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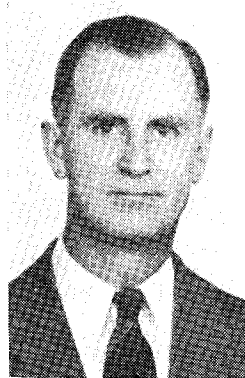

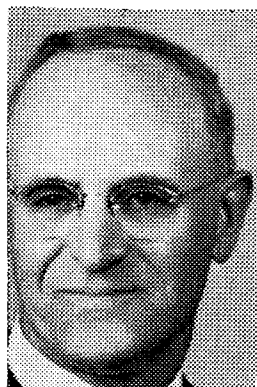

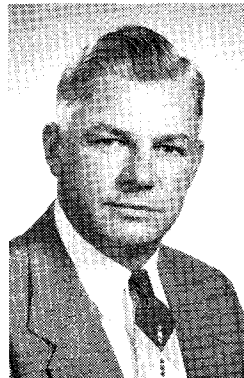

General Superintendent's Address

I Cor. 9:16-27 - "A Planned Ministry"

In this scripture you will find hidden away in several verses the thought of a planned ministry. Unless you and I as ministers have a planned ministry, we are certainly not going to accomplish all that God would have us to accomplish. I would like to ask you preachers this morning, "Are you accomplishing the most possible in your ministry?" "Are you really accomplishing everything you expected to accomplish, that you desired and that you felt God would have you to do when He called you?"

There are many preachers working for degrees - I wish we could have more preachers that wouldn't look so much on these degrees as the thing that will most help their ministry, but would strive for the superlative degree in their ministry - something that goes beyond what others are willing to accomplish and are willing to do. In earning a degree, the average preacher wastes both time and talent. We Pilgrim preachers should all be accomplishing the same as preachers of other denominations and faiths. Why can't we accomplish as much as Moody or Spurgeon, Luther or Wesley? I ask myself the question: "Why have they accomplished so much more than I or my brethren can do? Is their God my God? Is He a partial God and will He do more for them than for us?"

It is easy to say that they were called and anointed for a special time. But will God do more for a Calvinist Moody, Sunday, Spurgeon or Graham than He will for an Armenian Flexon, Monroe or Robbins? No, He is the same impartial God to all, but they are getting a job done that we are not doing. I cannot believe that God loves them more than He does us or will do more for them than He will for us, but he is waiting for some men that will put themselves at God's disposal.

You say, "They are educated." We have the same privileges and opportunities, but we are having such a little effect on our generation.

I am thinking of a missionary of long ago who landed on a south sea island in 1848 and left it in 1872. After his departure from the island, the natives erected a memorial for him. On the memorial it says, "When he came in 1848 there was not a Christian on this island. When he left in 1872 there was not a heathen on this island." What an effect for a man to have on his parish! Are we affecting our parish as God would have us to affect it? This man's burning passion was to win souls for God. Where is our burning passion for souls? Where are the preachers of our generation that will stand forth as John Geddes and have one purpose - to win men and women for Christ? The following I obtained from a Mexican pastor:

"I am only a spark - make me a fire;
I am only a string - make me a lyre;
I am only a drop - make me a fountain;
I'm only an ant hill - make me a mountain;
I'm only a feather - make me a wing;
I'm only a serf, make me a king;
I'm only a link - make me a chain;
I am only a sprinkle - Lord, make me a rain."

When the prodigal son left his father's house he said, "Father, give me." When he came back he begged, "Father, make me." Oh, for a group of preachers who would say earnestly, "Make me" whatever you want me to be. Everything I have is at your disposal!"

An effective ministry must be a planned ministry. A successful business man works by a plan. He knows the road he is taking to reach his success. The ministry of the Gospel is the greatest business on earth and should not be handled haphazardly. Christ in His ministry only fulfilled what had been planned a long time before. Hebrews 10:7 - Lo, I have come to do thy will. John 4:41 - I must needs go through Samaria. It was in the plan of His ministry for Him to go there. Paul had a planned ministry. I Cor. 16:5-9. Now I will come unto you when I pass through Macedonia for I do pass through Macedonia. He had a plan. He knew where, when and how to reach his destination. He advised Titus (Titus 1:5) to plan his ministry.

Without a planned ministry it is easy for us preachers to major on minors and minor on majors. I am afraid that is what we have done in a lot of places, until we have given our people and communities the wrong impression of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Let us major on majors and minor on minors and put things in proper perspective before our parishoners and the community in which we are laboring.

A planned ministry never goes to seed on anything. Money, maidens and modernism are the three M's a preacher must watch. But if the devil cannot wreck a ministry on one of these he will try to do it by getting him to ride a hobby. We think of dress and outward appearances immediately on the mention of riding a hobby. But a preacher can ride a hobby by continually preaching on prophesy or the cross or worldliness. These things must be preached, but no one of them should be preached all the time.

