STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W. M. S. and Y. M. W. B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.
- 2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.
- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, where ever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid him while he is absent.
- 8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.
- 9. Each church may elect a nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the board.
- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation; if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elder's Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livlihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record," published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurer's' books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164-4 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30 may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

- 20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.
- 21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the first Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the charge to vote on a week night, it shall be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and his Advisory Board,

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the 108th Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference here assembled, greetings in the name of Him who "ever loves us and loosed us from our sins by His Own Blood"! Indeed it is a privilege to be able to meet once more upon this sacret hill-top. By the mercy and the enabling grace of God we are permitted to gather here to care for the work entrusted to our care by the churches within the bounds of the Conference and the purposeful providences of God. Let us remember that it is no light or trivial calling to be here engaged as members of this particular session in the business of the Church of Jesus Christ. Surely we are favored to be "workers together with God." So then let us labor together and so "endeavor to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" that when this session comes to a close we may be able to say, in regard to all our deliberations and transactions of business, "it seems good to us and to the Holy Spirit."

Truly, it is with a profound sense of gratitude to Almighty God for His Grace and guidance throughout another year that we present this report to you. We have closed a year of many and varied experiences, activities and not a few perplexities. In some parts of the Conference the work has appeared to move rather slowly-too slowly for the good of the Church and the welfare of souls. In other sections there have been heart-warming and encouraging advances. In fact some have stated that they have had the best meetings the church has experienced for years. In some places revival fires are really burning. Several reported excellent results during the week of prayer. We do thank God for every degree of progress that has been made, for our consecrated laymen who have so nobly stood by, for our faithful preachers who have "earnestly contended for the faith", for the new church buildings and parsonages which God has helped us to obtain and build, for the excellent Ministerial Institute, for the two good camp meetings God gave us, for every victory, for the increased interest in aggressive evangelism and for the increase of spiritual fervency in some quarters.

Nevertheless, we are again meeting under the shadow of an ominous world situation and in a time of "extreme and dangerous imbalance." Nobody seems to know what to do. Mr. Baruch said, "We stagger from crisis to crisis." General Marshall said, "We may expect ten years of tensions." This year 1951 finds our nation in the most perilous position in her history. Days of mortal peril and days of earth-shocking events are upon us. Certainly the world outlook was never darker and it grows darker by the hour. How well the present situation in world affairs fits the description of our Lord who said, "There shall be . . . upon the earth distress of nations, with perplexity; the sea and waves roaring; men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth." (Lu. 21:25, 26.)

In the religious world the situation is no better for there we are witnessing the development of the great apostasy so frequently warned against in Bible prophecies. This apostasy is wide-spread and alarming. It denies the authority of the Bible as the true revelation from God, denies that the God of the Bible is the only true God, denies the facts of our Lord Iesus Christ, the Second Person in the Trinity—His incarnation, His sacrificial death, His resurrection in bodily form. His ascension and coming again. Further it denies the fall of man, the reality of sin, the need of regeneration and cleansing, the Judgment and Eternal Punishment and all this in circles which loudly claim the name of "Christian." Bear in mind that apostasy of which Paul speaks is not a "falling away" into formalism, backsliding, or vice; but a downright forsaking of the Lord Iesus Christ and "the faith . . . once for all delivered unto the saints" (Jude 3); and, the following after "another Jesus . . . or, another gospel" (11 Cor. 11:4) proclaimed by men who are "false apostles of deceitful workers, transforming themselves into the apostles of Christ" (II Cor. 11:13). As a result religion has been diluted. standards and heritages are dying-dying before our eyes. Modernism, liberalism, even infidelity, have crept into every one of the great denominations.

Beloved, our only hope is in God and in an intervention from the skies. The present world condition, the lukewarmness in the church, the spread of false doctrines, the abounding wickedness, the millions without God and hope, the great army of young people that are falling prey to present-day evils, the wide-spread apostasy and the great need of a spiritual awakening is a challenge to our own beloved Church. This is our hour! Our part is to keep our church doors open, to keep our church program deeply spiritual and not to allow it to degenerate into a shallow and a mere amusement affair, to tell men of the love of God, to turn hearts from sin to repentance and to God, and to bear witness for Christ with such compelling persuasiveness that to be ready to lead the believer into a place of trust in God, to help the believer to know anew that God will guide, sustain and give grace and peace sinners will take heed, to preach a rugged gospel which is not watered down, to be ready to lead the believer into a place of trust in God, to help the believer to know anew that God will guide, sustain and give grace and peace within, regardless of the raging storm without and to help the believer to face the dangers with strength, courage, fortitude and divine assurance. In the midst of the present-day apostasy there is a glimmer of light-a movement toward God in a sense. In speaking before the students of the University of Southern California, Dr. Louis H. Evens said, "Civilization, seeking to save itself from destruction in atomic war, is coming back to religion because nothing else works. Men have tried the PESSIMISTIC THEORY that human society is decaying anyway and there is nothing we can do about it. They have tried the OPTIMISTIC THEORY that there is no use worrying as everything is fine. They have tried the OSCILLATION THEORY that the pendulum brings a crisis every twenty-five years. They have tried the MILITARY THEORY and the world is still at war. They have tried the EDUCATIONAL THEORY, but humanity is going underground to save itself from its smartness. The REGENERATION THEORY is the only one left. Men are beginning to believe that they must be changed and transformed and made into new creatures by the power of God." Therefore. let us bend every effort, invest every energy, sacrificially give of our means and time, all bathed in agonizing prayer to capitalize on this swing back to religion by aggressive evangelism. God help us to give of our best in a determined offensive for spreading Old Time Religion in this tragic hour.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and Recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

