is strong evidence that we lack a positive,

spiritual message. With all of our finery, where are our sheaves? Let us denounce sin, proclaim the Gospel, declare the Second Coming, Preach Repentance and Restitution, warn men of God's wrath and judgment, and prevail in prayer for a Holy Ghost Revival.

In closing this Pastoral Letter, I am asking the Chairman of this conference for the privilege of setting aside our formal business, to gather for United Prayer. I am asking first for every Pastor who wants to see revival, and is willing to obey the Holy Ghost to see revival in his church and community, to join me at the altar. Then I am asking every delegate who desires to see revival and is wiling to let the Holy Ghost have His way in their lives, to join us. Then every friend present is invited to come.

Brethren, we need revival and we need it now, for the coming of the Lord is at hand.

General Superintendent Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, Delegates and Friends of the Twelfth Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District, Greetings!

The past year has unfolded new areas of service in our Missionary Society work. Your Committee chose the theme "A STAR IN THE NIGHT" for the promotion of local missionary society work.

Each society received a poster imprinted with a five point star. Each point on this star represented a project or a goal to be reached during this conference year.

Each society was required to enroll at least 75% of the total lady membership of their church to qualify for the first of the five points.

The second goal was Prayer and Fasting for Missions at home and abroad and

\$...25 per meal to be put in the local missionary society for each meal fasted, which was to be twice a month.

The third point of the star was 50% of the church membership families subscribing to, and reading the Monthly World Missionary Bulletin, the Missionary Society News Sheet and The Western Builder.

Fourth, was District Interests, which included 100% of District Dues to be paid which amounts to \$6.00 per year per Society, to have the equivalent of one-third of the local society present for the District Missionary Convention and participation in all projects of the year. The three district projects chosen were: Fall project, paint for Beech Grove Church in which \$109.70 was given. Mid-winter project, small organs and books for the Philippines, amount given was \$225.83 and the Spring project was folding chairs for our new work at Van Wert, for which we are still receiving contributions.

The fifth and last point of the star included participation in All Church November Self Denial Offering and the All Church Easter Offering.

The co-operation on all of these points were excellent and each society meeting all five goals will receive a gold seal which will be placed in the center of their star.

The three District Missionary Conventions held in May were very well attended. Color slides were shown of the trip made to Jamaica and Grand Cayman by Mrs. Brand and myself.

Let me take this opportunity to thank each of you who gave in the love offering for my missionary trip. It was a very pleasant surprise to me when I returned home. May God bless you for this gesture of kindness.

Those who served on the District Missionary Society Committee were, Mrs. M. H. Robbins, Secretary; Mrs. L. T. Brand, Treasurer; Mrs. D. R. Close and Mrs. C. P. Wilson, Advisory Members. I appreciate the labors of this fine committee.

REPORT OF DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The close of the conference year found the church extension committee with some ten churches under its supervision in a greater or lesser degree. Some of the fields at present require no outlay of district funds—only encouragement and a bit of guidance from the committee in major matters such as pastoral and evangelistic help.

Much of the assistance rendered where financial outlays have been necessary has already been shown in the report of the District Treasurer, as all our funds are held by him and distributed through his department.

Two churches should be mentioned in particular, as one is relatively new and the other is an entirely new project.

BEECH GROVE:

This work came to us largely because a Pilgrim friend had an interest in the community and was willing to invest some of his personal funds in its purchase. Also, the Evangelical United Brethren Conference was willing to sell it for a very small fraction of what it would cost to build it. This large, completely furnished brick church in a prosperous rural community, is now the property of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Two or three small towns are in easy driving distance as well as the rural populace that immediately surrounds it. This should prove a good field in which to labor.

VAN WERT:

This is a new field of labor coming to us largely through the burden and vision of Rev. Albert Huffine. After holding services first in a rural church just out of Van Wert, then in a private home in Van Wert, it was felt that a building was necessary.

A fine location was finally found on Main Street—a residential property with suitable arrangement for the pastor's living quarters, plus a chapel for holding church services. This we were able to purchase for 12,500.00. Five hundred dollars of the down payment was met by the local congregation and they are paying \$40.00 of the \$70.00 monthly payments.

It should be pointed out here that this building has value as a residential property and no changes are anticipated that would have a devaluating effect. Therefore every dollar we place in the property is building equity for the district. We hope with this fine location and able leadership to see a permanent work develop in this fine city.

