



Journal of Daily Proceedings

Fairmount, Indiana, August 19, 1919.

The Seventy-first Session of the Indiana Annual Conference assembled in the Tabernacle on the Camp Ground at Fairmount, Indiana, Monday evening, August 18, 1919, at 8:00 P. M. and listened to a soul-inspiring sermon delivered by Rev. H. T. Arnold upon the close union of the love of Christ and the Church.

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I.

It is contrary to the spirit of our Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.

II.

That any candidate for Elder's Orders or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Conference, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the truth and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.

III.

That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesy be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

IV.

Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

v.

Whereas the Discipline requires that the stewards meet the pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time

enter into an agreement in writing with the pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the pastor shall fail to render said service, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligations entered into by contracting parties.

VI.

Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year.

VII.

The membership, as far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

VIII.

All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall, in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

IX.

We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with previous arrangements between pastors and charges.

X.

All unaccounted for numbers appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.

XI.

The Committee on Elder's Orders are hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.

XII.

It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.

XIII.

The official character of no pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

XIV.

The ordination services shall be held in connection with the memorial services of the Conference.

XV.

Pastors shall pass their statistical reports to the Committee on Ministerial Character, who shall pass upon their regualrity or irregularity. Hereafter these reports shall not be read in open conference.

XVI.

The Board of Trustees shall formulate plans to govern the Educational Secretary and Church Extension Secretary in their work, this to be a standing rule of the Conference until revoked by vote of this body.

XVII.

It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.

XVIII.

It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and General Evangelists shall be called first.

XIX.

In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

XX.

No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with the charge or Conference.

XXI.

Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear their moving expenses, if any expense should be thus incurred.

Report No. 2.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

- 1. We recommend that Rev. J. O. Baker be elected Financial Agent for the Bible School.
- 2. That he receive four hundred dollars (\$400.00) as a remuneration for his services as Financial Agent.
- 3. We recommend that three Conference Evangelists be elected and that the salary of each Evangelist be eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100.00) and that the President shall be compensated for all expenses incurred in the performance of his presidential duties. The amount necessary for his remuneration to be taken from the Conference Mission Fund and Church Extension Fund. The Evangelists' apportionment for each charge shall be raised pro rata to meet the increased salaries.

- 4. The high cost of living makes a raise in the salaries of our pastors imperative, and we do therefore recommend that all charges that have not paid a cash salary of \$800.00 and have not provided for a substantial increase in the pastor's salary for the ensuing year, be urgently requested to give the matter immediate attention with an increase of not less than twenty-five per cent. Under existing circumstances, the minimum salary should not be less than \$800.00.
- 5. Where there are unavoidable deficiencies in the salaries of the Conference Evangelists, we recommend that such deficits be paid from the arm of the work they represent.
- 6. When pastors or charges deem it necessary to cancel dates with the duly elected representatives of the Conference, said charge shall be responsible for the payment of the Evangelist's apportionment assigned them.
- 7. In accordance with the General Conference action, each member of the Church is expected to pay into the hands of the pastor the sum of ten cents per year to provide a General Conference expense fund.
 - 8. The President shall be required to organize our evangelistic forces with the view of entering new fields and especially in the centers of population. All the Conference Evangelists in their quarterly meeting work, when emergencies arise, may call to their assistance other persons when satisfactory arrangements can be made with all concerned. All the Evangelists shall report their work quarterly in the Wesleyan Methodist.
 - 9. We recommend that each Sunday School devote the offering on the first Sunday of each month to Home and Foreign Missions, divided equally, and that the money raised by the Conference Missionary Secretary be devoted to Conference Missions.
 - 10. We offer the following apportionments to the different charges for the various arms of the work during the coming year:

Report No. 4.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY.

This year the policy of the Sunday School organization has been one of retrenchment made necessary on account of the uncertain conditions under which the work had to be carried on. Because of these conditions I am sure we have failed to realize many of the things we had hoped to realize in the way of advancement. We are, however, grateful for the manner in which our people have responded to the methods of work which had to be used in doing the necessary things.

It has been my privilege to visit in person some of the District Conventions and I have received splendid reports from those which I was unable to reach. Our workers have shown a marked degree of application in the past year to working out our organization and they have been very considerate of the disadvantages under which the Conference Secretary was obliged to labor.

In all my correspondence I have found an earnest disposition of inquiry and I am satisfied that whatever directions were necessary were followed out as nearly as possible.

You will call to mind that this year has been unusually hard for all religious organizations, and yet in the face of this fact our Conference Sunday Schools have made appreciable advancement in many respects. Our organization may not be worked out any more minutely than before, but as it is it is working better than before. Our workers have been able to see the vital importance of the work and the vitally important things necessary for the doing of the work under conditions that served to test and try the efficiency of the methods adopted. This year has convinced many who were yet in doubt as to their being needed in the active work of the Sunday School and church. They have come to see the need of greater consecration, self-denial, and application to the things in which the Church is interested.