- 1. The following Denominational Budget items: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$2.00; Pension, \$1.25; Home Missions, \$1.25; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25; Administrative Budget, \$40; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.15; Australia, \$.25; (These assessments are per church per year.)
- 2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference Work) shall be equal to ten percent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly)
 - 3. Conference Group Life Insurance; \$.35 per member.
 - 4. Conference Entertainment, \$.35 per member.
- 5. The Pioneer self-denial envelopes for remittances of \$.25 or more monthly (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.
- 6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.
- 7. The pastor or person responsible for the sale of Conference Minutes in the local church, shall remit \$.50 per copy to the Chairman of the Committee on the sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31. The Chairman of said Committee may mail statements to all who have not paid for their minutes by March 31, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30.
- 8. The above items, with the exception of Paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church treasurers are to make Monthly remittances to the credit of Conference work, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.
- 9. Church Treasurer's reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceeding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurer's records for the Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

- 1. The first Sunday School offering of the month to Conference Missions for the use of churches not self supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
 - 2. Sunday School Birthday Offerings to Conference Missions.
- 3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.10 per Sunday School member.
- 4. The three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local Church Treasurer for remittance to Sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

- 1. To the Conference President:
 - A. \$3380.00 annual salary.
 - B. \$1000.00 annually for traveling expenses, from which he shall provide adequate liability insurance for his car.
 - C. Telephone bill, including toll calls.
 - D. All miscellaneous items relating to the Office of Conference President.
 - E. \$100.00 annually for vacation purposes.
- To Mrs. H. C. Van Wormer for secretarial services to her husband, \$10.00 per week.
- 3. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services: The necessary amount to bring the offering for the Secretary to \$100.00; Conference Treasurer, \$100.00; each Sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia Treasurer, \$25.00; Group Insurance Secretary-Treasurer, \$25.00; Conference Pension Plan Treasurer, \$25.00; Camp Meeting Fire Marshall for services at Conference, \$10.00; Superintendent of rooms for services at Conference, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$15.00; New Aid Treasurer, \$25.00; he shall also pay the above and all other members of Conference Boards or committees an amount equal to all expenses in the pursuit of their duties in connection with their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.
 - 4. The sum of \$35 monthly to Ada Dishong from the Assistance Fund.
- 5. Conference Budget receipts shall be distributed as follows for the ensuing year; Conference Budget, 75 per cent; Conference Missions 10 per cent; Miscellaneous Fund, 1 per cent; Pension Plan, 9 per cent; Assistance Fund, 5 per cent.

ITEM V. APPROVAL OF PAYMENTS.

- 1. By correspondence on June 17, 1950, authorized the payment of \$35.00 monthly to Ada Dishong from the Assistance Fund.
- 2. By Correspondence on October 19, 1950, the Conference Treasurer was authorized to pay to Rev. T. O. McCracken, our Sunday School Secretary, the cost of his expenses to thet National Sunday School Convention in Philadelphia on November 2-4, 1950.
- 3. By correspondence on November 9, 1950 the Conference Treasurer was authorized as follows: "Every time a loan is granted to any church from the Conference Fund, an additional 5% should be placed into the Minister's Aid Fund from the Conference Fund at the time the loan is granted."
- 4. By correspondence on December 18, 1951 the Conference Treasurer was authorized to pay the expenses of H. C. Van Wormer and T. W. Comadoll to Syracuse, New York to attend a special meeting of Houghton Area Conference Presidents and Pioneer Secretaries.

ITEM VI. SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. That the record blanks of Budget distribution and monthly payments, which may be obtained from the Conference Secretary be used by the Church treasurers and that an extra copy be posted in each church so that the church members can see what progress is being made in the payment of the Budget.
- 2. The price of meals at Conference to those visitors not having official business with the Conference be set as follows Breakfast, 40c; Dinner 75c; Supper, 50c; or \$1.50 per day, and that the Superintendent of the Dining Hall have these prices posted in the Dining Hall in a conspicuous place, indicating to whom they apply. Free meals shall be given visiting ministers and their families for two days.
- 3. The Superintendent of the Dining Hall receive \$110.00 for his services, Plus \$100.00 for telephone, postage and traveling expenses. Same to be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund.
- 4. The Conference President may, by previous arrangement, meet the Board of Stewards or Finance Committee of each local church in the course of his Quarterly Meetings Schedule, for the purpose of discussing the church's financial needs or abilities, and making such suggestions as would tend to expedite the financial program of the church.
- 5. The Conference Tithing Secretary be authorized to draw on the Conference Treasury to the amount of \$25.00 during the conference year, for supply and distribution of tithing literature among the churches.
- 6. The Conference Treasurer be authorized to engage a fully accredited auditor to audit his books annually.
- 7. The deficit of \$136.34 recorded in the report of the Pension Plan Treasurer be paid from the Conference Budget.
- 8. Any deficit which may remain at the rise of this Conference session, on the General Conference Travel and Entertainment Budget for the current quadrennium, to be paid from the Conference Budget.

- 9. \$250.00 be paid against the deficit in our payment of the Administrative Budget, from the Conference Budget.
- 10. The Conference Group Life Insurance not be increased as was discussed on the Conference Floor.
- 11. The Publication Committee submit an annual report of all expenditures authorized for printing and publication.
- 12. The Conference President select some one or more persons to prepare articles for the Conference Messenger, to be published each month if feasible, which will be an aid in keeping our pastors and church constituencies alerted to the importance of paying their budgets in full.
- 13. A source of income for the Minister's Aid Fund be provided as follows: When payments are made on loans from Conference funds and said payments are placed in the Church Aid Fund, 10% of said payments shall be diverted to the Minister's Aid Fund.