Mention should be made here of the liberality shown at the missionary conventions which almost, if not completely, underwrote the remaining \$1,500.00 that was needed for the down payment. One thousand dollars was already in the Treasurer's hand from the sale of a property in Van Wert and was available to be used for this purchase.

Under God, this new work should become a real lighthouse in that area.

We covet the prayers and cooperation of this conference that we may be able to strengthen these churches under our supervision at this time, and in His time, to enter new and fruitful fields of labor.

JOINT RESOLUTION OF RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES:

INASMUCH as there is a need to remodel the present District Parsonage or to build a new District Parsonage,

BE IT RESOLVED: that this conference give power to the District Council to make the necessary alterations of the present parsonage, not to exceed \$5,000.00 expenditure; and,

That the money for this expenditure be raised by a budget of \$1.00 per member.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That, if the District Council deems it unwise, after investigation, to remodel the present parsonage, they shall bring to this conference next year a blueprint, with its specifications, and several bids of cost for the building of a new parsonage, and that said information shall be the basis of action of this conference at that time.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.

B. That all money raised in the local churches for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, except Pension moneys which are sent directly to the General Headquarters' Pension Office.

C. That after April 1, 1967, each local church treasurer send all Pension money directly to the General Headquarters' Pension office.

D. That the District Treasurer send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget at least six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since many of our Pastors and Churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to standards required by the state, therefore be it resolved that:

A. The District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of qualified men who shall meet with him for the purpose of counsel and advice at each church or new location where church property is to be erected.

B. A committee shall be chosen for each zone or section as necessary so that the men may be familiar with the territory.

C. This committee shall report to the Council as to its findings.

No. 3 CAMP AND CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Whereas many of our pastors and laymen who attend the annual conference do not get to attend the camp services due to various demands at home, and due to the added expense of having our conference either ahead of or after the camp; and since we have only a few campers who attend the day services of camp;

A. Therefore, be it resolved that we request our council to set the camp and conference as follows:

(1) That our camp begin on Friday evening before the last full week of July.

(2) That our district conference begin on the first Monday of camp at 9:00 a.m., with the following schedule: Monday 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.;

Tuesday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; in the event business cannot be completed by 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, a further session may be held Wednesday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

(3) That the evening evangelistic camp services continue on schedule during the conference, with the exception of Tuesday evening, which is set aside for the Ordination Service.

(4) That the District Youth Convention convene as per schedule on Friday, with its conference being held on Saturday.

(5) That the regular camp service schedule resume after the close of the District Conference.

(6) That services be provided for the children during the conference.

B. All who rent a room or a cot at camp shall furnish their own linens.

C. Our camp schedule shall be arranged to provide one service for World Missions, one for General Church Extension and one for District Church Extension at times to be set by the District Council.

D. In order to prevent disturbance on the camp ground during the camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep peace. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.

E. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention camp and conference; also that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's convention as well as the camp.

No. 4 CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COUNCIL

In order to promote a better method of coordination of the non-professional teaching interests of the church, including Sunday School, P.Y.S., C.Y.C., and P.E.L.T., and in accordance with the plan set forth by the 1966 International Conference,

A. Be it resolved that a Christian Education Council be formed in our district with the District Superintendent as chairman and the following membership: Assistant District Superintendent, District Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools, District Youth President, District Director of PELT, District CYC Director, and one member-at-large. The latter shall be nominated by the District Council and elected by the conference. It is recommended, where possible, that the member-at-large be a professional educator.

B. This council shall meet regularly at the call of the chairman, and at its first meeting of the year, shall organize itself with a secretary and other necessary officers.

C. This council shall be authorized, under the direction of the District Council, to promote the program of the Department of General Sunday Schools and Youth, and to make long-range plans for the coordination of the interests of the various departments it represents. It shall not supplant any of the various district boards represented by it.

No. 5 CONFERENCE BAR

A. The conference bar shall consist of the two south sections of seats back to the center aisle, and the platform.

No. 6 CONFERENCE YEAR

A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician must have sufficient time to prepare his

report for the Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close May 31st and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than June 10th.

B. Dates of quarters of the fiscal year shall be June through August, September through November, December through February, and March through May.

C. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes on May 31st, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close on June 5th.

No. 7 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.

No. 8 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a voucher.

