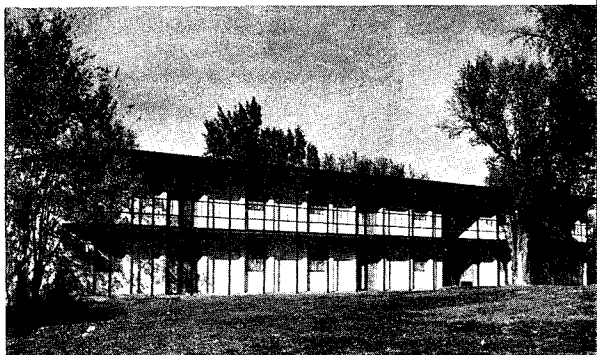

CALIFORNIA ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Journal of Proceedings

First Sitting, June 27, 1967

The forty-fifth conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Azusa Pacific College Hillside Campus, Glendora, California, at 9:00 A.M.

Congregational singing was led by Jack Gilbert. Lundy Hill offered prayer.

District Superintendent Thomas Lee introduced General Superintendent J. D. Abbott, presiding officer of the conference. Rev. Abbott spoke from the Scripture, I Thessalonians 4:1-8 upon the subject of holy living. Holiness, he pointed out, is a doctrine of purity, of uprightness, of righteousness, the opposite of impurity, wickedness, vice. The Christian's life is to be the pure life; the Christian's life will be just the kind of life that person wants it to be, the kind of life he is willing to pay the price for. The speaker concluded the message by quoting 10 practical traits of the sanctified.

Conference business opened by roll call to which 42 ministerial and 47 lay delegates responded.

The District Superintendent moved to receive into the conference Rev. Wilbur Smith, pastor of Los Angeles First Church, pending receipt of proper transfer papers. Motion carried.

The conference bar was established as the first seven rows of seats in the auditorium and the tables at the front.

The chair referred to general conference action making it unnecessary for the district conferences to formally accept ministerial transfers.

The District Superintendent introduced Rev. George Harris, transferring from the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District, now pastoring Rees Memorial Church and Rev. Wilbur Smith, transferring from the Indiana District, now pastoring Los Angeles First Church. These ministers were welcomed by the chair.

Time of conference sittings was set as follows: 9:00 A.M. - 11:30 A.M. and 1:15 P.M. - 4:30 P.M.

Rev. Ermal Wilson and Rev. Jim Sheets were introduced by the Reception Committee, welcomed by the chair, and granted honorary seats within the conference bar.

Report of the District Superintendent was read and received with a rising vote of thanks.

Oral report of the Assistant District Superintendent was presented and received.

The District Treasurer's report was presented and received.

By common consent, two sheets of the Treasurer's report which highlighted U.S.F. giving and other special offerings will be omitted from the printed reports in the conference journal.

Motion carried to give the District Treasurer a rising vote of thanks.

The General Superintendent gave special honor to pastors of those churches that paid 80-100% of General U.S.F., stating that these churches will receive certificates of recognition from the general church.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was read and accepted with appreciation.

The first sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

Second Sitting

The second sitting opened with congregational singing led by Jim Wilkins. Max Greene led in prayer.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. Joseph Ryan, director of the Southwest region of N.A.E., who spoke briefly on the various facets of the N.A.E. program.

Minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

General Superintendent Abbott presented certificates of recognition to pastors of churches that were faithful in U.S.F. giving, as follows: One-star churches—Los Angeles, Sylmar; two-star churches—Corona, Sacramento,

Buena Park; three-star churches—East Pasadena, Redondo Beach, Ojai, San Diego, Rialto, San Dimas and Santa Ana.

Brother Abbott presented briefly the current Pilgrim Pension Plan special offer to ministers and churches.

Report of the District Missionary Society President was presented.

Report of the Auditing Committee was read and received.

District Missionary Society President's report was received with expression of appreciation for Mrs. Beck's eight years' service as District President.

Statistical Committee's summary report was read and received.

Partial report of the Educational and Examining Boards was read and adopted.

Report of the Conference Action Committee was read and voted upon as follows:

Nominations for vacancy on Examining Board were: Omar Fenton, C. L. Morgan, Fred K. Wells. Ballots were cast. Tellers retired to count the ballots.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Tellers retired to count the votes.

Tellers reported L. B. Smalley elected District Treasurer.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

Fred Wells dismissed with prayer.

Third Sitting

The third sitting opened at 9:00 A.M., Wednesday, June 28, with congregational singing led by L. B. Smalley.

General Superintendent Abbott read II Peter 3:1-14 and brought a devotional message highlighting challenges facing the church in these last days — challenges to love, to give, to be pure, to be joyful, to pray, to serve.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Motion carried to dispense with the roll call.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Leonard Leitzel who was welcomed by the chair and granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

Tellers report indicated the following: Assistant Superintendent, no election; District Secretary, no election; Examining Board, C. L. Morgan; Educational Board, Joseph Fillmore, three-year term.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent. Tellers retired to tally the votes.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Tellers retired to count ballots. Report of balloting for Assistant District Superintendent declared Lundy Hill elected.