REPORT NO. 7

ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE MINISTERIAL INSTITUTE

The Allegheny Annual Conference Ministerial met in the home of the Conference President, Titusville, Pa., on December 10, 1950, with the Chairman, The Rev. H. C. Van Wormer presiding.

After prayer, the Rev. Joseph B. Markey was elected song leader, a program was drafted and adopted and other necessary business transacted.

April 10th, the date set for the institute by previous action, found a splendid group of ministers and their wives gathered at the Barberton Church for the fifth institute of the conference and the entertaining church proved to be a gracious and thoughtful hostess. The Pastor, of course, as well as his kindly people, has, I am sure, the gratitude of the conference for a job so well done that the assignments were cared for with an absence of strain that kept everyone at ease and moved along in a manner that appeared, at least, entirely without effort. To have the mechanics of entertaining a gathering of this size so well worked out ahead of time is an accomplishment that deserves commendation. The Pastor and people of the Barberton United Presbyterian Church opened the doors of their beautiful building to the institute and the evening services were held there and this proved a blessing indeed for the congregations were much too large for the Wesleyan Church. On the instructions of the institute, the secretary has written them a letter of appreciation.

The guest speaker, the Rev. Wm. Smith of Colorado Springs, Colo., proved himself a man with a vision of the needs of the ministry in "Such a Time as This." Every message was an honest appraisal of the personal needs of the minister; a message that, though it searched to the quick, was delivered in such an unassuming humble spirit as to make its personal application easy but effectual.

The program included 22 papers submitted by ministers of the conference and, though some with assigned subjects could not be present, their papers were submitted and ably read by others appointed to do so. In the opinion of your humble secretary, every paper bore unmistakable marks of a deep interest on the part of the writer and, thus, became a part of a most profitable program. Much research coupled with earnest prayer and thoughtful study on the part of every participant was surely the factor that gave every paper a genuine message.

By a unanimous vote, another institute is to be held from April 8 to 10, 1952 and, if the local church approves the pastor's invitation, it will meet at Falconer, New York, if the Lord wills it so.

The Committee met, during the institute, on the afternoon of April 12th and set the amount of remuneration for the guest speaker as follows—an offering of \$100.00 and \$100.00 traveling expense and, by common consent, agreed that a gift of appreciation should be tendered the United Presbyterian Church, and \$20.00 to the pastor of the Barberton Wesleyan Methodist Church for expenses incurred in arranging for and entertaining the Institute.

The Committee earnestly solicits the prayers of the Conference in their planning and preparation for the next institute that the Lord may make it a time of fitting the ministers of Allegheny Conference for the tasks of serving churches in a time such as we find ourselves in now and that the institute may be an instrument in the hands of the Holy Spirit in making and keeping them holy men and women of God, in the pulpit and in all their walks of life.

We mailed the pastors Sunday School blanks, as well. We appreciate the co-operation of the pastors and pray God will make this coming conference year the best in our history.

REPORT NO. 10

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the 108th Annual Session of Allegheny Conference we bring greetings in the Name of Him who said, "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty."

In the January 1951 issue of the Intelligence Digest the concluding article was entitled, "The world's need of spiritual revival". We have condensed this article and thus quote, "When every strategic and material consideration of the situation has been weighed and considered, our final need still remains. If, or when, all that human hand or brain could do was done, that final need would still remain to be met: a far greater spiritual and moral conviction. We need to be swept by a decisive revival which will give a victorious conviction to our peoples. This is now lacking. It is of first importance.

Few people can read the news today, or study foreign affairs, without a feeling that we need a fresh inspiration: A sense of help from a source more powerful than any human efforts offer. It is a situation beyond man's wit fully to solve—and some think even to tackle, so complex and dangerous has it become.

Having made so great a mess of our affairs, men would be foolish in this hour not to return to the old paths, and with the humility and faith which is an essential condition, seek Divine guidance in this time of peril and perplexity. Man, on his own, has not so brilliant a record that he has any justification to be too proud to do this.

At any rate, one would think common sense would lead us at least to try it. For, at present, we are cascading towards a very unpleasant crisis,

without the slightest signs of leadership or clear, hopeful policy. It is by every measure, the time for something to be done. Would we not therefore be wise to take another clear look at the miracle of the smallest atom, and another at the vast heavens, and reach the sensible conclusion that the One who conceived and made it all, might if we ask, get us out of our mess?" Surely the times in which we live challenge and demand of each of us to be constantly at our best spiritually. We need to consistently endeavor to maintain such a state that our lives will be the testimony and example they should be and likewise to keep ourselves prepared for the Second Coming of our Lord.

During the past year we were twice asked to assume added responsibilities. The first was when the death of Rev. W. H. Marvin left a vacancy at the Annandale Church. The Conference President and the Mission Board placed this work under our care until such time as the Church could secure a pastor. We filled this pulpit during the last four Sundays in December. The first of January Rev. H. R. Waite took over as the pastor. The second emergency was caused by the illness of our Conference President. We assumed his Quarterly Meeting schedule from January 21 through March 4, a period of 7 Sundays. During this time we conducted 11 Quarterly Meetings.

The possibility of opening a new work near Kayser, W. Va. continues to challenge our thinking and faith. In July wife and I made a trip to this field, spent a night with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Reeves and conducted a service in the United Brethren Church. We ministered to a well filled church of attentive people. In August we made another trip to this field, taking with us Brother Dale Holley who thought possibly he might take over the opening of a work in this place. During the past month he and his wife paid this field a visit of a couple of days. During this time he had the opportunity of surveying the field and its possibilities, as well as attending Sunday School and conducting a morning service in one of the churches. This is a needy community, very needy, it is within the bounds of our conference, the challenge and the prospects are ours. To get a good foothold in this community would open up avenues to other needy nearby points. At present we are planning some definite and concrete moves in this direction soon, with the possibility of the Holleys assuming charge of the work.

