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Standing Resolutions

TO MODELLA COMPANY

- 1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meeting see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.
- 2. The Pastor's statistical report must be passed by the Conference Treasurer and the Committee on Character, and must be presented to the Statistical Committee before being read to the conference body.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year, which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as member ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the chairman and committee temporary organization and the third member of the Publications Committee. Each member of this report shall be presented to the conference body separately and time allowed for nominations from the floor.
- 4. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at midnight Wednesday following the second Sunday in July and that the Conference Treasurer close conference books effective midnight, Wednesday, following the third Sunday in July, and that all statistical reports are to be sent in by that date to the Conference Treasurer, and that he in turn send one to the statistical chairman. All money received after that date to be applied to a budget item on the following year. The Conference Treasurers of the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth and Y.M.W.B. send a report immediately after their books close to the Conference Treasurer listing amount paid on each budget item from each church.
- 5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.
- 6. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 7. All ministers and delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.
- 8. No divorced person who has been remarried shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.
- 9. All Conference officials shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.
- 10. No charge shall call a pastor or a supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in our Conference qualified for the work. The Conference President after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations, shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report

their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

- 11. The Tent Committee shall be composed of the following: The Conference President, W.M.S. President, and Wesleyan Youth President.
- 12. The vote on the pastor shall be taken by ballot the first week in June unless special permission is granted by the Conference President and his Advisory Board for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.
- 13. Let all ministers have their membership transferred to their new appointment, and the Ways and Means Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 14. There shall be a Conference Cabinet composed of the Conference President, the Mission Board, the Camp Meeting President, and the Young People's President. It shall be the duty of this Cabinet to approve and adjust all special and unusual plans of any conference organization to raise funds during the interims of the conference sessions.
- 15. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of anyone within the Conference endorsing or owning a television set.
- 16. No person shall be ordained until he has given two years active service in this Conference.
- 17. The Conference President and the Conference Secretary be members of the Publications Committee ex-officio.
- 18. A standing Committee on Ways and Means shall be elected at the regular conference election, of which the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio.
- 19. RESOLVED, AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, AND OR-DERED, by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 9th day of August, 1956: That the Trustees of said Conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey mortgage, or lease, property, for, or on behalf of, said conference, and to sign notes and execute mortgages for said purposes on behalf of said Conference, provided, however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a Majority of the Missionary Board, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Kentucky Conference and Friends:

We gather under favorable conditions for the thirty-fourth annual session of the Conference for which we give praise to our Heavenly Father.

State of the Work

Some good progress has been made this year over the conference and it is felt that the state of the work is good.

Two new church buildings have been erected or are being built, New Shiloh and New Albany. The Clear Fork Church parsonage was completed for occupancy last fall. Mt. Zion has put asbestos shingles on the parsonage, a new basement under it and plans to install a new furnace before cold weather. Bloomington has repaired the church auditorium and converted to gas heat. Milan has purchased and paid for new pews. Owensboro has added a bathroom to the parsonage and made repairs on the church. Bloomfield has rearranged and repaired the church sanctuary. Atwood has purchased a parsonage. Holton has roofed their parsonage and constructed a new foundation under the church. Brooksburg made a partial basement under the church and installed a furnace. Mt. Tabor is now rebuilding a frame structure necessitated by the bulging walls of the concrete block building.

In the pioneer field, there has been some progress made regardless of hindrances. On indebtedness \$1600 has been paid.

When statistics are available, it will be seen that the indebtedness over the conference is very small and that we are very solvent.

There have been some good revivals in many churches this year. Our greatest need is a mighty Holy Ghost revival that will produce divine love, a tender compassion and true intercession so that souls shall be born into the Kingdom.

Recommendations of the Mission Board

To promote the Kingdom of God by the salvation of precious lost souls, as accountable stewards of God we recommend the following advance pioneer program for vision, venture, and victory in enlarging our borders to the glory of our Redeemer.

I. Conference Districts:

The Conference shall be divided into seven districts with a chairman over each district.

1. The designated districts shall be composed of the following churches in each district as named:

Bloomington District—Bloomfield, Brazil, Mt. Calvary, Mt. Zion, Sylvania, Washington, Whitehall, Bloomington.