Do not allow the devil to ruin your ministry by getting you to ride hobbies. There are a lot of things in the Book that we should preach on. We are to preach **against** sin. In doing so you may not always be well received, but we are in the ministry to present the gospel to the people. Isa. 58:1 says "Show my people their transgressions" Paul said "Reprove and rebuke, not in anger, but with all long-suffering." John Wesley said "In dealing with humanity and in administration - we need the hand of a woman, but the heart of a lion" - that will enable us to stand forth with a strong heart when it comes to principles; but always rebuke and reprove with all long-suffering and tenderness.

In the Bible, Paul pictured sin as something "working in us unto death." Unless we can make the sinner feel that the sin in his life is working death for him eternally, we cannot do him any good. The only way we can make sin look black to the sinner is for the man of God to be shocked by it. We must make our people be shocked by it. Let us preach it as a shocking thing. A lot of people don't like that kind of preaching. They remind me of the little boy whose mother was scrubbing his ears, and as little boys go, of course, he did not like the operation. Finally he said, "Mom, why do you have to scrub my ears so hard? Why don't you just dust me off?" Lots of people would like to be just "dusted off", but sometimes we need to use a mop. Things need to be "mopped up." We need to make sin look sinful.

Above everything, preach the word of God, the great doctrines of the Word. Yesterday morning was the first time I have heard a preacher preach on the DOCTRINE of the resurrection. We should preach on the doctrines of the resurrection, on Calvary, the second coming, new birth, sanctification. Just think, in all these years I have been in the ministry, I have just heard my first message preached on the doctrine of the resurrection. We have lost people because we have tried Sunday after Sunday to keep feeding the older sheep, when all the time there are new lambs who need to be taught the A-b-c's of the gospel. Let's get the cookie jar down on the lowest shelf where the good things of God can be reached and understood by all.

The old preachers preached expositorially and doctrinally. Recently a census was taken across the country as to what type of preaching the people wanted to hear. 90% said they wanted a Bible centered ministry that is expository, or explanatory. Some sermons don't have one grain of Bible in them except the text, and the preacher leaves almost as soon as he takes it. The old preachers didn't give prizes or hold suppers or festivals to get the crowd - they only preached the word of God. Try it and see if it will work for us today. I believe the world is hungry to hear of the Light . . . Someone has said, "If a preacher has anything to warm my heart, I can listen for an hour. If he has no message, but only a speech, then ten minutes is too long."

An old lady who had been a charter member of the oldest church in town was asked how she liked the new pastor, a young man who had just come to the field. She replied, "Oh, we have the best pastor we ever had. He doesn't meddle in politics or religion either one." Well, of course our job is not to meddle, but to preach a religion that will make a change in people's lives. The preaching of the Word will cause the people to come around to hear what God, through you, has to say.

You may say, "everyone has a Bible." Yes, most people have a Bible, and many of them read it, but they don't understand it. Just a few weeks ago in Indianapolis one of our workers felt that he should go to a certain address to call on a couple. He didn't know why, but he went. When he knocked, the lady came to the door in the customary modern undress, smoking a cigarette. He told her, "God has sent me here." "I don't know why, but he did." She invited him in with tears in her eyes. In the living room sat the husband, also in shorts, without shirt, and smoking. They were reading the Bible. The wife said, "If God sent you here, I know why. We have been trying to read this Book and find something that would help us to find God. Can you tell us if there is anything in this Book to help us?" He began to read, to talk and explain and answer their questions. In two week's time they were saved, sanctified, and had applied for membership in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Again I stress - people have the book, but they do NOT know it. They can read it - but they can NOT understand it. Let us give it to them. Let us explain it to them. They are hungry for the Bread of Life.



SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent Dr. R. G. Flexon, members and friends of the fifth annual conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings.

It is with a keen sense of the solemn responsibility of this hour that I stand before you today. With the tragic night of sin's darkness fast settling over a lost world, there is not time for vain babble or devastating indifference. In a world tottering on the brink of atomic holocaust, what we do for God must be done now. It is my desire that this Conference may be characterized by vision, purpose and dedication to press the battle for God through the enabling power of the Holy Spirit.

This year has been filled with district activities aimed at better promotion of the work. (A) The promotional rallies last September, in which Bro. Flexon ministered so faithfully were indeed a great blessing to the District. (B) The ministerial convention last March with Bro. Flexon as principal speaker, was one of the highlights of the year. (C) The Sunday School institutes were most educational and inspirational under the able ministry of Rev. Joe Brown, Rev. Kenneth Phipps and Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz. (D) The youth camp is, in our opinion, one of our best district ministries. We would urge ever greater effort toward the salvation of our youth through this medium.

The fellowship, prayers and cooperation of the Council, ministers and lay members has been most gratifying and appreciated beyond words of expression. Many times, under burdens of the work, we have recognized with deep gratitude the undergirding, sustaining grace of God through the prayers of God's people across the district.

MATERIAL IMPROVEMENTS

MAUD - The beautiful new parsonage referred to last year was dedicated last fall with General Superintendent Melvin Snyder present for the occasion.

TROY - Purchased and dedicated beautiful new church furniture. A complete remodeling and beautifying of the interior of the church was also completed in time for the combined Dedication and Mortgage Burning service on May 24th.

UNION CITY - Broke ground for their new 42' by 65' cement block church which is now in the process of construction on the site of the property purchased with the parsonage some two years ago.

