Daily Proceedings

Minutes of the Seventy-Second Annual Conference of the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, held at Aberdeen, South Dakota, June 2nd through June 8th, 1953.

Conference Sermon—The Conference Sermon was delivered, Tuesday evening June 2nd, 1953, by the Rev. John J. Hunter of Billings, Montana. The text for the message was taken from II Chronicles 16:9. A large number of pastors, delegates and friends gathered together in the new Tabernacle for this initial service.

Wednesday Morning, June 3rd, 1953

Communion Service—A communion service was held in the early morning praver meeting with the Rev. S. J. McIntyre in charge, assisted by Conference Officers J. F. Simpson, John J. Hunter, Marvin E. Jones, and L. D. Harris. A gracious sense of God's holy presence was upon this service.

Devotionals—The Devotional period was conducted by the Rev. Themas Bailie, pastor at Watford City and Johnson Corners, North Dakota. The lesson was taken from Philippians the third chapter.

Called to Order—Conference was called to order with the President, J. F. Simpson in the chair. The roll call was made to which thirty-nine ministers and thirty-six lay delegates responded.

Motion to Seat Delegate—Miss Esther Grosenback was seated as the Delegate from Hot Springs on motion from the floor, with stipulation that she be free to conduct Children's meetings.

Motion to Receive Report—The Conference Program was read by a member of the Conference Program Committee. A motion prevailed to refer the matter of a Chairman for the Committee on Railroad Expense back to the Committee on Nominations. The report on Program was then accepted by motion.

Motion—Motion prevailed that the hour of meeting of the Beckman Board be clarified. A change from the program was made, setting the date of such meeting for Tuesday, June 9th.

Bar of Conference—Motion carried that the first eight rows in the center section and the first four rows on either side of the Tabernacle, constitute the Bar of Conference.

Election—Lester Bennett was elected to be the official Bell Ringer for all services.

Election: Nominating Committee—The following persons were elected to the Committee on Nominations: John J. Hunter, Marvin E. Jones, W. J. Leyh, H. H. Franklin, Max Hansen.

Adjourned subject to call of Chair.

Called to Order-The body was called to order by the President to resume business.

Report: Nominating Committee—The Committee on Nominations brought in a report, the report was accepted as amended. (See Report No. 1.)

Work Committees—The President read the list of Committees responsible for various tasks during Conference and Camp Meeting. The report was accepted by motion.

Greetings to Conference—Mention was made of greetings received from the following persons: Misses Alma Aldinger and Ruth Bixler, Harry Shreve, Warren Pamp, Mrs. Grace Miller Hoien, and John Winterberg.

Motion prevailed that correspondence received from the above persons be read at the time of the reading of the Minister's reports.

Itineracy and Orders—The President appointed the following laymen to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders: Max Hansen, Fred Nultemeier, Dan Palmer.

Wednesday Afternoon, June 3rd, 1953

Devotionals—The devotional period was conducted by the Rev. A. L. Mudgett, pastor at Watertown, South Dakota. The lesson was based on Philippians 2:15, 16.

Called to Order—Conference was called to order by the President, and then, because of considerable committee work yet to be done, the Conference was adjourned subject to call of the Chair.

Thursday Morning, June 4th, 1953

Devotionals-The devotional period was conducted by the Rev. Dean Watson, pasto: at Pierre, South Dakota.

Called to Order—Conference was formally called to order by the President. There was a presentation of "Wesleyan Signs" by Rev. J. F. Simpson.

Roll Call-Roll call was made with thirty-one ministers and twentynine laymen responding.

Courtesies—The Committee on Courtesies introduced the Rev. Howard Boyle, pastor at Tuthill, South Dakota. He spoke briefly in testimony.

Dr. R. D Reisdorph of Houghton, New York, denominational representative, and Sunday School Secretary and Editor, was introduced. He brought greetings from the official family of the Church, as well as his own personal greetings.

Partial Report: Conference President—A partial report of labors for the year was read by the Conference President, and the report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 2.) Partial Report: President's Assistant—The President's Assistant read a partial report of his labors for the year, and the partial report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 3.)

Report: Wesleyan Men's Fellowship—A report was read by the Conference Secretary for the Promotion of the Wesleyan Men's Fellowship. The report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 4)

Motion—A motion prevailed that greetings be sent to the Rev. A. M. Wiley, veteran member of the Conference, who is serving a Free Methodist Church at Spearfish, South Dakota.

Report: Committee on Railroad Expense—The Committee on Railroad Expense read its report and by motion the report was accepted. The amount to be paid by each charge on this item is \$10.50. (See Report No. 5.)

Adjourned for Committee work.

Thursday Afternoon, June 4th, 1953

Sunday School Rally—A Sunday School Rally under the direction of Rev. Richard Rossow was held, with Dr. R. D. Reisdorph as the speaker.

Called to Order-The President called the meeting to order.

Courtesies-The Rev. Ernest Hobby was introduced to the Conference. He spoke briefly.

