DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of the Seventy-Sixth Annual Session of the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, held at Aberdeen, South Dakota, June 11th through June 15th, A.D., 1957.

First Meeting—8:00 a.m., Tuesday, June 11, 1957

Opening Seession—The Seventy-Sixth Annual Session of the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Camp Grounds, Aberdeen, South Dakota, at 8:00 a.m., June 11th, 1957. The Conference President, Rev. J. F. Simpson, presiding.

Dakota Conference Camp Meeting—On Thursday, June 6th, preceding the conference, the annual Camp Meeting was begun, with Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, Evangelist of Marion, Indiana; Rev. A. Thomas Claus, Youth Evangelist from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and Rev. and Mrs. O. L. Bynum of Anniston, Alabama, Song Evangelists. These God-called efficient leaders and workmen, were used to advance the cause of Christ, and numbers found help of the Lord.

Total number of votes cast, 76. Number favoring the amendment, 67. Number opposing the amendment, 11. The amendment was approved by the Dakota Conference by more than the needed two-thirds majority vote.

Denominational Address.—The Orders of the Day called for the Denominational address. Rev. R. L. Gowan offered prayer. Rev. Roy S.

Nicholson, Denominational Representative, spoke from the subject, "Wesleyan Methodism's Major Problem." The speaker stated the greatest need of Wesleyan Methodism at all levels of the Church, from the General Conference to local levels, is Brotherly Love.

Brotherly Love is the evidence that one is in fellowship with God. It is the divine ideal for the Christian Church. The Church should be a family bound by the ties of divine love. There are ten churches which fail because of this lack in comparison with one which fails because of a moral lapse. The Church should guard against all things that hinder. The Church must come up to God's standard—a burning heart of divine and holy brotherly love. This service was closed by prayer.

People in every part of the world, the speaker pointed out, are attempting to find peace, which can be found only in the Christ. Every Christian in every local church has a mission in every land. There should be a representative from every church, engaged in some phase of missionary work or activity. An offering was taken for various fields and missionaries, and for missionary work.

REPORT OF JOINT BOARD MEETING ON RELOCATION OF CAMP GROUNDS

Minutes of Joint Board Meeting, held at the Robbinsdale Church of Rapid City, South Dakota, July 25, 1956.

In keeping with action authorized unanimously by vote of the Conference body, and included in the report of the Special Commtitee on page 35 of the Conference Minutes, 1956, "The Advisory Board, the Building and Location Board, and the Camp Meeting Board," having been delegated by Conference action to "further study . . . relocation of the Dakota Conference Camp to the Camp site at Rapid City, South Dakota," and having been vested with "power to act" were called together by the Conference President, Rev. J. F. Simpson, at the above place and date.

The meeting was called to order by the President at 1:30 P.M.

In an opening season of prayer the mind of the Lord was earnestly sought for the important decisions under consideration, and for urgent needs that were confronting many of the Churches of the Conference.

In the opening discussions, the "pros" and "cons" of moving the Conference Camp to a new location were freely discussed. Some of the items considered were the cost of relocation, new construction, and other difficulties that would be involved in such a move. Study was also given to problems resulting from the expansion of the City of Aberdeen, which has taken our present Camp site into the City limits, brought us under new regulations, and seemingly blocked any possible expansion of our grounds which was deemed by all present to be an urgent need of the Camp. One of the benefits resulting from the above problem which was considered was that of the increased value of the present Camp site, with some differences of opinion being expressed as to how high a value we could place upon it. The report was given of one Realtor's estimate of \$30,000.00 as the valuation of the present Camp site; but all board members present conceded the possibility of a higher value being realized if the right buyers were contacted, and if we salvaged what we could of movable buildings and of equipment and facilities that could be used in another Camp.

After considerable discussion, a unanimous decision of all present was reached favoring definite steps toward the relocation of the camp.

A motion carried unanimously that the Aberdeen Camp be listed for sale by our Conference President, Rev. J. F. Simpson, and that he be authorized to employ such means as he saw fit in securing a buyer.

Expression was made and supported that an effort be made to get the best price possible from the Aberdeen Camp site, even though it might require a considerable length of time. No definite price was set by the Board but discussion favored a figure between forty and fifty thousand as a starting price.

At this point the Board recessed briefly and met a short time later on the new Camp site approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles west of Rapid City at the end of Red Dale Drive off from the Canyon Lake Road.