I have found in the District Superintendents and the members of the Conference Board a devout and efficient organization of men who hope to do the better and larger tasks. I may suggest to you that the most serious difficulty before them in the accomplishment of the necessary things is the fact that they find themselves within limitations which I am convinced from this on are not necessary. I would suggest that these workmen be given the tools with which to labor, that the Conference organization become decidedly active in the open field and make vital contact with every local organization as nearly as possible.

It occurs to me that in this hour when we behold a better era in our educational life we should not forget the small things that will reinforce and strengthen our possibilities. I can but believe that our educational program should begin in the Sunday School; that it should not reflect upon existing institutions of the State. but that it should establish a life determination that will result favorably to the united ambitions of the Church.

It is proper, I believe, to remind you that the Indiana Conference has always been in the advance of the Sunday School movement in our denomination. We are ready, with slight alterations in our financial system, for the advanced steps made by the General Conference in Sunday School work. I have asked your Conference

Board to submit to you a plan for taking care of this situation. I solicit your co-operation for them in adopting a plan that will work and in providing sufficient for Conference work to enable this department to return to its former intensive plan of operation.

Report No. 5.

CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

I.

Organization.

The Sunday School is the Church at work winning souls for Christ. The work to reach the highest success should have some form of organization. Organization cannot take the place of spiritual life, but it is necessary to direct this energy, and unify the work.

The principles of organization under which our Sunday School work is to be carried on are as follows:

- 1. Locally, under the supervision of the Church through the Sunday School Board.
- 2. The work of the various departments under the direction of efficient superintendents chosen by the Church through the Sunday School Board.
- 3. The Sunday School graded according to age and development and taught by godly teachers.
- 4. The organization of the Conference and Connection according to the Discipline for the most effectual service.

Enrollment.

II.

- 1. Permanent records for the use of the Sunday School and Church should be kept of the entire enrollment of the school.
- 2. The teacher or the class secretary should keep an enrollment of the membership of the class.

3. The Superintendents of the Cradle Roll, Home and Temperance Departments should keep an accurate enrollment of the membership of the several departments, with the date of entrance, promotion or death.

III.

Literature.

The Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature can not be successfully superseded by any other for our schools. This is one of our best means of indoctrinating our people with the fundamentals of Bible instruction. We urge all our Sunday Schools to encourage the use of our own literature in accordance with the Discipline.

IV.

Our Sunday School standards have proven to be a great stimulus and as a result we have reached a much higher degree of efficiency in the work for the Lord than formerly. Our Connectional Sunday School Board has incorporated the standards of this Conference and enlarged them into what is called "Efficiency Standards for Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools." We have adopted these standards. In these standards the per cent. is given for each of the nineteen points required under the standard for Loyal Sunday Schools, and also for each of the thirteen requirements of the Front Line Sunday Schools. Thus each school may receive proper credit for all work performed.

٧.

Constitution and By-Laws of Organized Classes.

Article 1.

Article 2.

The object of this class shall be Bible study, soul winning, the extension of Christ's kingdom and mutual helpfulness among its members.

Article 3.

The officers shall consist of a Teacher, President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot, except the Teacher, who is elected by the Church; but the class may make a request for its choice. The officers shall continue for one year, or until their successor is elected.

Article 4.

The standing committees shall be appointed or elected as follows: (1) Executive, (2) Devotional and Missionary, (3) Membership, (4) Program, (5) Memorial. Other committees may be created as needed. The Executive Committee shall consist of all the class officials, pastor and superintendent of the Sunday School.

Article 5.

The class meet every Sabbath for Bible study in connection with the Sunday School.

The business meetings shall be held on the first Tuesday evening of each month. Special meetings may be called at any time by the president, teacher, or any five members of the class, by giving notice to the class on the Sabbath preceding the proposed meetings. One-fourth of the enrolled membership shall constitute a quorum. The class shall meet quarterly as follows:

The first Monday evening of March, June, September and November.

The subject for the March meeting shall be "Studies in the Life of Christ."

The June meeting with a Home Coming, with an address on Sunday School work.

The September meeting shall be a Missionary meeting.

The theme for the November meeting shall be Temperance Reforms, or patriotic in nature.

Article 6.

In view of the evils that may arise from the social features there shall be no refreshments served by the class for a financial consideration, nor shall games be indulged in by the class.

Article 7.

Duties of Officers and Committees.

Section 1. The teacher shall have charge of the lesson and shall be ex-officio members of all committees. The teacher must be consulted by the officers and committees relative to all subjects pertaining to class work and committee appointments.

Section 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the class, except lesson period, and shall be the geenral executive officer. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 3. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence, and shall render such other assistance as may be required by the President.

Section 4. The Secretary shall have charge of all records of the class, record the minutes of all business meetings and make all announcements. Also make a record of the attendance of the members each Sunday and report the same to the class or the Secretary of the Sunday School as required.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall have charge of all monies and pay it out as directed by the class in harmony with the rules of the Sunday School. Also to report to the class as often as required and to the Treasurer of the Sunday School each Sunday.

