Standing Rules

1. **Visiting Ministers:**
All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.
2. **Date of Conference:**
The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 7:30 p.m., the last Monday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Monday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.
3. **Examinations:**
Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.
4. **Loans:**
Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.
5. **Procedure:**
The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.
The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.
6. **Taking of Pastoral Vote:**
To obtain uniformity, it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on any day during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on prepared official ballots for this purpose.
7. **Pay for Officials:**
The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.
8. **Statistician:**
The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.
9. **Closing of Records:**
The Conference Treasurer shall close her books on June 3 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer then shall fill in Item IX on the statistical report blanks, affix his signature and return one to the pastor who sent it. The other statistical report shall be forwarded to the Statistician by June 17.
10. **Reporting of Statistics:**
We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.
11. **Reports:**
The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.
12. **Ex-Officio Members:**
 - (a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.
 - (b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the

Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.

(c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.

(d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Conference Missions Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

(a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay, and the church shall furnish the supply. The pastor's vacation must be taken sometime between the rise of the conference and the convening of the next conference unless a satisfactory arrangement is made otherwise with the church.

(b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.

(c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.

(d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.

(e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.

(f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.

(g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.

(h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.

(i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.

(j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

(k) A pastor who is leaving a church will continue through conference and camp Sundays from which church or charge he will receive his salary until the end of such time. The above will not pertain to a pastor leaving the conference unless he completes the major part of above mentioned time.

(l) A pastor failing to make required conference reports shall state his reason to the Pastoral Relations Committee before he is given a conference appointment.

(m) Each church shall formulate a policy for the remuneration of guest speakers.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

(a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.

- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
 - (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.
 - (d) The local church is urged to adopt a policy for paying General and Conference budgets quarterly.
20. **Course of Study:**
Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itinerary and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.
 21. **Ministerial Institute:**
The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.
 22. **Delegates' Credentials:**
It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.
 23. **Audits:**
The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookkeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.
 24. **Conference Missions:**
 - (a) In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered conference missions. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
 - (b) The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for conference missions.
 25. **Bible Study Quarter:**
Each church is expected to conduct a systematic Bible study for at least one quarter during the conference year. The material to be selected by the pastor and local church from approved material.
 26. **Committee on Orders of the Day:**
The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday, conference missions; Thursday, a public missionary service; Friday, the ordination service.
 27. **Church Membership Classes:**
Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.
 28. **Financial Appeals:**
 - (a) The conference shall promote the offering for the Houghton Academy on Academy Sunday which is the second Sunday in September. Twenty-five per cent of this offering is to be designated for scholarships for Wesleyan missionaries' children.

(b) The Lenten season and Easter offering is hereby established as a time for a special offering for the local church.

(c) Any financial appeals to be made in the local churches by non-Wesleyan persons or groups shall require the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board. This does not apply to representatives of the Gideons and of the American Bible Society.

29. Conference Board of Managers:

The Conference Board of Trustees are the Board of Managers of the Conference during the interim of conference. (See Discipline par. 245.)

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY - TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the call of the President, the Rev. D.A. Rees, for its 121st annual session at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 29, 1965. The Rev. I. Leslie Conley led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace." The Rev. Leon Jelliff offered prayer. The roll was called with 33 elders and conference preachers and 28 lay delegates responding. The report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted and amended to seat alternates. (See lay delegates on page 14.)

Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr. brought a devotional message from Psalm 69:9, "The zeal of thine house has eaten me up." He dwelt on (1) the necessity for zeal, and (2) discontent as an evidence of the decline of zeal.

The Agenda on Orders of the Day was adopted subject to necessary change. (See Report No. 1.) A motion prevailed that we adopt the report of the Nominating Committee. (See Report No. 2.) Rev. Lloyd Mack requested permission to come to and go from conference as he had to care for business relating to his son's departure for Hong Kong. This was granted by common consent.