PLEASANT VALLEY - Is now in the process of constructing additional Sunday School rooms in the basement of their church.

LIMA FIRST - Is now nearing the completion of their Basement Sunday School facilities.

LEIPSIC - Has put a new roof on the church and considerable repairs have been completed on the parsonage.

MEADOW GROVE - Has just completed the construction of brick face to the block church, which together with completion of landscaping makes this a beautiful as well as adequate structure. This will strengthen the influence of this church in the community.

CHURCH EXTENSION

The work at Auburn, which was started in the late fall of 1957 was organized last October and property settlements were made in December. We now have 18 loyal Pilgrim members in this enthusiastic new addition to our District family of churches. The Sunday School has averaged 61 in attendance for the year. The property, consisting of one acre of ground and a tabernacle style church 40' by 70' fully equipped, was purchased for the sum of \$8,000.00. Toward this purchase, the local church has paid \$539.00, and \$842.34 has been spent on repair and redecoration. This work was completed in beautiful condition in time for dedication on June 14th, at which time Bro. Flexon was with us. A very recent report tells us of the purchase of a very good city transit bus for \$700.00 which is to be used as a Sunday School bus. This will without a doubt be a great asset to the Sunday School attendance. District financial help is no longer necessary and they are now paying their pastor \$30.00 per week. Much credit

for this fine new church can be given to the faithful ministry of the pastor, Rev. V. C. Sharp, and his good companion. Their sacrificial labors of love have been richly rewarded. They have endeared themselves to the hearts of the people of that community and the future is bright, with the help of the Lord.

The missions at Richwood, Kenton, Deshler and Cumminsville all show promise and we trust these works may soon become established churches.

THE FUTURE

Last year, the program set up by General Conference was enthusiastically adopted by this Conference. Goals were set spiritually, numerically and financially, and a program adopted to reach those goals. We feel God was pleased with that program and has used it for his glory. We urge that this Conference continue this program without change, as it is set forth in our 1958 minutes, page 26-27, entitled "Toward Tomorrow." Although the goals have not been fully reached, we deem it worthy of our even greater effort during the coming year.

Although we have suffered some loss this year in membership, we feel that the Sunday Schools gain of 10% in 57, 4% in 58 and near 5% this year will surely be reflected in a growth in members in the near future. We urge our churches to give the lambs as well as the sheep a warm welcome into the fold ere they are lost.

The \$6,113.00 received in the District Promotional offering is a considerable gain over the \$3,700.00 received the year before. This fine response is most appreciated, and we believe that you will desire to continue this offering on the same basis. This fund has enabled us to meet our obligations on the camp ground and still proceed with the sorely needed sanitation facilities. It has also given us more than \$1,300.00 for the Church Extension Loan fund, from which fund \$1,000.00 was loaned to the Auburn work. Had it not been for this fund we would never have had this fine new church. This is only a sample of what can be done in the future.

Let us not be complacent or content until these goals have been reached and then set new goals for even greater victories for God and the salvation of lost souls.

WESTERN OHIO CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, Monday a.m., July 27, 1959

The fifth annual conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Springfield, Ohio at 9:00 a.m. with Rev. G. F. Sheridan leading the congregation in singing "Let the Lower Lights be Burning" and "I'll live for Him."

Rev. O. E. Rutledge, Assistant District Superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. Harold Monroe, District Superintendent, congratulated Rev. R. G. Flexon, General Superintendent, on the recently bestowed doctorate, and presented him as chairman of the conference. Dr. Flexon gave a short report of the accomplishments of his area of administration of the church, after commenting that he was still a patient and needed doctoring. He reported on a new preachers magazine now being published, a new personal evangelism program that has been adopted and will soon be presented to all the districts, and the new plan for each district to be visited by the Board of General Superintendents for a period of three or four days. He then addressed the conference, speaking especially to the ministers, on "A Planned Ministry." I Cor. 9:16-27.

The motion to print Dr. Flexon's address to the conference verbatim in the conference minutes was carried.

Roll Call of Ministers and lay delegates was read by the District Secretary, Rev. M. H. Robbins. Ministers were requested by Rev. Flexon to respond to roll call with number of Advocate Subscriptions they would endeavor to obtain during the coming year. Response from those present was 704.

One new church organized during the past year was presented. The motion to accept the Auburn church, with its delegate was carried. Three new ministers transferring from other districts, Duane Tulowiczky from N. Ind. Dist., Donald M. Bassham from W. Va. Dist. and Gilbert DeLong from Penna.-New Jersey district, were presented to and accepted by the conference. Seven candidates for first year license were recommended by the council, and approved by the conference. The reception committee presented Sr. Flexon and Rev. Close, who gave their testimonies.

The District Superintendent's report was read and accepted with a rising vote of appreciation. Assistant Superintendent, Rev. O. E. Rutledge gave his report which was accepted. Mrs. L. R. Roberts gave the report of the Auditing committee, which was accepted. The treasurer's report was given by Rev. G. F. Sheridan, and was accepted with a rising vote of appreciation, also.

At the recommendation of the Dist. Council, a number of churches which had not been able to pay the United Stewardship fund were permitted to be seated within the conference bar. Rev. Flexon and Rev. Monroe explained that these had been carefully considered, and this action was not to be taken as a blanket action which would necessarily be repeated another year.

