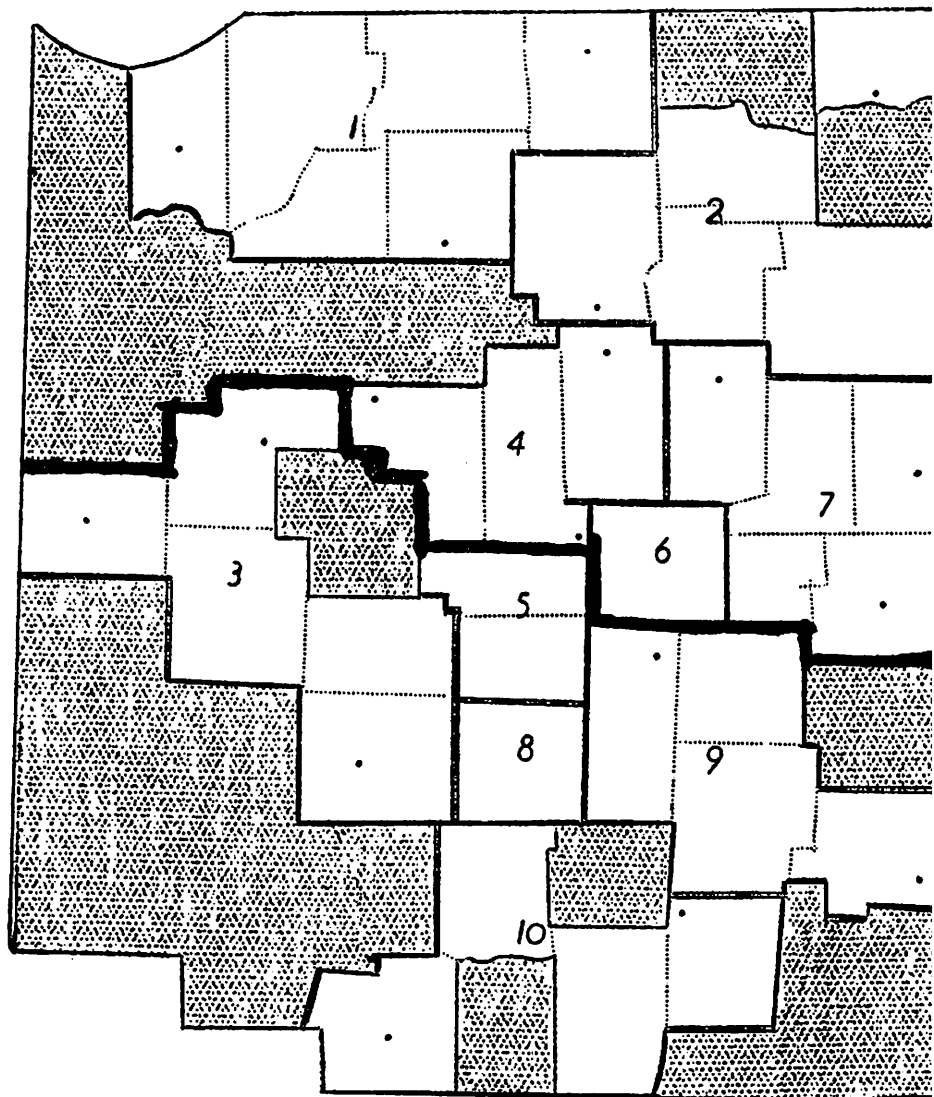

# Resolutions and Laws

## I. CHURCHES

### A. Houses of Worship:

Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or ministers of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain regular appointments for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

### B. Pastoral Support:

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, also the pastor's medical, surgical and hospitalization insurance premium and Social Security. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the service of any one, it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks' vacation with pay.

### C. Pulpit Supply:

1. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. This is not to be interpreted as other Wesleyan Methodist Conferences. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

2. It is recommended that churches giving a vote for recall of their pastor, vote on or between the first and second Sundays of May.

### D. Annual Business:

The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 270 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of May.

