Journal of Daily Proceedings

Fairmount, Indiana, August 12, 1918.

The Seventeenth Annual Session of the Indiana Conference met Monday evening at 8 P. M. in the Tabernacle on the Camp Ground and Rev. E. J. Pitts preached a most excellent sermon urging us all to a deeper trend of soul burden and effort.

The business session was called to order Tuesday morning by the President at 8:30. The devotions were conducted by Elders T. J. Pierce, W. W. McMichael and C. S. Smith.

The Roll of Licentiates and Elders was called, and 38 elders and 8 licentiates responded to their names.

The following persons presented credentials and were enrolled as delegates:

Upon the question being raised, the President ruled that inasmuch as two delegates had been elected each for L. O. Vickery and S. E. Baker, one by Boxley Circuit and one by Fairmount Circuit, he would decide that the delegate from Boxley be seated for L. O. Vickery, since he was subject to a Registration Board outside the State and Fairmount was not his permanent home; that in the case of S. E. Baker he would seat the delegate elected by Fairmount, inasmuch as his goods were stored here and he was subject to the Registration Board here.

Upon call Bessie Baker of Boxley Circuit and Blanche Thompson of Fairmount were enrolled as delegates.

Enos Bakehorn, John Cleveland, Eva Cook, E. A. Schooley, Della Whicker, Vina Jones, Emma Bemis, and James Seward presented regular certificates of election and were seated as delegates.

The Conference was declared open for business and the President delivered his annual address, which was freighted with patriotism, spirituality and good business sense.

The President then read the report of his official acts during the year. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 1.)

The Bar of the Conference was fixed as the first four seats in front and the sides and to include the rostrum.

The Committee on Courtesies was filled with the election of H. T. Hawkins and S. C. Kinnison.

The Conference was ordered to convene at 8:30 A. M. and 2 P. M., and adjourn at 12 M. and upon motion in the afternoon.

The Committee on Memorials, with E. Teter as chairman, was filled with the addition of C. A. Billheimer, T. M. Bodenhorn, D. L. Shideler, and J. L. Rigsbee.

The Committee on Resolutions, with W. L. Thompson as Chairman, was completed with the addition of H. T. Arnold and Hazel Conover.

The Committee on Finance, with W. W. McMichael as Chairman, was elected as follows: S. C. Kinnison, W. D. Baker, Hurvey Smith and Mark Shambaugh.

The Committee on Ministerial Character was filled as follows: T. P. Baker, Chairman ex-officio; H. C. Brown, W. H. Hopkins, G. H. Payne, and Edna Baker.

The following were elected a Committee on Pastoral Relations: T. P. Baker, Chairman ex-officio; C. S. Smith, W. L. Thompson, T. J. Pierce, Mary Ebert, Vina Jones, and Thomas Dyson.

Upon motion J. O. Baker, Edward Cory, C. L. Enyeart, Thomas Dyson, and Doxey Payne were elected a Committee on Vacancies.

Elder T. P. Baker, whose term of office now expires on the Committee on Elders' Orders, was elected to succeed himself.

B. I. Eddy was elected to the Committee on Audits to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of C. E. Zike.

D. C. Dooley and B. I. Eddy were elected an Auditing Committee for next year.

Elders J. O. Baker, C. S. Smith, Charles G. Payne and H. T. Arnold were elected Judicial Committee.

H. T. Hawkins, E. J. Pitts, and H. T. Arnold were elected the Conference Sunday School Board.

The officers of the Library Association were elected as follows: J. O. Baker, President; Edward Cory, Vice-President; D. C. Dooley, Secretary, and J. E. Smiley, Treasurer.

Elders W. D. Baker, Fred DeWeerd and S. A. Mow were elected Camp Meeting Committee for next year.

Elders E. J. Pitts and F. O. Spitlar were re-elected Statistical Committee for next year.

Miss Edna Baker was elected Conference and Camp Meeting Reporter.

Charles G. Payne was elected Conference Registrar.

Upon motion an offering of \$13.52 was laid upon the table for the purchase of an American flag to be hung in the Tabernacle, and Mrs. Bessie Baker was elected to purchase the same.

Rev. Anna Kirk Folger, of the Illinois Conference, was introduced and after appropriate remarks was made an honorary member and accorded a seat within the bar.

