JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The fifty-sixth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kan., Tuesday, August 10, 1926, with President P. A. Miller presiding.

Devotions were led by Rev. S. F. Wilson, who read the 84th Psalm. Fervent prayer was offered by Brother Huscher and Brother Wilson. The blessing of the Lord was manifested at this opening

service of the Conference.

In the absence of the Conference Secretary, the chair requested Brother Cook to act as Secretary pro tem.

Roll Call.—The roll call was answered by twenty elders and five Conference preachers.

Committee on Credentials.—On approved motion E. H. Dunbar and Elmer Anderson were elected as a Committee on Credentials.

Partial Report of Committee on Credentials.—The Committee on Credentials rendered a partial report. The following delegates were duly elected to the Conference:

Davidson, Bethel; Everett Allison, Hall; Dwight Osborn, Hall; Ray Campbell, Ames; Will McHenry, Morgan Chapel; Ada F. Pomeroy, alternate from Topeka; R. R. Crowson, alternate from Kansas City, and Lewis Woodruff, from Hollis.

On approved motion the delegates were seated.

Conference Bar.—On approved motion the first four rows of seats were made the Conference bar.

Time of Conference Hours.—On approved motion the Conference voted to meet at 8:30 A. M. and 1:30 P. M. and adjourn on motion.

Children's Meetings.—The Committee elected at the last Conference relative to the arranging for children's meetings rendered a report. On motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Moved and supported that the Committee elected last year to arrange for the children's meetings provide also a suitable person to have charge of the play hours.

On motion adjourned to the call of the chair.

Tuesday Afternoon.

The devotionals were led by Rev. V. C. Martin, who read the 4th chapter of James and called on J. M. Davidson to lead in prayer.

The roll was then called and the minutes of the previous session read and approved.

The Report of the Committee was adopted as read.

Tent for Children.—Moved and supported that all able-bodied men turn out after supper and put up the big tent in accordance with the Report of the Committee on Children's Meetings.

President's Report.—President Miller gave his Report. See Report.

The President's Report was adopted, excepting the financial part, which was referred to the Auditing Committee.

Examination of Character.—The Examination of Character was taken up and the following names were called and read their reports and gave their testimony: E. J. Carry, S. F. Wilson, E. A. Coates, C. E. Huscher, Elizabeth G. Hardie, William A. Smith, L. S. Currie and Elizabeth Currie.

Committee on Orders of the Day Partial Report.—The Committee on Orders of the Day rendered a partial report recommending Wednesday 2 P. M. for the election of permanent officers.

On approved motion the report was adopted.

Memorials.—On approved motion the name of Robert Hardie was referred to the Committee on Memorials.

Prayer for Rain.—Some time was then spent on the advisability of praying for rain. The point under discussion was as to whether revivals are easier to promote under adverse conditions than under favorable conditions.

Letter from H. W. McDowell.—The Secretary read a communication from Brother McDowell, and on vote of the Conference was instructed to write him a letter of greeting.

Committees were called to organize.

On approved motion the Conference was adjourned.

Brother Williams led in prayer and pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday Forenoon.

Brother Carkuff led the devotionals, reading from the Scriptures and making some appropriate remarks. J. M. Davidson then led in prayer.

The Roll was then called.

The Minutes of the previous session were then read and approved.

Conference Book Store.—The President made some remarks and there was some discussion as to the advisability of a Conference Book Store.

Committee on Credentials Partial Report.—The Committee on Credentials presented the names of Julia Adams, Easton; George E. Rhodes, Willis, and Bertha Kersey, Topeka, as delegates to the Conference. On approved motion the delegates were seated.

Prayer League.—The Secretary of the Prayer League then gave his report and on approved motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Some time was spent in giving testimony as to the benefit of the Prayer League, after which Brother Carry was given a rising vote of thanks for his labors in carrying on the work, and then all sang "Blest Be the Tie that Binds."

Reports.—The Conference Secretary made a request asking that all reports be made in duplicate and typewritten.

Letters to the Conference.—Letters were read from A. B. Hotchkiss, William Hotchkiss and J. A. Drake. The Secretary was then instructed to write these brethren a letter of greeting from the Conference.

The Secretary then read letters from Sister Vera Macy and Sister Grace Davis. A rising vote of thanks was then given these sisters for their letters and the Secretary instructed to write them a letter of greeting from the Conference. The blessing of the Lord fell on the assembly and there was a gracious season of prayer, confession and praise.