**E. Church Council:**

1. It is recommended that each church have a church council which shall serve as the coordinating committee for the entire church program. This council may be composed of the pastor, the S. S. Supt., the church treasurer, the president of the WMS, the president of the WY, the first member of the advisory committee, the chairman of the Board of Stewards, the chairman of the pulpit supply committee and other leaders or committee members as the church may deem advisable.

2. The pastor may call the council together monthly or as many times during the Conference year as deemed advisable. The council may initiate business, make referrals, listen to reports, and serve in an advisory capacity for the entire church program. The Boards of the church shall continue to function as specified by the Discipline and in no way should this council displace any other committee or board nor assume any authority vested in any other committee.

3. When such a council exists, it should be the duty of the council to meet with the conference officials at least one time during the Conference year when the official visits the church to discuss problems and ideas which have to do with the better operation of the local church.

**F. Newly Organized Churches:**

Conference Budget shall not be assigned a newly organized church until one year from the end of the fiscal year in which they are organized.

**II. PASTORAL DUTIES****A. Insurance:**

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire, lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

**B. Statistics:**

1. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee, without fail, by June 10. In reporting statistics, all figures given shall be in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. This applies to all except budget and benevolence items. All unaccounted for members appearing in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported as received.

2. "When a pastor or evangelist shall not have submitted satisfactory

reports, including statistics, he shall appear before the committee on Ministerial Report. In the case of a pastor, when his church's budget is not paid in full, he with the elected delegate shall appear before this committee."

3. Delegates' credentials secured from the secretary shall be mailed to the assistant secretary by the pastor, not later than June 10.

C. Quarterly Meetings:

1. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meetings.

D. Calling List:

1. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

E. Church Extension and Evangelism:

1. When it is possible and deemed advisable by the Church Extension Board, pastors are urged to cooperate with the Board by offering their services in assisting weaker churches who are unable to assume the total cost of special evangelistic help. The church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.

2. All pastors should seek the counsel of the church advisory committee when a revival meeting away from the church is anticipated. No pastor should hold more than two revival meetings away from his charge unless by the consent of the Conference President.

F. Summer Camping Program:

1. All full-time pastors and pastors' wives shall offer their services and be granted time by their churches to help in the Youth and/or Junior Bible Camps unless excused by the President. This would not deduct from vacation, revival time, or salary.

### III. CONFERENCE

A. Conference Officials:

1. There shall be a President and Vice President elected. The Vice President shall assist the President in presiding at the annual conference.

2. They shall be given a two weeks' vacation with pay and shall have the privilege of holding one revival meeting yearly, in or out of the Conference, at a time of their own choosing and for which they are to receive the remuneration personally.

**B. Officials' Duties:**

1. The Administration shall arrange an official visit with each pastor aside from Sunday, for the purpose of counseling, studying the local work, and discussing, as well as giving ideas for promotion in the interest of the local work. The Administration shall meet with the Council or Committee of the local church for the purpose of presenting plans of promotion for the local work when advisable.

2. President—The Conference President shall supervise the entire program of the Conference, being responsible for all matters of a general nature and devoting as much of his time as possible to visitation of the local churches.

3. The Vice President shall assist in the administration and visitation, and shall be responsible for the supervision and promotion of the church extension work of the Conference, under the counsel and direction of the President.

4. The Administration shall meet with the Wesleyan Youth Executive Committee and the Sunday School Board to counsel and to aid them in their work.

5. The President and Vice President shall constitute the executive committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER. They shall be responsible for editing and circulating it. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

**C. Annual Conference:**

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Ind., beginning on the Tuesday nearest July 11.

2. The first Sunday following conference shall belong to the old conference year, and the second Sunday following conference shall belong to the new conference year. This applies to pastoral appointments.

3. The fiscal year begins June 1st and ends May 31st.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. "Effective July 1, 1966, the conference shall pay the hospitalization supplements premium for the Superannuated ministers and their wives who are listed with Medicare and who have received a Conference appointment at the hands of this Conference for ten years previous to their retirement. (Conference appointment shall be understood to consist of pastors, general evangelists, conference evangelists only in full time work, conference officials, general conference officials, or those employed by the Board of Administration.) In case of the death of the minister, his wife shall continue to receive these benefits as long as she remains a widow and a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The Conference shall also pay the hospitalization insurance premium for those superannuated due to ill health as interpreted by the Social Security Administration. The Conference shall pay the hospitalization supplements premium for



widows who have served with their husbands ten years prior to their retirement."

