The Conference Treasurer is hereby authorized to remit the President's salary semi-monthly. We further recommend that if the budget does not take care of the President's salary, the deficit be taken out of the Pioneer Fund. We further recommend that the Conference President's utility bills be paid out of the Conference Fund.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, 9:30 A.M.

OPENING - The Tennessee Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for its Twenty-ninth Annual Session on the Campground at 9:30 A.M., Tuesday July 15, 1958.

Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. M. L. Arnold. Rev. Carl Cox conducted devotions. Roll was called with 12 Elders, 4 Conference Preachers, and 19 Delegates responding. Mrs. C. H. Cummings, Juanita Cronnon, Mrs. J. A. Cassady, and Clyde Scott were seated as alternate delegates. It was voted to include in the roll call those who were listed as supply pastors. It was voted that preachers who have been given an appointment since last annual conference be seated and given full privilege of voting. It was voted that the first five rows of seats forward be the Bar of Conference.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ORDERS - The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders gave its report, which was adopted. (See Report #10).

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS - Committee on Resolutions reported. Voted by two-thirds standing vote that: in Item 6 the wording "and other worldly manifestations on the person" be placed after the wording "unnecessary ornaments"; in Item 25 the word "financing" be inserted following the word "place"; and that a new resolution, to be Item 30, read as follows: "That all officers and standing committees assume their duties at the close of the sitting of Conference at which they are elected".

Voted that each church, through its delegate, send a report of the pastoral vote to the Committee on Pastoral Relations at Conference.

PASTORAL RELATIONS - The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its report, which was adopted. (See Report #11).

Upon motion, Conference adjourned sine die. Benediction.

**RESOLUTION AND LAWS  
OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE**

(Page 10)

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: Be it resolved, that these articles shall become the standing rules and law of this Conference:

1. Before a local building committee proceeds with a building plan or program that they be required to have all plans approved by the President and his Advisory Board and the Missionary Board; and further, that no financial obligations be assumed without the consent of the Conference Trustees.

2. That the Board of Conference Trustees be, and they are hereby empowered, to sign all papers necessary for the sale or transfer of Conference, Church or Parsonage property, proving the said sale of transfer is authorized by the President and his Advisory Board and shall not violate the spirit of paragraphs 388, 387 of our Book of Discipline.

3. The Board of Conference Trustees are hereby authorized to execute papers to secure funds for the liquidation of Conference, Church or Parsonage indebtedness, providing that the Churches set forth in writing the amount and the purposes for which the loan is to be used; and that no funds so secured shall be used for any other purpose than that set forth in the notice to the trustees of the Conference.

4. When a deed for Conference, Church or Parsonage property is received and before it is recorded it shall be referred to the President and his Advisory Board who are hereby designated as a Deed Examining Committee whose duty shall be to examine the deed and see that there are such disciplinary clauses included as may be necessary to make the property secure to our Church. Said Committee shall have power to engage such legal advice as may be needed to insure the proper steps regarding the reception or transfer of the property. See paragraphs 388, 389 of present Book of Discipline.

5. We shall proclaim with voice and pen and holy living the gospel of full salvation, recognizing our dependence upon, and need of the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

6. We shall continue to interpret the teachings of the Scriptures and the Special Rules of the Discipline in accord with the standards held by the early Methodists and the Wesleyans of the past generations. To this end we reaffirm our stand against the reception of any member as a full member who wears jewelry, including the wedding band or other unnecessary ornaments, and declare ourselves in favor of higher standards of dress, and other world manifestations on the person. Our ministers are asked to refrain from performing wedding ceremonies using the ring, and to be positive in their declarations regarding this entering wedge of worldliness. We further declare our opposition to such things as commercialized ball games, Sabbath desecration, theatres, television, and such like, and shall support our ministers in their endeavors to counteract these menaces. We further urge our ministers to take an active stand in exposing the three "C's" of the world—Communism, Catholicism, and Compromise.

7. We urge all Conference Preachers and Elders to become members of the Women's Missionary Society, and that the pastors attend each meeting and encourage the women, this being one of the strong arms of the Church.