During the month of July in company with the Conference President we made a trip to Painesville, Ohio, to investigate the possibility and advisability of renting the church building vacated by the Lutheran Congregation. Our thought was to rent the building, conduct a revival and observe the results before assuming the purchase of it. We laid our plan and desire before the pastor of the Lutheran Church who promised to take up our request with the trustees and let us know their decision. As of the present we are still waiting for his answer. An investigation of the building showed it in none too good repair, also the seats had been removed which would have created a problem for us. It seems that for the present at least, the door has been closed.

In October we were contacted by Rev. F. E. Mansell concerning a group of people at Nutter Fort, W. Va. We visited this group October 8. We met their representative group on Saturday night. They had a nice church building with living quarters in the back. On Sunday morning they had a

good Sunday School and we had a good audience both in the morning and night services. We left them with the promise that they could expect a preacher over the next week end with the thought in mind of calling him as pastor. We were unable to fill this promise. Because of other urgent arrangements already made it was impossible for us to return for this Sunday also. We tried to send in another worker, but in the meantime they had called in another pastor and for the present this door seems to have closed. We do feel though that seed has been sown, and a contact has been made that may yet develop in the future. A number of these people have attended W. Va. camp and this is in our favor, no doubt they will continue to attend it and thus we will be able to keep in touch with them.

On November 9, 1950 we effected a church organization of the Loyal Oak Pioneer Group, with 18 members. Two have united since. This group is well located in a strategic center of a growing community and we are faced with the fact that we must either develop and care for it or some other group will come in and take over. The real need at this place is another building in which to worship. We are sure that time and prayer will find a solution to our need here.

March 5-11 found us at a new field in Hooversville, Pa. near Johnstown. During the winter revival at Johnstown a number of people from this community were converted. An empty church building was located in this village and under the leadership of Rev. D. M. Stonebraker, services were begun. For a nominal monthly sum this building has been secured for our group. This week of services we feel was a time of sowing as well as some reaping, people are still getting saved and the work is progressing. This is a needy town, we have a good nucleus to begin with, and we feel that an organization may develop soon. On Saturday evening, March 10, we organized this group into a Pioneer Organization.

During the past year the work at Isabella has gained both in numbers and in spiritual attainment. They have recently purchased a parsonage next door to the church. This venture was financed by the parent church at Brownsville. From all indications at present this pioneer point should be ready for organization within the next year. This work for some time has been under the supervision of Rev. and Mrs. George Adamson, and has been making good progress.

Through the efforts of Rev. C. A. Blair and the help and co-operation of the Brownsville church another likely prospect is being developed at Vestaburg, Pa. On Thursday night, April 29, we preached for them. They anticipate building a church this summer. One encouraging feature of this group is the number of men they have. Some of their number feel they should be connected with some church denomination. We have good hopes that with the fellowship and mutual co-operation there is between this group and our church at Brownsville when that time comes they will choose our church for making such a move. We find that it is a paying proposition from every angle for our local churches to be friendly and co-operative with these local independent groups when the doctrines are basically the same even though there might not be the same standard held by them as we hold, some warm-hearted fellowship and brotherly kindness often works wonders and brings about profit both to them and to ourselves.

After starting a work in Butler and caring for it for the past two years, Brother and Sister Wallborn are now moving to another state. Although nothing spectacular seems to have been accomplished, nevertheless some folks have been saved, and a fair little Sunday School has been built up. The Wallborns have labored diligently and prayerfully for this work, good seed has been sown. The possibility of securing new workers for this place is being considered by the proper conference officials.

The work at Greenfield (formerly called Little Hope) has maintained a good S. S. average during the year and made some progress spiritually as well. It was our hope that this work could be organized this year. Some wedding rings have prevented this. During the year a good lot was given to the church and a parsonage was constructed. A conference loan of \$800.00 was given to help with this project. Beyond a doubt there is a good prospect in this field, a Holiness Church is needed in this community. It is our most earnest desire that hindering causes can be overcome during this year and this band of people organized.

During the year the Ashtabula group secured a fine church building, rent free, in a much more desirable location than the store building in which they were worshiping. There has been an increase in the Sunday School attendance, but it is still an uphill pull.

The Millers have labored faithfully at Jamestown in the Tabernacle with not too much visible success and results. The Tabernacle was recently insulated which will make for a better and more comfortable place of worship.

Again this year we conducted a 2 Sunday revival at the Lakeview Community Church with Brother and Sister Halman. This church has maintained a good Sunday School average but they have gone through a time of sifting otherwise. The sifting has been for the benefit of the church however. The solid, substantial people have stayed by while others for various reasons have dropped out. Without a doubt the time is approaching when this group will have to make a decision. Many now are ready and I think they see the benefit of an organization but some hindrances continue to block the way. Some real saints of God are to be found in this group. Earnest prayer by the conference is needed as they approach the time of crisis.

On May 24, a letter reached me from Rev. C. H. Midkiff of Kilsyth, W. Va., concerning the possibility of our opening a work in this place. The letter told how a godly Wesleyan woman had led him into the experience of Holiness so it is only natural that they turn to us for help in the matter of establishing a church. This town as near as we could ascertain is about 150 or 160 miles south of Clarksburg. This places it considerably beyond our present Conference bounds but still within our territory. At the present time we are in touch with this man by correspondence and as soon as possible a careful survey of this field will be made.

REPORT NO. 11

THE CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

As long as Jesus tarries and the Church is the sphere and organ of His enterprise here on the earth, the Great Commission—"Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature"—will be our battle cry. That is evangelism. And that is Jesus' last command to His church. It was likewise the charge which Paul the aged gave to his son in the gospel, Timothy: "Do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of thy ministry."