6. The President and Vice President shall be consulted before any love offerings are taken during the annual encampment.

7. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the Minutes as if ordered by this conference.

8. In the election of the President and Vice President, the Secretary and Treasurer, the first ballot shall be the nominating ballot.

9. A citation in the form of a certificate shall be presented to all those who have been appointed by the Conference, and have given twenty-five years of service to The Wesleyan Methodist Church.

D. Secretaries:

1. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary, constitute a committee on communications.

2. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion daily papers and the church periodicals.

3. In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 92, exact budget assessments will be made for each church and mailed to the respective pastors by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of each conference session.

4. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

E. Treasurers:

1. The Treasurers shall submit their reports by June 25, to the Auditing Committee, who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

F. Boards:

1. Board of Conference Extension and Evangelism:

a. The Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of the Conference President, the Vice President, the Conference WMS President, WY President, Sunday School Secretary and two elders and two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year and they shall not serve for more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than Conference President and Vice President be at the same time a member of the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism and the Conference

Board of Trustees.

2. Board of Trustees:

- a. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

G. Salaries:

The Secretary shall be paid \$200.00, Assistant Secretary \$100.00, Treasurer \$600.00, Assistant Treasurer \$100.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$50.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$50.00, the expenses of these officers and the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

H. Minutes:

1. The Conference Minutes are to be distributed with a minimum of one copy for every four members of the church or fraction thereof and that the same be paid for out of the Conference Operating Fund. Additional copies may be purchased at 75¢ per copy.

IV. COMMITTEES:

A. Itineracy and Elders' Orders:

1. The Committee on Elders' Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

B. Camp Meeting:

1. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

2. The Conference President shall be a member ex officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

3. We shall hold an Annual Camp Meeting beginning on Friday night nearest August 11th and to run through two Sundays.

C. Building:

1. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without adequate workman insurance and the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

**D. Nominating:**

1. A committee shall be elected to nominate for the next annual conference all committee members (except chairmen appointed by the President) and all conference officers (except the President, Vice President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer). The elected ministerial and lay members of the nominating committee shall not immediately succeed themselves.
2. Membership of the nominating committee shall be the President as chairman and Vice President, both ex-officio, and two ministers and three laymen by election. The elected ministerial and lay members shall not immediately succeed themselves.

**V. OTHER RESOLUTIONS**

- A. The Indiana Conference heartily supports all standards of the Wesleyan Methodist Church against prevailing worldliness as defined in our discipline, and interpreted by the decisions of our General Church, and disapproves of any tendency to deviate from Bible standards.

**VI. BURIAL ASSOCIATION**

- A. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.
- B. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

**VII. RULING ON AMENDMENTS**

- A. Additions or amendments to the Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference may be made in any meeting by majority vote providing the proposed addition or amendment has been read before the body at least one day previous, or if not previously read, by two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

# Reports

## Report No. 1

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

What this conference year has lacked in length it has supplied in importance. All heaven has rejoiced as precious souls found victory at our altars throughout the conference. New converts have united with our churches and several of our faithful people have gone to be with the Lord. For every trial God's grace has been adequate.

In the conference year there have been several "firsts." Changing to two officials and a full time secretary has meant some adjusting, but has proved to be quite effective. The calls of the officials on the pastors have been a blessing to the officials as well as the pastors. The informal luncheon meetings with the pastors were times of fellowship and inspiration. The Winona Retreat sent many weary parsonage couples back to their work relaxed and confident that God would see them through.

Never in our day had there been a General Conference called one year ahead of schedule to care for important matters of the Church. The 1966 special General Conference produced two important items that will go down in history as milestones in Wesleyan Methodism.

