To General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, Delegates and friends of the sixth annual Conference of The Western Ohio District of The Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings. With a keen awareness, we face a rapidly developing secular world. Men's minds are saturated with the greed for things until their very souls bow at the shrine of materialism. Fear grips men's hearts and sin drags men ever farther from God. The Church of Jesus Christ is now being challenged as never before. We hold the solution, the balm, the key for all world need, The Gospel of Jesus Christ. The world must not only be told of its ill, it must also be shown the way and won to Christ our Redeemer.

The Bible declares that, "straight is the gate, and narrow is the way which leads unto life, and few there be that find it". Church extension is one of our great concerns. Acute problems face us here because of a relatively large percent of smaller churches already struggling for existence. With souls crying for help, we would call for a united effort to do more about reaching them. A proposed program to strengthen this phase of the work has already been outlined and presented through the proper channels to be brought to this Conference. If we are to succeed here, we must have a consuming vision and a united effort. Knowing our people, we have faith that this can and will be done.

This past year has been filled with thrilling activities for promoting the Work of God. The meetings with our three General Superintendents last fall were gratifying indeed. The ministry and leadership of these men of God has been used for good throughout the year. The soul stirring ministry of Mr. Leonard Whipple, on Lay Evangelism, did much to promote that program. The fine spirit of vision, optomism and dedication with which he approached his work, also contributed much to the District. The well attended Ministerial Convention was filled with helpful materials, and the ministry of Rev. R. A. Beltz was an inspiration to all to strive for greater effectiveness in our ministry of this Glorious Gospel.

We would like to express appreciation for the wonderful cooperation and vision that has characterized the District work throughout the year. Attendance at District and Zone activities has been gratifying. Cooperation in meeting the General and District obligations has enabled Western Ohio to stand among those at the very top of the list of all the Districts in the percent of United Stewardship funds paid. It has been a real pleasure to work with the District Council, the Youth Council and President, and the various committees of the Conference. The dedication of the ministry and laity alike, to the various phases of Christian service, has been most gratifying. We consider the Youth Camp to be the best planned, promoted and most effective that we have ever had. The work here in preparation for Camp was the best in many years. The program set up for this work last conference is working beautitifully. We would especially like to express appreciation to our Assistant Superintendent who did much to lift the load made heavier by our illness for a few weeks this spring.

MATERIAL PROGRESS

Two new churches have been dedicated this year, Berrysville and Springfield Meadow Grove. The lovely new church at Union City is now nearly ready for dedication.

At Washington Court House, a growing Sunday School necessitated the construction of additional Sunday School rooms which have been in use for most of the year.

Construction is now well under way for a very fine and adequate Sunday School addition to the Lima Market St. Church.

Mulberry is in the process of extensive remodeling to make way for an expanding Sunday School.

Dayton Greenwich Village has installed new furnaces and a new piano.

A parsonage has been purchased at Mason, and the pastor is now living on the field.

The New Madison Church was able to clear their indebtedness and burn the mortgage this year.

Plans are now drawn, or in process, for new churches at Greenfield, Grand Rapids, Madisonville, Napoleon and Mt. Orab.

These fine new facilities are a great asset to the District as well as each local church. To pastors and churches we heartily commend you for this fine work, and plans for the future.

In closing, please allow a word of personal appreciation from Sister Monroe and myself, for the prayers, love and gifts as you so faithfully stood by us through the illness that came our way this spring. Through your prayers, God has been merciful, sparing our little girl, and we are eternally grateful for every consideration and kindness.

WESTERN OHIO CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, Tuesday, July 19, 1960, 7:30 p.m.

The Sixth Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Filgrim Holiness Church, meeting in the camp tabernacle at Springfield, Ohio. July 19, 1960, was called to order by the District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe.

The congregation was led in prayer by Rev. O. F. Rutledge.

Rev. G. F. Sheridan led in singing, "When I See the Blood," and "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah."

Rev. Monroe again called the congregation to praver with Rev. Melroy Ward leading.