8. Each Church shall make a special effort in behalf, and loyally support the Church Extension Card Plan.

9. EACH PASTOR, OR CHARGE, SHALL HAVE IN THE HANDS OF THE STATISTICAL SECRETARY NOT LESS THAN FIVE DAYS BEFORE THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE, ONE COPY OF HIS STATISTICAL REPORT IN FULL. This report shall be accompanied by a statement from the Conference Treasurer giving the amounts paid on budget under item VIII in the pastor's statistical report, and the pastor's report must check with that of the Conference Treasurer.

10. The Conference Treasurer's books shall close on June 30 of each year and no credit shall be given on the Budget for that fiscal year for money received after this date.

11. The President's Secretary's and Treasurer's correspondence expenses shall be paid from the Conference Fund by the Conference Treasurer.

12. Minutes of this Conference shall be published through arrangements made by the Missionary Board and delivered to the pastors in numbers equal to 50% of their Church membership.

13. Preachers and Delegates shall remain throughout the entire Conference session unless providentially hindered or excused by the Conference.

14. All Elders received from other denominations shall be required to pass examination on our Book of Discipline, and must have passed a course of study which is equivalent to our course for ordination, and harmonize with our theological views. They shall give special attention to the requirements found in paragraphs 171 of our Book of Discipline.

15. Copies of these resolutions, together with the apportionments and the addresses of the President, Secretary and Treasurer, shall be in the hands of each pastor within two weeks of the close of the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary be authorized to carry out this resolution.

16. Pastors shall mail all Delegates' credentials to the Conference Secretary not less than five (5) days before convening of Conference.

17. The Conference Budget shall be raised and remitted monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

18. All monies which are reported through the Conference Treasurer shall be set to him either as cash or receipts and he shall give Conference Treasurer's receipt for each item, and no money shall be listed paid out by the Treasurer except by check, on order of the President, and he shall be required to present cancelled checks and vouchers for each bill paid.

19. Those wishing to take examinations in the Course of Study for credit during any year, shall write for questions before May 31 of that year, and shall have the answers in the hands of the proper instructor before June 30 for credit for that year. The Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall not be expected to send out questions or accept papers after these dates.

20. It shall be a standing rule that the Secretary shall be remunerated the sum of \$50.00 for each session of Conference. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be given \$25.00 per year for services.

21. We recommend that when the Conference President labors as an evangelist in any of our Churches, he be paid as other evangelists are paid.

22. Each unorganized work which is being run under the direction of the Conference and served by a member of this body, shall be allowed to elect an honorary delegate who shall be permitted to sit with the Conference and speak on matters of business, but not allowed to vote.

23. The Conference President shall be required to hold Quarterly Business Meetings at all unorganized works that are under the Conference Missionary Board or with the Conference, and the pastors of these works shall receive an offering quarterly to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and used toward the President's salary. Treasurers of these unorganized works shall be members of some Wesleyan Methodist Church unless otherwise approved by the Conference Missionary Board.

24. In order to help maintain the spirit of brotherhood among our members and ministers, we ask that designations of titles, degrees and authority be omitted both in our public meetings and in the printed minutes, except in the first public introduction of each individual.

25. The Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders will be responsible for the time, place, financing, and program of the Ministerial Convention each year.

26. The Conference President and his Advisory Board is a constituted committee on Special Orders.

27. As television is a satanic miracle to wreck the Christian Faith, our ministers are asked to take a stand against it, preach against it, and condemn it, and that no minister or delegate be elected to office who has a television set or who is in favor of it. And, we recommend the local churches hold the same standard.

28. That outgoing pastor's responsibility continue through the Sunday following Annual Conference. Also, that a church allow its pastor at least two meetings away from the church and that he be given at least one week's vacation with pay; that last provision to include the Conference President.

29. That no budget credit be given until payment is itemized, or otherwise specified.

30. That all officers and standing committees assume their duties at the close of the sitting of conference at which they are elected.

31. Before any of these resolutions and laws of the Tennessee Conference can be changed or repealed, it shall require a two-thirds standing vote of the Conference body.

