Conference Resolutions

Section 1. Conference Officers

- 1. (a) We shall have a traveling Conference President, who shall receive house rent and \$5200 annually, \$300 of which shall be applied on his utilities. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month, beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finances, and other affairs that affect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary and to urge that adequate remuneration be given Evangelists for their services. He shall visit each church at least once annually. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. He shall be granted a four weeks' vacation with pay.
- (b) His traveling expense at .07 per mile or actual train or bus fare, also his telephone, long distance phone calls pertaining to Conference work, desk and secretarial expense, shall be paid from Conference incidental funds. The Conference shall assist the President to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to half of his social security assessment on his salary as President, such gift to come from Conference President's Salary Fund.
 - (c) He shall be Custodian of Deeds.
- (d) There shall be a full-time traveling Vice-President. His duties shall be to assist the Conference President in carrying out the program of the Conference and the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism in the field of Pioneer Evangelism, and in the General Administration of the Conference work. This shall include evangelistic campaigns on mission points and in other churches of the conference as time and duties permit.
- (e) From Conference Pioneer Funds, he shall receive living quarters, telephone and desk expense, travel expense, and a guaranteed salary of \$4500, \$300 of which shall be applied on his utilities. His offerings from evangelistic meetings on pioneer points and in organized churches, including all monies handed to him while engaged in these meetings, shall apply on his guaranteed salary. He shall be granted the privilege of holding one evangelistic campaign during the year either within the Conference or elsewhere, which shall not apply on his guaranteed salary. He shall be granted a three weeks' vacation with pay. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot.
- (f) The Conference shall assist the Vice-President to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to half of his social security assessment on his salary as Vice-President, such gift to be paid from the Conference Pioneer Fund.
- (g) There shall be a Second Vice-President who shall labor without salary. He shall serve in an advisory capacity and as Chairman of a

3-member study committee. The responsibility of this committee shall be to study the duties of the Conference President and make recommendations to the Annual Conference concerning ways of relieving part of the President's work load.

- 2. (a) The Conference shall be divided into six districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth, and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exceptions of a Central District composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware, Union, Ross and Pickaway Counties, and the Wheeling District bounded on the west by the Western County lines of Carroll and Harrison Counties extended South to Willow Island and directly east from Willow Island to the Allegheny Conference Line.
- (b) The Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of the Conference President and Conference Vice-President, and six additional pastors, one from each of the six districts of the Conference. These six members shall be nominated by the Committee on Pastoral Relations, and shall be elected by ballot. In presenting these nominations at least two names shall be submitted from each district.
- (c) The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall meet at the beginning of the Conference year to formulate policies and lay general plans for the conduct of the Conference Pioneer work during the year. The actual carrying out of these plans shall be in the hands of Executive Committees which in each district shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference Vice-President, and the District man. The full board may meet at any time at the call of the Conference President and the Vice-President. Desk expense, telephone calls and mileage or fares incurred in the Pioneer Work shall be paid from the Conference Pioneer Fund.
- (d) The six district men, under the direction of the Conference President, shall assist him in his Pioneer duties, and shall organize the pastors in various districts for pioneer work. They shall designate one Sunday as a Pioneer Day, on which day the Pastors shall exchange pulpits to bring a pioneer message and raise offerings and pledges for the work unless by vote of the entire Board an alternate plan may be used.
- (e) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from the Conference Pioneer Fund.
- (f) The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to cooperate by granting their pastors a two-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.
- (g) The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism and the Conference Board of Trustees shall jointly administer the Conference Building Aid Fund.
- (h) Activities of the Board, with the amounts of salaries guaranteed and the amounts invested in each project, shall be reported to the Conference annually.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of ten members, six ministerial and four lay to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements, and the making of complete

arrangements for Camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. The President of the Conference shall be an ex-officion member of the Camp Meeting Committee and presiding officer of the Camp Meeting Session. This Committee shall designate one of its members as Chairman, another as Secretary, and another as Treasurer. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the Conference minutes. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This Committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of Conference buildings on the Campground.

- 4. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Ohio Conference to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the Conference as provided in the book of Discipline, paragraph 120, and 384-389. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:
- A. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of a like character when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio Annual Conference, or to any church within the Conference needing funds to liquidate Conference, church or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (this writing is to become a part of the permanent records of the Trustees), and that both the President and Trustees of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable. Whenever money is borrowed for use of a local church, the local church shall agree to be responsible for its payment.
- B. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the Conference, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of the Conference President, a majority of the total membership of the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.
- C. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said Trustees, provided the sale of such Conference property, church or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his advisory board.
- 5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .07 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees from the Conference Pioneer Fund and the Conference Incidental Fund, to the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism from the Pioneer Fund, and to the Camp Meeting Committee from the Camp Meeting Treasury.

- 6. Resolved: that there be a Church Building Loan Fund to be loaned to the churches for building purposes, this fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts, annuities and the budget item included in Conference Work, said fund to be administered by the Conference Trustees, and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees. Not more than 20 per cent of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use, the interest to be figured at 3 per cent for the total length of the loan and paid back at the rate of not less than 1 per cent of the total per month. Special short term loans of less than one year can be made at 6 per cent interest.
- (a) All notes to churches shall be drawn up according to the general form given in the Minutes of 1940.
- (b) There shall be a Pioneer Loan Fund under the administration of the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism and the Trustees as per Conference Resolution 4 (b). All loans from this fund must be approved by both Boards.