Louisville District-Atwood Camp Taylor, Highland Park, Ninth

Street, Sale Avenue, Shively.

- Madison District—Brooksburg, Holton, Hope, Madison, Milan, Milton, Mt. Tabor.
- New Albany District—Clear Fork, Elizabeth, New Albany, New Shiloh, Pekin.
- Owensboro District—Owensboro, Newburgh, Princeton, West Frankfort, Ill.
 - Paoli District—Leavenworth, Paoli, Rock Springs, Simpson Chapel, Temple.

Winchester District-Jamestown, Lexington, Means, Winchester.

- .2. Each District shall have a chairman to be nominated by the Mission Board, approved by the Conference, provided the Conference Body or district may nominate others from the floor.
- 3. The chairmen from the seven districts shall constitute the Mission Council with which the Mission Board may confer for advice.
- 4. Each chairman shall co-operate with the Mission Board in promoting the pioneer program of the conference.

III. Calendar System:

Sunday in September designated by the Mission Board shall be Pionser Calendar Sunday.

- 1. On this designated Sunday the churches of the district shall exchange pulpits under the direction of the Mission Board to lay on the consciences of our people the multitudes without Christ in the unreached areas of our Conference.
- 2. Pledges shall be taken at each church to be paid by the Calendar System in 10 monthly payments.
- 3. There shall be a pioneer secretary appointed in each church to collect the pledges monthly for the local church treasurer to remit monthly to the conference treasurer.
- 4. The Mission Board may grant to pioneer works and mission churches the right to use funds locally.
- 5. The Mission Board may suggest a goal for each exchanging pastor to try to reach in each church in counsel with the pastor of each church.
- 6. The dollar per member budget for pioneer work shall be dropped in lieu of the inauguration of the Calendar Plan, except as the local church may desire to pay it.
- 7. The Sunday school offering of the first Sunday of each month shall go to the conference pioneer work, this to be remitted monthly.

 III. Field and Financial Goals:
- 1. The Mission Board shall conserve money and effort to enter centers of population.
- 2. Men having ability to pioneer may be employed with a salary, and money may also be invested in church property deeded to the conference.
- 3. This year we urge the raising of \$5000 for a great pioneer advance program.

IV. Revolving Fund:

The present Revolving Fund shall be augmented by gifts, and at the discretion of the Mission Board by pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

V. Mother Church:

We urge the larger churches of the conference to start a prayer meeting, and wherever possible, a Sunday school, in a needy area with a view of getting another church started in co-operation with the Mission Board. VI. United Effort:

The Mission Board in co-operation with the Mission Council, the Conference W.M.S., and the Conference Youth Executive Committee may devise ways and means to purchase pioneer property and to care for pioneer pastors.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Our thirty eight Sunday schools have been carrying on all year with results that compared with those of last year demand attention. Attendances have been maintained with good averages, yet there is plenty of room for improvement. Most of the schools observed Rally Day with very good attendances and some approaching records. Most of the schools also contributed to the Thanksgiving Offering, which totaled \$486.52 for our conference. And since the Connection has entered into the

International Headquarters project, the goal for the coming Thanksgiving Offering of \$50,000.00 is double that of last year. Let all schools set themselves to meet the challenge of this asking.

Financially the receipts of the Sunday schools fell below those of last year by about a thousand dollars, but the proportion of giving to missions, benevolences and for supplies remains about the same.

The number of conversions also fell considerably from the previous year, but the number of those converted who joined the church shows a very commendable increase, seventy-three instead of the twenty of last year.

The total enrollment suffered a startling loss of nearly three hundred, two hundred and ninety-one to be exact. This is a serious loss, that calls for a very careful check up on all of our work. The number of Daily Vacation Bible Schools dropped from eight to six with a corresponding drop of enrollment of eighty. The Home Departments dropped from six to four with a huge drop in membership of thirty-three. However the Cradle Roll membership has increased thirty for which we are thankful. There is need and room for improvement in all of our schools. Let us deliberate upon these facts in the light of Dr. Nicholson's searching text "What doest thou here, Flight." Then let us purpose to make this a more fruitful year in every school.

COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Let a copy of the report on Finance be placed on bulletin board of every church.

Item I. BUDGET. We recommend.

- 1. General Budget.
- a. That this conference pay General Budget Assessment.
- b. That each active member of the local Wesleyan Youth pay \$1.50 annually on the General Wesleyan Youth budget.
- c. That in accordance with the action of the Board of Administration, all newly organized churches and organized missions be exempt from the General Budget the first two years: furthermore that they be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.
 - 2. Conference Budget

That our churches pay Conference Budget as follows:

- a. Conference work fund—\$1.00 per member, disbursed by Conference President and his Advisory Board.
 - b. Conference Entertainment-\$1.00 per member.
 - c. Camp Meeting Fund-\$1.00 per member.
- d. That the Sunday school offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent monthly to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism.
 - e. Conference Parsonage Fund-\$1.00 per member.
 - f. Conference President's salary-\$1.00 per member.
 - g. All budget money shall be sent in monthly.

Item II. PASTOR

- a. That each pastor encourage the Storehouse Plan of Tithing. (See Malachi 3:8-10)
- b. That all pastors endorse and encourage membership in Church Extension Card Call Plan.
- c. That the conference year for the current or out-going pastor shall end immediately following the last Sunday of Camp and that the church that he is serving pay his salary until that time.
- d. That all churches provide for their pastors suitable living quarters, all utilities, and fill their obligation by monthly donations.
- e. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church. Item III. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT:
- a. That the Conference President be paid \$70.00 per week, house rent, utilities, desk expenses, and traveling expenses at 7 cents per mile in connection with conference work. This shall be raised by the \$1.00 per member and an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's cash salary to be remitted monthly by the church treasurer to the conference treasurer.
- b. That the Conference President shall meet the Board of Stewards of all churches paying less than \$1,000 salary and adjust the finances accordingly at the first Quarterly Conference.
- c. That each church hold four quarterly meetings annually; one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be

arranged by the pastor. These Quarterly meetings to be held the third weeks of October, January, April and July (or immediately after the local treasurer's books have been closed).

- d. That the Conference President shall give one Sunday preaching service to each church annually and that he give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches.

 Item IV. MISCELLANEOUS
- 1. That the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary each be paid \$75.00 a year.

Report No. 8

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY FOR Y.M.W.B.

Let us emphasize the work of the Y.M.W.B. and take great care in training our boys and girls by interesting them in mission study. We recommend that each band adopt the Standard of Efficiency.

- 1. Twelve band services in which prayer, God's Word and Personal service were stressed. (10%)
 - 2. One public service during the year. (10%)
 - 3. Band funds remitted quarterly. (10%)
- 4. The use of mite boxes, envelopes, membership cards or some other systematic method for gathering in dues and offerings. (10%)
- 5. The Superintendent of the Band be a reader of THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY. (10%)
 - 6. An increase in membership. (5%) and treduct to the
- 7. An increase sino funds raised. (5%)
 - 8. An offering for Home Missions. (10%)
 - 9. An offering for Education (10%)
- 10. One cent per member sent to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent as desk fund. (10%)
- 11. The annual report sent in on time. (10%) (That is at the time the Conference Superintendent designates.)

Report No. 9

PLAN OF WORK

I. Home Work

- 1. We recommend that each local society contribute liberally to the General Home Fund for the support of Special Missions (See WESLEY-AN MISSIONARY) and Church Extension Work.
- 2. We recommend that each local society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of the Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.
- 3. We recommend the use of designated Thank-offering envelopes for Home Missions.
- 4. We recommend that local societies inquire into the needs of the home mission stations and orphanages before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same; that such boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate the same, the voucher evaluation signed by the missionary be forwarded to Conference Woman's Missionary Society Treasurer for proper receipting.
- 5. We recommend and urge each local society to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the extension program of the Church.

II. Foreign Work

We recommend:

- 1. That we co-operate with the Foreign Missionary Department in the support of its entire foreign missionary program.
- 2. That we forward Sunday school charts, cards, and flannelgraph materials to Foreign Dept., South Marion Station, Marion, Indiana.