The new location, having been passed on as a Youth Camp site by previous Conference action, was looked over quite thoroughly by all members present. It was noted that the new Camp site included approximately 60 acres of beautiful rolling timber land with some very fine spots in it for Tabernacle and other Camp buildings. Two large dormitories being prepared for Youth Camp purposes are already on the grounds, two private houses belonging to Wesleyan Ministers, and also that a well had been drilled and a large electric pump had been installed.

Plans for the grounds were discussed at some length with a motion being passed to place the planning of the grounds in the hands of the local committee: Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. Dean Watson, Ted Beckman, Melvin Gibson, Harold Griffin, and L. D. Harris.

Some further discussions centered around suggestions for a central water system, a suitable sewage system, streets and cabin arrangements, etc. A motion was carried that also placed the platting of the lots in the hands of the above mentioned local committee.

Lot sizes of 60 x 50 ft. at the price of \$100.00 each was accepted.

Meeting adjourned with prayer.

We, your Missionary Board, submit the following report:

The Missionary Board met at 1:00 p.m., June 15th, on the Aberdeen Camp Ground, with the Conference President in charge. The following recommendations were made:

- 1. That the payment on the Flandreau note be considered after January 1, 1958.
- 2. That we pay \$70.00 per week salary for the Conference Presiident, and that his traveling expenses be paid.
- 3. That we advance one-half of the President's salary at the first of each month; and that at the end of the month he submit a statement of monies received and balance be paid.
- 4. That we advance to the President \$50.00 per month for expenses, and that he send a statement of deficit at end of month for said expenses.
- 5. That the moving expense of the Conference President be cared for; and that the matter of his rent be referred to the Advisory Board.
- 6. That at the time of his visitation, the churches endeavor to raise a liberal offering for the Conference President, thus reducing the amount to be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 7. That \$60.00 per month be paid Romeo Baronia, with consideration of a raise at the next Board Meeting.

- 8. We recommend that the Conference elect Rev. J. F. Simpson to be the Superintendent and/or President of our Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Work in the Philippine Islands, and that at a later time, the Board study the needs that may arise concerning this office.
- 9. That by September 1st, we pay \$90.00 of the Building Material bill at Pierre.
- 10. That the President of the Wesleyan Youth be a member of the Missionary Board.
- 11. That the item of the Sioux Community Chapel be studied at the next meeting.
- 12. That the Charles D. Haynes monthly payment on principal and interest be paid.
- 13. That we pay \$43,00 per month house rent payment at Sundance.
- 14. That we pay one-half of the monthly house payment at Belle Fourche, and that the item of salary again be referred to the Beckman Board.
- 15. That we apply the Pioneer Pastor's Fund to the Bismarck work.
- 16. That we allow \$45.00 per month house rent at Bismarck and that the pastor's salary be \$55.00 per week.
- 17. That we request the privilege of adjusting Standing Rule No. 12 to the extreme rent condition existing in Bismarck.
- 18. That the Conference President go to Missoula for a study of that field, and that at the next Board Meeting he bring a recommendation regarding definite commitments.
- 19. That the matter of salary for Terry, Montana be referred to the Beckman Board.
- 20. That we secure a loan of \$1,500.00.
- 21. That Item No. 29 be stricken from the Standing Rules.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PASSAGE OF CHARACTER

The Committee on Passage of Ministerial Character has examined the reports that have been presented with appreciation of the work of the past year and with Christian regard for the faithful brethren who have labored diligently and sacrificially as to the Lord and not unto men. Our confidence in our ministerial brethren is such as to prompt us to pass their characters—even though their reports do not

42

fairly represent the excellence of their work. We regret that they have not felt it necessary to give a good report of the good work.

The committee does not wish to impede the work of the conference by insisting on mere technicalities nor to weary the patience of its members by an attempt to enforce the letter of the discipline. However, there appears to be such general misunderstanding and neglect of the "Report of a Minister to the Annual Conference" that some remarks and recommendations seem to be in order.

Item I. OBSERVATIONS.

1. There are some 108 names on the conference roll.

2. All members of the conference (except denominational officers) are required by the discipline to answer the questions on the "character blank" in writing. (See paragraphs 139, 41, and 128.)

3. Only 59 of the 106 thus required to report returned the report blanks, although 21 others sent some form of greetings to the conference and 6 others were present at some time during the conference and camp meeting. Twenty-eight did not report in any form.