Report: Building Committee—The Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location read its report, and the report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 6.)

Partial Report: Auditing Committee—The Auditing Committee read a partial report, and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 7.)

Report: Conference Treasurer—The Conference Treasurer read his report, and by motion the report was accepted. (See Report No. 8.)

Report: Camp Treasurer—The Camp Treasurer read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 9.)

Partial Report: Conference President—A partial report, completing the report, of the Conference President was read and by motion accepted. (See complete Report No. 2.)

Report: Treasurer President's Advisory Board—The report of the Treasurer of the President's Advisory Board was read and accepted by motion. (See Report No. 10.)

Report: Pension Fund Treasurer—The Conference Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 11.)

Report: President's Assistant—A partial report, covering a financial statement and completing his report, was made by the President's Assistant. The report was accepted by motion (See complete Report No. 3.)

Courtesies—The Rev. Martin Cox, Public Relations Man for Miltonvale Wesleyan College was introduced and spoke briefly. Then quartet members from the same institution were introduced: Paul Britton, Pat Ryan, Mike Ryan, William Butcher, Dick Ernst. A number, "Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho" was sung by the quartet.

Courtesies—Earl Olson, who is joining the Conference was introduced and spoke briefly.

Testimony—The President mentioned the work that had been done in supervising the building of Rest Rooms on the grounds by Rev. H. J. Van Vliet, then he asked for a testimony from Brother Van Vliet.

Report: W.M.S. President—A brief report was brought to the Conference body by the President of the Woman's Missionary Society regarding funds raised by that organization and by the Young Missionary Worker's Band.

Motion—Motion prevailed that the Conference Trustees set a value on the grounds and buildings of the Campgrounds, and that such evaluation be brought in for inclusion in this year's minutes.

Adjourned by motion.

Friday Morning, June 5th, 1953

Devotionals—The devotional period was conducted by the Rev. Harold Griffin, pastor at Belle Fourche, South Dakota.

Roll Call—Forty-three ministers and thirty lay delegates responded to the roll call.

Courtesies—Wesley McIntyre, pastor at the new Church at Harlowton, Montana, and Eugene Stanislaus, pastor at Missoula, Montana, were introduced to the Conference, and each one spoke briefly.

Courtesies—Paul Faulkenberry, from Marion College, was introduced to the Conference and spoke briefly.

Partial Report: Itineracy and Orders—A partial report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was read, and by motion accepted. (See complete Report No. 15.)

Motion—Motion was made that we grant any local Church who holds property the right to lease lands, as far as Conference authority in the matter goes.

Motion to Refer-Motion prevailed that the above motion be referred to a special Committee of three members for proper phrasing.

Election-The following were elected to the above mentioned special committee: Conference President, R. D. Reisdorph, Thomas Bailie.

Adjourned subject to call of Chair.

Saturday Morning, June 6th, 1953

Devotionals-The Rev. W. J. Leyh, pastor at Huron, South Dakota, led in the devotional period.

Roll Call—The roll call was made to which thirty-four ministers and twenty lay delegates responded.

Minutes were read and approved as read.

Motion—Motion prevailed that 450 copies of the Minutes be printed at our Publishing House, provided that we can have delivery of same within forty-five days of submitting of copy. Amended to read 500 copies.

Partial Report: Auditing Committee The Auditing Committee gave a partial report, completing their former report. (See complete Report No. 7.)

Report: Treasurer Beckman Board—The Treasurer of the Beckman Board read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 16.)

Motion—A motion was made that we give a rising vote of thanks to Brother O. Theo. Beckman for his fine report and for the work involved in keeping the books for the Beckman Board.

The Conference President turned the chairmanship over to the Vice

President, who in turn asked our denominational representative, Dr. R. D. Reisdorph, to preside.

Report—The Committee on Passage of Character read its report and the report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 17.)

Report: Committee on Resolutions—The Committee on Resolutions read a report, and it was referred back to the Committee by motion. (See Report No. 18.)

Report: Statistical Committee—The Statistical Committee read the report on Statistics and by motion the report was accepted. (See Statistical tables.)

Report: General Evangelist's Labors—A report of Evangelist's Labors was read by the Chairman of the Statistical Committee, and the report was accepted on motion. (See Report No. 19.)

Election—A memorial was received and accepted by the Conference from the Aberdeen Prayer District asking that we have a Conference Prayer Secretary. Elected to this position was the Rev. A. L. Cretsinger.

Motion—That expenses involved in the promoting of the above office be raised by offerings taken at Prayer Conferences in the Conference.

Report: Appraisal—The Trustees brought in a report of valuation for Campgrounds and buildings. Motion prevailed to refer the report back to the Committee for further study.

Partial Report: Itineracy and Orders—A report was read by the Committee on Itineracy and Orders completing the report of said Committee. The report was accepted by motion. (See complete Report of Committees)

Motion—Motion prevailed that the President and the President's Assistant work out the details of a slate for the Assistant with pastors involved as they see fit.