Rev. C. N. Porter, recently of the Baptist Church, was introduced to the Conference and spoke of his religious principles and why he united with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Upon motion the Rule restricting the Camp Meeting help to the membership of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection was rescinded.

Upon motion Conference adjourned.

Second Meeting, Tuesday, 2:00 P. M.

The devotions were conducted by H. C. Brown.

The roll was called, and the minutes were read and approved.

Recommendations to be received to study preparatory to travel were received for Jacob Hunter, Charles Abrams, Albert Lee, Walter R. Morris, and Murton Duckett. Upon motion these, with all other similar papers, were ordered passed to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders.

A communication from Paul Billheimer was read to the Conference and upon motion the Secretary was instructed to reply to the same with greetings of the body.

The Committee on Elder's Orders made a partial report. The partial report was adopted. (See Report No. 2.)

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I.

The Evangelists shall be required to devote their time to the work and give a report of the first and third Quarterly Meetings, and the pastors shall report the second and fourth, in the Wesleyan Methodist, and in case of failure to do so, except for lawul reasons, they shall be subject to censure by this Conference.

II.

It is contrary to the spirit of our Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist at any service with oath-bound societies.

III.

That any candidate for Elder's Orders, or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes or examinations of the Conference, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the truth and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.

IV.

That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be opened to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesy be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

V.

Any waiving of the above resolution by contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

VI.

Whereas the Discipline requires that the stewards meet the pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved, That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the pastor as to the service he is to render the church. In case the pastor shall fail to render said service, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as other financial obligations entered into by contracting parties.

VII.

Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year.

VIII.

The membership, as far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

IX.

All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more, shall, in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

X.

We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to the salary; provided that this shall not interfere with previous arrangements between pastors and charges.

XI.

All unaccounted for numbers appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put into the hands of the pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.

XII.

The Committee on Elder's Orders are hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.

XIII.

It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, and the Assistant Secretary \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.

XIV.

The official character of no pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

XV.

The ordination services shall be held in connection with the memorial services of the Conference.

XVI.

Pastors shall pass their statistical reports to the Committee on Ministerial Character, who shall pass upon their regularity or irregularity. Hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.

XVII.

The Board of Trustees shall formulate plans to govern the Educational Secretary and Church Extension Secretary in their work, this to be a standing rule of Conference until revoked by vote of this body.

XVIII.

It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.

XIX.

It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and General Evangelists shall be called first.

XX.

In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

XXI.

No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with the charge or Conference.

Reports of Committees

Report No. 1.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The following constitutes the President's official acts for the Conference year:

- 1. The Cicero charge being left in the hands of the President at the last Annual Conference, I appointed Setta Caldwell and Earl Glover pastors, the former to preach for Cicero and the latter to preach for Atlanta.
- 2. By action of the last Annual Conference, the Kokomo charge, constituted of Kokomo and Mt. Olive, was divided, leaving Kokomo, at the close of the Conference, without a pastor. I appointed Lewis Burns pastor of this church.
- 3. The Roseburg church, being left without pastoral oversight, at the close of the Conference, I appointed Frank R. Birch as a supply for that charge.
- 4. Accepted the resignation of L. R. Mitchell, pastor of the Westfield charge.
- 5. Appointed T. J. Pierce pastor of the Westfield charge, to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of L. R. Mitchell.
- 6. Accepted the resignation of S. M. VanBlaricom, pastor of the Kirklin charge, and appointed him pastor of the Laketon charge.
- 7. Appointed H. G. Brown pastor of the Kirklin charge to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of S. M. VanBlaricom.
- 8. Received a church in Green County, known as Pleasant Ridge, organized by H. C. Brown, and appointed him pastor of the same.
- 9. H. G. Brown tendered his resignation as pastor of the Kirklin charge. His resignation was accepted.
 - 10. Appointed L. R. Mitchell pastor of the Kirklin charge.
- 11. Accepted the resignation of S. E. Baker as pastor of the Fountain City charge, it being necessary that he might devote all of his time to the Sunday School work of the Conference.
 - 12. Appointed J. F. Presnall pastor of the Fountain City charge.
- 13. Received W. G. Bogue, an Elder in good standing in the Holiness Christian Church, on a recommendation from that Church, and appointed him to general evangelistic work within the bounds of the Indiana Conference.