4. Of the 49 blanks returned, 15 were satisfactorily completed.

5. On the rest the answers revealed varying degrees of misunderstanding of the questions or of the duties to which they refer—and in a few cases some neglect of the duties enjoined by the discipline.

For example, according to what the reports stated—

6. Seven conference preachers had not quarterly conference license. (See paragraph 92 of the discipline for the requirement.)

7. This lack is balanced by the fact that 14 elders **do** hold quarterly conference licenses. This is not required.

8. One seriously "qualified" answer to the question of using the Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature was noted.

9. Three ministers do not subscribe for THE WESLEYAN METH-ODIST.

10. Five ministers do not subscribe for THE WESLEYAN MIS-SIONARY.

11. Fifteen ministers do not subscribe for WESLEYAN YOUTH.

12. Thirty did not answer "yes" to the question about the charge's meeting its financial obligations to the conference and the denomination.

13. Three members did not have copies of the Standing Rules of the conference.

14. The reports of 14 pastors lacked either the report of the delegate or his signature—or both.

15. Eleven more delegates answered "no" to the question as to whether the stewards had met with the pastor to agree upon his support for the coming year—though some of these, of course, were from charges which are calling a new pastor. Nevertheless, only 17 of our 50 churches reported carrying out this procedure, which is both a requirement of the discipline and a subject in the conference president's letter to the chairman of the pulpit supply committees from year to year.

Item II. RECOMMENDATIONS.

Because the character report blanks do have a value to the work of the conference, and lest they should speedily become a meaningless formality, we offer the following recommendations:

1. That an instruction sheet be prepared to accompany the character blanks in order that the meaning of the questions may be clarified. (For instance, what is the meaning of a "yes" or "no" to the question on readiness to accept work at the hands of this conference?)

2. That each minister whose name appears on the conference roll be asked to fill out the appropriate pages of the character report in addition to whatever testimony and personal greetings he may wish to send.

4. That the church delegates be asked to call the attention of the chairmen of the boards of stewards to the matter of meeting with the pastors each year.

4. That each pastor should hereafter secure the signature of the church delegate, thus vouching for the accuracy both of the questions answered by the pastor and those to be answered by the delegate.

5. That the minister's name should appear somewhere on the report, preferably by changing the word "Delegate" to "Pastor" at the end of Item VI and signing in the blank provided. (Twenty-four blanks had no minister's name—and some no name of the church.)

6. That the character blanks should again be turned in with the statistical blanks before the beginning of conference.

7. That someone be appointed to review the character blanks before conference convenes—and that if any reports contain omissions or answers hard to be understood, the blanks be returned to the ministers for correction before they are passed upon by the committee.

8. That the character of all who made a report be passed.

9. That the conference secretary be asked to notify those who have not made some kind of a report to the conference in either of the past two years that the conference desires to know their whereabouts and how they fare and that a report would be appreciated at the next session. (See paragraph 135 of the discipline.) It is assumed that anyone who does not report once in three years in answer to a special request would not wish their name to remain on the conference roll. Item III. EXCEPTIONS.

Conference preachers who are appointed by the conference as sole or principal pastors of **organized** Wesleyan Methodist churches are eligible to vote on conference matters (except in the election to Elders Orders, in the passing of the character of elders where a vote is required, and in the election of committees affected by the same. See paragraph 170, sub-paragraph (2), of the discipline.)

Item V. AUTHORIZATION

According to the records of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders as compared with the statement of the discipline (paragraph 170, subparagraphs (2), (3) and (4), the following conference preachers are eligible to be authorized by the conference president to administer the sacraments and (where state laws permit) to perform marriage ceremonies if they are employed as the sole or principal pastor of a Wesleyan Methodist church: Charley Abarr, Richard Franklin, Andrew Gerleman, Max Hansen, Benjamin Joachim, Arnold LaRue, Darrell Martin, C. Milton Newbold, Earl Olson, Elvie Turner, Bennie D. Veeder, Marion Vreugdenhill.

This eligibility might also be extended to the following by vote of the conference: Howard Boyle, Loren Hunt, Rudy Hauck, Walter Kemp, Isla F. Knight, William Maynard, Richard Mitchell, Tillman Nelson, Leon Ordonez, Mae Palmer, F. M. Schumacher.