E. Be it further resolved that all minister's phone numbers be carried in the Ministerial Directory.

No. 9 DISTRICT COUNCIL

A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a quorum.

B. Be it resolved that our entire District Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.

C. Be it further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 10 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 11 DISTRICT PROGRAMS

A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following conference, for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work, Local, District and General.

B. Be it resolved that each local church be urged to strive for a ten per cent membership gain this conference year.

C. Be it further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

its 10% gain in membership be given an honor roll certificate. Be it further resolved that the ten highest in numerical gain and the ten highest in percentage gain be recognized publicly during the conference, and be listed in the conference journal.

No. 12 FRANKFORT PILGRIM COLLEGE

A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be one of the two representatives from the Western Ohio District to the Board of Directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

B. The second representative to said Board of Directors shall be appointed by the Council.

No. 13 MINISTERS

A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.

B. Be it resolved that all pastors encourage local preachers to pursue their course of study according to the Manual, Sections 143, 206, 210 and 211. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend the District Conference .

C. We recommend that our licensed ministers present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the Examining Board, at the appointed time of their meeting with this Board.

No. 14 MINISTERS HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

Be it resolved that the District Ministerial Hospitalization Group Plan be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent.

No. 15 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.

B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 16 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.

B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.

C. The location of this convention should be under the direction of the District Council.

No. 17 MISSIONS

A. Be it resolved that our District Church Extension Committee be composed of five members, consisting of the District Superintendent, two members of the District Council (to be appointed by the Council), and two members to be elected by the Conference from outside the council.

Any pastor serving under the District Church Extension Board shall be disqualified from election or appointment to that Board.

B. This committee shall be responsible for the execution of the District Church Extension program as approved by the District Council and shall report annually to the District Conference.

C. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.

D. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.

E. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Church Extension projects.

F. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Church Extension Project.

G. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in new fields.

H. All District Church Extension funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer.

I. Combined District Church Extension and Missionary Society conventions shall be held in two or three strategic areas in the district, and all monies received during these conventions shall be divided equally, except that which is given for a specific place or department.

No. 18 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 19 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

A. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.

B. The time of ordination shall be the order of business on Tuesday night of Conference.

No. 20 PASTORS

A. Calling of:

(1) Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.

(2) To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.

(3) Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.

(4) Be it resolved the the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the last Sunday of June.

(5) Because the present setup in voting on the recall of pastors covers a considerable length of time, making it difficult for the superintendent to make a recommendation when a pastor is not recalled:

(a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent set a date when all churches in the District, wherever the pastor hopes to continue, shall vote on the recalling of the same, and notify the District Superintendent of the results of the vote. This ruling need not apply where the pastor had notified the District Superintendent and the church that he expects to move, or when the pastor has a call for two or more years with unexpired time.

B. Support of:

(1) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.

(2) Inasmuch as moving pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage, due to varied facilities: Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church owned parsonages.

(3) Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastor a two week vacation with pay, and that time for pastor to take said vacation be decided by the Church Board and pastor.

(4) Be it resolved that no pastor take more than two revivals, of not more than 10 or 12 days each, per year away from his church in addition to his two weeks of vacation.

No. 21 PASTOR CALLS

Be it resolved that each visit to a home, and each person ministered to in a hospital or elsewhere be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 22 PILGRIM MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Whereas the strength of the church is in her unity, fellowship and common purpose, and

Whereas our attitude toward material needs of the church is a fairly accurate measure of our devotion to God, and

Whereas increasing demands upon both time and ability compel men to reach well beyond their reasonable capacities, and

Whereas the demands of these days call for the best both in qualifications and in dedication, and

Whereas material pressures consistently and sorely limit our leadership in their outreach toward the spiritual needs of our people, which needs are of first and final importance,

Therefore, be it resolved that a Pilgrim Men's Fellowship be organized in the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, in accord with the format of the Miami Valley Pilgrim Men's Fellowship.

Be it further resolved that a District Coordinator be appointed by the District Council, whose duties shall be to help organize the fellowship in churches and/or zones and to coordinate the total program of said organization within the District.

Format of Constitution of Miami Valley Men's Fellowship:

Name of Organization:

- a. Pilgrim Men's Fellowship

Purpose of Organization:

- a. To give practical expression to Christian fellowship
- b. To enlarge the scope of service to Christ and the church
- c. To emphasize witnessing, especially to men and boys.