Rev. Monroe introduced General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, with fitting words of commendation. Rev. Snyder, before reading the scriptures, called the congregation to worship in song with two verses of "Tis so Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

A scripture lesson was read from Revelation 3:7-13. "The Secret of Success" was the theme chosen for the opening address. Rev. Snyder pointed out the fact that we have had some success as a Pilgrim Holiness Church, but he expressed a desire for greater success. He pointed out that four things were said to all the Asian churches: (1) "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches," (2) "Him that overcometh," (3) "I know thy works, "and (4) "To the angel of the Church." Rev. Snyder fittingly indicated the importance of hearing what the Spirit saith, since our success will be in exact proportion as we hear and obey what the Spirit says. To have spiritual success, men sometimes have to change their minds. Peter was given as an example of a hard-headed man who was ready to change after he heard the voice of the Spirit. Another example was cited as the Spirit spoke to the early church, saying, "Separate unto me Paul and Barnabas for the work whereunto I have called them." In referring to the words, "Him that overcometh," Rev. Snyder said, "Here we have spiritual conflict.

There are no Holy Ghost victories without their being challenged by Satan." Paul said, "A great door and an effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries." IT TAKES UNSPEAKABLE, UNUTTERABLE CONFLICT TO SEE SOULS SAVED. Of

the third thought, "I know thy works," the speaker said, "The Lord has the correct view. He knows the quantity and quality of our works. He not only knows what we have done but why we did it. The expression, "To the Angel of the Church," indicates spiritual responsibility, and in this case, ministerial responsibility. These messages are not given directly to the churches, but to the pastors; and they give them to the churches. The word 'angel' means messenger. When you have a message from God, give it. We are under sealed orders; we must be delivered from the people if we are to deliver God's message.

Following his very challenging message, Rev. Snyder prayed for the members of the Conference and asked God's blessings upon the deliberations.

After announcements by Rev. Monroe, the service was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Charles Felsburg.

Second Sitting, Wednesday a.m.

The morning sitting of the Conference was opened by Rev. Monroe. Rev. M. H. Robbins led the congregation in singing, "Draw me Nearer." Rev. Raymond Simpson led in prayer.

Dr. Melvin Snyder, chairman of the Conference, led the congregation in moments of worship with a responsive reading of Psalm 150. The Conference then proceeded with business, with the Conference Secretary reading the roll of Ministerial and lay delegates.

The District Superintendent's report was read and received with a standing vote of appreciation.

The report of the Assistant Superintendent was given and received with an "Amen" of appreciation.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted by motion.

The Treasurer's report was very ably given and the General Superintendent requested the pastors and delegates of the gold star churches to stand for recognition. Motion to receive the Treasurer's report with a standing vote of appreciation was seconded and carried. Rev. Snyder spoke words of high commendation of the District, the Superintendent, individual churches and pastors for the success they have attained this year and called for singing of the Doxology in celebration.

It was moved and seconded that the following be given recognition and received into the Conference and seated immediately within the Conference bar: Rev. and Mrs. A. T. Adams, Rev. and Mrs. Ted Wilson, Rev. F. W. Nason, Rev. I. J. Snider, Rev. and Mrs. D. R. Close. Motion carried. Others introduced to the Conference were: Rev. Pobert Hiler, Rev. Garry Spriggs, Rev. and Mrs. E. L. Jackson, and Rev. and Mrs. James Lynch.

The report of the Statistician was read and accepted by a rising vote of thanks. Rev. Moore urged the people to be more thorough in making out reports, so they will be accurate. The reports of memberships must be compared to the memberships appearing in the minutes of the previous year. At this point the chairman urged the pastors to receive members into probationary relationship, stating that at this point there are only five questions to be asked. At the beginning of the probationary membership, the members should be enrolled in a New Convert's class. This gives them a feeling of belonging. At this period, when they have severed their worldly connections, they need a new fellowship. At the end of this training, if they do not qualify, they automatically drop out; if they qualify, they are received into full membership after accepting the covenant of the church.

The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read and Certificates of Recognition were awarded the pastors of the Greenfield and Mulberry churches. This presentation was made by the District Superintendent. The report of the Secretary was then received by a standing vote of appreciation.

Before considering the reports of the Resolutions and the Ways and Means Committees, the chair ruled that these Committees are not to bring any resolutions not recommended by the Committee. When the work of the Committees is completed, time will be given to any individual who feels he must bring something to the attention of the Conference.

Conference bar was announced, as previously established in permanent rules; three sec-

tions at the right of the platform to the back center aisle, and the platform. Time of sittings as previously established to be 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon, 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. This also is a standing rule.

Report of the Resolutions Committee was read by the Secretary, Rev. Charles Felsburg, with the following results:

Resolution No. 1 concerning annual church meetings was ruled out of order by the chairman on grounds that it conflicted with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Resolution No. 2 to add "F" under Building Committee was seconded and carried.

Resolution No. 3 to delete "A" under Conference was seconded and carried.