Item VI. MISCELLANEOUS

Mrs. Victoria Moulton and W. E. Moulton, who were ordained to the ministry by the General Baptist Church and who have transferred their membership to the Wesleyan Methodist Church, have satisfied the Committee on Itineracy and Orders as to their agreement with Wesleyan Methodist doctrine, discipline, government and usages and as to their personal and educational qualifications for the work of an Elder. We recommend that their earlier ordination be recognized by the annual conference and that their names be added to the roll of Elders.

Frederick B. Francis, an Elder of the Holiness Movement Church of Canada, desirous of joining the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, has been examined and we find that he has passed a course of study equivalent to our course of study for candidates for Elders Orders with the exception of Wesleyan Methodist Church History and Wesleyan Methodist Discipline. We recommend that candidates attending school be requested to specify in their report to conference each year their school classification as to course and year.

REPORT OF THE DAKOTA CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

June 13, 1957

ACTIVITIES

During the past year your conference Sunday School Secretary engaged in the following activities in the promotion of the Sunday School work of the conference.

- 1. Attended the sessions of the National Sunday School Association in Chicago in October, 1956.
- 2. Accompanied Dr. Reisdorph, Denominational Sunday School Secretary, in a one-week tour of the conference, assisting in conducting seven rallies throughout the area.
- 3. Co-operated with the general office in promoting the Autumn Advance.
- 4. Co-operated with the general office in the raising of the Thanksgiving offering for the General Headquarters Building. Our conference total was \$2,192.20. Our giving average for this project of 86.6 cents per scholar was fourth highest among the conferences.
- 5. Sent out quarterly correspondence to each pastor.

ATTENDANCE FOR THE YEAR

The average attendance for the year shows a 5% gain. In spite of this gain in attendance our enrollment dropped 116. To me this indicates we are bringing people into our Sunday School classes but are evidently not getting their names on our rolls.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. I would urge that in the coming year we give attention to the promotion of the Home Department of our Sunday Schools. Twenty-seven of our schools show no Home Department enrollment whatsoever. This is a field of service we are neglecting. Generally speaking, the group reached by this department of our school are those well up in years and nearest eternity.

2. The Cradle Roll department is one of the best means of building the Sunday School and the vast numbers of infants reported by our Bureaus of Vital Statistics show this is a field that demands increased activity on our part.

3. I would urge further that each pastor co-operate with the local, district, or state organization of the NSSA. Much help and inspiration can be garnered from this group that has taken the lead in promoting the Sunday School as the evangelistic stronghold of the church.

TRANSPORTATION SECRETARY'S REPORT

About 34 years ago the Chicago and Milwaukee Railroad Officials granted J. F. Simpson, President of the Dakota Conference, an Annual pass, good in North Dakota, South Dakota, and Montana. Later it was extended to be good on the entire Milwaukee System.

This great consideration was through the influence and courtesy of our family physician, Dr. Owen King of Aberdeen, South Dakota, who was a friend of Mr. O. N. Hartstead, Chicago, Illinois.

Mr. Hartstead was the head Official of the Milwaukee Railroad.

It was not long until most of the other Railroads operating in the Dakota Conference followed this example and issued Annual passes to Conference Officials.

These passes have been renewed for thirty-four years.

When Mr. Hartstead sent the first pass he added these words, "We hope that you will have much use of it."

Mr. Hartstead's wish has come true. At a conservative figure, over a million miles have been traveled during this time on free transportation. This would be a saving of \$30,000.00 to \$40,000.00.

Your Transportation Secretary has been able to secure passes in addition to the one Mr. Hartstead sent him.

It has been possible to secure passes for some Conference Officials and some Denominational Officials, for over 30 years.

It is difficult to get facts and figures on the total miles traveled and the saving that has come to our church through the courtesy of the Railroads.

With praise to God and deep respect and appreciation to those who have helped so graciously, we press on, knowing that God can set before His people an open door that no man can shut.

It is very important that we never forget to rely upon Him to make a way when there is no way and to know how to show courtesy and gratitude to those who have befriended us.