Form of government or administration:

- a. This fellowship shall be governed by a Board of Directors.
- b. This Board of Directors shall be comprised of two men from each affiliated church. Said two representatives shall be selected under the direction of the local church board.
- c. The members of the Board of Directors shall elect a President, vice-president, secretary and treasurer from their own ranks, who shall continue in office for one year or until their successor has been elected.
- d. The Board of Directors may delegate routine matters to the Executive Committee comprised of the officers of the Board of Directors.
- e. The local church representatives shall be elected or appointed for the period of one year. They may be elected to succeed themselves, depending on the policy of the local church board.
- f. By virtue of his office it must be recognized that the District Superintendent is ex-officio chairman of the Board of Directors.
- g. An affiliated pastor shall be elected each year to serve as an active member and advisor of the Board of Directors. Said affiliated pastor shall be a member of the executive committee.
- h. Consideration may be given to having a Member-at-large on the Board of Directors to be elected by the body of the fellowship.
- i. All members of the Board of Directors shall be members in good standing of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Meetings: Preferably once a month—time and place to be set by the Board of Directors.

No. 23 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 24 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least

thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.

No. 25 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers.

No. 26 STANDARDS

A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.

C. The local church shall direct all activities of the church toward the spiritual, moral, and social maturity of its people.

D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that we urge our ministers and laity to DILIGENTLY guard their hearts and homes against the subtle influence of this modern media.

No. 27 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH PROMOTIONS

A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends that the state conferences provide for a District Sunday School committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee, and,

B. Whereas the "Decade of Progress" is the Sunday School program of our church, and whereas the program is so practical in many areas for every church school, and since it is unfair to the future leaders of our churches and schools for the present leaders to fail to co-operate, Be it resolved that the conference urge our churches to participate.

C. Inasmuch as our District annually has some type of Sunday School convention, and since it is generally held some time in the fall, therefore, be it resolved that we designate the first week of November as District Sunday School Promotion Week; further, be it resolved that the District Sunday School Convention be held during that week.

D. Since it is difficult to have a convention which draws a crowd sufficient to merit obtaining an outstanding speaker, therefore be it resolved that all churches be asked to plan their revivals in the future so as not to conflict with the Sunday School week; further, that the District Superintendent remind the church boards of this resolution when he meets with them relative to their local plans.

E. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our district churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.

F. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

G. Be it resolved that separate Sunday School Institutes and Youth Institutes be held at different times, in such areas of the District as may be convenient.

No. 28 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the District Superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the District.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, be a member of the District Board of Trustees.
- C. The District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.
- D. The District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be a member of the Board of Directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

No. 29 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 30 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 31 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp rent be paid out of the camp and conference fund already voted upon by this conference.

No. 32 APPRECIATION

A. Be it resolved that we extend to our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.

B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, Members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, Educational and Examining Committees, cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.

C. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

A. Be it resolved that everyone attending Camp and Conference be given a work assignment by the Camp Registrar, except General Officials, Evangelistic Workers, special guests, delegates to conference, children 13 years of age and under, and any others deemed excusable by the Camp Registrar.

B. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free.

C. That all visitors attending the annual conference be charged a reasonable sum for

meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers and their wives.

D. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimburse their delegate for traveling.

E. That the charge for rooms and cottages for camp and conference be as follows:

(1) \$8.00 and up for the entire time or \$2.00 and up per night.

(2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time, or \$1.00 per day.

(3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.

(4) Renters of cottages for the entire camp shall pay an electricity fee of \$1.00 per cottage.

F. Be it resolved that the registrar notify cottage renters by the first of May to inquire whether they desire to retain their cottage for the camp. If no reply is received by the registrar within 30 days, the cottage may be rented to others on the waiting list.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; enlist throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give one days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$5.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by the district council.

No. 5 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

A. Be it resolved that the equity from the sale of the Sugar Grove Camp at Springfield, Ohio, in the amount of \$22,040.45 be placed in the District Church Extension Loan Fund to further promote Church Extension within the District.

B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.

C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.

D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of six per cent per annum.

E. What The Loan Fund Can Do

(1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.

(2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.

(3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.

(4) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The money will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

A. Be it resolved that each local society or church be requested to pay 50 cents per month for the promotion of the District Missionary Society.