Monies borrowed for this fund shall be at the best available rate of interest and shall be secured by straight notes signed by both Boards.

These funds are to be reloaned only for Pioneer Real Estate and buildings. The total amount of each loan shall not exceed 75% of the estimated value of the completed building. The appraisal to be made or approved by the combined Boards. The interest charged on these loans shall not be more than the interest paid on monies borrowed for this fund.

Repayment shall be made at the rate of 1% per month on the total amount of the loan. These payments shall be made at least semi-annually and shall pay interest to date with the balance to be applied on the principal. The payments shall be made by the local group unless the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism specifically assumes that responsibility.

Section II. Annual Conference Session

- 7. (a) The annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.
- (b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.
- (c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and Camp.
- 8. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.
- 9. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as lay delegates to Conference shall be able to attend the entire session.
- (b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegate's Credentials; including the following items: certificate of election, address of delegate, the Pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.

- 10. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the Conference treasurer a signed statement of all budget monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.
- (b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the Pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.
- (c) The W. Y. reports submitted to the Annual Youth Conference shall be the basis for reporting W. Y. membership on the pastor's statistical blank. The W. Y. President shall, soon after the close of Youth Camp, mail each pastor a signed statement with membership information for his annual conference report.
- 11. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: MONDAY: 7:30 p.m., Communion Service and Conference Sermon; TUESDAY: 9:00 a.m., Opening Business Session; 1:30 p.m., Tithing Secretary's Address; 7:45 p.m., Sunday School Hour; WEDNESDAY: 11:00 a.m., Denominational Address; 1:30 p.m., Election of Officers; 7:45 p.m., Pioneer Service; THURSDAY: 10:00 a.m., Educational Service; 1:30 p.m., Evangelism Service. (Note: Immediately following adjournment in the afternoon, caucus meetings shall be called to nominate District Prayer and Evangelism Leaders.); 7:45 p.m., Missionary Service (conducted by W.M.S.); FRIDAY: 1:30 p.m., Memorial Service (when necessary); 7:45 p.m., First Service of Camp Meeting; SUNDAY: Morning, Ordination Service.
- (b) The annual session of the Ohio Wesleyan Youth Conference shall be held on the fourth Monday in June and the following four days, in connection with a Youth Camp.
- (By special Conference action due to General Conference year, the Youth and C.Y.C. Camps will be held at the following times:

Youth Camp — June 17-21,1963 C.Y.C. Camp — July 9-12, 1963

This arrangement is for this current year only.)

- 12. (a) The members of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall be elected by ballot.
- (b) All persons who feel that they have completed the Disciplinary requirements for ordination shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders on the first day of Conference, and all others pursuing the course must appear not later than the third day of Conference.
- (c) The Committee will continue to adhere strictly to the intent of the Disciplinary rules pertaining to the course of study. Any person who fails to pass at least one book each year will be referred back to his quarterly Conference. This committee will give only written examinations which must be taken in the presence of some designated examiner. No candidate may hope to receive credit in the current year for any book, who fails to take examination before July 15.

- 13. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to June 30. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.
- (b) In accordance with paragraph 165.4 of the Discipline, the term of church officers shall coincide with the church fiscal year.
- (c) The W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B. books shall close on June 20. (All monies to be credited on current year's budget must be in the respective treasurer's hands by this closing date.)
- (d) The Conference Treasurer's books shall close on July 5. (All monies to be credited on current year's budget must be in his hands by this date.)
- (e) The Treasurers of the W.M.S., Y.M.W.B., and the W.Y. shall report to the Conference Treasurer by June 30 the total amount contributed for budget items by each church.
- 14. There shall be a three-day Ministerial Convention for inspiration, instruction and fellowship held twice each year, meeting at the various churches by invitation and opening on the fourth Tuesday of March and the fourth Tuesday of October, with the exception that on alternate years we shall cooperate with the Marion Area Ministerial Conventions. The officers of the Convention shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary-Treasurer, and a Reporter. There shall also be a Planning Committee consisting of a chairman, the Conference President, ex-officio, and three elected ministers. The duties of the committee shall be to plan programs, publicize the Conventions, and have general oversight of them. All officers of the Ministerial Convention shall be elected by ballot at the time of the Spring Convention and shall serve for a term of 2 years.

All money for expenses shall be raised by free-will offerings during the conventions.

It shall be the duty of each minister with Conference appointment to attend these Conventions unless providentially hindered.