1. **Merger.**—The vote of 130 to 33 approving merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church bespoke the spirit of unity which marked the conference. The Pilgrim Holiness Church also approved union by a vote of 250 to 75. We Wesleyans have two more votes to be taken. The Conferences will express themselves and then each local church is to vote within 90 days following the annual conference session. It is envisioned that the merging General Conference will be held in about two years. May we continue to seek God's guidance as we face the great task which lies before us.
2. **New Pension Plan.**—Of great importance to our ministry was the adoption of a new Pension Plan, with an overwhelming vote of the lay delegates, as well as the ministers. The Equitable Life Assurance Company agreed to accept all the liability of the former Pension Plan and permit our ministers to build credit years at a cost very little more than it would have been necessary for us to pay to keep faith with our now retired ministers. The new plan is a non-contributory plan and thus laymen and ministers will join tithe and offerings in building a sense of security for the ministerial needs of the Golden Years of life. I will gladly contribute \$7.00 per year to aid my brethren in reaching this goal and thus show my appreciation for the Wesleyan ministry. We believe every Wesleyan will gladly join in this great work.

We congratulate the Sweetser Quiz Team on winning the State, Area, and General Conference play off. They worked hard and they represented us

well. Thanks so much, young people. We thank God for you!

It has been a joy to work with the Rev. C. A. Hoover as he has served so well as vice president. Mrs. Juanita Hoover has served as office secretary and has greatly assisted in carrying the load we men could not do.

The construction, opening, organizing, and dedication of the Fort Wayne, New Haven Church were highlights in the Conference Extension Department. Mishawaka's growth has gladdened our hearts as reports of victories keep coming in.

Eleven months filled with blessings, trials, victories, loss, work, praise, tears, labors of love, sorrow, joy, disappointment, but most of all the presence of God. This is life! Not all joy, but enough of God to insure final victory.

We have sought to carry out the assigned work in the fear of God. We love our task and appreciate God's people, laymen and ministers. We are laborers together! In conjunction to the presidency we have served in various other related assignments which, we trust, have helped enlarge the Kingdom of God.

5. That one day a week be set aside as a day of fasting and prayer for revival in every church this conference year.

## B. Conference Budget:

The Conference Budget shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer as undivided Budget at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages: (All churches whose regular Sunday school offerings and regular church offerings and tithes average the following per week for the month shall remit as indicated).

- Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7%
- \$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8%
- \$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9%
- \$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10%
- \$200.00 and above shall remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

- 62½% for Conference Operating Fund
- 22% for Conference Extension
- 9½% for Camp Meeting
- 3½% for Conference Youth Work
- 2½% for Conference Sunday School Work

## C. Budget to Conference Treasurer:

All church budget excepting that raised by the WMS and the YMWB, and

the Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

**D. Adjusting of Funds:**

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and if, in the conference year, there shall occur a deficit, the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to raise the Conference Budget 1% for the balance of the year.

**Item II. Re: REMUNERATION OF OFFICIALS**

The salary of the President shall be \$6800 per year, plus hospitalization insurance, Social Security, and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water conditioner and sewage); and that of the Vice President shall be \$5800 per year, plus hospitalization, Social Security, and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water conditioning, and sewage); the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expense incidental to their work. Travel expense shall be paid at the rate of 7¢ per mile. The Administration shall employ secretarial help as needed. These items shall be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

**Item III. Re: RECOMMENDATION:**

WHEREAS, the full-time pastorate is of necessity for the growth of the local church, and

WHEREAS, at such time the church reaches this goal the pastor will be committed to devote himself to the full-time work of the church,

WE RECOMMEND that the Administration when advisable shall meet with each pastor and local Board of Stewards for the purpose of setting a full-time salary for the pastor. This agreement must be reviewed periodically.

## Item X. COMMITTEE PROCEDURE

1. All persons eligible for authorization must have passed at least two books each year on the Course of Study, or have completed the Course, and must be appointed as pastors. (Paragraph 267 (2-6). These examinations must be taken by June 15.

According to legal opinion obtained by our Conference President, persons are advised that, if they perform marriage ceremonies without proper authorization, they are subject to a fine and imprisonment.

2. In order to be continued in the Course of Study, a Local Preacher must make an annual report to the Committee by June 15, and have passed at least one book by that date.