Resolution No. 4 relating to the fiscal year was moved and seconded.

Announcements were made and we were adjourned by expiration of time, to reconvene at 2:00 p.m.

The service was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Howard Williams.

Third Sitting, Wednesday p.m.

The afternoon sitting convened with the General Superintendent in the chair. Rev. Charles Felsburg led the congregation in singing, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned," after which we were led in prayer by Mrs. L. R. Roberts.

Following a season of prayer, three ministers were introduced to the Conference; Rev. E. E. Leadingham from Marion, Ohio, who brought greetings from Eastern Ohio District; Rev. Earl Wilson from Gloversville, N. Y., and Rev. William Whitmore, who is returning to this district from West Virginia. It was moved and seconded, then carried, to grant these brethren an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

A substitute motion for resolution No. 4 of the Committee's report was read, moved and seconded, to close the conference year on December 31 and begin the new conference year on January 1, the annual Conference remaining in July as at the present time. It was moved and seconded that resolution No. 4 and the substitute be referred to a committee of three appointed by the chair, and the matter be presented to the conference next year. Motion carried.

Resolution No. 5 to delete Par. D under Ministers carried.

Resolution No. 6 to delete A and B under Ordination carried.

Resolution No. 7 concerning pastors was lost.

Resolution No. 8 concerning pastors' vacations carried.

Resolution No. 9 concerning the Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees was moved and seconded. The chair instructed the editing committee to include this in the minutes since it was omitted through error.

Resolution No. 10 under a new heading "Pastoral Calling" carried.

The Ways and Means Committee report was read by Rev. Stanley Dean.

Resolution No. 1 A and B concerning delegates' expenses was moved and seconded and referred back to the committee.

Resolution No. 2E concerning registration fee was moved and seconded. Conference was recessed for ten minutes and after returning to the tabernacle, discussion was resumed. A substitute motion was made and seconded to set aside one Sunday a year to receive a free will offering for camp expenses. Motion was lost. Main motion 2E was lost.

Resolution No. 3 relating to clean-up days carried.

Resolution No. 8A regarding price of the Conference minutes carried.

Resolution No. 9A concerning salary of District Superintendent was seconded.

An amendment to give the District Superintendent \$90.00 per week plus six cents (.06) per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay was made, seconded and carried. An amendment was offered to increase mileage to eight cents (.08). The amendment was lost. Resolution 9A as amended carried.

Resolution concerning Camp Pledge System was moved and seconded. An amendment was offered to delete the \$10.00 from the motion. The Amendment was lost. An amendment

was made to substitute the word 'shares' for 'pledges'. Amendment carried. Motion an amended carried.

Resolution concerning Ministerial Benevolent Fund was brought to the Conference. Motion was made and seconded to refer the entire matter to the District Council, and for them to bring the information to the Conference next year. Motion carried.

A recommendation from the District Council reading as follows:

"Be it resolved that all members of this conference, ministerial and lay, whose churches have not paid at least 90% of the United Stewardship Fund, be given a voice and vote in this Conference providing, in the act of accepting such privilege, they pledge themselves and their churches to do their utmost to raise this on a monthly basis in the coming year,"

was ratified by the Conference.

At this time, Dr. M. H. Snyder appointed Rev. G. F. Sheridan, Rev. Rudolph Moore and Rev. Charles Felsburg as the committee to study Resolution No. 4 and its substitute, for presentation to the next conference.

The following partial report of the Examining Board was read by Rev. W. L. Fisher and accepted by the Conference. For ordination as Ministers: Arlen Gray, James Estes, Gary Leiberick; for ordination as Deaconess, Mrs. Jeanette Gray; advanced to first year ministerial license, Jerald Lavy, Esther Elliott, Paul T. Berridge, Robert D. Hiler, Edsel Trouten, Arthur Scott; advanced to second year ministerial license, Levinia Walston; advanced to third year ministerial license, Gilbert DeLong.

Report of the Memorials Committee was read, and after moments of silent prayer, the chairman, Rev. Snyder, led in audible prayer acknowledging the triumph of those who passed to their reward during the past conference year.

It was moved and seconded to start the evening service at 7:30 to give the District Council and Committees more time to work. Motion carried.

After announcements were made the service was dismissed with prayer by Rev. I. J. Snider.

Fourth Sitting, Wednesday Evening

The evening service opened with Rev. G. F. Sheridan leading the congregation in singing, "I Know Whom I have Believed," and "A Charge to Keep I Have." We were led in prayer by Rev. G. E. Stace.

