PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

Fifth Annual Assembly of the California District.

First Meeting, Tuesday, May 31, 2 P.M.

The Fifth Annual District Assembly was called to order by the General Superintendent, Rev. Seth C. Rees, at 2 P.M. Brother C. C. Waterman read the Scripture and Brother Rees prayed. The first meeting was marked by the divine approval of God and a spirit of co-operation and brotherly love.

The Chairman made a brief speech on the standards of a Holiness Assembly. He then introduced Brother Nering, Pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Phoenix, Arizona, who spoke a few words. Brother Miner, Pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Fresno, was introduced and gave his testimony. Brother Dixon, Pastor of the Newberg Church, Ore., and his wife, were introduced and each testified to the saving power of God.

The Assembly was led in the song, "Rock of Ages," by Brother Edwards.

It was moved and carried to dispense with the reading of the Minutes. It was moved and carried that the Assembly Bar be the seats in front of the rear posts.

The rules of the General Assembly as outlined in the Manual were

adopted as the rules of the Assembly.

It was moved and carried that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to nominate all Assembly committees.

It was moved and seconded to have a morning meeting from 9:30 to 11:45. Carried; and an afternon meeting from 1:30 to 4:00. Carried. By vote of the Assembly, Mrs. W. R. Miner was made a lay delegate

from Fresno.

The Chair now announced the Committee on Nominations. They were: Brother Hodgin, Mrs. Scogin, and J. P. Coleman. On motion, Brother Waterman was added. They retired in order to make out a list of Committees.

Reports were now heard.

Brother Nering gave his reports for the church in Phoenix, which showed a remarkable growth for so young a church. The reports were adopted.

Mrs. Waterman gave a verbal report.

Brother Dixon reported for the work in Newberg, Oregon, which is also a new work. Adopted.

Brother George C. Wise gave his ministerial report and also the District Treasurer's report, both of which were adopted.

Moved and carried that the pastors be strongly urged to see that all

money raised for the District or General expenses pass through the District Treasurer's hands.

The statistical report of the Pasadena Church was read and adopted. It was moved and carried that the Secretary be allowed to select his own assistant.

Mrs. Evans gave her deaconess report showing considerable work in Long Beach.

Moved and carried that the time be extended ten minutes in order to hear the report of the Nominating Committee.

The Secretary asked to be excused from the Statistical Committee and the Board of Education. This was granted. Brother Augsbury was substituted on the Statistical Committee.

With these changes the nominations were ratified.

On a carried motion the Assembly stood adjourned to 9:30 Wednesday morning.

Second Meeting, Wednesday, June 1, 9:30 A.M.

The second meeting was opened with a song led by Rev. O. R. Sickler. Brother Coleman prayed.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and approved as read.

It was moved and seconded that because of the change from the College Chapel to the Church auditorium, the Conference Bar be the first five rows of the two middle sections of seats. Carried.

On a carried motion, Professor Krag was added to the Board of Education. It was moved and carried that Alexander Krag serve for three years, Rev. J. R. Gardner for two years, and Rev. J. Preston Lane for one year.

The roll was now called and some additional names given.

Brother Rees spoke on the necessity of each one taking part in the necessary business of carrying on the Church work. He concluded with a verbal report of his work.

Brother Sickler, District Superintendent, made his report which was adopted.

Brother Hodgin, pastor of the First Church of Pasadena, made his report for himself and Mrs. Hodgin. Report adopted.

Brother Waterman reported for the Belvedere Gardens Church. Mrs. Waterman's report was included with his. Reports adopted.

Brother Miner reported for the Fresno Church. Reports adopted. The report of the District Foreign Missionary Treasurer was read and

showed some gain over last year. Report adopted.

By action of the Assembly, Mrs. Murphree was made a lay delegate

to the Assembly from Rialto.

The Pasadena Finance and Sunday School reports were read and adopted.

The Rialto Church reports were read and adopted.

The San Bernardino Sunday School reports were read and adopted.

