STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and li-

cense attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elder's Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.

21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the first Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the charge to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

REPORTS

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the 109th Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference here assembled, greetings in the name of Him who exhorts us: "Take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and so that day come upon you unawares . . . Watch ye, therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things about to come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man." (Luke 21:34-36).

In the good providence of God it is our honored privilege to meet again upon this sacred hill-top to care for the work entrusted to our care by the churches of the Conference and by the purposeful providences of God. The immediacy and urgency of this hour make it imperative that we, as ministers and delegates of the Allegheny Annual Conference here assembled, be "workers together with God" to solve the problems which confront us by the aid of the Holy Spirit in a manner to exemplify that holiness of heart and life which the Church has always advocated.

The closing year has been one of many tests, varied experiences, numerous activities and many complexities. The new English Church was gutted by fire and they had to worship for a time in the home of the pastor which was a tremendous task with over a hundred in Sunday School. This was quite a blow to this new church but they were helped greatly by the Lord and came out of the experience stronger in faith. The Loyal Oak Church was forced to vacate their building in the middle of the year with no other place to go except in the basement of the pastor's home. They have nobly worked to keep their Sunday School growing and to keep the Church group together. They are looking forward to their new Church building. On account of the War restrictions Barberton and Akron Grace were forced to cancel their building programs. The West Virginia Camp Meeting came to a sudden end about 2 A.M. on a Tuesday morning on account of the flood which covered the camp grounds. This necessitated the selling of the present camp site and giving up the campmeeting until suitable grounds can be located. In spite of the curtailment of materials, Massillon, Franklin and Wolf Summit were able to complete their fine, new church buildings. Considerable remodeling has been done in several other churches. The newly remodelled Hillsdale Church caught on fire and spoiled all that had so recently been accomplished. But the folk met the loss with courage and faith in God and now all is again restored. The Meadville Church secured a new parsonage near the Church. Good progress is being made in the basement building at Alliance, Ohio. A group is being slowly gathered which we hope will eventually become a fine church in this city. The new work at Warren, Ohio, has made surprisingly good progress in obtaining a fine group of people and in putting up a commodious building. The new work at Cabin Run, W.

Va., made wonderful progress and they expect to put up their new building this summer. In many places throughout the Conference there have been excellent, heart-warming advances and scenes of revival fervor while in others the spiritual advancement has been very disappointing. However, we do heartily thank God for every degree of advance that has been made, for our faithful, noble, consecrated, loyal band of laymen who have so nobly stood by the work, for our faithful, spiritual, sacrificing band of preachers who have, we believe, "Earnestly contended for the faith" in the face of a growing apostasy, for the excellent Ministerial Institute, for the splendid camp meetings, for every victory, for the increased interest in prayer and fasting in many quarters and for the increase of spiritual fervency in other places.

As to what lies ahead we are uncertain—religious awakening, revival, the coming of Christ, or judgment. Nevertheless, we do know that we are living in crucial days—an hour of supreme peril. The crisis has not lessened. Nations are being rocked to their foundations by devastating wars, by strange ideologies that distort the minds of men and modes of life, and by moral declension almost unparalleled in history. Our world totters on the rim of total destruction. A slight nudge and the dogs of war will let loose a wave of annihilation which will wipe out whole nations. These are not the words of visionary religionists but of sober, calculating scientists—men who are directing the work on the atomic and hydrogen bombs. As a result people everywhere are bewildered, frustrated, disillusioned, confused, unsettled, disappointed and they are asking hundreds of questions; such as, what lies ahead? Whither are we bound? What is to be the next act in the great human drama? Men know not which way to turn. No statesman, no military genius, no parliament, no congress, no legislation on the face of the earth knows the way out to a real, lasting peace.

Besides, our own beloved nation stands in the greatest peril since the war between the states. The national scene is an enigma of uncertainty. Never in history has America been called upon to assume such important duties to the world at large and to give such great leadership as at the present time, but America finds herself faced with a weak, hesitating, uncertain leadership. She seems to be more bent on pleasure and thrills than on preparing herself for world leadership. Recently Roger Babson had this to say: "The national and international drift is toward disaster. I am not a chronic alarmist, but I sincerely believe the handwriting is on the wall—America is being weighed in God's balances and we are found wanting. We face four immediate dangers: (1) **A third World War**—the mad armament race continues with ever-increasing tempo—with weapons that could destroy us all. (2) **An economic downfall of the nations allied against Communism.** The whole Western World is begging for more dollars—the barrel is almost empty—when it is empty—what then? (3) **A moral Collapse**—the recent investigations by congressional committees only scratch the surface of immorality in high places—we are breaking apart from the inside. (4) **The judgment of God**—no nation has ever been guilty of the sins of America and escaped—our nation is now ripe—watch out! God cannot be trifled with."

Furthermore, the Church is facing what is perhaps her most serious struggle in her history. For "the foe is not the ancient enemy whom she

has always known—the devils' hatred manifested by the world; the enemy is one that is leavening the professing Church from within—the devil's hatred operating by means of traitors who call themselves Christian, apostates within the visible church. The battle is waged around the citadel and not from afar. It is the leadership of Christendom that is causing, in great part, the true Church her fiery trials today. In places of responsibility, in prominent pulpits, in chairs of the seminaries, and on the printed page, men who have been 'ordained' as ministers of Jesus Christ, considering themselves to be too far advanced in intellectual attainment, too scientific and too wise to believe the Bible, are attacking the truths of the Scriptures, 'the faith once delivered to the saints', and causing the ship-wreck in many lives."

As a result of this apostate teaching, bold, brazen unbelief and skepticism are meeting us at every turn. A social gospel has sprung up and is being substituted for the personal, evangelistic, individualistic and redemptive message. A change is taking place in our evangelism. Christ and the Cross are still being featured but it is not the Christ of the Book nor the "Old Rugged Cross." It is a new one which lets old Adam live his life; motivation is not changed; he still lives for his own pleasure. The accent is still on enjoyment and entertainment. It redirects the sinner. It steers him into a cleaner and jollier life but it is not the life of God. Dr. Thomas says: "A popular holiness is now coming to the front which says the same things that the old holiness leaders stood for but it seems to mean a different thing. It preaches a holiness that has little or no offense of the cross about it. It does not reprove pride so much as it tries to quiet men's fears and to provide a teaching that soothes rather than disturbs. It makes grand claims but stands for little. The followers of the new holiness lightly profess to be saved and sanctified wholly, but follow the world's fashions in dress, in speech, and in amusements. Programs and talent have crowded out prayer and humility. Psychology supplants Pentecostal zeal and a whipped-up party spirit takes the place of holy compassion for the lost."

Consequently, respect for the Word of God is disappearing in so-called Christian circles. Love for the Bible and obedience to its plain precepts is often no longer deemed essential either in pastor or flock. The Word of God is not popular; it is no longer the attraction which draws people together as it used to be. Because so-called Christians today evince little hunger for the Bible, preachers are resorting to other attractions—the skating rink, the religious movies, drama, plays, magic, etc. These are taking the place of Bible Study and the prayermeeting. Dr. A. S. London said, "A leading minister in a southern city gives over his Sunday evening services to the youth who have their games, dances, and such like, all in the name of a social gospel. It is my candid opinion that such a church program will do more to curse its youth than many outside influences."