The motion was made that we dispense with the reading of the pastoral-statistical reports for this year. This motion was amended to state that the pastor make a statement as to whether or not his church's budget was paid in full. The amendment was carried. The motion as amended prevailed.

We adjourned by vote. Dr. John Edling, missionary on furlough from Haiti, closed with prayer.

SECOND DAY - WEDNESDAY MORNING

The Conference President called the conference session to order. Bradley Wood led in singing, "When The Roll is Called Up Yonder." The conference roll was called.

Dr. H. K. Sheets, General Superintendent, and Rev. Philip Birchall, President of Houghton Academy, were introduced and brought greetings to the conference. Rev. Paul Larson, pastor of Elmira Church, was introduced and brought greetings.

Dr. John Edling was in charge of devotions using II Corinthians 4:6,7 as the scriptural background for his remarks relating "earthen vessels" of the scripture to the lamps used in Haiti. Rev. Lloyd Mack led in prayer.

The motion was made and seconded that Kenneth Barry be seated as delegate from Baldwinsville in the place of Ward Hall.

Orders of the Day - Rev. William Woughter, Sunday School secretary,

gave his report which was adopted by vote. The financial report was received and referred to the auditing committee. (See Report No. 3.)

Orders of the Day - The Vice President, Rev. James Bence took the chair. President David A. Rees read his annual report and Official Acts which were adopted by two separate motions. His financial report was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 4.)

A proposal made by Lloyd Mack was referred to the Pastoral Relations Committee.

Rev. Thomas Boghosian reported on his Chaplaincy at Syracuse University which was accepted. Recommendation Number 1 was adopted. Number 2, A and B were adopted and referred to the Financial Committee. Number 3 was referred to the Pastoral Relations Committee. The financial report was received and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 5.)

Orders of the Day - Mrs. Charlotte Lamos, Conference Treasurer, read her report which was received and referred to the Auditing Committee by vote. (See Report No. 6.)

Rev. Gerald Wright, Sr., read a statement from the Board of Trustees. Mr. Lamos spoke to the Trustees' statement and made a motion that the report be received with a vote of confidence in the Board of Trustees. The motion prevailed.

We were adjourned by limitation of time.

SECOND DAY - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Conference was called to order by the Conference President. Bradley Wood led in an opening hymn. Rev. Charles Wheeler, conducted devotions emphasizing the necessity of our rejoicing in the Lord. Rev. Edward Mein led in prayer.

The Orders of the Day were changed to permit the Bookstore report to be given following the Report of the Board of Trustees.

The Courtesy Committee reported and introduced Dr. Willard Smith.

Orders of the Day - Educational Hour

The Rev. Wesley B. Nussey introduced Rev. Philip Birchall, principal of Houghton Academy. Rev. Birchall gave a brief background of the Academy. He spoke of the distinctions of Christian Education, emphasizing the fact that we should not minimize our own distinctions. He brought out the fact that in both pre-reformation and post reformation days great men were educated with a religious emphasis. Mr. Birchall stated that "the basis for education is in the nature of man created in the image of God widening his intellectual horizons. The glory of God is the only true goal to education."

Dr. Willard Smith, business manager of Houghton College was then introduced. He spoke, first, of the concern over the moral decline in secular educational institutions. He compared Houghton College of today with ten years ago. He stated that 10 years ago there were 600 students and 40 faculty members whereas now there are over 1050 students and a faculty of 70. The school plant was worth one million and now is worth five million. The assets were worth one and a half million and now are worth six and a half million. These are the results of prayer and cooperation of God's people.

We were dismissed for a ten minute recess. After reconvening the Rev. Wayne Wager was introduced to the conference. Brother Wager has been pastoring the Lyncourt Church this past conference year. The report of Children's Camp was postponed by motion until Friday.

Orders of the Day - Rev. James E. Bence, trustee secretary, gave the report of the Board of Trustees. This was accepted by vote.

Mrs. C. Lamos gave the financial report for the Christian Life Book Shop located in Syracuse, New York. The report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 7.)