Two additional names for first year license were presented to the Conference by Rev. W. L. Fisher. They were Eden L. Johnson and Glen E. Wickard. A motion prevailed to accept the recommendation of the Examining Board.

The ordination service continued with Rev. Melroy Ward reading I Timothy, Chapter 3, Rev. G. F. Sheridan reading II Timothy 4:1-8 and Rev. Harold Monroe reading Titus 3:1-11. After the reading of the scriptures, Rev. Harold Monroe presented the candidates, James Estes, Gary Leiberick, Arlen Gray and Mrs. Jeanette Gray to Dr. Melvin Snyder for ordination.

Rev. Snyder read I Timothy 4, using the last part of the reading for the ordination address"Take heed unto thyself and unto the Doctrine." Rev. Snyder said this message is to Timothy and to us, and this warning is two-fold: (1) Take heed to SELF, and (2) to DOCTRINE.
A warning should be positive, and in this day we need to be warned. First, we have a warning
to the messenger. You will be remembered by what you are, long after you no longer speak.
We need to be genuine. You will have problems and you must have spiritual discipline, but
if you must discipline others, you must also discipline yourself. If you occupy a lowly, humble place, you will be more able to effectively help others. Your first responsibility is to "Take
Heed to Yourself." Since all of us are what we think, we should take heed to our mental processes. Take heed in these awful days to your attitude toward sin, for it is very important
that we have a proper concept of sin. Take heed to your attitude toward others. Take heed
to your attitude toward constituted authority.

Second, take heed to the Doctrine. There are many doctrines, but this refers to a particular one and that Doctrine is that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself. What-

ever you preach, you are to preach the Gospel and you will have success in winning souls. You may preach on related subjects, but always point men to Christ. Don't lose sight of this central thought that men are saved only by faith in Christ!

Next we have a word of exhortation - Continue steadfast. We are set aside, apart, for God, for all time and eternity.

Last we have this glorious promise - you will be saved, and you do not have to go to heaven alone, but you may go loaded with sheaves. "THOU SHALT BOTH SAVE THYSELF AND THEM THAT HEAR THEE." Each of us has our own ministry and in a very real sense, ours will be a saving ministry.

At the close of the message, Dr. Snyder gave a brief charge to the men who were to receive their first year license. Then turning to the candidates for ordination, he asked them the questions required of all candidates preceding ordination. After answering the questions satisfactorily, the candidates knelt at the altar and were duly ordained, three to the ministry and one as a deaconess, by Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, General Superintendent and the District Ordination Committee composed of Revs. Harold Monroe, Melroy Ward, M. H. Robbins and W. L. Kilwy. After a very impressive service, the congregation sang, "Blest be the Tie that Binds," and "The Old Rugged Cross," while the congregation greeted the newly ordained.

The Resolutions Committee reported. Resolution No. 11 to delete Pastoral Calls from the Grading system carried.

Resolution No. 12 concerning the Camp Ground Improvement Program carried, then was reconsidered by the Conference. After discussion, it was moved and seconded this matter be referred back to the Council. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that this Conference send love and greetings to Rev. L. R. Roberts who is ill at home. Carried.

It was moved and seconded we send greetings to Rev. B. A. Awe. Carried.

Service was adjourned by expiration of time, and we were dismissed with prayer by Rev. M. H. Robbins.

Fifth Sitting, Thursday a.m.

Conference was called to order with Rev. Donald Bassham leading the congregation in singing, "He abides." Rev. Floyd Belden led in prayer.

Rev. Harold Monroe, District Superintendent, recognized the presence of Dr. Paul F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, who later was to address the conference.

The following evangelists were presented to the Conference: Rev. Charles Marshall, Rev. I. J. Snider, Rev. Raymond Simpson, Rev. V. C. Sharp.

A motion prevailed to accept the Council's recommendation of Rev. V. C. Sharp for the field of evangelism.

Rev. M. H. Snyder, in presenting evangelists, mentioned the shortage of evangelists, and pointed out two things discouraging to evangelists, namely; the shortage of non-christians in their congregations, and the depression wages being paid them. He expressed the opinion that \$200.00 should be the barest minimum paid for a ten days or two weeks meeting.

After the evangelists were presented Dr. Paul F. Elliott was invited by the chairman to address the Conference. Dr. Elliott stressed the possible impact on the public schools by teachers trained in a Christian College. He indicated his burden to turn out a product loyal to the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He pointed out that there is no intention of competition between the Bible Colleges and the Liberal Arts College.