REPORT I

Report of the President to the Twenty-ninth Annual Conference of the Tennessee Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

**Christian Greetings:**

We need not remind you that these are crisis days. It is evident in many ways. The need of the hour is great, and should grip us with a sense of urgency. War threatens the nations. Greed, lust and immorality are on every hand. One news analyst said recently, while discussing an outbreak of war in a certain place, something like this: The leaders of these countries will awaken to the realization that they have fought a war for which there is no excuse, a war that should never have been fought, a war that nobody can hope to win.

I am fearful that the church is about to engage in a war in which we shall all be the losers, a war for which there is no excuse.

Sometime ago while driving through the Shiloh battleground near Savannah, Tennessee, I drove slowly enough to note the heaps of cannon ball, made into pyramids, dotting the woods, and the guns used to fire them. I read the names of States, some Southern, some Northern, some Western, on the great memorials, which had sent men to this spot to kill fellow Americans, or to be killed, perhaps by one who had been a neighbor. I could visualize men stalking those woods in search of a supposed enemy, who was only a friend who did not understand, or who was on another side. I was told of "Bloody Pond" where men came from both sides of the battle to lay down their weapons and bathe their wounds in the same water until it was stained red with the blood of brothers, of friends who had become enemies, but who now laid aside their weapons that they might attend to their hurt. This perhaps could be called another for which we can see no excuse today.

Then I thought of Calvary, with its crimson stream, where the wounds of the soul, the wounds of division and strife, can be bathed and cleansed. Let us who are here today see that all carnal weapons are laid aside, and stepping into the stream from Calvary, be cleansed of all that would divide, all that would break fellowship, and shoulder to shoulder fight the one fight for which there is an excuse, the one we can surely win, the battle against sin. In the fear of God, let this be so.

**Our Official Acts:**

Soon after the close of conference, James Wilkins was appointed to supply Mountain View Mission.

September 4, 1957 - we received the resignation of Winfred McNally as pastor of Shadeland Mission.

We requested Rev. Ealis Stephens to fill the pulpit at Corinth for a few weeks and, later, appointed him as supply pastor there at the request of the church.

October 2, 1957 - we received an appeal from a representative of a group at Knoxville. First from an opinion given by me at a Fourth Quarterly Conference of the church in June of 1957, concerning the legality of certain resolutions adopted by the church. I stated, in answer to this appeal, that "Although I was forced seemingly to offer my opinion at that time without time for study or thought, and although I must state frankly that I am not quite as sure of my ground in ruling the resolutions legal, since giving them more study, I feel that since it would be a reversal of my previous ruling, possibly giving the impression to some that I could not be trusted to abide by my own decisions, and also, since the group has the right of appeal from my decision to the President of the General Conference, Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, I prefer to let my ruling stand."

November 30, 1957 - we held a pre-organizational meeting with a group at Maryville.

December 15, 1957 - we organized a church at Maryville, Tennessee with nine full members. They voted to be called the Maryville First Church. We recommend they be received.

December 15, 1957 - we received Rev. Ray Hubbard as a conference preacher, and appointed him pastor of the Maryville Church.

February 15, 1958 - E. B. Carnes surrendered his elders credentials and requested that the church forgive him.

May 15, 1958 - we accepted the resignation of T. J. Arnold as pastor of Johnson City to become effective on May 30, 1958.

June 25, 1958 - we granted a letter of transfer to T. J. Arnold, Conference Preacher, to the Indiana Conference.

June 25, 1958 - we granted a letter of transfer to James Blackburn, Conference Preacher, to the Ohio Conference.



## Other Activities:

We have preached about 150 times; conducted a short revival; assisted in pioneer revival at Maryville.

Conducted 45 Quarterly Conferences; supplied at Oak Ridge most of the year.

Assisted in Youth Camp, Conference Ministerial Convention and Southern Area Convention at Central.

Have served as editor of the Tidings, as camp president with about 30 days labor on camp ground, and have travelled approximately 19,000 miles in caring for work of conference and churches.

## Material Progress:

Mascot Church has remodelled and added Sunday School rooms.

Stair Avenue has remodelled entire main building with addition of four class rooms.

Maryville Church added to our number with fine prospects for a strong church.

Clinton completed addition to parsonage of two nice rooms and bath, with garage underneath.

Oak Ridge has bought new pews.