The following ministerial reports were read and adopted: A. C. Augsbury, Carl Dauel, Walter Carrithers, H. L. Blake, Carl Hodgin, J. A. Murphree, W. R. Phillips, and Perry Wilson.

The election of District officers was made the special order of the day

at ten o'clock, Thursday.

On a carried motion, the Assembly stood adjourned to 1:30 in the afternoon.

Third Meeting, Wednesday, June 1, 1:30 P.M.

Rev. Ralph Steelhead led the devotions. The Minutes were then read and approved as read.

The following reports were read and adopted: W. L. Surbrook, L. H. Brown, Alta Loma Church, William Chambers, N. R. Barker, Helen Cooper, Frank Henry, Kennis McCurdy and Stanley Weber.

Rev. M. Walton, a minister of the Nazarene Church, was given a seat in the Conference Bar.

Rev. E. B. Galloway's report was read and adopted.

Mrs. Scogin made her report which was adopted.

A motion was made and seconded to allow Mrs. Scogin twenty-five dollars for incidental expenses in connection with her work in the jails of Los Angeles.

Mrs. Rees' report broke up the meeting, and a time of singing and

rejoicing followed.

Mrs. Yorba and Mrs. Jacobson each made her report which was adopted.

At this point a song was sung and another time of refreshing from

God was enjoyed.

The matter of the publishing the Minutes was taken up and after some discussion, three hundred copies were ordered published, the copies as well as the expense to be apportioned among the Churches.

Brother W. L. Troyer was added to the Examining Board. It was moved and carried to adjourn for ten minutes.

The Olinda Church reports were read and adopted.

Rev. J. P. Coleman, our Senior Elder, made his report which was adopted.

Rev. Mr. Wells, a Nazarene minister, was recognized and given the privileges of the floor.

The following ministerial reports were read and adopted: Luther Estes, Brother and Sister H. W. Galloway, J. Harold Goss and Mrs. Carl Dauel.

The Board on Examinations recommended for license the following: Helen Burkholder, Mrs. Thomas Norris, Mrs. Florence Scofield, Herbert Trafton, and Mr. and Mrs. Dow Wright.

Brother Troyer gave his report which was adopted.

Brother Miner made a supplementary report of the jail work. The Fresno Church, under Brother Miner's direction, has clothed, fed, visited, and prayed with hundreds in the County jail. This report was adopted and ordered included with the others.

It was moved and carried that the time for the ordination service be

Sunday morning at 10:45.

Brother Hodgin, pastor of the Pasadena Church, offered the prayer meeting to the Assembly.

On a carried motion, the offer was accepted.

On a carried motion, the meeting stood adjourned.

Fourth Meeting, Thursday, June 2, 9:30 A.M.

The Scripture reading was given by the members of the Assembly. Brother Troyer led in prayer.

On a carried motion, the calling of the roll was dispensed with.

The Minutes were read and approved as corrected.

The matter of where and when to hold the next District Assembly

was taken up and discussed. A motion to hold the Assembly in Belvedere Gardens on the last Tuesday of May was lost.

The motion was made and carried to hold the next Assembly in Pasadena. Another carried motion set the date for the fifth of June.

The report of Rev. Christopher Stone was read and adopted.

A letter from Brother and Sister Burnsides was read. They have been working in Texas and have had good results.

The time set for the election of officers having arrived, Brothers Dixon and Wise were appointed by the Chair to act as tellers.

On the first ballot, Brother Sickler, our present District Superintendent, was re-elected, Brother Waterman receiving the next highest number of votes. It was moved and carried that Brother Waterman be declared elected Assistant District Superintendent.

It was moved and carried that we suspend the rules and that the Chair be instructed to cast the ballot for Walter H. Adams as District Secre-

It was moved and carried to suspend the rules and instruct the Secre-

tary to cast the ballot for George C. Wise for District Treasurer.

Professor Krag was elected District Missionary Treasurer in the same manner. Mrs. Krag was elected Assistant District Missionary Treasurer.

It was moved and seconded to place three name on one ballot for the three additional members of the District Council. Carried. The three receiving a majority on the first ballot were: G. A. Hodgin, J. P. Coleman, and Seth C. Rees.

