The Fifty - Fourth Annual Conference of the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was called to order by the Conference President, Rev. V. O. Agan, in the tabernacle of the camp grounds at Camp Eden, St. Clair County, Alabama at 11:00 A.M., Tuesday, August 6. 1963.

Song service was directed by Rev. Wardner Medders. Rev. Neal Phipps, representative from Brainerd Indian School, Hot Springs, S. D., led in prayer. Rev. G. B. Vernon, Jr., delivered the Conference Sermon using Isaiah 32: verses 13 and 15 for Scripture text. The service was closed with prayer around the altar.

FIRST MEETING, TUESDAY 1:30 P. M. AUGUST 6, 1963

Devotional was conducted by Rev. Paul Brown reading from Exodus Rev. G. P. King led in prayer.

Conference President was authorized to appoint an Insurance Committee to study needs of Conference Insurance program. It was decided, by vote of conference, that this committee be composed of equal number of laymen and elders.

Recommendation to the churches that vote on pastor be held not later than the 2nd Sunday in June was approved.

The Alabama Wesleyan Methodist are the most noble people existing. You have been kind, considerate and surely my words of appreciation are due you. You have overlooked so many blunders of mine and still have loved me fervently. Let us be tenderly true and faithful until Jesus comes.

I have been out of the Conference two days more than I was allowed for revivals. For this I apologize and ask forgiveness. I have turned into the Conference fund \$251.00 from my salary.

I wish to express to you and all members and friends of our Churches our sincere thanks for your prayers throughout the year - without prayer all would have been a failure. The warmest word of appreciation is given my advisory Board, Rev. E. L. Shigley & Bro. W. O. Finnen for their counsel and help.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM REPORT NO. 8

Whereas; Christianity does not consist merely in outward conformity to standards of conduct—as good as they may be—but in an inward and personal experience of Divine grace which makes one a new creature in Christ Jesus, we would most earnestly urge every Wesleyan to live in the constant assurance of saving and cleansing grace.

In order that true morality may be maintained we would insist that a family altar be established in every Wesleyan home, that every member of the church be faithful in constantly and consistently attending all the services of the church, and in the practice of private Bible reading and prayer.

Inasmuch as morals are related to dress and conduct we would most earnestly request that we give attendance to the discipline as relates to doing whatever is done in word or deed be done to God's glory and in Christ's name.

We would urge the women to dress plainly and modestly in attire that decently covers the body, maintains the distinction of the sexes, upholds the standards of holiness, & calls attention to our Christian profession.

Inasmuch as the use of jewelry and outward ornamentation encourages pride, destroys humility, and is one of the marks of a God-defying and immoral age, we would reaffirm the need for the cultivation of inner adornment and the exclusion of the outward finery.

We further reaffirm our belief that the inner glory is reflected in outer conduct and that long hair for the women is a protest against a God rejecting world which sets its abbreviated styles. We believe long hair is a woman's glory and is becoming to her holiness testimony.

Inasmuch as the average T V program does not build Christian character nor influence the lost to seek the Lord; and inasmuch as many programs are definitely destructive of spiritual ideals and character, we would urge our people to refrain from purchasing and viewing television for Jesus sake.

The further encroachment of Communism, Catholicism, worldliness, and modernism, will bring a continued lowering of moral standards. We would most earnestly persuade the people called Wesleyans to beware of the slightest inroad of that which may be questionable; to pray for those in places of political and ecclesiastical leadership; and to do all in our power to maintain the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace so long as no convictions or principles are compromised.

Earlier, we brought to conference body letters to President Kennedy and U. S. Senators. These were approved and we have dispatched same. (letters not printed).

REPORT NO. 13 REPORT OF TRUSTEE TO CENTRAL

The world is engulfed with a drowsy, care for nothing attitude, and it has rubbed off on the church, as though it would be better red than dead. Statesmen are tired, and those who are still fighting must grow weary battling against every odd that invades the horizon.

So many problems look you in the face if you are a Bible Believing Christian. First, there are the plain holiness fighters, then the holiness rejectors, and then the holiness condoners.

The Church has many times struggled to a re-awakening. This re-awakening is not promoted by the majority, but by a small minority who usually are willing to pay an utmost price.