Tellers' report indicated no election for District Secretary. New ballots were cast.

Ballots were cast for additional member of the Educational Board. Nominations for district trustee for a term of three years were: Charles McKay, Clayton Hockenberry, Bill Crowe. Ballots were cast.

Report of balloting for District Secretary declared Ellis Morrell elected. Nominations for District Missionary Society President were: Dorothy Greene, Ruth Cooper, Fawn Palmer. Ballots were cast.

Tellers' report indicated no election to the Educational Board. Another ballot was cast.

Report of ballot for District Trustee declared Charles McKay elected. Ballots were cast for advisory members of the district council.

The Reception Committee introduced Dr. and Mrs. C. W. Thomas who were welcomed by the chair and granted honorary seats within the conference bar.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

Fourth Sitting

The fourth sitting opened at 1:15 P.M. with congregational singing led by Robert Seelig. Donald Rippey led in prayer.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Robert Girard, fraternal delegate from the Wesleyan Methodist Church, who brought greetings from the California conference of that denomination. Rev. Girard was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Gilman Welch, pastor of the McKinleyville Pilgrim Church, who gave a word of greeting and testimony.

Correction made by the reporter of the Committee of Tellers necessitated additional balloting for advisory council member.

Motion carried to vote on the two names receiving the highest number of votes in the previous balloting. Ballots were cast. Tellers retired to tally the votes.

Mile High Pines Youth Camp Report was presented and accepted. By

common consent, totals of the semi-annual financial report of Mile High Camp were called for and read.

Tellers' report declared Fred Wells elected advisory member of the District Council.

Report of the director of CYC was read and accepted.

Report of the director of PELT was read and received.

Report of the District Sunday School Treasurer was read and accepted.

Final report of the Educational and Examining Boards was presented and adopted. The following motion, made by the chairman of the Educational Board, carried: Inasmuch as it is impossible for Rev. Richard Tschinkel to attend the ordination service of this conference, due to circumstances beyond his control, therefore, be it resolved that this conference request our General Superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott, and our District Superintendent, Rev. Thomas Lee, to make arrangements for his ordination.

Report of the Conference Action Committee was presented and acted upon as follows:

The General Superintendent explained that California is entitled to four ministerial and four lay delegates to the international conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and four ministerial and seven lay delegates to the merging General Conference. Ballots were cast for four ministerial delegates to these conferences.

Motion carried to recess until tellers are ready to report.

Report of balloting declared Lundy Hill and Thomas Hamon elected.

Motion carried to vote on the six names receiving the highest number of votes. Inasmuch as Lundy Hill is an ex-officio member of the international conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, another minister will be elected delegate to this conference. L. B. Smalley and Joseph Fillmore were elected to serve as delegates to both conferences; C. L. Morgan to the international conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church only.

Motion carried that alternate delegates be selected by strength of the previous vote. (It is to be noted that C. L. Morgan will be first alternate to the merging conference.) Other alternates by strength of vote are: Wm. S. Deal, R. M. Greene, George Harris.

Ballots were cast for seven lay delegates to the merging general conference.

Motion carried to recess five minutes while ballots are being counted.

At the request of the chair, Dr. Clifford Thomas represented Owosso College, commenting on enrollment, teaching staff, campus, facilities, activities and curriculum.

Report of balloting declared Joe Potts, Martin Horine, Charles McKay and Paul Green elected delegates to the merging General Conference.

Motion carried to vote on six names receiving highest number of votes for additional delegates. Ballots were cast.

Motion carried to extend the time to the completion of business.

Report of balloting declared June Hill and Fred Gustin elected delegates to the merging conference. (Inasmuch as Joe Potts is an ex-officio member of the international conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, June Hill will serve as delegate to that conference also.)

Motion carried to vote on the three highest names for additional lay delegate to the merging conference. Ballots were cast.

Final report of the Conference Action Committee was read and voted upon as follows:

Tellers reported no election on last balloting.

Motion carried to vote on the two highest names for additional lay delegate. Jim Wilkins was elected.

Motion carried that alternate delegates be determined by strength of vote on the second ballot. Alternate delegates in order of strength of vote are: Milton Stuart, Victor Klein, Ralph Mackay, Gertrude Beck.

Motion carried that any unfinished business be referred to the District Council with power to act, including hearing of the minutes of the fourth sitting.

Motion carried to adjourn at 5:00 P.M.

District Superintendent Thomas Lee dismissed with prayer.

ORDINATION SERVICE

Four ministers and three deaconesses were ordained June 28, 6:30 P.M.

Prayer of invocation was offered by C. L. Morgan, L. B. Smalley led the congregation in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have," after which Lundy Hill led in prayer. The congregation sang "Rock of Ages."

District Superintendent presented the ordinands to the General Superintendent as follows: Ministerial, Gilman Welch, Roland Lamb, James Adamson, David Holmquist; Deaconess, Barbara Holmquist, Ruby Tschinkel, Merline Miller.

Joseph Fillmore read I Timothy 3; Fred Wells read II Timothy 4:1-4.