We are faced with probably the most baffling, distressing days which the church has ever faced. The utter godlessness of the masses, the corruption in high places, the dire disregard and contempt for things sacred and spiritual, the complete break down in morals and domestic integrity, the spirit of rebellion and anarchy sown and cultivated in the hearts of the youth by the educational systems of our day, the glamorizing and popularizing of the vilest of evil, coupled with the departure of Christendom generally from

the faith, combine to make this one of the darkest and most fearful times which the church has ever faced. And yet, as we reflect on conditions and the church in relation to them, we are reminded that the church period is frequently, if not always referred to in the scriptures as "night." In the first chapter of Revelation we have the stars and the candlesticks mentioned, both of them instruments of the night; with the only day-time manifestation coming from the face of the Son of Man walking in the midst of the golden candlesticks with "countenance as the sun shineth in His strength." Again in Mark 13:35, we have the Words of Jesus, "Watch ye therefore; for ye know not when the Master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cock-crowing, or in the morning." The first watch was in the evening from 6 to 9 P.M. The second watch was known as midnight from 9 P.M. to 12 midnight. The third watch was from 12 midnight to 3 A.M., known as the cock-crowing. The fourth watch was from 3 to 6 A.M., known as the Morning Watch. All of which suggests to us that the period in which the church awaits the return of her lover is a period of night, with the only daytime light radiating from the face of Him who walketh in the midst of the Golden Candlesticks. But, beloved, we are the stars; we are the golden candlesticks, and we are called, and commissioned, and provisioned for just such times and conditions as these.

It is night, and the hour is dark—appallingly dark, but there are lights along the horizon. God is pouring out His Spirit in revival measure and power in many places. Voices are calling out of the darkness, some of which are being heard in high places, across the nation, and, we hope, around the world. Let us join our faith and our prayers with every God-called and God-ordained force which is laboring to bring about revival in our time. If we do not, the probabilities are that God will pass us up and raise up those who will. I am persuaded that what we need and what God is still willing and able to give us is a revival of the Charles G. Finney and the Evan Roberts type. Let us enter into a covenant to resolutely humble ourselves before God and seek Him until He comes to us again in revival power. And when He does streams of holy evangelism will be the result.

Your Board of Trustees reports the following business transacted during the year:

- 1. June 8, 1950. A meeting of the Board was held at Stoneboro, Pennsylvania, for the purpose of organizing the Board and election of officers. The election resulted as follows: Chairman, H. C. Van Wormer; Secretary, T. O. McCracken.
- 2. The Board considered the matter referred to it by the Conference and formulated its report. We recommend that 10 per cent of money paid on loans from church aid be appropriated to Minister's Aid Fund.

Motion was made to loan Robert Cherry \$100.00 from the Minister's Aid.

3. June 13, 1950. The Board of Trustees met at the parsonage in Franklin, Pa., and examined plans presented by the pastor and their board of Trustees.

Voted to approve plans for the basement on 1339 Buffalo Street.

Motion was made to authorize the Franklin church to secure a loan of \$4,000.00 wherever it would be to the best advantage.

Motion was made to authorize the Franklin church to sell the present church property to the best advantage.

Motion made that building not exceed \$10,000.00.

- 4. July 10, 1950. By telephone. The Conference Board of Trustees authorized the Barberton Board of Trustees to sell the property on Seventeenth Street. This property was to be sold at best advantage.
- 5. July 10, 1950. By telephone. The Board authorized the Franklin Trustees to continue with their building and to secure an additional loan wherever possible, of \$4,000.00. Conference to underwrite the note.
- August 4, 1950. The Conference Board of Trustees met in Punxsutawney Wesleyan Methodist church to look over plans and discuss the building of a parsonage.

It was moved that the Pastor and his Board of Trustees be authorized to go ahead with the building of a parsonage, at an estimated cost of \$4,000.00, on the condition that two-thirds of the membership of the church agreed.

Permission was given by the Board of Trustees to the pastor and the Punxsutawney church to secure a loan of \$3,000.00 at the best advantage.

The Board of Trustees recommended that the Nu Mine church be granted

a loan of \$500.00 from Church Aid for the purpose of purchasing a new furnace and that they pay the same back as soon as possible.

7. August 19, 1950. Stoneboro, Pa. A motion was made and carried to loan the Smithport church the sum of \$500.00 to be taken from the Conference Budget, to pay on the lumber bill owed to William Oaks, of Marion Center, Pa.

The Board of Trustees agreed to loan Rev. E. R. Barris \$100.00 to be taken from the Minister's Aid Fund.

- 8. By telephone. Authorized a loan of \$100.00 to F. E. Mansell to be taken from Minister's And Fund.
- 9. October 30, 1950. A meeting of the Conference Trustees was held in the Greenfield (Little Hope) Church. A motion was made to authorize the building of a parsonage.

Since the property was deeded to the Allegheny Conference, a motion was made and carried to loan the Greenfield church \$800.00 to be taken from the Conference Budget.

Voted to loan the Wolf Summit church \$1,000.00 to be taken from the Church Aid Fund.

Voted to authorize the Franklin church to secure a loan of \$4,000.00. Conference to underwrite the note. A motion was made that the building not exceed \$12,000.00.

REPORT NO. 23

STONEBORO CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT

To the members of the Allegheny Conference: Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, Greetings in the name of Him whose work engages our attention at this time.

It is with a grateful heart that we give to you another report of the Stoneboro Camp Meeting Association.

One of the outstanding features of last camp was the fact that it was the Camp's Fiftieth Anniversary. One day 17 were present who attended the first Camp. Bro. Foster Alexander wrote a very interesting article on the first camp fifty years ago for the Conference Messenger. The camp materially has come a long way since then and we hope some progress has been made spiritually as well.