In the centuries past, God has a good many times raised up a good, pure church to propagate His message. In the propogation of this message, nearly every Church that I know anything about has begun educa-tional institutions to properly instruct in doctrine, workers and leaders for the church. Men need to be instructed in doctrine and prictice to properly lead the church. This is right and good and none of us would have it different. Thank God for the Institutions of learning.

Our Wesleyan Methodist Discipline states: "We are aware that most great moves away from the simplicity of the gospel and away from the fundamentals of the faith in the various churches have had their beginnings in the school systems and we believe that it mut be insisted upon that all our schools should function to produce TRAINED WORKERS FOR THE CHURCH." (Caps. mine).

In which direction will Central go? Will it continue to move toward a confirmed state of culture -religion in which there is little difference between it and the world — or on the other hand, will it move in the direction of a deepened spiritual vitality? The question is not 'in what kind of religious climate will our grandchildren have', but what will our Children have?' is it formal and cold, or warm and vital? There are forces pulling both ways. There are contrary forces influencing Central's direction. There are two factors that could determine Central's directions and movement: 1. The winds that blow on the surface and, 2. there are the deep undersurface tides moving silently and inexorabley - this controls directions to a great degree.

The history of the drifts in the schools of churches goes back for many years. It seems that if a school is true to its beginnings for 25 years, that is about normal. Central has stood far longer than that, for which we thank God. I refer now to a specific school that I could name if necessary. (I have tried to stay out of the realm of personalities and names in this report.) This particular school used to have the old time Holiness preachers and the president, at that time, said that he would not be president unless he could use that caliber men as evangelists. Many sought & found God at the altars. Years have passed, & the drift struck it a smoker was installed. Dancing came into the school. (You say horrors, but keep your mind open to this.) The man who was president of the school in its early days still lives and has been maintained on its Board of Trustees and he told me recently that he had resigned from the board because the present president now persisted in having dances and my friend could do nothing to get this matter corrected. Just months ago a report came to me that 5 or 6 young ladies from that school went to an M. D. at one time for abortions. Once a Holiness School but now a hull. A strong institution of learning, yes, operating a smooth program - on she goes. There is a judgment coming.

Twice I have spoken on the Board at Central trying to caution its Board of Trustees that we as trustees stand in danger of doing just what other boards have done for other schools - sell them out to the world. I, as your representative, have tried to represent your interest as I thought you wanted me to as a majority. As long as I am there I will represent what I believe the majority of you want - or I will be gentleman enough to resign. I am afraid that we of the Board of Trustees are gradually selling out to a worldy program, that one day will shock us all.

The problem, mainly is not in the student body realm, not in the rank or file of the students. But the basic problem is in the rank of Trustees. For instance, not more than six months ago a dear brother came to me and said, "I want you to forgive me for my actions on Central's Board when I was on it. I did not understand the situation and I voted wrong & am sorry. I had been talked to, but now it just goes to show how shallow they are who talked to me." I believe that he was sincere. I feel that he was sorry that he had misunderstood some things & I accepted his apology in good faith.

I am vitally concerned at the way we are losing the battle a rung at a time. We as the Board of Trustees got on the matter, some meetings are, of television, and its relation to Central. Someone of the same convictions as I, was pointing out is evils, and that it fostered immorality. Someone on the opposing side suggested that if we are to get rid of things that have an evil use then we had better get rid of the automobile, for they are ______ houses on wheels. We didn't get rid of televisions at Central. I understand that some may have them. I have not stooped nor snooped, but I understand some of Central's family may have them.

May I make this clear here? I have never told any pastor or church - nor have I advised them against paying their educational budget. I have said do what you can but don't trangress your conscience. I would also say that no man in Alabama would be happier than your representative on the Board of Trustees of Central Wesleyan College if I could say to you. 'come on boys let's push - let's get our prospective preachers to Central'. But can we conscientiously do that - when they have had instructors who go mixed bathing? A man held the watch for a faculty member (no longer on the faculty at Central) told me about that and I did not pick it. I have never picked anyone to pull out of them things that reflect on Central - but I have heard a good deal at times without asking anyone.

At a Board Meeting the President of the School brought up a vital issue. He reported that several students had gone to ball games without permission. He stated that it was not possible to give permission, for a few meetings previously we thought that it was settled that campus students could not attend off campus sports such as this. The President reported that those attending had been dealt with and had promised to abide by the rules when they had left the office. When the President asked the Board to consider this matter of ball game going, it seemed to me that it was a long shot in the dark, but to my surprise it was not a shot into the dark.