The Apostle prophesied that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, truce-breakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, traitors, heady, high-minded, lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God . . ." 2 Tim. 3:1-4). So in this pleasure-mad age when entertainment and amusement is at its apex, we need not be surprised to

find the craze for this infiltrating into the visible church. Even in so-called fundamental circles in order to attract crowds the Word of God is handled lightly, the solemn message of the cross is proclaimed in a jocular spirit and holy things are treated with irreverence in many places. It is a tragic thing when ministers of the Gospel engage in worldly antics and irreverent jestings to draw the crowds and to be popular. Is this not offering strange fire to the Lord? Let's steer clear of this entertainment program. A day of judgment is coming for America and the world, and it may be closer than we know. It is no time for mirth and foolishness.

We are engaged in a gigantic struggle. We face a tremendous challenge. Church History shows that preachers go into apostasy quicker than the masses of the laity. Those who know lay the blame for the world's present condition and the Church's apostasy at the feet of the ministry. Dr. G. W. Ridout, sometime ago in THE HERALD, said: "The Christian pulpit is largely to blame for the moral sag that is on us because when the pulpit is vital and preaches a vital gospel, hurls thunderbolts of truth at iniquity; uncovers sin and brings the artillery of heaven to bear upon the wicked; cries out against wrong no matter by whom perpetrated, it becomes a great and mighty factor for righteousness in the community and the nation. On the other hand when the pulpit trims to suit the crowd, when the preacher seeks popularity more than righteousness, when the pulpit becomes recreant of its great trust and becomes a castle for moral cowards the nation suffers as a consequence. Some pulpits of today are filled with careful, cautious and time-serving men. Many of the big pulpits are filled by unbelievers, skeptics, critics, unitarians—men who have lost their faith and taken up intellect, they have given up the gospel and taken up novelties; they have long since lost the Holy Ghost and are following other ghosts. In America there are over two hundred thousand Protestant pulpits. A vast number of them raise no cry against the sins of the day and they exhibit no more influence and power in raising the moral tone of the nation than if they did not exist at all."

Beloved, our Wesleyan Methodist Church has the message for this hour—a crucified, buried and risen Christ. He alone is able to change men and conditions. Let us go out in this faith and in the power of the Holy Spirit as did the early Church to proclaim a risen Christ to a world that has lost its way. We have been on the defensive long enough. Let's get on the offensive! The early Christians could have surrendered their convictions and their faith, and softened their message—but the cause would have been lost! To be sure they were in the minority, were few in number and were limited in material resources but they were a faithful, God-centered, God-directed, God-empowered minority who were so consecrated to the one task of winning souls that they went out on the offensive and soaked the arena sands with their blood—but the cause lived! Brethren, if we compromise with our world today, we can measure our spiritual decay and defeat by our success in adaptation. But if we remain different from our world, our spiritual success will be in direct proportion to our failure to adapt.

Throughout the year we have continued in the work assigned to us by the last Annual Conference. To the best of our knowledge and ability, through much fasting and prayer, we have sought the guidance of the Holy Spirit in every action taken. Following is a report of our actions.

emphasize soul winning and to labor to bring them into the church;

14. To emphasize in all our work the doctrine of entire sanctification in an effort to lead the people into this blessed experience;

15. To encourage the maintenance of the family altar in every Wesleyan home in Allegheny Conference as a means of bringing our people to a better spiritual state and our families to Christ;

16. To encourage an active program of personal evangelism for every believer.

CONCLUSION: As we bring this report to a close we wish to thank each one for his splendid co-operation, for the many who have prayed for us, for the many kindnesses which have been shown us and for the way you have loyally stood back of us. As we go into another Conference Year, let us in this crucial, climactic hour rise up and accept the challenge and go out with the help of the Holy Spirit to follow Christ in bringing lost men and women to the great loving heart of God! **The time for action is NOW! The time for a revival is NOW! The time for a mighty crusade is NOW!** In this end time let us heed the admonition of the great Apostle who said, "And this I do say, brothers; the margin of time left before the Second Coming is very narrow . . . live a life of peace, not of wrangling" (1 Cor. 7:29, 15, Way).

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and Recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$2.00; Pension, \$1.25; Home Missions, \$1.25; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25; Administrative Budget, \$.40; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.15; Australia, \$.25; (These assessments are per church member per year.)

2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference Work) shall be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly.)

THE ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE

3. Conference Group Life Insurance; \$.35 per member.
4. Conference Entertainment, \$.35 per member.
5. The Pioneer self-denial envelopes for remittances of \$.25 or more monthly (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.
6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.
7. The pastor or person responsible for the sale of Conference Minutes in the local church, shall remit \$.50 per copy to the Chairman of the Committee on the sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31. The chairman of said Committee may mail statements to all who have not paid for their minutes by March 31, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30.
8. The above financial items, with the exception of those mentioned in Paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District-Sub-Treasurers. Church treasurers are to make monthly remittances to the credit of Conference work, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.
9. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceeding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offering of the month to Conference Missions for the use of churches not self supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
2. Sunday School Birthday Offerings to Conference Missions.
3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.10 per Sunday School member.

 - E. \$100.00 annually for vacation purposes.
2. To Mrs. H. C. Van Wormer for secretarial services to the Conference President, \$10.00 per week.
3. The expenses of the Sunday School Secretary to the National Sunday School Convention annually and the expenses of any others whom the Conference may elect to represent the Conference at other bodies, such as was done this year regarding the N. A. E.
4. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services: The necessary amount to bring the offering for the Secretary to \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$125.00; each Sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia Sub-treasurer, \$25.00; Group In-

insurance Secretary-Treasurer, \$25.00; Conference Pension Plan Treasurer, \$25.00; Superintendent of rooms for services at Conference, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$15.00; Aid Treasurer, \$25.00; he shall also pay the above and all other members of Conference Boards of committees an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of their duties in connection with their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.

5. The sum of \$35.00 monthly to Ada Dishong from the Assistance Fund.

6. The sum of \$25.00 monthly to Mildred Barris to aid in the cost of special medical treatment from Assistance Fund.

7. To the Supt. of Camp Grounds, the cost of preparing and maintaining the Camp Grounds for the Annual Sessions of Conference.

3. The Superintendent of the Dining Hall shall receive \$110.00 for his services, plus \$100.00 for telephone, postage, and traveling expenses. Same to be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund.

4. The Conference President may, by previous arrangement, meet the Board of Stewards or Finance Committee of each local church in the course of his Quarterly Meetings Schedule, for the purpose of discussing the church's financial needs or abilities, and making suggestions as would tend to expedite the financial program of the church.

5. The Conference Tithing Secretary be authorized to draw on the Conference Treasury to the amount of \$25.00 annually for the supply and distribution of tithing literature among the churches.

6. That the word "New" be dropped from the term "New Aid Fund."

7. The deficit of \$37.99 in the report of the Pension Plan Treasurer be paid from the Conference Budget.

8. The Miscellaneous fund, which has heretofore been fed by 1% on the Conference Budget, be discontinued, since those items paid by this fund can as easily be paid from the Conference Budget.

9. The Conference President select some one or more persons to prepare articles for the Conference Messenger, to be published each month if feasible, which will be an aid in keeping our pastors and church constituencies alerted to the importance of paying their budgets in full.

10. A source of income for the Ministers' Aid Fund will be provided as follows: When payments are made on loans from Conference funds and said payments are placed in the Church Aid Fund, 10% of said payments shall be diverted to the Ministers' Aid Fund.

June 8, 1951. The Conference President called a meeting of the Board in the office on the Camp Grounds. Five members were present and, after prayer, transacted the following business:

Voted to authorize the Treasurer to pay the moving expense of Harry Stephenson from Greenfield to Beaver Falls.

Voted to pay the moving expense of Dale Holley if he takes over the work at Keyser, W. Va.