A motion prevailed to dispense with the roll call.

The Resolutions Committee reported and Resolution No. 13 concerning the District's stand on the 1960 presidential election carried.

Resolution No. 14 concerning Missions carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported and Resolution No. 1, referred in previous sitting, carried.

Resolution No. 10 B(8), Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their dis-

trict obligations without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual Conference, was seconded. An amendment was offered to have churches failing to meet their budgets appear before the District Council and receive just reprimand. The amendment carried. A motion prevailed to reconsider the original matter. After some debate, a motion was made calling for the previous question. The motion carried with a vote of 54 to 23.

Resolution to amend Par. 10 B(5) carried.

A motion came from the floor, with a second, that the District Superintendent ask the churches to raise the salary of the pastors 20%, or a minimum of \$5.00 per week. Carried.

Rev. W. L. Fisher brought a report from the Examining Board of Rev. E. L. Jackson transferring from the Wesleyan Methodist Church and Rev. J. Howard Berridge from the Church of Christ in Christian Union, both ordained ministers. Garry Spriggs was recommended for first year liceuse. Report accepted by motion and the men were received into the Conference.

and seconded the Conference minutes be approved by the District Council. Motion carried.

At this time, Rev. Monroe appointed tellers in preparation for the election of District Officers. Ballots were east for the Assistant Superintendent, Rev. O. E. Rutledge was elected on the second ballot.

Nominations for District Secretary were Rev. M. H. Robbins and Rev. L. R. Enlow. Rev. Robbins was elected on the first ballot.

Nominations for District Treasurer were Rev. G. F. Sheridan and Rev. G. E. Stace. Rev. Sheridan was elected on the first ballot.

Ballots were east for five advisory members of the Council. The Conference adjourned by expiration of time and ballots were counted during the lunch hour.

Sixth Sitting, Thursday p.m.

Meeting was called to order by the chairman calling for an immediate report of the tellers on the morning's ballot. The report declared four advisory members of the Council elected, namely, Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev. W. L. Kilwy, Rev. G. E. Stace and Rev. L. R. Enlow.

A motion was made to vote on the three highest remaining candidates, but Rev. Hannan withdrew his name. A motion was then made to vote on the three highest, Rev. Hannan excluded. Motion was seconded and carried. Rev. L. R. Roberts was elected on the first ballot.

Rev. Snyder requested we have an Educational Board and an Examining Board instead of a Combined Educational-Examining Board.

Motion to allow a plurality vote on both the Educational and the Examining Boards was seconded and carried.

The following Council nominations for the Educational Board were read by the Conference Secretary: Rev. L. R. Enlow, Rev. L. T. Brand and Rev. D. R. Close. Rev. Enlow was elected for three years, Rev. Close for one year. The Council had previously requested that Rev. Dean remain on the Educational Board for his unexpired term of office.

Rev. Marsh was asked to serve his unexpired term on the Examining Board. Six names were presented as nominations for this board: Revs. Ted Wilson, L. R. Roberts, Raymond Simpson, Charles Felsburg, O. E. Rutledge and W. L. Fisher. The four elected were: Revs. Raymond Simpson, three years; W. L. Fisher, and Ted Wilson, 2 years; and Charles Felsburg, one year.

Council nominations for District Trustee were read by the Secretary: Rev. W. L. Kilwy and Rev. L. R. Enlow. Rev. Kilwy was elected.

Moved and seconded we vote for Frankfort College Trustees on a plurality basis. Motion carried. The names of Revs. Harold Monroe, G. E. Stace, Charles Felsburg and L. R. Enlow were submitted to the Conference. Rev. Monroe and Rev. Stace were elected.

Nominations were read and ballots cast for District Statistician. The nominees were Rev. Rudolph Moore and Rev. R. T. Powell. Rev. Moore was elected.

The name of Francis Scott was presented by the Examining Board for first year license. This was ratified by the Conference.

The Secretary presented a letter of transfer for Rev. Wm. Whitmore from the West Virginia District. He was received into the Conference upon motion.

A Motion from the floor that the remaining items under "Standard of Excellence" on page 21 of 1959 minutes be deleted was seconded and carried.

Dr. Snyder introduced evangelists who had not been present when evangelists were introduced earlier in the conference. They were Rev. and Mrs. Howard Williams, Rev. James Estes and Rev. Wm. Whitmore.

A final resolution of appreciation was presented by the Secretary of the Resolutions Committee, and was adopted by the Conference.

