JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The fifty-seventh annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kans., Tuesday, August 16, 1927, with President Miller in the chair.

The devotions were led by Brother Carkuff, who gave a splendid exhortation and then led in prayer.

Roll Call.—The roll was called, with seventeen elders and three conference preachers present.

Credentials.—On approved motion W. H. Cochran and V. C. Martin were made the Committee on Credentials.

Rev. Sherman Emrick, of Longford, was then introduced and made some very good remarks.

On approved motion the President's official report was accepted and the financial report was referred to the Auditing Committee.

On approved motion the Conference was adjourned and Brother Ford dismissed the Conference with a word of prayer.

Tuesday Afternoon.

After a splendid talk by Brother Shea and the reading of the Scripture on Paul's admonition to Timothy, Brother Smith led in prayer.

Brother Cooper then added some appropriate remarks.

Examination of Character.—Elmer Anderson and E. H. Dunbar were called and gave their reports.

Courtesy.—Rev. Johnson, of the Miltonvale Methodist Church, was introduced to the Conference.

The examination of character was resumed and the following were called and gave their reports: William F. McConn, C. W. Dennison, G. A. Duncan, A. T. Bundy, W. L. Carkuff, and the report of Brother H. H. Williams was read.

After the roll call the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Report on the Orders of the Day.—The Committee on the Orders of the Day recommended the Conference give the hour of 10:30 A. M. Friday for the Educational Service, 4 P. M. Friday for the Conference Y. M. W. B.; 10 A. M. Saturday for the Sunday School Rally, and 10:30 A. M. Saturday for the Connectional interests.

Examination of Character.—William Hotchkiss was called and gave his report.

Holiness Conventions.—The Chairman of the Second District gave his report on the Holiness Conventions held, and on approved motion the report was adopted. See Report.

There was no report from the other districts.

Chairmen of Holiness Conventions.—On motion Brother Haun of Topeka was made chairman of the Holiness Conventions in the First District, Brother V. C. Martin chairman of the Second District, and Brother McIntosh of the Third District.

Examination of Character.—Brother Arthur Rothfuss was called and gave his report.

Report of the Conference Sunday School Secretary.—The Sunday School Secretary gave his report which was accepted on approved motion. See Report.

W. H. & F. M. Society Offering.—The Finance Committee recommended that the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society be given the privilege to take up a subscription to be equally divided between Home and Foreign Missions.

Orders of the Day.—The hour for the Orders of the Day having arrived the services were turned over to Brother Shea.

Friday Morning.

In the devotions Brother William Millard led the singing and Brother Cook read the Scripture and led in prayer. The blessing of the Lord was poured out upon the Conference.

After the roll call the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Moral Reform.—The Committee on Moral Reform reported, and on approved motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Itineracy and Orders.—The Committee on Itineracy and Orders gave a partial report, and on approved motion the report was adopted, the names of Imo Jones, Archie Harris and J. E. McIntosh were added to the roll.

Courtesy.—Brother Ora Weed, of Arizona, and formerly of Kansas, was introduced to the Conference and gave his testimony together with an account of his labor since leaving the Kansas Conference.

Brother Tigar of the Middle Atlantic States Conference was then introduced to the Conference and made some appropriate remarks.

Brother S. M. Yonally, pastor of the Rice Methodist Church, was introduced to the Conference and gave some remarks of appreciation of the Miltonvale Wesleyan College of which he is a student.

Brother Boardman and Brother S. F. Wilson of the Oklahoma Conference were then introduced to the Conference, and both gave some words of greeting.

Pastoral Relations.—The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave the first reading of its report.

Chairman Resigns.—Brother Haun resigned as Chairman of the First District Holiness Conventions, and on motion his resignation was accepted.

After the roll call the minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The roll was then called, after which the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Boundaries.—The Committee on Boundaries then read its report. On approved motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Wesleyan Young People's Society.—The President of the Wesleyan Young People's Society gave a report of the Society.

On motion the program of the Wesleyan Young People's Society was approved and our co-operation as a Conference pledged to them in their work.

Deaconess.—Sister Young sent in a report to the Conference and it was read on suggestion of the President.

Chairman Holiness Conventions.—On motion Brother Tigar was made the Chairman of District No. 1 Holiness Conventions.

General Conference Reports.—The Delegates to the General Conference gave their reports. Brother McConn stated the Educational Policy of the Church. Sister Huscher and Brother Miller dwelt on the Spiritual uplift.

Courtesy.—The Connectional Missionary Secretary, Rev. E. F. Mc-Carty, was then introduced to the Conference and made some appropriate remarks.

Report on Orders of the Day.—The Committee on Orders of the Day recommended that the hour of two-thirty P. M. Saturday be given for memorial services for Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss and layman Henry F. Douthart of Willis, Kans., who has been prominent in the Conference for many years.