REPORT OF VACANCIES COMMITTEE

We, your committee on Vacancies, beg to submit the following report:

About Sept. 1 we were informed that Rev. Thomas Bailie, Treasurer of the Ministerial Relief Fund, and Blue Cross, was leaving the Conference, thus leaving a vacancy in these positions. We at once consulted Brother Bailie both as to the vacancy and as to his wish for a successor. Brother Bailie confirmed the fact of the vacancy, and also suggested Rev. Paul Davidson as his successor. In due process of election by correspondence Rev. Paul Davidson was elected, and on September 14, 1956, accepted the position, and has been serving faithfully in that position. On June 7 we were informed of the vacancies in the Conference Auditing Comimttee. Rev. R. J. Sausoman and Rev. Wesley McIntyre were elected to this vacancy, and have been serving since.

STANDING RULES

1. Annual Conference $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ Fund—Financial Plan for Conference Work: Money for Conference work shall be obtained by each local Church paying an amount equal to $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all monies raised for all purposes, this to include local treasury, Sunday School, W. M. S., W. Y., and Y. M. W. B., with the exception of finance for building and repairs. One-third of this fund shall be used for Church Extension within the bounds of the Dakota Conference, and the balance, two-thirds, shall constitute the regular Conference Fund. This amount is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer once a month.

2. Railroad Expense: The amount of the Railroad Expense Assessment this year is \$11,50 and it is recommended that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer as soon as possible. The Committee shall reimburse the pastors for railroad expense on the basis of four cents a mile, one way, for distance traveled.

The Committee in securing the amount of assessment for each Church shall take the cost of carfare of the pastors present, and eligible for such expense, added to any deficit from the previous year; the result divided by the total number of churches, shall determine the assessment each year for this item. Only those pastors whose Churches have paid the assessment for the previous year shall be eligible to receive carfare.

3. Camp Meeting Board: The Conference W. M. S. President, the Conference W. Y. President and the Pastor of the Aberdeen Church shall be members of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of office.

4. The Local Church File is to be left with the Church by the outgoing Pastor, so that the incoming Pastor will have immediate access to the data contained therein upon his arrival on the field. This file is to be open for inspection to members of the local church.

5. **Budgets:** All churches will be instructed at the beginning and again at the close of the Conference year regarding their obligations to the Conference relative to Budget askings, and the amount due on Budget.

6. Officer's Terms: All officers shall hold office until the close of the Conference session in which they are retired.

7. Honorarium Treasurer: The Conference Treasurer shall be paid an honorarium of \$150.00 each year.

8. Honorarium Secretary: The Conference Secretary shall be paid an honorarium of \$50.00 each year.

9. **Regarding Ordination**: No person shall receive ordination in the future in the Dakota Conference who does not intend to engage in definite Christian work.

10. The Auditing Committee shall be one of the Standing Committees.

11. Instructions to Treasurers: The Treasurers of the various Conference funds shall hold such funds in some bank that is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in the name of the Dakota Conference, and checks drawn on such account shall be signed by the treasurer, as treasurer of said fund.

(a) Each treasurer shall have in hand, bank statements at the beginning and at the close of the Conference year involved, and said bank statement shall be submitted with the Treasurer's account book to the Auditing Committee of the Conference at the Annual Conference session, on the first day of the session.

(b) Duplicate receipts, or records, other than the treasurer's account book, with source, date and donor of all receipts shall be submitted to the Auditing Committee with said treasurer's books.

(c) All disbursements from said funds shall be paid by check, and all cancelled checks shall be submitted with the treasurer's books to the Auditing Committee.

12. Pioneer Pastors' Funds: An assessment of one dollar (\$1.00) per year shall be raised from each member of each charge and sent to the Conference Treasurer, the monies thus raised to constitute the Pioneer Pastor's Fund. This money shall be disbursed to no more charges than can adequately be cared for by the money which shall come in.

The Pastor receiving aid from this fund shall send a monthly statement of monies received from the charge and from secular work by the Pastor, said statement to be sent to the Conference Treasurer. The Conference Treasurer on receipt of said statement shall send a check to make up any deficit in salary, as agreed previously by the Missionary Board and the Pastor.

At any time the Missionary Board feels that the local Church receiving help from the fund, fails in its obligations, the contract shall be terminated by the Missionary Board.

13. Closing Date of Conference Fiscal Year: Closing date shall be April 30.

14. Financing of Printing of Minutes: The Secretary shall send a statement to each charge as to the amount they are to pay for printing of the Minutes, the amount to be based on the number of members on each charge.