Harriman, First is in process of adding class rooms.

Scarborough is adding new concrete porch and vestibule with belfry.

Freedom Hill built two new porches and re-roofed parsonage.

## REPORT III

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BOARD

The Missionary Board of the Conference transacted the following business during the Conference year:

July 18, 1957:

1. Voted to authorize payment on moving bills of the smaller churches where needed.
2. Voted to continue the publication of "The Tennessee Conference Tidings" with the staff set-up as of last year.
3. Voted to pay the kitchen help and registrar for the conference session as follows: Mrs. Arnold - \$20.00, Thomas Arnold - \$20.00, Registrar - \$10.00, Carl Reed - mileage at 5¢ per mile for 170 miles.
4. Revs. Arnold, Hampton, and Herron were elected as an executive committee.

October 25, 1957:

- Voted to purchase an available property in Maryville, Tennessee with arrangement for loan and placing of pastor and arranging for a revival and organization of church left in hands of the Executive Committee, and that when organized, the church be under the direction of the Executive Committee and the Advisory Board of the Conference.

December 10, 1957:

1. Voted to approve the action of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders in asking the churches for contribution to ministerial convention.
2. Voted to authorize the Tennessee Conference Member of Board of Trustees of Central College to present recommendation to the said Board of Trustees requesting clarifying of certain resolution adopted last year by the board and concerning which the Missionary Board had requested clarification.
3. Approved the application of the Stair Avenue Church for a Card Call, with the Conference President making explanation on answers on questionnaire.
4. Approved request of the Mascot Church to be allowed to secure loan for purpose of buying pews and certain other improvements on the church.
5. The Executive Committee was designated as a committee to investigate the need of the Conference parsonage upkeep and repair and to report back to the Missionary Board.
6. Motion prevailed by unanimous vote, that we give to Knoxville First Church and its pastor a vote of confidence in the matter in dispute regarding the standards for leaders adopted by that church on June 19, 1957.
7. Motion prevailed, by unanimous vote, that the Missionary Board voice a question as to the legality of the action taken regarding the vote of Knoxville First Church on Leadership Standards, since the Conference President's ruling was given before the last session of the Annual Conference and since this was not reported to the Annual Conference and no action was taken by that session, and since no ruling has been given during this conference year, thus making the appeal to the General President out of order, due to the time element involved; and since we feel that any complaint involving a local church should be dealt with according to paragraph 411 of the discipline: It was voted that the secretary pro-tem communicate these actions to the General Conference President.

July 8, 1958:

1. Voted to pay note on property held by the Oak Ridge Church.
2. Voted to defer action on matter concerning the Rockdale Church.
3. Voted to engage the same workers for kitchen and entertainment at conference as used at camp with proportionate pay for time served.
4. Voted to pay the Camp Meeting Association \$100.00 out of entertainment fund if possible.
5. Voted to recommend that the Conference have only men of the Conference to preside at the Conference Sessions.
6. Voted to request the Conference representative on the Central College Board of Trustees report to the Conference regarding certain recent developments at Central College and that notification of this intention be conveyed to the President of Central College and opportunity be given to the President to appear or send representative before the board before this report be given.

JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

The Judiciary Committee of the Tennessee Conference submits the following report:

On January 16, 1958, we were called into session to consider an appeal and complaint filed with the Board by Knoxville, First Church, through its pastor and Advisory Board.

The Committee was advised that on June 19, 1957, the Church had adopted a statement of policy to follow in the selection of its Leaders. An appeal had been made to the Conference President for a ruling as to whether or not the church had a right to establish such a policy, and he ruled that the church did have a right to do so. This ruling was made before the last session of the Annual Conference. As a result of this, certain members of the church quit attending services and started something of a counter move by having services of their own, etc. Some five months after the 1957 session of the Annual Conference, the withdrawn group appealed the Conference President's ruling to the General President for a ruling by him.

As a result of this appeal, the General President handed down a supposed ruling, not on the Conference President's ruling, but on the individual items within the statement of policy, ruling that they were illegal. It was due to this supposed ruling that an appeal was made to the Judiciary Committee for advice in the matter. This appeal was made strictly according to the Discipline which states in paragraph 411, "A complaint against an offending church shall be presented to the Chairman of the standing committee previously elected by the Annual Conference for the trial of an Elder----".