Finance.—A further report of the Finance Committee was adopted.

Orders of the Day.—The hour for the Orders of the Day having arrived the Conference Sunday School Secretary conducted the Sunday School Rally.

The Connectional interests were then presented by Brother E. F. McCarty, who gave some very good remarks.

Pastoral Relations.—The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave the second reading of its report.

On approved motion the Conference was adjourned.

Brother Shivers then pronounced the benediction.

Saturday Afternoon.

Moral Reform Report to the Wesleyan.—The motion was approved that the report of the Committee on Moral Reform be sent to the Wesleyan for publication.

Committee on Vote of Thanks Report.—The Committee on Thanks gave their report and the report was adopted on approved motion.

Books and Periodicals.—The report of the Committee was read and adopted. See Report.

Auditing Committee Report.—The Auditing Committee read their report and on motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Time of Camp Meeting and Conference.—On motion the Camp Meeting was fixed to commence on Thursday and the Conference was fixed to commence on Monday at 10 o'clock and to run parallel with the Camp Meeting.

On approved motion the Camp Meeting was set to commence a week later than this year.

Committee Chairmen.—On motion the President was given the privilege of appointing the Chairmen of the Committees that required much time in the preparation of their papers for the Conference, the same to be appointed within thirty days of the rise of the Conference.

Pastoral Relations.—The final reading of the Committee was then given and the report was adopted as read. See Report.

Itineracy and Orders.—The Committee on Itineracy and Orders then gave the last reading of its report and the report was adopted as read. See Report.

Free Table Board.—The Conference then voted to have free table board as heretofore.

Conference Date Reconsidered.—A motion was carried to reconsider the date of the 1928 Conference and Camp Meeting, and the former motion was then before the house.

An amendment carried that the Camp Meeting begin Thursday, August 9th, and that the Conference begin Monday, 10:30 A. M., August 13th, 1928.

The motion was then carried as amended.

Conference Dormitory.—The matter of a Conference Dormitory was discussed.

Memorials.—On motion Brother Miller, Brother Cooper and Brother Ford were made a Committee on Memorials to be kept permanently in the minutes.

Conference Dormitory.—On approved motion the Camp Ground Committee was instructed to erect a dormitory as was discussed in the case they could raise the money and they were given the privilege of taking a subscription Saturday evening.

Statistical Report.—The Statistical Report was then read and adopted.

On motion the Conference was adjourned sine die.

Third Meeting.—At this meeting the Board voted to pay the paving tax at Norton, it also gave \$100.00 to the Concordia Mission. The Board was solicited to subscribe \$500.00 for the Concordia Church to be paid in five yearly payments. As the Board changes yearly it did not think it had the power to make such a subscription but did take the following action. It gave \$100.00 to the Concordia church and subscribed \$100.00 yearly for four years subject to the approval of the succeeding Missionary Board. \$30.00 was advanced on the parsonage rent at Longford. It voted to give Brother Carkuff \$25.00 to assist him in his work at District 55.

Fourth Meeting.—At this meeting ways and means were discussed as to how to extend the work but nothing was definitely settled. It voted to give Gage Park church \$127.00 to purchase seats. It also

recommended that the Conference President see about the organizing of the church at Belleville, also the securing of a place for worship.

MORAL REFORM.

Moral Reform eminates from the mind of the Almighty. The purpose of the Christian religion is to change the lives of men. All reforms which in any way lift men to a higher plane of living have their origin in the teachings of the Man of Galilee. All men will never become Christian, but the Gospel is a leaven which permeates every fabric of our social structure, and influences the lives of even its most bitter enemies. The Wesleyan Methodist Church has always stood in the forefront in the fight for all moral reforms. Therefore, we, the members of the Kansas Conference of said Church do hereby declare our position upon the following vital questions.

We believe in the principles of the Eighteenth Amendment and the Kansas State law which prohibits the sale of cigarettes to minors, and we urge our people to co-operate in every way possible in the enforcement of these laws. We also recommend that in the primary elections and nominating conventions of next year our people actively support such candidates as are favorable to these laws.

We deplore the existing commercialization of the Christian Sabbath and pledge our active opposition to all attempts to make the Sabbath anything other than a day of rest and worship.

We view with alarm the increasing divorce-rate in the nation and believe it to be due largely to the lack of proper home training. We urge that the children of Wesleyan Methodism be systematically taught concerning the sacredness of the home, respect for the house of God, regard for parental authority, and the choice of amusements which will build Christian character rather than destroy it.

We recognize the fact of depravity and its effect upon human life. We believe that our young people should be carefully taught concerning organized vice and every form of social evil which wrecks the lives of men. Virtue rewards her followers with length of days.