By vote, placed the Pioneer Secretary's salary at \$60.00 per week with \$500.00 per year traveling allowance and telephone expense.

Voted to place the following churches under the supervision of the Pioneer Secretary: Niles, Robertsville, Hillville, Cottage Hill, Hampe Memorial, Blue Eye, Harbor, Hadley, Van Port, Riverview, and Luciusboro.

August 21, 1951. A joint meeting of the Mission Board, the President's Advisory Board, and the Pioneer Secretary was called by the President in the Office on the Camp Grounds with four members of the Mission Board present. After prayer transacted business as follows:

Motion made and carried that the Keyser, W. Va., work be loaned \$1000.00 toward the building of a House of Worship.

August 22, 1951. A joint meeting of the Mission Board, the Advisory Board, and the Board of Trustees was called by the Conference President in the office on the Camp Grounds. Members of all boards present excepting the secretary of the Mission Board. Clyde Blair appointed Secretary Pro Tem. Delmar Kaufman called into the meeting to discuss the situation at Warren, Ohio. Plans for a building were presented by Delmar Kaufman.

Motion made and carried that a loan be made to this work, from the Pioneer Fund, for the purpose of buying a lot in Warren and to proceed with the building of a tabernacle, provided they can meet the requirements of the State Building Code. The lot to be deeded to the Conference. Delmar Kaufman authorized to investigate the attitude of the local community.

December 1, 1951. By correspondence. The Mission Board approved the acceptance of the resignation of Guy Terpe from the oversight of the work and the erection of the building at Alliance and the transfer of the Pioneer Secretary there for such supervision as soon as possible.

April 30, 1952. The Conference Mission Board met at the home of the Conference President, the Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, in his home in Titusvill, Pa., at his request. All members present together with the Conference

Vice President, the Rev. T. A. Robertson, who had been requested to be present. After prayer business was transacted as follows:

The Conference President informed the Board of the intention of the Pioneer Secretary, the Rev. T. W. Comadoll, to return to a pastorate and then carefully laid the present needs of the Pioneer Field before them that this might be given careful consideration before nominating a Pioneer Secretary.

Voted that the Mission Board recommend that the Conference Trustees purchase the two lots, now leased by the Conference, at Jamestown, Pa., with Conference Mission Funds, for the sum of \$400.00.

Motion made and carried, that no individual start any new work, looking forward to a new Wesleyan Methodist Church, without the sanction of the Conference President and his Advisory Board and that all such work be under the immediate supervision of the Pioneer Secretary and the Mission Board.

The Board voted to ratify the action of the Conference Board of Trustees in using \$5943.60 from Conference Mission Funds in purchasing materials for the construction of a church building at Alliance, Ohio.

Voted that the Van Wormers be reimbursed for serving dinner to the members of the Board in the sum of \$6.00.

June 4, 1952. The Conference Mission Board met in the Camp Office with the following members present: H. C. Van Wormer, H. E. Robertson, Clyde Blair, Donald S. Clair and Chas. C. Cross. After prayer by Donald St. Clair transacted the following business:

Voted to divide the Sunday afternoon Pioneer offering between Loyal Oak and the Evangelization Program in West Virginia.

Voted to place in nomination the names of T. W. Comadoll and C. R. McPherson for the office of Pioneer Secretary.

June 5, 1952. The Conference Mission Board met in the Camp office with the following members present: H. C. Van Wormer, H. E. Robertson, Clyde Blair, Donald St. Clair, and Chas. C. Cross, and voted that the following recommendations be presented to the Conference:

Since reviewing the matter of the Pioneer Secretary, as instructed by the body, and in consideration of the present Pioneer Secretary's state of health, the Mission Board recommends the nomination of C. R. McPherson to this office, with a view to the evangelization of the West Virginia territory now under consideration.

REPORT NO. 7

ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE MINISTERIAL INSTITUTE

The Allegheny Annual Conference Ministerial Institute Committee met on the Stoneboro Camp Grounds on August 21, 1951 to formulate plans for the Institute of 1952, with the President presiding. In the absence of the Secretary, the Rev. T. W. Comadoll was elected Secretary Pro Tem and the following arrangements agreed upon:

That, the Rev. H. Robb French be the evening speaker.

That, Dr. S. I. McMillen, M.D. be engaged to speak on Thursday evening and that Dr. Claude Ries be engaged for the period of the Institute for Bible teaching and other phases of helpful truth.

On November 27, 1951, the Committee met in Franklin, Pa., with the President presiding and 5 of the 9 members present and the Rev. T. W. Comadoll again acting as Secretary Pro. Tem.

The partially prepared program was completed and the Rev. Raymond Kuhn elected Director of Music for the Institute.

When April 8th, the date set for the Institute arrived it found all the ministers and their wives who could possibly attend being received with a warm welcome by the Rev. W. G. Steele and the members of the Falconer Church. The gracious spirit of cordiality of this pastor and church and friends of the community will linger on in the minds of those who were privileged to be their guests. This cordial spirit of hospitality is not new to the Falconer Church and many of the senior members of the Conference will remember, with happy reflections, the Annual Conference Sessions and Conventions in the yesteryears that were made happy privileges by the cordial Christian hospitality of this church.

Dr. Stephen W. Paine, President of Houghton College, had been engaged, when Dr. Claude Ries could not be present, and his messages on "Centrality of the Scriptures in the Christian Faith," "Centrality of the Scriptures in the Preaching of Holiness," "What the Layman Expects of his Pastor," and "Importance of the Family in the Growth of the Church," were addresses that warmed the hearts and stirred the minds of those in attendance and, I trust, budded out into fragrance and fruit in their service. Doctor McMillen's message on "The Bible as the Medical Guide Supreme" should linger on as a genuine mental and spiritual medicament for the servants of the Lord in these days of Hustle and Bustle and Crush and Rush and Nerve Tension. The messages of the Rev. H. Robb French were like Cap Sheaves to the Shocks of Grain garnered during the day. May they keep that Precious Grain of Spirit Anointed, Heaven Sent Wisdom where we can draw upon it for our own needs and for the sake of our service to others and to God in the days ahead.

The Institute Committee met following the evening service on April 8, and agreed upon the following:

Reimbursement for the entertainment of workers to the Rev. and Mrs. W. G. Steele—\$25.00 and to Rev. W. G. Steele for janitor work—\$15.00. To the Rev. H. Robb French for services in the Institute—\$125.00 and for travel allowance—\$50.00. To Dr. Stephen W. Paine for his services—\$50.00. And to Dr. S. I. McMillen for his Thursday evening address—\$15.00.

The regular annual business meeting of this, the sixth Ministerial In-

stitute, was held in the Falconer Church on April 10, when the following business was accomplished:

Voted to have another Institute in 1953, and to hold it on April 7, to 9, exclusive.

The cordial invitation of the Massillon Church to hold the next institute there was accepted by vote.

The Secretary Pro Tem was instructed to send greetings from the Institute to the following members who were ill: The Rev. Charles C. Cross, Mildred Barris, Sister Garvin, Sister Hetrick, Sister Yount, Sister Golden, and Sister Deeter.

Voted to limit letters of greetings to pastors and wives.

A motion to impose a charge of \$2.00 as a registration fee was lost in the "Nos" that followed.

Thus another Allegheny Annual Conference Ministerial Institute came and is now gone—unless we, the ministers of Allegheny Conference, have carried it on in our lives and in a burning passion to serve the Lord in that service that all other Christian service is a part of, saving men and women, boys and girls, by bringing them to Jesus who alone can transform their lives so they can live beyond and above SIN in such an age as this.