Rev. J. D. Abbott spoke from I Corinthians 1:26-29 highlighting some dangers which face ministers and urging the ordinands to chart their ministerial life to miss such snares. The ministry, he pointed out, is an office of dignity and honor, demanding the whole man. The preacher faces the enemy of the souls of men, charged to preach the eternal truth; let him be aggressive in giving the truth.

The candidates stood before the altar and responded to the covenant as read by Rev. Abbott. As they knelt at the altar, Thomas Lee offered prayer. The ordination council lay hands on the candidates as Rev. Abbott ordained each one individually.

The Lord's presence was especially manifest as the congregation greeted the newly-ordained before the altar.

Thomas Hamon dismissed with prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our General Superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott, my fellow ministers, delegates to the forty-fifth Annual Conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and friends, greetings!

I would indeed be an ingrate if I did not preface this report with praise and thanksgiving to God for His blessings upon His people this past church year. There have been gratifying reports of divine visitation in revival power upon many of our churches, resulting in the salvation of sinners, and the purifying of believers. This is the whole purpose of our existence, and without it everything else we do is without real point or purpose. Though the problems of the work may abound, yet if God is in our midst, His love constrains us to labor in faith, and in love, for the glory of His great name.

District Leaders. I cannot speak too highly of the services of those who have labored with me as Conference leaders through this past year. The advice and cooperation of the men on the District Council, their long hours of wrestling with the many problems, their patience, and their faith, has been inspirational.

Rev. Lundy Hill has been a considerate and helpful assistant. His words of counsel have been of great value. Tribute should be given to *Rev. Joseph Fillmore*, District Secretary, and to *Rev. L. B. Smalley*, District Treasurer, for the faithful discharge of their duties, and rendering many services beyond this point, out of sheer love for God and the church. *Charles McKay* has continued to give able spiritual direction, and promotional versatility, in the leadership of our District Youth program. His report will be found in the minutes of the District Youth Conference printed in our Conference Journal. *Rev. Eugene Lee* has ably, and industriously directed the efforts of the Sunday School Committee in giving leadership to the District program. The recent Victory Night Banquet was well planned and attended, and was a fitting climax to the year's activities. *Mrs. Gertrude Beck* has had a fruitful and continuing ministry as President of our District Missionary Society. With the fine cooperation of her husband, Rev. Paul Beck, she has performed service far beyond normal in her conduct of the office. Under her able leadership our societies have functioned cooperatively, and effectively, in behalf of mis-

sions at home and abroad. We are debtors to her for the many arduous hours spent in behalf of the church. It is certainly worthy of our appreciation.

A Forward Look. At our Area Leaders Conference held at Colorado Springs, Colorado, last December, our General Superintendent, Rev. J. D. Abbott, forcefully emphasized the need of our people for: (1) A Spiritual Renewal, (2) A Deeper Loyalty, (3) A More Effective Outreach. This emphasis so warmed the hearts of District Leaders in attendance that we plan to make this the pattern for the dominant theme on our Conference for the coming year. We solicit the prayers and cooperation of our people in the implementation of this program. As we look toward the consummation of merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, let us pray for a merging of spirit as well as a merging of numbers and material assets. If we move in this vein, God will be glorified, and we shall realize genuine benefits to our own Conference, and throughout the new Wesleyan Church.

LOCAL ADVANCES:

Sacramento. One year ago I reported to the Conference that our church at Sacramento was rapidly moving toward assuming total responsibility for the operation of the work in our state capitol. I am happy to report to this Conference that, under the able leadership of Rev. Lundy Hill, the congregation has been completely independent of District financial support since December 1, 1966. In addition to this, the last report from the District Treasurer indicated that they have supported the District and General Church in U.S.F. participation alone, in excess of \$850 for this church year. Praise God for this fine church and pastor!

Corona. God has signally blessed the teamwork of the Corona Pilgrims as they have labored with their pastor, Rev. Clifford Morgan, to advance God's cause. This year they have acquired a much-needed property adjacent to the church for the sum of \$9000. This property sold two years before for \$13,300. Improvements consist of a two-bedroom house on a spacious lot, a double garage, screened patio area, and a large storage room. The members have completely redecorated the interior, and it is presently being used to house a portion of their expanding Sunday School. In addition to this purchase, they have installed a new chancel rail and altar in the sanctuary, and acquired an organ for the sum of \$722. Congratulations, Corona!

El Monte. The El Monte Pilgrims, with pastor R. M. Greene at the helm, have just completed a beautiful new sanctuary, complete with office facilities, nursery, pews, and pulpit furnishings. The appraised value of this new structure is \$85,500. Due to the industry of the pastor and his people it has been erected for approximately \$50,000. El Monte church is to be complimented for this splendid structure.

Escondido Church with Rev. Thomas C. Hamon as pastor, has implemented a major move to insure growth and outreach in the city. They were providentially enabled to secure acreage, in a rapidly growing area, that will permit expansion of their facilities as numerical growth warrants. The old church property has been sold, and all buildings have been moved to the new location. This move has resulted in the saving of thousands of dollars in materials, and expedites continuation of their program without loss of time. The congregation looks to the future with high anticipation of wholesome development in Kingdom building.