This camp was peculiar in that the attendance for the first few days was smaller than for a number of years but by Sunday it had increased until, in the opinion of some, there was a larger crowd on the grounds than there had ever been before and, from Sunday until the close on Thursday, the attendance was better than we have ever known.

Also many years have passed since we have had a camp with as little disorder among the people, disobedience to camp rules, disturbances on the grounds and in the cottages and dormitories as in this camp. This is the way a Holiness Camp should be. The rules are made for the spiritual benefit of the people and to violate them is only to work against one's own soul. Holiness Camp Meetings should not be places of recreation, amusement, vacation and pleasure.

Again we wish to express our appreciation for the faithful leadership of Rev. H. E. Robertson in the morning prayer and the noon fast and prayer services and the prayer group leaders who earnestly worked to keep the camp a center of intercession. The attendance at the morning prayer meetings was excellent but it seemed harder to pray through than formerly. We seemed to be faced with too much of a complacent spirit.

Our evangelists Dr. O. G. Wilson, Rev. W. F. French, Rev. Mrs. Catherine Bloom, preached with God's anointing upon them, with an earnestness and a tenderness, and with a soul passion which brought results as the long altar and front seats were filled time after time with seekers. We were unable to mention all the services but on Saturday morning the Spirit moved in until there was no preaching. On Sunday morning the Lord helped Dr. O. G. Wilson to bring a message of tremendous warning to beware of the deceptive efforts today which turn men from the pathway of God. Missionary service proved a time of blessing as Bro. Gibbs, returned Missionary from Japan, presented the needs in a land whose door is open and a people who are pleading for the message of full salvation. touched and the response was excellent. Miss Martha Bloom, the song evangelist, did excellent work and her ministry in song was blessed of God. The children's meetings under the direction of Rev. Mrs. Neva Golden and her group of workers was a job well done. Rev. Oneida Gleason, with Rev. T. O. WEDNESDAY MORNING

Following devotions with the main conference body, the delegation came to order with group singing. The minutes were read and approved. A recess was announced to hear Rev. Leo Cox from Australia. At the call of the chair the morning session re-convened with the calling of the roll. There was a response of 17 Conference Society Members, 45 Presidents, 60 Delegates.

Report: The Y.M.W.B. Superintendent, Mary Huntsman, submitted her report, which was referred to the Auditing Committee.

Orders of the Day: The election of Conference Officials. The following tellers were appointed. Elsie Stallsmith, Irene Henry, Helen Kuhn, Bertha Himes. The voting membership was 125. Balloting resulted as follows:

Societies Reported: Punxsutawney, Hampe Memorial. The delegation was especially happy that Sr. Annie Hampe, president of Hampe Memorial, could be present this year in our body. In her testimony she told us she was 83 years old, had been saved 60 years, has been a Wesleyan Methodist for 55 years, and had been married 63 years this coming September and that this had been the best year of her life. She attributes this to a closer fellowship with the Lord through fasting and prayer.

Minutes read and approved. Roll Call was responded to by 16 Conference Society Members, 44 Presidents, 62 Delegates.

Presentation: The Courtesy Committee introduced Rev. Leo Cox, President of Australia Bible College. He spoke concerning the lessons learned in prayer and faith since going to Australia; also of the following projects: The work among the women and children, the challenge of the migrants from Europe, the college, and the need for building for Sunday Schools. Rev. Mrs. Clara McLeister, former Connectional President of the Womans' Society was presented at this time and gave a resume of her pastoral work of late years. Mrs. Amy Zike, wife of our General Evangelist, Rev. C. E. Zike, was introduced.

A motion prevailed to omit the Roll Call and reading of the minutes in the afternoon session in order to hear the Educational Address.

A good review of the study book, "We Americans North and South" was given by Catharine Carlson.

A motion was passed to send the statistical reports to Neva Golden, chairman of this Committee, rather than to the Secretary. With the report, non cash voucher receipts and statements from the local treasurer must be sent in also.

Lillian Merrifield gave some blessed reflections of Sr. Della Enty, local President of Templeton Colored Church who recently went to her heavenly reward.

Recessed to hear Conference sermon.

Mrs. Clara McLeister led the devotions, reading and commenting on various portions of Scripture relating to the Holy Spirit and His work. This statement, "The Lord will fill our heart, if we will make the vacuum" impressed our thinking. Dorothy Wotring led in prayer. The reading, "The Missionary Barrel" was effectively given by Sr. McLeister. It shed light on our missionary giving.

SATURDAY MORNING

This morning session came to order with the singing of missionary choruses, followed with prayer by Mae Moore. Previous minutes read and approved. There was a response of 7 Conference Society Members, 34 Presidents, 51 Delegates.

Societies Reporting: Johnstown, McLeister Memorial, Indiana, Luciusboro, Hadley, Hillsdale, Mentcle, Canton First, Mt. Calvary, New Castle, Nu Mine. Report: The Child Evangelism Secretary, Evangeline Dunkerly, gave her report.

Presentation: Rev. F. R. Birch presented the interests of Foreign Missions, bringing information received from his recent visit to each field.

Poster Appraisal: The judges of posters submit the following decision: First place, "Needs of Haiti" V. M. Smith, Massillon.

THE PUBLIC MEETING

On Friday evening the public missionary service was conducted in the main tabernacle by President, Ivah Van Wormer. The appointed song leader, Rev. Markey, led the congregational singing. Appropriate messages in song were sung by Erma Blair and Lois Schmul and Junior. Hazel Brannon led the audience in prayer.

Mrs. Calhoun spoke from these words, "Bear ye one another's burdens." She said Haiti was like Lazarus, full of sores and only Holiness can fully recover them. Bro. Calhoun's message emphasized the need of self-denial in answering the call to serve.