Your Committee earnestly solicits your prayers in having, beyond question, the Mind of the Spirit in the great task of preparing for another Institute.

6. That we recognize the petition of the Pleasant Hill Church and that said church will be known hereafter as the Pleasant View Church.
7. That the churches of the Canton Zone be permitted to act as a zone on the same basis as the 1949-1950 division.
8. That the New Castle District be permitted to be divided into zones according to the action taken at their last Holiness Convention.

REPORT NO. 9

THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

These are good qualifications for a good teacher. The Superintendent so often has to ask for just most any one to teach. They may be willing enough, but few are prepared. My firm conviction is that each Church should have a special department for training teachers. Then instead of training these students in everything else except Bible doctrine, they must have Bible taught so thoroughly that whether they teach children or whether they teach adults, they can use the Book. Men and women are trained and fitted for every other task in life, why not **TRAIN SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS?**

Through the conference year we have endeavored to keep in touch with the Sunday School and to remind each School of special efforts. Report blanks and other Sunday School material has been mailed to the pastors. We have visited some of the districts and a number of the churches in the interest of the Sunday School. Some of the Sunday Schools have done remarkably well, others have witnessed a number of their Sunday School scholars getting saved. While the Sunday School work presents peculiar difficulties yet it offers tremendous possibilities for every church.

REPORT NO. 10

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the 109th Annual Session of Allegheny Conference we bring greetings in the Name of Jesus our blessed Redeemer whom, we love, worship and serve.

This has been a year of progress and advancement in the pioneer Fields. Four new churches have been organized with a total of 82 members, 70 of this number being new Wesleyans and 12 transfers from other Wesleyan Churches. Two new works have been opened that as yet are not organized and other fields have been investigated that bid well to produce good so'ld churches in the coming years.

For the past two or three years we kept in touch with a family near Keyser, W. Va., who were interested in the opening of a spiritual work in their community. Several trips were made to their home and some time

spent in looking over the field. The burden for such a work began to take hold on the heart of Brother Dale Holley. We made one trip together to this field and later he and his wife paid a visit to the Reeves' home and looked over the field. Soon after last Conference he quit his job in the coal mine and made preparation to move to this field and start a work. The conference tent was moved to this community and plans were made to hold a tent meeting as soon as possible. As soon as we could after our return from General Conference we joined the Holleys in the services and continued the meeting over two Sundays. The Lord was present and His word took hold on hearts and good fruit was realized from the services. Under the wise and capable leadership of Bro. and Sr. Holley the work continued to prosper. On November 4, 1951, this group was formed into a regular Pioneer Organization and on March 17, 1952, it was organized into a full fledged Wesleyan Methodist church. They remodelled a shop building owned by Bro. Reeves for a temporary place of worship. It very nicely has served the purpose. Last fall an abandoned school building was purchased and plans are now under way to construct a church building this summer. An excellent plot of land has been given by an interested neighbor in the community. This gives us an opening in a part of our conference bounds hitherto untouched by our church. It likewise gives us a base from which to launch an expansion program in the future. This new church is to be known as the Cabin Run Wesleyan Methodist Church.

In the fall of 1950, a group of people from Hooversville, Pa., a small town about 15 miles from Johnstown attended a revival held in the Johnstown Church and were soundly converted. They soon became interested in establishing a Wesleyan Methodist church in their town and community. Rev. D. M. Stonebraker, the Johnstown pastor, likewise became interested in seeing this desire become a reality. An empty church building was located at the edge of the village and rented for a very nominal sum yearly. They started an afternoon and evening service. This newly converted group of people united with the Johnstown Church with the understanding that when and if a church was organized in Hooversville they would transfer their membership to it. Early in March, 1951, wife and I held a week of services with this new group at the close of which they were formed into a Pioneer group and received into the Conference as such. Last conference this new work was placed under the care and leadership of Rev. Frank Hicks as their pastor. He and his wife took the burden of this work on their hearts and good progress continued in every way. On Feb. 17, 1952, we had the pleasure of fully organizing this work. Brother Stonebraker was present for this glad occasion and had a time of rejoining as he transferred 9 members from his church in Johnstown as charter members of this new organization.

Evangelist, C. R. McPherson had brought word concerning a group of people at English, W. Va., which is within our conference bounds and who were likely prospects for a Wesleyan Methodist Church. Later we received word that this group had been organized by Rev. C. F. Smith, Vice-president of the Tennessee Conference. I was asked by the Conference President to contact Rev. D. P. Denton, the President of the Tennessee Conference, concerning this matter. On receipt of his letter I forwarded it to our Conference President who in turn contacted the General Board of Administration

about this situation, and their ruling was that it should remain a part of our conference. It became my delightful and happy privilege to make the first official contact with this group for our conference. We discovered the reason why Bro. Smith was asked to come and organize them was due to the fact that many years ago he held revival services in this place and they were well acquainted with him, and also due to the fact of their close proximity to the Tennessee conference they felt that there could be more close contact and flowship with the group there. We soon discovered however that they only desired to do that which was the right thing to do and so my message to them of the decision of the Board in Syracuse had no dampening effect in any way. The Conference President and I made a later trip and at this time they were officially made a part of our Conference. We held a weeks revival in late February, and early March at the close of which the Church was dedicated. The Conference President and his wife were there for this occasion. Their new Church building was partially destroyed by fire in December but by the time we arrived in February for the services, it was rebuilt a better building than before. This new work, like the one near Keyser, W. Va., opens to us a new part of our territory, and also provides a solid base for future expansion in this part of W. Va.

Rev. Kenneth Brown, a member of the Free Will Baptist Church, and well acquainted with the group at English soon united with them. He had previously held a tent meeting at Tazewell, Va., and was pastoring a group in this place. He soon persuaded this group to unite with the Wesleyan Methodist Church and it was his and their desire to become a part of our Conference. This group, however, was in North Carolina territory, but quite a distance from any of their churches. They are only 25 or 30 miles from the English Church and they felt that if they could be a part of the same conference it would be a help to them. This matter was taken up with our General Conference President, Rev. R. S. Nicholson, who in turn took it up with the N. C. Conference officials. They very generously agreed to let us have Tazewell County and organize this work as part of the Allegheny Conference, until the next session of our General Conference, when a final disposition to this matter will be made. We were authorized by the Conference President and his Advisory Board to proceed with the organization of this group which we did. They were organized on April 13, 1952, and officially received into our conference. Plans had been made for a building which at this time is well under way.

The territory around English, W. Va. opens to our conference one of the most fertile fields for new works that can be found anywhere. Before the organization of the Church at Tazewell you could go 50 miles in any direction without contacting a Holiness Church. Towns, villages and country side ripe and open for evangelization and new works. It isn't territory that has been highly worked with a message such as ours, but our message is vitally needed in these days of declension. Our opportunity in this field is **now**. Unless we advance and occupy it cannot be too long until some other Holiness group is going to see the vast opportunity and move in. In Rev. Kenneth Brown, we have a man well equipped with tent, loud speaking system, and other facilities, to evangelize in this region. He is also experienced in conducting such campaigns, and being a native of those parts has the confidence of the coun-

tryside for many miles in every direction. Brother McPherson is likewise quite well known in those parts. Immediate steps and plans should be considered by the proper officials to intersely evangelize this territory and conserve it for our church and conference.