- 14. Granted Willie C. Roberts a letter of standing.
- 15. Accepted the resignation of Paul Billheimer, pastor of the Hartford City charge, he enlisting for service in the Army of the United States.
- 16. Accepted the resignation of Lewis Pratt, pastor of the Hamlet charge, he locating in the southern part of the Conference to assist in the work there.
- 17. Accepted the resignation of Newton Gilliland, pastor of the Peru charge. He was granted a letter of standing, and united with another Church.
- 18. Appointed Earl Glover, a Licentiate on the Peru charge, pastor of the Peru charge, the charge having made choice of him to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Newton Gilliland.
- 19. By request of the Hartford City charge, John Croy, a Licentiate, was appointed to the pastorate of that charge.
- 20. Accepted the resignation of L. R. Mitchell, pastor of the Kirklin charge.
- 21. Appointed W. G. Bogue pastor of the Kirklin charge to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of L. R. Mitchell.
- 22. Accepted the resignation of S. E. Baker, Conference Sunday School Secretary, on account of his health, and reported same to the Chairman of the Committee on Vacancies.
- 23. The Committee on Vacancies reported through its Chairman that no one had been chosen to fill the vacancy in the Sunday School Secretaryship; and that the duties of that official would be performed by the Sunday School Board. Report accepted.
- 24. Accepted the resignation of Anna Linville, pastor of the Thorntown charge. Her resignation was due to ill health.
 - 25. Appointed Emma Payne pastor of the Thorntown charge.
- 26. Accepted the resignation of N. E. Smith, pastor of the Albion charge. Requesting a letter of standing, he was granted same, and united with another Church.
- 27. The Hamlet charge arranged to supply itself with local help until Conference. The arrangement was consented to by the President and his Advisory Board.
- 28. S. E. Baker, desirous of being without the bounds of the Conference for some time, and of engaging in work as his health would permit, was appointed to general evangelistic work.
- 29. The Kokomo church, because of its depleted condition, early in the year voted to disband, and reported said action to the President of the Conference. On the strength of this report the

pastor, Lewis Burns, was regularly relieved of the pastoral oversight of that church.

- 30. On account of his health, Lewis Burns tendered his resignation as pastor of the Mt. Olive charge.
 - 31. Appointed Glen Payne pastor of the Mt. Olive charge.
- 32. The Albion charge arranged to supply itself with preaching the remainder of the Conference year, by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 33. Accepted the resigntaion of Walter and Miriam Jennings, pastors of the Mt. Etna charge, preparatory to sailing for Africa, their new field of labor.
- 34. The Mt. Etna charge, through the proper committee, reported to the President that the charge had chosen A. U. Murphy as a supply to fill the vancancy made by the resignation of Walter and Miriam Jennings. This action was approved by the President and his Advisory Board.
- 35. Received a church organized by W. D. Baker in the city of Indianapolis. The Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference instructed the President of the Conference to negotiate with the Methodist Protestant people and get an option on a church property, owned by them, located on the corner of Shelby Street and Hoyt Avenue, in the city of Indianapolis. The option was secured, to continue until Setpember 15th of this year. In this building the church was organized and is now worshiping. The property can be secured at a reasonable figure, and if purchased the Conference will have to render financial aid; but it is a good proposition. The work there is hopeful, and it is my opinion that the Conference should act and act now.
- 36. W. G. Bogue having proven himself worthy during the year, I recommend that he be received into full connection with the Church at this Conference.
- 37. Appointed Chairmen of Committees as follows: Resolu tions, W. L. Thompson; Memorials, E. Teter; Finances, W. W. McMichael.
 - 38. Accepted the resignation of Edgar Zike as a member of the Auditing Committee.
 - 39. I recommend that the maximum time for the Special Orders be one hour, provided that this shall not interfere with Special Orders that have been allotted more time by this arrangement.
 - 40. I further recommend that the Laws and Resolutions of this Conference be published in the Conference Minutes as in the past.
 - 41. Appointed Jacob Hester pastor of the Indianapolis church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

We are grateful to God for His kind providence that has permitted us to meet again in this annual gathering with no losses in our ministerial ranks. The Rev. W. G. Bogue, who has come among us since our last Conference, and Rev. S. D. Hawkins have lost their beloved companions, and other of the faithful of the Conference have passed from labor to reward. We bespeak for the bereaved the sympathy of the Conference in their time of sorrow.

