#### JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The forty-third session of the Kansas Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America met at Miltonvale. Cloud County, Kansas, August 26, 1913, at 2 p. m.

Opened by singing "I'm glad salvation is free," after which President Ford read the 3rd of 1st John. Prayer by Brother L. Wing.

Roll call answered by 21 elders and 11 licentiates.

On motion, Rev. T. J. Pomeroy elected Committee on Credentials.

Brother Rich appointed to assist the Committee on Credentials. Committee on Credentials make partial report as follows:

Moved to adopt report and seat delegates.

Question raised as to the legality of certain delegates from Miltonvale. President Ford makes statement of reception of members into Miltonvale church and challenges of same, claiming reception of members as illegal, hence election of delegates illegal. Reads Discipline, makes explanation and states that before the report can be adopted, these credentials from Miltonvale should be withheld.

On motion, all credentials received with the exception of the Miltonvale charge.

Conference bar fixed at first five rows of seats.

Question arises as to the seating of Miltonvale delegates.

Informal discussion follows. Brother Bond declared out of order.

Brother M. F. Lienard reads statement from President of the General Conference.

Brother T. J. Pomeroy asks for information.

Brother Dow makes statement that members are received by letter into the Wesleyan Methodist Churches without being present; this being the spirit and policy of the Church. Statement was made by Brother Hill that quite a number of members have been received without a letter in the past few years.

President Ford makes official report. See report.

On motion report adopted.

Committee on Credentials makes partial report, reporting the name of H. E. Macy, transferred from Iowa Conference. On motion, report adopted and referred to Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Moved that in electing committees that only one member from a charge be accepted.

Moved and carried that President of Conference be chairman of Committee on Religious Services. P. A. Miller, G. Mann, Sister Bertha Nelson and S. J. DeWitt added to the committee.

In view of the fact that the delegation from Miltonvale is in

question, moved to adjourn.

Moved that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow. Discussion as to length of time. Voted on each motion and both lost.

On motion Rev. D. T. Grout made second member on Pastoral Relations Committee. On motion the following other names were added: T. J. Pomeroy, F. C. Hill, and lay delegates A. L. Bartley, Henry Parsons, P. M. Martin.

On motion, visiting brethren invited to honorary seats in the conference. The following were introduced to the conference: Rev. R. W. Emerson, President of the Iowa Conference; Rev. Littel, of the M. E. Church; Rev. Currie, of the Dakota Conference; Rev. Travis, of the U. B. Church.

Committee to Examine Pastoral Reports elected as follows: President first member, ex-officio. Sister M. F. Lienard and Brother W. H. Smith added to the committee.

Rev. A. P. Lienard and A. L. Bartley elected as Statistical Committee.

On motion, F. C. Hill elected to succeed himself as member of Committee on Itineracy and Orders. President appoints M. Watkins and Sister N. May Clark as lay members.

Brother A. B. Hotchkiss elected as chairman of Committee on

State of the Work. G. Mann and J. A. Stansbury added.

Committee on Sabbath Schools filled as follows: W. E. Odell, chairman. Brother F. E. Shivers and Sister Eura Howard added.

On motion Brother S. F. Wilson elected chairman of Committee

on Boundaries. I. C. Dunbar and M. Watkins added.

On motion, W. C. Elliott elected chairman Committee on Books and Periodicals. Brother Frank Duncan and F. E. Shivers added.

On motion, P. A. Miller elected chairman Committee on Finance. E. W. Howard and G. Mann added.

On motion, S. F. Wilson elected chairman Committee on Moral Reform. T. J. Pomeroy and J. A. Stansbury added.

On motion, President of the conference made chairman of Committee on Vote of Thanks. Advisory Board remaining members.

On motion, the hour of opening to be 8:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. On motion, President of the conference made chairman of Committee on Orders of the Day. E. H. Cook and W. H. Smith added.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by P. A. Miller.

#### Wednesday Morning.

Devotions led by Brother L. Wing.

Roll Call. Reading of minutes of last meeting. Approved after correction.

Committee on Credentials report names of A. C. Hill, Clay Center; Imo Jones, Excelsior; Mrs. Barbara Fringer, Keene; also report names of Dan Smith and Frank Betzer, William Millard and W. A. Smith, recommending them to travel under the direction of the Conference. Delegates seated and credentials referred to Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders make partial report, recommending that letter of H. E. Macy be received, and that Frank Kline be received to travel and enter course of study.

Secretary of Committee on Itineracy and Orders offers resolution presenting outline of course of study. See Resolution. Moved to adopt. Remarks by F. C. Hill. On motion resolution adopted.

President speaks of a loan made to Brother E. S. Higgins by the Kansas Annual Conference.

C. E. Sears, of Oklahoma, introduced to the Conference and makes statement of the fidelity and sacrifices of our late Brother E. S. Higgins.