As a result of the Committee's study of the matter, a letter was ordered sent to the pastor and Advisory Board of Knoxville, First Church, giving them the studied advice of the Committee. It read:

"The Judicial Committee of the Tennessee Conference received your petition for advice and counsel in the matter regarding the complaint of certain members against the church for having set up standards of leadership for the church. The Committee met on January 16 and considered the matter at length and sought divine guidance in the counsel which we should offer to the church. After careful study of the facts in the case, and the provisions of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline relating to such matters, we reached the following conclusions, and offer them as our advice. In doing so, the Committee has pledged itself to co-operate with you in carrying them out:

- (1) - The Committee questioned the Conference President at length as to his ruling and the date on which it was given. He affirms that his ruling was given on June 19, and that any subsequent conversations regarding it were simply reaffirmations of his original ruling. His ruling at that time was that it was constitutional for a church to establish standards of leadership for its leaders. This ruling was made prior to the July 1957 session of the Tennessee Conference, and since that session of the Annual Conference the local church has taken no official action on this matter.
- (2) - Since the action of the church and the ruling of the Conference President both preceeded the last session of the Conference, and since the Discipline states (par. 149) that the decisions of the Conference President are final unless appealed to the General President before Conference, therefore at that session of the Conference, the ruling of the President became the property of the Annual Conference, and there can be no appeal except by members of the Annual Conference. Any further action of the church or a group within the church must be taken in accordance with paragraph 411 of the Discipline which gives the proper procedure in case of a complaint against a church.

(3) - The Committee has been shown a copy of the General President's letter of December 21, 1957, in which he indicates that the local church has violated the Discipline by establishing standards which are illegal. Since any violation of the Discipline by a local church must be considered by this Committee, we feel that we are within our jurisdiction in advising the church in the matter.

Concerning this letter, a copy of which was sent to D. A. Rees, Secretary of the Board of Administration; another to Mrs. H. H. Cureton; another to our Conference President, Rev. M. L. Arnold, and indirectly a copy to the church, the Committee notes the following points of question:

(1) - The church is accused of illegal action, even though the Conference President had ruled it legal and no request was made to the Annual Conference to reverse that ruling of the Conference President, thus making his action final (paragraph 149 of the Discipline):

(2) - Although the church is accused of taking illegal action, and the standards are branded as illegal, no specifications are given as to which of them is illegal and why they would be considered illegal since they are based firmly on the rules laid down in the book of Discipline and in the Standing Resolutions and Laws of the Tennessee Conference;

(3) - One of the Elementary Principles of our Church is that the Church has a right to form and enforce rules and regulations that are in harmony with the Holy Scriptures (Par. 37-38). It has never been specified which of these Resolutions violate the Holy Scriptures.

In view of these facts, and numerous others which have been brought to the attention of this Committee, we advise you as a church to consider your action of June 19, 1957, with the subsequent ruling of the Conference President prior to the last session of the Annual Conference, as final until there is a clarification of certain points in question. Since you have clearly acted within your disciplinary rights, we would advise you to maintain the resolutions which were adopted by the church by proper democratic processes, and pledge to you the support of the Committee in upholding the clear provisions of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline. Done by action of the Committee, in session at Knoxville, Tennessee January 16, 1958, and signed by its order and in its behalf.

NOTE: The fourth member of the Committee abstained from taking action due to the fact that he is the pastor of the accused church."

Although this letter covers most of the issues involved, the Committee feels that the following matters should be placed on the record in this case:

(1) - Although the ruling of the Conference President was made before the last annual conference session, and no appeal was entered, and the conference adopted the report of the President without reversing any action which he had taken, nevertheless, the appeal of the complaining group was not made until December, 1957. In his so-called ruling, the General President states that the Conference President, made his ruling on October 15, 1957. The Conference President, both before the Missionary Board and this Committee, reaffirmed that his decision was in June, 1957. When advised of this error in date, the General President wrote that the action of the church took place in October, 1957. Records of the church show that no such date was involved in this matter at all and that all church action was taken before the last session of annual conference. When the Secretary of the Committee advised the General President that the dates under which he issued the so-called ruling

were completely false, he ignored the matter and refused to accept the corrected date.