Sometime ago, I read and studied an article in the publication Christianity Today, by V. Edmond Edman. May I quote from the May 12, 1958 issue: "The danger of irresponsibility to ones' constituency can be avoided only as a Christian College maintains its Christian convictions and continues on its appointed course. With conscience toward God & man, it must maintain the faith of the 'fathers' and its faithfulness to its friends. The Christian College would do well to nail its colors to the mast and then to be true to those colors.

"There is more danger, that a Christian College will drift off course than make definite decisions so to do. My study of American Colleges leads me to the conclusion that deviation from Christian persuasion and principle always begins at the top. That is, spiritual decay starts in the trustees and administration, and not in the student body. It is therefore of greatest importance that Christian colleges exercise care in admitting only committed and conscientious Christians as trustees and officers of the College.

"It is imperative that the Christian College know itself, the HERI-TAGE OF ITS PAST, and the Christian persuasion of its founding fathers, & stand PROUD thereof, in the right sense. Each generation ought to consist of Christians who are true to themselves and especially to the Saviour. Well did Solomon make the observation, "Remove not the ancient landmark which thy fathers have set."

When the matter of the ball game going was brought up, it seemed that some felt that if we are going to get students, then we have got to adjust to that direction. One member of the Board said that he hoped his son would come to Central, but he was quite sure the son would not come with the prohibition on ball game attendance. A good number of the Trustees attend ball games and one said that when he got fired and tense he found it relaxing just to let his hair down and attend a ball game.

Brethren, would you believe that 13 men, Holiness men, when the smoke cleared away - had passed a resolution permitting the students to attend ball games? If I do not want my child to attend then, I must sign a statement forbidding his attendance at ball games and then they will not let him attend.

I read the Discipline at that meeting: "We are aware that most moves away from the faith start in the school system, and that the primary objective for having Church Schools is to train workers for the Church" I have heard, it seems, more talk about getting students and accreditaiion and training for teachers - than I have heard of trying to turn out Holy Ghost baptized preachers with a burden, vision, and compassion that can give the clarion call, in the last days of the Message of Jesus Christ.

On it goes to its destiny - time will tell - short hair - bobby socks -sleeves too short - a little jewelry. I have heard of a little wearing of shorts on campus - swimming, how that since the school has a lake that boys and girls have different days, but a boy life guard is on duty, so I am told, and the thought is that the lifeguard was a profession (this part of report was written across a two year period) ball fields, since some of the money from the campaign was marked for other improvements, an O. K. has been given to spend money preparing the athletic field - attending organized ball games - television. But I know and understand that church loyalty lets you say nothing about these things. I give this report with the sense that this may cost me dearly - but its off my heart to you. Lets all try to get to heaven.

I have held speaking my part perhaps when I should have spokenbut I do not desire to harm our area school. If I have delayed too long, forgive me. I have not opposed accreditation; I do not now oppose that. However, the Christian College, with a God given commission, must be itself, not a pale copy of some publicly supported college or university. We, on the Board, have heard a good deal of what others are doing, and the spirialing cost and every time they are asking for more, and more money, and it seems that they must have it. While offering education on the highest academic level, it must remain thoroughly Christian in it's philosophy of education, it's practice and it's objectives. In it's determination of it's policies, it must persist in it's application to current problems. That is, it must determine it's size, it's basic organization, it's curriculum, and it's graduation requirements, while above all, maintaining a high spiritual standard for their entire college family.

If I felt free to indulge in personalities, I could tell you some more things, but I must not. Just one thing here, a faithful and good pastor said to me that his children would have been better off if they had never gone to Central - he has several reasons for saying that I am sure.

I know that I am bringing to you the deepest conviction of a very important cross section of the Alabama Conference and perhaps of the Southern Area.

One problem merely graduates into another. When the drift strikes there seems to be no end to it. Just a little more here and a little more there, and soon the drifting element is doing their utmost to stifle the element who are trying to stand by the 'stuff'. Brethren whether there is any thing we can do except try to do right, I do not know. I do know that those on the board who have made a good and noble stand have felt the end is not yet.

Just at the last Board meeting, a request was sent in to the Board for permission to wear certain type of athletic attire while playing basketball. This is one more rung in the entire battle.

It is such a grief to see the area school on the drift. Some may not seem to see it, but its very clear to me and to many across our zion. The old time saints are groaning. Many seem to think that this program is spelling progress.