On motion, the above matter referred to the Committee on Finance.

Rev. E. W. Howard moves that we have a committee of four on Charity. On motion, Rev. E. W. Howard made chairman of this committee. D. T. Grout, Ruby Rich and Sister Bertha Nelson added.

Rev. M. F. Lienard presents a resolution with reference to people taking up and discussing the school question. Moved to adopt.

On motion, laid on the table.

Committee on Credentials report name of Nettie Perry, delegate from Hall charge.

Rev. E. Teter introduced to the Conference.

Question arises as to what licentiates are entitled to vote. Chair gives decision.

Moved that the delegation of the Miltonvale charge be now taken up.

Moved that Rev. E. Teter take the chair, as President of the General Conference, to decide the case in hand.

President Ford takes the floor and reads his statement of yesterday, giving reasons for his decision concerning the election of delegates from Miltonvale as being illegally elected.

Questions asked. Sister M. F. Lienard makes statement as to the election of our last Governor, showing that in a number of precincts illegal votes having been cast, the vote was thrown out.

Brother Teter first decided as to the legality of the members received by the Miltonvale class, and holds that all would be considered legal except the two members received from the Nazarene Church, who failed to take the Church covenant. He states that those who come from Wesleyan Methodist Churches are members without taking the Church covenant, but members received from other denominations, other than our own, do not become members without taking the Church Covenant of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The next question to be decided is whether one or more illegal votes invalidates the whole election. Discussion at length.

Brother Teter states that he will render a decision of this latter question at the opening of the afternoon session at 1:30.

On motion adjourned.

Benediction by Brother Edgar.

#### Wednesday Afternoon.

Opened by singing "There is Power in the Blood." Rev. H. H. Williams read 23rd Psalm and led in prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of minutes.

President Ford makes statement that after consulting the statutes he finds that his decision on the point of invalid election was wrong, and he begs the pardon of the Conference in being too hasty in rendering a decision.

Brother Teter reads his finding and decision as a matter of news.

On motion, the seven delegates elected from the Miltonvale charge are seated.

Committee on Credentials report following names as delegates:

J. A. Anderson, Eskridge; J. W. Glover, North Branch; Lewis Woodruff, Ames. On motion, delegates seated.

Examination of character taken up. The following pastors of the Conference were called: Elizabeth Feltar, of Hollis; Sister Rosa Gordon, of Alton charge; George Kearns, of Concordia; E. H. Cook, of Topeka; Brother J. E. Dillman, of the Wilson charge; M. F. Lienard, of Pavonia; Brother P. A. Miller, of Willis; Brother T. J. Pomeroy, of Easton; Brother J. A. Stansbury, of North Branch; Brother E. W. Howard, of Kansas City; Brother I. L. DeWitt, of Hall; Brother G. L. Girtler, of Excelsior; Brother W. S. Ashcraft, of Lookout; Brother Wm. A. Smith, of the Wide Range class; Brother W. E. Odell, of New Hope; Brother L. S. Currie, of Keene; Brother C. H. Dow, of the Clay Center charge; Brother Grant Mann, of Gaylord; Brother Edgar Lienard, of Crawford; Estella Ried Lienard, of the Oakland charge; and Brother F. E. Shivers, of North Branch.

After being told by the President that their characters were passed, the different pastors were asked to read their statistical report. They also spoke of the condition of their work and referred to their Christian experience, all testifying to the saving, sanctifying and keeping power of God.

W. C. Elliott tells of his labors as being encouraging during the last year.

Brother F. C. Hill called and makes statement of his work. The year has been good spiritually and every way.

A. B. Hotchkiss, Conference Evangelist, reports for his work. He states that the blessing of God is on the work and that the Lord saves and sanctifies today.

Brother P. M. Martin called and reports of his work and of God's blessing upon his soul.

Motion to adjourn. Benediction by E. H. Cook.

Moved that Professor H. H. Hester be given the present time in which to present the Prohibition cause. Followed by Brother D. Smith and P. A. Miller.

On motion, a vote of thanks was given by the Conference to these brethren for their words of instruction.

Professor McDowell, of Houghton, introduced to the Conference. He makes a few remarks.

Examination of character resumed.

Father Carnahan.

On motion, Secretary instructed to write a letter of greeting to Brother Carnahan.

Brother L. Wing called and makes report for Wesley Chapel. Experience good. Ready to go or stay.

Rev. G. B. Howard's name called. Not being present, Brother Evan Howard makes statement of his fidelity to God and of his request to be placed upon the superannuated list.

On motion, Rev. S. G. Huston granted a letter of standing.

