REV. CHARLES H. GUERNSEY

Born December 31, 1882

Entered the ministry in 1929

Ordained Elder in 1936

Deceased April 8, 1962

Standing Rules

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 1:30 p.m., the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itinerary and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

To obtain uniformity, it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on each day during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

The Conference Treasurer shall close his books on June 10 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer then shall fill in Item IX on the statistical report blanks, affix his signature and return one to the pastor who sent it. The other statistical report shall be forwarded to the Statistician by June 17.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-Officio Members:

(a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.

(b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the

Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.

(c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.

(d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Conference Missions Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

(a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay; and the church shall furnish the supply.

(b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.

(c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.

(d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.

(e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.

(f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.

(g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.

(h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.

(i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.

(j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

(a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.

(b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.

(c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.

20. Course of Study:

Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.

21. Ministerial Institute:

The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.

22. Delegates' Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.

23. Audits:

The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.

24. Conference Missions:

- (a) In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered conference missions. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
- (b) The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for conference missions.

25. Bible Study Quarter:

During the first quarter of each calendar year, which is designated as Bible Study Quarter, each church shall conduct a Bible study program. Plans for this work shall be offered each year by the President and the Bible Study Committee.

26. Committee on Orders of the Day:

The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, conference missions; Thursday, a public missionary service; Friday, the ordination service.

27. Church Membership Classes:

Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.

28. Financial Appeals:

- (a) The Conference shall promote the offering for Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday which is the second Sunday in September. This shall be in addition to raising the educational budget in full. (Note: Houghton Academy receives 20 per cent of the total educational budget.)
- (b) The Lenten season and Easter offering is hereby established as a time for a special offering for the local church.

(c) Any financial appeals to be made in the local churches by non-Wesleyan persons or groups shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. This does not apply to representatives of the Gideons and of the American Bible Society.

Daily Proceedings

First Day - Tuesday Afternoon

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the Chair for its 118th annual session at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, June 26, 1962. We were led in singing "Constantly Abiding" and "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder," by Rev. Leon Jelliff. Prayer was offered by Rev. Stanley Wright.

The roll was called showing 33 elders present. The report of the Committee on Credentials was read and adopted. (See Lay Delegates on page 13.) The roll of lay delegates was called showing 24 present.

The Courtesy Committee reported and Dr. Paul Kindschi was introduced to the Conference.

Dr. Paul Kindschi, Executive Sunday School Secretary, brought a devotional message from Psalm 63:26, "As I have seen thee in the sanctuary," and from the words of God to Moses, "I will put thee in the cleft of the rock." This was followed by prayer around the altar..

The Agenda on Orders of the Day was adopted. (See Report No. 1)

The Report of the Nominating Committee was adopted with the amendment that the Report be referring to the committee for any necessary changes. (See Report No. 2)

The Report of the Committee on Bible Study was made by Rev. Royal Woodhead and adopted by vote. (See Report No. 3)

The Conference President reported for the Conference Pension Plan Treasurer who recommended that a memorial be sent to the next General Conference recommending that all business be conducted directly from the Pension Office at Marion, Indiana.

Rev. Carroll Brentlinger, the Tithing Secretary, gave an oral report which was adopted.

The Secretary of Wesleyan Men's Fellowship, Rev. Leslie Conley, reported orally, emphasizing the need of lay evangelism. The report was accepted.

The Conference expressed itself as desiring to have a Hammond organ for conference and camp at a delivery cost of \$50.

We adjourned by vote.

Second Day - Wednesday Morning:

The Conference President called the conference session to order. Rev. Leon Jelliff led in singing "His Grace Abounded More." The Courtesy Committee presented Dr. Alton E. Liddick, Executive Secretary of World Missions and Denominational representative, who conducted the opening devotions.

The roll was called and minutes of the Tuesday afternoon session approved. Dr. Claude Ries brought greetings. Rev. David Cyrus was introduced to the conference. He gave a personal testimony.

The Conference voted unanimously to act on Item No. 6 of the Policy Committee.

Item No. 6 of Policy Committee Report was adopted unanimously by vote. (See Report No. 7).

The Mutual Aid Treasurer, Rev. Richard Brown, gave his financial report which was referred to the Auditing Committee. It was understood that assets not included in the report be secured from the Conference Treasurer and entered in this report. (See Report No. 8).

Third Day – Thursday Morning

The Chairman called the Conference to order. The Rev. Leon Jelliff led in singing, "On Christ The Solid Rock I Stand." The minutes were read and approved. Rev. Harry Barrigar, a Conference preacher & pastor of independent churches near Genesee, Pa., led in devotions basing his remarks in Mark 9:2.

