REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE EXTENSION

During the course of the year, your committee has met on five occasions. One of them composed of a partial committee for the purpose of studying the work of Conference Extension and to make recommendations for the promotion of this very vital phase of our Home Mission endeavors in our Conference.

As a result of these studies, we beg to submit the following recommendations:

- 1. We recommend to the Conference that a Special Committee on Conference Extension be elected for another year to study further the problems of Conference Extension.
- 2. We recommend that for 1951-1952, workers be employed by the Conference Missionary Board when occasion demands. We further recommend that the Conference officials be permitted to arrange their schedule to visit churches where there is a need, provided an officicial visit is made once a year with each church in the Conference.
- 3. We recommend a minimum goal of \$2.00 per member for Conference Extension work to assist new and weaker churches and that the stronger churches should not expect assistance, except in case of emergency.

If the total amount raised in the Conference during the year is in excess of this \$2.00 minimum goal, all such excess shall be placed in a sinking fund, with the thought in mind of providing additional supervision.

4. We further recommend that a program of education and promotion be used for the purpose of acquainting our people with the projects.

In order to set up and launch the above program, we recommend that the Home Missionary Secretary, or some other competant person be secured and that work with the Conference Extension Secretary to survey the field and to work with the District Superintendants and other constituency, to more fully acquaint them with the development and possibilities of Conference Extension.

We recommend further that there be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, one man in each of the Conference Districts who will assist the Vice-President in the carrying out of the Conference Extension work.

5. We have surveyed the field and find there are many worthy communities, but we recommend that for the coming year, our special projects be Lawrence and Muncie.

Motion—A motion prevailed that the time be extended beyond the 11:30 recess time to complete the work of the Conference.

General Order—The general order continued. Harriet Decker, C. C. Decker, Howard Noggle, Kathryn Beaver, Dorothy Barse, Kenneth Miller, Wayne Tippey, Melvin Kohn.

Granted Letter—A motion pevailed that a letter of standing be granted to Melvin H. Kohn, an elder.

Minutes—The minutes were read and approved.

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties.

- 1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee before the close of the fifth day of August.
- A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.
- B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.
- C. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i. e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.
- 3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice-President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

- 6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$2000.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help to establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice-President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.
- 8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

III. Churches.

- 1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.
- 3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from their denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.
- 4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.
- 5. The Sunday School offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV. Conference.

- 1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August fifteenth.
- 2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year.
 - 3. The fiscal year begins August 1st and ends July 31st.
- 4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

- 5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.
- 7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.
- 8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers.
- 9. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.
- 11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Mission and Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Board shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 13. The President of the Conference, and Vice-President shall be given each year a two week's vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 14. hen the churches, which have been placed in the hands of the President, decides as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.
- 15. "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the Ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 16. There shall be a January Preacher's and Worker's convention held biennially in the four sections of the Conference. These conventions shall be held during the years in which Marion College Area Ministers' Conventions are not held. The Vice-President shall be responsible for planning and conducting such Conventions. He may nominate and the Convention shall elect one man from each Conference District who shall serve with him on the Planning Committee.
- 17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.
- 18. That the Conference Secretary be authorized to purchase a reasonable priced bouquet for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the event of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included.

When the request is given, that the price of the flowers be given as missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

V. Committees

- 1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.
- 2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.
- 3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.
- 5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

- 1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.
- 2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

- 1. August 21—Upon the request of the Atlanta Church, I appointed W. M. Phillippe as supply pastor, subject to the receipt of his membership transfer.
- 2. August 28—After Ivan L. Sisk had declared that he did not care to serve at Lawrence any longer, I counseled with the Missionary Board and, upon their recommendation, appointed O. H. Guillaume as superintend of the Lawrence Mission.
- 3. September 1—Received a Letter of Transfer for Conference Preacher W. M. Phillippe, from the North Georgia Conference.
- 4. September 3—After counseling with some of the members of the Byron Church, I appointed Vestal and Mary E. McAninch as pastors of their church.
- 5. September 25—Accepted the resignation of Paul West from the pastorate of the South Salem Church.
- 6. September 25—At his request, I granted Conference Preacher Paul West a Letter of Transfer to the Allegheny Conference.
- 7. September 27—The Board of Trustees voted to purchase a tabernacle at Winchester where there are more prospects of soon organizing a Wesleyan Methodist church. So with the approval of the Board, I appointed Rev. Russell W. Castle to supply as superintendent of the Mission there.
- 8. October 27—At the request of the South Salem Church, I appointed Helen Brock as their pastor.
- 9. November 3—H. P. Buell has been preaching at a country church in Michigan for several weeks. He requested that I make his work a conference appointment for the year. Inasmuch as that church is a community church and not under the supervision of the conference, the request could not be granted. However, I do hereby recognize the fact that H. P. Buell is pastoring the Franklin Community Church near Indian Lake, Michigan.
- 10. November 30—Wilbur R. Way had served as superintendent of the Max Mission since conference without appointment. Having received a recommendation from the Thorntown Church for Brother Way to travel, I, therefore, appointed him as superintendent of the Max Mission.

11. January 8—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder Clifford Hull, from the Iowa Conference.

- 12. January 9—Received a church of ten members at Valparaiso, which was organized by the Rev. Vestal Van Matre, and declared it to be a Wesleyan Methodist Church.

his enrollment fee, providing that, if he shall waive service credit for such years as he has not paid assessments, he may become a member, by paying his membership fee.

All pension budget and assessments and entrance fees shall be sent to the Conference Pension Treasurer.

When a pastor fails to raise any budget on the Superannuate Pension Plan, it shall require a vote of the Conference to pass his character.

Item III. That the Conference Sunday School apportionment be 15 cents per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the Conference Minutes of the preceding year under (Total in Main School). Send all Sunday School Apportionment money to the Conference Treasurer.

Item IV. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 35 cents per copy, with a minimum of one copy for every six members of the church and should any deficit in the fund occur, that it be paid from the Conference expense fund.

Item V. That the General W.Y.P.S. dues be \$1.00 per active member of the W.Y.P.S. This money to be sent to the Conference W.Y.P.S. Treasurer.

Item VI. That the President shall have general supervision of the work of the Conference.

- A. We recommend that the Conference Officials be permitted to arrange their schedule to visit churches, where there is a need, provided an official visit is made once a year with each church in the Conference.
- B. The Vice-President shall have direct supervision of the Conference Extension work, subject to the counsel and approval of the Conference Missionary Board. He shall be responsible for the promotion of raising Conference Extension Funds, and he may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.
- C. The minimum goal of \$2.00 per member be raised and the Rally Day offering go to the Conference Extension Fund. Also that every effort possible be put forth to meet the goal of two new churches this year.
- D. We further recommend that there be nominated by the Committee on Pastoral Relations and elected by the Conference one man in each of the Conference Districts, who shall assist the Vice-President in carrying out the Conference Extension work. It shall be his duty to inform the Vice-President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district and the Vice-President shall investigate the same. The district man shall also assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds.

Item VIII. All Quarterly Meetings shall be arranged by the Pastor and his Advisory Board, and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The Pastor shall report quarterly to the President and the Vice-President on blanks formulated by the President.

Item VIII. That the salary of the President be \$300.00 per month and the Vice-President \$275.00 per month, the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly with expenses incidental to their work.

Item IX. The Vice-President shall receive \$30.00 per month parsonage rent.

Item X. We recommend that the President and Vice-President employ secretarial help as needed, the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Item XI. We recommend the following concerning the INDIANA WESLEYAN MESSENGER:

- A. That the President and Vice-President constitute the Executive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER.
 - B. That the Vice-President be the Editor.
- C. That the Executive Committee be empowered to select some person to act as Business and Circulation Managers.
- D. That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ an assistant as need demands to be mailing secretary for the Business Manager.
- E. That the various departments which use the columns of the WES-LEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

Item XII. We recommend that:

- A. The President call a meeting of the Ministers in different parts of the Conference early in the Conference year.
- B. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the Conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote greater interest in the Conference work.
- C. All Pastors be required to attend the meeting for their district except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

Report No. 12

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. We recognize Godless Communism as a present, subtle influence that is seeking to supplant our Democratic way of life, which guarantees religious freedom. We also recognize that the present trend toward a welfare stat eis the opening wedge of Socialism which leads to materialistic Communism. Therefore, be it resolved: That our ministers and our church leaders sound a warning and inform us as to the danger of this false security offered by Socialism. We urge our people to exercise their privilege to vote against this evil whenever possible.
- 2. Since many of our own young men are being called to the armed forces to defend Democracy, let each local church pray fervently that each serviceman experience a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, continued growth in grace, and God's protection. Besides maintaining frequent personal correspondence, let us co-operate wholeheartedly with the Wesleyan Servicemen's Commission.
- 3. In comparison of the average attendance in Sunday school with the large enrollment, we recognize the need for a renewed effort to more thoroughly train our children, to hold our young people, and to make a spirit-directed, evangelistic appeal to all classes of society.

By adoption of this report the conference re-affirms the historic stand of the Church on matters of Christian doctrine and practice. We urge strict adherence to the discipline as to the standards of dress, Sabbath observance, parental authority, and reverence for holy things. Also, let us cry out vigorously against the use of alcoholic beverages and the growing menace of the narcotics trade.

- 5. In view of the importance of Christian education in the work of the Church and the increasing difficulty of maintaining Marion College, be it resolved: That the Indiana Conference pledge itself to give its very best support to Marion College, both by earnest prayer and by financial aid.
- 6. We recognize the service that can be and has been rendered to the Church through outright gifts, grants, estate notes, annuities, and other financial contracts. Whereas the Indiana Conference with assets of one and one-half million dollars and with liabilities totaling only 6% of this amount; therefore, we urge our ministers and other authorized persons to make contacts with interested parties or prospects, and to report the same to the Conference Board of Trustees.

The twenty-second session of the Indiana Annual Conference W.Y. P.S. convened in the Young People's tabernacle on the campground Tuesday 1 p. m. August the 14th.

The song service was conducted by the Rev. Francis Ott.

Standing Rules

- 1. The first session of the W.Y.P.S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock: and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- 2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee: and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committees; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.
- 3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- 4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W.Y.P.S. Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.
- 5. There shall be a W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W.Y.P.S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected: so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- 6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee.
- 7. Members of the executive council shall not hold the office of district chairman: but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.
- 8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- 9. All churches shall send their delegates' credentials and statistical report to the secretary by August 4.
- 10. The executive council of the W.Y.P.S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.
- 11. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W.Y.P.S. report to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- 12. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district, within three weeks, after the close of conference.
 - 13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.
- 14. The executive committee of each local W.Y.P.S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

- 15. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference W.Y.P.S. treasurer not later than August 4.
- 16. There shall be a missionary committee elected, by each local society, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.
- 17. The W.Y.P.S. treasurer shall pay from the conference fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The W.Y.P.S. secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- 18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

- A. We recommend that each District co-operate with the following Conference program as to Rallies:
- 1. Quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies to be held in each District, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents.
- 2. An additional promotional rally to be held in each District, in the month of September, if possible, under the supervision of the Conference Executive Council, and that they be authorized to secure the Area President or another member of the Haiti Crusade for these rallies.
- 3. That there be a state-wide rally held on the Campgrounds on Memorial Day.
- 4. The following point system for district banner awards be adopted: local society president at rally, 5 points (if president is absent the vice-president shall receive the same number of points), Pastor present, 5 points; current number of Wesleyan Youths taken, 1 point each subscription; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1% of the active society members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; 1 point for every other person present; and for each mile traveled to the Rally site, 1 point. Each special organized youth service, such as jail services, hospital visitation, street meetings, etc., 5 points. The society with the highest total is to be the winner.
- 5. The District President call a meeting of the district officers and advisors as soon as practical after the promotional rally for the purpose setting definite goals, including more rallies in the district, better planned programs, better promotional plans.
- 6. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

II. Projects

- A. For Crusade projects we recommend the following:
- 1. In keeping with the emphasis of the General Conference W.Y.P.S. that we make crusading our major project for this year.
 - (a.) We participate in the crusade plans sponsored by the General Conference W.Y.P.S. for this year.
 - (b.) We have as a goal a Home Missions crusade sponsored by the Indiana Conference W.Y.P.S. and in co-operation with the General Youth Department and the Home Missionary Department, when sufficient funds are invisioned. That the raising of these funds be under the supervision of the executive council.
- 2. Each District set a goal and the District President give special emphasis in promoting the crusade work in rally offerings.

- B. For local Society Projects we recommend the following:
- 1. Strive for an increase in membership and greater co-operation within each society.
- Plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the society such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio programs, and street meetings.

III. Finance

- A. For finance we recommend the following:
- That the Area President receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.
 - 2. That the salary of the Conference officers be as follows:
 - (a.) President, \$80.00
 - (b.) Vice-President, \$40.00
 - (c.) Secretary, \$25.00
 - (d.) Assistant-Secretary, \$10.00
 - (e.) Treasurer, \$50.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, one on January 31 and the other July 31.

- 3. That the desk and traveling expenses of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer be paid from the Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and that the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. (That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of 5 cents per mile).
 - That the budget for the following year be as follows:
 - (a.) General Dues, \$1.00 per active member of the society.
 - Conference Budget (based upon church membership.) 20 cents, Conference Extension Fund 25 cents, Conference Expense Fund 15 cents, Youth Camp Fund
 - (c.) That above funds be sent in quarterly. In as much as this is based on Church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.
 - (d.) That all pastors assisted by Conference Extension Fund shall report church attendance, finance, and spiritual condition monthly to the Conference W.Y.P.S. President, who shall in turn report the same to the District President.
- 5. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the General Promotion of the Youth Work.

- 6. All Offerings above the operating expenses of the District Rallies to be sent to the Conference Treasurer to apply on Crusades.
- 7. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer for Departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings.

Dear Women of the Indiana Conference W.M.S.

Another quadrennium has passed. We trust many of you were privileged to attend the General Conference. Gains along various lines were reported. Goals were set of which we can familiarize ourselves in the coming year.

The Indiana Conference had a splendid report with a grand total of \$151,855.11 or a gain of \$59,353.00 over the previous quadrennium. The magazine subscription list made a very commendable advancement from 1132 in 1947 to 2027 in 1951, a gain of 895. This figure may not be accurate but Indiana was among the first to go over the top and was well in the lead with renewals. We express our personal appreciation for the fine spirit of cooperation shown in the campaign.

The General Conference made a 25¢ per active member assessment for the Administrative Funds. Do not confuse this with your dues. The dues are still \$1.00 per year. We trust the membership roll will not be affected by this action of the General Conference. We would recommend that you vote out of your treasury the 25¢ per active member assessment rather than make individuals feel responsible for paying it along with dues.

For the past twelve years we have served in the capacity of president. This responsibility fell upon us in April 1939 in the home of Mrs. Ida Hopkins. No president has had a more loyal group with whom to work. You have been most co-operative. I do not remember of a single instance when any district, Society or individual failed. My blunders have been many but you were very considerate. We now feel that the Lord is releasing us and we are retiring from this office. We thank you for every prayer and every kindness and pray that our successor may be shown the same wonderful spirit of cooperation. May the work of spreading the Gospel continue until all have heard of God's wonderful gift to a lost world.