Rev. Monroe expressed personal appreciation for the many kindnesses shown to him and his family, including the increase of salary. He also expressed appreciation to Rev. M. H. Snyder for his fine leadership during the conference.

A motion to authorize the District Council to take care of any unfinished business of the Conference was seconded and carried.

A motion for adjournment was offered and the 1960 conference became history with a closing prayer by District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General Interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

"Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to the standard required by the state, therefore be it resolved that.

A committee of three, two of whom shall not be members of the District Council, be appointed by the District Council to act as a Building Committee whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. To study the State Building Code and learn all requirements.
- B. To study methods of financing and have knowledge of best and cheapest ways.
- C. Check with church boards as to the deed and type of mortgage.
- D. No church can buy or build without the approval of this committee and a written consent from the District Council.
- E. This committee must be consulted before buying or building District Property.
- F. Be it resolved that the Building Committee be sent under the direction of the District Superintendent to each building project.

No. 3 CAMP AND CAMP SCHEDULE

- A. Be it resolved that any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Registrar, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.
- B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp, furnish their own linen.
- C. That our camp schedule be arranged to provide one afternoon service for Foreign Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions.
- D. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district to another district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp registrar.

- E. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- F. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.

No. 4 CONFERENCE

- A. Conference Bar to consist of three sections of seats at the right of the platform, to the back center aisle, and the platform.
- B. Conference time schedule to be: 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 Noon; 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- C. Be it further resolved that we provide for services for children during Conference.

No. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 5th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.

No. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

- A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a voucher.
- B. Be it further resolved that all ministers' phone numbers be carried in the Ministerial Directory.

No. 8 DISTRICT COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that our entire District Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.
- C. Be it further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 9 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved: that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 10 DISTRICT PROGRAM

In the light of God's blessing on the last General Conference, where faith and vision took precedent over problems and circumstances, and whereas Divine leadership was evident, Be it resolved that the General Church program as adopted by the General Conference and entitled "Toward Tomorrow" be continued in its entirety.

Be it further resolved that in conformance with this program, the following District goals be continued:

A net gain of two churches this year.

A net gain of 112 members each year (2 per church).

Annual pastors' conference.

Accentuated Holiness Evangelism.

Establishment of Prayer and Fasting Leagues. (Pledge people to fast and pray at least one meal each week - suggested Friday morning.)

To promote this program we propose in addition to existing District and General procedure that:

- (1) Our General Superintendent in cooperation with the District Superintendent and Council, be asked to meet with our people in special promotional meetings on Zone and local, as well as District level.
- (2) That the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following Conference for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work Local, District and General.

No. 11 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 12 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 13 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.
- C. The location of this convention should be as nearly central as possible.

No. 14 MISSIONS

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two persons to serve with the District Superintendent as a Home Missionary Committee.
- B. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.
- C. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- D. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.
- E. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.
- F. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.
- G. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer and forwarded to the Treasurer of this committee.

No. 15 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 16 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination,

we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. All mini ters being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- B. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night of Conference. No. 17 PASTORS
- A. Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- B. To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.
- D. Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conferenc Year without consent of the District Council.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- F. Inasmuch as moving Pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage due to varied facilities:
 Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church-owned parsonages.
- G. Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastor a two week vacation with pay, and that time for pastor to take said vacation be decided by the Church Board and the pastor.
- No. 18 PASTORAL CALLING

Be it resolved that each person visited in a hospital or in a home shall be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 19 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 20 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Be it resolved that this Conference go on record as opposing the election of a Roman Catholic as President of the United States, and that each pastor of the Western Ohio Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church urge the people in his congregation to vote accordingly.

No. 21 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.

No. 22 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after the election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 23 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3,

namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.

- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.
- No. 24 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION
- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends the state conference provide for a District Sunday School Committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Rally be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- C. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our Distruct Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- D. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.
- No. 25 SUPERINTENDENT
- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.
- No. 26 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

- No. 27 VOTING
 - Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.
- No. 28 YOUTH
 - Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.
- No. 29 APPRECIATION
- A. Be it resolved:
 - That we extend to our General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference, and that a letter of

- appreciation be mailed to them by our District Secretary, and that we express our appreciation to Rev. Darrell Rotz for his labors as a reporter.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to relieve the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly renumerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. That all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, The price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives.
- F. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimburse their delegate for traveling expenses.
- G. That the charge for rooms for camp and conference be as follows:
 - (1) Rooms at the rate of \$8.00 for the entire time or \$1.50 per day.
 - (2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time or \$1.00 per day.
 - (3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; enlist throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give three days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$20.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by the district council.