It was moved and carried that we elect a Rescue Board.

It was moved and carried that the Assembly Committees be made the District Boards wherever there might be corresponding Boards, with the proviso that before the Boards be ratified, opportunity be given for the

adding or subtracting of names from each.

The Rescue and Foreign Missionary Boards were ratified without change. To the Home Missionary Committee was added Brother Sickler's

Brother Augsbury was elected auditor.

It was moved and carried to elect a District Board of Trustees of three members. A second motion that the Chair nominate these, was passed.

It was moved and carried that each Church take an offering every

quarter for the District Superintendent.

It was moved and carried that each officer, minister, and deaconess be required to mail one copy of his report to the District Secretary before the Assembly, and bring one with him. Lost.

The East Pasadena Church gave its statistical report. Report adopted.

Mrs. Hodgin reported that at the General Assembly, the California delegation pledged one month's salary (one hundred and fifty dollars) for the Editor of the Advocate. It was moved and carried to apportion this sum among the churches.

The Chair now nominated the Board of Trustees. These were: George C. Wise, Charles C. Waterman, and W. L. Troyer. On a carried motion

these were ratified.

The Chair spoke on the need of helping financially the work in Phoenix, Arizona. The people gave hilariously and soon more than one hundred and fifty dollars was subscribed.

The doxology was sung and the meeting stood adjourned.

Fifth Meeting, Thursday, June 2, 1:30 P.M.

Brother Nering conducted the devotions. Brother Dixon led in prayer. There then followed a short time of testifying and praising the Lord.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as cor-

Rev. Eli Reece, a Friends minister, was recognized and given the privileges of the floor. He spoke about a proposed Union Camp Meeting

Ground which could be used by all those Holiness bodies participating. Moved and carried to make the consideration of the question the order of the day for Friday morning.

Brother Bland, a Nazarene minister, was recognized by the Assembly

and given the opportunity to speak.

The Examining Board recommended the following for renewal of licenses to preach: Mr. and Mrs. George Burnsides, Mrs. Eva Dauel, N. R. Barker, L. W. Brown, Helen Cooper, William Chambers, Luther Estes, Harold Goss, Gladys Grout, Gene Gandier, Ruth Hocking, Frank Henry, Leroy Hutchings, Edna Kincaid, Kennis McCurdy, R. K. Storey, James Stives, Stanley Weber, and F. R. Yoder; and the following for renewal of license to do deaconess work: Mrs. Mary Burt, Mrs. Rhoda Bucey, Mrs. Flora Evans, and Mrs. Jacobson.

The report was adopted as a whole.

The examining Board recommended the recognition of the following transfers: Ordained ministers: Miss Lillian Beard, John Edwards, Miss Salome Gross, Edwin S. Kilbourne, and Mrs. Hazel M. Kilbourne. Licensed: Martin Cross, and Mrs. Thompson.

Mrs. E. G. Hollowell made her report which was adopted.

The Rescue Committee made a report which was also adopted. Reports.)

Mrs. Scogin, Treasurer of the Rescue Board, made a financial report

which was adopted.

A ten minute recess was now taken.

The Committee on Publishing interests reported. Adopted. (See Re-

The Committee on Home Missions reported. Adopted. (See Reports.) It was moved and carried that the reports which come in later be

added to the reports in the Minutes.

Brother Hodgin presented the matter of publishing a song book called the "Songs of the Pilgrims." The proposition by the individual making the offer was to turn over all plates, the only obligation being the payment to him of a royalty of two cents per book, the books retailing at twenty-five cents each.

It was moved and carried that we recommend to the General Publish-

ing Board this proposition for favorable action by them.

Mrs. Hollowell introduced Sister Lefler from Fifth Street Mission who

gave her testimony.

Mrs. Foss was recommended by the Examining Board for a reissuing of ordination papers. They also recommended Emmett Van Note for ordination and Mrs. Stewart of the East Pasadena Church for license to preach. The recommendations were ratified.