Courtesies-The Rev. H. K. Sheets, General Secretary of the Wesleyan Young People's Society, was introduced and he told something about the trip he is to make this summer to the Orient in the interests of the men in service.

Brother and Sister Daniel McCandless were introduced to the Conference.

Report: Resolutions Committee—The Committee on Resolutions read a corrected report and it was adopted by motion. (See Report No. 13.)

Adjourned for committee work.

Monday Morning, June 8, 1953

Called to Order—Conference was called to order by the President. Report—The Special Committee on leasing of properties for oil leases read a report. The report was amended by motion, and then accepted as amended. (See Report No. 20.)

Motion—By a member of the Board of Trustees a motion was made that the valuation of Campgrounds and Buildings be set at \$85,000.00. The motion prevailed.

Report—The Conference President made a report on purchase of property in Rapid City for an Indian cemetery. First purchase for this purpose, is being divided by a super-highway, so a grant in a different location for a cemetery is now being acquired.

Motion—Motion prevailed that we assume costs involved in purchase, deeds, abstracts for 20 acres of land in Rapid City, above mentioned, and that we reimburse Rev. J. F. Simpson for any personal money advanced in the purchase.

Election-Rev. Darrell Wagner was elected a member of the Conference Sunday School Board.

Report—A report was read by the Conference Prayer Secretary, and by motion the report was referred back so that he might harmonize this prayer program with that of the Woman's Missionary Society—then word is to be sent to the pastors regarding the program.

Report: Special Committee—A report was read from a special committee consisting of the Judiciary Committee and the Conference Officers containing a recommendation. (See Report No. 21.)

Report: Committee on Passage of Character—The Committee on Passage of Character read a report pertaining to men on the Conference Roll who are not stationed as pastors. (See Report No. 22.)

Motion: Statistical Reports—Motion prevailed that pastors be requested to mail their completed Statistical Reports to the Conference Statistical Committee Chairman by May 15th.

Motion: Committee to be Elected—Motion prevailed that a committee of three be elected to help in screening and choosing books to be sold on the Bookstand. The following were elected to said committee: Clyde McCoue, Robert Bateman, John Hunter.

Motion-Motion prevailed that an earlier date be set for the meeting of the Missionary Board during our next Conference.

Motion—Motion passed that whenever money is paid by the Conference for rent. and whenever such rental money is used for the purchase of a parsonage, that said parsonage be deeded to the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Dakota Conference. This to become a Standing Rule.

Report: Pastoral Relations—The Committee on Pastoral Relations read its report and by motion the report was accepted. (See Report No. 23.)

Report: Missionary Board—A report was read by the Conference Missionary Board, containing an item for the Standing Rules as part of the report. The report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 24)

Motion-Motion prevailed that the above report be clarified in regard

to the item having to do with an appropriation for the Watertown Church, adding these words to the report: "That interest involved in a loan to be secured by the local Church be assumed by the Conference."

Motion: Amend Standing Rules—Motion prevailed that the following amendment be made in the Standing Rules: Pioneer Pastor's Fund, paragraph 2, page 47 of 1952 Minutes, the following words to be struck cut "of salary received on charge," and these words be substituted: "A statement of monies received from the charge and from secular work be made by the pastor, said statement to be sent to the Conference Treasurer. The Conference Treasurer on receipt of said statement shall send a check to make up any deficit."

Motion: Rental for Pioneer Pastor-Motion prevailed that some Treasurer of some Conference Fund be committed to pay \$40.00 per month toward the rent of the Pioneer Pastor.

Motion: Group Insurance—Motion carried that a Committee of the following two, Thomas Bailie and Marvin Jones, be instructed to continue study of the matter of Group Insurance for our ministers.

Minutes Read-Minutes for last sessions, including current one, were read, and after certain corrections were approved.

Motion prevailed that we adjourn to call of Chair.

Report No. 2

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Conference President is keenly conscious of his weakness, his limitations and some mistakes during his years of official work but he is thankful for the patience and cooperation of the pastors and layman as we have labored together to advance God's cause in the Conference.

We are thankful for the fine band of young men and women whom God has sent to us to help push the battle. The future is bright if we remain spirit energized. We are also deeply grateful for the men and women who have stood by and borne the burden in the heat of the day for twenty-five or thirty years. Their number is getting smaller but in the day of God they will have their reward for much of the victory that will be won in Dakota Conference.

These who hold seniority in our Conference in years of service rendered are, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. A. M. Wiley, Rev. and Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Bailie, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. and Mrs.

Rufus Reisdorph, Mrs. Frank Traver, Rev. J. E. Spry, Mrs. Laura Raymer, Rev. S. J. McIntyre. Without them the Conference would have been short of a staff of workers to carry on in those hard days. Esteem them very highly in love for their works sake, and hold such in reputation because for the work of Christ they have not regarded their lives.

We are also keenly conscious of and appreciative for the fine band of laymen who have stood by during this time and have helped to carry the financial load as well as the spiritual phase of the Conference and Camp; their number is getting smaller year by year as they are being called home, however, God is raising up others to take their place and share their vision and concern.