Section III. Churches and Pastors

- 15. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:
 - (a) Attend the annual Camp Meeting.
- (b) Remain on the work he is appointed to for the whole Conference year. Any pastor leaving the work during the year shall not have his character passed except by vote of the Conference.
- (c) Cooperate with the stewards in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.
- (d) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.
- (e) Be sure all Conference preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.
- (f) Submit monthly reports to the Conference President on prepared forms, and also return monthly report blanks to the Sunday School secretary.
- (g) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

- 16. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:
 - (a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.
- (b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the last Sunday of Camp Meeting, and grant him a 2-week vacation.
- (c) Pay traveling expenses and room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference. We recommend that the expenses at conference of each General Evangelist be paid by the church of which he is a member, such expenses to include travel expense for a distance not to exceed that from his home church to the conference.
- (d) We recommend that each church assist its pastor to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to at least half of the social security assessment on his salary as pastor.
- (e) We recommend that at the beginning of the conference year each church in cooperation with the pastor authorize through its Treasurer and Board of Stewards the payment in ten equal monthly payments, beginning in September, that part of the Denominational and Conference budgets not expected to be raised by auxiliary groups.
- 17. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee; they shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee; the matter of such reports and agreements shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.
- 18. The Committee on Pulpit Supply shall conduct the vote on retaining the pastor not later than June 1st, giving the required two weeks notice in advance. The chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Supply shall immediately inform the Conference President of the results. If the vote is for a change and the pastor so desires, his name shall be placed on the list of available men. The list shall be sent to churches requiring the same on or after June 10, and pastors desiring to be included on that list must notify the Conference President prior to that date.

Section IV. Standards of Practice

- 19. (a) We recommend the use of Associate Membership as a probationary membership for all adults who are received into the church on confession of faith.
- (b) We recommend and urge all our pastors and churches to receive into JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP all boys and girls who give evidence of being genuinely converted, that they be baptized, and that they be given a course of instruction by the pastor in the doctrines and standards of our Church. (Discipline, Par. 73, Sub. (2).
- 20. We, the Ohio Conference, declare our opposition to worldly practices and adornment. We believe that the wearing of the wedding ring is a violation of the scriptural injunction against the wearing of gold, which is not purely utilitarian in its use, because the wearing of the

wedding ring encourages the wearing of other superfluous ornaments and adornments. We, therefore, do earnestly request that all our local churches comply with this expressed standard. It shall be the duty of our pastors and ministers to support this resolution.

- 21. We require that all workers, preachers, and singers at Children's and Youth Camps, Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves below the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 22. In the judgment of the Ohio Conference the common use of television is an impediment to the development of holy character. Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Ohio Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, by not owning or permitting a television set to be brought into a church parsonage or minister's residence.

Section V. Amendment of Conference Resolutions

- 23. The Conference shall elect annually a standing Committee on Resolutions whose duty shall be to submit to the Conference suggestions for revisions or additions to the standing resolutions of the Conference. It shall be empowered to submit such suggestions relative to:
- (a) Revision of standing resolutions from time to time as need may arise in order to make them consistent with each other, with other legislation enacted by the Annual Conference, and with any changes which may be made in the Discipline by action of a General Conference.
- (b) Revision or amplification of the standing resolutions to define details required to implement any action of the Annual Conference.
- (c) Preparation of new or possible new resolutions under instructions from Annual Conference.

 The Committee shall not have power to initiate suggestions for resolu-

The Committee shall not have power to initiate suggestions for resolutions dealing with entirely new business. Such suggestions may be acted on by the committee only under instructions from the Annual Conference.

Report No. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Christian greetings to the ministers and lay members of this fifty-fifth annual session of the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

These are days that try every fiber of a man's soul. God will have a tested and tried people for the bride of His Son and to that end the pressures in these last days are tremendous.

These are also good days to prove to a lost world that God's marvelous grace is really sufficient. I am glad that I am a born again, sanctified son of God. I am really delighted that He saw fit to call me to the Christian ministry. I rejoice that His good providence has allowed me to serve Him through the Wesleyan Methodist Church in the Ohio Conference. I sincerely regret that my service to God and to you has been so faulty and inefficient.

In attempting to accomplish the task assigned by the last Conference, I have visited and preached in all of our churches and missions at least once. I have, to the best of my ability, tried to judiciously administer the work of the Conference. I have held revivals and week end meetings, including a ten day meeting in Puerto Rico, as time and energy would allow. I have counseled with both preachers and laymen in our various churches and have sought, both by example and exhortation, to push and promote the work of God within our territory. As your representative on various boards and committees I have made ten trips to Marion, Indiana.

In all, I have traveled better than 20,000 miles and preached 146 times in the glad service of my Lord and Master. From the Conference Treasurer I have received \$4500.00 in salary, \$108.00 on my social security payment, \$987.25 in reimbursed travel expense, \$238.06 for phone expense and \$50.00 for desk expense. Parsonage rent was credited at \$840.00, and I received for special meetings and gifts — \$273.00, fees — \$20.00, and donations — \$12.00.

August 10

Appointed Roy R. Straub as supply pastor at Africa. Appointed Edsel Trouten as supply pastor at St. Albans.

September 1

Appointed Kenneth Martin, Sr. as pastor at Piqua under the Church Extension Board.

September 30

Appointed Walter E. McKee, Jr. as pastor at Dayton Oakridge.

November 3

Upon recommendation of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, I received Roy R. Straub and Edsel Trouten as Conference Preachers

Appointed Edsel Trouten pastor at St. Albans.