Dear Brethren, this may be a part of the total program in preparation of the coming of the bridegroom. To my judgment when the drift struck there were some who wanted to do right and be right. But to travel with the program, it seems to me, some have changed their convictions that they once had. Brethren, do you think that I could make a change from my position and not know it? I am making no plans for a change! I believe there is help for those who will sweetly, devotedly & clearly stand for the right and in the right spirit. Now I know when any one raises a voice along these lines, immediately someone cries out 'be careful'.

As I have told the Board, I tell you. In our school system, it is beyond me how we have come to get in the shape we are in with our discipline reading as it does. I suppose I need more help from the Lord than most people, but I find I have to pray much to keep the fire burning in my soul.

I would like to stay true to Jesus and let the world know I'm His.

Be it Further Resolved: That a committee be appointed to make a special survey to study the needs of a workable program of the Alabama Conference that will also permit our younger men to become members of a pension plan.

REPORT NO. 17 REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

We, your committee on Ways and Means offer the following recommendations:

1. That the "Conference Budget Fund", consist of the following items: Presidents Salary, Conference Missions, Conference work, and Pastors Insurance Fund, and that the budget assignments be as follows: Conference Budget Fund \$6.50 per member; Conference Parsonage \$1.50 per member; Conference Sunday School 5c per member of main school; General Budget; World Missions \$2.00 per member; Church Extension & Evangelism \$1.50 per member; Education \$4.00 per member; Pension Plan \$3.50 per member; Children's Home 35c per member; Administrative Budget \$1.70 per member; General Conference Expense & Entertainment \$50 per member; Australia 25c per member; Brainerd Indian School \$.25 per member; General Sunday School Work 20c per member in main school; Board Meeting Expense 15c per member; and Wesleyan Seminary Foundation 30c per member.

2. We recommend that each church pay the travel and registration expense of the pastor and delegates to the annual conference.

3. We recommend that the conference president be paid a salary of \$3,600.00, travel pay of \$800.00, and all utilities for the conference year. These payments to be made from the Conference Budget Fund.

4. To clarify the duties of the conference president we recommend that he devote full time to the work of the conference which includes the administrative and promotional duties of this office. We further recommend that the president visit each church of the conference on a Sunday during the year, and that he hold one quarterly conference, and other quarterly conferences by invitation as time may permit; for each church of the conference during the conference year.

5. We recommend that the conference President be permitted to hold two (2) revivals outside the bounds of this conference during the conference year. With regard to revivals held inside the bounds of this conference & pioneer work, we recommend that the president work under the direction of the Conference Board of Church Extension.

6. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer not do any deficit spending from the conference Budget Fund in excess of one months operating expenses without the approval of the Church Extension Board.

7. We recommend that each pastor of the Conference work with his Board of Stewards to adopt a systematic monthly basis of paying the budget.

8. We recommend, that the Alabama Conference petition the General Eoard to grant relief by leaving the Pension Plan assignment at \$2.00 per member and that a special offering church wide be used to make up the deficit status of the Denominational Pension Plan.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

During the Conference year I have spoken a number of times in behalf of Sunday School work and written several articles to the Alabama Wesleyan.

I ordered one each of the eighteen adult Aldersgate teachers and scholars quarterlies and a selection of Sunday School tracts which I presented at the Fall Youth Convention; and also arranged for three class-

sented at the ran routh convention, and also arranged for three class-es to be taught during the Sunday School at camp meeting. Many have expressed appreciation for the nature of the material which is being furnished by the general Sunday School Department; however, there has been some objections to having to pay the I. C. R. E. for the Scripture selections which is used in the I. C. R. E. curriculum. It is hoped that in the not too distant future the holiness bodies may be able to publish a complete series of material. It is encouraging that Aldersgate material is already being supplied for three of four of the class divisions.

The general Sunday School department is to be commended for the proposed plans to present a series of studies in Welesyan beliefs. We are happy that a study of the doctrine of sanctification is planned for one quarter next year and a V. B. S. course is being offered in 1964.

Each Sunday School is encouraged to order a set of the WETT course immediately, and to begin a teacher training course in the areas of study most badly needed.

The Sunday School secretary and his board recommend that the Thanksgiving offering be taken for an extension of Sunday School work as suggested by the general Sunday School office. It is further recommended that a Conference Sunday School Convention be planned for October 26, preferably in the Birmingham area.

