Resolution No. 4. Whereas our Young People's Societies need definate, prescribed objectives to stimulate interest and to tie them closer to the program of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and

Therefore, be it resolved, that we recommend our Pilgrim Youth sponsor the white work in Africa and the opening of the New Home Missionary District in Florida.



"Some forces are so deep-seated strongly entrenched that they cannot be overcome by any other means.

"He who never practices fasting is never apt to become eminently holy."

3. Roy Morgan's paper on "Ministerial Ethics" was desired by several to be published in the Pilgrim News so no exceprts

are given here.

Ralph Steelhead was unable to be present to read his paper on: "Evaluation of Hymns in Worship." Sister S. C. Rees read it and gave comments on the subject:

"The true value of hymns is not appreciated as much as it should be."

"Hymn singing has produced some of the greatest revivals.'

A hymn is an Ode of praise to God: if praise be given to anyone or anything else -it is not a hymn."

"We should seek quality in the hymns we select."

5. The Prophetic note was sounded by Rev. Wm. Beirns, editor of the "Midnight Cry" magazine.

Some years ago, preaching on the Rapture of the Church and the coming of Christ was very prominent, but there has come a degree of confusion because of differing interpretations, so that the subject has been largely dropped. We are now in the period represented by the ten virgins who all 'slumbered and slept'.

Then will go out the cry of "Peace and safety", but another cry will also go forth: it will be the "midnight cry" 'Behold the Bridegroom cometh'. Then all awaking virgins will be stirred and will wish they had kept awake.

6. Rev. L. Lincicome, evangelist.

"God consciousness fades out of the life just to the extent that the closet is neglected."

"One who has not the ability to stay with God in the closet will not be able to stay with Him out of the closet."

Rev. Wm. S. Deal gave six rules which a minister must follow to keep his soul

- 1. He must attend to the culture of his own soul.
- 2. He must sternly and systematically spend time in prayer.
- 3. There must be the personal appropriation of God's Word for his own soul.
- 4. He must seek to liv in an atmosphere conducive to spirituality.
- 5. He must avoid the restless scattering of his energies over a multiplicity of things.
- 6. He should observe family devotions wherever he is staying.

Bro. Deals' sermons were pointed and penetrating. Good altar services followed with a good number of people seeking God and finding Salvation to God be all the glory.



As it is now getting close to our Camp meeting time, and we are all interested in having a great time in the Lord, it is in the interests of all concerned that I write you this letter at this time.

The Council has again appointed me as the Manager of the Cafeteria and lunch stand on the Camp grounds for the coming Camp and Assembly, and I am writing all of the churches to see if we can again have a good response toward curtailing the expense of meals so that all may get meals

at as reasonable cost as possible.

Last year in response to our requests, the folk answered with a ready hand and quite a bit came in so that we were able to keep the cost of meals at a minimum. (We served a meal at the noon hour that would have cost no less than \$1.00 at most restaurants for 60c.) We are going to try and keep these low levels as near as possible for the coming Camp. We shall only be able to do so by the different churches sending in canned foods and fruits and other items which will help us in setting the tables with low cost food. Things such as meats, vegetables, milk, eggs and fresh fruits will be a great help to us. (Of course any perishable foods should not be brought in too far ahead, but any canned food may be brought in early.)

We thank you for your help the past year, and shall appreciate what you will

do to help this year.

Our price list for meals for the coming Camp meeting and conference is to be very little above previous years and a tentative price range will be as follows: Breakfast (complete) 45c; Noon Meal (lunch) 65c; Evening meal (supper) 50c. There may have to be a slight adjustment of these figures, but we hope that it will be to a lower than a higher. Of course those who do not buy full meals will be charges accordingly.



James M. Dooley Called Home

JAMES MERLE DOOLEY was born October 20, 1899, at Bellville, Kansas, and departed this life August 5, 1951, at El Monte, California, at the age of

51 years, 9 months, and 16 days.