Rev. Flexon commended the District on high percentage (81.5%) of payment of United Stewardship funds.

The council is now investigating provision of manual on list of inactive ministers. This will include licensed and ordained ministers who are not active in the work, and will affect their seating in the conference next year.

The Statisticians report was read and accepted. Rev. Flexon urged that more attention and concern be given to gain in membership and gave his appreciation for the increase in Sunday School attendance.

Report of Sunday School promotional secretary and presentation of awards were given. The report was accepted.

Committee meetings for 1:00 p.m. were announced, and the sitting adjourned by expiration of time, Rev. Monroe dismissing with prayer.

Second Sitting, Monday p.m.

Afternoon sitting of the conference was called to order by Dr. Flexon. Rev. Wayne Goldsmith led the congregation in singing "Trust and Obey." Rev. H. C. Walker led in prayer.

Report of the Resolutions Committee was read and the following action taken:

A motion was made to amend the preamble to No. 2, Building Committee, page 19, District Minutes to read, "A committee of three, two of whom shall not be members of the District Council, be appointed by the District Council to act as a Building Committee whose duties shall be as follows:" and to add "E" to this resolution. A motion was made from the floor to amend the proposed "E" to read "This committee must be consulted before buying or building District property." Motion to amend carried. Main motion as amended carried.

Motion to add the words "upon presentation of a voucher" to No. 7A was carried.

Resolution No. 8 to add words "with no business being transacted in the absence of a quorum" was ruled out of order by the Chairman. Instructions were also given to change the number constituting a quorum from six to five in compliance with the manual.

Resolution to delete the present No. 10, District Program, and insert the preamble and Items 1 and 2 and Standard of Excellence Grading System from the Toward Tomorrow program, page 26 and 27 of Dist. minutes as the new No. 10 was adopted.

Resolution to add the words "not members of the District Council" after "shall appoint 2 persons" in No. 15A was lost.

Motion concerning calling of pastors from Western Ohio District which would amend No. 18A was ruled out of order by the chair according to Sec. 60, Par. 2 of the manual.

Motion to delete the words "page 37" from Resolution No. 19 carried.

Resolution No. 27 concerning the appointment of a commission to explore needs of present camp grounds, repair, possibility of renting, relocating, etc., was lost in a standing vote of 28 for and 70 against the resolution.

Resolution No. 28 concerning the expenditure of money by the Dist. Council was referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 29 relative to petitioning the General Board to allow the general superintendents to remain in their present areas for the quadrennium and to present a memorial to the next Gen. Conference setting up four year terms in each field was carried.

Resolution No. 30 concerning preparation of a list of inactive ministers was adopted.

Resolution No. 31 concerning giving of Advocate Subscriptions by Sunday School was referred to Ways and Means Committee since it concerned finances.

The following action was taken on the report of the Ways and Means Committee:

Motion to add "F." to No. 6 concerning churches and youth societies paying expenses of delegates to the youth and church conferences was adopted. Motion to change heading of No. 9 to read "District Youth President" was adopted. Motion to add No. 11, Dist. Church Extension Loan Fund, as taken from Dist. Minutes, Toward Tomorrow program, page 26 and 27, beginning with Item 3, was adopted as presented by the committee, by a standing vote of 57 for and 54 against.

Resolution No. 12 concerning clean-up days at the camp ground was lost.

Resolution No. 13 concerning Ministerial Student Scholarship was lost by a standing vote of 19 for, 42 against the motion.

A motion was presented from the floor to be used as a substitution for Resolution No. 12 of the committee. The motion was adopted as follows: "Be it resolved that each church give three days work for clean-up of the camp ground, or pay \$20.00 to the Dist. Treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the Camp Ground Manager contact the pastors of the churches to determine the best time for these work days."

Information was requested by the Memorials Committee. In the absence of the chairman of that committee, the Dist. Supt. appointed Mrs. Geo. Poole as Chairman, Mrs. Richard Powell and Mrs. E. M. Maddox to be remaining members.

Recommendations of the council for ordination were Rev. James Scalf and Rev. Ralph Hitesman. They were approved.

Motion to adjourn was carried and we were dismissed with prayer by Bro. Flexon.

Third Sitting, Monday Evening

The evening sitting convened with Rev. Flexon conducting an ordination service. Rev. G. F. Sheridan led the congregation in singing "Rock of Ages." Rev. Harold Monroe led in prayer. Revs. O. E. Rutledge, Melroy Ward and W. L. Kilwy read the following scriptures, respectively: II Timothy 4:1-8, I Timothy 2 and Titus 3. The congregation sang "A Charge to Keep." Rev. Monroe presented the candidates, Rev. Ralph Hitesman and Rev. James Scalf, to the General Superintendent.

