## **CHINA**

Sis. Grubb is still in Atuntze, on the border of Tibet, doing her best for the Lord. She has suffered much for the cause of Christ, but results are being realized. Several Tibetans have found the Lord.

## **ALASKA**

Bro. Fred Getso was here for a short furlough, and has returned, making Anchorage his headquarters. The outlook is good, and he hopes to open a mission. He needs our united prayers. The weather conditions have been severe this winter, and he has suffered from the cold. Even a bottle of ink placed under his pillow has frozen.

## **PALESTINE**

Sis. Shoucair is doing a good work in the school. She is training young people for the work of the Lord. She needs our support. Conditions are very trying on account of war, strikes, and failure of crops. One of her young men who is teaching in the school is coming to America this year to finish his education and become better acquainted with the workings of the church, so that he will be qualified to assist in carrying on the work in that field.

## **PERU**

Our work in Peru, under the faithful superintendent, James M. Spencer, and wife, is in a prosperous condition. A charter is being granted for the new church at Bambamarca. Naoma Greer will sail, D. V., on April 23rd, to help in the work there.

Sis. Louise Van Metre is doing a good work for the Lord, in the Andean region. He is blessing her ministry, and making her a great blessing in that needy field.

## **THE HOLINESS EVANGELISTIC INSTITUTE**

This school is now in its seventh successful year, and has been fulfilling the purpose for which it was founded, that of preparing for Gospel work those who have been called of God. Having had revival meetings with Bro. M. P. Smith, Bro. Lloyd Dixon, and others, the school is now in a good spiritual condition, and has taken on the spirit of our forward movement. It has contracted with KFAC Radio Station for 45 minutes each day and God is blessing

this effort to broadcast the Gospel and let people know of the school and church. We desire the consideration of the Assembly at this time as to the continuance of the radio program.