Moved and seconded to suspend the rules and meet in the morning at 8:30. An amendment to change the hour to 9 o'clock was passed. The

main motion as amended was then adopted.

On a carried motion the meeting stood adjourned.

Sixth Meeting, Friday, June 3, 9 A.M.

The Devotions were led by the District Superintendent, Rev. O. R. Sickler.

Mrs. Hollowell reported that Brother Humphrey, the colored minister

had passed away.

Brother J. M. Nead was recognized and asked to speak. He spoke on jail work. 150,000 men and women are in jails and penitentiaries of the United States, 15,000 of which are estimated to be innocent of the charge against them. His work is getting boys to Christ. He gave an insight into the working of the jail system. Some thrilling stories of jail work

were told.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as read.

Roll Call.

The matter of a Union Camp Ground was introduced. Brother Rees was asked to give any information he might have in the matter.

Moved and seconded that the matter be referred to the District Council. Carried.

The Olinda Church made supplementary reports which were adopted.

East Pasadena supplementary reports were read and adopted.

The following reports were read and adopted: G. H. Scofield, Gladys Grout, Leroy Hutchings, and J. Edwards. Brother Coleman read report of the Committee on Memoirs. The re-

port was adopted and ordered spread on the Minutes. (See Reports.)

The Resolutions Committee reported. Report adopted.

The Examining Committee recommended for ordination: E. P. Dixon, Adopted. Mrs. E. G. Hollowell was recommended for ordination for a deaconess. Adopted.

Moved and seconded that a report be demanded from each minister and that a written excuse be given by those who cannot be present. Carried.

Moved and carried that the Secretary be permitted to have a stenographer to help send out blanks, said help to be paid from the General District Fund.

Moved and carried that hereafter at our annual Assemblies we have

an educational meeting.

The Chair now made an address: He spoke first about the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and the necessity of supporting it. He also spoke highly of the work of the Editor, Rev. W. C. Stone, and the high standards which he has set. The pastors were urged to get subscriptions.

The next proposition was the matter of Church extension work. We were urged to move out and establish new Churches and preaching points. An appreciation of the unity and blessing of God upon the Assembly

was next made.

Sister Rees and Brother Waterman each gave a stirring appeal for church extension work.

The report of the Foreign Missionary Committee was read and

adopted. (See Reports.)

Our christian experience at the present time we believe is the best

We have made but few changes over the district during this year. We have not suffered the loss by death of any of our ministers, and only one change has been made among our pastors.

We have increased our territory, taking into our district the states of Oregon and Arizona. We have organized two new churches, one at Newberg, Oregon with about thirty members, here they have a new church building. The other is at Phoenix, Arizona. They have just purchased a lot and are planning on erecting a new church soon.

We have visited every church several times, and have held four review.

We have held ten revival meetings in established churches, five in the district for which we received \$171.00 in 1926, and \$141.01 for the five months of 1927. We held four outside of our district in 1926 for which we received \$329.00.

REPORT OF RESCUE COMMITTEE

The Lord uses at least four public agencies in the saving of souls. The Home, the Sunday School, the Church, and the Rescue Home. It is the work of the Home, the Sunday School and the Church to save from the allurements of sin; but if these agencies lose their grip and fail, (and they do in the majority of cases) and some mother's girl plunges into a cesspool of iniquity and sin, it becomes the task of a love impassioned rescue worker to save or let perish the struggling broken types of humanity.

Having no rescue home established, the work has not gone with the assurance it otherwise would have; however the noble work has been

carried on.

We have come in contact with many fallen girls that are sick of sin, and some have been placed in private homes, which has not proved satisfactory. But unsatisfactory conditions, hindrances, and seeming futile efforts do not quiet the cry of the lost nor set at ease the soul burden of a heaven-born rescue worker.

Therefore be it, Resolved, that this Assembly instruct its pasters on the District to hold at least one public rescue service during the year, at which time a special offering be taken and forwarded to the District Rescue Board Treasurer, to be used by the District Council to further the prospective Rescue Home.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS


