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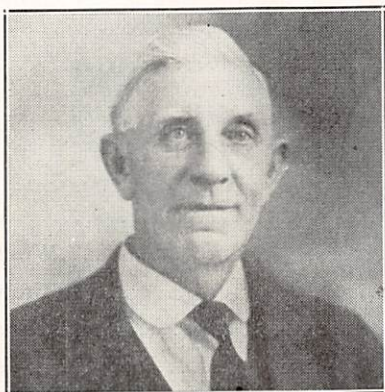

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, July 19, 2:00 p. m.

The forty-sixth session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened in the Tabernacle on the grounds of the Greer Camp Meeting Association at Greer, South Carolina at 2:00 p. m., July 19, 1938. Devotions were conducted by Rev. R. C. Kendrick.

The Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. R. C. Kendrick. The roll was called and 13 Elders and 10 Conference Preachers answered to their names.

On motion, it was voted that the special orders be changed so that the Connectional Representative would speak at 9:00 a. m. Wednesday instead of 3:00 p. m. Thursday.

The President appointed J. F. Childs, F. L. Moore, and C. E. Henderson as lay members on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The Secretary read the reports of Rev. J. M. Hames (General Evangelist), and W. B. Clubb (Evangelist). By vote of the Conference their reports were adopted and their characters passed.

A Committee on Ministerial Meetings was elected as follows: J. B. Hilson, Chairman; V. A. Mitchell, Central District; J. M. Miller, Spartanburg District.

Conference adjourned to the call of the Chair.

At 9:00 the Conference was called to order and the special orders of the day were taken up.

Rev. W. L. Thompson, Connectional Home Missionary Secretary, gave the Connectional Address.

Wednesday, July 20, 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. G. E. Crenshaw.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The roll was called.

A. D. Horton, Miss Jannie Nimmons, J. L. Cantrell, C. C. Mason, W. H. King, I. B. Brannon presented proper credentials and were enrolled as Lay Delegates.

C. V. Marchbanks from Alice Mill, W. L. Benjamin from Alice Mill, C. R. Ruppe from Gaffney, J. D. Land from Conestee Charge, R. P. Robinson from Glendale Charge, and Paul Miller from Westminster Charge were recommended to the Conference to study under its direction. The Conference voted to refer their names to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

G. L. Stewart from the Mt. Olivet Charge was recommended for Elder's Orders. By vote, this recommendation was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Rev. J. A. Wood of the North Carolina Conference was introduced to the Conference and made a few appropriate remarks.

Miss Bell of Asheville, N. C., Miss Birely, Missionary to China, and two of their friends were introduced to the Conference and gave words of greeting and testimony.

On motion Conference recessed for five minutes.

After the five minute recess, the Conference went into the election of Delegates to General Conference to be held at Fairmount, Indiana, June 28, 1939. The election was by ballot.

R. C. Kendrick, W. D. Correll, R. C. Mullinax, J. D. Elrod, and J. B. Hilson were elected as Ministerial Delegates.

The Conference voted to elect only three (3) alternate Ministerial Delegates and three alternate Lay Delegates.

W. L. Miller, D. G. Matheny, and J. D. Scoggin were elected alternate Ministerial Delegates in the order named.

J. F. Childs and W. M. Harris were elected the first two Lay Delegates.

The Conference voted to make it the Special Order to have an Educational Service Thursday, July 21, 7:30 p. m.

On motion Conference adjourned.

The Conference W. H. & F. M. S. held its public meeting. Miss Josie Garrett, the Vice-President, presided. Miss Gertrude Farmer spoke regarding the progress of the work at Glenville. Rev. W. D. Correll delivered a very timely message on Missions.

The Secretary read a letter from Rev. D. T. Cain. An offering of \$14.25 was received for him.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The Secretary read a letter of greeting from Miss Ruth Kelley, Missionary to Africa.

The Secretary read the reports of Rev. W. D. Correll and Rev. G. E. Crenshaw, General Evangelists. The Conference voted to adopt their reports and pass their characters.

J. B. Hilson gave a verbal report. By vote of the Conference his report was adopted and his character passed.

On motion Conference adjourned.

Thursday, July 21, 1:30 p. m.

A Memorial service was held for Rev. D. O. Powers, Rev. J. T. Carey, and Rev. R. F. Turner, with Rev. R. C. Kendrick in charge.

Conference was called to order by the President.

R. C. Mullinax resigned from the Committee on Apportionment. His resignation was accepted, and W. L. Miller was elected to fill the vacancy.

S. I. Keeler, General Evangelist, read his report. The Conference voted to adopt his report and pass his character.

Upon motion the Conference voted that in case the church building of the First Wesleyan Methodist Church of Central becomes property of the Annual Conference and in case the local church so desires, the Conference Trustees are authorized to sell the said property and apply the proceeds of the sale to the building of the new church at Central College.

By vote the Conference instructed the Secretary to write a letter of greeting to Miss Ruth Kelley, Missionary to Africa.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair.

On motion the Conference voted that R. C. Mullinax give a discussion on the common rules and principles of Parliamentary Law.

W. L. Miller was called to the Chair.

R. C. Mullinax conducted a profitable discussion on Parliamentary Law.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair.

The President nominated and the Conference elected R. C. Mullinax and C. E. Henderson as the President's Advisory Board.

The Committee on Moral Reform reported. The report was accepted.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its first reading.

W. L. Miller was called to the Chair.

The Committee on Thanks reported. The report was adopted. See Report No. 7.

J. C. Nunnally, Conference Sunday School Secretary, reported. His report was adopted and his character passed.

Conference adjourned to the call of the Chair.

Friday, July 22, 1:30 p. m.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The Committee on Apportionment recommended that the budget be apportioned as follows per member: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$1.25; Home Missions, \$.50; Orphanage, \$.25; Conference President's Salary, \$.75; Conference Work, \$.45; Church Extension and Conference Evangelism, \$.30; Superannuate Ministers' Fund, \$.20; General Conference Travel, \$.10; Conference Entertainment, \$.10; Minutes, \$.05. Committee on Memorials reported. Report was adopted. See Report No. 6.

Rev. Miss Marie G. Downer of Asheville, N. C. was introduced to the Conference and gave words of greeting.

The Conference voted for its next annual session to be held at the Greer Campgrounds, Greer, S. C., July 25, 1939.

On motion Conference voted to recess for G. L. Stewart to preach.

After G. L. Stewart preached, the Conference was called to order by the President.

The Treasurer read his report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 10.

The Auditing Committee reported. The report was adopted. See Report No. 8.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported. The report was adopted. See Report No. 4.

The Secretary read the report of the Treasurer of the Superannuate Board. The report was adopted. See Report No. 9.

Conference adjourned.

Friday, July 22, 7:30 p. m.

There was an Ordination Service in charge of the President, Rev. R. C. Kendrick. J. Youngblood and L. W. Barbee were ordained. Rev. R. C. Mullinax preached the Ordination Sermon using 2 Timothy 4:5 as a text.

Saturday, July 23, 8:00 a. m.

Devotions were conducted by C. W. Nalley.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

The Committee on Fifth Sunday Holiness Convention recommended that the convention be held the fifth Sunday in January, 1939.

Upon motion the Conference elected J. B. Hilson as Educational Secretary.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its second reading.
Conference adjourned on motion.

Resolved, That the Trustees of the South Carolina Annual Conference, together with the President of the said Conference, be and they hereby are empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans to the South Carolina Annual Conference or to any church needing funds to liquidate Conference, church, or parsonage property indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (and this writing is to become a part of the permanent record of the Trustees) and that the Trustees and President of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which said loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable. And the Trustees of said South Carolina Annual Conference are also hereby empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said Trustees, where the sale of Conference, church, or parsonage or other real estate has been approved or authorized by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his Advisory Board.

By vote the Conference adopted the above resolution.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its third reading. The report was adopted. See Report No. 2.

The minutes were read and approved.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions Adopted in 1898

Resolved, 1st. That as a body in Conference assembled, we will not allow our pulpits or churches to be used by those who do not give evidence of being sound in the doctrines of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and true to our polity.

2nd. That as ministers and laymen we will use our best endeavors to prevent the promulgation of doctrines or usages not in accord with the Wesleyan Methodist faith.

Resolutions Adopted in 1905

Resolved, 1st. That the law with regard to complaints or violations of orders and resolutions found on page 37 of our Discipline, and beginning with the words, "When the President," shall apply to all cases of the violators of our Discipline, and no charges shall be entertained by the Judiciary Committee without said previous investigation and labor.

2nd. That no member of the Conference shall have his character passed who fails to carry out all the rules and orders of this Conference, unless providentially hindered, except upon a three-fourths vote of the body.

Resolutions Adopted in 1907

Resolved, 1st. That we affirm our faith in the soundness of the position taken by the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in denying any of its members membership in any secret society.

2nd. That we believe that the preaching of Holiness that does not include a clear and distinct opposition to all secret societies is seriously lacking in the essential elements and must be more or less displeasing to God.

3rd. That we believe that the right type of Holiness preaching and teaching is the most effective means by which to induce men to separate themselves from all lodge entanglements; therefore, we will do our best to double our diligence in this line of effort.

4th. That we affectionately admonish our people to avoid all compromise with secrecy. Hence we as a Conference require that our pastors and churches shall not elect, or suffer to be elected, superintendents or teachers of any Sunday Schools that are held in our churches if they hold membership in secret societies; furthermore, those belonging to secret orders shall not be allowed to hold services in our churches.

5th. That we seriously urge upon all our brethren and sisters that they may be careful to maintain a consistent, but radical, attitude of opposition to all organizations, secret or open, which are opposed to Jesus Christ and His doctrine and principles of righteousness.

Resolutions Adopted in 1914

Resolved, 1st. That all of our Licentiates not receiving any appoint-

ments to pastoral or evangelistic work be required to preach at least once a month, or twelve times during the Conference year.

2nd. That in addition to the above resolution, we earnestly request all preachers not receiving a regular appointment by the Conference, except those attending school preparatory to the ministry, to hold, if possible, a two weeks revival during the year.

3rd. That all preachers unemployed by the Conference during the coming year be urged to select a fellow-laborer with whom they can work harmoniously, and go out and try to build up new works as they may have opportunity, and revive the desert places.

4th. That in order that the foregoing resolutions may have the greatest effect possible, and that each preacher may have a higher estimation of the dignity of his calling, and that the burden for souls may be increased, and that they may feel the sympathy of the Church to which they belong, we urge each charge to pass like resolutions.

5th. That it is not only the duty, but binding on each Circuit preacher of our Conference, to receive whomsoever the Conference may designate as Quarterly Meeting Evangelist, and give him their hearty support and coöperation.

Resolution Adopted in 1919

Be it Resolved, That the Committee on Public Worship consist of the President of the Conference, the pastor of the charge where the Conference is held, and the pastor's delegate.

Resolution, Regarding Tithing, Adopted in 1922

Resolved, That no person be licensed to preach who does not tithe his income; that all our licentiates be required to faithfully tithe their income; and that the license of no preacher be renewed, who fails to tithe.

Resolutions Adopted in 1923

Resolved, 1st. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be opened to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

2nd. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided, this shall not interfere with previous arrangements between pastor and church.

Resolution Adopted in 1926

Resolved, That the pastors be required to raise their Minute Money and send to the Conference Treasurer within sixty days after they receive their Minutes.

Resolutions Adopted in 1931

Resolved, 1st. That this Conference elect a Tithing Secretary, as provided for in our Discipline, whose duty it shall be to visit each charge

at least once a year, if possible. Each church visited shall raise at least the traveling expenses of the Secretary at the time of his visitation.

2nd. That each local church or charge elect a Tithing Secretary, whose duty it shall be to thoroughly canvass the membership of the church or charge each quarter and labor most earnestly to induce each member to strictly tithe his income and to place the same in the church treasury for the purpose of meeting all the claims of the church, both locally and generally. This Secretary shall report at each Quarterly Conference the percentage of the membership who are tithing in keeping with this plan, the percentage who are giving in other ways, and the percentage who are not giving at all.

3rd. That each pastor and church coöperate with these Secretaries in every possible way in order to make the entire membership of this Conference strict tithers.

Resolution Adopted in 1932

Whereas in America there seems to be a constantly increasing disregard for law and law observance, and whereas there has been a desire on the part of some to annul or repeal the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Be it Resolved, That we unequivocally place ourselves in opposition to any plan whereby either this Amendment or the Volstead Act should be changed.

Be it further Resolved, That we will labor diligently in public and private to create that public sentiment for these laws that will not only keep them on our Statute books, but cause them to be more rigorously enforced.

Resolution Adopted in 1938

Resolved, That the Trustees of the South Carolina Annual Conference, together with the President of the said Conference, be and they hereby are empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans to the South Carolina Annual Conference or to any church needing funds to liquidate Conference, church, or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (and this writing is to become a part of the permanent record of the Trustees), and that the Trustees and President of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which said loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable. REPORTS

Report Number 1

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the South Carolina Conference: Greetings in the name of our Risen Lord.

The providence of the Lord has brought us together again in this forty-sixth session of our Annual Conference. I trust we have come together in the tenderness of the Spirit. In all of our deliberations, let us maintain the spirit of courtesy and Christian tolerance.

In our activities as Conference President we have enjoyed the co-operation of the pastors and the people in general. No doubt we have not measured up to the expectation of all; but we have endeavored to serve the Church without any partiality to the best of our ability.

The financial conditions in the bounds of our Conference have been very discouraging. Many of the textile plants have been closed and some are still standing. Others operate on less than half time. Despite this fact, our people have been very heroic and some of the churches will be able to report a full budget. Blessings be on our self-sacrificing pastors and their people.

Since we reported at our last Annual Conference, the death angel has visited our ranks and claimed two of our faithful ministers. Rev. D. O. Powers passed to his final reward on September 22, 1937. He had served the Conference for many years. At the time of his death he had his twenty-second appointment to the Whitmire Church.

Rev. J. T. Carey, the oldest Elder in our Conference, passed to his reward May 11, 1938. He too had given many years of useful service to the South Carolina Conference. He was held in high esteem by all who knew him. We will cherish the memories of these holy men.

The Lord has given some very gracious revivals this year. Aside from the two new churches organized, we have had a noted increase in membership.

It is my humble judgment that we as ministers need to adhere more strictly to our duty set forth in our book of Discipline, paragraphs 352-357. By this we would not only be able to refute false doctrines, but it would help us to fill our empty pews and increase our usefulness as a Church.

The Anderson Church has added to the appearance and comfort of their House of Worship by putting in new windows and new pews.

The following churches have been dedicated this year:

Alice Mill Church—December 5, 1937.

Fellowship Church in Anderson County—February 13, 1938.

Pickens View Church—June 26, 1938.

The following acts of official business are in harmony with my Advisory Board:

On August 14, 1937, Rev. C. W. Nalley resigned as junior pastor of the Rock Hill Church and was appointed pastor of the Union Church.

On August 30, 1937, we organized a church at Chesnee, S. C., with seventeen members. This was the result of a tent meeting conducted by Rev. H. A. McCutcheon in harmony with the Missionary Board. This church was added to the Providence Church, and Rev. H. A. McCutcheon was appointed pastor. Through the coöperation of the Conference Trustees with the Missionary Board and donations from others we built a nice little church—32 x 46. We worshipped in it the first time on January 23, 1938. There is an indebtedness of about four hundred fifty dollars (\$450.00) on the building.

On September 19, 1937, Rev. J. B. Hilson resigned as pastor of the Greer Church to enter college at Marion, Indiana to take his Master's degree in Theology.

On October 31, 1937, Rev. L. W. Barbee was appointed pastor of the Whitmire Church to fill the vacancy made by the death of Rev. D. O. Powers.

On November 4, 1937, Rev. L. W. Barbee was transferred from the Alabama Conference to the South Carolina Conference.

On December 16, 1937, Rev. W. L. Miller was appointed Trustee of the Conference for the remainder of the Conference year to fill the vacancy made by the death of Rev. D. O. Powers.

On December 16, 1937, Rev. J. R. Green was appointed as member of the Committee on Vacancy to fill the vacancy made by the death of Rev. D. O. Powers.

On March 1, 1938, Rev. T. C. Harvey of the Tennessee Conference was called to Greer Church as Pastor and has been serving since.

On April 10, 1938, we organized a church at New Hope with twelve members. This church is due to the efforts of Rev. C. J. Blanton, and he was appointed pastor.

Report Number 3

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD

We recommend:

1. That the Conference Treasurer pay the deficit of \$130.79 on the Conference President's salary and traveling expenses. This money to be taken from the fund for Conference Work.
2. That the President receive \$100.00 per month salary and two cents per mile traveling expenses.
3. That the President have the oversight of the work according to our book of Discipline, and that he hold the first and last quarterly meetings. He is to work in needy churches or open work in new fields in the bounds of the Conference.

4. That the President consult with the Board of Stewards of the local churches, especially the weaker churches, as he makes his Quarterly Conference rounds for the purpose of encouraging and devising methods and plans for the better payment of the pastors and thereby building up the work to make self-supporting.

5. That the Statistical Committee be paid \$6.00. This money is to be taken from the fund for Conference Work.

6. That the Treasurer's salary be \$50.00 and the Secretary's salary be \$45.00. This money is to be taken from the fund for Conference Work.

7. That the Conference give Westminster Church one dollar every time it raises a dollar above the interest for one year on its parsonage indebtedness until the amount of \$50.00 be given. This money is to be taken from the fund for Conference Work.

8. That the Conference aid Central, First Church in the amount of \$50.00 toward the erection of its new church to be built on College Hill; provided that the Conference shall have a clear title of complete ownership of the church property. This money is to be taken from the fund for Conference Work and is to be paid when it is needed to continue the building.

9. That the Conference furnish material in the amount of not more than \$50.00 for covering the Glenville parsonage. This money is to be taken from the fund for Conference Work.

10. That the President be authorized to draw on the fund for Conference Work for the printing of Conference stationery.

11. That the fund for Conference Entertainment be paid to the Camp Meeting Association for entertaining the Conference.

12. That during the interim of Annual Conference the Missionary Board shall be duly authorized to draw on the funds for Conference Work, Church Extension and Conference Evangelism, and General Conference Travel as it shall deem best for the interest of the Conference, and that the Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to make payment from these funds upon written order signed by the President and at least one-half the other members of the Missionary Board. This item is to be permanent until otherwise modified by the Conference.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

We, the Trustees of the South Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, met July 22, 1938 at the Campgrounds at Greer, S. C. and transacted such business as came before us.

1. In compliance with the action of the Annual Conference of 1937, we on March 19, 1938 deeded the old Fellowship Church property to Loyce Knox for the sum of thirty dollars (\$30.00). This money was turned over to the local trustees of the Fellowship Church to be used in repairing and remodeling the school building purchased for a church.

2. On January 1, 1938 we authorized the Conference Treasurer to loan the Chesnee Church three hundred dollars (\$300.00) from the General Conference Travel Fund to be used in building the new church. This money with five per cent (5%) interest is due and payable April 1, 1939. This was done at the request of the Conference President.

3. On January 1, 1938 we signed a note to Dobson Lumber Company of Greer, S. C. for two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) at five per cent (5%) interest for lumber to be used in building the Chesnee Church. This note is due and payable January 1, 1939.

4. In compliance with the action of the Annual Conference of 1937, we permitted the city of Williamston to put a street across the church lot of the Williamston Church for which we received no remuneration.

5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer pay interest due on

all notes against the Conference, and collect interest on all notes due the Conference.