No. 8 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 9 MINISTERS DUTIES

A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 10 MINISTERS HOSPITAL-SURGICAL INSURANCE

A. Be it resolved that an operational budget of 25c per member per year be raised for the said plan.

B. Be it further resolved that we urge each local church to pay the premium for its pastor under this plan.

C. Be it further resolved that the District pay for the District Superintendent's Hospital-Surgical premium under this plan.

No. 11 MINUTES

A. Be it resolved that the price of the minutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.

B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$75.00 for these services.

No. 12 PARSONAGE

Be it resolved that we pay \$1.00 per member per year towards the remodeling of the present, or building of a new District parsonage.

No. 13 SALARIES

A. District Superintendent

(1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$110.00 per week, 7c per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities, and three weeks vacation with pay.

(2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

(3) Be it resolved that the District enroll the District Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan and Ministerial Benefit as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.

B. District Council

Be it resolved that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council, and all other officers and committeemen, when traveling in authorized District work.

C. District Treasurer and Secretary.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurers' Salary be \$600.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$250.00.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 14 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund

The following United Stewardship Fund, in accordance with action of the 1966 International Conference, is to be raised by our Conference and its local churches:

B. District Budget

(1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interest of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offerings received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

(2) Be it resolved that we raise 75 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.

(3) Inasmuch as zoning arrangements concerning Frankfort Pilgrim College have been reached to the satisfaction of the General Board and the District Council, therefore be it resolved that we raise \$1 per member per year for the Frankfort Pilgrim College.

(4) Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.25 per member per year to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.

(5) Be it resolved that we ask each church to raise \$3.00 per member per year for Camp and Conference operations.

(6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe.

(7) Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths for the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

(8) Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their district obligations without good reasons shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

(9) The following chart shall be used as a guide for local church treasurers in paying the district budget:

(10) Be it resolved that the District Council appoint a committee of three to study our budget system and present to the next District Conference a "one figure" budget which would include tithe, district budget and United Stewardship Fund, based on the financial strength of each church.

No. 15 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH INSTITUTES

Inasmuch as it has been recommended by the District Council, be it resolved that we raise 50c per member per year for the Sunday School and Youth Institute.

No. 16 TREASURER

A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books—Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer, the audit to be made after the books have been closed on June 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

No. 17 YOUTH

A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.

B. That the expenses of the Youth Convention and Conference be paid from the camp operation fund.

C. Be it resolved that the young people who receive free entertainment at our District Youth Convention and/or Conference be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00. Delegates to the Youth conference are to be excluded from the payment of this fee. Be it further resolved that the monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

REPORT OF DISTRICT AUDITING COMMITTEE

We, the Auditing Committee of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, accept the audit of our District funds as prepared by the Public Accountant, Marion L. YOUTH CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Twelfth Annual Youth Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was opened with Rev. M. H. Robbins leading in singing "It Is Mine."

We were led in prayer by Rev. Hugh Mosher.

The presiding officer for this Conference, Rev. Charles Felsburg, introduced the speaker of the hour, Rev. H. John Blann, president of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

Rev. Blann spoke about "Our Daring Tasks" carrying out the commission of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. The Scripture used was Acts 1:1-11. The development of the address included: What is our task? Workman for the task, Enablement for the task, Extent of the task, Motivation for the task, and Termination of the task.

The conference was called to order by Rev. Felsburg and the Secretary proceeded with the calling of the roll. The following officers were present: Rev. Charles Felsburg, District Superintendent; Rev. L. T. Brand, District Youth President; Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, District Vice President; Rev. Stanley Booher, District Treasurer, and Mr. James Booher, District Secretary.

Also 27 pastors, 16 Youth Presidents and 37 delegates answered the roll call of churches.

A motion carried that the conference bar consist of the platform, the center and south sections extending back to the aisle.

The time for adjournment was set at 12:00 and the time for re-convening at 1:30 p.m.

Rev. L. T. Brand read his fine report for this past year and was given a standing vote of thanks.

The auditors report was presented by Rev. Verl Light, Secretary of this committee.

The Treasurer's report, a detailed one, was read by the Youth Treasurer, Rev. Stanley Booher. This fine report was received by the conference.

Reports of the Zone Chairmen were given and were received upon motion.

After being presented to the conference, a standing vote of thanks was given the Youth Presidents for their fine reports.