Appointed Roy R. Straub pastor at Africa.

November 28

Accepted the credentials of Elder Roy D. King, surrendered at my request.

April 30, 1962

Granted Elder Everett Wildman a transfer to the Indiana Conference. May 5

Received Conference Preacher H. M. Ratliff from the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and referred him to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders for examination and classification. Appointed him as a Conference Evangelist.

May 15

Appointed Kenneth Teter as a Conference Evangelist.

July 6

Appointed Roy R. Straub and Gene E. Stanley to the Auditing Committee.

July 10

Accepted the resignation of Leslie D. Wilcox from the Resolutions Committee and the Committee on Committees. Referred these vacancies to the Committee on Vacancies.

July 22

Deaconess Nellie Ellis should be removed from the roll. She is no longer a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Death

March 8, 1962

Death claimed Unstationed Elder Leonard A. Smothers. A memorial service will be held later in this session of Conference.

Dedications and Organizations:

October 8, 1961

Conference Vice President, Donald E. Howard, was in charge as the Sherrodsville Wesleyan Methodist Church was dedicated to the service of our King. This wood frame building gives a very neat appearance and its carpeting, pews, drapes and interior lighting harmonize beautifully to help create a very worshipful sanctuary. Their indebtedness is approximately \$5000.00. The Rev. Walter G. Friedley is their pastor. November 26

A remarkable job of converting the old tabernacle into an excellent

new stone church was completed as Coshocton dedicated their house of worship to the Lord. The interior of their sanctuary is lovely and worshipful with its laminated arches and natural wood finish. The church office, pastor's study and Sunday School rooms are all excellently done and functional. Their indebtedness is about \$25,000.00. Rev. Thomas E. Phillippe is their pastor and also served as contractor, carpenter, electrician, etc.

July 10, 1962

Organized the Pleasant Wesleyan Methodist Church with eleven charter members and three junior members. This work has been under the direct supervision of the Conference Vice President.

July 11

Organized the South Parkersburg Wesleyan Methodist Church of West Virginia, with nine charter members and one junior member. Appointed David J. Rodgers as pastor under the direction of the Church Extension Board.

July 13

Reorganized the Piqua Wesleyan Methodist Church with twenty charter members and one associate and one junior member. Appointed Kenneth Martin, Sr. as pastor under the Church Extension Board.

In addition to the actual dedications, St. Marys obtained a parsonage for their pastor, Norwood is about to complete a major addition to their church, South Zanesville will soon complete their sanctuary, the first unit in Pleasant Chapel's building nears completion, and New Rome is in the process of building a parsonage to be used as their meeting place.

We are ministering in a pagan society that is morally and spiritually bankrupt.

May God save us from aping them either in their attitudes or actions. May God save us from monkish isolation that merely withdraws to our creeds and cloisters.

May God save us from hopeless, faith crippling despair that just assumes — we can do nothing about it.

May God save us from wasting our time and energy in loveless criticism and cannibalism.

Bishop Marston declares that orthodoxy and piety are the two banks of the stream of power from above. Without piety we would have but the marsh of worldliness. Without orthodoxy we would have the marsh of fanaticism. Our chief danger is to be without His power that comes only with a personal Pentecost until even though the banks are intact, we are powerless with only a form of godliness.

May God indeed help us to maintain right beliefs and to hold to scriptural standards and also to have enough power within those proper banks to turn some wheels and to minister effectively even in these last days.

Report No. 2

VICE-PRESIDENT

To the ministers and laymen of the 55th session of the Ohio Conference, greetings in Jesus' precious name.

We submit the following report of the labours of your Vice-President during the Conference year just past. This report includes a financial statement of Pioneer Evangelism income and disbursements.

First of all, we wish to register our praise and thanksgiving to God, who in His all wise providences has strengthened us for the battles and the toils of this year past, and for the visitation of His Spirit in revival fire upon the Pioneer field. To Him be all the honor and the glory forever. AMEN!

We also wish to thank all, both members and friends of the Pioneer Evangelism plan, who by your prayers and financial support in both gifts and loans have made possible the progress made this year. Without your co-operation, nothing could have been accomplished.

We have traveled a total of 24,148 miles, of which 17,300 miles were charged to Pioneer Evangelism. We conducted one three-week campaign, two week-end meetings, three funerals, had various other services, and visited the Pioneer points as much as our labours and time permitted. A good portion of our time this year has been given to establishing the Pleasant Chapel work in Marion.

Three churches have been organized this year: Pleasant Chapel with eleven full members and three junior members; Parkersburg with nine full members and one junior member; and Piqua with twenty full members, one associate member and one junior member.

One point was closed this year due to certain local circumstances; that of Hooverson Heights, West Virginia.

Three church buildings are now under construction: Pleasant Chapel, which is nearing completion of the first unit; New Rome and South Zanesville.

Our opportunities and open doors are many and urgent. The Board is recommending that the Mt. Carmel-Tobasco work be made a major project this year with a full time pastor and a building program. This project will require our best in co-operation and sacrifice if the goal is to be realized.