Year by year God is placing on the hearts of different layman to donate a beef to the Conference and Camp, which is deeply appreciated and God is making a record of this love service. This year Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Lerew of Ashton, and Mr. and Mrs. Ted Beckman of Strool have each made such a donation to Camp. We say thank you and may the Lord reward you.

We give praise to God for the ground that has been gained in the Conference but it seems that it should have been more.

God has placed a love in the heart of your leader for the souls of men and the advancement of the Conference work, so that it has been a JOY to give the work of the Lord in the Conference FIRST PLACE; so that it is ahead of his comfort and the comfort of his family, ahead of his financial interest, ahead of his health interest, ahead of every earthy interest. He can say with the apostle, "I have coveted no man's silver or gold," as offers have been made him which surpassed the remuneration he was receiving, but these things had no attraction. The will of God surpassed all earthly values.

One of the prayer burdens and ideals your President has had for years, has been the desire to help lift the burden of rent from every pastor where there is no parsonage by helping to purchase a suitable modern parsonage. By God's help, and the cooperation of those involved, the ideal has almost been reached, as there are very few of the churches without a parsonage today. For which we all should say, "Praise the Lord." For almost twenty years the Lord has enabled your Conference President not to be chargeable to the Conference for his rent. Sometimes it has involved heavy indebtedness on him but God has provided and will provide. In these years three properties have been built or bought as a parsonage home at his own expense, namely, Houghton, S. D. and Ipswich, S. D. and Rapid City, S. D. two of them have been sold in order better to serve the Conference interests by moving to a point where the need seemed the greatest. The present parsonage was erected in the summer of 1952 on contract bid and financed personally by a bank loan.

Probably the Conference President should say in the language of Paul "Forgive me this harm." However the day is coming in which the Conerence should have in their planning a parsonage for the President.

Some day all of us will stand before the judge of all the earth to give an account of our stewardship, whether we be layman, pastor, or Conference President. Each one will have to give an account of himself to God. If we have failed God or His cause and betrayed the trust given us, it will be too late then to make amends. Let us labor while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work. We need the power of the Holy Spirit to see and develop the potential God has placed in our reach, as stewards of God's Treasury.

The question has been asked many times by many people, does Pioneer effort pay? We wish to submit a partial report of Pioneer efforts for the past 13 years.

During this time 30 church properties and 21 parsonages have been built or bought, the value as listed in the Conference Minutes is \$448700. Two of these churches have been closed and sold and one parsonage, leaving a net gain in Picneer churches in 13 years of 28, and 20 parsonages, a total of 48 properties, an average of more than three a year for thirteen years. In this time the Sunday school has been more than doubled by the addition of the pioneer churches. The Church membership gained by the addition of these churches is over 400.

These new churches, as above mentioned, contributed in 1951-52 Conference year \$3,897.00 on General Budget; \$6,992.00 on Conference Budget; making a total raised in the one year about \$11,000. for budge items. The receipts from the crop and Beckman Estate last year added to the \$11,000 raised on Pioneer fields for budget would make the total of over \$30,000. raised in 1951-52 from Pioneer fields for Conference and General budget. The salary for pastor and local church expense is not added to this list.

The property received from Willie E. Beckman by deed and will is the product of pioneer effort. The value of this property added to the value of the 30 new churches and 20 parsonages, secured in the past 13 years makes a total of over \$800,000. added to the Dakota Conference by pioneer effort. Does pioneering pay?

Organized a Church at Tolstoy, S. D. May 18, 1953.

I have visited each Church, or charge once and several of them twice, and conducted services and business meetings, except two, and they were visited by the Conference President's Assistant, and were given time for him to hold evangelistic services for them several days.

Conducted Annual Business Meetings in 18 churches, which was an extra visitation to said churches.

Report No. 6

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING AND LOCATION

Business Session at Wesleyan Methodist Church, Watertown, S. D., August 26, 1952-10:00 a. m.

Members present-Rev. J. F. Simpson Harold Yetter, L. L. Hildebrandt, Rev. John Hunter.

Property of both Church and parsonage were looked over thoroughly by the Committee and were persuaded that an acute need existed for additional space for Sunday school rooms.

After an opening season of prayer the Committee was called to order by Rev. Simpson and several tentative plans for enlargement were discussed. The members of the local building committee were called in, also th pastor, Rev. A. L. Mudgett.

The first plan suggested by the Conference Committee took into consideration the value of the present parsonage quarters and recommended:

1. That the parsonage quarters be moved to another lot for use as a parsonage, or for salable property.

2. That the extension of the present auditorium to within 6 feet of property line on the north.

3. That the construction of a corner tower and entrance with an upstairs classroom on the southeast corner of the auditorium.

In the discussion which followed, this plan was, in the opinion of the local committee, inadequate for their needs. They felt the problem should be approached from the angle of solving the problem of classroom space first, rather than the enlargement of the auditorium.