No. 5 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting church extension within the district.
- B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.
- C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.
- D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of five per cent (5%).
- E. Be it resolved that we substitute the PENNY-A-MEAL offering with an increase in the District Budget of \$4.00 per member. Said money shall be dispersed as follows: the min-

imum payment on principal and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp ground fund and District Church Extension Fund.

F. Realizing the cost of interest, we propose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

WHAT THE LOAN FUND CAN DO

- (1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.
- (2) Evantually improve some older but premising churches.
- (3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.
- (4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus giving them funds with which to operate.
- (5) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The money will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 8 MINISTERS' DUTIES

- A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 9 MINUTES

- A. Be it resolved that the price of the Minutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.
- B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$25.00 for these services.

No. 10 SALARIES

- A. District Superintendent.
 - (1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$90.00 per week, 6 cts. per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
 - (2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6 cts. per mile traveling expense.
- B. District Council.

Resolved that 6 cts. per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized District work.

- C. District Treasurer and Secretary.
 - Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's salary be \$500.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$200.00.
- D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.
 Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 11 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund (Formerly General Budget)

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provision as follows:

Foreign Missions 20% or \$1.60
Administration
General Church Extension 14% or 1.12
Senior College 21.4% or 1.71
Church Extension Loan Fund 3% or
Sunday School Extension and Youth 2.6% or .21
Contingent 3% or $.24$
Total, per Member per Year 100% or \$8.00

B. District Budget.

- (1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offerings received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.
- (2) Be it resolved that we raise 25 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference Expense.
- (3) Be it resolved that each church raise at least 50 cts. per member per year for our zone school.
- (4) Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member per year be raised annually to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.
- (5) Inasmuch as there is an indebtedness of \$5,800.00 on the addition of the showers and modernization of the rest rooms on the camp ground, be it resolved that we ask each church to raise \$1.00 per member per year to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, to be applied on this indebtedness until paid, and that each church pay this portion of their budget this year by November 30 if possible.
- (6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Cold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.
- (7) Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.
- (8) Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their district obligations without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

No. 12 SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE

Be it resolved that each church raise \$5.00 per year for the financing of our Sunday School Institute. We urge each church to take care of this before the time set for the Institute.

No. 13 TREASURER

- A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.
- B. Insuring of the Treasurer We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 14 YOUTH

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in budget statement as "camp and conference."
- C. That young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult super-

vision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

IN MEMORIAM

CALVIN C. CHRISTY was born in Wauseon, Ohio, August 22, 1924 and departed this life October 3, 1959 at the age of 35 years. He was converted and became a member of the Grand Rapids Pilgrim Holiness Church. He was always a ready and willing worker for the Lord and the Church. He felt his call to the ministry and attended Owosso Bible College. He was preparing for this work at the time of his sudden death.

REV. RALPH DILLARD was born in 1889 and departed this life August 11, 1959. Bro. Dillard was saved at the age of eleven and served the Lord faithfully until the end. He was united in marriage to Margaret Long and to this untion were born four children. His widow and three of the children survive. We rejoice that another of God's children has won the race.

MRS. FERN HENSCHEN was born in the year of 1899 and departed this life February 11, 1960. She was saved at an early age and was a faithful servant of the Lord. YOUTH CONFERENCE REPORT OF DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

TO OUR ASSISTANT GENERAL YOUTH SECRETARY, REV. JOSEPH BROWN AND MEMBERS OF THIS YOUTH CONFERENCE:

We are overshadowed by the great democratic and republican conventions as men and women of politics are engaged in the selection of a man they anticipate to serve as Chief Executive of the United States of America. We are aware that our convention is not receiving such worldwide attention—much less N.B.C. news coverage; but let us be assured that we are receiving heaven-wide recognition. Rev. Rudolph Moore gave a brief statistician's report that was accepted.

The motion was made and carried that this conference give Rev. Richard Powell and the West Carrollton church a rising vote of appreciation for the tables they made.

The report of the resolutions committee was given with the following revisions:

It was moved and carried that Resolution No. 2, BIBLE MEMORIZATION, be deleted, inasmuch as this project was culminated at the National Youth Convention.

It was moved and carried that Resolution No. 5, REPORTER, be changed to read "Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather news for the youth page of the **Western** Builder."