The Sunday School secretary is hopeful that a Sunday School Library may be enlarged this year with several each of the books on the WETT series included.

2. Committee Reports. All reoprts of committees shall be made in writing and handed to the secretary at the adoption by the conference.

3. Sunday School. Sunday School shall be held at the camp on Sunday of the Camp Meeting and those attending the camp ground groups will be counted as attending in their respective churches. That all Sunday Schools under the Wesleyan Pastors be counted in their statistical reports.

4. Credentials. Each annual conference preacher, shall present his credentials at each annual conference session for renewal and proper signature. Paragraph 170 subdivision 2 of the Book of Discipline 1959 Edition shall be adhered to in renewing authorizations of annual conference preachers.

5. Illness or death. The Secretary shall be notified by telephone in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home and he shall mail notices at once to each pastor.

6. Financial Year. The financial and statistical year of each church shall close with June 30th each year & all receipts and budget money be mailed to the Conference Treasurer not later than July 15th with a completed pastor's report.

All pastor's reports not in hands of the Statistical Committee by the first day of conference shall be omitted from the Statistical Report.

7. Ministerial Labors. The patsor's labors shall terminate with the Sunday following the close of annual conference session.

8. Moving Pastor. Each church shall make provisions for the moving of the incoming pastor, either by paying moving expenses or providing way to move him.

9. Vacation. The Conference President and all pastors shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay. with one Sunday absent from their pulpit.

Also that the pastor have the privilege of holding two revival meetings each year, as arranged between him and the church.

10 Conference Entertainment. Each member and each visitor to the Annual Conference above 12 years of age shall be required to pay \$2.50 for entertainment purposes and children between the ages of 6 and 12 shall pay \$1.25.

11. Marriage. No minister may perform a marriage involving a divorcee except in cases where thorough investigation reveals that the divorce has been on Scriptural grounds. This does not prohibit the remarrying of persons who have been divorced from each other.

The Alabama Conference believes that the use of the wedding ring ceremony in holy matrimony and the wearing of the wedding ring is a violation of both Scriptural admonition and our Book of Discipline. We do hereby voice our opposition to this practice and sincerely request the ministers of the Alabama Conference to refrain from conducting such weddings.

12. Resolved that we, the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, declare our opposition to the present trend of drift toward worldliness as evidenced by the mad rush for earthly possessions, the immodesty in dress such as wearing of slacks, sleeveless dresses, shorts and other apparel which do not conform to Scriptural standards of decency, and the adorning of the body with jewelry and rings including the wedding ring, and the practice of wearing short hair among the women. We, therefore, do earnestly request that all our local churches comply with this expressed standard. It shall be the duty of our pastors and ministers to support this standard rule.

13. In the judgment of the Alabama Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effects upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The Principles of Wesleyan Methodism — being the epitome of the Christian religion — obligates Wesleyan Methodist to an unblamable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore we must request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs, for Jesus' sake.

Since Paragraph 39 of the Dicipline declares: "It is the duty of all ministers and members of the church to maintain godliness and to oppose all moral evil." And since ministers, especially, are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Alabama Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid this which menaces vital godliness.

Inasmuch as these resolutions expresses the will of the Wesleyan Methodists of Alabama, in conference assembled, and inasmuch as the Ministers of the Alabama Conference are obligated to comply with each of the Standing Rules of the Conference (see paragraph 141, section V, subsection 4) we request that these rules be considered by the Committee on Ministerial Character before the Ministerial Character blanks are endorsed.

Be it further resolved that no one be asked to preside over our Conference Sessions that is not in harmony with these rules.

14. Be it resolved that each district of the conference be represented on the nominating committee of the conference. Be it further resolved that no member, except the Conference Pros-

Be it further resolved that no member, except the Conference Prosident, shall be eligible to succeed himself on the committee. The Conference President shall be co-chairman.

15. When the Conference President is elected Editor of the Alabama Wesleyan, he is to be granted the privilege of choosing the Business Manager of the paper.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

We, the Resolutions Committee, wish to submit the following report:

1. Recognizing that the return of holy conviction, spiritual worship, and Bible standards is the hope not only for our personal salvation but also for the survival of our nation and believing that God has raised up the Wesleyan Youth for this purpose, we would earnestly urge that every Wesleyan Youth resolve to aim constantly at pleasing God and promoting deep spirituality through constant Bible study, a consistent prayer life, and a complete abandonment to the will of God which would be shown by a complete separation from all worldliness. II Corinthians 6:17-18.