McKinleyville, our newest work, is looking forward to being able to build a first unit in which to worship, in the near future. This group has been meeting in a building scarcely larger than a double garage, and a larger facility is a real necessity. Pastor Gilman Welch reports numbers finding the Lord, and it is my sincere opinion that they would more than double attendance in a very short time if they had space in which to put them. The people are praying and giving to keep their work in operation, and looking to God to enable them to begin their building program. Perhaps some of you who listen may be able to help answer these prayers with a substantial contribution.

Oak View, with Rev. Eugene Lee as pastor, is laboring to hold the line against great odds that militate against the progress of the work. However, as a result of memorial funds given in honor of two former members, Guy Watson, and Earl Short, they have completely renewed the platform and pulpit areas of the sanctuary, and provided a beautiful floor covering with pulpit furnish-

ings. The people are courageously rallying to meet their needs and are pressing forward with faith and optimism.

Ojai Church reports the renovation of several Sunday School classrooms in the church building. New floor covering, repainting, and enlarging of these rooms has added much to the beauty of God's house. Pastor W. H. Robinson is the leader of this congregation.

San Dimas Church is going "full speed ahead" to complete the first two units of their new plant. There have been a number of financial hurdles to overcome, but with continued hard work, pastor L. B. Smalley and his people are pressing this project to completion, and hope to be using their new facility very soon.

Long Beach reports extensive remodeling of their Sunday School Annex to provide better accommodations for their Sunday School. This has involved plaster repair, floor covering for two rooms, and the painting of three rooms and a hallway. Pastor Rev. James Adamson and members contributed many hours in making this improvement possible.

Sylmar Church. Rev. Jack Gilbert, pastor, has painted the entire church building on the outside, and interior of all classrooms. They have also painted the parsonage inside and out, and provided it with drapes, and a refrigerator. In addition to this, much lawn and shrub work has been done to keep the property presentable. Besides a great deal of hard work, about \$850 has been paid out for paint and repairs.

Redondo Beach. Pastor Lee Sorenson reports that due to the generosity of a couple attending their church, the floor of the sanctuary has been completely covered with wall to wall carpeting. New drapes have also been added and fresh paint in various areas of the church has greatly added to the appearance of the place of worship.

Rees Memorial Church. As I am writing this report, Pastor George Harris informs me that Rees church is in the process of purchasing a lovely new parsonage. The congregation is responding enthusiastically to supply finances to complete the transaction. May the Lord continue to assist in this much-needed project.

Many of our churches have made fine progress in numbers, finances, and in spiritual blessings but did not get their reports to me. Even some I have mentioned failed to respond to my appeal for a report, but I have given a sketchy report anyway. Perhaps our pastors are too busy making history to record it.

Finances.

The Treasurer's report will reveal that this has been our best year in U.S.F. giving for many years. The cooperation of our churches has been encouraging. It is my feeling that those who have not responded have been victims of over-extending themselves in previous years in building programs. Key members have moved away and left the congregation too weak financially to meet basic commitments. There is a real emergency existing in some churches because of this. I should point up to this Conference, however, that if the 12% had been paid in full it would have met only about 65% of our General U.S.F. commitment and left the District to operate all arms of the work with less finances than a number of our local churches have with which to function locally.

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

JUNE 1, 1966 — MAY 31, 1967

To our General Superintendent Rev. J. D. Abbott, District Superintendent Rev. Thomas E. Lee, and members of the forty-fifth Annual Conference of the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings!

Several of our Sunday Schools have made this past year one of outstanding achievement as they have made strides toward the realization of their potential. Others have found it to be a year of extreme frustration. That last caption is descriptive of our circumstances, for while we have expended a great amount of time and energy, we certainly have not set the world on fire.

The keen interest of our local leaders in the work of the Sunday School was in evidence at the Superintendents' Banquet on September 9, 1966. Eighty-eight Pastors, Superintendents and Assistant Superintendents, along with their companions were in attendance. The Sunday School Committee's program for the year was introduced with a strong emphasis on the Teacher of the Year and Superintendent of the Year award system. The four-fold purpose of the Sunday School was presented: To contact and bring in the unsaved; To win them for Christ and the church; To train them for effective Christian service; To support the total program of the church—local, district, and general.

One of the great desires of the Sunday School Committee is to establish a closer line of communication. A quarterly publication known as the "Sunday School Standard" was first published in November, 1966 to help achieve this aim.

I personally feel the need for a closer working with the Sunday School personnel at the local level. One step in this direction was the establishment of some organizations. Zone organizational meetings were conducted on three zones. However, because of the divided interests and responsibilities of these zone officers and the limitation of our own time, this phase has not yet been fully carried out.

The District Christian Education Conferette was once again a joint project sponsored by the District Youth Society and the District Sunday School Committee. The theme of this Conferette was "Alive Unto God." This project will be under the auspices of the District Christian Education Committee in the years to come.