Rev. Felsburg then commented on the joy found in serving Christ. He said that we should instill Christian fiber in our youth; build not only for today but also for tomorrow. Responsibility must be shared by young people as well as adults in the Christian life. Teenagers need guidance and worthwhile goals. Youth is looking for an anchor.

We were adjourned with prayer by Rev. L. T. Brand.

Rev. Charles Felsburg re-convened the Youth Conference at 1:30 p.m.

A member from the King's Crusaders of Owosso College led the conference in singing "Joy Unspeakable". The King's Crusaders then sang a special song, "The Answer Came."

Rev. Stanley Booher led the conference in prayer.

The song "I Wouldn't Take Nothing For My Journey Now" was sung by the King's Crusaders.

The report of the Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees was read by Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz.

Under No. 2, Committees, a resolution carried to change the words "Annual business meeting" to read "District Youth Conference."

A motion carried to delete section No. 6 entitled Statistician.

Under No. 8, Youth Council, a resolution passed in which paragraph B was revised concerning college tours.

No. 8-C, Youth Council, was deleted on motion.

A motion carried concerning No. 10, Youth President, relative to his visiting the zones annually.

Under No. 13, Zone Program, Paragraph B was deleted on motion.

A motion concerning the re-zoning of the Western Ohio District into three zones carried.

Under No. 1-C, (Ways and Means Report) a motion carried changing the rate paid for travelling done by the District Youth President.

Under No. 1-D, Executive Fund, a motion also carried to increase the reimbursement for travel expense for each Youth Council member.

A motion carried under No. 4-A, Youth Camp, concerning increasing the Youth Camp fee.

A resolution passed recommending that the District Conference pay the rental on the camp ground in behalf of the Youth Camp.

A resolution carried that the former Zone Treasurer's balances be divided equitably between the three new zones of the District.

Rev. L. T. Brand was elected District Youth President on the first ballot. Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz was elected District Youth Vice President on the third ballot. Rev. Stanley Booher was elected District Youth Treasurer on the first ballot. Mr. James Booher was elected District Youth Secretary on the first ballot, after which he resigned. Rev. Kenneth Whitescarver was then elected to this position on the third ballot.

The conference was divided into the new zone areas for the election of Zone Chairman and other Zone officers.

The Northern Zone elections were as follows: President, Rev. M. H. Robbins; Vice-President, Rev. Ted Wilson; Treasurer, Ruth Armstrong, and Secretary, Rev. Ronald Travis. The Central Zone elections follow: President, Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz; Vice-President, Rev. Verl Light; Treasurer, Harold Longfellow, and Secretary, Murlyn Enlow. The Southern Zone elected: President, Rev. Wallace Marshall; Vice-President, Rev. Willis Clock; Treasurer, Paul Powell, and Secretary, James Stevens.

A motion to authorize the Executive Youth Council to read, correct, and approve the minutes was carried.

A resolution of appreciation was submitted by the Resolutions Committee thanking Rev. Charles Felsburg for his very fine leadership in this 1966 Conference.

At 5:00 p.m. the conference was adjourned by prayer offered by Rev. Charles Felsburg.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Rev. Charles Felsburg, chairman, and delegates of the 1966 Western Ohio District Youth Conference.

It has been an unspeakable joy to work with the youth of our district this past year. We have experienced splendid co-operation and spiritual enthusiasm from the many good pastors and youth leaders of Western Ohio. We humbly thank God for His divine blessings and help this year.

Highlighting the district youth activities for this year were, the Owosso College trip, senior banquet, and the district youth camp.

The Owosso tour began after school on Thursday, October 21, from the Mulberry Church. Progressing northward in a church bus graciously loaned to us by the Springfield First Church, all 49 members of the tour were aboard and Owosso bound by 9:00 p.m. The reception and hospitality of the Owosso College students and staff made the trip an almost unforgettable experience.

It is our prayer that the energy expended in the organization of this trip will cause many of our young people to attend Owosso College. It is also our prayer that every young person in our district planning to attend college will choose a Christian college and to this end we freely give ourselves.

On April 16 at the West Carrollton High School, 35 high school seniors from the Western Ohio District were honored in the annual senior banquet. "Projecting Grace Age into the Space Age" was the theme of the banquet. Over 170 people attended this banquet. Rev. Wm. Gilkerson highlighted the evening with a message entitled, "Senior, Relax, and Live." We wish to thank the banquet committee composed of Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, Mr. Vera Close, and Mrs. Virginia Ferguson for their many hours of labor to make this a success.

