JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The seventy-first annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 10:00 a.m., Tuesday, August 5, 1941, with the President, Rev. William A. Smith, in the Chair.

·The singing was led by Brother Gerald Carry and the devotions were led by Brother T. J. Pomeroy. He read 1 Cor. 13 with appropriate remarks, and followed with prayer.

The roll was called. 32 Elders and 9 Conference Preachers answered the roll.

Delegates—The names of 47 Delegates-elect were read by the Nominating Committee who had duly examined the credentials.

Credentials Committee—R. O. Cooper and Gerald Carry were elected the Credentials Committee. They reported the names of 5 Delegates-elect. On motion the credentials were accepted and the Delegates seated.

Conference Bar—By vote the ten front rows of seats in the middle sections of the tabernacle were made the Conference Bar.

Orders of the Day—The Committee on Orders of the Day read the program for the Conference business and special services.

On motion the hour of 2:30 p. m., Wednesday was made a Special Order of the Day for the funeral service of Brother Frank M. Hinnen.

On motion the time for the Ordination Service was referred back to the Committee for another hour.

The report of the Committee on Orders of the Day was adopted with the understanding that adjustments be made to the special orders.

Adjourned on motion. Benediction by Brother Hill.

Tuesday Afternoon

The devotions were led by Brother E. H. Cook. He gave a splendid "to the point talk." He called on Brother Patterson to lead in prayer.

The roll was called and the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Credentials—The Credentials Committee reported one Delegate-elect. On motion the Delegate was seated.

They also reported the following recommendations:

By the Topeka, First Church that Mary C. Dunbar; by the Eskridge Church that Raymond Rist; by the Kansas City, Kansas Church that Charles Groves, and by the Manhattan Church that Evan M. Peabody be received to study preparatory to travel.

On motion the above recommendations were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Resignation—The resignation of Lillie Stewart from the Statistical Committee was accepted.

On motion the Chairman of the Statistical Committee was authorized to choose someone to fill the vacancy.

Afternoon Roll Call—A motion carried to discontinue the calling of the roll in the afternoon sessions.

President's Report-The Conference President gave his report.

The official part was adopted, and the financial part referred to th Finance Committee.

Vice-President's Report—The report of the Vice-President was given and accepted.

Sunday-school Secretary's Report—The Sunday-school Secretary gave his report. The official portion was adopted, and the financial part was referred to the Auditing Committee.

Delegates Seated—The Conference President having given a statement of the organization of the new churches at Leavenworth and Arkansas City, the Delegates-elect from said churches were seated.

Adjourned for committee work.

Conference Sermon—In the evening Brother Smith brought us a gracious message from the text, "They need not depart, Give ye them to eat." He pressed the fact that our ability to serve depends, not so much on the abundance that we have on hand, but upon getting what we have into the hands of Christ. He also emphasized the thoughts that the health of our congregations are greatly effected by what we feed them, and their desire to eat by the spirit and manner of presentation. Also that what we are is more vital than what we do. "Take heed unto thyself."

Wednesday Morning

The devotions were led by Brother L. W. Melton. The Lord added His blessing. Brother O. G. Wilson led in prayer.

The roll was called and the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Itineracy and Orders—The Committee on Itineracy and Orders gave a partial report recommending that Raymond Rist be received to travel under the direction of the Conference and pursue the reading course.

Courtesy—Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, Connectional Home Missionary Secretary, and our Connectional Representative, was introduced to the Conference. He responded with cordial greetings and a statement of his mission among us.

Credentials—The Committee on Credentials read recommendations that the Conference receive to travel under its direction Frank Gilger, recommended by the Hall Church; and Floyd M. Elder, recommended by the Grace Chapel Church.

Order of the Day—9:00 a. m., the hour for election of Conference Officers. As we gathered about the altar Brother Nicholson led us in prayer for divine guidance.

Two Secretaries and two groups of Tellers were appointed by the President.

Brother Nicholson was invited to preside during the election.

By proper Parliamentary and Disciplinary procedure the election resulted as follows:

F. C. Hill Resigns—F. C. Hill declined the election to the office of Second Vice-President and also the election of Ministerial member of the Board of Trustees. The results of the second ballotings are recorded above.

Referred to Nominating Committee—The offices of Assistant Secretary, Sunday-school Secretary, Prayer League Secretary, Tithing Secretary, Educational Secretary and all standing Committees and Boards were by motion referred to the Nominating Committee for nominations.

Statistical Corrections—The Statistical Committee was authorized to correct mathematical errors in the statistical reports without consulting the pastors.

Associate Members Tithing—By vote "Membership Tithing" under Item III in the Statistical Reports was interpreted to include associate members.

Trustees Authorized—The following resolutions concerning purchase, sale and mortgaging of church property were adopted:

Resolved, That all actions heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That the duly elected and qualifying Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary actions as to them may seem proper and expedient and to the best interests of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by such Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the said Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Adjourned for committee work until Thursday morning. Benediction by F. E. Shivers.

Thursday Morning

The devotions were led by Brother George Sundstrom. He read from 1 Cor. 15 and gave helpful comment.

The roll was called and the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Credentials—The Credentials Committee read a recommendation from the Naponee Church that Raymond Balty is a suitable person to travel under the direction of the Conference. The recommendation was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Finance—The Committee on Finance gave a partial report. The report was adopted. See Report.

Courtesy—Rev. Alfred L. Lange of Leavenworth was introduced to the Conference.

Order of Day—The Conference W. Y. P. S. came before the Conference in a body to present the new churches which had been organized under their supervision during the past year. The Red Cloud, Nebraska, Church was presented by Martin Cox who organized the same. Clayton Hansen, the pastor, gave an encouraging report. The Hardy, Nebraska, Church was presented by F. E. Shivers who officiated at the organization. Vivian Haun, one of the pastors, told of the advancement of the work. The Arkansas City, Kansas, Church was presented by its organizer, William A. Smith. The pastor, Gerald Carry gave an encouraging report.

William A. Smith also presented the new churches which he as President organized at Leavenworth, Kansas and at Englewood, Colorado. Brother Hulet, pastor at Leavenworth, spoke of the progress there. Brother Conrad, pastor at Englewood, was not present.

O. G. Wilson, Second Vice-President of the Conference, formally received these churches into the Conference with well chosen words of appreciation. He challenged them for six new churches duuring the coming year. He led us in a prayer of thanksgiving for and blessing upon the

above churches, also petitioned for wisdom and grace to meet the challenge given.

Rev. Roy S. Nicholson gave a short, but very helpful and encouraging

talk to the young people.

Future Opening Dates—On motion the Camp Meeting Committee was asked to present recommendations relative to the future opening dates of the Conference.

Association Chairmen—Martin Cox and R. E. Britton were elected Chairmen of the Ministerial Association.

Charters—On motion the Conference Trustees were instructed to see that all church charters of disorganized churches are removed from the State Records.

Resolution Amended—A motion carried to amend Resolution No. 12 making the last clause to read, "Second, nominate all sessional and standing committees and boards and be prepared to report as the first item of business."

1942 Nominating Committee—William A. Smith, Chairman ex-officio; F. C. Hill, A. E. Harris, E. J. Carry, R. O. Cooper and the Church Delegates from the Ottawa, Wichita and Concordia Churches.

1942 Conference Sermon—On motion E. A. Coates was invited to bring

the Conference Sermon for 1942.

Advisory Board—The President nominated O. G. Wilson and Rudolph Hansen to his Advisory Board. They were elected.

O. G. Wilson Resigned—O. G. Wilson presented his resignation from the Conference Board of Trustees. A motion to accept the resignation was lost by a vote of 41 to 23.

Quarterly Meetings—On motion the Quarterly Meeting Schedule Committee was asked to prepare a schedule whereby the Conference President would be present to hold all Quarterly Business Meetings.

Adjourned on motion. Benediction by William A. Smith.

Thursday Afternoon

For devotions Mr. Don Gibbs and Miss Bertha Meyer, both blind, brought two special numbers in music and song. Brother U. G. Travis led in prayer.

Pastoral Relations-The Pastoral Relations Committee gave their first

reading.

Tithing Report—The Tithing Secretary gave her report. The report

was adopted.

Courtesy—Rev. Charles Klingman, U. B. pastor at Big Springs, Kansas, Mr. Don Gibbs, evangelistic singer, and Rev. Clarence Mason, pastor in the Wisconsin Conference were introduced to the Conference. They gave kindly responses.

Order of Day-Pastors report. U. G. Travis, Velma Knox, H. B.

Hotchkiss, Dale W. Campbell, T. F. Child, R. E. Britton, L. S. Currie, Elizabeth Currie, L. H. Tasker, F. M. Elder, R. J. Eling each reported.

Order of Day—Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, our Connectional Representative, brought a splendid address from the subject, "The Ideal Wesleyan Methodist Church." The ideal presented was a lofty one, but challenging.

Courtesy—Rev. Jesse Whitecotton and Rev. E. E. Cory, the evangelists for our camp meeting, were introduced. They responded with words of greeting.

Adjourned on motion.

Friday Morning

The devotions were led by Brother Raymond Rist. After the Scripture lesson and some good comments, he called on Brother Harrington to lead in prayer.

The roll was called and the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Itineracy and Orders—The Committee on Itineracy and Orders gave a partial report recommending that W. C. Hansen, Laurence Melton and Alice Boyd be elected to Elders Orders. For balance of report, see report.

Camp Meeting Treasurer—The Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Committee gave his report. By motion the report was referred to the Auditing Committee.

Conference Fund—A motion carried that the expense of providing a caretaker for the campground and the insurance on the buildings be paid from the Conference Fund.

Itemized Report—On motion the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Committee was asked to furnish an itemized account of expenditures for publication.

Field Man—The motion to have another man to travel the Conference was by vote made a special order of business at 2:00 p. m. today.

"I think it meet, as long as I am in this tabernacle to stir you up by putting you in remembrance." 2 Peter 1:13.

REPORT OF THE AUDITING COMMITTEE

We, the Auditing Committee, have examined the books of the following Treasurers and have found them to be correct: The Missionary Board, Camp Meeting and Campground Committee, Superannuate Board and Kansas Conference Treasurer. Also the report of the Conference President, Sunday-school Secretary and the Tithing Secretary.

STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

With a deep sense of gratitude to our Heavenly Father, we observe an increase of material, as well as spiritual blessings upon us as a Conference during the past year. Under His leadership there have been five new churches brought into the Conference, all of them in promising fields. Three of these were sponsored by the Conference W. Y. P. S., working jointly with the Missionary Board.

The present church membership is 1469, which represents a gain of 81. (1388 last year.) The associate members number 276 (242). 38 were baptized, (48), and there are 973 tithers reported (958). There is a gain of 117 Wesleyan Methodists, the total now received being 526. A gain of 8 Wesleyan Missionaries is shown.

Four new Sunday schools are reported. The total number in Sunday school is 4006, an increase of 282. The average attendance is 2193, a gain of 39.

The total number of church buildings have increased three, the valuation of all church buildings being \$110800.00, an increase of \$13490.00. The indebtedness increase is \$5,718.72. The parsonages, of which there are four more, show an increased valuation of \$5225.00, while the indebtedness increased but \$2182.72.

The total pastors' cash salary is \$20770.21, an increase of \$2076.18 over last year. The average cash salary (not counting churches not func-

tioning the whole year) is \$467.41, or \$8.98 per week. 41% of the pastors received less than \$300.00 cash salary, and 52% less than \$400.00.

The total amount raised for all purposes is \$70862.47 (\$59758.50) or an average contribution per member of \$48.24.

The following charges raised each item of the budget assigned (or more): Antioch, Belleville, Cedar, Chapman Creek, Concordia, Eskridge, Gaylord, Grace Chapel, Hall, Hollis, Hopewell, Inglewood, Iowa Union, Kansas City, Kansas; Kansas City, Mo.; Miltonvale, Ottawa, Topeka First, Gage Park, Quinton Heights, Wichita Mission, Williams' Chapel, Willis.

Ames and Wichita raised the total amount assigned but did not fill each item.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting two years in advance.
- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held on the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. H. & F. M. S., or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of the subscriptions from his charge.
- 4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expenses. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.
- 7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: 1/3 cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in 1/2 inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.
- 8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
 - 9. To Hold Quarterly Meetings. Resolved, That the Conference

President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.

- 10. Inspection of Church Property. Resolved, That it is the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President should inquire at each Quarterly Conference whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.
- 11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That we elect a Committee of five Elders, including the President as Chairman ex-officio, and three Delegates-elect from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine the credentials of all Delegates to the Conference. Second, nominate all sessional committees and Boards, and be prepared to report as the first item of business.
- 12. Theological Institute. Resolved, That the traveling expenses of instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed for Institute work.
- 13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund, and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such service.
- 14. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication. (Published in 1938 Minutes, amended in 1939.)
- 15. 1 Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active ministers to pay 1 per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on the Budget.
- 16. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 17. Additional Delegates. Resolved, That when more than one Delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the Elder that entitles the church to the additional Delegate.
- 18. Fiscal Year. Resolved, That the fiscal year of the local church close one week before Conference and that the statistical report be made on the basis of money received up to that time.
- 19. Pastor Paid Through Conference. Resolved, That the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.
- 20. Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders

of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publica-

- 21. Conference Opening Date. Resolved, That the Tuesday nearest August I be the permanent date for the opening of Conference.
- 22. Election of Conference Treasurer. Resolved, That the election of the Conference Treasurer be held following the reading of the Treasurer's annual report, rather than at the time of the election of the other officers of the Conference.
- 23. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, That the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 24. Vacations. Resolved, That the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

Resolved, That we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the Church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he may choose for vacation.

25. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, That all actions heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary actions as to them may deem proper and expedient and to the best interests of the Annual Conference and the Local Churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by such Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the said Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

MORAL REFORM

"Be ye holy, for I am holy." 1 Peter 2: 16.

We, as young people, have a great challenge ahead of us to establish the high Christian Bible standard of holy living in conversation, in reverence for the house of worship, and reverence for the ministers. We shall devote more time to the reading of the Bible, our own Church periodicals and books, for they are conducive to draw us closer to the Lord, and we shall devote more time in meditation and service for the Lord in the beauty of holiness.

We shall be careful that our mode of dress becometh holiness: no short sleeves, short skirts, low necks, bobbed hair, permanents, anklets, wearing of jewelry, nor any worldliness which would encourage the pride of the heart.

A great challenge faces the W. Y. P. S. to rekindle revival fires, help rescue the perishing, and reclaim backsliders.

What has been done by the young people in evangelism and in honoring the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, is recognized and appreciated.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Sisters of the Kansas W. H. & F. M. Societies:

Greetings! For my message this year I wish to draw a few thoughts from an incident in the life of the Master. It was the close of the day in which Jesus had fed the five thousand. He had commanded His disciples to get into the ship, and to go to the other side unto Bethsaida. After sending the people away Jesus departed unto a mountain to pray. As the ship reached the midst of the sea, a mighty storm arose converting it into a churning mass. But, from his vantage point Jesus saw them "toiling in rowing."

First, will you notice that the disciples were not fleeing from the presence of the Lord as was Jonah, when he was overtaken by the storm, but they were where Jesus had sent them. Shall we conclude then that Jesus had sent them out to sea in the teeth of a storm? He must have done just that, but He didn't thrust them out to forget them, for He saw them "toiling in rowing." Although this was a literal storm, it was a specimen of the hardships they were to expect, when hereafter He should send them abroad to preach the gospel. They must expect to "toil in rowing," they must work hard to strive against so strong a stream; they must likewise

expect to be tossed with waves and to be persecuted by enemies. By exposing them He intended to train them for such difficulties that they might "endure hardness."

Notice also, that Christ did not come immediately to their aid, but not till after three o'clock in the morning. Sisters, do you sometimes think it strange that at times the winds are contrary—yes even when you are in the Lord's work? Remember this also-He sees you toiling in rowing and will come to your rescue. Though His coming may be deferred, He will come. No difficulties can obstruct Christ's gracious appearances for His people, when the set time is come. He will either find or force a way through the most tempestuous sea for your deliverance. Cromwell said to his soldiers just before a great battle: "Know ye soldiers all, that God always comes to man's help in the nick of time." One has said, "It is a glorious thing to have a big trouble, a great Atlantic billow, that takes you off your feet and sweeps you right out into the sea, and lets you sink down into the depths, into old ocean's lowest caverns, till you get to the foundations of the mountains, and there see God, and then come up again to tell what a great God He is, and how graciously He delivers His people." Life is just hard enough to bring out the heroic. Let us go forth to face the storms with and for Him.

W. H. & F. M. S. MORAL REFORM

The one great desire in the heart and mind of God seems to be that He may dwell among His people to bestow His love upon them, to be everything to them, and out of His great heart He speaks to His chosen peo-

ple these words: "And now Israel, what doth the Lord thy God require of thee but to fear the Lord thy God, to walk in all His ways and to love Him and to serve the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul, To keep the commandments of the Lord and His statutes which I command thee this day for thy good? He is thy praise, and He is thy God."

Our nation is putting on an intensive defense program at a terrific cost and a sacrifice of both lives and money. Beloved, unless we as Christian women, a part of the body of Christ, awaken to the subtle planning of the enemy of souls to make inroads into our homes and churches and stir ourselves to throw around our children and young people a strong defense of intercessory prayer and reading of God's Word the battle will be lost and our own souls imperiled. Let us as holiness women set the example and wear our dresses a good length below the knee, our sleeves full length, never go without hose or wear shorts or slacks. A devout saint has said, "Your short skirts are the reason for your barren altars." There may be several other things hindering us from carrying the burden God is waiting for us to carry: such as visiting the beauty parlors for permanents, cutting of hair, and modern hair dress. A Christian should not be found there. Also the wearing of gold including the wedding ring and worldly adornment which are strictly forbidden by God's Word. (1 Peter 3: 3.)