The Victory Night Banquet of May 19, 1967 was well attended by 213 loyal Sunday School teachers and workers. Forty awards were presented to well deserving Sunday Schools and individuals. The outstanding Sunday Schools were as follows: Highest percentage gain in average, Sacramento, 84%; Highest numerical gain in average, Corona, 66; Highest average attendance, El Monte, 201. The Superintendent of the Year was Mrs. Kathryn Tolton of Corona. The Teacher of the Year was Miss Debra Hall also of Corona.

Our district has seen a gain in Sunday School enrollment during this past year of 13% and a gain in average attendance of 3%. I have personally traveled over 3000 miles and given over 350 hours in the interest of District Sunday Schools. I have conducted six Sunday School Committee meetings, three Zone meetings, two local meetings, and been in charge of two banquets. The job of publishing the Sunday School Standard and the publicity for the Conferette also fell my lot. As a direct result of this position, I served as a member of the Mile High Pines Board and of the District Christian Education Committee.

The members of the District Sunday School Committee have served admirably. Their faithfulness and cooperation has been greatly appreciated. They are Rev. Mrs. Myrna Deal, Mrs. Marianne Troyer, Rev. Fred Wells, and Rev. Dale Kelley.

Newly acquired responsibilities and a distance factor force the necessity of our resignation from this position. May I thank the conference for having had the privilege of serving in this capacity. Let us continue to labor for the salvation of souls and the upbuilding of God's Kingdom.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE 1967 CONFERENCE

DISTRICT

1. BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 4, under District, pages 26-27, be revised to read: "The Office of Public Affairs of the National Association of Evangelicals shall be authorized to speak for the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on all legislative matters that are of vital interest to and conviction of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The District Secretary shall send a copy of the District Minutes and the Manual to the State Director of NAE, calling attention to this resolution and requesting return correspondence in regard to the news of interest, such news to be forwarded by the District Secretary to the local congregations."

2. BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 6, under District, page 27, be edited to read: "Each standing rule shall be dated, such date to be its origin or last revision."

LOCAL CHURCH

3. BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 4, under Local Church, page 28, be revised to read: "All reports shall be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than 10 days before the Conference date."

4. BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 12, under Local Church, page 28, be deleted.

UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND

5. BE IT RESOLVED THAT Standing Rule No. 2, under United Stewardship Fund, pages 28-29, be revised to read: "The following system of finance shall be followed in caring for the United Stewardship Fund obligations of each local church:

An amount equal to \$2.25 per assessable member per month shall be paid to the local church treasurer. The local church treasurer shall remit these funds each month to the district treasurer. Assessable members are all members other than Junior or Associate Members. It is strongly recommended that each pastor and local church board plan to raise this fund above the regular tithe of the local members."

The remaining portion of the above rule, beginning with, "The District Treasurer shall distribute, etc.," shall remain the same.

6. BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Proposed District Budget be adopted.

7. BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Proposed District Budget for each fiscal year be printed in the Conference Minutes.

8. WHEREAS some of our churches are in serious financial difficulty and some relief is needed to protect the life of any such churches,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the District Council shall be authorized to make a long-term loan to such churches, such loan to draw interest com-

mencing at the time of repayment at the rate of 5.5% or the current rate being charged by the Revolving Loan Fund. Any such loans shall be made from the Capital Account, the Revolving Loan Fund or the Ventura Account.

9. BE IT RESOLVED THAT the conference authorize the District Council to appoint a Comity Committee, such committee serving with the General Superintendent to work with a like committee from the Wesleyan Methodist Church on matters of common concern in relation to merging district interests.

10. INASMUCH AS the Board of General Superintendents presented such a theme in the Area Leaders' Conference,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we adopt for this conference year the emphasis that the time is now for: 1. Spiritual Renewal; 2. A Deeper Loyalty; 3. A More Effective Outreach.

11. BE IT RESOLVED THAT this conference instruct the District Secretary to express our appreciation by letter to Azusa Pacific College for the use of the facilities of its Hillside Campus for our District Conference and Camp Meeting.

12. BE IT RESOLVED THAT this conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Thomas Lee for his untiring labor of love among the California Pilgrims.

13. BE IT RESOLVED THAT this conference give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. J. D. Abbott for his labor of love among us.

14. BE IT RESOLVED THAT greetings be sent to all missionaries now serving under appointment abroad, who hold membership in this district.

STANDING RULES and BY-LAWS

Annual Conference

1. A Conference Registrar, appointed by the District Council, shall assume his duties at the place of conference one hour prior to the opening of each session of the Conference and shall register all members of the Conference and all duly certified lay delegates, presenting each member or delegate with a badge admitting him within the Conference bar.
The Conference Registrar shall receive and record the certificates from the lay delegates and shall present the list of registered delegates to the Conference Secretary prior to the opening of each session of the Conference (1964).
2. The chairman of the Statistical Committee shall present orally the following highlights from the Statistical Committee report: total number of seekers, membership, Sunday School attendance and the financial summary of totals by departments. This entire report shall be posted before the fourth sitting of the Conference.
3. The District Council, the Conference Action Committee, the Educational Board, and the Examining Board shall meet prior to the Annual Conference to take care of such work as they have on hand.
4. When recommendation for credentials is presented to the Conference, the candidate shall be present or send a written testimony to accompany the recommendation.
5. Each local church delegate shall be reminded of and shall abide by the following requirement found in Section 75, Paragraph 3, of the Manual: "All delegates shall pledge themselves to their local church that they will stay until the close of the annual Conference unless called home by sickness or death." Further, that such delegates pledge to attend all sessions.
6. Since local church lay delegates are required by Manual to stay until the end of Conference, all who hold credentials in the California Conference shall also feel obligated to conduct themselves in like manner.
7. Any church or pastor failing to raise the United Stewardship Fund without good reason shall be denied a voice in the annual conference. (1966)

