- 1. THE CONFERENCE TREASURER is authorized to close his books two weeks before Conference convenes.
- 2. THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT and the Board of Trustees shall constitute a committee for the building and location of churches and parsonages and the examining of deeds, and the transferring of property.
- 3. THE OFFICE EXPENSE of the President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be paid by the Conference.
- 4. ALL LEGAL DOCUMENTS shall be held in the custody of the Conference President and the same be locked in a fire-proof safe.
- 5. THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT shall have power to arrange the religious services at Annual Conference.
- 6. THE CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE shall consist of twelve members with equal representation from each District and the Conference President as Chairman. The Conference WY President shall be an ex-officio member.
- 7. ALL CONFERENCE TREASURERS shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper or auditor.
- 8. THE CHURCH TREASURER is authorized to close his books the last Sunday of June.
- 9. ALL PASTORS are to be given a two weeks paid vacation with one Sunday absent from the pulpit. Time spent at Annual Conference and Camp Meeting shall not be counted as vacation but is required as pastoral obligation.
- 10. IT SHALL BE THE DUTY OF ALL PASTORS to look after the insurance of their church and parsonage. All insurance shall provide for fire, lightning and tornado. If the Church fails to do so upon reasonable efforts of the Pastor, the Conference President shall be notified and he shall take care of such business. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall make him responsible to the Conference Board of Trustees and the Conference President.
- 11. EACH PASTOR is requested to keep a file of his calling list and all those connected with the Church and Sunday School, with names, addresses and phone numbers; and that the same be kept for his own work or to be turned over to his successor.
- 12.EACH PASTOR should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church to help establish it. The Church which he serves as Pastor

should grant him such privileges without censure and with full renumeration of salary while in such meetings. The President shall serve as co-ordinator and help arrange such meetings.

13. THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT shall appoint at a proper time two more members to serve on the statistical committee.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Georgia Annual Conference, Inc., of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for its first united annual session on Union Point Campgrounds at Union Point, Georgia, on August 1, 1960 at 4:00 p. m.

OFENING- The President, the Rev. W. M. Fhillippe, Jr., called to Conference to order. The Rev. Ralph Day led in devotions.

ROLL CALL- The roll call was made. Thirty-one ministers and twenty-seven delegates were marked present.

EAR OF CONFERENCE- The bar of the Conference was fixed to include the first five rows of seats and the platform.

HCURS FOR CONFERENCE- It was voted that business begin at 8:30 A. M. and be adjourned at 12:00 noon; be resumed in the afternoon at the call of the chair and adjourned by vote.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE- The Committee on Nominations made its report, which was adopted. (See report No. 1) The motion carried that vacancies be referred back to the Committee on Nominations.

CRDERS OF THE DAY REPORT- The Committee on Orders of the Day made its report, which was adopted. (See report No. 2)

RULING ON AUDITING- The motion carried that those who had not had their financial reports already audited by some accredited bookkeeper, should turn their reports over to the Conference Auditing Committee.

STANDING RULES- The Standing Rules of the Conference, which had been drawn up by the Legal Advice Committee and ratified by the Conference President and his Advisory Board, were read for information. A motion carried, expressing the approval of the Conference Body.

ADJOURNMENT- Adjournment by motion. Closed with prayer.

TUESDAY MORNING MEETING 8:30 A. M.

CPENING- The meeting was called to order by the President the Rev. W. M. Phillippe, Jr. The President led in devetions and officiated in the observance of the Lord's Supper.

ROLL CALL. The roll call was called and Nathan Poppell was seated as a delegate from Bethlehem. The Minutes were read and approved.

COMMITTEE ON COURTESY- The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. V. A. Mitchell, Secretary of Church Extension and Evangelism; and Dr. R. C. Mullinax, President of Central College. The motion carried that those presented by this committee be invited to remain within the Conference Bar.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT- The Rev. V. A. Mitchell was called to the chair and the President read his report. The motion carried that the general report be adopted. The motion carried that the report of labors and official acts be adopted.

The motion carried that the general report be sent to the Editor of The Wesleyan Methodist for possible publica-

tion.

It was voted that only the goals, financial, and official acts portions of the President's Report, in condensed form, be printed in the Conference Minutes. (Report No. 3)

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ORDERS- The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders made a partial report which was adopted. (See Report No. 4)

ORDER OF THE DAY- The time for Orders of the Day having arrived, Dr. R. C. Mullinax delivered an address in behalf of Central College.

RESCINDED ACTION- The motion carried that the action which referred vacancies of the session committees back to the Nominating Committee be rescinded.

AUDITING COMMITTEE MEMBER- W. H. Hampton was nominated and elected to serve on the auditing committee in the vacancy made by the absence of Jesse Towner. The motion carried that the balance of vacancies of the session committees be referred back to the Committee on Nominations.