Rev. F. E. Shivers, as chairman of District No. 3, reports for Holiness conventions held during the year. Reports one good convention. Sister Lizzie Feltar reports for District No. 2. One good convention held. Not many present, but good time, with God present. Brother E. H. Cook reports for District No. 1. Two conventions held, one at Keene and one at Topeka. Both good.

Committee on Credentials report Rev. F. E. Shivers recommended to Elder's Orders. On motion referred to Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On motion, matter of districting the Conference for Holiness conventions be left in the hands of Committee on Boundaries.

#### On Charity.

One of the distinguishing characteristics of the Christian Church from all other religions of the world is that the poor are cared for. A careful study of the Holy Scriptures will be sufficient to convince any candid mind that one part of the mission of the Christian Church is to care for the physical needs of the poor and destitute. In the sixth chapter of the Acts of the Apostles we find that the early Christian Church was confronted with the necessity of calling a council for the purpose of formulating a plan of a more systematic distribution of the funds for the poor, thereby giving us the doctrine of Stewardship, which is obligatory upon us as individuals, as societies and as a Church. If we purpose to live in harmony with the Word of God and enjoy the favor and the blessing that comes to those who obey God in every good word and work, we must keep close to the sacred Word, by the way of giving heed to its injunctions. We are told by St. James that "pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this: To

visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world." "What does it profit, my brethren, though a man say he hath faith, and hath not works? Can faith save him? If a brother or sister be naked and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled: notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful: what doth it profit? Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone."

Again we learn from the sacred oracle, what our Savior says concerning our duty in this respect. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me." Also we are informed by St. John that "whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?" My brethren, "Let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth."

We are pleased to note the increased interest manifested in the different societies of the Wesleyan Methodist churches of the Kansas Conference. We would call special attention to the requirements of the Discipline, Section 19, with reference to practical benevolence, especially to paragraph 244.

We respectfully submit the above, trusting that as a Church professing the experience of full salvation, we shall not be wanting

in the grace of giving.

#### Moral Reform.

Your committee to whom was referred the subject of moral reform report as follows:

While we believe that all righteousness should begin within the HEART by being born of GOD, yet where persons will not be saved, that public sentiment should be so moulded that there will be crystallized into law such laws as that the Government should forbid all that is injurious, and protect that which is right.

1st. PROHIBITION. We are proud of our record on the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic and hope to see the day when not only state-wide prohibition, but NATION-wide prohibition SHALL BE THE LAW OF THE LAND.

2nd. We believe that the use of tobacco in any form is a great evil and waste of the Lord's money, and are glad we, as a Conference, make an objection to receiving persons in the church who use it in any form, and hope to see it made a test of membership in the general Church. We are glad to note that public sentiment is now so against its use that spitting in public places and conveyances is prohibited.

3rd. Coffee. We believe the habitual use of coffee is injurious to a more or less extent, and where persons are so addicted to its

use as to suffer when not using it, that they should abstain from its use for JESUS' SAKE.

4th. We would warn our people against the use of soft drinks which have a stimulating quality that makes it difficult to abstain from, and makes it harder to control the appetites and passions of the human body. It is a needless self-indulgence and should be abstained from for the reasons given above.

5th. It is estimated that the stupendous sum of \$15,000,000 is spent every year in the United States for chewing gum. Let us as a Church save our pennies and send the Gospel to the heathen.

6th. Marriage. While marriage by the law is a civil institution, yet we believe it an institution ordained of God, hence moral as well as civil, and the people should heed the divine injunction where it says "be not unequally yoked together with unbelievers," and that we should discourage all our members from entering into such marriages.

7th. We urge our members to keep the Sabbath day holy. There is reckless disregard for the holy day in individuals as well as in the great corporations of our country, and we are glad to note that the post offices have been closed on Sunday. Let the good work go on.

8th. We deplore the extremes in the fashions of dress and we believe that all should dress so as to preserve modesty, and that costly apparel should be avoided, and that we still insist on our people keeping away from shows, carnivals, festivals and all such diversions that cannot be engaged in in the name of JESUS.

Inasmuch as several books in the course of study as provided by our last General Conference were repudiated by our last Annual Conference; and since this has left us practically without any definite course of study for our licentiates to follow; therefore we, your Committee on Itineracy and Orders, recommend that the following course be used by the Kansas Conference until our General Conference shall furnish us with a satisfactory one:

Resolved, That hereafter in our Annual Conference sessions we devote the hour of 3 P. M. each day to religious services.

#### No. 8.

Whereas, the Tidings of Joy Mission at 445 Virginia Avenue, Kansas City, Kansas, has been greatly blessed of God in the conversion of those who are in adverse circumstances, and in feeding and clothing the destitute, and

Whereas, the financial burdens have been heavy and the support inadequate at times, therefore be it

Reolved, that we heartly endorse the work by giving our sympathy, prayers, and financial support.