A second plan was suggested by Brother Simpson which called for the construction of an "L" addition on the east side of the building 30 feet wide and 34 feet long, the south wall of the "L" to be off-set eight feet from the front of the church, and calling for the construction of a vestibule tower at the southeast corner of the present church structure.

Following a discussion of this second proposed plan a report was given by the building committee of the local Church on the construction plan and cost of a basement "L" 38 feet by 34 feet, including two rest rooms, 2 by 12 floor joists on 16 inch centers, subflooring and weather proof covering on top-\$2,345.00.

After lengthy discussions of the pros and cons of the above suggested plans the following motion was passed upon by the Conference Committee: Moved by Hunter, seconded by Hildebrandt that the Committee approve the basement plan submitted by the local committee with the provision that the plans be revised to include an indentation in the front wall, with the understanding that in the matter of finance the committee is approving only the present construction (the basement). plans for further construction to be referred again to the Conference Building Committee. The above motion was passed unanimously.

The local committee gave an expression of their satisfaction with the action taken.

The meeting was adjourned.

HARLOWTON, MONTANA—February 24, 1953

Rev. J. F. Simpson, Harold Yetter and Rev. John J. Hunter, members of the Building Committee, looked over quite thoroughly a Church and parsonage property being offered for sale in the city of Harlowton. The investigation being made in response to a request from a Wesleyan Methodist family who are desirous of having a Wesleyan Methodist Church in the community.

The Church building is a concrete block structure with an auditorium approximately 30 by 45 feet, plus a side room "L" approximately 24 by 14 feet, the auditorium being equipped with pews and the side room with chairs. The basement consisted of two small unfinished rooms in which a new oil furnace and forced air system had recently been installed.

The parsonage property located adjacent to the Church had been converted into a Sunday School Annex building, but could easily be remodeled for parsonage quarters and consisted of four rooms and bath downstairs and two rooms upstairs with an oil heatrola as heating unit.

A price of ten thousand dollars was being asked for the two buildings. As several items of repairs were needed on the buildings, it was decided by the members of the committee present to recommend to the Missionary Board that an offer of eight thousand dollars be made on the property.

Meeting adjourned.

Minutes of Conference Building Committee meeting held at Aberdeen, S. D., Tuesday. March 3, 1953.

Members of the Committee present were: Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. Bennie Veeder, Harold Yetter, and Rev. John Hunter. Meeting jointly with the Committee were Rev. Marvin E. Jones and Rev. A. L. Mudgett representing the Camp Meeting Board. Mr. Roy Wilhelm of the Spink County Co-operative Lumber Co., representing the contractors, also met with the Committee.

The first item discussed was that of meeting the City requirements for modernizing the Camp. It was unanimously agreed by those present that the site of the old Tabernacle was the most suitable location for the erection of a building to house the rest rooms and wash room. It was further agreed upon that the north end of the concrete slab constituting the floor of the old Tabernacle be covered with approximately 3 inches of new concrete to provide a base for a new building 20 or 24 by 50 feet --rest rooms to be located in each end, with a wash room between them. It was the mind of the committee that the side walls and lean-to roofs of the old Tabernacle could be cut and properly braced and moved on rollers onto the above specified base to constitute the outside structure of the rest rooms building. It was also agreed that a structure approximately the same size as the rest room building be erected on the south end of the old Tabernacle floor to serve as additional dormitory space. The unused portion of the old tabernacle floor would constitute a court approximately 30 feet between the two above described buildings.

The committee next went over the tentative contract on the new tabernacle with Mr. Wilhelm, who suggested changes that would make a considerable saving. Changes passed on included changing the size of single doors from 3 foot doors to a standard size of 2'8" by 6'0", at a saving of approximately 35.00 on the four single doors. A second change passed upon was to change from the use of interlocking asphalt shingles to roll rubberoid applied with metal strips at 18 inch intervals at an estimated saving of about 300.000. A change in the platform piers was also passed upon at a further saving of approximately 100.00. It was also requested that lapsiding be used on the front of the building at approximately the same cost.

Mr. Wilhelm agreed to a provision in the contract, granting the Con-

ference the privilege of using donated labor to apply the sheeting on the roof and sidewalls of the new tabernacle with deductions allowed on the contract price according to cost of applying the sheeting by hired labor.

A motion was unanimously carried that further details that might arise be handled by the Conference President.

Meeting adjourned.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY BOARD

We, your Missionary Board, submit the following report:

A meeting of the Missionary Board was called by the Conference President Friday, June 5, 1953.

The following recommendations were made:

1. That all pastors receiving aid from the Conference, whether the funds come from the Conference Treasurer, Advisory Board, Beckman Board, or Pioneer Pastor's Fund, shall send a monthly statement of monies received—1st, from the Charge, and 2nd, from secular work. This report to be sent to the Conference Treasurer, also this information to be included in the regular quarterly report to the Conference President. That these reports be kept for the Missionary Board to Study. We recommend that each pastor who receives Conference aid meet with the Missionary Board at the time of his appointment. That where a church is unable to give a pastor a living wage, that the matter be studied by the Stewards and Pastor and there be given time for secular employment to supplement the salary. We further recommend that any church that receives Conference aid for two consecutive years and does not show a gain in at least some department that the case be studied by the Missionary Board. We recommend that this become a Standing Rule.