ORDER OF THE DAY- The time for Orders of the Bay having arrived, the Ordination Service of James Meaders and J. L. Hilliard took place. The Rev. V. A. Mitchell brought the ordination address.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON 1:30

OPENING- The Conference was called to order by the President. After a congregational song, E. C. Moon led in prayer.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT- The report of the Vice Presiden Ralph Day was read and adopted. (See report No. 5)

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS- The Committee on Nominations brought a final report which was adopted. (Report No. 1)

COMMITTEE ON COURTESY- The Committee on Courtesy presented the Rev. and Mrs. Richard Lively of Houghton, New York, and Mr. Duane Huff of Atlanta, Georgia.

ORDER OF THE DAY- The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, the Conference proceeded to the election of Conference officials. The chair appointed tellers as follows: James Meaders, Raymond Phillips, Jimmy Moss and James Teddars.

On the first ballot, W. M. Phillippe, Jr. was elected Conference President with 38 out of 69 votes.

Cn the first ballot, R. R. Hicks was elected Vice Presi-

dent with 51 out of 69 votes.

There was a unanimous standing vote of pledged support

to the newly elected President.

On the first ballot, P. L. Swauger was elected Secretary with 50 out of 69 votes.

There was a vote of appreciation for Dr. Mullinax with the request that he carry greetings from the Georgia Conference to the Alabama Conference to which he was going.

There was a vote of appreciation to Mrs. R. L. Hamby for thirty years of faithful service in the office of secretary for the North Georgia Conference.

A Nominating Committee for the purpose of nominating a Trustee for the Central College Local Board of Trustees was nominated and elected as follows: E. C. Strickland, Ralph Day, Okay Highsmith.

M. L. Arnold was nominated and elected to serve as the

Conference Sunday School Secretary.

A motion carried to elect three members for the Sunday School Board. They were nominated and elected as follows: Gene Smith (Term expires 1962), S. A. Hamby (1961), and Grady King (1961).

James Meaders was nominated and elected to the office

of Educational Secretary.

W. M. Phillippe, Sr., was nominated and elected to

the office of Tithing Secretary.

R. R. Hicks was nominated and elected to the office of

Secretary of Evangelism.

M. A. Lively was nominated and elected to the office of Secretary of Wesleyan Men.

N. C. Hoggle was nominated and elected to the office of

Pension Plan Secretary.
The Committe on Church Extension and Evangelism was nominated and elected as follows: W. M. Phillippe, Jr., ex officio chairman; R. R. Hicks, T. W. Mobley, J. L. Hilliam, Mrs. P. L. Swauger, Mrs. J. C. Duke.

The Special Committee on Nominations nominated W. M. Phillippe, Jr. to be Trustee for Central College Local Board of Trustees. He was elected by ballot with 46 out of 66 votes. The same Committee nominated S. A. Hamby as alternate member and he was elected with 57 out of 69 votes.

VACANCY COMMITTEE- The members of the Committee on Vacancies were nominated and elected as follows: C. L.Cawthor Chairman; N. C. Hoggle, P. L. Swauger, Glenn Day, N. Poppell

JUDICIARY COMMITTEE- Ralph Day, Chairman; M. L. Arnold, C. M. Payne, W. T. Brinson. Nominated and elected.

FINANCE COMMITTEE- The motion carried that the Finance Committe be elected as a session committee at the next annual Conference.

STATISTICAL COMMITTEE- Glenn Day was nominated and elected to serve as Statistical Committe Chairman. The motion carried that the persons on the Statistical Committee not be asked to serve more than one year consecutively.

The motion carried that the President appoint at proper time two more members of the Statistical Committee and that the same be standing rule no. 13.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS ORDERS- P. L. Swauger, Chairman; (4 year term); R. R. Hicks, (3 year term); W. M. Phillippe, Sr., (2 year term); J. C. Duke, (1 Year term).

CAMP MEETING BOARD- The motion carried that the word "honorary" be deleted and that the word "ex-officio" be inserted in its place in standing rule no. 6. The item of Camp Meeting Board elections was tabled.
CARD CALL SECRETARY- P. L. Swauger was nominated and

elected to serve as Card Call Secretary.

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT- A report of the Auditing Committee was made and adopted. (See Report No. 6)

REPORT No. 12. MORAL REFORM

Balance on Hand

In as much as the followers of Christ have the responsibility of exercising their influence upon the home, school church and government, we feel it necessary that a voice be raised in proper support of these and other established institutions.

FAMILY- The family is the foundation of our society and therefore must be strong in its influence. This can best be accomplished through daily family devotions, group activity and family discussions. The family heads should seek to protect the family interests through the consciousness of such threatening influences as divorce, unprofitable radio and television programs, unwholesome music and literature.

CREATION- We reaffirm our faith in the creation of man

by the immediate creative act of God according to the Bible account, and not by the process of evolutionary transition from a lower form of animalism to his present physical and intellectual condition. We abhor the present day teaching of the Darwin Theory of evolution because of its undermining influence of the basic principles of the Holy Writ, and its lack of scientific and Biblical proof. We believe that true science and the Holy Bible are not in conflict.