15. Each Pastor Shall Receive His Salary from the Church he has served the past year, for the two Sundays of Conference and Camp Meeting.

16. Change of Pastors—Moving Expenses: We recommend that when a Church makes a change of Pastors that said Church enter into an agreement with the incoming Pastor establishing an equitable way of financing the Pastor's moving expenses.

17. Vacation for President: We recommend that the Conference Pres-

ident be granted a two-weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

18. Vacation for Pastor—We recommend that the Pastor be granted a two-weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

19. Ministerial Benefit Fund—Purpose: To provide financial assistance for Conference Elders and preachers in times of serious illness, or death, in their families.

All members and licentiates shall become members upon payment of first assessment, but no one shall be eligible to receive benefits until four consecutive assessments have been paid.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall make four assessments per year, or more if emergencies arise, in the following manner: Each minister on the Conference Roll shall be assessed \$1.50 on due notice from the Secretary, except when both husbands and wives are preachers. In such cases only one is assessed. Each pastor shall collect \$1.50 from his Church or charge each time an assessment is made, except ministers not serving in the Conference as Pastors. These are to pay \$2.00 for each assessment.

Disbursements: The Secretary shall upon the receipt of the worthiness of the case, pay out of the treasury 50% of the amount of the actual expense provided that the expense is more than twenty dollars, and further provided that no payment shall exceed seventy-five dollars to any one family during one Conference year, possible exceptions being made in extreme cases with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ministerial Benefit Fund. (Normal maternity cases excepted.)

Members delinquent in the last two payments prior to claim for help, shall be ineligible. In case one is delinquent in two, or more, payments, no benefits will be paid in emergencies by paying of delinquent payments. If assessment is paid by check, include a service charge, to the amount of the check.

In case of death a maximum of \$100.00 will be paid the beneficiaries. The assessment in such case shall be one dollar for pastor, and one dollar for Church, and \$1.50 for all others.

In case the Secretary-Treasurer is in doubt as to the worthiness of a case, he shall advise with the Conference President.

Postage and necessary expense shall be deducted from the fund.

20. Opening Date of Conference: shall be the first Tuesday after the second Monday of June of each year. (Camp Meeting shall begin on the Thursday preceding Conference.)

21. Conference Work—All monies sent in under the $7\frac{1}{2}$ % fund shall be counted as Conference Work on the Statistical blanks, and monies sent in for the Pioneer Pastor's Fund shall be counted as Conference Missions on the blanks.

22. Standing Committee Records: Each Conference Standing Com-

mittee shall have a book of records, and shall be prepared to report to Conference all work done by their Committee.

23. Member of Missionary Board: The Conference Treasurer shall be a member of the Missionary Board by virtue of office.

24. Committee Members Travel Expense: All members of all Committees doing Conference work shall have their travel expenses paid from the Conference Treasury.

25. Closing Date for Treasurers: All treasurers of the various funds of the Conference are instructed to close their books on the 15th day of May each year.

26. Committee Chairmen and Personnel: The Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, the Chairman of the Committee on Railroad Expense, and the entire Statistical Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference a year in advance and their names to appear with the list of Standing Committees.

27. Church Responsibility: Each Church shall be responsible to the Pastor, and each Pastor shall be responsible to the Church to which he was appointed at the last session of Conference, and which Church he has served for the preceding Conference year; this responsibility to be inclusive of the first Sunday after the close of Conference and Camp Meeting.

28. Superannuate Pension Fund: Monies sent in by the Churches on the budget item of Superannuate Pension Fund (\$1.50 per member), is to be sent to the Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer of the Conference.

29. Aid to Churches: All pastors receiving aid from the Conference, whether the funds come from the Conference Treasurer, Advisory Board, Beckman Board, or Pioneer Pastor's Fund, shall send a monthly statement of monies received—1st, from the Charge, and 2nd, from secular work. This report to be sent to the Conference Treasurer, also this information to be included in the regular quarterly report to the Conference President. That these reports be kept for the Missionary Board to study. We recommend that each pastor who receives Conference aid meet with the Missionary Board at the time of his appointment. That where a church is unable to give a pastor a living wage, that the matter be studied by the Stewards and Pastor and there be given time for secular employment to supplement the salary. We further recommend that any church that receives Conference aid for two consecutive years and does not show a gain in at least some department that the case be studied by the Missionary Board.