Following a tent meeting conducted by Rev. George Hawthorn and the Niles pastor, Rev. Delmar Kaufman, a group of people were contacted who expressed a desire for a Wesleyan Methodist Church in Warren, Ohio. In time lots were purchased and plans approved by the Trustees for the erection of a building in this city. This work was put under the supervision and authority of the Niles pastor, Rev. Kaufman. We gave what help we could in a physical way to this work, but due to instructions from the Mission Board to labor at the building at Alliance, Ohio, our aid to this project would be limited. At present they have a neat and good building in which to worship. Brother Kaufman purchased material carefully and economically or the cost of the building would have been much greater. He also worked hard and long at the task of building. Much labor was donated which helped to keep costs down. When fully completed around \$8,000.00 will be invested. This work officially became a part of the Pioneer department when a Pioneer organization was affected on May 16, 1952. Rev. James Hogg aided greatly in this work by aiding with the building and preaching at this new point since its beginning. This building was officially dedicated on May 18, 1952.

Following a tent meeting at Alliance, Ohio, conducted by Rev. George Hawthorn and Rev. Willis Muir, plans were formulated for a new building there. Rev. Guy Terpe, pastor at Massillon, Ohio, was placed in charge of this work and given the supervision of the building. Blue prints were obtained and approved by the State and work begun early in September. The first part of October we were requested to proceed to this new project and give what help we could with the erection of this building. We got on the job as soon as possible after work already planned could be dispensed with. We spent our time from then until late November when the weather made further construction impossible at this new work. This is a large building being 70 x 34 ft. We completed the block laying the last really nice day before bad weather set. In early December we were asked by the Mission Board to assume responsibility of this work due to the physical condition of Bro. Terpe. Thus this work became a part of our Conference Pioneer Department. On Jan. 6, 1952, a pioneer organization was formed of this group. Rev. Willis Muir has been the hard working, diligent, and faithful pastor of this new group. As soon as the weather permitted this spring and we could be released from other duties we resumed work on this project. When fully completed there will be living quarters upstairs for the pastor, a basement auditorium 40 x 32 ft. The Massillion Church gave continued and earnest help on this work after its resumption this spring, otherwise it would have been impossible to have it as nearly finished as it is. The pastor will soon be in the living quarters upstairs and they hope soon to be holding their services in the basement. Most likely the building will be dedicated early this summer.

The group at Loyal Oak were forced out of their building last fall and have worshipped since in the basement of the pastor's home. The church services were not only kept going without any interruption, but the S. S.

average has been maintained. They now have a lot and plans are under way for a new building of their own to be erected this summer. This is a fertile field and there is every reason to believe that a strong church will ultimately be established in the growing community.

There is likewise a building project planned by the Soldier Pioneer Group. The building in which they have been worshipping has been deeded to them by the Sykesville Baptist Church. But conditions make it imperative that the location be changed and a new building erected.

We were encouraged at the beginning of this conference year that the Greenfield Pioneer group could be organized during this year but some conditions arose which have made this impossible. We feel however that ultimately this group can and will be organized into a solid and substantial church. Some good progress has been made this year in a spiritual way and some conditions have been met that greatly encourage us concerning the future of this work.

The work at Isabella has made good progress in the S. S. this year. The great need is for a real spiritual awakening in this mining town. Butler continues to press on amid surroundings that are difficult. A sifting time has come into the Lakeview Community group and a more solid foundation is being laid for what we trust will be a Wesleyan Methodist church in the future. Ashtabula enjoyed a good revival this Spring and there are indications that better days are ahead for this little group. Bro. and Sr. Miller continue to labor faithfully on at Jamestown and keep encouraged in the midst of a very discouraging situation. There now appears that there are some signs of a break that we trust will be the beginning of better days for this faithful couple.

As we terminate our labors in the Pioneer department we wish to give praise and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for strength for our labors, and protection in our travels. We desire to express to our Conference President our grateful thanks for his kind and thoughtful consideration of us and his every encouraging words to us. We also wish to convey our appreciation to the members of the Mission Board who have served on it during these six years of our pioneer labors, they have indeed been brethren in the Lord. Then there have been the loyal and sacrificing men and women who have actually carried on the work on these small and new projects. Heaven alone has the record of their achievements and could adequately portray the part they have filled in the forward advance of our Pioneer work. Without them it would have been impossible. To the loyal laymen and pastors of the conference we express our thanks for your support of this arm of our Conference work by the distribution of the pioneer calendars and liberal offerings. And then last, but far from least, has been the contributions made by Mrs. Comadoll with her music, singing, prayers, and exemplary living. Without her, what little I have done could have never otherwise been accomplished. The Apostle Paul correctly summed it up when he stated that we were, "Workers together with God."

We most freely, frankly, and fully acknowledge that during these last six years many mistakes and errors of judgment have been made, but we are happy to testify to the fact that in all of our labors there was a sincere aim to please God, advance His Kingdom in this world, and enlarge the borders

of our Conference. During the past six years 13 new churches have been organized and brought into the conference, bringing in a total of 173 new members, not counting those who transferred from other Wesleyan Methodist Churches. The total value of new property coming in through the pioneer department during this period has been approximately \$87,750.00.

During the past year we have travelled 17,300 miles, spent at least three months in working on building projects. We preached 115 times, held two revivals, conducted 9 Quarterly Meetings, and made 30 Pioneer Visitations and trips. We served as delegate to the General Conference session at Fairmount, Indiana. And in the absence of the Vice President accompanied the Conference President to the area leaders meeting at Syracuse, N. Y.

REPORT NO. 11

THE CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

True Scriptural Evangelism can never be separated from the Apostolic faith and life built around the cross. Whenever and wherever there is a return to primitive Christianity, Apostolic evangelism always accompanies it and the Word runs and is glorified. The Book of Acts is a moving record of evangelism as men of like passions as ourselves kept in step with the movings of the Holy Ghost.

In the beginning of the 18th century, with England sitting in the squalor of sin, and with religion at a low ebb, John Wesley, his brother Charles, and a few others, sought the old original paths of Bible holiness. The Apostolic fire of Divine Love caught in their hearts, which closed the beaten paths offered by the Old Church of England and thrust them out to the streets, highways, and out-of-the-way villages to spread Scriptural holiness over the lands. The recovery of Apostolic power and life by Wesley and his humble followers was such that the hindrances and oppositions only contributed to the furtherance of the gospel to the neglected areas.

Our problem of evangelism is the problem of escaping the over-whelming power of contemporary literature and example of the modern streamlined holiness movement. The holiness movement of seventy-five years ago came as a result of a small remnant returning to the original sources of Wesleyan Literature for their reading, and the recovery and practice of original Christianity.

To the extent that Apostolic life is recovered, to that extent will true evangelism be recovered. Much of the gloom and lack of enthusiasm in our present outlook toward Scriptural evangelism is to be found within ourselves—a spirit within us that savors of this world. It arises from an undue concern for our own and not Christ's; too much care for the business of living in this world and not enough for living in Heaven; too much time given to what seems legitimate, and too little abandonment to the work of God. It is all too evident that imperceptibly many of our own draw back to worldly allurements of honor and ease, and become cluttered in their own souls with the love of things. This includes dress and the fineries of home adornment. We too soon leave the humble way of making ourselves of no reputation of taking up our cross and of being even more vile in our own eyes.

Apostolic evangelism does not follow the old beaten paths of sight, but observes where God is working, hears the Macedonian call, "Come over and help us," and straightway sets forth to obey. It does not expect results without using the means. It does not expect great fruit from God without yielding to the lowly unsensational toil of prayer, and to preaching from house to house repentance toward our Lord Jesus Christ. Beloved, we must become walking preachers, visiting from house to house, if we again get the movings of God for ourselves and the people.