The Courtesy Committee reported. Rev. Malcom Ellis, missionary to Africa, was introduced to the Conference and he brought greetings.

It was voted that Dr. Alton Liddick, denominational representative, preside during the election of Conference President and Vice-President.

Board of Trustees – Terms to expire 1965: Rev. I. Leslie Conley, Rev. James E. Bence, David A. Rees.

It was voted that the Campmeeting Committee be continued with nine members.

By motion the time was extended to complete elections.

A motion was made that we elect delegates to General Conference without nominations and by ballot. A division of the house showed 35 affirmative votes, 11 negative votes. The President declared the passage of the motion.

Third Ministerial – James E. Bence.

Rev. Paul Lawrence was nominated as Director of Child Evangelism. The nomination was confirmed by vote.

We Adjourned by motion until 12:45.

Third Day – Thursday Afternoon.

The President called the conference to order and we were led in the singing of "Blessed Assurance." Elections were continued.

It was moved and seconded that the motion that we ballot without nominations be rescinded. The motion was carried by a two thirds vote.

A motion to close nominations was lost.

Further nominations were: Edward Willett, Howard Dietrich.

Nominations were closed by vote.

A motion was carried to move the Orders of the Day to permit the completion of elections.

The name of Richard Doan was added to the nominations.

Third Lay Delegate – Howard L. Dietrich.

First Alternate Lay Delegate – Richard Beech.

A five minute recess was granted.

Order of the Day: Denominational Address.

Dr. Alton E. Liddick, the Official Church Representative, addressed the conference. He first brought greetings from the General Superintendents, then reviewed the work of Wesleyan World Missions and work of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, concluding with I Cor. 16:

The Campmeeting Treasurer gave the financial report which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 10.)

It was voted that the Secretary write a letter of appreciation to those who had a part in recent camp construction.

The Camp President gave a verbal report noting recent improvements and recommended that George Lee and Vern Parker be sent a letter of Thanks.

He concluded with an exhortation that there be earnest prayer for the spiritual emphasis of our camp.

Rev. Orville Lawrence, Secretary of Tellers, reported on the election of Standing Committees and Boards. (See Conference Committees and Boards.)

The Report of the Policy Committee was moved to follow the Finance Committee by vote of the Conference.

We adjourned by motion.

Fourth Day – Friday Forenoon

The President called Conference to order. We were led in singing, "Send the Old Ti Power." Rev. Thomas Boghosian, Pastor of the Wesleyan Methodist Community Church, Kirkville, N. Y., conducted devotions. The minutes were read, corrected, and approved.

Mrs. Gladys Newbury, President of the Woman's Missionary Society, gave her report. She was given a rising vote of thanks. The President of the Conference Wesleyan Youth, R. Gerald Jack, gave his annual report. It was noted that he is concluding his services as Conference W. Y. President as he has become the Houghton Area W. Y. President. He concluded with an exhortation to pastors to give greater support to the youth program. The members of the Conference stood expressing confidence in and support of the conference youth program.

The Report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was given and adopted by vote. (See Report No. 11.) The Report on Religious Services was given and adopted by vote. (See Report No. 12.)

The Conference President reported orally on the Christian Life Book Shop. It was stated that the audit report is not ready. It is understood that this report will be published in the Conference Minutes. It was moved, seconded and passed that the banker's report be made available to the pastors of the Conference.

The Conference President clarified the statement read from the minutes of the Conference Board of Trustees concerning Binghamton. The statement read, "At this time there appears to be no urgent need in the securing of these lots." His explanation was that the

attorney representing the seller had stated that there was no hurry to secure the desired lots since the government was no longer urging sale.

Time was extended to complete the reports on the morning's agenda. The Report of the Auditing Committee was read and adopted. (See Report No. 13.) The Finance Committee reported. The Report was adopted. (See Report No. 14.) The Policy Committee Report was read by Rev. Carroll Brentlinger and adopted item by item. (See Report No. 7.)

The Committee on Standing Rules reported. Items one through seven were adopted item by item with more than a two-thirds vote. The Committee further recommended that these changes be made in the Standing Rules and that this report be not included as a report in the printed 1962 Minutes. The recommendation was adopted by vote.

The Conference Secretary read the Report of the Commission on Church Union. The following resolution was submitted for a ballot vote: "Be it resolved that our church continue to pursue the possibility of union, on mutually acceptable terms, with the Pilgrim Holiness Church and other sister holiness groups of like precious faith as doors may providentially open." The tellers reported that 54 votes were cast; 51 affirmative votes, and 3 negative votes.

We adjourned by common consent.