He found the Lord early in life, and soon afterward was called to preach the gospel. He attended the Wesleyan Methodist Bible School at Miltonville, Kansas, and later, the Bible school at Tabor, Iowa. While at Tabor he began his ministry, serving as a student pastor. Upon graduation, he was united in marriage to Miss Agnes Morehead. He later enrolled in Chicago Bible Institute, where he received his degrees. While there, he pastored the Northwood Park Community Church. Upon leaving this pastorate, he organized and pastored the Jefferson Park Tabernacle for several years. He then came west to Colorado Springs, Colorado, where he united with the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and served on the teaching staff of the Colorado Springs Bible Training School.

In the autumn of 1935 he came to California, where he spent the remaining years of his life as pastor, evangelist, and Bible school teacher. For several years he conducted a radio broadcast. Always a scholar and student, he was a spiritual and aggressive preacher of the Word. He served his God and the Pilgrim Holiness Church in various capacities, as assistant district superin-

tendent, on the district councils, and on Bible school boards.

As a pastor, he served the Bellflower, Ventura, East Los Angeles, East

Pasadena, and Long Beach churches of the California conference.

Left to mourn his departure are: his wife, Agnes M. Dooley; a son, Rev. Kenneth Dooley of Eugene, Oregon; three daughters, Mrs. Darlene Anderson of Rosemead, California; Esther Marie, and Bonnie Ruth; one grandson, Terryl Kenneth Dooley; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Dooley of Bellville, Kansas; two brothers, Earl of Manhattan, Kansas, and H. F. of Oakland, California; two sisters, Mrs. Art Goeske of Chicago, Illinois; and Mrs. Glen Corman of Caspar, Wyoming; and a host of friends.

While we feel the loss keenly, it gives consolation to know that our loss

is heaven's gain.

The funeral sermon was delivered by Rev. C. L. Morgan. Scripture was read and prayer was offered by Rev. E. W. Hall. Obituary was read by Rev. Omar Fenton. Rev. Clinton Jones was the soloist. Rev. H. J. Olsen gave the graveside remarks. Benediction was pronounced by Rev. Omar Fenton.

DEDICATION OF CHURCH

Located in the thriving valley of Yucaipa, California, is a new Pilgrim Holiness Home Mission Church. The lot for this new Church was purchased by the California-Arizona District in November, 1950. The ground-breaking service was held on March 11, 1951.

Soon after the ground-breaking service, work was begun to construct a sanctuary thirty-two by forty feet, including an auditorium, rest rooms, and three classrooms, which open to provide more room in the auditorium. The opening service was on the morning of July 22, 1951. Each district council member present participated in the service, and a challenging dedicatory message was brought by our faithful District Superintendent, Reverend Clifford Morgan. At the conclusion of the sermon a solemn charge was accepted by the pastor and his wife, and district trustees, who are acting as trustees of this new Church. An offering of \$70 was given to be used by the local church for necessary materials.

Meet the President of Pilgrim Bible Institute, who is a native of this state, born in El Centro, California, November 27, 1915, the son of William D. Thomas, who now resides in Oregon.

He is now beginning his fourth year of administrative duties at P.B.I. However, preceding that time, he served on the school board of directors for seven years.

Mr. Thomas was first converted at the age of 12 while attending the former Pilgrim Grammar School in Pasadena. After the Pilgrim Bible Institute was begun in 1932 at El Monte, (formerly known as the Holiness Evangelistic Institute) he enrolled there as a High School student, graduating in 1934. The following year he enrolled in the Christian Workers' Course, during which time the Lord called him to a full consecration of life and service. After graduating from the Christian Workers' Course he became pastor of the Redlands church. While there, he married Katherine Dawson, also a student in P.B.I.

He has pastored nine years in the California District, and three years in Central Point, Oregon, where he opened and organized the church. In 1938 he came back to P.B.I. and finished the theological work required for the Th.B. degree. In 1950 he graduated from La Verne College, receiving the B.A. degree, with an education major.

Future plans? To finish graduate work at U.S.C., if God wills. He hopes to see P.B.I. become accredited, with buildings and facilities adequate to train future generations of Pilgrims for the work of the Lord Jesus Christ and the Pilgrim Holiness Church. We bid him God speed and assure him our prayers and co-operation for the advancement of His Kingdom.-Editor.