The challenge is to our vision and faith. "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us," therefore let us press on to possess the land. In the words of Nehemiah, "The God of Heaven, he will prosper us; therefore we his servant will arise and build." Nehemiah 2:20.

Report No. 8

SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Members of the Fifty-fifth Annual Ohio Conference Greetings in Jesus' Name.

In I Peter 4:7, we read, "But the end of all things is at hand: be ye therefore sober, and watch unto prayer." These are very timely words as we meet in this conference session. We are aware of the world turmoil. Politically, the nation is in jeopardy. War clouds hang low. Communism and Catholicism strive for mastery and to take our freedom; bringing even heavier burdens than are now already felt, with the high cost of living and ever increasing taxes. In some areas already Holiness Camps have felt the pressure from groups laying tax claims to the property. What will the end of these things be?

Not far behind comes the Modern Church, a cultured so-called Christianity that is hardly more than a social club or a business organization, and is far from being a God Ordained Religious Institution. One man made the statement, "The Church no longer needs the Holy Ghost, but needs men, money and education." What a sad day when men who profess to be Spiritual Leaders go so far as to make such statements! Brethren, in these days of Apostacy, we need men who are dead to self-interests, filled with the Holy Ghost, with a real compassion for the lost; men who seek to obey God rather than man.

The ever increasing crime rate is most alarming. Low moral standards are shocking, with the children, teenagers, and adults' minds being filled with the trash coming into many homes by way of T.V. and salacious literature. What a tragedy when the ministry keeps silent on such, and compromising churches raise no voice of protest, and when many parents apparently see "no harm" in such things, or feel any responsibility to safeguard the home against these present day evils! Brethren, we need to "Cry aloud and spare not!"

As to our activities in the Department of Evangelism, I regret that so little has been accomplished. No contacts were made with any of the District Chairmen. I ask you to forgive me for not at least writing you and encouraging you to push the battle in prayer and district rallies to seek for the revival we need. I have no knowledge of any rally this year, but trust you have had them.

These rallies on Evangelism were not intended just to add another wheel to church machinery, but to help our people to humble themselves in fasting and prayer for the revival we must have if we survive. I did not get material to the Editor of the Conference Messenger for an article on revival each month, but trust you read the articles that did appear. We thank the Editor for his cooperation in publishing these articles.

I appreciate all of you who have been faithful to pray for me as I have tried to serve as Secretary of Evangelism in the past. As this Conference session relieves me of this responsibility, I would decline any future consideration. However, I pledge myself to join with you in prayer for a revival in our Conference and connection. Don't fail to pray for the Evangelists of our Ohio Conference. We need this support. The battle is on, but the Captain who has never lost a battle leads on. Let us keep true to the end. It may not be long. Respectfully Submitted,

Report No. 10 CONFERENCE TRUSTEES

We, your Conference Board of Trustees, submit this report of official actions taken during this Conference year:

Victory Campground, Galena, Ohio, August 3, 1961. Reorganization meeting. Donald C. Fisher, Chairman, R. J. Stratton, Secretary; additional members of the board: Harry McQuigg, Walter E. McKee, Ernest Massie, Clarence A. Wright, Donald E. Jaycox.

Gave approval to the borrowing of \$3,000 at 5% for three years from James A. Ross and/or Grace Ross by the Campmeeting Committee to be used to purchase land west of the present bounds of the campground as per former action taken by the Camp Commmittee and Trustees.

Gave approval to borrow \$1,000 at 5% for three years from James A. Ross and/or Grace Ross by the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism to be used by the Pioneer Loan Fund. This Fund to be responsible for repayment of principle and interest.

Victory Campground, Galena, Ohio, August 4, 1961. Authorized a grant of \$500 from Conference Building Aid Fund to New Rome Church to assist in construction of a parsonage type building as a tentative place of worship.

Authorized a grant of \$500 from Conference Building Aid Fund to assist in purchase of two lots, 112 ft. x 300 ft. each, on Smeltzer Road near Pleasant School south of Marion, Ohio as site of a new Pioneer project.

Westerville, Ohio, August 17, 1961. At the call of the Chairman and by special telephone conference, a quorum being present, unanimous approval was given to the following authorizations:

- 1. A loan of \$200 at 3% from the Church Building Loan Fund for one year to the Mingo Junction Church for repairs to the parsonage and church.
- 2. The purchase of a lot, by the Pine Street Church of Zanesville adjacent to the south boundary of the present church property. Cost of lot to be \$2,000.
- 3. The purchase of a five room residence property for use as a parsonage at 516 Hendricks Street, St. Marys, Ohio from Elva Ann Lemunyou. Cost of property to be \$3,900. Title to be held in the name of the Conference Corporation.
- 4. The borrowing of \$2,800 at 6% from the Union Building and Loan Company of St. Marys, Ohio to assist in purchase of the Hendricks Street property and also authorized and empowered Donald C. Fisher to sign any and all necessary papers to negotiate said loan in behalf of the Conference.

- 5. A loan of \$1,000 from the Church Building Loan Fund to be used by the St. Marys Church to assist in making purchase of the parsonage property. Repayment of the loan to be according to provisions of Conference Resolution No. 6.
- 6. A grant of \$200 from Conference Building Aid Fund to St. Marys Church to further assist in purchase of the property.