Proposals made by Mr. Lamos relative to improving our annual income for conference missions were referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Committee on Religious Services reported. (See Report No. 8.)

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders made a partial report. (See Report No. 9.)

Adjournment was by motion and prayer by Harold Jack.

Orders of the Day - 6:30 P.M. A memorial service for the Rev. Alexander J. McKenzie, who entered the conference in 1936 and died March 30, 1965, was conducted by the Rev. Stanley Lawrence.

THIRD DAY - THURSDAY MORNING

The session came to order with the singing of "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name." The roll was called. The Rev. Paul Larson, pastor of the Elmira church, was in charge of devotions. He read Romans 12:1,2 calling for a "reasonable service." The minutes were read and approved. Mrs. Leulla Clark was seated as the delegate from Lyncourt church in the place of Mr. Tarbell Lamos.

Dr. Sheets, Gen. Supt., was invited by vote to preside during the election of the conference president and vice president.

The committee on Examinations of Character gave a partial report. The following ministerial characters have been examined and were passed by vote of the conference: Charles Wheeler, William Woughter, Gerald Wright, Jr., Carroll E. Brentlinger, Thomas Boghosian, Edward Mein, William W. Turverey, George M. Pattington,

Time was extended to complete elections.

The motion was made that there be an additional lay member added to the Board of Trustees. Motion was withdrawn by mover, Mrs. Hamilton, and the one who seconded the motion, George Pattington. It was voted that the Trustees be requested to make a study with the attorney on the number and ratio of ministerial and lay trustees and report to the 1966 conference.

The names of Mrs. Myrtle Lawrence and Lloyd Mack were added to the list of nominations under World Missions Secretary. The

motion was made and carried that Ward Hall's name be deleted from Promotional Secretary for Wesleyan Men.

Nominations were closed by vote.

Dr. Sheets shared with the conference greetings from Chaplain & Mrs. Richard Sprowl stating something concerning his work and the illness of their youngest child. The Conference Secretary was instructed to send greetings to the Sprowls. Prayer was offered for the Sprowls and their child.

We recessed for 15 minutes.

The following elders were elected to General Conference, June 1966:

1st Ministerial delegate - David A. Rees

2nd Ministerial delegate - James E. Bence

3rd Ministerial delegate - Gerald F. Wright, Sr.

The motion was passed that a Committee on Resolutions be elected. First member elected was Thomas Boghosian; second member was Shirley Zimmerman; and the third member was Lloyd Mack.

The conference adjourned with prayer by the Rev. E. Van Wicklin.

THIRD DAY - THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Bradley Wood led in an opening hymn after which the conference president called the conference to order. Prayer was made by Rev. Thomas Boghosian.

Dr. Sheets gave reasons for having General Conference in 1966. They were: (1) internal problems which require General Conference action, (2) merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church, (3) to deal with the emergency brought on by the destruction of the World Headquarters, and to consider joint publishing with the Pilgrim Holiness Church, (4) to deal with all regular business.

The Courtesy Committee reported. Elwyn Patrick, student at Asbury Seminary, was introduced and gave his testimony. The secretary read the results of the conference ballot. The President declared elected those receiving a majority vote. (Please see conference Officers and Boards.)

Orders of the Day - Gen. Supt. Dr. H. Sheets, the denominational representative was introduced. Dr. Sheets spoke, giving us a devotional message. He then spoke about the World Missions Department. He stated that the World Missions Program is rapidly growing; that there is one overseas Wesleyan Methodist to every 306 in the United States and Canada; there were seven times as many Sunday Schools organized overseas as were organized here at home. Dr. Sheets told us about the tornado tragedy that destroyed World Headquarters. He laid the burden of rebuilding upon all of us as faithful Wesleyan Methodists.

We were adjourned for a fifteen minute break.

Upon reconvening, a motion was made and supported to elect a

committee to nominate the remaining delegates and alternate delegates to General Conference. Wesley B. Nussey was nominated as first alternate ministerial delegate.

Harold Woodard, Richard Beach, Harold Jack and Carl Moore were nominated for first lay delegate. Nominations were closed by vote.

1st alternate ministerial - Wesley B. Nussey

1st lay delegate - Harold Woodard

2nd ministerial delegate - I. Leslie Conley

Carl Moore, Frank Hamilton, and Richard Beach were nominated as 2nd lay delegates. Nominations were declared closed.

2nd alternate - I. Leslie Conley

2nd lay delegate - Richard Beach

Harold Jack, Frank Hamilton, Carl Moore were nominated as third lay delegate. Nominations were declared closed. There was no election on the first ballot.

3rd lay delegate - Harold Jack

Verne Parker, Richard Doan, Herbert Stevenson, Carl Moore were nominated as 4th lay delegate, and a delegate-at-large.

Rev. Roger Rounds spoke words of commendation in behalf of the Rev. and Mrs. Stanley Lawrence and moved a rising vote to express the conference gratefulness to the Lawrences for their example in the conference and their faithfulness. The motion carried unanimously.

There was no election of the first ballot for the 4th lay delegate.

4th lay delegate - Carl Moore

We adjourned by motion.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY MORNING

The conference was called to order by the Conference President. Bradley Wood led in the singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." The roll was called. Rev. Roger Rounds had devotions. He spoke on the destructiveness of fear and the power of perfect love to deliver from fear. The minutes were read and approved.

Miss Madge Pratt was seated as an alternate delegate from Lyn-court in the place of Mrs. Charlotte Lamos.

Ward Hall, Herbert Stevenson, Milton Rathbun and Faye Stewart were nominated for 1st lay delegate to General Conference. No election on first ballot.

The Wesleyan Youth President gave his report.

The Children's Camp report was read and referred to the Auditing Committee (See Report No. 12.)

The Courtesy Committee reported. Rev. and Mrs. Jack Lintz were introduced to the conference. They gave their testimonies.

1st alternate lay delegate - Ward Hall

Herbert Stevenson, Emmett Brentlinger, Verne Parker and Faye Stewart were nominated as second alternate lay delegates. No elec-

tion.

The Committee on Resolutions read their report. It was approved. (See Report No. 13.)

It was recommended that the Secretary communicate our attitude to appropriate legislators. This passed. It was moved and carried that this resolution be made available to pastors to take back to their churches to be sent to assemblymen, senators and the Governor.

Mrs. Gladys Newbury gave the Wesleyan Woman's Missionary Society President's report. A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Newbury.

2nd alternate delegate - Herbert Stevenson

Pastor Enos Cann gave his report.

We adjourned to give committees time to complete their work. Rev. William W. Turverey closed in prayer.

FOURTH DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The Vice President, James E. Bence, called the conference to order. Bradley Wood led in the singing of "Glory to His Name." Devotions were conducted by Carl Moore.

The Committee of examination of Character gave a partial report. It was adopted by vote.

The Committee of examination of Character gave the following recommendation: "Whereas we feel the character report blank of the minister is inadequate to answer in the absence of the individual as to his present character we therefore recommend that: (1) it be designated that the individual absentee give a written testimony as to his state of grace, this is to be sent with the character report form to conference secretary, (2) the character of an individual shall not be passed without receipt of such information."

It was amended to add, "if at all possible."

The previous question was moved and passed.

The main motion was lost.

The Report of Statistical Committee was read and adopted. (See Report No. 18.) It was voted that the Educational Budget and the Pension Fund be paid in full.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Brother and Sister Crandall for the work they've done on the Statistical report.

The Mutual Aid report was read by the conference secretary and referred to the auditors. (See Report No. 14.)

The report of the Finance Committee was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 19.)

The Nominating Committee recommended that: (1) the Policy Committee become the Conference Missionary Board, (2) the Conference Secretary, the Camp President, be added to the Policy Committee and that a layman from each district be appointed to the Policy Committee by the Conference President and the Advisory Board.