2. That we pay \$12.50 per month on the Rapid City note.

3. That we continue to pay \$15.00 on the Flandreau note per month and that the local church make a liberal offering as payment on this note.

4. That we pay \$70.00 per week salary for the Conference President and that his traveling expenses be paid.

5. That at the time of his visitation, the churches endeavor to raise a liberal offering for either the Conference President or the President's Assistant, to apply on his salary, thus reducing the amount to be paid from the Conference Treasury.

6. That \$60.00 per month be paid Romeo Baronia for salary unless information from the field warrants reduction of same.

7. That \$100.00 per month be paid toward the salary of John Mickley as Pastor of Sioux Community Chapel. We recommend that an itineracy be worked out by the Conference President for Rev. Mickley and Rev. Broken Rope to visit our churches in the interest of Indian Missions and raise funds to be directed to the Conference Treasurer through Missionary channels.

8. That the Charles D. Haynes monthly payment on principal and interest be paid.

9. That we pay the Quarterly Conference Evangelist \$60.00 per week.

10. That we pay the Quarterly Conference Evangelist \$40.00 per month for house rent.

11. That the traveling expenses of the Quarterly Conference Evangelist be allowed.

12. That we delegate to the Quarterly Conference Evangelist the authority to hold quarterly business meetings in our churches.

13. That we apply the Pioneer Pastors' Fund to the Pierre work, and that his salary be set at \$50.00 per week.

14. That we give \$75.00 per month for Pastor's salary at Missoula, Montana.

15. That we pay \$40.00 per month for house rent, and \$50.00 per month salary to the Sundance work.

16. That we assist in moving pastor to Rawlings, Wyoming.

17. That we assist in moving pastor to Harlowton, Montana.

18. That we assist in moving pastor to Brookings, South Dakota.

19. Motion was carried that we appropriate \$3,000.00 to the Watertown Church, \$1500.00 payable at time of construction and \$1500.00 payable one year fater.

20. That all unfinished business be considered at the Fall meeting.

21. That we give \$30.00 per month for house rent at Belle Fourche.

22. That the following requests for assistance be referred to the Conference Advisory Board: Hot Springs, Mission, Tolstoy. That the request for assistance for Rawlins be referred to the Beckman Board.

That the following churches who have requested consideration for assistance, namely, Belle Fourche and Miles City, that their need be studied in the Fall meeting of the Missionary Board.

Standing Rules

1. Financial Plan for Conference Work—Money for Conference work shall be obtained by each local Church paying an amount equal to $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all monies raised for all purposes, this to include local treasury, Sunday School, W.M.S., W.Y.P.S. and Y.M.W.B., with the exception of finance for building and repairs. One-third of this fund shall be used for Church Extension within the bounds of the Dakota Conference, and the balance, two-thirds, shall constitute the regular Conference Fund. This amount is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer once a month.

2. Railroad Expense—The amount of the Railroad Expense Assessment this year is \$10.50, and it is recommended that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer as soon as possible. The Committee shall reimburse the pastors for railroad expense on the basis of four cents a mile, one way for distance traveled.

The Committee in securing the amount of assessment for each Church shall take the cost of carfare of the pastors present, and eligible for such expense, added to any deficit from the previous year; the result divided by the total number of churches, shall determine the assessment each year for this item. Only those pasters whose Churches have paid the assessment for the previous year shall be eligible to receive carfare.

3. Camp Meeting Board—The Conference W.M.S. President, the Conference W.Y.P.S. President and the Pastor of the Aberdeen Church shall be members of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of office.

4. The Local Church File is to be left with the Church by the outgoing Pastor, so that the incoming Pastor will have immediate access to the data contained therein upon his arrival on the field. This file is to be open for inspection of members of the local church.

5. Budgets-All Churches will be instructed at the beginning and again at the close of the Conference year regarding their obligations to the Conference relative to Budget askings, and the amount due on Budget.

6. Officer's Terms-All officers shall hold office until the close of the Conference session in which they are retired.

7. Honorarium Treasurer—The Conference Treasurer shall be paid an honorarium of \$150.00 each year.

8. Honorarium, Secretary—The Conference Secretary shall be paid an honorarium of \$50.00 each year.

9. Regarding Ordination—No person shall receive ordination in the future in the Dakota Conference who does not intend to engage in definite Christian work.

10. The Auditing Committee shall be one of the Standing Cocmittees.

11. Instructions to Treasurers-The treasurers of the various Con-

ference funds shall hold such funds in some bank that is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in the name of the Dakota Conference, and checks drawn on such account shall be signed by the treasurer. as treasurer of said fund.

(a) Each treasurer shall have in hand bank statements at the beginning and at the close of the Conference year involved, and said bank statement shall be submitted with the Treasurer's account book to the Auditing Committee of the Conference at the Annual Conference session, on the first day of the session.