Fourth Day – Friday Afternoon

The Conference was called to order at 1 P. M. by the Vice-President. We were led in singing, "Sweet Hour of Prayer," by Rev. Leon Jelliff. Devotions were conducted by Dr. Frank Wright. George Merz read his pastor's report.

A letter was read from Mr. Clinton Tasker, Director of the Evangelical Child and Family Service. The Conference expressed its approval of the Evangelical Child and Family Service and permission was granted for the letter which was read to be circulated among the pastors of the Conference.

Order of the Day

The Report of the Director of Child Evangelism was given orally by Rev. Paul Lawrence. It was adopted by vote. It was voted that the Statistician read only the total of figures as they are included on the pastor's abbreviated form. Rev. John Crandall, the Statistician, read his report which was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 15.)

Edward Van Wicklin gave his pastoral report. Brother C.C. Watson, the lay delegate from the Taylor church, made the report for that charge. The Committee on Characters made a partial report and the following characters were passed: George Crook, Leonard Hayes, Richard Sprowl, Robert Crosby, John Edling, George Merz, James Frazee, Grace Russell. George Pattington and Richard Brown gave their pastoral reports.

Reverends Stanley Wright, Leon Jelliff, Grace Russell, Bernard Newbury gave their testimonies. Greetings were read from Chaplain Richard Sprowl who is stationed in England with the U.S. Air Force, Rev. and Mrs. Robert Crosby who are missionaries to Columbia, Rev. Clarke LaCelle and Rev. Arland Rees. Dr. John Edling, missionary to Haiti, also sent greetings which were not received in time to be read.

It was voted that the society formerly referred to as the Fyler Society be henceforth referred to as the Community Wesleyan Methodist Church, Kirkville, N.Y., and be listed in the Conference Minutes thus: "Kirkville – Community Wesleyan Methodist Church."

The Assistant Secretary read the pastoral reports for Wallace Taylor and James Frase. The Conference President nominated James E. Bence and Howard L. Dietrich as his Advisory Board. The nomination was confirmed by vote. The Secretary nominated William Turverey as his assistant. This nomination was confirmed by vote. It was voted that Howard L. Dietrich, Treasurer, be authorized to appoint his own assistant. We recessed to the ringing of the bell.

The Conference returned to hear the Report of the Pastoral Relations Committee. Mrs. Elsie Doty, secretary of the committee, read the report. The report was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 16)

The Conference President reported orally on the Home for the Aged. A motion was adopted to approve of the action of the committee to date. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the present committee be continued. The present committee is: Rev. David A. Rees and Mr. Edward Willett.

The Nominating Committee nominated Wesley B. Nussey and Gerald Wright, Sr., to be

members of the editorial board of the Conference News to serve with the editor, Harold Kingdon. Nominations were confirmed by vote. It was voted that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. The minutes were read and approved. It was voted at 5:30 p.m. that we adjourn to meet at the call of the Chair. Conference closed with prayer.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the Members of the Rochester Conference assembled on the Chambers Campground for the 118th Annual Session:

Greetings in the precious name of our Saviour, Christ Jesus. God in His great love and mercy has permitted us to complete another year of service and we close the year with heartfelt thanks for His grace and protecting care especially in the moment of great danger.

In an hour of constant crisis, continued inflation and economic difficulties, together with the ever-present threats from the enemy, let us have hope and take courage in the promise which God gave to Caleb to the effect that he should subdue the most powerful tribes in Palestine with Divine help. Thus can God help us to look ahead with positive faith and see that, through His grace and strength, we have a future which offers us perhaps the greatest opportunity and challenge the Church has ever known. In fact, some leaders feel that God has guided the unprecedented building and expansion program across the nation in preparation for an outpouring of His Spirit in a marked degree. Let us be much in prayer and have faith that this may be.

We are confident reports from all phases of the work will show that God has given us another good year of real progress. It has again been a year marked by a program of expansion. Four new churches are now under construction, namely, Chambers which is already nearing completion; Pulaski which is well along in their construction work; Bentley Creek which is just beginning actual construction and Beuna Vista where the work is steadily moving along and it is expected will be completed and ready for use late this fall. Most of you are undoubtedly acquainted with the background which made possible the new memorial church at Chambers. This is not only the result of the generous spirit of Mr. George Lee, but also of his love for God and a desire to see the cause of Christ advance. This church is being built in memory of Mrs. Grace Lee, his wife, a fine Christian who was called to her reward early last fall. The new Pulaski church is the result of another church, Sandy Creek, which was faced with the problem of either enlarging their present educational unit or sponsoring a new church in the Pulaski area where several of their families are located. This mother-church program is greatly appreciated and God has put His seal upon the project from the be-

ginning. The new church at Bentley Creek is to meet the need of a growing attendance and to serve the community more adequately. The fine new chapel parsonage at Fyler was opened Easter Sunday with good attendance and interest. It was our privilege to speak in the evening service and we firmly believe the prospect in that area are very encouraging.