Section 6. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the class work.

Section 7. The Membership Committee shall be responsible for securing new members, encouraging absentees and visiting the sick. Also for devising plans and methods for increasing the class attendance, and may call upon members of the class for assistance, and for greeting, welcoming and introducing new members of the class and visitors.

Section 8. The Devotional and Missionary Committee shall be responsible for the religious life of the class through special prayer

meetings, securing the presence of all members at regular church services, interesting them in Bible study, and enlisting every member in the regular work of the Church, Sunday School, and other forms of missionary and benevolent Christian service.

Section 9. The Program Committee shall be responsible for arranging programs for the class meetings.

Article 8.

The Constitution may be amended at any regular business meeting of the class by a two-thirds vote of the class enrollment. Any motion to amend must lay on the table at least one month before the final action is taken.

Article 9.

All the work of entertainment of the class shall be conducted in harmony with the rules and Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, of which we are a part. By-Laws may be adopted as the needs of the class may indicate.

By-Laws.

- No. 1. A committee shall be composed of as many members as the needs may require. The committee work may also be organized to the best advantage to accomplish the greatest results.
- No. 3. The Class President shall have power to divide the class into four sections for the quarterly meeting occasion. These sections shall have charge in rotation of serving refreshments. Not more than two articles shall be served at any one meeting.

VI.

Departments.

We consider our Sunday School Departmental work as providential opportunities of performing successful service for Jesus.

They offer the Church an opportunity to take hold of the child as soon as it enters this world and to continue this relation throughout life. They afford, too, the most excellent means of building up the depleted Sunday Schools.

VII.

Redistricting.

We recommend that the districts of the Conference and the Superintendents of the same be as follows:

Northern-E. J. Pitts.

North Central-F. O. Spitler.

Eastern-E. E. Corv.

Western-E. L. Glover.

South Central-D. C. Dooley.

Southern-C. G. Pavne.

We further recommend that the high-water mark for the district work for the coming year be the same as last year:

- 25 per cent increase in the Cradle Roll Department.
- 25 per cent increase in the Home Department.
- 15 per cent increase in the total membership of the schools.
- 40 per cent increase in the number signing Temperance pledge.
- 25 per cent increase in the Teachers' Training Course.

VIII.

Reorganization, Statistics and Statistical Information.

- 1. We recommend that all schools in the Indiana Conference reorganize between the first and fifteenth of July each year.
- 2. Each local Superintendent of departments and of the main school shall report their work to the quarterly conference, also give a duplicate to the pastor. The pastor shall report the work annually to the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

We are grateful to God that in His kind providence He has permitted us to meet again, and that so many who were called to the colors have returned to us.

We rejoice that in the struggle between tyranny and freedom God is again vindicating His Word in the triumph of righteousness.

We deplore the popular tendency to minify the power of the Blood and the potency of Divine revelation and to magnify human agency, thus defeating God's plan in the Church and bringing havoc to human society.

We are also reminded that the nation that rejects God in sowing the seeds of skepticism and infidelity will in time have a day of reaping.

While we are rejoicing over the victory won in the ratification of the National Prohibition Amendment, we do not want to forget that the victory is not complete until the liquor traffic is utterly banished from our globe.

By reason of the appalling increase in the use of tobacco brought about by government authorization during the war, we feel that it is imperative to use every lawful means to combat this growing evil and to give our full endorsement to the No-tobacco League.

As we witness the growing power of Roman Catholicism in control of the public school system of our cities and country, we want to emphasize the need of standing firm against any encroachments of such legislation as will tend to unite the Church and State. We also deplore the possibilities of throttling the voice of public sentiment and conscience, religiously or otherwise, through the press.

Inasmuch as the Word of God gives direction on the manner of dress that is becoming to the followers of Christ, we believe

the Wesleyan Methodist Church should not be silent in her attitude to this question. We deplore the immodest costume of dress that is being worn by many on the street and public places. We believe it to be grossly immodest, dangerous to health and highly incentive to immorality. We therefore declare for a more sane manner of dress, such as will harmonize with the teachings of the Word of God, Christian culture and refinement.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Dear Sisters of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies of Indiana—Greetings in Jesus' name!

We certainly come together at this time with grateful hearts and bowed heads before Him who ruleth the heavens and maketh wars to cease in the earth. Some of us, after having ministered with loving hands to their needs, have followed our loved ones to the grave and committed their souls to God who gave them, while others were denied this tender ministry and on account of the awful tragedy of war, their dear ones sleep in the briny deep, or grace the hillsides of sunny France, all waiting alike the great day when the sea and the grave shall give up their dead, and with those who remain, shall appear before the Judge of all the earth to answer for the deeds done in the body.

In the providence of God we have met again this conference year of 1919 to bring our offerings of gratitude and love, and lay them at the feet of Him we love and serve, that we may help bring about the glad time when the kingdoms of this world shall recognize Jesus as the supreme Ruler of the hearts and lives of men. While the past year has had its sorrows, it has had its joys and blessings as well.