Marion, Ohio, October 25, 1961. Gave approval to a short term loan of \$180 to the Middletown Church from Church Building Loan Fund to be secured by note dated October 10, 1961.

Authorized a short term loan of \$200 to Dayton, Central Church from the Church Building Loan Fund for one year.

Approved a grant of \$75 to St. Albans, W. Va. Church from Conference Building Aid Fund to assist in needed repairs.

Authorized the renegotiation of the present loan agreement with the Zanesville Federal Loan of Zanesville, Ohio relative to the Zanesville, North Terrace Church indebtedness, and the signing by the Chairman and Secretary in behalf of the Conference Trustees of an Additional Advance Agreement and note of security for same for the amount of \$1,134.83. Original note dated August 28, 1955.

Westerville, Ohio, December 21, 1961. At the call of the Chairman and by special telephone conference, all members being present, unanimous approval was given to the following actions:

- 1. Authorized the purchase of a property at Tobasco, Ohio (Cincinnati Area) consisting of a plot of ground of approximately 200 ft. frontage and 500 ft. depth on the Mt. Carmel-Tobasco Road (north of Tobasco) for the sum of \$4,500 and the cost of survey to be paid by the Conference.
- 2. Authorized a grant of \$500 from Conference Building Aid Fund to assist in purchase of lots at Tobasco.
- 3. Authorized a loan of \$2,000 from Church Building Loan Fund for the same purpose. Repayment of loan and interest to be on the basis of provisions of Conference Resolution No. 6. Additional monies required to assist in purchase of lots to be by action of the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism by a grant of \$1,000 and an equal amount to be raised by the local group anticipating organization and Conference affiliation.

Victory Campground, Galena, Ohio, January 8, 1962. Gave approval to the Pine Street Church, Zanesville to construct a three bedroom parsonage on the lot south and adjacent to the church lot and to borrow up to \$3,000 to assist in completion of the building.

Westerville, Ohio, February 9, 1962. Authorized a grant of \$200 from Conference Building Aid Fund to the Miami Shores Church to assist in insulation of the church building.

Approved consolidation of items of local indebtedness of the Millersburg Church and the securing of an additional loan to cover these outstanding obligations from the Commercial and Savings Bank of Millersburg, Ohio by passage of a formal resolution authorizing the borrowing of said amount, and this to be added to the original bank obligation and secured by a note bearing 6% per annum. Total secured indebtedness not to exceed \$9,800. Also authorized the Chairman and Secretary to sign all

necessary papers of this transaction in behalf of the Conference Trustees.

Gave approval to State Approved plans for a 30 ft. x 46 ft. church building to be erected by the Pleasant Chapel congregation on Smeltzer Road, south of Marion, Ohio.

Authorized a loan of \$300 from Church Building Loan Fund to the Chillicothe Church to assist with interior improvements of the church building.

Westerville, Ohio, March 12, 1962. By special telephone conference at the call of the Chairman, a quorum being present, unanimous approval by roll call vote was given to State approved building plans and the New Rome Church was authorized to construct their parsonage building. Also by roll call vote unanimous approval was given to a formal resolution authorizing the execution of a note of security and mortgage on three lots, Nos. 68, 69, 70, located in Crellin's Woodlawn Subdivision at New Rome, Franklin County, Ohio, in favor of The Buckeye Federal Savings and Loan Association in the amount of \$8,000 at 6% interest. Said loan is to be used in construction of the parsonage building and repayment of loan to be at the rate of \$80 per month. A loan transaction cost of \$100 was likewise approved. The Chairman and Secretary were authorized to sign any and all papers in regard to this transaction in behalf of the Conference Trustees.

Marengo, Ohio (Fargo Church), March 28, 1962. Approved the mortgaging to Zanesville Federal Savings and Loan Association, for an amount not to exceed \$5,000 at 6% interest, our property located at 36 Shawnee Avenue, South Zanesville, Ohio for the purpose of financing the construction of a worship auditorium onto the present building. Also authorized the Chairman and Secretary to sign any and all necessary papers relative to this transaction.

Authorized a grant of \$500 to the Columbus Church from the Church Building Aid Fund to assist in construction costs of the new church auditorium to be attached to the present Sunday School unit.

Authorized the Columbus Church to borrow \$15,000 at 6% from the Wesleyan Investment Foundation, Marion, Indiana to be used in construction costs of the new church auditorium at 3350 Atwood Terrace.

Authorized the Chairman and Secretary to sign all necessary papers to negotiate this loan.

Authorized the Rittman Church to refinance their present indebtedness and approved the mortgaging of our property at 71 Fairlawn Avenue, Rittman, Ohio to the First Federal Savings and Loan Company of Wooster, Ohio, for an amount not to exceed \$5,200 at 6% interest, with a monthly payment of \$52. Authorized the Chairman and Secretary to sign any and all necessary papers relative to this transaction in behalf of the Conference Trustees.

Consideration and approval was given to the request of the Norwood Church to incorporate under the laws of the State of Ohio.