3. In order to be a Conference Preacher, a person must pass at least one book and report on his studies and labors to the Committee by June 15. It is understood that one is a Conference Preacher only when appointed by the Conference to definite pastoral or evangelistic work. (Paragraph 267 (1) ).

4. In order to receive credit at the annual session of the Conference, a person must have passed his examinations before June 15. All grades, transcripts, and reports are to be sent to the Committee by that date.

5. A recommendation of a Local Preacher to travel under Conference Direction is valid for one year. If work is not assigned at the Annual Conference session, the person is left in the hands of the President for appointment. If no appointment is made, there must be a renewal of this recommendation before the next Annual Session.

6. The Committee asks that all recommendations to study or travel or for special workers be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than Tuesday of each Session of Conference.

7. Except with special consent of the examiner, all persons pursuing the regular Course of Study will be required to pass the books listed in the 1966 Discipline and to use the current materials provided by the Church.

8. Beginning with 1965 all books on the Reading Course must be reported on forms provided by the Committee.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

I. DOCTRINAL:

Be it resolved that the Indiana Conference reaffirm its adherence to the Constitution of the Church with both laity and clergy giving particular heed to discipline paragraph 52 (3) "The conditions of full membership are—Acceptance of the Articles of Religion, The General Rules, The Elementary Principles, and the authority of the Discipline in matters of church government."

That we adhere to the Elementary Principles as the basis of law and order among us.

That the Special Directions of the discipline be our guide in spirit and in practice as we avoid evil, do good, cultivate spiritual life.

Be it further resolved that whatever constitutional structures these matters take, that they be preserved and nourished among us in Christian Charity.

II. SPIRITUALITY:

With our theme as a Conference, "Evangelize Now", let us lay a spiritual emphasis upon all members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church to study, and educate ourselves and practice personal evangelism in Revivals, special surveys, Sunday Schools, and in every day living.

In as much as we are living in a day of spiritual lethargy, we urge our people on to a deeper spiritual life by attending all the services of the church, with more emphasis upon prayer meetings and the Sunday Evening Evangelistic Services.

**III. MORALS:**

Since the evil influences of sin and immorality are so vividly placed before our youth and children today, we urge our people to use extreme caution in the selective use of television and printed literature. Furthermore, we recommend that our people properly dress as becometh children of God.

Whereas the tendency prevails to make Sunday a "Holiday" instead of a Holy Day, we emlore all of our people that by protest, precept and practice, they shall endeavor to demonstrate to this materialistic generation how God intended this day to be observed.

**IV. MISSIONS:**

Because of Christ's command "to go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" and since many are yet unevangelized, we urge a greater effort to be made to increase our missionary giving, the budget to be the minimum.

We further admonish the church to reevaluate the dispersing of funds in an attempt to give to missions so as to major on the true mission of the church.

**V. COOPERATION:**

Be it resolved that the laity exercise full cooperation with the Pastor in matters of Church Loyalty—Regular attendance to all services, systematically giving of tithes, willingness to help bear the burdens of others, readiness to except responsibility, and all work to one end, that is to please God rather than self.

# Daily Proceedings

The seventy-seventh annual session of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Indiana Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the Wesley Service Center on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana, July 12, 1966.

Tuesday, July 12, 8:30 a.m.

**PARTIAL REPORT OF PLAN OF WORK**—The Committee on Plan of Work gave a partial report.

**COURTESY**—The Courtesy Committee presented the Rev. and Mrs. Kingsley Ridgway and Mr. Keith Golding from Australia, who brought words of greeting and expressed appreciation for the faithfulness of the WMS to both the Australian and the New Guinea fields.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To the members of the 77th annual session of the WMS of the Indiana Conference, Greetings!

Again, the good providence of God has permitted us to make another report—a report of your work and mine, for this is a two-fold record.

With humble hearts we enumerate the achievements of the past year, fully conscious that it was by God's help that such were accomplished. "To Him be the glory, great things He hath done."

In many ways we have had a fine year. Our missionary magazine subscriptions have increased. Numerically, we have gained, our total membership having made a net gain of 140. At the present rate of gain in active members, had General Conference come at the regular time, we would have been eligible for another delegate. Financially, basing our figures on an 11/12 of a year, we have made a gain of \$3,071.88. Spiritually, there are reasons to believe that we have made progress. Seldom does a church or missionary organization go forward unless there is a spiritual awakening. I am praying that there shall be more of a spiritual awakening in our churches this coming year.

There were eight special projects promoted this year: Bogota Church building in South America, equipment for the Bogota Church, church building for Haiti, General Fund for Sierra Leone, West Africa, Studio Equipment

for Marion College, the new church building in Albuquerque, New Mexico, Staff House at Union Biblical Seminary in Yeotmal, India. The total amount raised for these special projects was \$11,086.64.

Dormitory 14, had a face lifting last fall. All the walls have been painted; new beds, springs and mattresses are added features to these rooms. Much credit is due Loucile Wniterholter, our vice president, for her untiring efforts in getting this work done, but I cannot stop here for had it not been for some faithful men and women in our conference that came and donated some labor it would have been a much harder task to have completed.

Reverend and Mrs. Paul Dekker, missionaries to Sierra Leone, West Africa, will be with us Wednesday evening in our Missionary Rally. Missionary Dekker will be speaking for us at this time. Reverend and Mrs. K. M. Ridgway, missionaries to New Guinea, will share their experiences with us during our meetings on Thursday.

Our new Quadrennial theme "Fruit Unto Life Eternal" has a two-fold meaning. Fruit for the person next to us—fruit for the whole world—the harvest of grain that reaches to the end of the world. May we, in these three days of conference, feel a new awakening toward others. May there be such a challenge thrust before us that we shall go back to our various societies to bear and to gather "Fruit unto Life Eternal."

Motion—A motion was made that we amend the Ways and Means report, I Rallies, J. 1. to delete everything after the word "full". It was carried.

Motion—A motion was made that we adopt the Ways and Means Report with its amendments. It was adopted.

Motion—A motion was made that we adopt the proposed changes of the Standing Rules. An amendment was made to use the words "may be invited" instead of "shall be invited" II. C. They were adopted.

# Standing Rules

We, the Committee on Ways and Means recommend the following:

## I. AREA

- A. The Area President is to receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.

## II. CONFERENCE

- A. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Conference shall meet at the site of the annual conference; the first session shall convene at the call of the chair and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- B. The President shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the annual conference.
- C. That there be a standing committee of three teenagers elected each year to meet at least three times during the year to aid in presenting teenagers' ideas to the WY Executive Council. The first member elected will be the chairman of the committee and may be invited to sit in on the Executive Council meetings, with no power of vote.
- D. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to complete the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- E. The Wesleyan Youth Treasurer shall pay from Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of fifty dollars toward the expense of printing the Minutes. The Wesleyan Youth Secretary shall cooperate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- F. The Ways and Means Committee for the coming year shall be nominated by the Executive Council prior to the first session of the youth conference and shall be elected during the conference and shall meet at least 60 days before the next youth conference.
- G. Copies of the Report of Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed within 30 days after the close of the main conference, one copy to each district chairman, pastor and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.
- H. There shall be a Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee of seven members. The Executive Council shall be members ex officio; the president of Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman of said committee; the other three members to be elected for a term of three years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

- I. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall be seated as members of the conference.
- J. There shall be a Youth Camp and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- K. The Youth Camp Committee shall be authorized to make available the recreational equipment during conference and camp.
- L. The Executive Council of Wesleyan Youth shall be authorized to assist pioneer projects.
- M. The Executive Council shall provide for at least a biennial Youth Convention.
- N. All pastors shall be granted the privilege of sitting within the conference bar and speaking on any question. Pastors of Wesleyan Youth age will be voting members of the conference and shall be authorized to vote and hold office on the district level, and if a member of a local WY, may hold the office of district chairman.