A motion then prevailed that the letters from these Sisters be

sent the Wesleyan for publication.

Credentials Partial Report.—The Committee on Credentials presented the names of J. W. Martin from Gaylord, and E. R. Pitts from Concordia, as delegates to the Conference and on motion the delegates were seated.

Mission Work .- A report was given of work that was being

done in Missouri by Brother and Sister John Warner.

A call was given for committee work.

On approved motion the Conference adjourned.

Brother Pomeroy led in prayer and dismissed the Conference.

Wednesday Afternoon.

Sister Hardie led the devotions, reading the forty-sixth Psalm. Brother Shivers was called upon and led in prayer.

Roll Call.

The Minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Report of Committee on Orders of the Day.—The Committee on Orders of the Day made their report and on approved motion the report was adopted. See Report.

Credentials Partial Report.—The Committee on Credentials presented the names of Hattie Reed, Antioch, and Mae Stansbury, Wesley Center, as duly elected delegates to the Conference and on motion delegates were seated.

Election of Permanent Officers.-Order of the Day, the election

of permanent officers, was called.

A question was raised concerning the delegate from Oakland, as the delegate was not and would not be present.

On approved motion the action of the Conference seating the delegate from Oakland was rescinded.

Committee on Credentials Partial Report.—The Committee on Credentials then reported the name of James Freeborn as alternate delegate from Oakland and on approved motion the delegate was seated.

President.—President P. A. Miller was elected to succeed himself on the first ballot.

Vice-President.—The ballot for Vice-President was then taken and Rev. F. C. Hill was elected to succeed himself on the first ballot.

Secretary.—I. L. DeWitt having received a majority of all of the votes cast was declared elected as Secretary of the Conference.

Assistant Secretary.—After several votes and no election, the Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Conference for Warren Freeborn as Assistant Secretary.

Treasurer.—The Secretary was then instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for C. F. Pomeroy as Treasurer of the Conference.

Assistant Treasurer.—On motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for William A. Smith as Assistant Treasurer.

Sunday School Secretary.—The Secretary then cast the ballot of the Conference for E. H. Cook for Sunday School Secretary.

Tithing Secretary.—E. A. Coates was then elected to the office of Tithing Secretary.

Prayer League Secretary.—E. J. Carry was then elected to succeed himself as Secretary of the Prayer League.

Conference Trustee.—F. C. Hill was elected as ministerial member to succeed himself on the Board of Conference Trustees.

The names of L. P. Rawlins and Alexander Ballard were placed in nomination and the motion sustained that the nominations cease.

Conference Trustee.—L. P. Rawlins was elected as lay member on the Board of Conference Trustees on the second ballot.

General Conference Delegates.—P. A. Miller was elected as the first ministerial delegate to the General Conference.

On the first ballot William F. McConn was elected as the second ministerial delegate to the General Conference.

Albert Johnson, of the Hall charge, was elected as the first lay delegate to the General Conference on the third ballot.

William Macy, the second highest on the ballot for the first delegate, was elected as the second lay delegate on the first ballot.

Brother DeWitt was elected as the alternate for Brother Miller, and Brother Smith as the alternate for Brother McConn as ministerial delegates to the General Conference.

Brother Holloway was elected as the alternate for Brother Albert Johnson, and Sister Huscher was elected as the alternate for Brother Will Macy.

Motion to adjourn was sustained and Brother Coates was called upon to dismiss.

Thursday Morning.

The devotionals were led by Brother Ford and God's blessing was manifest when he led in prayer.

After the roll call the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The election of the permanent officers of the Conference was then resumed as unfinished business.

Quarterly Meeting Evangelist.—The advisability of having a Ouarterly Meeting Evangelist was discussed.

A motion was supported that we have two Quarterly Meeting Evangelists.

An amendment was offered recommending that the Conference President hold four Quarterly Meetings on each charge during the year.

A motion was lost to refer the matter to a committee of three elders and two laymen.

An amendment to the amendment was offered that the word four be changed to two and that the words "and that he have oversight of the other two" be added.

The amendment to the amendment was carried and then the amendment as amended was carried.

President to be Quarterly Meeting Evangelist.—The original motion as amended was then passed, that the President hold two quarterly meetings on each charge and that he have the supervision of the other two.

Home Missionary Secretary Introduced.—Brother Baker, our Home Missionary Secretary, was introduced to the Conference and gave us some very good remarks on the state of the general work and concerning former Wesleyan Methodism. The Conference then sang "Blessed be the Name."