Mr. George Waterman was introduced and gave his testimony.

The Auditing Committee report was read and adopted with all the financial reports which were included in the report. (See Report No. 15.)

The report of the Director of the Christian Youth Crusaders, also known as the Committee on Child Evangelism, was adopted.

The following elders reported: Merlin Loomis, George Pattington, Roger Rounds, William Turverey, Edward VanWicklin, Wayne Wager, Charles Wheeler, James Frase, Wallace Taylor, Gerald MacKinnon, Adelbert Edwards, James Bence, Harley Hill, Leon Jelliff, Mary Crandall, Bernard Newbury, Wesley Nussey.

Mrs. Margery Hawks, representing Truth for Youth, gave a report on the work of Truth for Youth.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported. The report was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 9.)

The final report of the Committee of Credentials was read and adopted. Bertrand Rudd's character was passed by vote. A rising vote of thanks was given to Wallace Taylor and James Frase for the fine job they are doing in the dining hall.

A motion was passed that the Secretary send greetings from the conference to all superannuated elders who have not attended conference.

A motion prevailed that we commence conference at 8:00 a.m., Saturday morning instead of 8:30 a.m. We were adjourned with prayer by Herbert Stevenson.

FIFTH DAY - SATURDAY MORNING

The conference was called to order by the Assistant Secretary, William Turverey. Bradley Wood led in the singing of a hymn and I. Leslie Conley prayed. The roll was called. The minutes were read and stood approved as corrected.

Richard Doan, Promotional Secretary of Wesleyan Men, gave an encouraging report on the activities of the Wesleyan Men.

The report of the Policy Committee was read. Recommendation No. 1 was adopted. No. 2 was lost. No. 3 was adopted. No. 6 was adopted. No. 7 was lost. No. 8 was adopted. No. 9 was adopted. No. 10 was adopted. No. 11 a,b,d were adopted. No. 11c was lost. Recommendations Nos. 4 and 5 were adopted. No. 12 was referred to the Board of Trustees, the Treasurer, and the pastors of the Penfield, Pulaski, and Kirkville churches, and that the decision of this committee be final. Recommendation No. 13 was moved, seconded and discussed at length. The previous question (Recom. No. 13) was moved, seconded and passed. Recommendation No. 13 was adopted by more than a two-thirds majority. (See Report No. 16.)

Time was extended by vote followed by a recess to give the Chaplaincy Committee time to complete its work.

FIFTH DAY - SATURDAY AFTERNOON

The President called the conference to order. The Secretary nominated William Turverey as the Assistant Secretary. The nomination was confirmed by vote. James Bence and Tarbell Lamos were nominated by the President to the Advisory Board. The nominations were confirmed by vote.

The Pastoral Relations Committee report was read by Mrs. Roderick Douglass. The report was adopted by motion. (See Report No. 17.)

Richard Beach was elected to complete the Conference Scholarship Committee.

The motion made by Gerald Jack was passed that steps be taken by the Conference President and the Advisory Board to establish a seminary fund. Gerald Jack's name was added to this committee by vote. Standing Rule No. 2 was changed to strike out "1:30 P.M.", and insert "7:30 P.M.", and to strike out "Tuesday" and insert "Monday".

The conference voted to leave all unfinished business in the hands of the Conference President and the Advisory Board and the approval of Saturday's minutes to the Conference President, the Secretary, and the Advisory Board. The Conference President expressed his thanks to the Vice-President, the Secretary, the ministers and lay delegates.

We adjourned at 3:30 P.M. to meet at the call of the Chair. A prayer of thanksgiving was offered by Rev. Leon Jelliff.

REPORT NO. 3

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Highlights of the conference Sunday school year include the following:

The highly successful share convention, held in Elmira church, September 26th. Three hundred Sunday school workers from 33 schools attended from every corner of the conference.