Again the Lord helped Georgia Markey to raise the offering. After raising the general offering, an offering of \$1,892.00 was raised to purchase a car for the Saunders. The total pledges and cash raised through the W.M.S. during conference was \$16,738.00

THE W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the W.M.S. Presidents and Delegates of the 45th Session of the Allegheny Conference: Greetings in Him Who washed us and cleansed us by His own precious Blood! Again by His mercy and grace we are privileged to meet for another Annual Conference. God grant that it may be the best one we have ever had because of His manifest Presence in every service and because He has predominance in the hearts of us all.

Words cannot describe the turbulent conditions of the world today and the probably graver dangers ahead of us but let us keep our faith steadfast in the Almighty God who still has His hands on the controls of the Universe. Let us look up, for the darker these conditions in the world become the brighter is our hope of His Coming. May we each one be fully ready for that Coming; yea, more than that, may we each one be instrumental in bringing in as many others with us as we are able, to meet and praise Him together around the Great White Throne above.

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Following is a summary of our W.M.S. activities for the conference year 1950-1951:

Shortly after last conference we arranged and mailed to Headquarters the Program Calendar material for 1951 written by twelve of our conference ladies.

June 24th. Mrs. Eunice Comadoll organized Loyal Oak W. M. S. with 6 active and 6 honorary members.

July 18th. We conducted a missionary service at West Virginia Camp, at which time Mrs. Georgia Markey brought a wonderful, soul-stirring message. There was a good attendance and interest at this service.

The missionary services at Stoneboro Camp showed the usual missionary enthusiasm and zeal of our folk and were accordingly well attended. Though we were not privileged to have many missionaries with us at this time, we all enjoyed the good messages from Rev. Maurice Gibbs, returned missionary from Japan. Money was raised for him to purchase a car for his work in Japan. This he secured in September. However, he was not returned to Japan and so arrangements were made with him by the Executive Committee to purchase the car for his own personal use for \$1,000.00. On this he made a payment in May of \$500.00 with the promise to pay the remainder within a year's time.

October 6-8th was the time of the Workshop Meeting when all conference presidents and delegates were to meet at Victory Camp, Galena, Ohio. Because of sickness we were unable to attend as delegated by the conference, thus taking transportation from several other delegates planning to go. However, Mrs. Emma Armstrong, Vice-president, and Mrs. Muriel Terpe, Treasurer, attended, representing our conference and taking part as called upon. They reported a good convention with uplifting services and plans made to present to General Conference for various changes in the work.

October 15th. Rev. and Mrs. A. J. Calhoon, returned missionaries from Haiti, made a tour of three of our Districts: Akron, New Castle and Titusville, with a convention in the Indiana District. This itineracy, interrupted by two outside conventions, ended November 30th. Rev. Calhoon reported raising in cash and pledges \$8,431.69, some of which was for the truck for Haiti. This to our knowledge is the largest amount of money raised in any tour of our conference by any of our missionaries.

During part of this time Miss Grace Wood, returned missionary from India and Australia, itinerated the Indiana District with good results. Since the West Virginia pastors were tied up in meetings at this time we were unable to send anyone down there.

We have engaged Rev. and Mrs. A. J. Calhoon as missionary speakers for the public service of this conference session. Rev. Leo Cox, who is home from Australia to attend General Conference, is also to visit our conference June 6.

By the help of the Lord we have endeavored to oversee and plan the general work of the Society during the interim. In order to do this we have sent out at least 500 pieces of mail, consisting of three different circular letters, one circular correspondence by cards and the rest individual correspondence for the W.M.S. work and interest.

An intensive subscription drive for new "Wesleyan Missionary" subscriptions and renewals has been carried on this year with Rev. Oneida J. Gleason as Denominational leader of the campaign. Our conference has succeeded in obtaining 500 new subscriptions. Since we were apportioned 5 new subscriptions per society our quota was 430.

We have made some gains in the past Quadrennium. From 74 Societies we now have 87, a gain of 13. From 1303 active and 477 honorary members we have 1558 active and 592 honorary at present. From 1148 subscriptions to the "Wesleyan Missionary" we now have 1750. From a total offering of \$112,149.33 for the preceding Quadrennium we have a total offering of \$166,389.90 for this closing Quadrennium. To God be all the glory for these gains and may He forgive us if we should have done better! We trust the spiritual advancements of our Societies have been at least in proportion to the material gains. If we have not gained spiritually, we have miserably failed our Master.

Since this is the close of another Quadrennium our outline of work may be greatly changed and so we have no new recommendations to bring at this time. Nevertheless, our never-changing, supreme motive should ever be to please the Lord and to garner in many precious sheaves while it is day.

In closing this report we wish to say, "You, Sisters, have made this Society what it is! For your kindness, co-operation and faithfulness we wholeheartedly thank you and praise our Heavenly Father in Whom we all trust. Lord help us to be faithful to the end!

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

WE RECOMMEND:

- 1, That the first meeting after Conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office. Suggested helps, Section 13 and 30 of the Discipline.
- 2. a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. This includes the Standard of Efficiency as drawn by General Conference for local societies, to be secured from the literature Department, 3901 South Washington Street, Marion, Indiana.
- b. We urge that the President of each Society refer to those as a reminder during the year.
- 3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of the Society, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
- b. That our Holiness Conventions, where possible observe a missionary service.
- 4. That we urge our societies to carry our Prayer Partner plan, and keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission fields, thereby bringing first

hand knowledge to our societies. Information regarding this to be sent to each society by the Prayer Partner Secretary, Mrs. Ruth A. Hoien, Middlefield. Ohio.