Rev. Flexon spoke to the candidates from I Kings 17:24, "Thou art a man of God." He stated that a man ordained to preach the gospel assumes the obligation to be true to the virtues that were esteemed by Jesus Christ in his ministry. He must have loyalty toward constituted authority in the church in which he is ordained. He must be true to confidences with which he is entrusted. He must enforce rules of the church without partiality; be true to the field to which he has accepted a call, but when he leaves it, leave it completely to his successor. Remember that God has always led his people through leaders. Be loyal to your District and to District gatherings. Treat other ministers as you want them to treat you - not only as ministers, but also as gentlemen. Steal no more of their sheep than you want stolen of yours, talk about them as you want them to talk about you. Give concern to your members and their needs and burdens. Don't betray their trust. Treat all your people alike regardless of relationship, personal friendship or enmity. Be a perpetual student. Make books your friends - love them. Be constant in your search for truth and your presentation of it. Never be wrong in your facts. Never give less than your best to your work. Be clean in conduct, person, home and church. Be a good representative of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Do not make statements in haste that you may wish to retract. Be studious, kind, and thorough in all you do and above all, be punctual. Be honest, prayerful, spiritual, pure. Stay on a high moral level. Anything less is unworthy of the Pilgrim Holiness Church which ordains you. Live up to the challenge and the confidence of your church.

The congregation sang "Blest Be the Tie" and "We're Marching to Zion" while the ordained ministers welcomed the newly ordained into the fellowship.

The business session was called to order by Rev. Flexon. Rev. Sheridan noted a correction that should be made in the Treasurer's Report.

Minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.

The recommendations of the examining board were read by the Secretary and were approved. In the absence of other delegates, two ministers wives were approved by the conference as delegate and alternate from Bevis and Miamisburg churches, respectively.

The District Superintendent appointed Rev. Darrell Rotz, Rev. Gilbert DeLong, Rev. Clyde Waites, Rev. Ralph Shope and Rev. Lowell Brand as tellers for the election of officers.

Rev. Harold Monroe was elected as District Superintendent on the first ballot. (2 yr. term). The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. O. E. Rutledge was elected on the third ballot.

Nominations for Dist. Secretary were Rev. M. H. Robbins and Rev. L. R. Enlow. Rev. Robbins was elected on the first ballot.

Nominations for District Treasurer were Rev. G. F. Sheridan and Rev. W. L. Kilwy. Rev. Sheridan was elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for five advisory members of the council. Three elections on the first ballot were Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev. L. R. Roberts and Rev. W. L. Kilwy. The conference extended the time of the sitting to complete the count of the first ballot and further extended it to cast ballots for the two remaining members of the council, ballots to be counted by the tellers after adjournment and report given in the morning sitting. The three highest names in the previous balloting were voted on. They were Rev. R. T. Powell, Rev. L. R. Enlow and Rev. G. E. Stace. The ballots were cast and the sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. L. R. Roberts.

Fourth Sitting, Tuesday a.m.

Rev. Flexon called the conference to order at 9:00 a.m. and Rev. Darrell Rotz led in singing "I'm a Child of the King." Rev. R. T. Powell led in prayer. While still kneeling the congregation sang a verse of "Near the Cross." A number of inspiring testimonies were given. Rev. Flexon read Psalm 20.

Minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.

Report of balloting for remaining two advisory members of the council revealed that Rev. L. R. Enlow and Rev. G. E. Stace were elected.

Nominations for one member of the Examining Board were read by the Secretary. They were Rev. Stanley Dean and Rev. Bertha Keinbaum. Rev. Dean was elected for a 3 year term.

Rev. L. R. Roberts was elected as District Trustee for a 3 year term.

Motion to elect Rev. Rudolph Moore as statistician by acclamation carried. He was elected.

The District Superintendent read his appointments for the following committees: Resolutions Committee, Ways and Means Committee, Auditing Committee, Memorials Committee, and Reception Committee.

The Memorials Committee gave reports on four of the saints who went to heaven during the past conference year. The conference received the report by standing and Rev. Flexon offered prayer thanking God for their memory and asking that we may be inspired to better lives by it.

Motion was made that the Dist. Council appoint the two Dist. board members for Frankfort Pilgrim College. Carried.

A Question asked from the floor requested information concerning provision of the manual for an executive council within the district council. Rev. Flexon's answer was as follows:

"The manual does not provide for such a council or committee. However, any council or board has a right to set up committees within their own number and delegate to that committee authority either to investigate or act in their behalf. But when authority is delegated to any smaller committee, it does not relieve the larger body from responsibility. They are entirely responsible for the actions of that committee that they have set up. Certainly any council or board setting up a committee and delegating authority to that committee should not delegate absolute authority. There should be limits placed on the authority delegated to that committee, as the entire body is responsible. But the manual does not provide for an executive committee within the council. If it is done the council appoints that committee within the council; but, I repeat, that does not relieve the council of any action this committee may take."

Rev. Monroe further clarified the matter as it pertains to this district, saying that at times the council has appointed an executive committee within the council and delegated to them authority to act on a specific item, but at no time has any authority been usurped from the council by this committee. No council member has ever felt that this committee has taken any unauthorized action.

Pastoral changes were read by the District Superintendent and unsettled churches noted.

The conference approved the recommendation of the council to accept Rev. Estella Hancock into the conference, transferring from the Eastern Ohio Dist.

The Ways and Means Committee presented the following resolutions and action was taken as noted.

