

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The One-hundred-sixth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana at 7:30 p. m., August 9th, 1954.

Opening—After a moment of silent prayer, the Rev. E. L. Kierstead, president of the conference, offered a word of prayer for the opening service and the conference session.

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

C. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.

5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$2500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipt exceed \$2500.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he

pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.

III Churches

1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of one Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their report by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00,

each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.

14. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decides as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

15. "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

16. All churches receiving regular financial aid from the Conference Extension Fund shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board.

17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.

18. That the Conference Secretary be authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the event of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

19. In the election of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

V. Committees.

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itinerary and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. Pension Plan.

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it be further understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations submit the following report:

Item I. That the budget apportionment be per member as follows:

For purchase of Conference Parsonage No. 2

It is recommended that the expenses of the itineracy and elders committee be met from the Conference expense fund, and receipts from this committee be turned over to the Conference treasurer.

All church budget excepting that raised by the Y.M.W. B., and the W.Y.P.S. to be sent to the conference treasurer.

Item II. Superannuate Pension Plan.

When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuate Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so. Also the question, on statistical blank read to conference, shall be answered, "Are you a member of the Superannuate Pension Plan?"

Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist's appointment, after rise of this conference, excepting those who are now serving, shall be required to become a member of the Superannuate Pension Plan.

Item III. That the Sunday School Apportionment be 20¢ per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the conference minutes of the preceding year, under: (Total in main school).

Item IV. That the Conference Minutes be 50¢ per copy with a minimum of one copy for every six members of the church and should any deficit occur, that it be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Item V. That the General W.Y.P.S. dues be \$1.00 per active members of the W.Y.P.S.

Item VI. That the President shall have general supervision of the Work of the Conference.

A. Visitation of Churches: We recommend that the president be left

to his own discretion as to his church visitations, so that he may visit the churches or pastors as he feels there is need and that the vice president visit each church in the conference at least once during the year. That the vice president report each visit to the president on blanks formulated by this committee.

B. The Vice President shall be responsible for the supervision and the promotion of the Extension Work of the Conference, subject to the counsel and approval of the Missionary Board. Each quarter he shall visit each church, or pastor of church, which is regularly receiving conference support and/or under the direction of the Missionary Board, to counsel, advise, and help those pioneer pastors with their problems. The pastors of these churches are asked to make monthly reports to the Vice President and to the superintendent of the district in which the church is situated. The Vice President shall pass on these reports either to the Missionary Board or its Executive Committee at least quarterly. He and the district superintendents shall be responsible to seek for openings throughout the Conference and report the same to the Missionary Board. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to see that funds are raised for Extension work, and he may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.

C. The minimum goal of \$2.00 per member be raised for Conference Extension. At the suggestion of the Sunday School Secretary, we recommend that the Rally Day offering go for the establishment of the 2nd Church in Fort Wayne.

D. 1. We further recommend that there be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice President in carrying out the Conference work.

2. We further recommend that each church elect annually a Local Conference Extension Secretary whose duties shall be to keep the needs of Conference Extension before the people and to act as their prayer reminders.

3. It shall be the duty also of the District Superintendent to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district. The District Superintendent shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to co-operate and expected to do so.

Item VII. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board, and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meeting.

Item VIII. That the salary of the President be \$325.00 per month and Vice President \$275.00 per month; the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work.

Item IX. The Vice President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent.

Item X. We recommend that the Conference Trustees take definite steps towards the purchase of, or building of, a conference parsonage No. 2.

Item XI. We recommend that the President and Vice President employ secretarial help as needed, to be paid from Conference Expense.

Item XII. We recommend the following concerning the INDIANA WESLEYAN MESSENGER:

A. That the President and Vice President constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.

- B. That the President be the Editor.
 C. That the executive committee be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager.
 D. That the executive committee be authorized to employ an assistant as the need demands, to be mailing secretary for the business manager.
 E. That the departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

Item XIII. We recommend that:

- A. The President call a closed meeting of the ministers, and their wives in the different parts of the conference early in the conference year.
 B. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals, and in general seek to promote greater interest in the Conference program.

C. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting, except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

Item XIV. We, of your Committee, are not satisfied with the growth and progress of the Conference, we believe that our gains are entirely too small. We have been studying "plans for closer co-ordination between churches, pastors, and Conference Officials," but we have arrived at no satisfactory conclusion and have nothing better to present than that which we have presented.

We recommend that during the coming year the Committee on Finance and Appropriations continue to study plans for improvement, growth, and progress.

Report No. 14**REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE**

We, Your Committee on Resolutions beg leave to submit the following report.

1. That the Indiana Conference reaffirm the historic position of the Church on matters of Christian doctrine and practice. We believe it important that we have an increased emphasis on The Wesleyan Doctrine of Perfect Love or Entire Sanctification and that our people be constantly urged to seek its attainment as a personal crisis experience. We urge adherence to the Discipline as to standards of modest dress, parental responsibility, and reverence for holy things including the sanctuary of worship.

2. We urge that our pastors seek uniformity in interpreting the rules of the discipline governing the reception of members into our fellowship.

3. We condemn the growing tendency on the part of selfish and godless interests to turn the Sabbath day into a day of commercialized sports, amusements, and business. We believe our people should refrain from participating in such sports and amusements on this day. We urge our people to make practical application of their religious profession by patronizing the businessman who shows his respect for the church and its ideals by closing his place of business on the Lord's Day.

4. Our youth are being constantly propagandized by the tobacco and liquor interests through radio, television, newspaper, magazine, and billboard advertising. Therefore we recommend that our people give active support to the Indiana Temperance League and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in their organized attempts to get more effective scientific temperance and narcotics education into the public schools and that our churches through public meetings, the Sunday school Temperance lesson, the Daily Vacation Bible School, and other cooperative methods, seek to build in the community the ideals of total abstinence. We recommend also that every pastor preach at least one temperance sermon during the conference year.

5. We also go on record as favoring the historic attitude of the public schools toward the Bible and religious principles and commend public school superintendents, principals and teachers who are today striving to maintain religious idealism in their schools.

6. We commend our conference and youth leaders for the splendid youth camps which are being held on the campground each year and urge our pastors and people to get their young people to these camps for their social, intellectual and spiritual development.

7. We would also commend our pastors, evangelists, missionaries and college staff members who in a day of phenomenal wage and salary scales in industry and business, still sacrificially dedicate themselves to their heaven-appointed tasks. The Church could not live without their heroic devotion.

8. While the United States at the moment is not committed to active fighting on any front, yet the threat of war persists and our young men are being called into the various branches of the Armed Services. We recommend that our pastors and churches cooperate whole heartedly with our Wesleyan Service Men's Commission, which keeps a line of contact between the church and our service personnel, both in this country and abroad.

9. We recommend that in the early years our homes begin the indoctrination of our children in the fundamentals of the Christian faith. That our church periodicals be on the reading table of every home and that we seek to develop in our youth a desire for something better than the so-called comic strip (which contains no humor) or the sexy magazine so commonly found on our news stands. That the church provide for Sunday school teachers, a series of short lessons on the beliefs and standards of the church for presentation, once a month, for instruction of the children of the church.

10. Protestantism is threatened today both by godless Communism and authoritative Catholicism. Either will crush the Protestant Church if it can. The separation of Church and state guaranteed by the Constitution will be maintained only if Protestants exercise their God-given right of suffrage at the ballot box and put into public office men or women who believe in their right to worship God according to the dictates of their own consciences.

11. We commend the President of the United States for his constantly reiterated emphasis upon the need for a spiritual revival in our country. We also commend the Congress of the United States for the establishment of a prayer room in our nation's Capitol building. Our Master emphasized the value of human personality "ye are of more value than many sparrows," hence we believe Wesleyan Methodists should fully approve the present attitude of our government in seeking to maintain for

all minority groups the full rights of citizenship in a Christian political economy.

Minutes—The minutes were read and approved as read.