Not enough could be said about the district youth camp held from June 27 to July 1, 1966, which was acclaimed a success by both campers and counselors. We praise God for the hundred or more young people that were at an altar of prayer during the camp. Over 250 youth and 35 teachers and counselors graced this campground during that eventful week.

I wish to thank my good wife, Mrs. Rachelle Brand, Rev. Charles Felsburg, and the District Youth Council along with the many others who have helped in the promotion of the work of the youth this year.

I requested the District Council to refrain from the nomination of my name for the District Youth Presidency this coming year but after the splendid co-operation of the pastors, parents, and young people of the district in our youth camp, I have given this reconsideration. However, to be fair with you I must tell you that it would be impossible to visit each zone twice a year as outlined in our minutes and perhaps I will be unable to visit some areas even once. The duties of my pastorate are my primary calling and I feel this must not suffer. I love the youth of our district and feel that the district youth president's time should be concentrated on the three areas in which I have reported.

As we look to the future we are concerned about the lack of interest in youth rallies in some areas of our district. I offer as a suggestion that study should be made of dividing the district into three or four zones rather than eight and then have about four master rallies each year striving for large attendances with outstanding programs. Some districts advocate having a Saturday afternoon rally, a potluck supper and an evening service. We feel it is imperative that the young people of our district become well acquainted with each other and intermingle in such fellowships. This I would offer as a recommendation for the improvement of the overall district youth program.

Thank you for the opportunity of serving Christ in this challenging capacity.

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone Chairmen be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the District Youth Conference as possible. The Reports of these committees are to be sent to each church thirty days prior to Youth Conference.

No. 3 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develop a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather and co-ordinate Youth News for the WESTERN BUILDER.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program, the plans, dates, and administration of which are to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp begin on Monday of the last full week of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.

B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.

No. 7 YOUTH COUNCIL

A. Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times each year, the last Saturday of October and the first Saturday of February, and the officers of the district be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.

B. Be it resolved that the Youth Council promote annual tours to Frankfort and Owosso Colleges alternately.

No. 8 SENIOR BANQUET

A. Be it resolved that a senior Banquet be planned by the Youth Council. The time of said banquet shall be the third Saturday of April, place and price per person to be set by the council. It is recommended that the local church pay for the meals for their seniors.

B. Be it resolved that the project fund include payment for the speaker of said banquet.

No. 9 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone once annually.

No. 10 YOUTH PROJECT

Be it resolved that our youth project for this year be the buying of some permanent teaching aids and recreational equipment for the Youth Camp.

No. 11 YOUTH TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed June 10 and the Youth Council appoint an auditing committee.

No. 12 ZONE

A. In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President, and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.

B. Be it resolved that this conference rezone our District into three youth zones, these zones to be the Northern, Central, and Southern.

C. Be it further resolved that youth rallies on the zone level be held quarterly, and that a program having tremendous drawing attraction be offered to the young people. It is also suggested that these rallies be held on Saturday with an afternoon service, a potluck supper, and an evening service.

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Charles Felsburg for his very fine leadership in this conference.

YOUTH WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.

- B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$7.50 a year to maintain the fund.
- C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed seven cents (7 cts.) per mile for traveling expense.
- D. A motion carried to increase the reimbursement for travel expense of each Youth Council member from six cents (6 cts.) to seven cents (7 cts.) per mile.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special project approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.50 to be paid by each church.
- B. Be it further resolved that the District Youth Treasurer be given the power to draw from this fund for other funds, if necessary, subject to the approval of the Executive Youth Council.
- C. Be it resolved that the project fund include payment for the speaker of the Senior Banquet.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

- A. Be it resolved that each zone be responsible for raising of \$10.00 per church for the executive and project funds. Said money includes an executive fund of \$7.50 and a project fund of \$2.50, stated under No.1 (B) and No. 2(A),
- B. Be it further resolved that each zone endeavor to send at least one-half of the amount to the District Youth Treasurer not later than November 1st, and the final one-half not later than February 1st.

No. 4 YOUTH CAMP

- A. Be it resolved that the price of Youth Camp per family be as follows:
Ten dollars for one young person; nine dollars each for two young persons; and eight dollars each for three or more young persons.
- B. Be it further resolved that the amount of 50c be added to the admission fee for all late registrations.
- C. Be it resolved that this Conference recommend to the District Conference that the rental of the Campgrounds for the District Youth Camp be paid from District Funds, since the Youth Camp did not have a financial obligation for Camp Ground rental, when the Youth Camp was held at Springfield on the Sugar Grove Campground.

No. 5 YOUTH COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the admission fee for the Senior Banquet be paid when the reservation is sent (no refund to be given).

No. 6 FORMER ZONES FINANCIAL DISBURSEMENT

Be it resolved that the former Zone Treasurer's balances be divided by the number of churches which were in the former zone, and these amounts be transferred to the new Zone Treasurer into which zone the churches are now affiliated.

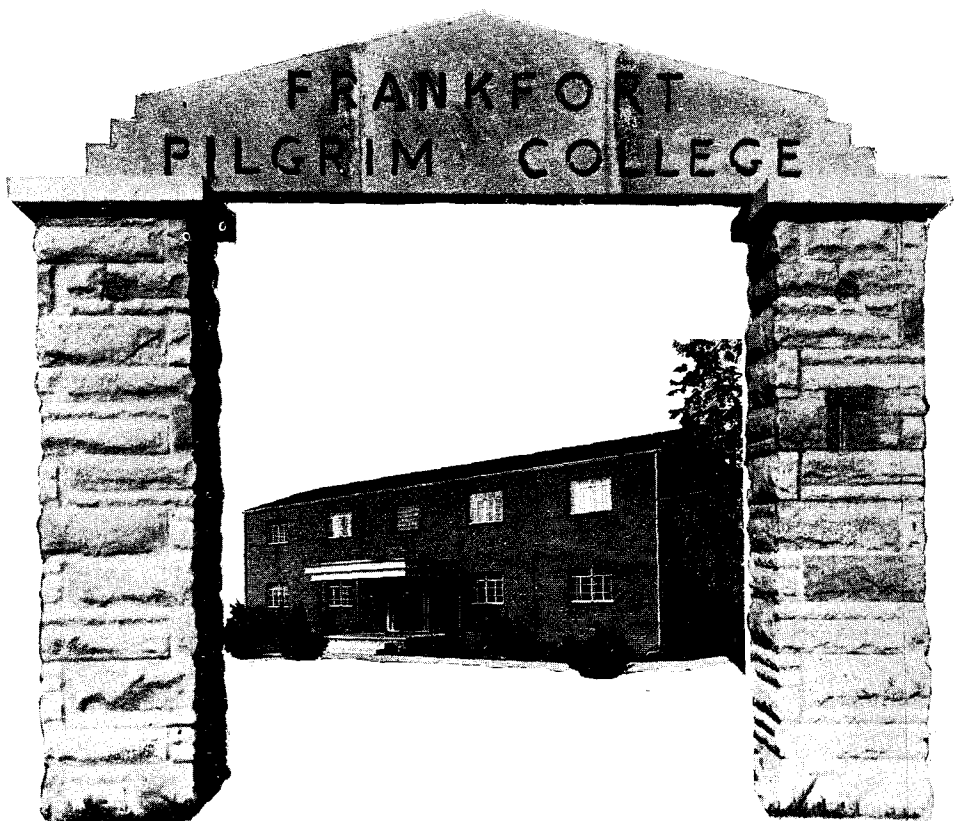

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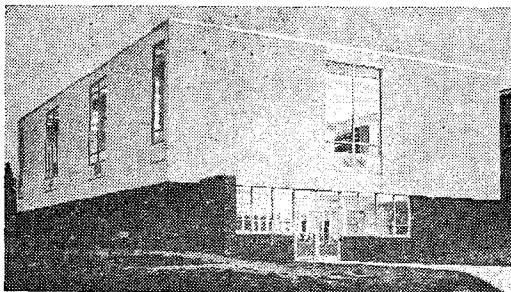
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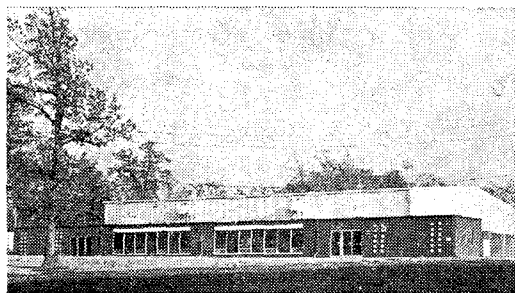