2. We suggest, in the light of the looseness of dress in the present age, that we refrain from the wearing of immodest clothing. I Peter 3:1.5.

3. Since jewelry is definitely unscriptural, we feel that our young people should refrain from wearing of jewelry in any form, including the wedding ring, class ring, and the like. I Peter 3:3, Isaiah 3:16, 4:1.

4. According to I Corinthians 11:1-16 we believe that the practice of women cutting their hair is against God's Word.

5. We recommend that we honor the Lord's Day by faithfully attending all services and refraining from buying and selling, joy riding, picnics, parties and other ways of descerating the Sabbath. Exodus 20:8.

6. We observe with great alarm the degrading tendency of the television and movies and recommend that our young people refrain from the viewing of them and attendance of ball games, carnivals, professional all-night and Sunday afternoon singings, & other ungodly attractions that would hinder us in striving for deeper spirituality and a closer walk with God. Psalm 101:3.

7. We recommend that our young people abstain from mixed bathing.

8. We recommend that our young people do not use tobacco or alcoholic beverages in any form.

9. We resolve that the young people of the Alabama Conference set aside one day a week for a prayer and fasting program.

10. We strongly recommend that our youth delegates be at least 15 years old, and that they be elected according to the standard of the Wesleyan Methodist Dicipiline, keeping in mind that to be a delegate one must be an active member and to be an active member one should be a Christian.

11. We also suggest that the conference secretary send a copy of these resolutions to each local society, and that the copy be read and explained by the adult counselor of each local.

12. We recommend that our young people strive to have a clear witness of being saved, sanctified, with a real determination to stand true to the Lord.

13. We resolve that at each first session of youth conference, there be a nominating committee of four members elected, who will meet with the conference president and nominate the executive counsel of Wesleyan Youth. Two nominations will be made for each office.

PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

We, the Planning Committee, wish to submit the following report: We recommend that some reward of recognition be chosen by the Executive Council and be given to the society having the largest n imber of points according to the General Efficiency Standard. We further recommend that the sum of \$30.00 be paid to the Wesleyan Youth President, and \$15.00 each to the Secretary and the Treasurer for the past conference year.

District Organization: The Alabama Conference Wesleyan Youth shall be divided into five districts which shall be called Southern, Central, Western, Eastern, and Northern. The Southern District shall be composed of the following locals: Active, Columbus, Ga., Montgomery, Prattville, Selma, Stanton, and Jemison Mission. The Eastern District shall be composed of Anniston First, Anniston Norwood, Golden Grove, Harpersville, Pell City, Talladega First, Talladega North Street, and Sylacauga. The Central District shall be composed of Bessemer, Birmingham First, Cordova, East Lake, Ensley, Jasper, and Springdale. The Western District shall be composed of Ada Chapel, Brent, Fairview, Friendship, Greensboro, Tuscaloosa, Waycross, Mt. Ivah, Wesley Chapel, and West Blocton. The Northern District shall be composed of Fort Payne, Glencoe, Mt. Carmel, Mt. Zion, Nixon Chapel, and Mentone.

The Minutes of the Annual Convention shall be published in the Minutes of the Alabama Conference, and they should be in by August 1, and the efficiency standard shall be included if possible. The Annual Conference shall be reimbursed for doing so.

The treasurer's books shall close fourteen days before the annual business meeting and all the local annual reports shall be sent to the secretary fourteen days before the annual business session. These shall be checked for accuracy concerning dues and turned over to the Chairman of the Statistical Committee.

Each Active member shall be assessed \$2.35 to be divided as follows: \$2.00 for general dues, \$.25 for conference dues, \$.10 for area dues. Each Associate member shall be assessed \$.50 to be divided as follows: \$.40 for conference dues and \$.10 for area dues

The Budget assessments shall be paid from the treasury of the locals as deemed advisable.

We recommend that the Youth Conference be held during the Annual Camp Meeting of 1963 and hereafter it is to be held during the Annual Camp Meeting.

We recommend that the Executive Council plan that the Youth Chapel be built this year with the approval by the Camp Meeting board, and that Rev. Norman Brush be the technical adviser.

We also recommend that local society be assessed \$25.00 for the project.

We recommend that a Fall Missionary Youth Convention be held at the Camp Ground during August 10 - 31.