Conference Committees

1. The financial records of the following departments shall be submitted to the District Auditing Committee at least 15 days prior to the District Conference: District Youth Society, District Sunday School Committee and District Missionary Society. The District Treasurer's books shall be audited by a Certified Public Accountant. (1966)

2. All licensed ministers and deaconesses shall be notified in advance of Conference to meet with the Educational and Examining Boards prior to District Conference, the date, or dates to be set by said Boards, and, in the event it is impossible to do so, they shall notify these boards in writing. (1966)
3. The Conference Action Committee shall meet 30 days prior to Conference and mimeographed copies listing all resolutions shall be placed in the hands of all delegates no later than 10 days prior to said District Conference.
4. A standing committee known as the District Stewardship Committee, shall be appointed to provide material on the subject of tithing for the education of our people. This committee shall be appointed by the District Council and shall make a report of its activities to the annual District Conference. (1966)
5. It is recommended that all plans for construction or remodeling of church buildings and parsonages be presented to the District Building Committee for their suggestions. Said committee shall be appointed by the District Council. (1963)
6. Copies of the minutes and financial reports of the District Sunday School Committee, the District Missionary Society, the District Youth Society, and the Mile High Pines Board shall be mailed each month to the District Secretary. (1966)
7. A District Christian Education Council shall be formed with the District Superintendent as chairman. Other members of the council shall be: the Assistant District Superintendent, the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the District Youth President, the District Director of PELT, the District Director of CYC, and others as deemed advisable. (1966)
8. A Conference Action Committee shall be formed, said committee to consist of seven members to be appointed by the District Superintendent, which appointments may be ratified by the District Council. (1965)
9. The Pilgrim Holiness members of the Board of Directors of Mile High Pines shall be the District Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Youth President, and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, together with seven members elected by the District Conference from nominations submitted by the District Council. Three of these members will be elected for one year, two members for two years, and two members for three years, thereafter, each member shall be elected for a term of three years, except those serving by virtue of their office. And be it further resolved that an annual report of the activities and finances of the Mile High Pines Board be made to the District Conference. (1965)

District

1. The following sums shall be allowed for services:
 District Secretary—\$50.00 per quarter;
 District Treasurer—\$100.00 per quarter. (1966)
2. This Conference shall accept and adopt a goal of \$5.00 per member per year in support of Central Pilgrim College. The basis for determining membership responsibility for the above-mentioned goal is to deduct 10% from the total voting membership of the church. Each church shall receive an offering for Central Pilgrim College at least once each month as a means of reaching the above goal. (1963)
3. A system to raise finance for District Home Missions shall be established. This system shall be known as the District Home Missions 500 Club, the purpose of which shall be to secure subscriptions to the 500 Club — individuals who will pledge themselves to give \$1.00 per month for the establishment of new churches in California. The District Superintendent shall effect the appointment of a local church "500 Club" representative, who shall solicit new members and shall make reports of the membership and giving to the District Superintendent. "500 Club" giving shall be supplemented by a quarterly offering to be taken in each local church on the first Sunday of June, September, December and March. (1965)

4. The Office of Public Affairs of the National Association of Evangelicals shall be authorized to speak for the California District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on all legislative matters that are of vital interest to and conviction of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The District Secretary shall send a copy of the District Minutes and the Manual to the State Director of NAE, calling attention to this resolution and requesting return correspondence in regard to the news of interest, such news to be forwarded by the District Secretary to the local congregations. (1967)
5. All correspondence with the General Missionary Society Director at headquarters, including reports, shall be directed to the District President, who will in turn relay the information to headquarters and/or secure an answer in return. The ONE EXCEPTION to the above rule relates to the correspondence concerning MISSIONARY CHRISTMAS BOXES, which should still be carried on directly with headquarters.
6. Each standing rule shall be dated, such date to be its origin or last revision. (1967)
7. The internship program as instituted by Central Pilgrim College shall be considered as part of the California District program. (1964)
8. The District Youth President, the District Missionary President, and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary or their representatives shall have the privilege of holding one service annually in each of the churches of the District in the interest of their particular group and an offering shall be taken in said service and forwarded immediately to the District Treasurer being specified for that particular District organization. (1965)
9. The District Treasurer shall be authorized to remove accrual loans from the District Home Missions and other accounts, and place these in Accounts Receivable at the end of each conference year in order to better show current status of such accounts. (1965)
10. The last Sunday afternoon of camp meeting shall be given to a Home Missionary service and an offering of cash and pledges shall be taken. (1964)