30. Agreement Between Conference and Willie Beckman Estate: "The following land is deeded to the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church on the agreement mentioned below: S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ North half of 28, all of section 21, and S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ of 9, all in township 18, range 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota."

1. That O. Theo. Beckman be appointed supervisor to rent and subrent such land.

2. That the land be not sold without the approval of O. Theo. Beckman.

3. That Rev. J. F. Simpson and his Advisory Board be a Committee to receive and disburse 50% of the receipts of the crop for Church Extension.

4. That when J. F. Simpson ceases to be President of the Conference that the Committee to receive and disburse the amount for Church Extension as mentioned in paragraph 3, be Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. William Ward, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. R. J. Sausoman.

5. When the land is sold, it is requested that Miltonvale Wesleyan College, the Indian Work and the Philippine work sponsored by the Conference, be given proper consideration.

6. It is requested that the following persons be a Committee to disburse the money from the sale of the land: Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. William Ward, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. John Kearns, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, Rev. Kenneth Shelley.

7. That the Committee mentioned in paragraph 6 be empowered to fill vacancies made by death or other causes, of any of the Committee.

8. It is requested that this agreement become a part of the Standing Rules of the Conference, and printed accordingly in the Conference Minutes.

9. In case O. Theo. Beckman, the land Supervisor, is deceased before the land is sold, that the Committee mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7 be empowered to transact all business relative to the land mentioned in this agreement.

Items of Vital Importance

Information Regarding the Beckman Board: A Board was created in June, 1949, to be known as the Beckman Board, this Board to manage and operate the Beckman properties. This Board is composed of the following persons: J. F. Simpson, L. D. Harris, William Ward, Mrs. L. J. Leyh, Arthur Reisdorph, John Kearns, R. J. Sausoman, O. Theo. Beckman, Kenneth Shelley. This Board is self-perpetuating and shall appoint any vacancies that shall occur through death or other causes. This Board shall have complete control over the properties received through transfers of Willie E. Beckman or O. Theo. Beckman, as Executor of the last will and testament of Willie E. Beckman, deceased. This Board shall retain such portion of income as necessary to meet its expenses in operating and keeping the property in good repair, including a separate reserve to insure sufficient operating funds. That the funds shall be disbursed in accordance with the agreement heretofore entered into between Willie E. Beckman and the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. That in accordance with the wishes of Willie E. Beckman that O. Theo. Beckman continue as supervisor of the Beckman properties.

31. The signers for the legal documents for said Dakota Conference, shall be the President and Secretary of said Corporation, or its Trustees.

32. Pastor to Receive Salary When Attending Youth Camp: Each Pastor shall receive his salary for one week, including Sunday, each year, during his attendance at Youth Camp.

33. Ministers Reporting: Ministers who do not report to the Annual Conference, and those who do not present a satisfactory report—the character of these can be passed only by Conference Action.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

On June 7, 1952, the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, voted to amend their articles of Incorporation, as follows:

1. That the Dakota Conference Missionary Board, be the Board of Managers for said Dakota Conference; it has the power of attorney to transact all legal business for said Conference, in keeping with the Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in the interim of the Annual Conference.

2. The signers for the legal documents for said Conference, shall be the President and Secretary of said corporation, or its trustees.

3. That the Beckman Board of the Dakota Conference, be known as the directors of the Beckman estate, with power to transact all legal business in the estate, in keeping with the provision of the Will of Willie E. Beckman.

4. When said Board of Directors shall sell a part, or all of the land in the Beckman Estate, or when the leasing of the land for oil, or the sale of mineral or gas right, or royalties be made, that the President and the Secretary of said Conference, or its Trustees, are empowered to sign any legal papers, leases, deeds, and contracts of all kinds.

1). The said Beckman Board of Directors has power to sell any, or all of the land, hereinafter described, and that the President and Secretary, shall have power to execute such conveyances. Said land being described as follows, to-wit: S. W. ¼ North half of 28, all of Section 21, and the S. W. ¼ of 9, all in Township 18, Ranges 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.

2). That said Beckman Board of Directors is self-perpetuating and the remaining members shall fill any vacancies which shall occur through death or other causes.