Let us not permit our children to wear anklets, or sunsuits, or go to swimming pools, movies, or other questionable places. Much care should be taken to guard the literature our children read and the company they keep. PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

Division I. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work be reviewed quarterly in each Local Society.
 - 2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days":
 - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
- B. Easter—Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.
- D. May Day—to be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on the home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory.)

- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day—public presentation of the Missionary Magazine in effort to secure subscriptions. The duty of the Local Solicitor for the Magazine shall be to secure renewals and fill the quota for her society. The same to be a permanent officer. We encourage the reading of Missionary books, and distribution of tracts, and a record be kept by the Magazine Solicitor of Mission books used.
- 3. That October 11 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report same to Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- 4. That all local dues be sent to our Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 709 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas. One half of the same to be used for Missionary work and be applied on church budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired. (See Treasurer's book Item "C"

under Number 4.) That honorary membership dues be applied on Missionary Budget.

- 5. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 6. That each Society contribute 10 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.
- 7. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- 8. We urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hepzibah Orphanage, except in cases where church budget is less than \$5.00, such contributions to be applied on church budget.
- 9. That each society be responsible for the raising of \$5.00 for the new W. H. & F. M. S.-W. Y. P. S. tabernacle.
- 10. That each Local President appoint a committee whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the kingdom of God.

We recommend that formation of Prayer Circles, where possible, or prayer chains to encourage faith and united prayer.

- 11. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for Mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
 - A. September, October and November for Education.
 - B. December for Orphanage.
 - C. January and February for Kansas Conference Missions.
 - D. March and April for Home Missions.
 - E. May for India, June for Africa, and July for South America.
- 12. In harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival, until it comes.
- 13. We urge the use of the programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary, also the Study Book, "The Monk Who Lived Again," by Pierson. Supplementary books recommended are, "Miracles in Black," by Wengate and "So Send I You," by Chadwick.
- 14. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer quarterly.

This money should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least two weeks before Conference.

15. That the annual report be reported by the President, Secretary

and Treasurer of the Local Society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's Report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, N. Mae Clark, 709 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate copy to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. The names of the newly elected President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank. We earnestly insist on more accuracy and promptness regarding the report.

- 16. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read at the last business meeting. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 17. That the president of the society be responsible for the reading of the report on Moral Reform at one public church service during the year.
- 18. That the President of each Society appoint a Committee of two to see to the gathering of food stuffs for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be: 10 quarts of fruit spread, or fruit, 5 quarts of pickles, relish or catsup; 10 pounds of noodles, 10 quarts of vegetables, and a cash offering for silverware, or fill quota with cash. The surplus donations shall be given to the dormitory and will receive credit on educational budget.
- 19. That the President of each Local Society appoint a Committee to coöperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday school in observance of Temperance Sunday and distribution of Temperance literature.
- 20. November—Men and Missions month. Program shall be sponsored by the men.
- 21. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 650 members, 200 honorary members, 400 magazines, and \$6,000.00 apportionment. We urge that each society make a gain in each of the above mentioned.

Division II. Conference Work

- 22. That the W. H. & F. M. S. Conference begins Tuesday Aug. 7th at 3 p. m.
- 23. That the President and District Organizer arrange the time and recommend the worker for the Conventions, also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker.
- 24. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President.

We suggest that each organizer meet with each Local Society once during the year.

25. The Districts are as follows:

District No. 1-Kansas City, Mo.; Kansas City, Kans.; Easton, Ot-

tawa, Fairview, Lawrence, Willis, Topeka, First; Topeka, Gage Park; Topeka, Quinton Heights; North Topeka, Williams Chapel, and Eskridge.

District No. 2-Clay Center, Wesley Chapel, Bethany Chapel, Abilene,

Antioch, Miltonvale, Salina, Idana, Milford, and Manhattan.

District No. 3—Concordia, Hall, Bellville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis, Union Valley, and Greenleaf.

District No. 4—Wichita, Wichita Mission, Grace Chapel, Hopewell,

Hutchinson, and Arkansas City.

District No. 5-Mankato, Wesley Center, Formoso, Victor, Hardy, Nebr.; Red Cloud, Nebr.

District No. 6—Cedar, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Gaylord, and Naponee, Neb.

26. That the Gleaners each pay their dues of one dollar, observe the monthly prayer hour, read the Missionary Magazine and correspond with the mission fields and the President of the Gleaners.