District Council

1. The District Council shall be informed of all matters of major legislative change prior to presentation to the Conference.
2. The District Secretary shall be informed immediately upon the death of any pastor or pastor's wife of the district and he shall notify by telephone all pastors in the district and notify the editor of the district publication.
3. An honor system for recognition of churches who pay their United Stewardship Fund shall be established and a chart be compiled by the District Treasurer and displayed at the District Camp and Conference.
4. The District Secretary shall give written notification to all appointees to standing Conference Committees within 30 days after District Conference. The chairman of each standing committee shall be notified by the District Secretary 60 days prior to District Conference to activate his committee.
5. Ministers coming to this District from other denominations shall be interviewed by the District Council before their credentials are presented to the Conference.

District Superintendent

1. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$5,720.00 per year in addition to his residence, utilities, traveling expenses and automobile mileage at nine cents per mile. (1967)
2. The District Superintendent shall be given an annual two-week vacation with pay.
3. The District Superintendent shall call a meeting of all District leaders and pastors for the purpose of introducing the programs of the various departments for the coming year. (1964)
4. The District Superintendent, in cooperation with youth zone leaders and heads of departments of the District Conference, shall formulate a district calendar and place same in the hands of each pastor and department head of this district; each youth zone leader and district department head shall prepare and send his annual schedules to the District Superintendent prior to the Pastors' and District Leaders' Conference. (1964)

Local Church

1. All local churches shall pay the traveling expenses and entertainment of their pastor and lay delegates for the Conference business sessions. (1965)
2. All local churches shall forward to the District Council for filing all legal papers pertaining to the ownership of the local church property.
3. Each pastor shall be granted the privilege of holding at least one revival in each Conference year.
4. All reports shall be made in full and sent to the Statistical Committee not later than 10 days before the Conference date. (1967)
5. Each local church shall be urged to raise a subscription list to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate equal to its total membership.
6. The Conference Minutes shall be sold at \$1.00 per copy and each church shall remit from local funds for the Minutes ordered and then sell them to the members for the stipulated price.
7. Pastors are urged to secure Pilgrim Holiness evangelists as much as possible. Evangelists from other denominations shall be secured under the District Superintendent's approval.
8. It is recommended that vacations with pay for all ministers of this district be based on the number of years in the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church as follows:
 - a. After one year of service—a minimum of two weeks;
 - b. After 10 years of service—three weeks;
 - c. After 20 years of service—four weeks. (1966)
9. Each church shall pay the assessment fees of the pastor and wife who are members of the Ministerial Benefit Association.
10. The Conference shall use the following method of renewing pastoral relations:
 - a. That each church when renewing pastoral relations, shall vote during the last full week of March.
 - b. That each local church secretary shall forward to the District Superintendent the results of such vote within five days following the time of voting.
 - c. That each pastor shall forward to the District Superintendent his reply within 15 days of the time of voting. (See 1966 Manual, Section 55, Paragraph 3.)
 - d. That each pastor who does not plan to renew pastoral relations shall notify the District Superintendent on or before the 15th day of March. (1963)
11. It is recommended that before licensed or ordained ministers coming from outside the California District, or from other denominations, be received into local church membership, the pastor shall consult with the District Superintendent and the District Council regarding said minister.
12. Local churches calling pastors from outside the confines of the District shall pay the necessary expenses involved in the changing of automobile license and registration. (1963)
13. Any church becoming two (2) months delinquent in United Stewardship responsibility shall feel obligated to call upon the District Superintendent and/or the District Council to help regarding this matter.
If any church fails to take such action, the District Council shall arrange an appointment to render such help, on the recommendation of the District Superintendent. (1966)
14. Before candidates for license are presented to the local church board, the pastor should counsel with the District Superintendent with regard to the fitness of such candidates. (1966)
15. Rental allowances, called for under our agreement covering two Life Leases at El Monte shall be paid for from interest accruing to the Revolving Loan Fund, instead of from the principal. (1966)
16. Monies accruing from interest on Revolving Loan Funds shall be placed in the District Home Missions Account, to be used for the promotion and support of District Home Missions after the life leases have been paid monthly. (1966)
17. This Conference shall adopt and implement the program as outlined by the Board of General Superintendents for the current quadrennium:
 1. To deepen the spiritual life of both pastor and people, by

- (1) Investing more time in the study of God's Word;
 - (2) Engendering a genuine and significant prayer life;
 - (3) Maintaining a regular family altar;
 - (4) Witnessing daily through life and word.
2. To set as a goal the establishing of a branch Sunday School by each church, both large and small. (1966)
18. The Pilgrim Holiness members of the Mile High Pines Board of Directors, or their representatives shall be granted the privilege of presenting the program and needs of Mile High Pines to the people of the District along with the privilege of conducting at least one service annually in each church, and of taking a free-will offering. (1966)
19. Full privilege and opportunity shall be given to the Board of Directors of Mile High Pines Youth Camp to publicize the need for and to solicit capital funds among the constituents of the respective partner denominations. (1966)

United Stewardship Fund

1. Newly organized churches shall assume one-fourth of their United Stewardship Fund the first year after being organized; one-half the second year; three-fourths the third year, and beginning with the fourth year, pay in full.
2. The following system of finance shall be followed, in caring for the United Stewardship Fund obligations of each local church:
An amount equal to \$2.25 per assessable member per month shall be paid to the local church treasurer. The local church treasurer shall remit these funds each month to the district treasurer. Assessable members are all members other than Junior or Associate Members. It is strongly recommended that each pastor and local church board plan to raise this fund above the regular tithe of the local members.