The new parsonage at Spencerport is nearing completion and it is hoped that it will be ready for occupancy this summer. The educational units at Berrytown and Pine Meadows are complete and the one in Boylston is nearing completion. The much needed educational unit at Rochester is already under construction and will be ready for use this fall — this within 6 years from the time they sponsored the new church at Spencerport. Several other churches have remodeled and modernized in an endeavor to provide adequate facilities to meet the needs of increasing church activities. We believe it pleases God not only to have adequate facilities, but to keep the church property in good condition and attractive. We are very glad for the progress being made in our new fields of labor this year. While there have been some problems, it has been one of real progress. Our men in these fields are diligently endeavoring to move ahead with real growth as rapidly as possible. Let us not fail to constantly remember them in definite prayer for continued success. A more complete report will be given in the church extension service tonight.

At the close of last Conference session nearly all the churches were supplied with pastors and the ones not supplied were soon cared for. In August we secured Donald Keller, a graduate of Allentown Bible College, to pastor Morris and Wellsboro. He moved onto the work in August where he has served through the year though he does not plan to return another year. Frankly, we are confronted with a bit of a problem at Wellsboro where the interest seems to have waned over a period of time to the extent that the attendance and, of course, the financial income, is very small. Your prayers are solicited for Divine guidance concerning this work. In the early fall we were able to arrange for the pastor of the Church of Christ in Christian Union at Cincinnati to also serve as pastor of our church at Taylor. They had no parsonage and we had no pastor — the two groups worked out a schedule of services that was agreeable and Rev. David Cyrus has been serving well our church there through the year. It is hoped this program can be continued through the coming year. Rev. Cyrus and the Taylor people have done a remarkable job in remodeling, repairing and redecorating the parsonage and have made it into a very fine and attractive residence.

During the year we received the transfer of Rev. Thomas Boghosian from the Champlain Conference and upon acceptance of this report he will officially become a member of this Conference. We granted a letter of standing to Rev. Hugh Newcomb, upon his request, to the Free Methodist Church which will become official upon acceptance of this report. We appointed Rev. Edward Van Wicklin supply pastor of the Elkland charge and upon adoption of this report will become a member of the Conference; Rev. George Merz as supply pastor of Onondaga Reservation — both of these men have served well in their respective fields of labor this year. The Christian Life Book Shop is progressing very well and we have a fine manager in Mr. Donald Clary. Our lease expired this spring and we found it necessary to move since we could not renew the lease, through no fault of the Book Shop, for any length of time. God marvelously helped and we were able to secure another location in the same block just a few doors from where we were — the new location is as good if not better than the former one; there is more space and it is all on one floor, which is a real advantage. We feel it is rendering a real ministry. Let us remember this is the Conference Book Shop and merits our patronage and support in every way. The Book Shop Report will deal with this work in more detail.

We were saddened by the passing of one of our senior ministers, Brother Charles Guernsey, who had served the Church and the Conference with warm devotion and loyalty until he retired and since then he had continued very active in the local church and had maintained a keen interest in the Conference activities. A memorial service is being planned in his honor. Also God called home Brother Floyd Douglass who had served the Conference for over 30 years as Treasurer and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Conference and also served several years as member of the Board of Administration of the Church. Sister Douglass was taken soon after his death. During the year death has claimed the lives of other devoted and loyal laymen. These facts serve to stir those of us who remain to greater diligence in our service for the Master.

Our hearts have been warmed and we have been both inspired and challenged by the encouraging signs in the spiritual realm — with reports of several being saved in the church and in the home while others have made a complete surrender to Christ and come to know the

joy of a real heart cleansing. We are encouraged by the moving of God in several of the churches through revival efforts – notably is this true in the Canisteo church. Let us join in earnest prayer for a definite moving of the Holy Spirit throughout the Conference that in God's own way every church will experience a real spiritual resurgence. All of our building and expansion program, as wonderful as it is and we must have it, is only a means to an end – a preparation for a gracious outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our midst.

This year we were privileged to speak at the dedication service of our beautiful new church in Baldwinsville and it was a real joy to organize the church in December with 58 new members – 45 full members and 13 associate members and several more will soon be joining. It was also a real pleasure to speak at the service of dedication of the excellent new parsonage at Willett Memorial – a parsonage planned and constructed especially to be a parsonage.