In his maturer years Wesley observed that Christianity was inclined to destroy itself. He stated that the Methodists in their beginnings were poor

and destitute of this world's goods, fervent in Spirit, self-denying in discipline and practice. Their salvation taught them frugality and industry. They prospered materially, riches increased, but alas! to his grief foolish desires arose again in their hearts. They became complacent and self-indulgent, so that their fervor for God waned and their glory and power was dissipated. He observed that this could be avoided only by giving and by obeying the command of Jesus, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures on earth." Brethren, this danger is with us also. Having measured their steps back to earth again, some have already suffered the loss of old-time fervor for God and His Kingdom.

The spirit of evangelism is not of this world. It seeketh not its own, but Christ's. Selfishness destroys it. Worldly friendships, and attachments to its ease and comfort cause this Divine passion to be grieved and to depart from us. The spirit of unselfish compassion for those in lostness can thrive only as the heart is detached from the encumbrances of earth. It is the spirit that forsaketh all to follow Him. Jesus says, "And everyone that hath forsaken houses, or brethren, or sisters, or father, or mother, or wife, or children, or lands, for my name's sake shall receive an hundred-fold, and shall inherit everlasting life." Matt. 19:29.

The spirit of evangelism when fully clothed in human personality is a spirit of faith that goes forth with confidence that a cause supported by the Triune God, God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit cannot fail, but must be accompanied with success, (not as the world counts success, however,) more than adequate to repay for all losses and pain.

The task of evangelism will never be finished until Jesus comes. Each new generation must be evangelized. We are responsible for our generation. God has espoused His own cause. Let us arise to take hold upon his strength and go forth as good soldiers, equipped with His armor and weapons of warfare, to fight a good fight and to see many delivered by His power from the prison houses of sin ere another year passes.

REPORT NO. 18

CONFERENCE GROUP INSURANCE

LIFE INSURANCE: Last year (1950-51) the churches of the Conference fell short of paying their assignment by \$372.87. This year they fell short \$374.90, which is more than last year.

On the basis of 3,170 church members at 35c per member, our annual

REPORT NO. 27

CHURCH BUILDING AND FINANCE

Your special committee on Church Building and Finance begs leave to submit the following report:

In presenting this report, we crave your most charitable hearing of what we have to present; for we would like to emphasize that that which is here written is, in our judgment, far from what a matter of so great importance merits. The needs in this field are so vast as to be beyond the ability of this committee to fully comprehend or adequately discuss. We

hope, therefore, that no one will feel that in the discussion and recommendations herein presented, the committee is assuming a position of finality or authority, but rather that we are endeavoring to frankly and simply present some facts which we consider are pertinent to the subject assigned.

It is the considered judgment of this committee that the providing of houses of worship ranks only second in importance to the act and spirit of worship itself. In fact, so important is each of these in its relation to each other, we can almost say, they are mutually dependent upon each other. Not that folks cannot and may not worship God anywhere, but they can worship Him a lot better as congregations if they have the proper surroundings and facilities for worship.

This, therefore, will bring into focus first, the matter of LOCATION. The importance of locating our churches well away from the racuous of city traffic, the thunder and rattle of fast freights, and the screaming of whistles, cannot be over-emphasized. If worship is a matter of the spirit and the mind, and it is, then our churches ought to be located where the worshipper will be as free as possible from these outside distractions.

In the matter of location, consideration needs to be given to the area to be served by that particular church. The selection of location is of tremendous importance. First, we should consider, what will be its future surroundings? Will it be surrounded by the type of people we can hope to reach? For example, it appears that it would not be wise to locate a Protestant church in a strongly Catholic or Jewish community. Of course, we recognize that the type of people living in a community may change in a few years; but then, it may not, and we ought not to deliberately place our churches in localities where there is little or no hope of reaching the people of that locality.

Accessibility, too, is a factor to be considered in the matter of location. Will the church be where people can find it? If it is, are there facilities of transportation within easy reach of the church? Of course, we do not expect trolley companies or bus lines to route their transportation right by everybody's door, but the church ought to be located sufficiently close to main lines as to be easily reached. This will mean that in many cases building committees will have to ignore that cheap lot out on the end of Blind Alley or that wonderful lot on the back side of Strawberry Hill that Uncle Ezra wants to donate in memory of his deceased mother-in-law. In locating and building churches, access and servicability must never be sacrificed to mere economy or sentimentality.

Space is another important factor in locating a church. Care should be taken to purchase a sufficient number of lots, or lots sufficiently large, to admit of necessary expansion in days to come, as well as provide adequate parking space off of public thoroughfares. In most cities nowadays, the latter is a must because of zoning codes which make off-the-street parking mandatory. With increased automobile traffic, any church on a principal highway, should make certain the buildings are set back far enough from property lines so that even the greatest demands of highway or street departments will not wreak havoc if widening demands are enforced. Setting a building well back from the street or highway is good for a number of reasons: (1) It gives room for landscaping, planting and setting. (2) The noise

of vehicular traffic is muted by distance. (3) It gives reasonable assurance that no widening program will ever seriously affect the church plant.

While considering location, it might be well to remind ourselves that the cost of an adequate survey may be entirely offset by the trouble it may save later on; besides it is a good legal instrument. The survey should show the lot's boundaries, grades showing variation in land elevation, the depth and flow of sewers, and location of utilities. Basements and rights of way should also be indicated on the survey. Probably most important of all, is a complete and satisfactory search of title.

The second phase of providing a place of worship will apply to the BUILDING itself. We note first, its **appearance**. By appearance we mean, that which strikes the eye first and registers in the mind. The building should immediately address itself to folks thinking as being a "CHURCH." It ought to be easily distinguishable from any other type of building in existence. And with a little thought, this matter is not as difficult as it might seem. It is not necessary that a church should be elaborate or ornate in order to identify itself as a church. If it does not have a steeple; then a simple tower, a gothic entrance, or simple gothic windows will give the desired effect. But whether the characteristic be any or all or none of these, every church building should have that about its architecture which makes it easily recognizable as a church, a place of worship, the House of God. If we want people to respect our churches as such, then we shall have to build them like churches.

Nor does this apply alone to exterior appearance, but as well, to **Interior arrangement**. We speak of the church as a place of worship, a House of God; and that is what it is . . . a **House of God**. Back in Exodus, chapter 25, verse 8, we read, "And let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among them." A sanctuary is a sacred place, a consecrated place, a place set apart for the use and service of God. And there should be that about every church which marks it as a sanctuary, the dwelling of God. It should speak to the individual immediately about God, and kindle within him the desire to worship. Everything about the place of worship should speak to men about God: its interior height, its groins and arches, its light-bringing window, its sacred altar, its communion table and pulpit, should all bear their eloquent though mute testimony. We are living in a day when that deep spirit of worship, and that devoted love and respect for the house of God is largely gone from us. Could it be that the cause, at least in part, lies in our failure to plan and erect church buildings with much about them that reminds folk of God and commands a spirit of reverence? A little lad once was asked by the minister in whose church he sat, why he liked to come to church. The little lad replied, "It makes me all quiet inside; and makes me feel bigger than I am." Is not that what we need in these days. We have read of a preacher who in letting a contract for the building of a church, said to the contractor, "I am not very particular what the plan is, just so 1300 people will be as close to me as possible." To which another preacher answered, "I am very particular about the plans for my church; for I want it built so 1300 people will be brought as close to God as possible."