Res. No. 14, transferred from the Resolutions Committee Report of yesterday concerning the placing of the Advocate in all homes of the local Sunday School constituency was adopted. No. 6F which was adopted yesterday was presented in an amended form and was referred back to the committee. Res. No. 6G concerning payment for rooms and trailer space was adopted. Res. No. 5, Stewardship Funds, Dist. Budget, Sec. (5) was amended to read as follows:

"Inasmuch as there is an indebtedness of \$5,800.00 on the addition of showers and modernization of rest rooms on the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of \$1.00 per member per year to be forwarded to the Dist. Treasurer to be applied on this indebtedness until same is paid." The resolution was adopted.

The addition of "D" to Resolution No. 8, Dist. Council, limiting their spending to \$500.00 per project unless approved by conference, which was No. 28 of Resolutions Committee Report of yesterdays sitting was presented. An amendment to change \$500.00 to read \$1,500.00 was lost by a standing vote, 49 to 17. A second amendment making the resolution read "any new project," was also lost. The third amendment, adding the words "maintenance and repair work excepted" carried. Further discussion, however, resulted in the tabling of the entire resolution.

Resolutions Committee presented a resolution of appreciation to all who had part in making the camp and conference successful. It was adopted.

The Ways and Means Committee re-presented the resolution which had been referred back to them. Motion was made to delete the last sentence of No. 6E and to add No. 6F as follows: "That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 for each youth convention and or conference delegate to the Camp Registrar for the conference, as well as traveling expenses to be paid to the delegate." Motion carried.

Announcements were made by the Dist Supt. concerning future dates to remember.

Rev. Monroe made a few closing remarks of appreciation for the confidence placed in him.

Rev. Flexon in his closing remarks stated his appreciation for the orderliness of the conference.

A love offering was taken for the General Superintendent, and the conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Connin.

Since two items were discovered to have been overlooked, the chairman called the delegates and ministers back into conference to consider them.

The Dist. Council's list of recommendations for evangelistic workers was approved. Motion that the Dist. Council read and approve the minutes of the last sitting and conclude all unfinished business was adopted. The conference was adjourned.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General Interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to the standard required by the state, therefore be it resolved that.

A committee of three, two of whom shall not be members of the District Council, be appointed by the District Council to act as a Building Committee whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. To study the State Building Code and learn all requirements.
- B. To study methods of financing and have knowledge of best and cheapest ways.
- C. Check with church boards as to the deed and type of mortgage.
- D. No church can buy or build without the approval of this committee and a written consent from the District Council.
- E. This committee must be consulted before buying or building District Property.

No. 3 CAMP AND CAMP SCHEDULE

- A. Be it resolved that any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Registrar, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.

- B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp, furnish their own linen.
- C. That our camp schedule be arranged to provide one afternoon service for Foreign Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions.
- D. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district to another district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp registrar.
- E. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- F. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.

No. 4 CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that Conference be on Monday and Tuesday following Camp.
- B. Be it further resolved that we provide for services for children during Conference.

No. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 5th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.

No. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

- A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a voucher.
- B. Be it further resolved that all ministers' phone numbers be carried in the Ministerial Directory.

No. 8 DISTRICT COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that our entire District Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.
- C. Be it further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 9 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved: that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 10 DISTRICT PROGRAM

In the light of God's blessing on the last General Conference, where faith and vision took precedent over problems and circumstances, and whereas Divine leadership was evident, Be it resolved that the General Church program as adopted by the General Conference and entitled "Toward Tomorrow" be continued in its entirety.

Be it further resolved that in conformance with this program, the following District goals be continued:

A net gain of two churches this year.

A net gain of 112 members each year (2 per church).

Annual pastors' conference.

Accentuated Holiness Evangelism.

Establishment of Prayer and Fasting Leagues. (Pledge people to fast and pray at least one meal each week - suggested Friday morning).

To promote this program we propose in addition to existing District and General procedure that:

(1) Our General Superintendent in cooperation with the District Superintendent and Council, be asked to meet with our people in special promotional meetings on Zone and local, as well as District level.

(2) That the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following Conference for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work - Local, District and General.

No. 11 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 12 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 13 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.
- C. The location of this convention should be as nearly central as possible.

No. 14 MINISTERS, INACTIVE

Be it resolved that the District Council petition the General Board for a ruling as to what constitutes an inactive minister for the preparation of a list of inactive ministers as provided for by the manual.

No. 15 MISSIONS

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two persons to serve with the District Superintendent as a Home Missionary Committee.
- B. This committee shall direct the efforts of a corps of ministers cooperating in Home Missionary Projects.
- C. Each Minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- D. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.
- E. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.
- F. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.
- G. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer and forwarded to the Treasurer of this committee.
- H. We also recommend that this committee investigate the advisability of building one or more folding Church Trailers.

No. 16 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 17 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. Be it resolved that all third year licentiates meet the Examining Board the first Saturday of camp in order that approved candidates for ordination may be determined before Conference, and that all others meet the Examining Board the Friday and Saturday preceding Conference.
- B. Be it further resolved that the District Council meet on Monday following the first Saturday of camp to take official action on the Examining Boards recommendations for Ordination.
- C. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- D. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night of Conference.

