

### STANDING RULES

- No. 1 Date of Conference: The Annual session of the Lockport Annual Conference, Inc., shall convene the Tuesday evening following the first Sunday of June on Houghton Campgrounds.
- No. 2 Board of Trustees Report for Final Action: Resolved, That all matters involving the expenditure of money to be appropriated from the Conference Treasuries, be referred to the Board of Trustees for their consideration and to be reported back by them to the Conference for final action.
- No. 3 General Conference Delegate: Resolved, That it is the sense of the Lockport Conference that no person should accept the position as delegate to the General Conference unless he expects to be present during the entire session. The President is required to communicate this resolution to the delegates three weeks before the General Conference begins.
- No. 4 Pastor's Moving Expense: The church calling a pastor to serve them shall pay his moving expenses to the charge. The same not to apply on his salary.
- No. 5 Closing Treasurer's Books: The Conference Treasurer is hereby authorized to close his books two weeks before the Annual Conference convenes, therefore all receipts and monies should be in his hands by that time if credit on Statistical Report is desired.
- No. 6 Temperance, Sabbath Observance, and Public Morals: Resolved, 1. That we are definitely committed to the prohibition of the liquor traffic rather than its regulation. 2. That we hereby affirm our belief and conviction that the Christian Sabbath was appointed as a day of rest and worship and should be so observed with resolute consistency. 3. That we believe that the highest and noblest conception of public morals is to be achieved through the regeneration of individuals rather than through the collective reformation of society. 4. That for the successful maintenance of the positions above indicated we are fully committed to the support of every valid effort for the preservation of our democratic rights of free speech, a free press, and free religion against all encroachments of dictatorial regimentation of thought and action whethe in State or Church.
- No. 7 Pastor's Vacation: Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay at a time he shall elect.
- No. 8 Reading of Reports: Resolved, That in the reading of the Pastor's Statistical Report it is obligatory to read only items 3, 8 and 10.
  - No. 9 Adjustment of Pastor's Salary: Resolved, That churches

which enter into a financial agreement with the pastor shall when needful, make adjustment of this obligation at each quarterly meeting. A full settlement of the pastor's salary shall be made before the time of the Annual Conference. Any financial agreement on salary entered into by a church and pastor shall not be of force after the end of the Conference year for which it is made, unless it is renewed by the contracting parties. The financial obligation of each church to its pastor shall be in force throughout the conference and camp meeting period. He shall receive his salary the same as if he were on the charge conducting services. The Sunday following conference shall be the first Sunday of the new year.

- No. 10 Delegates' Credentials: It shall be the duty of the pastors to forward to the Conference Secretary not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the church (not missionary) delegates' credentials from his charge.
- No. 11 Budget Apportionment: The Budget Committee shall base their apportionment of the budget for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Education and Hephzibah Orphanage on the rate per member recommended by the Book Committee. The Sunday School budget shall be determined by the number of persons in the Main School, at the rate of five cents a person for Connectional and one cent a person for Conference Sunday School work, the same to be listed as separate budget items. The Conference Budget shall be the sum recommended by the Board of Trustees and approved by the Conference. The amount apportioned for General Conférence President's salary shall be included in the Conference Budget. The Conference Entertainment Budget shall be the amount recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be disbursed upon their recommendation and approval of Conference. The W. Y. P. S. budget shall be determined on the rate per active member of the W. Y. P Society according to the Discipline. Each charge may have the number of members under sixteen years of age, and any Elder or Elder's widow who cannot contribute to the budget, deducted from its membership list provided the pastor gives to the Budget Committee the number of such members before the close of the second day of Conference.
- No. 12 Budget Credit: Nothing but cash shall count on the Sunday School, Conference, or Conference Entertainment budgets. Money paid on L. S. U. pledges, or interest paid on Educational Notes and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton College shall count on the Educational budget. Cash and receipts acceptable to the Missionary Boards shall count on Orphanage, Home and Foreign Missionary budgets.
- No. 13 Date for Taking Pastoral Vote: The Conference President and his Advisory Board shall fix the date of taking the vote for the pastor. He shall instruct the church two weeks in advance of the required announcement of such date.

## JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Lockport Annual Conference, Inc. of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened for its 86th Annual Session on Houghton Campgrounds, at Houghton, New York, on June 3, 1947, at 7:06 p. m. E. D. T.

Opening.—The President, the Rev. A. J. Taylor, called the Conference to order. The Rev. Charles Foster led in singing. The Rev. Charles Sicard led in prayer.

Roll Call.—The roll of ministers was called and 17 marked present.

Credentials.—Committee on Credentials made its report which was adopted with substitutions.

Roll Call.—The Roll of Delegates was called and 9 marked present.

Bar of Conference.—The Bar of Conference was fixed as follows: the first 6 rows in the second, third and fourth tiers of seats.

Temporary Organization.—The Committee on Temporary Organization made its report which was adopted with changes as voted from the floor. (See Report No. 1.)

Time of Meetings.—The time for opening and closing the meetings of Conference was fixed as follows: Morning meeting opening at 9:00 a. m., and closing at noon; the afternoon meeting opening at 1:30 p. m. and closing by vote of the Conference.

Orders Made.—Thee lection of Conference Officials was made an Order of the Day for Friday morning following the devotional service.

Religious Services.—The Committee on Religious Services read its report which was adopted as read. (See Report No. 2.)

Courtesies:—The Rev. Mervyn Summers was introduced to the Conference.

Adjournment.—Adjourned by limitation of time.

#### Wednesday Morning Meeting, June 4, 1947

Opening.—The meeting was called to order by the President. Devotions were led by Maurice Moore.

Roll Call.—The roll was called and name of Matilda Vincent substituted for Mrs. Lockwood. The Minutes were approved as read.

Substitution.—The name of Dr. Robert R. Luckey was substituted for the Rev. Erwin Enty on Committee on Auditing Statistical Reports.

Communications.—Communications were read from Robert N. Lytle, Peter D. Miller, Anna L. Filmore, and Maurice A. Gibbs. Their characters were passed. It was voted to send greetings from the Conference.

Budget Apportionments.—It was voted that all Budget apportionments be made in even dollars, omitting odd cents, with the exception of the Sunday-school Budgets.

Recess.—A recess was voted for committee work.

Substitution.-Following the recess the Conference was called to or-

der. Prof. Perry Tucker's resignation from the Auditing Committee was accepted and the name of Ernest Gillette was substituted.

Adjournment.—Motion to adjourn. Benediction by the Rev. A. A. Hickok.

Whereas: The issue of dropping the word, "Connection," is clearly a constitutional issue, and is subject to constitutional processess as in-

dicated in our Book of Discipline. This fact was not stated to our Conference when said petition was voted.

And Whereas, Such change in our Denominational name by dropping the word, "Connection," would involve endless confusion and expense in amending the articles of incorporation of our various incorporated bodies wherever the word, "Connection," is found. This would include the following:

All of our Connectional Societies such as "The Wesleyan Methodist Publishing Association of America," "The Wesleyan Educational Society," "The Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America," and "The Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America," all of our incorporated Annual Conferences, all of our incorporated local churches, all of our incorporated Camp Meeting Associations, and all other incorporated bodies bearing our denominational name, such as all of our colleges.

Be it therefore resolved by this Conference that upon the ground of the above stated reasons we do hereby rescind the above petition.

- 1. To elect a chairman, a secretary, and a treasurer.
- 2. To survey the Lockport Conference to determine the best places for extension projects.
- 3. To allocate such funds as are received for the purpose to the designated projects.
- Tσ publicize throughout the local churches the work of the department.
- 5. To render to the Annual Conference a report of the work of past year and a detailed plan for the following year.
- 6. To act as an advisory board to the extension secretary.
- Motion 6. That the treasurer of the conference board of church extension be authorized by the Annual Conference to receive funds for this extension program.
- Motion 7. That the pioneer calendar plan be used as a means of raising funds for this program. That all offerings and contributions received in extension service go into this fund.
- Motion 8. That all funds will go directly to the treasurer of the conference board of church extension. In any church having a W. Y. P. S. the local society shall receive credit for the funds raised in that church for this program.
- Motion 9. That the board of trustees, in line with Standing Rule No. 2 on page 2 of the Conference Minutes, recommend a minimum salary for the extension secretary to be paid by budget assessment. That the conference board of church extension shall determine a maximum salary and the remainder above budget to be paid from extension funds. The Annual Conference is in no way financially obligated beyond its commitments as listed in the annual budget apportionment.

(Temporary measure for the following year.) Motion 11. For the next year the salary of the conference President be set in accord to Motion 9.

### Report No. 15

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees of the Lockport Annual Conference met at the regular session of the said Conference at Houghton, N. Y., June 3-8, 1947.

The following recommendations are respectfully presented to the Conference now in session:

- 1. The payment of all financial accounts incident to the present session of Annual Conference.
- 2. The payment of \$50.00 each to the Rev. Walter Readett, Mrs. Beulah Markell, Mrs. Anna Elliott, and the Rev. Mae K. Shaffer, from the Superannuation Fund.
- 3. The payment to the Annual Conference Secretary and to the Treasurer the sum of \$30.00 each plus office expenses for the year ending June, 1948, and to the Rev. Miss Mary E. Bennett, the sum of \$10.00 for clerical work during the past conference year.
- 4. That we pay the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) on the conference indebtedness from the Conference Budget.

That we also appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) from the Conference Entertainment Fund to apply on the indebtedness of the Conference.

Also that the date of Sunday, July 6, be set aside for a special appeal to the various charges of the Conference to raise the remaining Ffteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) indebtedness of the Lockport Conference.

- 5. That the amount for conference work be the same as last year.
- 6. That the Secretary of Conference be authorized to distribute suitable stationery as shall be approved by the Executive Committee of the Poard of Trustees. Also 400 copies of the Minutes of this Session of Conference to be distributed to the several charges.
- 7. That the budget for Conference Entertainment be at the rate of 30 cents per member.

### Report No. 17

# JOINT COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ORDERS AND THE PASTORAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

That the Committee on Itineracy and Orders and the Pastoral Relations Committee of the Lockport Conference take cognizance of a request from the Wesleyan Methodist church in Buffalo, N. Y. conveyed by its pastor, the Rev. J. R. Pitt, that C. W. Smith be received as an Elder in the Lockport Conference has been considered.

The Committee desire to express to Brother Smith our sincere appreciation of his active part in the work of our beloved Zion.

However, in considering the request to be received as an Elder in the Conference, the committee find themselves somewhat embarrassed to act affirmatively since Brother Smith's past membership in a secret society (the Free Masons) and his activities in another secret order (the Ku Klux Klan) are rather widely known among the brethren of the Church.

The Church has ever been ready, indeed anxiius to receive back into its fold of membership those who have fallen therefrom, and who have returned with repentance for such defection, but in such cases it has been cautious of again placing such behind the sacred desk.

Further, it is not certainly known among us that this matter which would have caused the severing of the relations of our brother with the Wesleyan Methodist Church and its ministry has been regretted by him, nor indeed has he appeared personally before the committee that his attitude on this point might be known.

It is also true that there is at this time no appointment of a nature recognized in the Discipline to which he might now be assigned in the Lockport Conference. And the present advanced age of our brother makes it appear unlikely that he could anticipate active service as a pastor or evangelist in our midst.

Furthermore, our Brother C. W. Smith received his Letter of Standing from the Lockport Conference in 1925 and for the past 22 years has not been affiliated with the Conference.

We, therefore, do not recommend favorable action upon this request, but instruct our Secretary to communicate the substance of this resolution to Brother C. W. Smith, and to the Buffalo church, and that our Secretary assure Brother Smith of our Christian love for him and appreciation for his activity in support of the work at Buffalo.

# Report No. 20 HISTORY OF BATAVIA WORK, 1945—1947

To my fellow brethren of the Lockport Conference, greetings in the Eternal Name of our Risen Lord, who hath redeemed us and called us forth to declare His gospel amongst men of earth and in the present capacity, commissioned of His Spirit to repair the breech and build again the walls in the place of desolation, Batavia, New York.

Standing here as I am in a session of the Lockport Conference and representing the work at Batavia, is indeed a strange mystery and yet an occasion of Divine Providence. This fact reminds us so keenly of the faithfulness of God, His patience, His ways and pattern in life's purposes and without question, these answers to prayer have strengthened our faith and increased our devotion.

As a boy, I recall the days of Batavia in her glory, when as a youth she was zealously making progress. The last Sunday-school record I remember was 166 and well I recollect revival fires broke out, altars were frequent and many people were attending. Then's God's servant, the Rev. John H. Woodhouse, fell in the line of his battle and went home to his eternal reward. Memory is a little slow at forgetting, and it remains a mystery why the pattern became so tangled in the years that followed but we know that a veil was drawn—the beauty of the rose faded and the Batavia Church became bleek and a barren waste. This has given us much cause for inward suffering.

Reluctantly, but by some unseen compelling force, the Lockport Conference has spent themselves to retain Batavia as her property. The constant expense in her direction has no doubt appeared to be a liability, an exacting burden, a hindrance to progress and a deflation to faith. I have known this in my heart! On my occasional visits to the city, enroute to meetings or visiting my relatives, I would go by the property and deeply sigh. My spirit would know a heaviness and with it somewhat of a deep

confidence that some day we would be occupying those very buildings again. If that were ever to be the case, it would have to be God!

Through the years, I contacted Brother Taylor at intervals by mail, requesting him to use his influence in holding on to Batavia at any cost. It did not matterwhether I was to be God's agency or not, I felt God still had a purpose for Batavia and that in due time He would raise her up, grow out her locks and send her again to challenge the Philistines—and with Victory. Praise God!

The response from Brother Taylor concerning the possibility of opening the work was negative speaking in behalf of the Board and our offers to help were thus put on the table. This did not deter me but somehow challenged me. To abbreviate and bring the story to date—it was last year about this time that I heard that the property was up for sale to the Jewish Congregation at a sacrifical price. This aroused my English nature, inherited of course, and I prayed and figured thus, sat down to write. I recall I put all the punch I could muster into that letter, all the reason and sincerity of my soul. In a consecration service, God spoke to both wife and me about our material welfare, that is, if we were willing to put what savings we had toward Batavia, if we would be willing to sell our home in Marion, Indiana and disarm as far as earth was concerned, if we were willing to go should He open the door. Reminded of Calvary, we said, "Yes."

Thus it was, I asked the Conference Board if they would sell the property to me at the same price they were offering it to the Beth El Temple and give me preference over the Jewish unbelievers in this regard. The sale price was \$5550.00 for the two properties and for two whole months the Board never even received a reply to their offer.

I learned, then, that the Board wanted to discuss the matter with me. In the meantime a statement of my standing and integrity was received from my friend and gracious President of the Ohio Conference, Leslie Wilcox. It was in the month of September, 1944 that a special trip was taken to the home of the president, Brother Taylor, and here a special Board meeting was arranged. They learned my story and heard my proposition, after which, a ready discussion was made to stand back of a new effort to rehabilitate the Batavia work.

Our evangelistic schedule was cancelled, other plans were altered and we began packing in preparation to move. We sold our home in Marion, Indiana, to Christian people. The day of moving came and we journeyed to Batavia by faith. This was in the month of November and our family came to Batavia again in the middle of February.

The special offerings received through the Conference Thanksgiving and Christmas gifts have amounted to \$641.97. This amount is deposited in the Batavia Bank in what I call my "faith fund." Buffalo's recent offering makes this amount total \$674.05. Through gifts of friends and churches together with our own personal contributions we have advanced

toward Batavia about \$1200.00. Again we must say this is the work of God and His seal upon the decision. This reserve fund is for the purpose of incidental expenses, acquiring of necessary furnishings, advertising and initial revival campaign expense, thus to avoid my financial embarrassment in the offing. The house is again free from taxes. The Jewish people have vacated the property and Brother Taylor's recent visit was well timed so that officially we might approach the acting President of the Temple, Mr. Moss. We purchased from them the much needed heating system and the plumbing set-up, plus some other essentials and found the church building in fair condition. We are running from now to the opening of the services a weekly sizable ad in the paper with our cut and sermon notes in preparation for the announcement of special services. We hope to do extensive advertising of the gospel and the church throughout this area.

We hope to launch our first services with a five weeks' campaign, September 16. God has led several consecrated workers at their own volition to come and help us by faith. We hope to sign a contract with station WBTA very soon which includes daily and Sunday programs all through the revival. We are going to use the name, "Wesleyan Methodist Church." Our Sunday-school hour, one week after the opening of the revival, will be the only morning service for perhaps six months, for I definitely feel this emphasis on the children's education is a forerunner to a strong adult constituency later on and Sunday-school work gives entrance to new homes.

I shall list later on some of our present needs and perhaps, as a conference, you could assist us. We would like to see the Batavia debt completely liquidated and to this end we are petitioning God. It is my hope that during the revival campaign, opening September 16, a goodly number of preachers and laymen will drive in to help us in the battle, if this will be possible. And most of all, we need your prayers and moral support.

Thus, I bring to a close my 1945 report on Batavia. The challenge before us is great and I find no spirit of self sufficiency or independence. All I know is that God has called me; this is His battle and He must furnish the necessary wisdom and strength, understanding and grace. We have come up to the front line of duty and without question we face a clever, persistent foe. By FAITH, I am saying, in Christ, alone we are ABLE!

#### 1945-46

On September 9, 1945, the "Voice of Faith" was launched over WBTA-1940 Kc., Batavia's only radio station and this daily broadcast of one-half hour and one hour on Sunday served as a forerunner to the official grand opening of the new Batavia Wesleyan Methodist Church, which took place on Sunday evening, September 16, 1945.

The step of faith was rewarded as about 200 persons participated in this opening service which was recorded by Robert Monaghan and

this, the first Batavia for Christ Crusade, lasting five weeks, was launched with a party of ten workers in charge. "Faith" was the daily menu for radio, household, church and personal needs and God did not fail.

Sinners found God. It was noised abroad that "Jesus was in the house" and capacity audiences filled the place to hear the Word.

Four evangelistic crusades have been conducted during the course of 8 months, besides Holy Week services and a missionary convention of seven days. It is our strong desire to make Batavia a missionary church and already four local youth have responded to prepare for this work. Our great burden is also for Bible School and youth.

The Batavia Bible Educatinal School opened October 21, 1945 with sixty-eight present and about \$12.00 offering. We have reached a record of 155 present and \$300.00 special offering in Bible School.

It is worthy of note that 60 Wesleyan Methodist periodicals are subscribed besides 10 Missionary magazines and 12 Wesleyan Youths.

A tithing campaign was held four weeks in the early spring and about 50 persons agreed to the tithing pledge. A total of about \$123.00 was contributed toward the Conference Budget and benevolences even though we were not assigned any amount.

About \$5,926.71 was contributed for the church expenses and \$5000.00 are on hand toward the new church building project. This amount was secured in a five weeks' drive for funds and \$8,000 more has been pledged to be paid in a year's time. The completed church is an essential to our program of advance. A goal of \$30,000 has been set and construction "by faith" is hoped to start in 1946-47. Please pray for this project.

The radio broadcast has progressed by faith and over \$3,300 has been paid into the station for time and overhead by the radio audience. The pastor and wife receive no remuneration from this broadcast or salary from the Batavia church, but of their own increase, they share in the heavy obligations of this pioneer project.