Now, as we stated before, folk can and may worship God anywhere;

but it is our humble opinion that proper places of worship will greatly facilitate and strengthen the desire and spirit of worship. Church buildings can and do help to do this very thing. They can "make us all quiet inside." They can quickly create a feeling of reverent awe. They can shut out the world. They can initiate wordless and wonderful thoughts which have a strange power to make men fall silent in the presence of the Divine. Some churches are so eloquently commanding that almost any sensitive person stepping into them will first "lift up" his eyes and feel impelled, then, to "bow down and worship." One can almost see "the Lord, high and lifted;" and in the same breath, know "that the place whereon he stands is holy ground."

The church building should then for the hour, shut out the world and shut us in with God. It should be a "sanctuary" in the sense that in a vexing, dangerous and wearing world it will help us to renew our strength, to put on boldness and to face the trials and tragedies of our workaday life with strength greater than our own and with the inner assurance that we do not walk these perilous, demanding ways alone, but with God.

Let us, therefore, in planning and building the new church keep well in the forefront of our minds the fact that we are fulfilling the ancient command to make God a "sanctuary." It is a House of God we are building, not just a place to go to church. Let us build our churches and order our worship in such a fashion that they will bless and ennoble the spirit that is in man and enable him in the best way and in the fullest sense possible to "worship in spirit and in truth."

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That in the erection and remodelling of church buildings, local Building Committees and the Conference Board on Building and Location use only those plans and materials which adhere to a definite and distinguishable pattern of church architecture.

2. That the Conference Board on Building and Location collect and file such plans as are adapted to our needs as a Conference and make these plans available to Building Committees as the need rises.

3. That churches be built according to plans which will lend themselves easily to enlargement if and when that becomes necessary.

4. That Building Committees make a complete survey of the needs of their area from the standpoint of the Sunday School and the future growth of their congregation and build their church as far as possible with adequate housing and educational facilities.

5. That in selecting the site for a church building the following items be given special consideration: (1) A location as suitable as possible to the area to be served. (2) A location which is easy to find and is within easy reach of the general means of transportation. (3) The provision of sufficient space for parking and all future needs. (4) A location sufficiently elevated to make possible good drainage.

6. That since music and singing both in Bible times and since, have always held a prominent place in divine worship, and since many public

schools afford such splendid opportunities for both vocal and instrumental training, we believe churches should take cognizance of this fact and provide facilities for the harnessing of these talents for the glory and the service of the Lord.

7. That in buying or building parsonages, special care be taken to provide ample bed-room and storage space. To accommodate the average minister's family, parsonages should have four bedrooms and be built with a full sized basement and attic.

8. That the Conference seek if possible to enlist the services of a licensed architect. And a contractor of good repute, experienced in building churches, whose services could be made available to the churches of the conference, and whom the conference in turn would be obligated to some extent to employ.

9. That in building churches, a minimum of at least one-third of the estimated cost be provided for before the letting of a contract or beginning to build. Exceptions to this rule may be granted at the discretion of the Conference Committee on Building and Location.

REPORT NO. 29

DISCIPLINARY AMENDMENT

The revised Article as it is proposed to have it read:

V. THE SUFFICIENCY AND FULL AUTHORITY OF THE SCRIPTURES

12. The Holy Scriptures contain all things necessary to salvation; so that whatsoever is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby, is not to be required of any man, that it should be believed as an article of faith, or be thought requisite or necessary to salvation. In the name of the Holy Scriptures, we do understand the books of the Old and New Testament. These Scriptures we do hold to be the inspired and infallibly written Word of God,

fully inerrant in their original manuscripts and superior to all human authority.

The canonical books of the Old Testament are:

Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy, Joshua, Judges, Ruth, I Samuel, II Samuel, I Kings, II Kings, I Chronicles, II Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther, Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, The Song of Solomon, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, Daniel, Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.

The canonical books of the New Testament are:

Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, The Acts, The Epistle to the Romans, I Corinthians, II Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, I Thessalonians, II Thessalonians, I Timothy, II Timothy, Titus, Philemon, Hebrews, James, I Peter, II Peter, I John, II John, III John, Jude, and Revelation.

Psalms 19:7; Luke 24:27; John 17:17; Acts 17:2, 11; Rom. 1:2; 15:4; 16:26; Gal. 1:8; I Thess. 2:13; II Tim. 3:15, 17; Heb. 4:12; James 1:21; I Peter 1:23; II Peter 1:19, 21; Rev. 22:14, 19.

THE W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 46th Annual Session of the Woman's Missionary Society of Allegheny Conference, greetings in the Precious Name of Jesus, our Risen Savior and Coming King!

As another conference year closes we must give an account of our stewardship both to you and to our Heavenly Father. God grant that He who reads our motives and desires may find no fault there though many be the errors of the human efforts.

For a number of years the fact of crisis and danger has been known to us all and this past year has not changed but deepened the danger. The world dilemma is darkening and the anti-christ forces are closing in. Three desperate foes to the propagation of the true Gospel are well known: Communism, Modernism and last, but not least, Catholicism. To these we would add an even more subtle and dangerous one to us—a light, shallow, compromising holiness. In the end all will combine into the anti-christ spirit and real Christianity will ultimately stand alone in its purity. Let us be sure, desperately sure, that we are in the genuine holiness group, not in name only, but in truth.

Because of these rising anti-christ forces missionary work is being greatly handicapped. Our opportunity in Japan is closing and Shintoism is again taking over. China was closed several years ago; India will only permit social workers to enter, purely evangelistic workers being barred out. In South America Protestantism is fighting a bloody battle against Catholicism. Africa is also being threatened and many other hindrances could be mentioned. Missionary Boards are stressing the more nearby fields of service and are ready for the alerting of their foreign missionaries, if necessary. Needless to say, this all shows us how important it is that we be at our Master's business for "the night cometh when no man can work."

With heartfelt appreciation for your faithfulness in prayer and your splendid cooperation in all our labors, we submit this report. The activities of the Conference Year, June, 1951 to June, 1952 are as follows:

From June 27th to July 3, 1951, your president and five delegates attended the General Conference Session held at Fairmount, Indiana, the report of which will be given by the delegates. The changes made by the General Conference were many, too many to enumerate here. They will be brought out as clearly as possible in the Plan of Work and discussed as presented then.

For our West Virginia Camp Missionary service we had secured Mrs. Georgia Markey as speaker, but the flood made us evacuate the camp grounds the evening before the scheduled service so that it never materialized.

Our Stoneboro Camp prayer meetings were not quite so well attended this year as usual. The public service, however, was a great success financially and spiritually with Mrs. Norva Crosby, returned missionary from South America, and Mr. Nate Scharff, converted Jew, as the speakers. The latter spoke in behalf of the Jews with such unusual passion for the salvation of his people that it resulted in a very large offering being given for the instigating of a Wesleyan Jewish work. Rev. Robert Crosby, returned mission-

ary from South America, also spoke during the prayer service hour with much help of the Lord.

A very impressive and unusual service was held Sunday morning of Stoneboro Camp when Dr. Robert Benninger, missionary elect to Africa, was given an honorary ordination by the Allegheny Conference. The Blessed Presence of the Holy Spirit set His seal upon this service.

October 8th to November 18th and the week following Thanksgiving to December 2nd, Rev. Alton Liddick, returned missionary from India, made a tour of our conference with very satisfactory results both for the spiritual and financial cause of missions.

The month of February was assigned to our conference society during which to carry on a Chain of Prayer through our local societies for our missionary work. The Chain of Prayer now carried on by other conferences is to culminate at the Jubilee Year Celebration. Sixteen societies completely filled their day; ten had taken over 48 half hours of prayer, but five days were below the 48 half hour periods. We regret very much that 21 societies never even reported. Thus, the reason is plain for our failing to fill our quota. The Great Rewarder of prayer will mete out to each their reward or reproof as deserved.