No. 18 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- B. To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.
- D. Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- F. Inasmuch as moving Pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage due to varied facilities:
Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church-owned parsonages.

No. 19 PETITION TO GENERAL BOARD (Term of Office, General Superintendents)

Since our last General Conference we have had in our great church the leadership of three of God's choice Saints. Their work has been assigned by the Manual, Sec. 123, Par. 2. And since many now recognize the great advance in leadership, we feel that the Western Ohio District should petition the General Board under Sec. 126, Par. 2 that all General Superintendents be retained in their present fields of labor for the quadrennium, and a memorial be presented to the next General Conference setting up four year terms in each field.

No. 20 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 21 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after the election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 22 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 23 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends the state conference provide for a District Sunday School Committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Rally be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- C. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our District Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- D. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

No. 24 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.

- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 25 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 26 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 27 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

No. 28 APPRECIATION

A. Be it resolved:

That we extend to our General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.

B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.

C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our District Secretary, and that we express our appreciation to Rev. J. W. Smack for his labors as a reporter.

D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to relieve the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.

B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.

C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.

D. That our active ministers' children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.

E. That all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives.

F. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 for each youth convention and or church delegate to the Camp Registrar for the Conference, as well as traveling expenses to be paid to the delegate.

G. That the charge for rooms for camp and conference be as follows:

- (1) Rooms at the rate of \$8.00 for the entire time or \$1.50 per day.
- (2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time or \$1.00 per day.
- (3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.

No. 3 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that, each church give three days work for clean-up of the camp ground, or pay \$20.00 to the District Treasurer to secure the labor needed. Be it also resolved that the Camp Ground Manager contact the pastors of the churches to determine the best time for these work days.

No. 4 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting church extension within the district.
- B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.
- C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.
- D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of five per cent (5%).
- E. Be it resolved that we substitute the PENNY-A-MEAL offering with an increase in the District Budget of \$4.00 per member. Said money shall be dispersed as follows: the minimum payment on principal and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp ground fund and District Church Extension Fund.
- F. Realizing the cost of interest, we purpose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

WHAT THE LOAN FUND CAN DO

(1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.

(2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.

(3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.

(4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus giving them funds with which to operate.

(5) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 5 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer, and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the District Budget Fund but each church will receive credit for it in their annual report.

No. 6 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 7 MINISTERS' DUTIES

- A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 8 MINUTES

- A. Be it resolved that the price of the Minutes shall be 50 cts per copy.
- B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$25.00 for these services.

No. 9 SALARIES

- A. District Superintendent.

(1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$3,900.00, 6 cts. per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.

(2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6 cts. per mile traveling expense.

B. District Council.

Resolved that 6 cts. per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorizing District work.

C. District Treasurer and Secretary.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's salary be \$500.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$200.00.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

E. Educational-Examining Board.

Be it resolved that the Educational-Examining Board members be given \$65.00 per member per year, plus 6 cts. per mile for travel authorized by this Conference or the District Council.

No. 10 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund (Formerly General Budget)

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provision as follows:

Foreign Missions.....	20% or \$1.60
Administration.....	36% or 2.88
General Church Extension.....	14% or 1.12
Senior College.....	21.4% or 1.71
Church Extension Loan Fund.....	3% or .24
Sunday School Extension and Youth...	2.6% or .21
Contingent	3% or .24
Total, per Member per Year.....	100% or \$8.00

B. District Budget.

(1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offerings received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

(2) Be it resolved that we raise 25 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference Expense.

(3) Be it resolved that each church raise at least 50 cts. per member per year for our zone school.

(4) Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member per year be raised annually to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.

(5) Inasmuch as there is an indebtedness of \$5,800.00 on the addition of showers and modernization of rest rooms on the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of \$1.00 per member per year to be forwarded to the District Treasurer to be applied on this indebtedness until same is paid.

(6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.

(7) Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

No. 11 SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE

Be it resolved that each church raise \$5.00 per year for the financing of our Sunday School Institute. We urge each church to take care of this before the time set for the Institute.

No. 12 TREASURER

- A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books - Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.
- B. Insuring of the Treasurer - We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 13 YOUTH

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in budget statement as "camp and conference."
- C. That young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Nannie (Ellis) Rutherford was born in Brown County, Ohio, June 18, 1877, and departed this life November 6, 1958. She was converted in 1908 at Mt. Orab, Ohio, and later joined the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Oakland. For many years she had been an Ordained Deaconess and was a faithful worker for the Lord until he called her home.

* * * *

Rev. LaRue Irving Park was born October 17, 1889, in Lamoka Valley, New York, and departed this life February 13, 1959. He found the Lord at an early age in a cottage prayer meeting. He received his Bible School training at God's Bible School, and was ordained to the ministry in 1914. He pastored churches in Washington, Idaho, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee. At the time of his death he was pastoring the Pilgrim Holiness Church at Williamsport, Ohio.

He was willing to go where no one else would go. While much of his labor was in the home missionary field, he sacrificed greatly for the cause of foreign missions.