This has been a busy year – one which we have enjoyed in labors for the Master. We have preached and spoken at prayer meetings nearly a hundred times; assisted in several communion services, in baptismal services, participated in seven district ministerial meetings, mailed out 12 circular letters and carried on a heavy correspondence. We have conducted two revivals, two long-week-end services, spoke in Holy Week and Good Friday services. We have participated in 45 personal conferences and 13 business conferences; met with the Conference Board of Trustees six times; met with the Building and Locations Committee three times, conducted 36 quarterly and special business meetings. We have spoken in every church on a Sunday with one exception and in most of them both morning and evening services; spoke at one church and one parsonage dedication service and organized one new church, also spoke at the evening service on opening day at the new Kirkville Community Wesleyan Church. We have counselled freely with the Advisory Board; worked closely with the Policy Committees of the new churches, endeavored to cooperate with all the pastors and churches in the general progress of the work. Have worked with the Pulpit Supply Committees where changes were being anticipated which presently appear to be very few; worked with the local boards in special problems such as building programs, etc.

We would like to take this opportunity to again express to our Vice-President, Brother Bence, our sincere appreciation for his help and team-work. The counsel and cooperation of the Advisory Board has been a real help; we would express appreciation to our Conference Treasurer, Brother Dietrich, for his efficient work and cooperation. To the Conference Board of Trustees, the Conference Policy Committee and all other committees of the Conference; to the pastors and laymen we are grateful for their fine help and spirit of team-work. To our fine neighbors, Brother and Sister Conley, we say a hearty thank you for their help especially the times we have been away in Conference work for getting our mail, transferring telephone calls, etc. We express thanks to Mrs. Rees who has helped with the secretarial work in the office, shared the problems and joined in definite prayer for the work of the Conference. Above all, to God we express our deep gratitude for His help, guidance, blessing and especially for His protecting care which we felt so keenly this year at the time of our accident for it could have been so much worse.

Together, in whatever capacity we may serve, let us unite in a continued spirit of team-work and earnest prayer and strive to advance the cause of Christ and the Church this coming year.

A meeting of the Policy Committee was called to order June 11, 1962, at 10 a.m. in the Baldwinsville W.M. Church, by the chairman, Dr. David Rees.

A motion was made that Carroll Brentlinger act as the secretary of the committee. Motion was seconded and carried.

Matters discussed were as follows:

1. CONFERENCE NEWS

The committee examined formats of the conferences, considered the format of our paper along with the printing and distribution. Suggestions from our Editor, Harold Kingdon, were read by the secretary.

A motion was made that the recommendations of our Editor be approved with the addition that two men nominated by the Nominating Committee work with the Editor in editing the material for the paper.

The motion was seconded and carried.

2. CONFERENCE MINUTES

The printing of the Conference Minutes was considered, noting that the cost per copy was approximately \$1.00, and the approximate number distributed to the churches - 700. A motion was made that the conference budget be increased by 90¢ to cover the increased expenses for printing the Minutes and other conference items, making the total conference budget \$8.00 (not including Mutual Aid).

The motion was seconded and carried.

ROCHESTER CONFERENCE

3. ANNUAL MINISTERIAL MEETING.

It was felt that the Annual Ministerial Meeting should be continued and should fall on the first Monday in November..

4. DISTRICT MEETINGS.

It was suggested that only one district meeting be called each year and that sometime in the spring.

5. LENTEN-EASTER OFFERINGS.

A motion was made that the Lenten-Easter season offerings be used for local church projects and so stated in the Standing Rules of the Conference.

The motion was seconded and carried.

6. CHURCH PIONEER FUNDS.

A motion was made that Standing Rule No.24 be re-written by the President, changing the name "Pioneer Work" to "Conference Missions"; also, that the same change be made wherever the name is used. The motion was seconded and carried.

A motion was made that a pledge card system be adopted for conference missions as presented by the chairman. Motion seconded and carried.

The consensus of opinion was that the pledge card system would be first presented to the Annual Conference and then to the local churches.

A motion was made that a director be elected who would mail pledge reminder envelopes periodically and quarterly report cards to the conference pastors, who, in turn, are asked to report amounts received from all sources for conference missionary work and channel such monies through the local treasurers as the church or donors may direct. The motion was seconded and carried.

A motion was made that the Conference President and the District Chairmen work out the details of presenting the pledge card system to the local churches.

Motion was seconded and carried.

A motion was made that Conference Missions offerings this year go to the Conference Missionary program which will include Avon and Fyler.

The motion was seconded and carried.

7. CONFERENCE AND DISTRICT ACTIVITIES.

A motion was made that all dates for conference and district activities be cleared through the President's office and that this motion be incorporated into the Standing Rules. The motion was seconded and carried.

8. PULPIT EXCHANGE

A motion was made that we have an exchange of pulpits this year. The schedule to be worked out by the President and District Chairmen. The motion was seconded and carried.