(b) Duplicate receipts, or records, other than the treasurer's account book, with source, date and donor of all receipts shall be submitted to the Auditing Committee with said treasurer's books.

(c) All disbursements from said funds shall be paid by check, and all cancelled checks shall be submitted with the treasurer's books to the Auditing Committee.

12. Pioneer Pastors' Fund—An assessment of one dollar per year shall be raised from each member of each charge and sent to the Conference Treasurer, the monies thus raised to constitute the Pioneer Pastors' Fund. This money shall be disbursed to no more charges than can adequately be cared for by the money which shall come in.

The Pastor receiving aid from this fund shall send a monthly statement of monies received from the charge and from secular work by the Pastor, said statement to be sent to the Conference Treasurer. The Conference Treasurer on receipt of said statement shall send a check to make up any deficit in salary, as agreed previously by the Missionary Board and the Pastor.

At any time the Missionary Board feels that the local Church receiving help from the fund, fails in its obligations the contract shall be terminated by the Missionary Board.

13 Closing Date of Conference Year—Closing date shall be April 30th.

14. Financing of Printing of Minutes—The Secretary shall send a statement to each charge as to the amount they are to pay for printing of the Minutes, the amount to be based on the number of members on each charge.

15. Each Pastor Shall Receive His Salary from the Church he has served the past year, for the two Sundays of Conference and Camp Meeting.

16. Change of Pastors—We recommend that when a Church makes a change of Pastors that said Church enter into an agreement with the incoming Pastor establishing an equitable way of financing the Pastor's noving expenses. 17. Vacation for President—We recommend that the Conference President be granted a two-weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

18. Vacation for Pastor—We recommend that the Pastor be granted a two-weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

19. Ministerial Benefit Fund—Purpose: To provide financial assistance for Conference Elders and preachers in times of serious illness, or death, in their families.

All members and licentiates shall become members upon payment of first assessment, but no one shall be eligible to receive benefits until four consecutive assessments have been paid.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall make four assessments per year, or more if emergencies arise, in the following manner: Each minister on the Conference Roll shall be assessed \$1.50 on due notice from the Secretary, except when both husbands and wives are preachers. In such case only one is assessed. Each pastor shall collect \$1.50 from his Church or charge each time an assessment is made, except ministers not serving in the Conference as Pastors. These are to pay \$2.00 for each assessment.

Disbursements: The Secretary shall upon the receipt of the worthiness of the case, pay out of the treasury 40% of the amount of the actual expense, provided that the expense is more than twenty dollars, and further provided that no payment shall exceed fifty dollars to any one family during one Conference year, possible exceptions being made in extreme cases with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ministerial Benefit Fund. (Normal :naternity cases excepted.)

Members delinquent in the last two payments prior to claim for help, shall be ineligible. In case one is delinquent in two, or more, payments, no benefits will be paid in emergencies by paying of delinquent payments. If assessment is paid by check, include a service, charge, to the amount of the check.

In case of death a maximum of \$100.00 will be paid the beneficiaries. The assessment in such case shall be one dollar for pastor, and one dollar for Church, and \$1.50 for all others.

In case the Secretary-treasurer is in doubt as to the worthiness of a case, he shall advise with the Conference President.

Postage and necessary expense shall be deducted from the fund.

20. Opening Date of Conference shall be the first Tuesday after the first Monday of June of each year.

21. Conference Work—All monies sent in under the $7\frac{1}{2}$ % fund shall be counted as Conference Work on the Statistical blanks, and monies sent in for the Pioneer Pastor's Fund shall be counted as Conference Missions on the blanks.

22. Each Conference Standing Committee shall have a book of records, and shall be prepared to report to Conference all work done by their Committee.

23. Member of Missionary Board—The Conference Treasurer shall be a member of the Missionary Board by virtue of office.

24. All members of all Committees doing Conference work shall have their travel expenses paid from the Conference Treasury.

25. Closing Date for Treasurers—All treasurers of the various funds of the Conference are instructed to close their books on the 15th day of May each year.

26. The Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, the Committee on Railroad Expense, and the Statistical Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference a year in advance, and their names are to appear with the list of Standing Committees.

27. Each Church shall be responsible to the Pastor, and each Pastor shall be responsible to the Church to which he was appointed at the last session of Conference, and which Church he has served for the preceding Conference year, this responsibility to be inclusive of the first Sunday after the close of Conference and Camp Meeting.

28. Superannuate Pension Fund Item—Monies sent in by the Churches on the budget item of Superannuate Pension Fund, (\$1.50 per member), is to be sent to the Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer of the Conierence.

29. Aid for Rent—Whenever money is paid by the Conference for rent, and whenever such rental money is used for the purchase of a parsonage, that said parsonage be deeded to the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

30. Aid to Churches—Any Church that received Conference aid for two consecutive years and does not show a gain in at least some department, that the case be studied by the Missionary Board.