We, the Plan of Work Committee, wish to submit the following as outlined by the General and Annual Conference:

- l' 1. Arrange with pastor for one missionary prayer service each month.
- 2. A minimum of 10 meetings to be held during the year, at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted, and at least one public meeting.
 - 3. Recognizing the power of prayer, let us diligently observe the following:
 - A. The formation of Prayer Partner Circles in each Society with a Prayer Partner Secretary, who shall send a report to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary within 60 days after adjournment of the Annual Conference.
 - / b. The observance of a Prayer and Fast Day by each society once a month according to the plan of the Prayer Partner Secretary.
 - c. Cooperation in the World Day of Prayer services under the direction of the District Chairman.
 - 4. a. The President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of 75% of the active membership be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary.
 - b. A Magazine Solicitor to be elected who will faithfully endeavor to obtain all renewals and will gain at least two new subscripscriptions, reporting the same to the Conference Magazine Solicitor, according to the plan of said Solicitor.

- $^{{\rm C}}$ 5. a. Each Society to be represented in Annual Conference by the new President and Delegate.
 - b. Delegate to be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference session, same to be divided equally as decided at the Conference Session.
 - c. Statistical Report Blanks be filled out on time and send one copy to Mrs. Fern Davidson, Watford City, N. Dak. by May 15.
 - 6. a. All monies received as dues be sent to Conference Treasurer designating where 50% of same be applied on missions.
 - b. All monies and vouchers be sent to Conference Treasurer only at close of each quarter, unless otherwise specified, and final quarterly remittances not later than May 5th, using blanks sent out by Conference Treasurer.
- \bigcirc 7. Every woman in the church a member of the Society or a 10% gain in total membership.
 - 8. Standing rules to be observed are as follows:
 - a. An amount equal to 7½% of all monies raised, except funds for building and repairs and dues, be paid for Conference work.
 - b. \$10.00 per society be paid for Home Missions. This may apply on budget.
 - *c. \$5.00 per society be paid Hephzibah Orphanage. This may apply on budget.
 - d. 15¢ per member be paid for Conference expense fund.
 - $_{\bigcirc}$ e. Each Society to sponsor a Work Project throughout the year, bringing the same to the conference session to be displayed.
 - f. 25¢ per active member be paid for a General Administrative Fund. Not to apply on budget.
 - g. \$3.00 or more per society be paid to the Medical Student Fund. Not to apply on budget.
- 9. a. \$1.25 per member be paid toward the support of Alma Aldinger, our Conference Missionary. This may apply on budget.
 - \mathcal{O} b. Stress the use of the Card Call Plan. Not to apply on budget.
 - c. Cooperation as far as possible in meeting the "25¢ per member a month" requested for the new Headquarters Building, using Thank Offering jars for same to be opened quarterly.
 - d. Use of Pre-Easter Delf Denial Folders, said money to be used as directed at that time.
- \mathcal{A} 10. This efficiency standard to be read in the society at least twice a year.
 - 4% credit for each of the 25 items. Total 100%. Honor Roll 80% We recommend the following:
 - 1. That the Resolutions and Goals Reports be read before the society upon receipt of the new minutes.
 - 2. That we urge the use of "In Memoriam" folders.

- 3. That local societies inquire into the needs of Home Mission stations and Orphanage before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same, that such boxes be reported merely as to the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate and fill out receipt for same. This receipt to be sent to missionaries for their signature, after which it should be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer for proper receipting.
- 4. That gift subscriptions to the Magazine be encouraged.
- 5. That our Prayer Partners be remembered by letters and gifts.
- 6. That our local societies make bandages, and, unless otherwise directed through the Magazine, forward them to the Foreign Office, Fairmount, Indiana, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported.
- That we promote the use of the Study Book, Program Calendars, and other helps, and also the Missionary Reading Course, sending the final report for same to Mrs. Elva Beckman, Prairie City, S. Dak., by February 1.
- 8. That each Society send jelly and canned goods to camp.
- 9. That our pastors be given at least two grocery showers a year.
- 10. That we remember often in prayer:
 - a. The Sioux Indian Chapel in Rapid City.
 - b. Our work in the Philippines.
 - c. Missionaries who have gone from our Conference.
 - d. Dakota Conference youth preparing for Christian work.
 - e. The need of consecrated laity answering God's call to assist in new fields.
 - f. Our younger societies.
- 11. Concerning finances:
 - a. That a Missionary Offering be taken at the monthly prayer meeting.
 - b. That we continue the use of the dime strips for the Mission Equipment Fund. Does not apply on budget.