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

TO OUR GENERAL YOUTH CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS
MEMBERS OF THIS 1959 YOUTH CONFERENCE:

As we take a retrospective view into the pages of the yesterdays, we humbly acknowledge that the God of the Universe has been the Guide of the Youth. First Sitting

The first sitting of the Western Ohio District Youth Conference convened at 9:00 a.m., July 18, 1959, with Wesley Chatfield leading the group in singing choruses. Prayer was offered by Rev. Orvan Link. Rev. Darrell Rotz, District Youth President, introduced Dr. Paul F. Elliott, National Youth Director, who spoke of the new youth program set up by the 1958 General Conference.

Rev. Elliott commended the interest that had been shown in the first phases of the National Youth Quiz. He spoke on the objectives of Pilgrim Youth as follows: (1) Pilgrim Youth are world wide; (2) One third of Pilgrim Youth are on foreign soil; (3) Pilgrim Youth are start-

ing new churches in the homeland, as well as the foreign fields; and (4) the need of team work.

The conference bar was set to be the front two sections and the north side of the tabernacle, including the platform.

District President, Rev. Darrell Rotz, gave his report. It was accepted.

Motion to accept the treasurer's report by Rev. Stanley Dean was carried.

Zone reports were given. Motion to accept these reports carried.

The roll call was taken. Conference recessed until 2:30 p.m.

Second Sitting

The conference reconvened at 2:30 p.m. Report of the Resolutions committee was given. Resolutions numbered 4, 5, 7, and 9 in the report were adopted, and eight other resolutions continued from the previous year.

Reports of the Ways and Means committee was given. Slight changes in wording were made in resolutions 1 through 3, and Resolutions No. 4 concerning Youth Camp was adopted.

Rev. Darrell Rotz was re-elected as District Youth President.

Rev. Rudolph Moore was elected as Vice President.

Rev. L. T. Brand was elected as District Youth Secretary.

Rev. Stanley Dean was re-elected as District Youth Treasurer.

The Conference was divided into zones for the election of Zone Chairmen. It was decided that in the absence of six persons from a zone, the choice of the chairman for that Zone would be referred to the District Council.

The following Zone Chairmen were elected: Dayton - Rev. W. L. Kilwy; Hamilton - Mrs. Arlen Gray; Greenville - Rev. Rudolph Moore; Lima - Rev. Clair Bailey; and Defiance - Rev. L. T. Brand.

The conference adjourned with prayer.

Report Of Young People's Resolution Committee

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone Chairmen be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 BIBLE MEMORIZATION

Be it resolved that the Youth Conference continue the plan of Bible Memorization as outlined by our General Youth Department.

No. 3 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

No. 4 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develop a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 5 REPORTER

Be it resolved that a Youth Reporter be appointed by the Youth Council to gather news for the youth page of the Western Builder.

No. 6 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 7 STATISTICIAN

Whereas the Manual in Section 86, part 2, provides for each local youth president to give a report at the annual youth conference, be it resolved that we have a youth statistician and that said statistician be appointed by the Youth Council; and this report will not conflict with the present District report.

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program - plans, date and administration to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

No. 9 YOUTH COUNCIL

Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times this year, and the officers of the District be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.

No. 10 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone once annually.

No. 11 YOUTH SOCIETIES

Inasmuch as the General Conference has outlined new organizational procedures for Youth Societies, be it resolved that this Youth Conference adopt these provisions.

No. 12 ZONE PROGRAM

In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.

Report Of Young People's Ways and Means Committee

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

- A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.
- B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$5.00 a year to maintain the fund.
- C. Be it also resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed six cents (6 cts.) per mile for traveling expenses.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special projects approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.00 to be paid by each church.
- B. Whereas the present facilities are inadequate for efficient service in the kitchen: be it resolved that this conference continue as its project for the coming year the purchasing of a large food mixer, and to provide adequate wiring for the same.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

Be it resolved that each zone raise the equivalent of \$7.00 per church for the District Youth Council and the District Youth Project Funds.

No. 4 YOUTH CAMP

Be it resolved that the price of the Youth Camp be \$8.00 for the coming year, if held on these grounds.

At the request of Rev. G. F. Sheridan, District Treasurer, we have examined the cash receipts and disbursements of the Pilgrim Holiness Church - Western Ohio District for the period July 6, 1958 to July 5, 1959. And the summer camp operation for the period July 17, 1958 to October 11, 1958.

Recorded cash receipts were traced to bank deposits and disbursements were evidenced by cancelled checks. Cash on deposit was confirmed by a statement issued by the Arcanum National Bank, Arcanum, Ohio. Transactions in the Pilgrim Holiness Extension Fund Savings Account were traced and found to be in order. The savings account balance of \$2,518.89 at July 5, 1959 was confirmed by correspondence with the Arcanum National Bank.

Operation of the summer camp resulted in a net income of \$10.97 which was transferred to the Western Ohio District Funds and included in the November 7, 1958 bank deposit. The correction for a returned check of \$8.00, included in the deposit of July 29, 1958, should have been made through the account originally given credit when this cash was received.

It was impractical to verify recorded contributions received. However, from the extent of the examination it is our opinion that the accompanying statements of cash receipts and disbursements correctly reflect the cash received and paid out during the period under review.