The District Treasurer shall distribute within 30 days after receipt the funds received in the United Stewardship Fund as follows:

—62% to District Stewardship Fund, said 62% to be distributed as follows:

Superintendent's Account	52%
Operational Expense	19%
Home Missions	16%
International Conference Reserve	5%
Sunday School Promotional Committee	3%
Young People's Executive Committee	3%
Missionary Society Committee	2%

—38% to General Stewardship Fund; and if the said 38% shall exceed the annual General Stewardship Fund responsibility of this District, then the amount received over and above our annual General Stewardship responsibility shall be used for District Home Missionary work. (1967)

STANDING RULES AND BY-LAWS

Annual Youth Conference

No. 1—All reports should be sent to the District Youth Secretary one week prior to the Conference.

No. 2—All reports to the District Youth Conference are to be prepared in triplicate; one copy to go to the District Youth President; one copy to the District Youth Secretary. The third copy of the Local Society President's report shall be given to the Local Society Secretary and the Zone Chairman's report to the Zone Secretary.

No. 3—The date of the Annual Youth Conference shall be set by the District Youth Council. The Annual Youth Banquet shall be held the evening before the Conference, thus combining these two vital District Youth events.

No. 4—A Conference Action Committee shall be appointed annually by the District Youth President. The committee shall consist of five members of which at least two are teenagers. The District Youth Treasurer shall automatically be a member of this committee.

No. 5—The Minutes of the District Youth Conference shall be printed in the District Journal and Minutes of the District Conference. The District Youth shall bear the cost of such printing on a per-page basis.

District Youth Council

No. 1—Where at all possible, no one person should hold two offices on the District Youth Council.

No. 2—The District Youth President shall send a written quarterly report to the District Council covering his activities, those of the zone leaders, District Youth Treasurer, and activities of the Youth Camp Committee.

No. 3—The District Youth Council shall plan and conduct quarterly workshops, on the District and/or Zone level, for the purpose of aiding in the development of the total youth program of the local church.

No. 4—The Pilgrim Pilot editor shall be instructed to send news items each month to the Pilgrim Youth News.

No. 5—The official name "Pilgrim Youth Society" shall be used on all materials and in all oral communication.

No. 6—The financial records of the District Youth Society shall be audited by an auditor and/or an efficient bookkeeper at the end of each conference year.

Local Societies

No. 1—The report of each local youth president to the Annual Conference shall include all financial transactions.

No. 2—Each local youth society or church shall be urged to pay the expenses of its delegates to Youth Conference.

Pilgrim Youth Camps

No. 1—The responsibilities of the District Youth Council to the Youth Camps be as follows:

I. Before camping begins—

- A. Camp location and dates
- B. Choosing Camp Directors
- C. Publicity
- D. Pre-registration
- E. Printing application blanks
- F. Transportation to camp
- G. Set camper fees
- H. Secure services of a nurse
- I. Apply for surplus foods
- J. Appoint person or persons responsible for buying food
- K. Secure services of cook and helper
- L. Arrange for swimming facilities.

II. Prepare standardized outline for Camp Director's report.

III. Prepare written instructions in the Health Center regarding First Aid and filing insurance forms.

IV. Edit and reproduce instructions and regulations for Directors, Counselors, and Campers.

Zone

No. 1—Each newly elected chairman shall secure the name, address and phone number of each local church youth society officer, and zone officers for the President. This information must be submitted in writing, for informational purposes, within 60 days following Conference.

No. 2—Each zone chairman shall send a written quarterly report to the District Youth President.

No. 3—In case the zone chairman is incapacitated in any way, the Executive members of the District Youth Council, along with the District Superintendent, shall appoint his successor.

No. 4—Each zone treasurer shall pay to the District Youth Treasurer 10% of all offerings taken at zone rallies.

To our District Superintendent, Rev. Thomas Lee, and California Pilgrim Youth convened in annual conference at Arrowhead Springs Hotel, June 3, 1967, greetings.

The Spring rally was held at Mile High Pines in April and was a first. District Youth and District CYC joined to present two separate all-day programs simultaneously, thereby ministering to our youth of all ages.
PEP RALLIES: This completely different program was designed to communicate, to involve and to shake those who might be apathetic. A PEP Rally was held in each of the five zones. 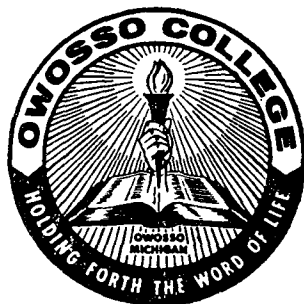