III. Medical Missions

We recommend:

- 1. That our local societies make bandages* and that these be forwarded promptly to the Foreign Dept., South Marion Station, Marion, Ind. to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported with no value attached.
- 2. That each local society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund, not to apply on budget.
- *Bandages should be 2", 3" or 4" in width, sewn together in 10 yard lengths with flat seams, and rolled firmly into rolls, not exceed 3" in diameter. Bound squares of blankets are needed in infant care.

IV. Educational

We recommend the co-operation of our local societies in the promotion of the Honorary Enrollment Plan for the Colleges. The monies for this

project should be channeled through the Local Conference and General W.M.S. Treasurers.

2. We recommend the observance of Educational Harvest Day with program and contribution of supplies and cash; all cash to apply on educational budget excepting that applying on special projects presented by college presidents.

V. Literature

We recommend:

- 1. That we carefully observe the monthly prayer request in THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY magazine and other special requests as presented.
 - 2. The observance of the Monthly Fast and Prayer Day.

3. That April be designated Self-Denial Month.

4. The promotion of a Prayer Partner Circle in each society making use of new prayer partner reminders and that reports be sent to the use of new prayer partner Secretary before January 1st.

5. That stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children,

adolescents, the aged, and with special emphasis upon the Jew.

VI. Area Work

- 1. We urge the provision for one area Convention during the Quad-
- 2. We recommend that all home and foreign appeals for special needs be made to the General Executive Board of our Woman's Missionary Society and they in turn channel these needs to the Area Chairmen who will present them to the conference presidents in their areas.

We further recommend that the gifts be sent as directed by the Area Chairman.

We further recommend that the Conference W.M.S. President direct Christmas gifts according to suggestions from Area Chairmen.

VII. Conference Work

- 1. We recommend that at least one workshop for the Y.M.W.B. and Children's Workers be held annually in each conference.
- 2. We recommend that each conference be divided into districts for conventions; the same to be supervised by a district chairman under the direction of the Conference W.M.S. President as a mission of the Conference with the conference of the conference with the conference of the co

VIII. Local Church

We recommend:

1. That each society pay twenty-five cents per member to our Conference Treasurer as our offering for our Conference President.

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- 2. That the President's traveling expenses be paid from the fund except those concurring during the annual tour of the Conference which are to be paid by the churches visited.

LOUISVILLE DISTRICT

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. Conference

a. The W.Y. President shall attend one rally in each district during the year and each district shall bear the traveling expenses at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.

b. We recommend that the pioneer project for this year be left in the hands of the W.Y. Executive Council, in co-operation with the Con-

ference Mission Board.

c. We recommend that each district have at least three rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

d. We recommend that the W.Y. Executive Committee make plans

to raise funds for the new Youth-Missionary Building.

- visit another Wesleyan Youth Camp to better plan our Youth Camp, and that their expenses be paid from the Youth Camp Fund.
- f. We recommend that the Executive Committee make plans for a monthly Youth Bulletin of local W.Y. interest.

 II. Local
- a. We recommend that the local treasurer send in an annual report to the Conference Treasurer, Miss Shirley Kendall, by May 29, and that all money received after this date be credited on the following year:
- a. We recommend that each society raise the amount of one dollar and a half (\$1.50) per active member for the General W.Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized society take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- b. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.
- c. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for Pioneer Evangelism to be used for our Pioneer Projects.
- d. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.
- e. We recommend that \$10.00 be raised in each Louisville District Rally and \$5.00 in each of the other District Rallies, the same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- f. We recommend that \$150.00 of this fund be disbursed for the support of the Ellis child in Africa.
- g. We recommend that the Area Assessment and all desk funds be paid out of the Conference Expense Fund.
- h. We recommend that the \$15.00 voted by the Conference as the Young People's assessment to help subsidize the Conference Messenger be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

i. We recommend that the amount of \$75.00 be given the W.Y. President in appreciation of his work in behalf of the Kentucky Conference Youth.

j. We recommend that the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Fund for the general promotion of Youth Work.

k. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W.Y. Treasurer and the Treasurer's books close May 29.