The following missionaries from our conference are now on the field: Hazel Jones, Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Landrey—India; Rev. and Mrs. W. N. Saunders, Dr. and Mrs. Robert Benninger—Africa; Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip—Haiti; Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Plants—Independent Indian Work in Fallon, Nevada.

The calls throughout the year were many and necessitated a heavy correspondence. We sent out 6 circular letters and 2 circular cards, besides other pieces of mail making a total of a little over 800 pieces. Last year's number was only 500 pieces.

Three new societies have been added this year though we lost one, Templeton First, making a total of 89. The new ones are: (1) March 1, 1952, the English W.M.S., formerly organized with 22 members, was received into the conference organization by the conference W.M.S. president. (2) March 17, 1952, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll organized the Cabin Run W.M.S. with 8 active and 5 honorary members. (3) April 24, 1952, Mrs. Ruth Stonebraker, duly authorized, organized the Hooversville W.M.S. with 13 active and 5 honorary members. We hereby welcome each of these fine societies and wish them God's richest blessing.

For this conference session we have secured the services of Rev. and Mrs. Archie Argo, returned missionaries from Africa, for our speakers at the public service, June 6, p.m.

As we go forward the coming year, it is only by the steadying, strengthening grace of God that we are enabled to face the struggle of the unknown future. But thank God with Christ as our All-mighty, never failing Guide and Captain we can bravely, fearlessly confront the foe and claim the victory in the Name of our Conquering King and Living Lord!

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK**WE RECOMMEND:**

1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office.

2. a. That the Program and Plan of Work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received.

b. That we urge the president of each society to refer to those as a reminder during the year.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We urge that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of the society, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That our District Holiness Conventions, where possible, observe a missionary service.

4. That we urge our societies to carry out the Prayer Partner Plan, and keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission fields, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our societies. Reports to be sent to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, Mrs. Ruth A. Hoiem, Middlefield, Ohio, at least sixty days after the sitting of Conference.

5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor. We also recommend that the Local Society president, vice president, secretary and 75% of all members be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary.

6. That the president of each local society remind those attending Stoneboro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.

7. a. That all local society officers and delegates to annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society members be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee, if possible.

c. That since the retiring president is Acting President during the Conference Session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate, assuming their expense for transportation.

d. That the delegates credentials be sent at least two weeks before Conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Society Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 2, Utica, Pa.

e. That Statistical Blanks with all vouchers not sent to the Sub-Treasurer and statements for local work, be sent at least two weeks before Conference to the Statistical Chairman, Mrs. Neva Golden, 310-17th St., Barnesboro, Pa.

f. That each society send fruits and vegetables, or the equivalent in cash to Conference. The larger societies sending two dozen quarts and the smaller at least one dozen. Fruits and vegetables to be all of one kind from

each society. Same to be credited at purchase price. We recommend giving cash where possible, same to be sent anytime during the year to the superintendent of the dining hall, Rev. W. R. Kopp, 416 East Main St., Titusville, Pa., or brought to Conference. Amount to be credited under "Other Objects."

g. That twenty-five cents be raised for each active member for Conference Entertainment and sent to the Sub-Treasurer before the books close April 30.

h. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified pledges will be divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.

8. a. That each society use the designated study book, also urge the use of the Program Calendar and other helps. That we encourage our members to follow the Mission Reading Course as recommended by General Conference. All reports to be sent to Mrs. Ruth Stonebraker, 160 Village St., Johnstown, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Reading Course.

b. That all literature including Program Calendars, Study Books and Efficiency Standards, be obtained from our Conference Literature Dept., address Mrs. Ruth Leyshon, 313 East Main St., Conneaut, Ohio.

c. That each society have a program committee varying once a quarter. We suggest the president act as chairman of said committee.

9. a. That each society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.

b. That each society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund. This not to apply on budget.

10. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. All Card Call money to be sent to Rev. J. R. Swauger, 330 East Onondaga St., Syracuse 2, New York, and stubs to be sent to Mrs. Neva Golden with the Statistical Blank. This not to apply on budget.

11. a. That we send program suggestions, Sunday School Literature, flannelgraph materials and used Christmas greeting cards to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage and Indian Missions. Also bandages for home and foreign when required. (NOTE: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide and tightly rolled. Number of pounds to be reported as Item of Interest on Annual Statistical Blank.)

b. That the number of boxes of used clothing sent to Home Missions be reported on Statistical Blanks under Item of Interest. No monetary value to be placed thereon.

12. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the Church educational budget. This is to include L.S.U. pledges.

13. a. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Program Calendar be observed where possible. That Easter and Self-Denial Offerings be used for Home Missions, and the Penny-a-meal offerings be used for Foreign Missions.

b. That the societies observe the monthly Fast and Prayer Service and that the self-denial offerings taken at these services be applied on Home Missions.

14. a. That where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

15. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a ten per cent gain in membership.

b. That the month of September be designated as Membership Month.

16. a. That one dollar dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent, UNDIVIDED, through the local church treasurer to the Sub-Treasurer. The Sub-Treasurer shall divide them thus: .25 Home Missions, .25 Foreign Missions and .50 Dues. Dues to be sent at least quarterly.

b. That each society be assessed .25 an active member for General Administrative Fund. This is not a budget item.

17. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and also for small offerings taken during Conference.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "Our Working Day," our Women's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year, and in our local societies stress the need of intercessory prayer and personal work.

2. That we give ourselves to Bible study, fasting and prayer, and that we be "Doers of the Work," going out two by two in home visitation, for Jesus said: "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few." Lu. 10:1-2.

3. a. That we give diligent attention to all missionary work at home and abroad. Let us not be negligent by our indifference, selfish motives and pleasures, and so lose sight of our sacred task of inspiring the missionary spirit.

b. That we encourage the men to attend and participate in our missionary prayer services, and to become honorary members.

4. a. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the Wesleyan Missionary and other helpful material, that our interests may be widened and our prayers more effective.

b. That in all our missionary meetings we stress the need of prayer for our missionaries, churches and officials, rather than engaging in social functions.

5. That we adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.

6. a. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

b. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part, thus creating in them the desire to follow the Bible standards, and helping them to overcome the temptations that present themselves to our youth today.

c. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject any erroneous teachings presented.

7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, the dance, cards, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read worldly comic books, listening to unwholesome radio programs, buying Sunday newspapers, and other Sabbath desecrations, such as pleasure riding, buying, etc. Isa. 58:13-14.

b. That we urge our people to refrain from buying television sets, realizing that television in its present operation is an evil influence, and may mean the loss of souls.

8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies, in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to face the low moral standards of this day.

b. That, since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents not to allow their children to participate in such unwholesome activity.

c. That we as mothers guard well our children and, as far as possible, know where they are and what they are doing at all times.

d. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently.

e. That mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses at least half-way between the knees and ankles, with long sleeves and modest neck-line, which should accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Tim. 2:9-10. Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "the woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man . . . for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."

b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, which includes brooches and other ornaments. Isa., chapter 3. Also that we do not wear nude shades of hose and hats that display flowers, feathers or veiling. Furthermore we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.

c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting or curling the hair, or the long bob. I Cor. 11:15. Also we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9 that broidered hair means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, which includes wearing long hose.

e. Further we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and neglecting long standing bills.

10. That we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms, since we greatly detest the use and effects of both II Cor. 7:1. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments opened on the Sabbath day.

b. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God who gives us freedom and liberty.

11. That these resolutions be read in each society quarterly, that all members be kept informed of the proposed attainments and requirements.