We believe that everyone should be familiar with the Bible and therefore pledge our united support to every organized effort now being made to provide for its daily reading and study in the public schools.

It is our conviction that the modern tendency in dress which exposes so much of the female body to the public eye cannot be other-

wise than detrimental to the moral standards of both sex. Hence, we urge that the women of the Kansas Conference be independent in their manner of attire, and dress themselves modestly, sensibly, becomingly, and without undue regard for prevailing styles, regardless of what extremes fashion may demand.

We recognize the decalogue and the Sermon on the Mount as the most adequate and complete standard of morals the world has ever known. It is our belief that the universal adoption and practice will solve every moral problem which now confronts the race.

That any charges which have not taken an offering for the Young People's Society's Delegate to General Conference do so at their earliest convenience and remit the same to the Conference Treasurer.

That the Conference President receive a salary of \$1,000 and expenses for the year. Should the Quarterly Meeting receipts be more than that amount it shall be the presidents.

That the Conference Evangelist be allowed \$13.50 per month house rent for the year.

That the Conference Secretary receive \$15.00 for his services and be reimbursed for paper and postage to the amount of \$2.00.

That the Conference Treasurer receive \$10.00 for his services.

We recommend an Educational Budget of \$1.50 per member and a Missionary Budget of \$4.00 per member.

We recommend a Conference Budget of \$1.60 per member and that all monies received by the President be receipted for and apply on this Budget.

We further recommend a General Conference Budget of five cents per each member and a Connectional Sunday School Budget of five cents per member reported in the main school.

A bill of \$10.00 for the printing of the Conference blanks has been presented. We recommend its payment.

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, here recommend:

Division 1.

- 1. That we have a Harvest Home Day as near the middle of October as possible, and that an offering for the College Library be taken in connection with Harvest Home Donations.
- 2. That by recommendation of the General Conference Society all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer, and there be divided equally between the General and Conference Treasurers.
- 3. That each Society contribute ten cents per member to pay General Conference delegates' expenses.
- 4. That each Society have a Magazine Committee of one, the same to be considered a permanent officer whose duties shall be to secure new subscriptions and renewals and also report quarterly to the Conference Magazine Committee.
- 5. That we contribute at least six dollars (\$6) per Society for Home Missions.
 - 6. That the statistical reports of the W. H. & F. M. Society be

in the hands of the Committee on Statistics two weeks before Conference.

- 7. That we observe one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work the same to be preceded by a day of fasting.
- 8. That the Kansas Conference continue the support of Sister Grace Davis and that a thank offering be taken at the monthly prayer service by each Society to provide for the same and sent to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- 9. That each Missionary Society have a basket to be filled with such articles as can be sent with outgoing missionaries or in the Home work.
- 10. We recommend the study book "A Straight Way Toward Tomorrow," for the coming year.
- 11. That our women of the W. H. & F. M. Society be modest examples in their dress and encourage others to do likewise.
- 12. That our societies receive credit of fifty cents per pound for bandages.
- 13. The Plan of Work and the Efficiency Standard be read quarterly in each local Society.
- 14. We recommend that the first week in June be dues paying time.
- 15. That we ask our Societies to make all the bandages they can and have them sent into headquarters by the first of September. Send to Rev. E. F. McCarty, 222 S. Clemens Ave., Lansing, Mich.
- 16. We recommend that each local Society wishing to send cash or making donations to the dormitory, report the same to the Harvest Home Committee in order to receive proper credit.
- 17. We recommend that our Societies contribute to the support of the Hephzibah Orphanage.
- 18. Each statistical report have the name of the President of the Society for the coming year written at the bottom of report.
- 19. That each local President appoint a committee of two whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering any assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the kingdom of God.

Division 2.

- 20. That our Conference Organizer and Y. M. W. B. Superintendent and the District Leaders arrange two programs for the coming year. The first to be on Home Missions to be given Thanksgiving Week and the second on Foreign Missions at Convention time.
 - 21. We recommend that the President and the District Leaders

arrange the time, place and recommend the worker for the conventions. Also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our-worker and report before the close of Conference.

- 22. That each District be supervised by the District Leader, under direction of the Conference President and report the condition of their District to President quarterly.
- 23. That we instruct our Magazine Committee to gather quarterly from our local Magazine Solicitors their reports and forward for publication.
- 24. That the Corresponding Secretary be instructed to supply each local President with a copy of the Efficiency Standard.
 - 25. That we have a Prayer Secretary.
- 26. That the Gleaners observe the monthly prayer hour, that each member secure at least three subscriptions to the Missionary Magazine. That they furnish 10 pounds of bandages and each member write at least once to each of our mission fields.