### III. DISTRICT

- A. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all District Chairman semi-annually.
- B. Each district shall elect an Adult Counselor to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

### IV. LOCAL

- A. All organized locals shall keep permanent records of membership. This list shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- B. All organized locals shall keep permanent records of finance in the WY Treasurer's Book (to be obtained from Wesleyan Headquarters).
- C. That all monies raised for budget and special projects be sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer within 5 days after the close of the conference fiscal year.
- D. All churches shall send their Delegates' Credentials and Statistical Reports to the secretary at least 30 days before conference convenes.
- E. The President shall submit a written report of the spiritual and financial status of the local to each regular quarterly business meeting or every third monthly business meeting of the Church.
- F. The local president shall consult with the pastor when making out his annual Wesleyan Youth Report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- G. The Executive Council of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- H. The General Wesleyan Youth Efficiency Standard is to be adopted and promoted and each local rating is to be reported in the annual statistical reports.

INDIANA WESLEYAN YOUTH  
REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means recommend the following:

## I. RALLIES

- A. That the district chairman be a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- B. That the district chairman be responsible for the rallies, and that written notices of said rallies be sent to the local church pastor and Youth president, and to the Conference Youth President at least two Sundays in advance in order to promote closer cooperation between the district chairmen and the president and the pastors. Rallies should be held at least quarterly.
- C. That the rallies be Christ-centered, providing an occasion for the propagation of Christianity and for fellowship among the locals.
- D. That the district chairman call a meeting of the local presidents, pastors, district officers, and the district adult counselor within 60 days after the rise of the Conference for the purpose of planning district youth rallies for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the Conference Youth President. If the district chairman fails to call said meeting, or fails to fulfill his district responsibility, these responsibilities will then be assumed by the Conference Youth President.
- E. That a special youth rally be held in each district during the months of April or May for the purpose of promoting the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp.
- F. That the following point system for district banner be adopted:
  1. Local president 10 points, or vice-president 5 points.
  2. All officers (including president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer) present 5 points.
  3. Pastor present 10 points, or adult counselor 5 points.
  4. Each 2% of active members present, excluding those in the armed forces and college, unless present, 1 point (Total possible—50 points).
  5. Each associate and non-active member present, 1 point.
  6. Each mile traveled from the local to the rally site, ½ point.
- G. That a loving cup be passed to the local and the award be based on the percentage of subscribers to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH as to the number of active members, plus the number of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH. (Divide the number of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH by the number of active WY members, and add the number of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH.)
- H. That the Conference print and distribute to the locals suitable blanks to implement the point system.
- I. That a State-wide Youth Rally be held on the Fairmount Camp-ground on Friday night of youth camp week. The Executive Council



and the Youth Camp Committee shall share the responsibility of this rally.

- J. That a plaque be presented to the outstanding local in the Conference, reading: "First in Excellence, Indiana Wesleyan Youth, year 1967." This plaque to be presented at the State Youth Rally, and upon presentation to the local becomes permanent property of that local. Choice of the local will be made by the Executive Council on the following point basis:

1. Budget for past 2 years be paid in full.	25
2. The district banner and/or loving cup must be obtained at least twice during the year.	25
3. Participation on local, district, and conference projects.	20
4. Diligence in reporting Delegates' Credentials and Statistical Reports within at least 30 days before conference convenes.	20
5. Local holds Certificate of Organization and current validating Seal.	10
6. One service per month, or 25% of total yearly services held in the interest of missions with an offering for missions to the Conference WY Treasurer.	25
7. One educational service with an offering for education.	15
8. One point for each percentage gain in membership. (INDEFINITE)	
9. Youth Week observed and reported to General Wesleyan Youth Office and conference youth president within three weeks after local observance. A Youth Week offering must be forwarded to the Conference WY Treasurer within three weeks after local observance.	25
10. Subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH must total 125% of the total number of active members.	25
11. All local monies paid at least quarterly to Conference WY Treasurer.	15
12. A systematic Bible Study plan.	15
13. 100% participation in a Scripture memorization outside of Youth Week or one verse per month.	20
14. Average attendance equal to active and associate membership.	15
15. Participation in district and conference activities with at least 2 "YT" entries on the district level.	25
16. Participation in Wesleyan Youth Readers' Club.	20
17. Participation in Wesleyan Youth Bible Quiz to district level.	25
TOTAL POINTS -----	INDEFINITE

## II. LOCALS

- A. The local president shall be responsible to see that each proposed member fully understands the membership pledge and that each active and associate member signs a membership card. No one shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.
- B. That the local president, adult youth counselor and sales manager shall be responsible for promotions of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH.