Your secretary plus delegates from all three cup-winning schools attended the Phila. Area S.S. convention in November. This very helpful convention will be held again this year from November 11-13.

The filmstrip library was very active and a good number of our Sunday schools, youth groups and churches took advantage of these free filmstrips. Appreciation has been expressed from many users. We urge that others take advantage of this service.

Twenty schools made gains great enough to offset the losses of others and bring our average totals up by 103 persons. The new schools at Penfield and Camden bring the increase up to about 180.

Exciting S.S. races and growths produced the following AWARDS:
 The three conference trophies are awarded as follows: Canistota with an increase of 15.1%, Kirkville with an increase of 25%, and Odessa with an increase of 83%. Pastors, or other delegate will receive transportation in one car to Phila. Area Convention, plus \$10 each for convention expenses.

10% ribbons of merit are awarded to: Avon 14.4%, Canandaigua 14.9%, Lincoln Falls 22%, Redfield 31%, Spencerport 13.5% and W. Jasper 10.6%.

THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday school board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year:

1. Each school in the conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.
2. Schools competing for the trophies shall be divided into three groups: up through 59, 60 through 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance for the last conference year. A trophy will be awarded to the one in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
3. The pastor, or a key layman, of each trophy winning school may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the conference Sunday school fund to the National Sunday school convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday school board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this will be given \$10. from the same fund for other convention expenses.
4. Each school shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of average attendance any four Sundays of the year. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday school session. Persons known to be in attendance at any Sunday service of any conference connected services such as Chambers camp, youth retreat or Houghton Youth Rally, may be considered present at their local Sunday school for that Sunday or Sundays.

REPORT NO. 4

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference here assembled on Chambers Campground for its one hundred and twenty-first Annual Session:

Christian greetings in the Master's name. Again it is a real privilege to gather here for this Annual Session of the Rochester Conference. We are indeed indebted to our Heavenly Father for His guidance and blessings throughout the past year. During the year it has been a joy and privilege to participate in three dedication services: the parsonage and first unit of the new church at Kirkville, the new furniture in the Waterloo church and the fine new church at Penfield. It is always a real pleasure to see our churches make progress as well as to open new fields of labor.

God has been blessing in a special way the new work at Penfield where church services began in late October; the progress there has been unusual for which we praise Him. In December plans were launched to purchase the Free Methodist Church in Camden, N.Y. and were completed in the early part of the new year. Rev. John Crandall has been holding services there Sunday afternoons until the close of the conference year when Rev. George Pattington will become the resident pastor. The interest and attendance has been encouraging and we believe there is a good opportunity in this area. We are indebted to Rev. and Mrs. Crandall for their special effort to work

in this new field through the remainder of the Conference year.

The work of our Pioneer fields is very encouraging indeed and we thank God for His guidance and blessings upon our pastors and people who are laboring so diligently in these new areas.

February 17, we received word from Rev. Barrigar that Has-kinville parsonage had burned but fortunately no one was at home and thus no one injured for which we thank the Lord. Plans were soon under way for a new parsonage and today it is being constructed. April 13, we received word that Wesleyan World Headquarters was almost completely destroyed by a tornado which struck Sunday evening, April 11. Again we thank the Lord no one was in the building at the time and thus no one injured. Our families, members of the Headquarters staff, were very fortunate in that not only was no one injured but very little damage was done to their properties. You have already received word that plans are being made to rebuild; also, because of this disaster and other urgent business items, a special General Conference is being planned for June 14, 1966 at Houghton.

During the year one of our number was taken home after many years of loyal and faithful service both in the pulpit and in the pew - we speak of Rev. Alexander McKenzie who was called home March 2nd. Let us remember Sister McKenzie and members of the family in prayer.

Rev. William Wilkinson, who served the Sandy Creek church very well but only for a short time, felt the Lord leading him into another field of labor and left in a very fine spirit. We are glad to welcome back into the active pastorate Rev. and Mrs. Bernard Roof, having accepted the call to Sandy Creek.