9. CONFERENCE DISTRICTS

The consensus of opinion was that conference districts should not be changed. The missionary districts and youth districts should be worked out by the corresponding societies to their best interests.

10. CONFERENCE MISSIONS MONTH.

A motion was made that September be Conference Missions month and October be World Missions month. The motion was seconded and carried.

11. MISSIONARY ITINERACY

By common consent it was decided that the Policy Committee meet with Dr. Liddick sometime during the conference to discuss the matter of missionary itineracy.

12. STANDING RULES.

A motion was made that a committee consisting of the Conference President, Royal Woodhead and Wesley Nussey rewrite and clarify the Standing Rules where necessary. The motion was seconded and carried.

13. BOOK STORE OPERATOR FOR CONFERENCE AND CAMP.

A motion was made that the President approach the Rev. and Mrs. Gerald MacKinnon

to see if they would be interested in operating the Book Store during Conference and Camp. Renumeration would be set at \$25 or 5% of the sales whichever is greater. The motion was seconded and carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

REPORT NO. 9

Report of the Sunday School Secretary

Your Sunday School Secretary attended the National Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School Convention and the National Sunday School Association convention in Detroit, Michigan, last October. Dr. Paul Kindschi was secured to conduct a workshop and bring an address for our Conference S. S. Rally on June 26, 1962.

Twenty (20) schools showed an increase in average attendance over the previous year. There are seven (7) schools in the group with 100 and above in average attendance, Baldwinville being added this year. There are now seventeen (17) schools in the group with 60 through 99 in average attendance. Endicott, Haskinsville, Odessa and Shady Grove moved up this year. The total average attendance for the Conference increased over the previous year by 106. The average size school is 79.

ROCHESTER CONFERENCE

AWARDS

The three Conference cups are awarded as follows: to Sandy Creek with an increase of 20%; to Baldwinsville with an increase of 24%; to West Jasper with an increase of 28%.

The pastor or other delegate of these schools will each receive transportation in one car to the National S.S. Convention or other nearby Convention. In addition to transportation as specified, each representative of cup-winning schools will receive from the Conference fund \$10.00 toward other Convention expense.

The 10% Ribbon of Merit is awarded to the following seven schools: Baldwinsville (24%); Blatchley (11%); Endicott (25%); Haskinsville (16%); Morris (15%); Sandy Creek (20%); and West Jasper (28%).

THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday School Board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year:

1. Each school in the Rochester Conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.
2. Schools competing for the Conference cups shall be divided into three groups: up through 59, 60 through 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance for the last conference year. A cup will be awarded to the school in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
3. The Pastor or a key-layman of each cup-winning Sunday School may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the Conference Sunday School fund to the National Sunday School Convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday School Board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this will be given \$10.00 from the same fund for other convention expense.
4. The Denominational Perfect Attendance Award System is recommended to the Schools of our Conference.
5. Each School shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of average attendance any four Sundays of the year. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday School session. Persons known to be in attendance at the Sunday morning service of our annual camp meeting may be considered present at their local Sunday School for that Sunday or Sundays.

Report of the Finance Committee

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1962-1963 the expenditures for the Conference Administrative work be approximately \$5,600.00 as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at the rate of \$77.50 per week.
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed expense at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The Conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities of the president.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the fifteen dollar minimum for Mutual Aid.
- E. That the Conference President receive \$300.00 for secretarial work.

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

- 1. The Conference Budget shall be \$8.00 per member of which 25 cents will go for the Chambers Camp expenses.
- 2. The Mutual Aid Budget shall be 50 cents per member.
- 3. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference, \$50.00 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$20.10 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

Pastoral Relations Committee Recommendations

We recommend that a full-time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the Discipline, paragraphs 147-150.

1. We recommend that the conference missionary churches shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, until such time as they shall have assumed the entire responsibility for their indebtedness, and that other missionary churches be under this care by mutual agreement of Church and Conference President. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches and shall be informed of the meetings of these boards with the agenda for the same. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these meetings. The Conference President shall visit these churches as often as necessary to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.
2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism (Conference Missionary Board). This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.
3. The Conference President shall superintend the more-established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year, preferably at a Sunday service, and shall present the needs of the conference and church missionary work. Each pastor shall adjust to the convenience of the President of the Conference so that his visit may be made with the minimum of time and travel.
4. He shall enforce the provisions of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church.
5. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.
6. His conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.
7. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two evangelistic meetings per year outside the bounds of the conference.
8. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.

WE FURTHER RECOMMEND that all appropriations cleared by the Pastoral Relations Committee be referred to the Finance Committee.