(2) - The disciplinary procedure in such cases was completely ignored. The General President has absolutely no disciplinary grounds for issuing a ruling until it has been through the proper channels. This was not done, nor did he consider the rights of the local Conference in the matter. Although the General President, without any reference to the facts in the case, insists that the action of the Church and the appeal of the complainants was done since last conference session, the Church records show that it was all done in June 1957; the Conference President has restated that his ruling was made at that time, and twice the matter was brought before the Pastoral Relations Committee of last conference session. The Committee fails to see how the General President would have any grounds for issuing any ruling in the matter, since according to the Discipline, this matter was supposed to have been settled at the last session of this conference.

(3) - Although the General President has issued a so-called ruling in this matter, he has never made any attempt to learn the truth about the case. In a letter to the Secretary he stated that he had been in contact with the complaining group for six months, but in all that time he had never contacted the Pastor of the Church, nor any of its official officers in an attempt to learn the truth about the case. The Committee learned that in all of this matter the Church and Pastor had been ignored and negotiations carried on that involved the church without the church even being advised of what was being done. In all this time, the General President nor the Conference President did not have an official transcript of the proceedings nor an official copy of the policy adopted. All they had was a mimeographed copy which admittedly contained some typographical errors. How the General President could honestly issue a ruling on something he had never seen was a matter of mystery to the Committee. In all this time, the General President had never contacted the Pastor, the Church Clerk, nor any other who could furnish him with an official transcript of the policy.

(4) - Up until the time of the Committee's meeting, the Pastor and Board of the Church had never been told who were the complaining group. Only one name had ever been revealed either by the General President or by the Conference President. First Church seemed to have been tried, convicted and condemned without ever having done them the justice of telling them who would be their accusers. Not even the worldly courts will treat the most hardened criminals thus -- but the Committee found that a Pastor and a Church had been treated thus by its denominations' officials.

(5) -- The Committee was advised of the fact that this matter had been brought before the Conference Missionary Board on December 10, 1957, and that the Board had unanimously voted to give Knoxville, First Church and its Pastor a vote of confidence in the matter. At the same time, by unanimous vote, the Missionary Board had voiced a question as to the legality of the action taken by the General President in his conduct of this affair. The Secretary, pro-tem, was ordered to communicate this information to the General President, along with a correction in the dates under which he was operating, but in his replies he refused to accept either the correct dates, the council of the Conference Missionary Board, nor the appeal to learn the facts before taking action. It was very evident from his correspondence that he accepted the word of the complaining group and was acting solely on what they told him, and that he had no intention of accepting the facts as given. All of this correspondence is in hand for verification of these statements. However, the Conference President has not yet opened his file of correspondence in this matter so that the Committee could know just what had gone on behind the scenes.



In view of these facts the Judiciary Committee recommended that the Church not ask for an appeal to the General Board of Review, but that they maintain the resolutions of policy as adopted by the Church within their disciplinary rights. This recommendation was made for these reasons:

(1) - Since the so-called ruling was made without any disciplinary grounds, it could in no honest sense be considered as an official ruling. To appeal something that could not rightfully exist would make them a party to this undisciplinary action.

(2) - Since the Church and its pastor had been completely by-passed in all this action, and since they had not been advised of any of the proceedings in the matter, and since no attempt had been made to learn from them the truth about this matter, therefore, the Committee felt that they should maintain their present stand until such a time as they should be treated with proper christian courtesy and ethics.

(3) - Since they did not know the names of the complaining group and since neither the Conference President nor the General President had done them the courtesy of furnishing them with these names, the Church had no way of determining even that the complaint was made by members of the church. Neither of the officials involved had sought to determine the proper membership status of these complainants.

(4) - Since the only violation of the Discipline which the committee could find in this case was the manner in which the General President handled it, therefore, it was the opinion of the Judiciary Committee of the Tennessee Conference, that Knoxville, First Church had acted within its legal rights in this matter, and that they had a perfect right to maintain their position until such a time as proper disciplinary action was taken.