- 5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.
- 6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stoneboro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.
- 7. a. That all society officers and Annual Conference Delegates be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
 - b. That each society have a nominating committee if possible.
- c. That each society put forth a special effort to send their president and a delegate to Annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.
- d. That the delegate's credentials be sent to Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, Cooperstown, Pa., at least two weeks before Conference.
- e. That Statistical reports with all vouchers not sent to sub-treasurer and statements received for local work, be sent at least two weeks before Conference to Mrs. Neva Golden, 310-17th St., Barnesboro, Pa.
- f. That each society send fruit and vegetables, or its equivalent in cash to Conference. The larger societies sending two dozen quarts and the smaller at least one dozen. Fruits and vegetables to be all of one kind from each society. Same to be credited at purchase price. We recommend giving cash where possible, same to be sent anytime during the year to the Superintendent of the Dining Hall, or brought to Conference. Amount to be credited under "Other Objects."
- g. That twenty-five cents be raised by active and honorary members for Conference entertainment and sent to the sub-treasurer before the books close, April 30.
- h. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified, these pledges will be divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.
- 8. a. That each society use the designated Study Book, also urge the use of the Program Calendar and other helps and as far as possible encourage all members to follow the Mission Study Course as recommended by General Conference. All material to be secured from Ruth Stonebraker, 160 Village Street, Johnstown, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Study Course.
- b. That each society have a program committee varying once a quarter. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said Committee.
- 9. a. That each society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.
- b. That each society contribute three dollars or more annually to the "Medical Student Fund." This not to apply on budget.
 - 10. That each local society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and

thus assist in the extension program of the church. All Card Call money to be sent to Rev. J. R. Swauger, 330 East Onondaga Street, Syracuse 2, N. Y.

- 11. a. That we send program suggestions, Sunday School literature, flannelgraph lessons, and used Christmas greeting cards to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage and Indian Missions. Also bandages for Home and Foreign when required. (Note: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide and tightly rolled. Number of pounds to be reported as item of interest on Annual report blank.)
- b. That credit received for boxes of used clothing be placed under Receipts, Item 6, Other Sources.
- c. That new clothing and provisions may be placed under Receipts, Item 2, Offering as cash.
- 12. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of Church Educational Budget, including L. S. U. pledges.
- 13. a. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed where possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions, and the Penny-a-Meal offerings be used for Foreign Missions.
- b. That the societies observe the monthly Fast and Prayer Service and that the self-denial offerings taken at these services be used for budget items where the society deems best.
- 14. a. That where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.
- b. That we encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by the General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.
- 15. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a ten percent gain in membership.
- b. We suggest the month of September be designated as "Membership Month."
- 16. a. It is required that one dollar dues be paid by both active and honorary members: That said dues be divided and fifty cents be sent in, specified as "Dues:" The other fifty cents to be placed in the treasury to be paid out with the offering for any budget expenditure.
- b. That all dues and monies be sent through the local church treasurer to the District Sub-Treasurer.
- 17. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and also for small offerings taken during the Conference.
- 18. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate.

God's Answer to this Groaning World", we, the Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme in this conference session; and in our local societies throughout the coming year stress the need of intercessory prayer of agressive evangelism as we know the coming of the Lord is near at hand.
- 2. a. That we give ourselves to Bible Study, fasting and prayer, beginning with the lost ones next door and reaching out to the uttermost parts of the earth, knowing that what we do we must do quickly. Rom. 13:12.
- b. That we observe our monthly Prayer and Fast Service at which time the self-denial offering shall be received.
- 3. a. That we shall by the help of the Holy Spirit endeavor to faithfully attend all missionary work at home and abroad. We shall not be negligent by our indifference and selfish motives and pleasures, in our sacred task of inspiring and having a missionary spirit.
- b. That we endeavor to encourage and interest the men to attend our missionary prayer services and become Honorary Members.
- 4. a. That we individually give ourselves more earnestly to prayerful and intellectual study of the Wesleyan Missionary and other helpful material whereby we may obtain profitable information from our missionary fields as to their activities and needs. James 1:5.
- b. That in our missionary prayer meetings we stress the necessity of prayer for our missionaries, churches and officials, rather than engaging in social functions.
- 5. That we adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.
- 6. a. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical Standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.
- b. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part, thus creating in them the desire to follow the Bible Standards and helping them to overcome the temptations that present themselves to our youth today. Prov. 22:6; Deut. 6:7.
- c. That we as parents pray mightily for our children who are of school age that they may be able to cope with and overcome the erroneous facts that are taught in our schools today.
- 7. That we abstain from attending the motion picture theatre, reading and allowing our children to read the worldly comic books, listening to unwholesome radio programs, viewing questionable television, buying Sunday papers, and Sabbath desecration. Matt. 5:8.
- 8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies, in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to face the low moral standards of this day.

- b. That we as mothers guard well our children and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times.
- c. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently.
- d. That mothers carefully select their "baby sitters," since there is so much immorality prevalent today.
- 9. a. That we uphold by precept and example, modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses at least half way between the knees and ankles, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which should accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Timothy 2:9-10. Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man . . . for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."
- b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, nude shades of hosiery and ornamental hats. I Peter 3:3-4 Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home. Also we need to be examples of godliness to those who approach our doors. Acts 22:15.
- c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting or curling the hair, or the long bob. I Corinthians 11:15. Also, we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9, that "broidered hair" means curled hair.
- d. That we also dress our girls and boys modestly, which includes wearing long hose.
- e. Further, that we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and neglecting long standing bills.
- 10. a. That we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms, since we greatly detest the use and effects of both. II Cor. 7:1. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments opened on the Sabbath.
- b. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing our national holidays, thereby honoring our God who gives us freedom and liberty.
- 11. That these resolutions be read in each society frequently enough that all members be informed of the proposed attainments and requirements.