Report—The report of the Resolutions Committee was read and upon motion adopted. (See Report No. 8)

Motion—Because the district statistics were not included in the reading of the Statistical Report, a motion was made that the District Statistical Report be read to the Executive Council and entered into the minutes.

There was a motion to amend this motion by adding the following: "This report be mimeographed and sent to pastors and presidents in the first conference mailing." The amendment was adopted by vote.

The motion as amended was adopted by vote.

Election—The secretary nominated and the conference elected Maxine Haines assistant secretary.

Motion—It was moved and carried that when we adjourn we do so to reconvene at the call of the chair.

Minutes—The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

Adjournment—Adjourned upon motion.

Benediction—The Reverend George Ott.

Standing Rules

1. The first session of the W.Y.P.S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.

2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committees; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.

3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.

4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W.Y.P.S. Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.

5. There shall be a W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W.Y.P.S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected; so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee.

7. Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.

8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.

9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical report to the secretary by July 5.

10. The Executive Council of the W.Y.P.S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.

11. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W.Y.P.S. report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.

12. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district, within three weeks after the close of conference.

13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.

14. The executive committee of each local W.Y.P.S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

15. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference W.Y.P.S. treasurer not later than July 5.

16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local society, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.

17. The W.Y.P.S. treasurer shall pay from the Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The W.Y.P.S. secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.

18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the Conference.

Report No. 6

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

A. We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies:

1. That quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies be held in each district, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents.

2. That an additional promotional rally be held in each district, as soon as possible after conference, under the supervision of the Conference Executive Council, and that they be authorized to secure the Area President or another denominational leader!

3. That the district president call a meeting of the district officers and advisors as soon as practical after the promotional rally for the purpose of setting definite goals, including more rallies in the district, better planned programs, better promotional plans, and a definite evangelistic emphasis.

4. That the following point system for district banner awards be adopted: local society president or vice president present at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; for each new subscription to the WESLEYAN YOUTH since the last rally, (that new subscriptions shall be those who have not been subscribers within the last year) 5 points; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1% of the active society members presents (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point; for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The reports of at least the highest two shall be read at the rally and the society with the highest total is to be the winner.

5. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

6. That there be a state-wide rally held on the Campgrounds on Memorial Day, and that the state banner be awarded using the district rally point system except that the president or vice-president, pastor, members, and non-members be counted for each service. New subscriptions for the WESLEYAN YOUTH shall be counted from the preceding conference.

II. Projects

A. For conference project we recommend the following:

1. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program, that we offer services on finances needed for at least one evangelistic campaign or survey this year, and that this assistance be rendered in such areas as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such an extent as deemed advisable by the Executive Council.

2. That we participate in the crusade plans sponsored by the General Conference W.Y.P.S.

B. For local society we recommend the following:

1. That the General W.Y.P.S. Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted, and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical

reports.

2. That each society plan visitation programs and special meeting with members of the society such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio programs, and street meetings.

III. Finance

A. For finance we recommend the following:

1. That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

2. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

- a. President—\$120.00
- b. Vice President—\$50.00
- c. Secretary—\$35.00
- d. Treasurer—\$65.00
- e. Assistant Secretary—\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 15 and the other June 15.

3. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 6 cents per mile.

4. That the budget for the following year be as follows:

- a. General Dues, \$1.00 per active member of the society.
- b. Conference Budget (based on Church membership)
 - 20 cents, Conference Extension Fund
 - 25 cents, Conference Expense Fund
 - 15 cents, Youth Camp Fund
 - 5 cents, General Conference Entertainment Fund

c. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.

d. That all pastors assisted by Conference Extension Fund shall report church attendance, finance, and spiritual condition monthly to the Conference W.Y.P.S. President, who shall in turn report the same to district chairmen.

5. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the youth work.

6. That all offerings above the operating expenses of the District Rallies be sent to the Conference Treasurer to apply on conference projects.

7. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the W.Y.P.S. Conference Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings, and be sent in quarterly with the W.Y.P.S. budget.