One thousand one hundred fifty dollars is on hand for a new Hammond organ for the radio broadcast and the new season for broadcasting the "Voice of Faith" opens September 8, 1946.

Through the channels of the Batavia work, including radio for the past eight months has passed approximately \$15,995, which according to the record, places Batavia both numerically and finncially, along the front ranks of the Lockport Conference. This is, of course, only to God's eternal glory.

About fifty eligibles are ready for affiliation and it is with thanksgiving, we can report that slowly but surely the Word of God is taking root in the hearts of the people and some gracious Christian characters are in the making.

Batavia is a miracle! The miracle is of God! Man is but an agency and a channel. When you think of Batavia, think only of "Calvary" for it is at Calvary that battles were fought and victories won. As a memorial

gesture to the memory of the late Rev. J. H. Woodhouse, and a monument to the power of a living Redeemer, the rehabilitation of Batavia moves on! I am deeply humbled, fearfully weak and very dependent upon God.

#### 1946-47

With humble, tender, determined hearts, Ms. Woodhouse and I wended our way home from Conference in June, 1946 ready for front line duty in continuing the battle for God in the Batavia Church.

Our Statistical report was most graciously received on the Conference floor and midst tears, words of commendation, a rising vote of appreciation giving God the glory, we were infused with new faith and assurance to return to the job.

It was interesting to note that the new Batavia Wesleyan Church was ranking second in the Conference Sunday Schools with average attendances, and third in totals for all purposes.

The summer months proved seasons of divine blessing as we had our first Annual Bible School outing at Letchworth Park with 135 present having chartered three busses for the trip.

The "Children's Jubilee" met with great success as in July a staff of ten workers conducted a week of Jubilee Services for the boys and girls.

About 400 persons were in attendance at the first baptismal service which was held at Bushville Pond, west of Batavia on Highway Route number 5.

The "Voice of Faith" broadcast opened in September followed by the First Anniversary Batavia for Christ Crusade Series of Meetings.

Realizing men as the strength and backbone of church life, in November, a Union Missionary Fellowship became the occasion of organizing a Men's Missionary League and the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society.

The winter saw a sifting time among our constituency and as the gospel was preached in all faithfulness, many turned and walked no more with us. Satanic influences sought to hinder and deter our young Christians. The Spirit of God worked most untiringly as the Devil contested our purpose.

Spring brought with it the Second Annual Missionary Convention with good attendance, eighteen missionaries in the course of eight days, with twelve of our young people offering their lives for service at home or abroad.

Easter introduced our first Dawn Service at the City Park and Angelus Choir composed of our local young people presented inspiring Easter Music.

The W. Y. P. S. has functioned most nobly in various phases of practical work and helps to form a twelve-piece orchestra for Bible School and night services.

A Hammond organ has been installed as well as completely paid for, a sum of \$2,192.00, and a gas furnace replacing the old boiler at a cost of \$775 which is also paid in full. The Batavia Church has been learning to tithe and give generously.

Our main ambition this year was to organize a Wesleyan Methodist membership and after a long and patient waiting before God plus faithful exposition of the Scriptural Standards, we were delighted to present to Lockport Conference of 1947, a fine Wesleyanic Class of 42 members which was formulated on Sunday, June 1, 1947. This gave us great cause for rejoicing and giving thanks to God.


Through the past twelve months including the radio funds a sum of approximately \$18,600 has passed through the channels of the church. Please observe the record of Batavia in the Statistical Report of these minutes.

In the course of our year's work about 13,000 miles have been traveled, conducting both local and itinerant approximately 700 public services including various departments of ministerial labor besides miscellaneous office, study, home and hospital work.


We have turned back over one thousand dollars of our personal income into God's work above the finance invested in operating expenses within the year and as yet take no stipulated salary from the Batavia work.

God has been pleased to bring scores of sinners and believers to altars of prayer and to this hour many are proving true. We attribute all abovementioned success to the faithful, tender Holy Ghost.

We gladly shoulder His Cross and bravely face tomorrow's challenge, ready today and always to give God all the glory. Pray daily for Batavia!