SOCIAL VIRTUES- The youth of today are faced with severe moral problems. We recommend that parents fulfill diligently their duty, by informing the youth of the facts of life, so as to help prepare them to face the realities of living. An urgent need exists for proper respect of authority and of the evils of tabacco.

SOCIAL INTERGRATION- Believing in the dignity of the individual and in the "right of personal choice", we urge continued opposition to the movement of social intergration in our schools, intermarriage, and other such traditional institutions. We believe that every man has the right to choose who shall be his friends, etc. We believe that the recent "sit-down" movements are not consistent with Christian conscience, because it takes away the right of a business way to traditional reservations. In all of these matters we urge careful thought and a prayerful approach to the solution of these problems.

CHURCH- We urge that each Church support whole-heartedly the general evangelistic program of "Operation Outreach".
The church must fall on its face crying out for revival! We
must present Christ as the answer to the world's problems.
Our people should give special attention to the preaching
and practicing of heart holiness according to the Wesleyan
tradition. We recommend a greater use of the Fundamental
Hymns of the Church, and we call for more doctrinal preaching and teaching from the pulpit. Our churches should endeavor to arrange youth recreation based upon Christian principles. There is a greater need for our people to be more
diligent in church and prayer meeting attendance. Full support is urged for the District and Conference activities
such as camp meetings, conventions, etc.

POLITICAL AND RELIGIOUS FREEDOM— We bring to the attention of all freedom loving people the threats to our political and religious freedom, and urge continued dedication to our historical position of the principle of separation of church and state. We request that our people keep this in mind when they cast their secret ballot in the upcoming national presidential election. Because of the historical "religious-political" philosophy of the Roman Catholic Church

we believe that no Catholic President can be loyal to the Constitution of the United States and at the same time be loyal to the Catholic Church.

Be it further resolved that the Georgia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America continue to oppose the admittance of Red China to the United Nations and also to oppose United States recognition of Red China. We further object to the visits to this country of high level members of the Soviet and other Communist nations.

MINUTES

OF THE

FIRST ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY

OF THE

GEORGIA CONFERENCE

OF THE

WESIEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF AMERICA

HELD AT UNION POINT, GEORGIA

AUGUST 1, 2, and 3, 1960

- 1. All monies to World Missions, Church Extension or other missionary enterprises must be channeled through the Conference Treasurer.
- 2. The closing dates of the quarters shall be September 30, December 30, March 30, and June 30. All monies and receipts shall be remitted not later than five days after the ending of each quarter.
- 3. The local treasurer's books shall close June 30, and the annual statistical reports shall be postmarked by July 7.
- 4. The Conference Treasurer's book shall close July 15, and she shall mail said reports to the Chairman of the Statistical Committee by July 22.
- 5. Membership dues shall be one dollar and fifty cents (General, \$1.00; Conference Work Fund, 50¢).
- 6. Benevolent Credits: Credit shall be given to all societies for receipts properly signed by the pastor, local President and local Treasurer. Said receipts are to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- 7. The election of conference officers shall be at the Tuesday afternoon meeting of the Conference session.
- 8. Delegate's credentials for the Conference shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than July 15.
- 9. The Y. M. W. B. is recognized as a part of the missionary work. The superintendents of the local bands shall be seated within the Conference bar without voting privileges. Local Y. M. W. B. Superintendent's reports shall be mailed to the Conference Superintendent not later than July 15.
- 10. The Conference Treasurer shall have her books audited by a competent auditor and submit a statement from the auditor to the Conference.
- 11.
 All conference officers, local presidents and duly elected delegates shall compose the voting body of the Conference.
- 12. There shall be two district chairmen to promote projects conventions and other missionary interests.
- 13. The reading of the statistical report by the delegate shall be preceded by a personal testimony. Item to be read are: name of society, name of president, number of members, total receipts, all disbursements and any other item of interest.

- 14. Friday before Conference shall be observed as a day of fasting and prayer.
- 15. Each society shall send to the Conference Treasurer at least \$5.00 annually for General Church Extension and Evangelism.
- 16. Time shall be given the Conference Y. M. W. B. Superintendent to conduct a workshop during the Annual Conference Session.

Report of the Special Treasurer for the mimeograph machine was given and adopted. Report No. 4.

Post Office Committee was appointed by the chairman: Sandra Day and Beckey Perkins.

- That the W. Y. Conference year run parallel with the Annual Conference year.
- That the conference W. Y. Executive Council make up the Youth Camp Committee.
- That the W. Y. Conference dues and money for the paper be 90¢ per member.
- That locals pay budget on active members reported at conference for the incoming year.

Motion with support was carried that the District Chairmen be members of the W_{\bullet} Y_{\bullet} Council.

Motion with support was carried that all matters overlooked be left in the hands of the President.

Motion was carried to adjourn.

Conference was dismissed in prayer by W. M. Phillippe. Jr.