The great struggle between absolutism and democracy that has spread war and carnage among the nations of the earth, is calling for our young men by the million to fill the depleted ranks of the Allies. We deplore the thought of war, with its awful toll of life and treasure, and sincerely pray for the day to come when the nations will learn war no more. We believe that a lack of patriotism and cowardice that submits supinely to the hand of tyranny and closes the ear to the cry of the downtrodden and oppressed to be worse than war. Be it the sense of this Conference that we endorse the action of our President and Congress in declaring war upon the militarism of the Central Powers of Europe and the energetic manner in which it is being conducted, for the speedy overthrow of the Kaiser and his Potsdam gang. We think it appropriate that some special tribute of honor and respect be paid to the young men who have laid their lives upon the altar of their country, some of whom have already fallen and lie buried in foreign soil.

We rejoice in the victories that have been won in the battle against the liquor traffic, i. e., the enactment of statutory law by our last Legislature that has made our State dry, diminishing crime and emptying the jails of their accustomed quota of occupants, and the passing of an amendment to the Federal Constitution to make this great reform nation-wide in its scope. We declare for immediate War Prohibition as a defensive and consistent measure in our great effort to conserve food stuff to feed the starving nations of earth.

We honor the men in every organization, especially the Prohibition Party and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, who have been sacrificing and laboring for the accomplishment of this great reform. We are convinced that the ratification of the Federal Amendment providing for the complete prohibition of the beverage liquor traffic is the greatest issue before the country and the world. "We believe that the question is now before the people in the choice to be made by the election of candidates to the Legislature whose vote alone must determine whether our State of Indiana shall ratify or be joined to the small minority of States refusing to have any part in the moral triumph of the century." We believe that no man should put party above principle in this contest and that no

other nominations should be made or at least accepted until the candidates of the two majority parties have been given the opportunity to declare themselves unequivocally for ratification.

We deplore the fact that our country is fast becoming a nation of tobacco users, which is ruinous to the human body, and is degenerating and demoralizing to society. As a reform church we shall stand in the future as we have stood in the past—against this great eyil that is seeking to ruin every element of society.

In these days of food conservation when every available acre should be utilized to the raising of food and textile crops for the hungry and impoverished peoples of the earth, we declare our opposition to the use of one and a half millions of acres to the culture of tobacco.

We sincerely appreciate the relief work of the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. in the war and recommend that our people support them, but we utter our protest against these organizations being made the distributors of tobacco among our soldier boys.

We believe in the enfranchisement of women as legal voters, with equal rights to serve in all offices of trust.

We reaffirm our opposition to all approaches to a union of Church and State, and declare our opposition to any religious body or sect, whether Catholic or Protestant, being supported by public funds.

We raise our voice in alarm against Mormonism, which is now finding opportunity to foster their polygamous doctrine in the battletorn countries as a means of reproducing lost man-power. We deplore the fact that Brigham H. Roberts, a notorious polygamist, who was thought unfit to sit in the House of Representatives a few years ago, is now, by an appointment of the Governor of Utah, serving as a Chaplain in the Army of the United States. We declare for an amendment to the Federal Constitution bringing Mormon polygamists under Federal control.

Report No. 6.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

The Committee on Memorials begs leave to submit the following report:

The Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America, at its 70th session, August 13, 1918, hereby memorializes the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America, at its next session, to be held at Fairmount, Indiana, on the fourth Wednesday of June, 1919, to amend the Discipline as follows:

- 1. Add to paragraph 65, on page 39, the following: In the transaction of all the business of the Church, in monthly or church meetings, quarterly meetings, or voting for pastoral supply. If in the election of delegates to the Annual Conference, no members under the age of twelve years shall be entitled to vote.
- 2. Add to paragraph 73, page 44, the following: But no letter of standing shall be granted in the printed form of paragraph 359 of the Discipline of 1915 if said member shall be living in declared open violation of the requirements of the Discipline as agreed to in questions 1 to 5 inclusive of paragraph 69, or of the covenant taken when received. Members living in open violation of the Discipline as described above are not entitled to a vote in any business connected with the church, quarterly conference or pastoral supply.
- 3. Amend paragraph 118 by inserting the following after the words "provided for," where it speaks of the debt due the Publishing House: No letters of transfer or standing shall be granted during the interim of Conference or during the session of a Conference until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from his contract for service with the charge or Conference.
- 4. An addition to paragraph 96: Where a church or charge elects delegates to an Annual Conference and also elects reserves, it may also at that same meeting instruct the chairman of the meeting electing said delegates to issue a certificate of election to any member of said church or charge that may attend the Annual Conference, provided that the regularly elected delegates or the reserves cannot attend; provided further, that the church or charge gives said authority at the same meeting at which the delegates were elected; provided further, that should two or more members attend

the Annual Conference from a church or charge, the church or charge shall indicate which member it prefers as delegate by a consultation or called meeting for that purpose and shall indicate the same in writing to the chairman either by letter or by communication by the member to be given the certificate. If no such authority is given at the time of said election, then no such certificate of election shall be issued.

5. An amendment to paragraph 102 to be known as sub-paragraph 4, other numbers to be changed to correspond. Where a church desires to be made a station, that fact shall be made known to the quarterly conference of which it is a part, and canvassed. If in the judgment of said quarterly conference, said church, if made a station, can support a pastor; and, further, that if made a station it will not leave the rest of the charge too weak to support a pastor, then said church may petition the Annual Conference to make it a station. If in the judgment of the Annual Conference it can grant said petition without injury to the charge, it may grant such petition. Where a church cannot give a pastor a reasonable support as a station, or where it would so weaken a charge that it cannot give a pastor a reasonable support, said petition may not be granted. The Annual Conference, however, may so provide for the care of the weaker point as to grant said petition, if in the judgment of the conference the cause of Christ will be better served by granting same.

When charges think that they can be better grouped together than they are by the action of the last session of the Annual Conference, the regrouping of the same shall be brought up in the quarterly meetings of both or all charges affected by the proposed change, and fully agreed upon. Then said agreements shall be presented to the Annual Conference in the form of a petition asking for said regrouping of the churches composing the charge or charges, and if in the judgment of the Annual Conference said regrouping of the churches will be of advantage to all parties, it shall grant said request; but should it be apparent to the Annual Conference that said regrouping is not for the best, the Annual Conference shall have the right to refuse said request, and shall make such changes as will be to the advantage of all concerned.

6. An amendment by addition to paragraph 78, to be known as subs (1-2): (1) Where a church or charge judge it best to waive their rights in selecting a pastor, in such cases it shall be left to the Annual Conference to appoint a pastor for said church or charge, and when so appointed, said pastor shall be received by the church

or charge the same as if they had voted for said pastor. (2) In case any church or charge leaves the selection of a pastor open by not entering into an engagement, or taking any vote, the Annual Conference shall appoint a pastor for said church or charge as is provided for in paragraph 102, sub-paragraph (5), and when such an appointment is made the church or charge is under as much obligation to receive said pastor as if they had voted for said pastor.

7. An addition to section 8, page 82, to be known as paragraph 126: Any president of an Annual Conference may call a special session of the same when a petition to call the same is presented to him signed by two-thirds of all the pastors of said Annual Conference. It may meet at the place selected for the annual meeting or at any place selected by the President and his Advisory Board if it is better to do so. Said call must define the business to be transacted and no business not stated in the call shall be transacted at the special session. When a special session is called, the churches or charges must elect delegates the same as is provided for in regular sessions.

Report No. 8.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

We, your Committee on Finance, beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We recommend that Rev. J. O. Baker be elected Financial Agent for the Bible School.