STANDING RULES

11. Our first session of Conference shall convene at 9:30 Wednesday morning, the last Wednesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Wednesday after General Conference convenes. The forenoon session shall be 9:30 to 11:30 A.M. The afternoon session, 1:30 to 4:00 P.M.
2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of Conference.
3. The Conference Officials shall receive the following salaries:
 President – \$15.00
 Vice President – \$5.00
 Secretary – \$10.00
 Treasurer – \$35.00
 Y.M.W.B. Superintendent – \$15.00
 They shall receive their board and room during Conference.
4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statis-

tical reports to the Conference treasurer by June 5th. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendents by June 5th.

6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial and other records for the year, May 31st.
7. To receive credit all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 5th. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.
8. It shall be the duty of the local president to forward to the Conference Secretary, who is a Committee on Credentials, not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the Credentials of the delegate from her society.
9. The matron of the Dormitories shall be elected by the Executive Committee. Her salary shall be \$35.00 per year. Her board and room is to be paid during Conference and Camp. She may choose her own assistant whom the Conference will pay \$5.00.
10. The Y.M.W.B. Superintendent and the Conference Treasurer shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper before coming to Conference and the auditor send the report to the President.
11. There shall be a member of the Camp Meeting Committee present to council with the Executive Committee when plans affecting the Camp are being acted upon.
12. All missionaries, General Officers, former Conference Officers, and local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall be seated within the Bar of Conference and given the right to speak.
13. The Conference shall elect 3 members for a committee on committees which shall meet before conference to nominate committees for the organization of conference. The President and Secretary shall be members Ex-officio.
14. The Executive Committee shall act as Orders of The Day Committee. The Secretary shall act as Committee on Credentials.
15. The offerings taken at Spring Conventions and Conference Public Meeting shall be divided as follows: one-third World Missions, one-third Conference Pioneer, and one-third approved project.

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY 1960 - 1961

We recommend:

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first meeting after Conference (5% Credit) and that arrangements be made for one missionary prayer meeting each month. (5%)
2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5%) and at least one public meeting. (5%)
3. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed by the Executive Board, who shall promote the program of the General WMS (5%): that a prayer Partner Circle be formed under the direction of the WWF Secretary, and report sent to the Conference WWF Secretary January 1. (5%)
4. That a Solicitor be elected for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY gaining not less than two subscriptions a year and that she use the Conference Church Key Combination on all subscriptions and that she report quarterly to the Conference Solicitor. (5%) That the President, Secretary, Treasurer and the equivalent of 75% of the active membership be subscribers to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY. (5%)
5. That a mission study secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15. (15%) That 10% of active members read at least four of the recommended books. (5%)
6. That a delegate be elected to the annual conference Woman's Missionary Society and that she pledge as instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5%) and that the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session, be granted the privilege of speaking and provision be made by her society for such representation. (5%)
7. That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the Conference Treasurer and be forwarded to the General Conference Treasurer for the General Fund.

8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.
9. That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference Executive Board.
10. That the newly elected local President or Vice President attend the Conference session and provision be made by her society for such representation. (Ten per cent credit for each of the above items, except those specified, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.

4. That we keep monthly Fast and Prayer Day.
5. That at least half and preferably all the April Self-Denial be designated for Conference Missionary League.
6. That the White Christmas Offering be designated for the Pastor on the Onondaga Indian Reservation.
7. The election of a Mission Study Secretary whose duties shall be: to promote the Mission Study and Reading course; to send the annual report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January; and to form a Missionary library, which shall consist of at least the books in the Reading course.
8. That all monies be sent through the W.M.S. Conference Treasurer: Vouchers permitted for local church work, Community Missions and other objects when necessary. All remittance must be sent by Sept. 5, Dec. 5, Mar..5, and June 5.