- C. That the local president shall be responsible for promoting projects suggested in Section III, Projects, paragraph 8.
- D. That the local president shall report ideas gathered from his local for the strengthening of the Conference youth program and Youth Camp. These recommendations shall be mailed within 30 days following the rise of the annual Conference, to the Conference WY president.

### III. PROJECTS

- A. For Conference project we recommend the following:
  - 1. That the Executive Council be responsible to promote the Bible Quiz program and to provide the information to the local presidents of such.
  - 2. That there be a contest designed to encourage Christian talent among Wesleyan Youth and that it be called "Operation 'YT'". (Operation Youth Talent).
    - a. That the said project include:
      - 1. Vocal solo
      - 2. Vocal group
      - 3. Piano solo
      - 4. Brass solo
      - 5. Brass group
      - 6. Woodwind solo
      - 7. Woodwind group
      - 8. Other instruments solo (excluding piano and organ)
      - 9. Other instrument group (excluding piano and organ)
      - 10. Reading
    - b. The following rules shall apply:
      - 1. Teens (13-19) only shall be eligible.
      - 2. All contestants shall be a member of an Indiana Wesleyan Youth Local.
      - 3. No contestant shall enter more than two divisions and only once in each division.
      - 4. All entries shall be Christian in nature.
      - 5. Personnel, entries, and instruments cannot be changed between district and state competition.
      - 6. Each contestant shall be introduced by a master of ceremonies, but each contestant shall introduce his own entry publicly.
      - 7. All entries will be limited to ten minutes.
      - 8. All entries shall be judged on the basis of personal appearance, communication, poise, originality, technique, choice of number, Christian attitude, respect of time, blend, and memorization.
      - 9. Each entry shall submit a copy of their selection to each judge.
    - c. Judges
      - 1. There shall be 3 judges.

2. Judges shall use a standard score sheet provided by the Conference WY Executive Committee.
  3. Judges shall not compare choice until each division is completed.
  4. It is further recommended that judges be secured from music studios—(professional musicians, music teachers, band or orchestra directors, and other qualified judges.)
  5. Score sheet shall be returned to contestant after the contest.
  - d. Contests
    1. The district contest shall be conducted during the youth camp promotional rally.
    2. The state contest shall be conducted during youth camp.
    3. The first place winner in each division at the district level shall be eligible for state competition.
  - e. Awards
    1. District awards shall be certificates provided by the district.
    2. Appropriate state awards shall be selected by the Executive Committee.
  - f. The Executive Council shall be responsible to promote "Operation YT" and to provide the information to the local president.
  3. The State Wesleyan Youth sponsor a Youth Week in a pioneer church using the finalists in "Operation YT", Bible Quiz, and Youth Officers. That this be a State work under the approval of the Board of Conference Extension and the pastor of the pioneer church.
  - B. For locals we recommend the following:
    1. That the local plan and promote the interests of the Bible Quiz and "Operation YT".
    2. That it plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local, such as jail services, shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, and radio programs.
    3. That it plan, with the pastor, for a project within the local church.
- IV. FINANCE
- A. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
    1. President—\$150.00
    2. Vice-President—\$100.00
    3. Secretary—\$100.00
    4. Ass't. Secretary—\$25.00
    5. Treasurer—\$100.00
    6. Youth Camp Committee Members—\$25.00 (To be paid from Youth Camp funds.) Said salary to be paid in equal payments on November 1 and May 1.
  - B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer be paid from the Youth Conference Budget and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from

the Youth Camp Treasury, and that said expenses be paid quarterly. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of 7¢ per mile.

- C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:
1. General assessment, \$2.00 per active member and \$1.00 per Associate member of the local.
  2. Honorary membership, \$ .50.
  3. One-fifth of the conference budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the discretion of the Executive Council.
  4. That there be a Youth Conference working fund assessment of 50¢ per active member.
  5. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the Conference Secretary within 30 days of rise of the main conference session.
  6. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the Conference.
- D. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference budget and working fund for general promotion of the youth work.
- E. That all monies raised by the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth budget.