- 2. That he receive three hundred dollars as a remuneration for his services as Financial Agent.
- 3. We recommend that three Conference Evangelists be elected and that the salary of each Evangelist be one thousand dollars; provided that the President shall be remunerated for all expenses incurred in the performance of his presidential duties during the year; the amount necessary for his remuneration to be taken from the Conference Mission Fund and Church Extension Fund.
- 4. The high price of living makes a raise in the salaries of our pastors imperative, and we do therefore recommend that all charges that have not heretofore paid a cash salary of \$800.00 and have not provided for a substantial increase in the pastor's salary for the coming year, be urgently requested to give the matter immediate attention with an increase of not less than 25 per cent. Under existing circumstances the minimum salary should not be less than \$800.00
- 5. When there are deficiencies in the salaries of the Conference Evangelists, we recommend that such deficits be paid from the arm of the work they represent.
- 6. During the year now past quarterly meeting dates have been cancelled and the Evangelists suffered a financial loss. This deficit has been paid by appropriation from the Conference budget. This is not just to the Conference, neither is it just to the Evangelist; and whereas, in the past this condition has brought confusion in the arrangement for Conference Evangelist visitations, and whereas, the cancelling of such dates on the part of the pastor or charge has worked a hardship on our Evangelists and brought a financial loss to them and the Conference, therefore be it resolved, that when pastors and charges deem it necessary to cancel dates with the duly elected representatives of the Conference, that said charge shall be responsible for the payment of the evangelistic apportionment assigned them.

We offer the following apportionments to the different charges for the various arms of the work during the coming year:

Report No. 10.

CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

I.

Organization.

The Sunday School is the Church at work winning souls for Christ. The work to reach the highest success should have some form of organization. Organization cannot take the place of spiritual life, but it is necessary to direct this energy, and unify the work.

The principles of organization under which our Sunday School work is to be carried on are as follows:

- 1. Locally, under the supervision of the Church through the Sunday School Board,
- The work of the various departments under the direction of efficient superintendents chosen by the Church through the Sunday School Board.
- 3. The Sunday School graded according to age and development and taught by godly teachers.
- 4. The organization of the Conference and Connection according to the Discipline for the most effectual service.

II

Enrollment.

- 1. Permanent records for the use of the Sunday School and Church should be kept of the entire enrollment of the school.
- 2. The teacher or class secretary should keep an enrollment of the membership of the class.
- 3. The superintendents of the Cradle Roll, Home and Temperance Departments should keep an accurate enrollment of the membership of the several departments, with the date of entrance, promotion or death.
- 4. A permanent record-should be kept by each local school of all young men who have registered for the Army. This record should contain the date of registration, mustering into service, mustering out of service, and all historical data. Record blanks are to be secured from the Conference Sunday School Secretary, together with a New Testament which contains a certificate of his membership in the Sunday School.

III.

Literature.

The Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature can not be successfully superseded by any other for our schools. This is one of our best means of indoctrinating our people with the fundamentals of Bible instruction. We urge all our Sunday Schools to encourage the use of our own literature in accordance with the Discipline.

IV.

Our Sunday School standards have proven to be a great stimulus and as a result we have reached a much higher degree of efficiency in the work for the Lord than formerly. Our Connectional Sunday School Board has incorporated the standards of this Conference and enlarged them into what is called "Efficiency Standards for Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools." We have adopted these standards. In these standards the per cent is given for each of the nineteen points required under the standard for Loyal Sunday Schools, and also for each of the thirteen requirements of the Front Line Sunday Schools. Thus each school may receive proper credit for all work performed.

V.

Constitution and By-Laws of Organized Classes.

Article I.

Article II.

The object of this class shall be Bible Study, soul winning, the extension of Christ's kingdom and mutual helpfulness among its members.

Article III.

The officers shall consist of a teacher, president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot, except the teacher, who is elected by the Church; but the class may make a request for its choice. The officers shall continue for one year, or until their successors are elected.

Article IV.

The standing committees shall be appointed or elected as follows: (1) Executive; (2) Devotional and Missionary; (3) Membership; (4) Program; (5) Memorial. Other committees may be created as needed. The executive committee shall consist of all the class officials, pastor and superintendent of the Sunday School.

Article V.

The class shall meet every Sabbath for Bible study in connection with the Sunday School.

The business meetings shall be held on the first Tuesday evening of each month. Special meetings may be called at any time by the president, teacher, or any five members of the class, by giving notice to the class on the Sabbath preceding the proposed

meeting. One-fourth of the enrolled membership shall constitute a quorum. The class shall meet quarterly as follows:

The first Monday evening of March, June, September and November.

The subject for the March meeting shall be "Studies in the Life of Christ."

The June meeting, a Home Coming, with an address on Sunday School work.

The September meeting shall be a Missionary meeting.

The theme for the November meeting shall be Temperance Reforms, or patriotic in nature.

Article VI.

In view of the evils that may arise from social features there shall be no refreshments served by the class for a financial consideration, nor shall games be indulged in by the class.

Article VII.

Duties of Officers and Committees.

Section 1. The teacher shall have charge of the lesson and shall be ex-officio member of all committees. The teacher must be consulted by the officers and committees relative to all subjects pertaining to class work and committee appointments.

Section 2. The president shall preside at all meetings of the class, except lesson period, and shall be the general executive officer. He shall be chairman of the executive committee and ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 3. The vice-president shall perform the duties of the president in his absence, and shall render such other assistance as may be required by the president.

Section 4. The secretary shall have charge of all records of the class, record the minutes of all business meetings and make all announcements. Also make a record of the attendance of the members each Sunday and report the same to the class or the secretary of the Sunday School as required.

Section 5. The treasurer shall have charge of all monies and pay it out as directed by the class in harmony with the rules of the Sunday School. Also to report to the class as often as required and to the treasurer of the Sunday School each Sunday.

Section 6. The executive committee shall have general supervision of the class work.

Section 7. The membership committee shall be responsible for securing new members, encouraging absentees and visiting the sick. Also for devising plans and methods for increasing the class attendance, and may call upon any member of the class for assistance, and for greeting, welcoming and introducing new members of the class and visitors.

Section 8. The devotional and missionary committee shall be responsible for the development of the religious life of the class through special prayer meetings, securing the presence of all members at regular church services, interesting them in Bible study, and enlisting every member in the regular work of the church, Sunday School, and other forms of missionary and benevolent Christian service.

Section 9. The program committee shall be responsible for arranging programs for the class meetings.

Article VIII.

The Constitution may be amended at any regular business meeting of the class by a two-thirds vote of the class enrollment. Any motion to amend must lay on the table at least one month before the final action is taken.

Article IX.

All the work on entertainment of the class shall be conducted in harmony with the rules and Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, of which we are a part. By-Laws may be adopted as the needs of the class may indicate.

By-Laws.

- No. 1. A committee shall be composed of as many members as the needs may require. The committee work may also be organized to the best advantage to accomplish the greatest results.
- No. 2. The class president shall have power to divide the class into four sections for the quarterly meeting occasion. These sections shall have charge in rotation of serving refreshments. Not more than two articles shall be served as refreshments at any one meeting.

VI.

Departments.

We consider our Sunday School Departmental work as providential opportunities of performing successful service for Jesus. They offer the Church an opportunity to take hold of the child as soon as it enters this world and to continue this relation throughout life. They also afford the most excellent means of building up the depleted Sunday Schools.

VII.

Redistricting.

We recommend that the districts of the Conference and the superintendents of the same be as follows:

Northern-E. J. Pitts.

North Central-F. O. Spitlar.

Eastern-E. E. Cory.

Western-D. C. Doolev.

South Western-T. M. Bodenhorn.

South Central-H. T. Arnold.

Southern-H. T. Hawkins.

We further recommend that the highwater mark for the district work for the coming year be the same as last year:

25 per cent increase in the Cradle Roll Department.

25 per cent increase in the Home Department.

15 per cent increase in the total membership of our schools.

40 per cent increase in the number signing temperance pledge.

25 per cent increase in the Teachers' Training Course.

VIII.

Reorganization, Statistics and Statistical Information.

- 1. We recommend that all schools in the Indiana Conference reorganize between the first and the fifteenth of July of each year.
- 2. Each local superintendent of departments and of the main school shall report their work to the quarterly conference, also shall give a duplicate to the pastor. The pastor shall report the work annually to the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

IX.

Circuit and District Conventions.

1. We recommend that the work of the Circuit and District Conventions be carried out on a general plan similar to that adopted in the Spring District Conventions this year.

2. The Circuit Conventions shall be conducted by the pastor

and such help as he may be able to call to his assistance.

3. The District Convention shall be under the supervision of the District Superintendents and Conference Sunday School Secretary where possible, or others.

X.