Approval was given to the Norwood Church to borrow \$30,000 at 6% interest to make major changes, improvements and enlargement of the present church structure at 5407 Warren Avenue.

Approved the borrowing of not more than \$10,000 at 6% interest, the

same to be secured by mortgage agreement, and used to construct a church building, according to earlier approved plans, on Smeltzer Road, south of Marion, Ohio. Authorized the Chairman and Secretary to sign any and all papers relative to this transaction.

Consideration and approval was given to the request of the Northridge Church to incorporate under the laws of the State of Ohio.

6A. Westerville, Ohio, May 31, 1962. At the call of the Chairman, a quorum being present, unanimous approval was given to the request of the Sherrodsville Wesleyan Methodist Church to consolidate their indebtedness and a formal resolution was passed approving the mortgaging to the Scio Bank Company, Scio, Ohio, our property situated in the County of Carroll, State of Ohio, in the Village of Sherrodsville for an amount not to exceed \$6,000 with interest at 4% per annum. The Chairman and Secretary were authorized to sign any and all necessary papers in order to properly transact this business.

Victory Campground, Galena, Ohio, June 26, 1962. Approval was given to the Bucyrus Church to purchase two lots on Songer Street at Wingert Street, 39 ft. x 108 ft. each, to be used as building lots for a parsonage for the local church.

A special savings account with The Home Savings Company of Westerville, Ohio with deposits and accrued interest for the amount of \$1,169.94 is being held in trust, according to wishes of the donor, for investment in a Wesleyan pioneer project in the east section of the city of Columbus, Ohio.

Due to underpaid budget, the beneficiaries will receive amounts reduced by 4.3% Twelve Ministers are on the active list and two others had benefits frozen as of this year.

God worked many miracles in supplying the needs of the work in La Gonave. The hospital unit was dedicated April 14, 1962. Dr. Anderson urged that we go, give and pray. Mrs. Blanche Kenney prayed.

7:45 P.M.

Mrs. Patricia Castle led the congregation in singing "Work for the Night Is Coming" and "Have Your Eyes Caught the Vision." Mrs. Della Ann Blackburn led in prayer for God's blessing on the service. A quartet of ministers sang "So Send I You." Mrs. Emma Lea Martin, W. M. S. president, introduced David Day of Puerto Rico, Rev. and Mrs. James Blackburn and Miss Opal Oman who will go to Haiti in August. She also introduced Dr. Marilyn Birch of Sierra Leone, Africa who brought greetings. The Marion College Quartet sang "As a Volunteer" and "On the Cross of Calvary." Dr. Norbert O. Anderson of Haiti spoke using Acts 3:1-9 and told of the work in Haiti. He said there are now 26 organized churches that make up the Haitian Conference. He also said that the medical work is an evangelistic arm for no one comes for medical help without first hearing the gospel. Many are converted as the result of this ministry. He said that the hope for Haiti is the indigenous plan of training native pastors, building churches, and the literacy work.

Report No. 2

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings in the name of Jesus to the women of the fifty-fifth session of the Ohio Conference!

You are acquainted with the quadrennial slogan: "Work His Works; the night cometh." In the gospel of John, Jesus said, "I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh when no man can work. . . . I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do." James 2:17 states, "Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone." We are aware that the twilight hours are upon us, so both our faith and works should be operating at fullest capacity. How pleasing it

is to God to find His children full of faith and diligent in works! In the year before us, may our hearts accept the challenge to work while it is day; the darkness is coming. A new day will dawn for the bloodwashed. How many more can we reach with the gospel so they will not be engulfed in eternal night?

As we come to the end of the year and make reports, we naturally compare our achievements with past records. Sometimes we are gratified to find we have done better than the previous year; sometimes we are sorry we haven't done as well. A healthy attitude is to give our best to God in all things, regardless of past gains or losses. I am sorry to report no new societies this year. I have contacted the pastor of each church and mission where there is no organized society and tried to stimulate interest and give encouragement. During the year I have written 143 letters, 52 cards, and sent out 11 other pieces of mail. I wrote notes and reminders for each of the ten Messengers. I have received \$39.76 for desk expense.

Rev. Malcolm Ellis toured the conference, church by church, in the fall and proved to be an interesting and interested missionary. Your churches responded and gave \$1,818.64 directly to make up a deficit on the radio house in Africa. Rev. Ellis again was used of the Lord in our conference in July when he served as a teacher to the boys and girls in the Bible Crusaders Camp.

Six Puerto Rican young people had one night to give in Ohio, so by correspondence with Missionary Bob Stowell, I arranged for one of the churches to entertain them and a two-district missionary and youth rally was announced. The night was cold and there was much snow but God used the young people to make our hearts rejoice and praise Him for the privilege of seeing what missionary work has actually accomplished. These youth gave radiant testimonies to God's saving power. Rev. and Mrs. Donald Fisher visited the Days in Puerto Rico in January and Rev. Fisher preached evangelistic messages in the churches there.