31. Agreement Between Conference and Willie Beckman Estate— "The following land is deeded to the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church on the agreement mentioned below: S. W. 1/4, North half of 28, all of section 21, and S. W. 1/4 of 9, all in township 18, range 11, in Perkins County. South Dakota.

1. That O. Theo. Beckman be appointed supervisor to rent and subrent such land.

2. That the land be not sold without the approval of O. Theo. Beckman.

3. That Rev. J. F. Simpson and his Advisory Board be a Committee to receive and disburse 50% of the receipts of the crop for Church Extension.

4. That when J. F. Simpson ccases to be President of the Conference that the Committee to receive and disburse the amount for Church Extension, as mentioned in paragraph 3, be Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. William Ward, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. R. J. Sausoman.

5. When the land is sold, it is requested that Miltonvale Wesleyan College, the Indian Work and the Philippine work sponsored by the Conference, be given proper consideration.

6. It is requested that the following persons be a Committee to disburse the money from the sale of the land, Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. William Ward. Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. John Kearns, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, Rev. Kenneth Shelley.

7. That the Committee mentioned in paragraph 6 be empowered to fill vacancies made by death or other causes, of any of the Committee.

8. It is requested that this agreement become a part of the Standing Rules of the Conference, and printed accordingly in the Conference Minutes.

9. In case O. Theo. Beckman, the land supervisor, is deceased before the land is sold, that the Committee mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7 be empowered to transact all business relative to the land mentioned in this agreement.

10. It is prayerfully requested that the Dakota Conference keep the spirit of unity, a missionary spirit, and confidence in your leaders. Action taken during the 1952 Conference pertaining to this agreement: The Beckman Board of the Dakota Conference shall be known as the DIRECTORS of the Beckman Estate, with power to transact all legal business in the Estate in keeping with the provisions of the will of Willie E. Beckman.

(1) When said Board of Directors shall sell a part, or all, of the land in the Beckman Estate, or when the leasing of the land for oil, or the sale of mineral or gas rights or royalties be made, that the President and Secretary of said Conference, or its Trustees, be empowered to sign any legal papers, leases, deeds and contracts of all kinds.

That the said Beckman Board, as above described, shall have power to sell any, or all, of the land hereinafter described, and that the President and Secretary shall have the power to execute such conveyances. (See description of land at beginning of this agreement)

Items of Vital Importance

Information Regarding the Beckman Board—A Board was created in June 1949 to be known as the Beckman Board, this Board to manage and operate the Beckman properties. This Board is composed of the following persons: J. F. Simpson, L. D. Harris, William Ward, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Arthur Reisdorph, John Kearns, R. J. Sausoman. O. Theo. Beckman, Ken-

neth Shelley. This Board is self-perpetuating and shall appoint any vacancies that shall occur through death or other causes. This Board shall have complete control over the properties received through transfers of Willie E. Beckman, or O. Theo. Beckman, as Executor of the last will and testament of Willie E. Beckman, deceased. This Board shall retain such portion of income as necessary to meet its expenses in operating and keeping the property in good repair, including a separate reserve to insure sufficient operating funds. That the funds shall be disbursed in accordance with the agreement heretofore entered into between Willie E. Beckman and the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. That in accordance with the wishes of Willie E. Beckman that O. Theo. Beckman continue as supervisor of the Beckman properties.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee of Plan of Work, submit the following as outlined by the General and Annual Conference:

1. Arrange with pastor for one missionary prayer service each month.

2. A minimum of 10 meetings to be held during the year, in which prayer is given a prominent place, and business is transacted; and at least one public meeting.

3. Recognizing the power of prayer, let us diligently observe the following:

- a. The formation of Prayer Partner Circles in each Society with a Prayer Partner Secretary, who shall send a report to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary within 60 days after adjournment of the Annual Conference.
- b. The observance of a Prayer and Fast Day by each Society once a month according to the plan of the District Chairman.
- c. Co-operation in the World Day of Prayer services under the direction of the District Chairman.
- 4. a. The President, Secretary, Treasurer and 75% of the active membership to be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary.
 - b. A Magazine Solicitor to be elected who will faithfully endeavor to obtain all renewals and will gain not less than two new subscriptions a year, reporting the same to the Conference Magazine Solicitor according to the plan of said Solicitor.
- 5. a. Each society to be recognized in Annual Conference by the New President and Delegate.
 - b. Delegate to be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that Society at the Annual Conference session, same to be divided equally between Conference, Home and Foreign Missions.
 - c. Statistical Report Blanks filled out on time. Send one copy to Mrs. Mable Wadsworth, Mina, South Dakota, by May 15th.
- 6. a. All monies received as dues be sent to Conference Treasurer, designating where 50% of same be applied on missions.
 - b. All monies and vouchers to be sent to Conference Treasurer quarterly and final quarterly remittances not later than May 1st, using blanks sent out by Conference Treasurer.

7. Every woman in the church a member of the society or a 10% gain in total membership.

8. Standing rules to be observed are as follows:
