JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The seventy-third annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection, (or Church), of America assembled in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas at 10:00 a. m., Tuesday, August 3, 1943 with the President in the Chair.

The opening devotions were led by Rev. W. D. Correll, one of our Camp Meeting Evangelists. He called on Brother William A. Smith to offer prayer. He read Col. 1:19-28, giving emphasis to verses 27, 28 as a picture of the Apostolic preacher who preached, warned, and taught to the end that He might "make all men see" the manifold wisdom of God. He said the end of all preaching is that we may present all men perfect and entire, wanting nothing. The song service was led by Brother Earl Fessenden, with Mrs. Charles Wilson at the piano.

The roll was called and thirty-four Elders, nine Conference Preachers, and three honorary enrollees answered present.

Credentials—The Secretary of the Nominating Committee presented the names of forty-four Delegates-elect, their credentials having been duly examined. This partial report was adopted and the Delegates were seated.

Earl Fessenden and Dale Campbell were by election made the Committee on Credentials. They presented the names of 14 more Delegates-elect. On motion the Delegates were seated. For the names see Conference Roll.

They also read a recommendation from the Ottawa Church that Miss Helen Gardner be received to travel as a singing evangelist and children's worker under the direction of the Conference. On motion this was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On motion the report of the committee was adopted as read. The report was printed for distribution in the Conference.

On motion adjourned for the noon hour. Benediction by R. O. Cooper.

Tuesday Afternoon

The afternoon session was called to order by the President. Sister Alice Boyd led in song and G. A. Duncan led in prayer.

The roll was called in the afternoon session to make a more accurate record of those present on the first day.

Credentials—The Credentials Committee read the names of 3 Delegates-elect. They were seated.

They read a recommendation from the Gage Park Church that Lucille Henderson be received to study in preparation for the work of a Deaconess under our direction.

Also recommendations by the Miltonvale Church that Cecil Livingood, Leo A. Heer, Oscar Johnson, Christie Stites and Clayton Ellsbury be received to travel under our direction.

They further read a recommendation from the Wesley Center Church that Lorraine Mitchell be received to travel, and a recommendation from the Inglewood Church that Wayne Babcock be received to study preparatory to travel under our direction.

On motion the recommendations were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

President Reports—The Conference President gave his report. On motion the official part was adopted and the financial part referred to the Finance and Auditing Committees.

Honor Roll—The Committee elected to prepare an Honor Roll for publication in the Conference Minutes gave their report. The report was adopted.

Conference History—A motion carried that we elect a committee to investigate and offer recommendations concerning the advisability of writing a history of the Kansas Conference.

On motion T. J. Pomeroy, John Ayers, J. M. Beecher, Mrs. Lola Smith and C. Floyd Hester were elected to the above committee.

Adjourned for Committee work. Benediction by T. F. Child.

Wednesday Morning

The devotions were led by Brother Charles Wilson. Sister Golden L. Young led in the congregational singing, and F. E. Shivers and E. A. Coates offered prayer.

The roll was called and Tuesday's minutes were read and approved.

Credentials—The Credentials Committee read the names of four Delegates-elect. On motion they were seated. See roll.

Courtesy—Brother and Sister H. R. Hale of Wichita, Brother T. L. Terry of Roachdale, Indiana, Brother and Sister Charles Wilson, who are returning to our Conference from Oklahoma, and Brother W. D. Correll one of our Camp Meeting Evangelists, were introduced to the Conference. They each responded briefly.

Whereas, He has pronounced a curse upon the liquor traffic in these words, "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor, drink, that puttest thy bottle to him, and makest him drunken," and

Whereas, therefore the truly Christian and temperance attitude is eradication and positive prohibition of alcoholic beverage traffic, and

Whereas, since the adoption of the Constitution of the United States the liquor traffic has been unconstitutional within her borders, therefore,

Be it resolved, by the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Kansas Conference assembled, that it pledge itself to fight the liquor traffic upon the aboved named grounds and to the end that the Congress may speedily be brought to submit to the states for their action the following proposed amendment to the Federal Constitution:

"The manufacture, importation, exportation, transportation, sale, purchase, possession or use of whisky, brandy, rum, gin, wine, ale, porter, beer, cordials, hard or fermented cider, alcoholic bitters, ethyl alcohol, all malt liquors and all other alcoholic liquors for use as beverages, and the use of personal or real property for any of said purposes, is hereby prohibited.

"Congress and the several states shall enact appropriate legislation to enforce this article." (Fletcher Dobyns.)

COMMITTEE ON BOUNDARIES

We, your Committee on Boundaries, wish to make the following recommendations:

That the new church at Wichita be known as the West Side Wesleyan Methodist Church.

That the Conference be divided into six districts as follows:

District 1—Kansas City, Missouri; Overland, Missouri; Kansas City, Kansas; Easton, Ottawa, Lawrence, Leavenworth, Topeka First, Topeka Gage Park, Quinton Heights, North Topeka, Oakland Mission, Willis, Williams Chapel, Eskridge.

District 2—Manhattan, Clay Center, Wesley Chapel, Bethany Chapel, Abilene, Antioch, Miltonvale, Salina, Idana, Milford.

District 3—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis, Greenleaf, Union Valley.

District 4—Wichita First, West Side, Wichita Seneca Street Mission, Hopewell, Grace Chapel, Hutchinson, Arkansas City.

District 5-Mankato, Wesley Center, Formoso, Victor, Hardy, Red Cloud.

District 6—Cedar, Gaylord, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Naponee, and Englewood, Colorado.

We wish to recommend further concerning the sale of Easton church and parsonage which was referred to your Committee on Boundaries by Brother Smith.

Inasmuch as repeated effort to revive the work at Easton has failed

and it promises no established work and that the remaining members request the sale of said property, and that Brother Smith and the Conference Trustees feel it advisable, we do hereby recommend the sale of the church and parsonage to W. B. Stafford at the following offers: church \$150.00; parsonage \$200.00. In view of the fact that consideration was given to allowing Leavenworth to have the parsonage, we recommend that \$150.00 be given to them from the sale of this property subject to the action of the Missionary Board.

MORAL REFORM

We are living in days of uncertainties, days when the scenes of our national life are shifting and changing as the days come and go. Thrones are tottering, and dictators arising. Securities that seemed impregnable now are trembling. The Church is not escaping the shocks of modernism and deadening effects of apostacy.

But the voice from the Word of God through the ages past is still saying that "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." The repeal of the eighteenth amendment has opened the floodgates to drinking, drunkenness and moral corruption such as we have never known. Immediately after repeal the breweries had this to say, "Not one-tenth of one per cent of the youth of America know the taste of alcohol. It is up to us to educate them." They are succeeding well—until liquor or alcoholic beverages can be had from many markets. It is said that there are enough barmaids that they standing side by side, would reach one thousand miles.

Its twin evil, the cigarette, has fastened its deadly fangs into the life of our youth and is wrecking the lives of both boys and girls. Smoking and drinking among women has increased at an alarming rate and strikes hard at the foundations of our homes. Children born of such mothers are inherents of blindness, heart trouble, insanity and other diseases. The pages of our magazines are smeared with their advertisements and their stories are subtlely written into the books of our children.

The viciousness of vice and immorality, the greed of the demonized liquor traffic to open doors of temptation and sell the souls and bodies of our boys in training, should awaken us to take definite measures to destroy these evil forces in their behalf. These conditions together with the evils of Sabbath desecration and pleasure seeking are enough to bring the judgments of God on any nation.

O Church of the Living God, is it not for such a time as this that Jesus said, "Ye are the light of the world, a city that is set on a hill cannot be hid." Are we not to arise and shine as a light in a dark place when multitudes are in confusion and know not the way to go? Will we suffer

a blackout of the Cross of Jesus Christ in this time of greatest need? Is this the time to become careless and at ease? Can we afford to drift into coldness and worldliness and lose the passion for the lost? Can we afford to become less spiritual by compromising our standards and holy convictions by wearing short sleeves, short skirts, slacks, anklets, no hose, cosmetics, jewelry or other needless ornaments, or dress our children in such nudity that they will lose all sense of modesty and become easy victims of sin and lust?

We, as Christian parents, should teach our children obedience and discipline in the home and early reverence for the house of God. Parents should also stand guard at the library table and safeguard the minds of their children by knowing the reading material perused by them and also the music on the piano.

Shall we not heed the call of the prophet Isaiah to "Awake, awake, O Zion, put on thy strength"; arm ourselves for the fight to keep spiritual, and in deep humility and contrition pray earnestly, for a fresh anointing to come upon the ministry, that the trumpet give no uncertain sound, and that upon us all will come a mighty out-pouring of Pentecostal power that will enable us to stand before Him guiltless in that Great Day?

"For the moral and religious instruction of our people, and for the promotion of Bible Holiness, and the propagation of other doctrines essential to the development of Christian character, we consider the Sunday School a necessary and indispensable institution of the Church" (Wesleyan Methodist Discipline).

Today this is vitally true when we consider the following facts:

- 1. There are 27,000,000 boys and girls under the age of twelve in the United States alone without any religious instruction.
- 2. Two out of every three children in America are in no Sunday school. They are the future of the nation.
- 3. To save a man is to save a soul, but to save a child is to save a soul plus a life.
 - 4. 85% of the church members come from the Sunday school.
- 5. Because of the overwhelming increase in the number of young criminals, investigation shows that scarcely any of them ever came under the influence of a Sunday-school teacher.
- 6. Because "it is not the will of your Father which is in Heaven, that one of these little ones should perish" (Matt. 18:14).

2844 miles were traveled in Sunday-school visitation. This includes a trip to our church in Denver, Colorado.

STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

R. E. BRITTON, Chairman.

Once again we have reached the place where we pause to review figures which are assembled from the various pastors' reports, showing work done for Jesus during the past twelve months. Presented herewith are figures showing totals and comparisons, as well as percentages in certain items of interest. Reports reached the hands of the committee from all the churches except Ash Creek, which was inactive during the year, and Hopewell, whose report reached the hands of the committee too late for insertion.

The membership reported is 1513, a gain of 43. 657 Wesleyan Methodists are received. (542 last year.) There are 79 more Wesleyan Missionarys, and 31 more Young People's Journals received than last year. 47 Sunday schools are reported, (46), and the average Sunday school of the Conference had an average attendance of 67, or an increase of 19 per Sunday school.

The pastors' cash salary is \$35,867, a gain of \$10,864 over last year. This is an average weekly cash salary of \$14.07. (\$10.45.) 44 church buildings are reported, with a total valuation of \$126,700. This represents an increase in valuation of \$5,650. The total indebtedness of the churches shows a decrease of \$2,300. We join heartily with the Kansas City, Kansas Church in rejoicing because of the liquidation of the long-standing debt on their church. The total valuation of churches and parsonages is \$182,320, and the total indebtedness on the same represents but $14\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the valuation. The total indebtedness decrease is \$6,335.

The Conference raised 108% of the budget, with the following percentages for each item: Foreign Missions, 101%; Kansas Conference Home Missions, 104%; Hephzibah, 103%; Connectional Home Missions, 104%; Education, 101%; Conference Fund, 100%; Superannuated Ministers, 99%; Connectional Sunday School, 96%; Connectional Young People's Work, 99%; Campground Maintenance, 97%. 38 churches raised every item of the budget, or over. In the interest of conserving space the names of those churches may be found in item ten, of the Statistical Report.

The total amount raised for all purposes is \$106,374, which is \$33,622 more than last year. This represents an average of \$63.50 per member of the church.

SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' AID SOCIETY OF THE KANSAS CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH CONSTITUTION

Article I. Members

All Elders, Conference Preachers who are voting members of the Conference, and duly elected Delegates to the Kansas Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection, (or Church) of America, shall be members of this society.

Article II. Officers

The Society shall elect by ballot a board of five members, three Elders

and two Laymen, who shall act for the Society in the supervision and dispersing of funds in the interim of the regular meetings of the Society. Members of the Board shall be elected for terms of three years. The Board shall have a President, Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall make annual report to the Society.

Article III. Funds

All interest on endowment, and all Superannuate monies raised shall become a part of the Benefit Fund and be subject to use for benefit of those qualifying for such benefit, unless specially specified for endowment.

No monies shall be dispersed except by order of the President and Secretary of the Annual Conference, as per paragraph 146 of the Discipline.

Article IV. Eligible Beneficiaries

- Superannuate Elders who have served under appointment of the Conference for twenty years.
 - 2. Widows of such men.
- 3. Widows of all other Elders who have served twenty years, provided the Elders were members of the Conference at time of their death and provided the widow served the Church as his wife during those twenty years. Benefit stops upon remarriage of the widow.
- 4. Other worthy Ministers or their widows may be included by vote of the Society.

Article V. Benefits

As the need may require and the funds permit, the basis shall be:

- 1. When a house is not owned by the beneficiary, the rent will be paid, not to exceed \$10.00 a month.
- When a house is owned, the taxes will be paid, not to exceed \$50.00 a year.
 - 3. Each married man will receive \$15.00 per month.
- 4. Each single individual, whether man or woman, will receive \$10.00 per month.
- 5. Added benefit may be given by a vote of the Society for each dependent child.
- 6. On judgment of the Board \$100.00 toward funeral expenses may be paid to eligible beneficiaries.
- 7. In event of payment under Item 6, the Conference President shall by public appeal at the next Conference session raise the amount disbursed to reimburse the Superannuate Treasurer for the funeral expense.

Note: The vote of the Society shall be final concerning its obligations to its beneficiaries.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting two years in advance.
- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held on the second day of Conference at 9:00 a.m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. H. & F. M. S., or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of the subscriptions from his charge.
- 4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expenses. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.
- 7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: 1/3 cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in 1/2 inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.
- 8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 9. To Hold Quarterly Meetings. Resolved, That the Conference President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.
- 10. Inspection of Church Property. Resolved, That it be the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President should inquire at each Quarterly meeting whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.
- 11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That we elect a Committee of five Elders, including the President as Chairman ex-officio, and three Delegates-elect from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine the credentials of all Delegates to the Conference. Second, nominate all sessional and standing committees and Boards, and be prepared to report as the first item of business. Third, nominate the Committee Chairmen for the next year.
 - 12. Theological Institute. Resolved, That the traveling expenses of

instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed for Institute work.

- 13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund, and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such a service.
- 14. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication. (Published in 1943 Minutes.)
- 15. 1 Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active ministers to pay 1 per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on the Budget.
- 16. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 17. Additional Delegates. Resolved, That when more than one Delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the Elder that entitles the church to the additional Delegate.
- 18. Fiscal Year. Resolved, That the fiscal year of the local church close one week before Conference and that the statistical report be made on the basis of money received up to that time. That the Pastors mail immediately to the Conference Treasurer the completed Statistical Report and budget receipts, who shall check them and give them to the Statistical Chairman, who shall then be prepared to report at an early session of Conference.
- 19. Pastor Paid Through Conference. Resolved, That the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.
- 20. Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."
- 21. Conference Opening Date. Resolved, That the Tuesday nearest August 1 be the permanent date for the opening of Conference.
- 22. Election of Conference Treasurer. Resolved, That the election of the Conference Treasurer be held following the reading of the Treasurer's annual report, rather than at the time of the election of the other officers of the Conference.
- 23. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, That the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
 - 24. Vacations. Resolved, That the Conference President be granted

a vacation over two Sundays that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

Resolved, That we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the Church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he may choose for vacation.

25. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, That all actions heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary actions as to them may deem proper and expedient and to the best interests of the Annual Conference and the Local Churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by such Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the said Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

26. Withholding cf Names. Resolved, That all names other than those on the regular roll of the Conference be withheld from churches as available pastors until all available conference members have been prayerfully considered and approached.

27. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, That all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must not be presented later than Thursday noon of Conference.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Redeeming the time, because the days are evil."

Time is a very choice and precious possession. It is short, uncertain, fleeting and pregnant with future consequences. Dr. Marden says, "The man is yet unborn who rightly measures and realizes the value of an hour."

Time plays an important part in the lives of individuals, communities and nations. Opportunities have come and gone for individuals; they have been lost because of failure to act at the proper time. Time is proving an important factor in the waging of this, the greatest of all wars. Movements of vast armies are timed, as well as the minutest details of individual attackers. A Pacific correspondent and observer recently made this statement concerning one of our Axis enemies, and at the present time, it seems

to be too true, "All that she requires now to make her the world's greatest power is time in which to exploit and develop her new empire and to unite the people under her leadership. And she is getting that time. Behind a network of defenses which we have not begun to penetrate, she is using every minute to achieve the military, economic and political consolidation of her kingdom. Whatever method of attack we may use later, they are making use of the time we are giving them."

Time, in Christian work is something that must be taken into account. The wise man of old said, "To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven." As surely as these words are true there are some times more propitious than others for the advancement in Christian work. There perhaps never has been a time in the history of the work on our foreign fields when conditions have been more promising. Rev. Floyd Banker said in a recent letter, "These are the harvest days." In spite of certain curtailments brought on by the war, steady advancement has been made on the fields. There is a vast field for service during these troublesome times. Funds are more plentiful than they have been in other days and probably more than will be in future days. Let us harness a goodly share of them and turn them into channels for the Master's use.

The days are evil, so much the more reason for being at our best for the Savior. Paul said, "and that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep." While the Church waits, Satan is utilizing every moment of time strengthening his strongholds, gaining new footholds and planning further aggression. Shall we not then be wise and redeem the time which is so precious and is given into our hands to use?

We were glad a substantial gain was registered in each branch of the missionary work during this Quadrennium. We trust that under the blessings of the Lord and the leadership of the Holy Spirit we may continue to go forward the next four years.

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

Division 1. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work be reviewed quarterly in each Local society.
- 2. That we observe at least four of the "Red Letter Days":
- A. Harvest Home Day, October 8. We urge each Society to send cash or donations to the Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- B. Easter—Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.
- D. May Day—To be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on the home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory.)

- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day—In accordance with the plans made by the General Conference Society for the celebration of the Twenty-fourth anniversary of the Wesleyan Missionary, we urge a special presentation of the Magazine.
- 3. That each Society elect annually a Magazine Solicitor to secure renewals.
 - 4. That we encourage the reading of Missionary books, and distribu-

tion of tracts and that a record be kept by the Magazine Solicitor of Mission Books read each month.

5. That we recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.

6. That all local dues be sent to our Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas. One-half of the same to be applied on Missionary Budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired. (See Treasurer's book Item "C" under Number 4.) Honorary membership dues apply on Missionary Budget.

7. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Con-

ference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer quarterly.

That this money should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least two weeks before Conference.

8. That each Society contribute 5 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.

9. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions

Connectionally supported.

- 10. That we urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage, except in cases where church budget is less than \$5.00.
- 11. That each Society be responsible for the raising of \$1.00 or more for the new W. H. & F. M. S. and W. Y. P. S. Tabernacle.
- 12. That each Local President appoint a committee whose duty shall be to contact the sick in person or by correspondence and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.
- 13. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for Mission Work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
 - A. September, October and November for Education.

B. December for Orphanage.

C. January and February for Kansas Conference Missions.

D. March and April for Home Missions.

E. May, June and July for Foreign Missions.

14. That in harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival, until it comes.

15. That we use material printed in the Wesleyan Missionary, also

the new study book "The Miracle Hand" in our regular meeting.

16. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary

and Treasurer of the Local Society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's Report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Ruby Anderson, 410 Monroe Street, Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference. The duplicate to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. Place the name of the President for the coming year on the back of the report blank.

- 17. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read quarterly. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 18. That the President of the Society be responsible for the reading of the report on Moral Reform at one public church service during the year.
