Anyone who has not attended for five weeks can be counted. The local Sunday School can set a minimum number of points a person must earn in order to qualify. A record of the individual points gained could be kept in the Sunday School class book in the space usually used for marking a person present or absent.



Dear Pilgrim Friends,

Your Bible school, Pilgrim Evangelistic Institute, opened its doors for registration on September 7, 1950, for the beginning of its eighteenth consecutive year of youth training for the church of the California-Arizona and Pacific North-west districts. The school has grown consistently from a group of heterogeneous students to an organization comprising three distinct departments. It would be difficult to state which department is the most important, for each department is related to the development of the child; and each parent feels that the group his child is in is probably the most important. There is a relative importance in all stages of growth, and who can say whether the college is the most important, or the elementary school? This institution grows to meet the needs of your children as you build it. It is from this sense of need for guided, guarded christian education that your school operates a four-year Bible College, a standard four-year high school, and an elementary school as well.

The college is developing with each succeeding year, and this year holds many triumphs, bumps, lessons and blessings. We rejoice that God is blessing and helping in every phase of the school. The criteria for a good training center is the products it turns out. The administration is pleased to return to you trained, spiritual pastors and christian workers.

A new development in the curriculum is the beginning of the course for Music Majors. Now we are offering this music course along with the Theological course. We trust that many workers, pastors, and pastors' wives will also avail themselves of this opportunity to train for efficient performance in voice, piano, accordion, wind instruments, and Hawaiian guitar, choral conducting, and learn theory of music along with the applied arts.

The total enrollment for the college and high school is approximately 75. (New ones are still coming in.) The elementary school has 50. There are fourteen different states represented; thirteen denominations, about onethird of the group being Pilgrims.

Due to numerous requests, we are offering a night class in Prophecy—course No. B1303B-304B — Thursday, 7:00-9:40 P.M. (3 units). This class is very well attended, and is proving one of great interest.

Financial Plan for District Support Of P. I. E.

At the 1950 District Conference a plan was adopted that set \$3.65, (A Penny A Day) for Pilgrim Evangelistic Institute, as a minimum amount for every member of the district to give to the school. The purpose of this plan is to provide a basic amount that everyone can give, even the children of the Sunday School. Of course, many can and will give more than "A Penny A Day", and this will be necessary if the plan is to succeed. Many have been giving a dollar a month, some more; we trust they shall continue to do so, and that others will join them.

We are making offering boxes for every church with a "dollar-thermometer" attached to indicate the amount the entire church is giving month by month. This receptacle should be placed in a conspicuous place near the entrance of the church. Besides giving these large containers to the churches, we are providing individual offering boxes for personal use, these small boxes to be brought to the church periodically, the offerings of such to be given in the total amount from the church. We strongly urge every church to take at least one offering a month for the school in a regular service. We feel that folk want to give and will give to our school if given the opportunity.

We have four splendid musical groups this year under the direction of Mr. E. W. Lewis, two male quartets, a

About 57 per cent of the estimated population of the United States is church-affiliated - in all, a total of 81,497,698 persons are members of churches in this country. Forty-eight Protestant groups, each with over 50,-000 members, reported a total of 47,-199,675 members, an increase of nearly 481,000 over the last report. These figures are released in the Southern Baptist Handbook for 1950.

The largest Protestant demonination is still the Methodist with 8,792,569 members reported. Southern Baptists were second with 6,761,265.

One cause for concern was the discovery that Protestant Sunday schools had lost over 37,000 pupils during the vear.

The patient man, who was then heading for his car, paused long enough to reply, "Yes, he's through, but he won't quit!"