1. We recommend that the Conference apportionment be five cents per member enrolled in the main school.

2. In view of present war conditions and the depleted list of pastors as a result, therefore we recommend that the Conference Sunday School Secretary be not required to attend conventions, but that this work be performed by the district superintendents, pastors, and the secretary when possible, but he shall have general oversight of all the Conference Sunday School work and shall by correspondence and otherwise co-operate with the pastors and Sunday School superintendents and assist them in carrying out the plans of the Connectional Sunday School Board.

SPECIAL REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES ON COLLEGE ENDOWMENT.

We, the Board of Trustees, beg leave to submit the following proposition to raise Endowment for a Central Connectional College to be located in Indiana:

Considering the needs of the School work in the Connection, and the times in which we live, we believe that the time in which to make this the most important effort in the history of the Church has arrived, therefore we recommend:

- 1. That October, 1918, be designated as the time for the Endowment drive, beginning with the first Sunday in the month and continuing until the goal has been reached.
- 2. We recommend that \$100,000 be raised in interest bearing notes or bonds.
- 3. All notes shall bear 5 per cent interest from the date that the \$100,000 is obtained.
- 4. Any person giving a note shall have the privilege of paying any part or all of the principal at any annual interest paying day.
 - 5. On this Endowment Liberty Bonds may be accepted at par.
- 6. We further recommend that in case anything thwarts the accomplishment of the purpose of the enterprise that the notes or bonds and the interest that may have accrued thereon be returned to the donors.
- 7. We further recommend that the management and control of the Endowment Campaign be placed in the hands of the Superintendent of the Bible School and the Conference President. That the pastors of the various circuits be the special agents of the campaign in their respective charges, with the privilege of calling to their assistance any member of the Conference whom they may choose. These pastors or agents shall mail a report of their success to the Conference President each Monday morning.
- 8. We recommend that, beginning with the adoption of this plan, that an article be published each week in the Wesleyan Methodist explaining the plan and urging our people to prosecute the work to a successful issue.
- 9. We recommend that at the adoption of this report an appeal be made to raise as great a sum of the needed amount as is possible as an incentive and encouragement to the faith and activity of our people.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

10. We recommend that the Trustees of the Indiana Conference be custodians of the notes and bonds that may be raised, and that they be so managed until ready to turn over to the Educational Society that they be safeguarded against loss to anybody.

Second Meeting, Wednesday, 6:30 P. M.

The devotions were conducted by Dollie R. Eddy.

Vesta Zike offered her resignation as Committee on Courtesies, which was accepted, and Ida Hopkins was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mrs. Anna Kirk Folger, General Organizer, was introduced to the audience, and gave an inspiring and helpful address regarding missions, especially the Home work in the Blue Ridge Mountains.

The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday at 9 A. M.

Third Meeting, Thursday, 9:00 A. M.

The devotions were conducted by Josephine Akright and Gertrude Ross.

The Roll of Societies was called and twenty-six responded.

The President read her annual address and gave her report for the year. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 1.)

It was moved and supported that the address and report be

published in the Wesleyan.

The Society then proceeded with the election of officers for the coming year.

Auvie Northam was unanimously elected President upon the

first ballot.

Upon motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Mary Smith for Vice-President. This was done and she was declared elected.

Upon motion Nettie Carter was instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Mabel Rich for Secretary. This was done and she was declared elected.

Upon motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Bessie Baker for Treasurer. This was done and she was declared elected.

Upon motion Bessie Baker was given the privilege of choosing an assistant. She chose Mary Smith.

Upon motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Nettie Carter for Superintendent of the Y. M. W. B. This was done and she was declared elected.

Emma Hawkins was elected to fill the vacancy on the Statistical Committee caused by the expiration of the term of Ida Payne.

Upon motion Bessie Baker was appointed to purchase a membership Banner for the Y. M. W. B.

The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday at 7: P. M.

The Society then proceeded to elect Bessie Baker Delegate to the General Conference Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, with Mary Spitlar as her Alternate.

Dollie R. Eddy, returned Missionary, gave a very interesting address regarding our work in Africa.

Upon motion Ida Hopkins was elected Conference Organizer.

The Committee on Resolutions offered their report. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

A resolution was offered that we remunerate our five officers to the amount of five dollars each from the rent fund. The resolution was adopted.

The Committee on Memorials offered their report. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 4.)

The Superintendent of Rooms gave her report. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 8.)