The Orders of the Day were then called for.

Brother McConn gave us a splendid address on the need of the school and educational interests in general.

Itineracy and Orders.—Business was then resumed, and on motion Brother Cook was elected to succeed himself on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On approved motion the President was given the privilege of nominating the two lay members on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders and nominated Brother R. R. Crowson and Sister Ruth Rasmussen. The Conference then approved the appointments. Judiciary Committee.—On approved motion I. L. DeWitt, E. A. Coates, C. E. Huscher and T. J. Pomeroy were made the Judiciary Committee.

Vacancy of the President.—On approved motion the old Committee on Vacancy of the President, E. H. Cook, S. F. Wilson, F. E. Shivers, Alexander Ballard and L. P. Rawlins, were re-elected.

Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committees.—The following were elected to the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee: P. A. Miller, E. J. Carry, S. F. Wilson, I. L. DeWitt, E. E. Palmer, C. H. Sheldon and T. B. Holloway.

Superannuate Board.—The old Superannuate Board, President of Conference Chairman ex-officio, I. L. DeWitt, T. J. Pomeroy, E. E. Palmer and Frank Dietrich, were re-elected.

Advisory Board.—The President nominated his Advisory Board and the Conference confirmed the nomination. F. C. Hill and C. H. Sheldon were made that Board.

Missionary Board.—P. A. Miller, Chairman ex-officio; I. L. De-Witt, E. J. Carry, William F. McConn, Alexander Ballard, C. H. Sheldon and Guy Harrington were re-elected as the Missionary Board.

Sunday School Board.—E. H. Cook, Conference Sunday School Secretary, was made the first member of the Sunday School Board, and Rev. E. H. Dunbar and Joel Ballard were then added to the Board.

Railroad Secretary.—On approved motion the office of Railroad Secretary was created.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

There is no greater force in Christendom for the advancement of the Kingdom of God and the perpetuity of the Church than the Sunday School. It is interesting to note that approximately 96 per cent of our Protestant ministers, 85 per cent of our Protestant membership, and 85 per cent of our organized churches, are the direct product and result of Sunday School organizations. In view of this fact, we believe we should properly emphasize the importance of the Sunday School.

Our Sunday School efforts, we fear in many instances, are largely confined to our own people, and we would recommend that we put forth more of an earnest and systematic effort toward reaching the unsaved homes of the community, since a good spiritual Sunday School often lays the foundation for a genuine revival.

While this is an age when knowledge along many lines has increased, yet it is astonishing how very ignorant many of our own people are of the simplest truths of the Bible. The cause of this is due, no doubt, to some extent, to the lack of thoroughness in our Sunday School work. Our Sunday School lessons have not been, in some cases, properly studied and explained. For the success of the Sunday School it is imperative that we have educated teachers. It is preposterous to say "any one can teach the children," when we consider that childhood is the most plastic period in life. We believe, that as pastors, each of us should take up some form of training for our Sunday School teachers and scholars.

We would recommend the use of our literature in all Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools and that regularity and promptness be encouraged in all.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

Reading is an essential element in the development of every life. Therefore it is important that the proper sort of reading material be selected and placed before our young people. While there is a vast amount of reading matter that will not develop the young life in the proper channels, and will even prove detrimental, there is also a large amount that will be a great aid in the formation of character and in the building of higher ideals.

We must recognize the fact that every American home must have some kind of reading material, and therefore it is essential that every one knows how to select the proper books and periodicals. Since the responsibility of a careful selection rests upon the parents, ministers and leaders, they should familiarize themselves particularly with the various kinds of matter likely to be read by young people; for all the youth will read something.

Books.

Judged solely from the standpoint of literature, the Bible is unsurpassed in the field of books. In addition to this fact, we recognize that it is the one safe guide for human life and conduct. Therefore we recommend that the Bible has first place in every Wesleyan Methodist home, and that we affirm our opposition to books of every description whose teachings are contrary to the biblical account of the creation and development of the human race.

We believe every Wesleyan Methodist home should have a copy of the Discipline, and that our children should be taught the Wesleyan Catechism.

We recommend that, so far as possible, our people purchase their books from our own Publishing House, because every book offered for sale by our Agent has been carefully reviewed, and is known to be safe. Books can be purchased from our Publishing House as cheaply as from any other. In giving our own Publishing interests this business, we will be helping to put the Publishing House upon a more sound financial basis, and thus will be helping the entire Connection.