I was able to secure Rev. Noel Williams and Rev. Lewin Tomlinson from Jamaica for six cold nights in January to tour some of the districts and many were impressed by the fervent evangelistic emphasis that attended their messages. These rallies netted \$547.00 which was more than enough to buy one motor scooter for district use in Jamaica. Some who were not privileged to hear the men also responded to this need. I secured Rev. Levi Troyer from Haiti to visit the remaining districts in May. You gave a total of \$105.10 for a jeep for Haiti. I was glad that some of the district chairmen took upon themselves the responsibility of securing another missionary for rallies. Miss Ruth Curtis from India brought refreshing messages directly from her field and raised \$145. for a school in India.

You gave to the White Christmas Offering which went to World Wide holiness literature \$928.61; to Self Denial which went to Ontario, Canada to buy a church and parsonage property, \$647.84; and to the vernacular Bible School in Africa, \$2,101.75.

There was a gain of 7 members and a gain of \$2,171.94 in cash receipts over last year.

I believe Ohio Conference is to be commended for their support of missionaries. Conference and individual church support include entire or partial support for Edna Taylor, Florence Glass, Alice Calhoun, Blackburns, Cowarts, and Freda Farmer. As you probably know, Rev. and Mrs. James Blackburn, Diane and David are going to Haiti next month. We have two other new ones to add to those who have already gone out to answer the call on the mission field — Miss Ruthan Fisher has gone to Africa as a missionary nurse this past June and Miss Opal Oman will be going in a few weeks to Haiti as teacher to the missionaries' children.

May God help us to take seriously our obligations to give earnest prayer support along with our finances to keep His work advancing while it is day.

Report No. 13

PLAN OF WORK

General Items

We recommend:

- 1. That a consecration and installation service for the newly elected W. M. S. officers be held the first meeting after the annual election.
- 2. That we observe the monthly "Fast and Prayer" day with April continued as self-denial month. That we continue the "Penny-a-meal-plan" which applies on World Missions.
- 3. That we promote a Women's World Prayer Circle in each society, making use of the new Woman's World prayer materials, and that the local Prayer Partner Secretary act also as W. W. F. Secretary, filling out the annual W. W. F. Prayer Circle report and mailing it to the Conference W. W. F. Secretary within 60 days after conference.
- 4. That we use the Guide along with the helps suggested in the Weslevan Missionary with frequent reference to the conference minutes.
- 5. That a special drive for the Wesleyan Missionary be held beginning with the rise of Conference.
- 6. That the local solicitor keep up to date records, including correct addresses and expiration date of **Wesleyan Missionary** subscribers, giving prompt attention to expiration slips and endeavoring to secure renewals immediately, and that she submit quarterly reports to the Conference Solicitor. Remember to use your permanent church key number.
- 7. That we stress the Memorial Folders to assist in furthering the cause of World Missions, rather than expensive floral tributes for the deceased.
- 8. That we contribute toward the Mission Fields as the needs are presented, suggesting large-size quilt blocks, simple or easy patterns on pillow-cases, etc., also cut out dress material for beginner sewers, also visual aids, pictures, etc.
- 9. That more stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children, adolescents, the aged and infirm, with special emphasis upon Jew and Negro.
- 10. That each active and honorary member participate in the Reading Course, and an effort be made to get others to participate.
- 11. That a special effort be made for active and honorary membership dues to be paid during the first quarter.
- 12. That every society make a great effort to enlist the interest of the entire church, especially the men and youth, for the cause of missions using them as assistants on committees and programs.

Financial Items

We recommend:

- 1. That each society pay annually an equivalent of \$.50 per active and honorary member to be used as a Conference Working Fund.
- 2. That the dues of \$1.00 per member, active and honorary, be sent directly to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer, and that all monies and voucher receipts be sent to the Treasurer quarterly.
- 3. That a statement of the items of Local Church work (baskets, gifts, and other local projects), the amount of the Card Call stubs and monies reported under "Other Objects" (postage, desk expense, reading books, etc.) must be signed by the local president and sent in with the quarterly report to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer in order to receive credit.
- 4. The final remittances must be in the hands of the Conference W. M. S. and Y. M. W. B. Treasurers on or before June 20.
 - 5. That each society give \$3.00 or more to Medical Missions.
- 6. That each society respond to the Card Call plan, thus assisting in the Extension program of the church.
- 7. That we observe Education Harvest Day with a program and cash contribution to apply on budget.
- 8. That each society contribute annually for the support of Hephzibah Children's Home, Brainerd, and Australia.
- 9. That each society contribute \$1.25 or more to the Camp Incidental Fund to be dispersed at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
- 10. That each society participate in the Honorary Enrollment Plan of Marion college.
- 11. That each society contribute to the "Mile of Dimes" project for Mission Field equipment, to the equivalent of one foot per active and honorary member.
 - 12. That we stress giving toward Jewish work.
- 13. That each local society support the work of the American Bible Society by an annual offering, preferably taken around December 1. Channel funds through conference W. M. S. Treasurer.
- 14. That we pay an amount equivalent to at least \$3.00 per active and honorary member to the Missionary Support Fund, from which Freda Farmer's salary be paid and the field support of James Blackburn.
- 15. Reminder: Let each society remember to pay the Faith Promise which will include the field support and salary of Della Ann Blackburn, World Missions, and Church Extension Pledge.