9. The observance of Educational Harvest Day with a program and offering (budget); the promotion of Honorary Enrollment; and a contribution to Houghton Library Fund.
10. Payments of \$.50 per active member constitute a W.M.S. Working Fund from which the Treasurer may pay necessary expense (non-budget)
11. That \$5.00 be given for the Camp Building Fund; \$3.00 or more for Medical Fund; promotion of the Mile of Dimes to be used for Mission equipment; and The Card Call Plan. (non-budget)
12. An annual offering to support The American Bible Society. Send to Conference W.M.S. Treasurer.
13. A contribution of \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage; \$5.00 for Australia; and liberal contribution to the support of Church Extension and Evangelism. (budget)
14. That stress be placed on personal evangelism with special emphasis on the Jew. March designated as "Focus" month.
15. The choosing from this list of projects: New items will be credited according to cost; no cash value for used items. Boxes of GOOD clothing for Hephzibah, and N.A.E. Relief; Children's clothing for Onondaga, quilts for camp and needy families, cancer dressings, Canned Goods at Camp - large jars of fruit - \$.45 per quart; jams and jellies - \$.40 per pint; vegetables - \$.35 per quart; dill pickles - \$.25; other pickles - \$.45. Camp needs are: pillow cases and double sheets (colored) single 63" quilts, single blankets, army blankets, medium size plastic waste baskets, large bath towels, large dishpans, dust mops and a cash offering for kitchen equipment.
Africa and Haiti can use baby layettes (essential parts), receiving blankets, bright dress material, embroidery work, S.S. charts, cards, papers, and Flannelgraph; crutches, eye glasses and frames, and dentures.
Evangelical Child Welfare can use baby layettes, and Maternity dresses.
16. That each society inaugurate a program of community service, under the supervision of the Work Director and two other people in counsel with the president. (Needs arising from unemployment, illness, or emergencies.)

Report of W.M.S. Conference President

Greetings to the members of the Rochester Annual Conference and of the Woman's Missionary Society. I wish to praise the Lord for His grace and faithfulness to me during the past year. It has been a busy one, with many opportunities of witnessing for Him. I have been made to realize that the "place" of service is not as important as "being a true Witness" wherever you are. The theme "Ye are my witnesses" was used at the Area Convention last fall. We are repeating it for our Annual Conference. How we need to realize that Christ is depending on each of us - and His cause will only be furthered as we offer Him our selves for His service.

Miss Suzanne Gillmer, Mrs. Elaine Pattington and myself attended the Area Convention at the Middle Atlantic States Conference grounds on August 1-3. Four other ladies attended because of personal desire to be there. We were greatly encouraged with the messages brought to us. The fellowship with others of God's family is always a blessing.

I arranged for the visitation of Miss Hazel Compton to the churches of the Conference during Oct. 25 - Nov. 26. I visited the Taylor W.M.S., at their request on Nov. 8. The members of the executive met for the planning of Spring Conventions and other business at Corning. I attended the Conference Policy meeting at Baldwinsville on June 11. I have sent out five form letters to pastors and local presidents along with the writing of a large number of cards and letters to answer questions from individual people and societies. I have been happy to thus serve the Master and you.

The "White Gift Offering" for the Merz family on the reservation amounted to \$729.81. There was \$115.60 given for the General Project of literature. The April "self denial" for Conference Pioneer amounted to \$1312., while \$114.62 was given for Kingston Canada Church. We have raised the Field Support of both Robert and Norva Crosby for the year of \$2400.

I believe everyone thoroughly enjoyed the ministry of Miss Laura Sells and of Paul and Donna Dekker at the Spring Conventions, which were held at Canisteo, Bentley Creek, Rome and Boylston. A word of appreciation is due the intertaining churches and the District Chairmen, who did such a fine job. The total offering was \$333.26, with a total attendance of 632.

Rev. Malcolm Ellis will be speaking to us at the Public Missionary Service of Conference. Dr. Alton Liddick, World Mission's Secretary, will address us also.

Gains were made by 13 societies in the raising of funds. They are: Bath, Blatchley, Boylston, Canandigua, Canistee, Chambers, Horseheads, Willview, Odessa, Rochester, Shady Grove, Waterloo, and West Jasper. The following 16 made gains in membership: Avon, Bentley Creek, Berrytown, Blatchley, Canistee, Chambers, Elmira, Endicott, Fyler, Haskinsville, Horseheads, Millview, Morris, Odessa, Shady Grove, and Spencerport. The total giving for all societies was \$21,168. This is a gain of \$1008 last year. The total membership stands at 902. Several societies reported a loss in funds. Some have been helping in local building programs, and failed to channel their money through the society and thus receive credit.

The united effort of praying and giving on all fronts is the only way that we can spread the "Good News", and thus witness for Him.

Report of the Conference Magazine Solicitor

It is with disappointment that I present my report to you, for we have suffered a large loss this year. According to reports available to me, 10 societies have had a gain this year while 22 have lost subscriptions. Of those societies which lost, many lost at least 5 and one lost 9. Our total this year shows 612 subscriptions to "The Wesleyan Missionary" while a year ago we had 663 so we lost 51 subscriptions. These are the societies that have a gain: Armenia, Bath, Blatchley, Fyler, Herrickville, Odessa, Pine Meadows, Sandy Creek, Shady Grove and Onondaga. If your society wasn't mentioned, then you remained the same or lost.

I would urge you to be faithful and prompt in sending these in. Some of you have been excellent about this in the past and I have certainly appreciated it.