We further recommend that we have a committee of three to establish a Conference book stand.

Periodicals.

It is essential that we use every means possible to establish our people in the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and to help them to become acquainted with the work of the Church, and to learn the plans for its advancement. One of the most important ways of indoctrinating our people with the principles, and of acquainting them with the work of the Church, is through our own Church publications. We believe that every Wesleyan family should subscribe to our own Church papers, the Wesleyan Methodist and the Wesleyan Missionary, and that every Wesleyan Sunday School should use our own Sunday School literature.

The Sunday School Times is also an excellent help for Sunday School workers.

The Christian Cynosure, the Defender, and the No-Tobacco Educator are publications that furnish valuable information in the field of reform.

For topics of national and world interest, we suggest publications such as Current History, The Literary Digest, World Work, The North American Review, the Review of Reviews, The Republic, The World Tomorrow, The Atlantic Monthly, the Scientific American, and The National Geographic.

We realize that our daily newspapers must print the news, even though some of it is of an unfortunate character; but these papers also print non-essential items, such as comic pictures, continued stories and witty sayings, and we regret to say that in many cases, these items tend to destroy the sacredness of home life or to make light of our Prohibitory law. We wish such items could be of a higher character.

If we keep uppermost in mind the development of Christian life, and the leadings of the Holy Spirit, we shall have a safe guide for the selections of our readings as well as for the directions of every walk of life.

In these days of modernism and the teaching of evolution and forgetting God, let us hold fast the truth in righteousness and contend earnestly for the faith once for all delivered to the saints.

Further, we as a Committee recommend to the Kansas Conference that we as a Conference bring before the General Conference an appeal to give a place in the Discipline for a statement against women bobbing their hair and wearing clothes like unto men's apparel.

We petition the General Conference to give us a form of questions to be used in the baptism of infants when one or both of the parents are non-Christians.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF WORK.

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

- 1. That we have a Harvest Home Day as near the middle of October as possible, and that an offering for the College Library be taken in connection with Harvest Home donations.
- 2. That by recommendation of the General Conference Society all Local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer, and there be divided equally between the General and Conference Treasurers.
- 3. That each Society contribute ten cents per member to pay General Conference delegates' expenses.
- 4. That each Society have a Magazine Committee of one, the same to be considered a permanent officer.
- 5. That our Conference Organizer and Y. M. W. B. Superintendent and the District Leaders arrange three programs for the coming year. The first to be on Medical Missions, to be given at Christmas time; second on Home Missions, to be rendered on Easter Sunday, and the third on Foreign Missions, at Convention time.
- 6. We recommend that the District Leaders arrange the time, place and recommend the worker for the conventions. Also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker and report before the close of Conference.
- 7. That each District be supervised by the District Leaders, under direction of the Conference President.
- 8. That we contribute at least six dollars per Society for Home Missions.
- 9. That the statistical reports of the W. H. & F. M. Society be in the hands of the Committee on Statistics two weeks before Conference.
- 10. That we observe one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work.
- 11. That the Kansas Conference continue the support of Sister Grace Davis, and that a thank offering be taken at the monthly prayer service by each Society to provide for the same and sent to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- 12. That the members of the Gleaners Society write at least one letter a year to each of our Foreign fields, also that the Gleaners need not share equally in the financial obligations.
- 13. That we instruct our Magazine Committee to gather quarterly from our local Magazine Solicitor their reports and forward for publication.

- 14. That each Missionary Society have a basket to be filled with such articles as can be sent with out-going Missionaries or in the Home work.
- 15. We recommend the study book, "Moslem Women," for the coming year.
- 16. That our women of the W. H. & F. M. Society be modest examples in their dress and encourage others to do likewise.
- 17. That our societies receive credit of 25 cents per pound for bandages.

 - 20. That we have a prayer Secretary.
- 21. We recommend that the first week in June be dues paying time.

- 23. Societies wishing to send clothing to the Home Mission fields, before sending to Alabama, correspond with Rev. T. P. Baker, Sheridan, Ind.; Blue Ridge work, correspond with Miss Ina Gaines, Greer, S. C.; Concordia Mission, correspond with Mrs. Gertrude Smith, Concordia, Kan.
- 24. We recommend that each local Society wishing to send cash or making donations to the dormitory, report the same to the Harvest Home Committee in order to receive proper credit.