It was moved and carried that Resolution No. 8, YOUTH CAMP, the District Youth Camp

will begin the last Monday of June each year unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.

Resolution No. 8A, YOUTH CAMP. It was resolved that the Youth Committee be responsible for the buying at the youth camp. An amendment was added that the words "Youth Committee" be changed to "District Youth Council." The amendment and original motion was carried.

Resolution No. 8B, YOUTH CAMP, It was resolved: Inasmuch as the site of our present youth camp has inadequate facilities, that the District Youth President appoint a committee to investigate the possibilities of renting a campground for the youth camp and bring a report back to this conference next year.

An amendment to this motion was added from the floor, "This committee shall be authorized to make this change if possible for this coming youth camp, and if not, the report to be given at the next conference." Both the amendment and motion carried.

Under Resolution No. 11 YOUTH SOCIETIES. The motion was made and carried that the words "this Youth Conference" be changed to "the Youth Conference."

A motion was made from the floor that the District Youth treasurer's books be closed July 5 and the youth council appoint an auditing committee. This motion carried.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee was given with the following revisions:

No. 2 PROJECT FUND - A motion was made and carried that our youth project be the buying of some permanent teaching aids, recreational equipment for the youth camp, and the purchase of stainless steel dinnerware for the dining room.

A motion was made and carried from the floor that the presidents of the local societies submit a written report of their local society, highlighting the activities, special services, and projects. This report is to be submitted to the secretary of the annual Youth Conference next year.

Rev. Rotz congratulated the national quiz winners from the Western Ohio district and made a motion that the secretary write a letter of honor and appreciation to Mary Smack, Janet Bennett and Grace Hilton of the Hamilton Church for their effort which made them successful as national winners of the quiz contest. This motion was carried. Another motion was made and carried that this conference give them a standing vote of appreciation.

Rev. Joe Brown appointed tellers for the election of officers.

Rev. Darrell Rotz was re-elected as District Youth President.

Rev. Rudolph Moore was re-elected as District Youth vice-president.

Rev. Stanley Dean was re-elected as District Youth Treasurer.

Rev. Lowell Thomas Brand was re-elected as District Youth Secretary.

The conference was divided into respective zones for the election of the zone chairmen. The following zone chairmen were elected: Dayton Zone - Rev. W. L. Kilwy, Defiance Zone - Rev. Paul Berridge, Greenville Zone - Rev. Rudolph Moore, Hamilton Zone - Mr. James Booher, Lima Zone - Rev. Claire Bailey, Mulberry Zone - Rev. Charles Felsburg, Washington Court House Zone - Rev. A. T. Adams.

The resolution committee offered the motion that we give Rev. Joe Brown a standing vote of appreciation for his capable leadership over this conference. The motion was carried.

The conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Darrell Rotz.

Report Of Young People's Resolutions Committee

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone Chairmen, be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be

standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

No. 3 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develop a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather news for the youth page of the Western Builder.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, campground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 STATISTICIAN

Whereas the Manual in Section 86, part 2, provides for each local youth president to give a report at the annual youth conference, be it resolved that we have a youth statistician and that said statistician be appointed by the Youth Council; and this report will not conflict with the present District report.

No. 7 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program - plans, date, and administration to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

- A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp will begin the last Monday of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.
- C. At the request of Rev. G. F. Sheridan, District Treasurer, we have examined the cash receipts and disbursements of the Pilgrim Holiness Church - Western Ohio District for the period July 6, 1959 to July 5, 1960 which included the summer camp operation for the period July 16, 1959 to December 16, 1959.

Recorded cash receipts were traced to bank deposits and disbursements were evidenced by cancelled checks. Cash on deposit was confirmed by a statement issued by the Arcanum National Bank, Arcanum, Ohio. Transactions in the Pilgrim Holiness Church Extension Fund savings account were traced to journal entries and found to be in order. The savings account

balance of \$1,876.35 at July 5, 1960 was confirmed by correspondence with the Arcanum National Bank.

The summer camp operation resulted in a net loss of \$157.74 which was withdrawn from District account funds. A separate checking account for the camp was not maintained for the year in review. Therefore, general fund cash receipts and disbursements include the camp operation. Camp transactions were transferred to a detailed journal and found to correspond with the general fund transactions. A comparative history of your organization would be available if the general account receipts and disbursements did not include the summer camp operation.

It was impractical to verify recorded contributions received. However, from the extent of the examination it is our opinion that the accompanying statements of cash receipts and disbursements correctly reflect the cash received and paid out during the period under review.