Concerning the Book Shop, we believe you will note from the Book Shop financial report that good progress is being made in this endeavor and we do appreciate so much the work of the Book Shop Committee as well as the fine work of our manager, Mr. Don Clary.

Rev. and Mrs. Stanley Lawrence are retiring this year and we join with the ministers and delegates of this body to express our sincere thanks and appreciation for their many years of loyal service in the pastorates they have served as well as their fine cooperation in Conference work and activities - may the Lord bless them in the years ahead.

Again this has been a busy year and we believe the reports will show good progress in all areas of the work. During this period we have preached 70 times or more, conducted more than 20 regular and special business meetings, engaged in over 50 business and personal conferences; we have mailed out 12 pieces of mail in the form of circular letters etc. besides a heavy personal correspondence, worked with pulpit supply committees and pastors where changes were being anticipated. Presently all churches are well supplied with the exception of three and we have good prospects for them. The plan for the Conference President to visit churches Sunday evenings has been a rewarding one and a source of satisfaction with the fine group of men whom God has called to serve in the Rochester Conference;

we believe more direct advantages can accrue from this past year's program.

We would like to express thanks and appreciation to our Vice-President, Rev. James Bence, and to the Advisory Board for their counsel and cooperation; to Mrs. Charlotte Lamos, our Conference Treasurer, for her very efficient work in this area; to our Conference Board of Trustees and all Conference committees for their splendid cooperation and help in planning and carrying on the work of the Conference. We receive a great deal of satisfaction in seeing the excellent spirit of teamwork in our midst - it is this working together of pastors and laymen that makes for real progress. To our neighbors, the Larsons, we express thanks for their cooperation in taking telephone calls and getting the mail on many occasions while we are out of the city. We would thank Mrs. Rees for her help in the office and in sharing through understanding and prayer the responsibilities of Conference work. Your Conference Policy Committee offers the following recommendations:

1. That a post conference information bulletin be prepared and six copies be sent to each pastor to be distributed to the local S.S. Sup't. Church treasurer, W.M.S. President, W.Y. President, pastor and bulletin board. The information for this bulletin should come from these various departments involved. The committee to write up this information be the Conference President, Vice-President, Secretary, W.Y. President, and W.M.S. President.
2. That the Annual Journal show a breakdown of the Conference Mission Funds, receipts and disbursements in a section by itself and the Conference Budget be shown in a section by itself for easy comparison.
3. That all Conference Mission Funds be handled directly by the Conference treasurer and that the Conference Missions Fund Promotional Secretary handle only the pledge cards.
4. That we consider the Kirkville, Penfield and Pulaski churches as recipients for assistance from the Conference Mission Funds: Penfield to receive from the Canandaigua District; Pulaski, from the Elmira District; Kirkville, from the Syracuse District; and that we suggest to the W.Y. to consider giving assistance to the Camden Church.
5. That the pastors of the Kirkville, Penfield, and Pulaski churches visit the churches of the district assigned to assist these churches thru' the Conference Mission Fund for the pur-

- pose of raising money for this fund.
6. That we elect a committee consisting of the Conference President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary to study the matter of closing the fiscal year.
 7. That the Agenda Committee give special attention to a definite time limit to speakers and all other items possible during the Annual Conference.
 8. That a committee consisting of the Conference President, the Trustees to Houghton College, and one elected member from this body select students at Houghton College to receive scholarships.
 9. That recipients of scholarships be published in the Conference News and the availability of such scholarships be explained.
 10. That from the 1963 Conference Policy Committee Report:
Number 2, reading, "that the Academy offering in September of each year be earnestly promoted and 25% of this offering be designated for scholarships for missionaries' children" be incorporated in the Standing Rules #28 (a) with the addition of the adjective "Wesleyan" preceeding "missionaries".

We recommend that a full-time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the Discipline, paragraphs 147-140.

1. We recommend that the conference missionary church shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, until such time as they shall have assumed the entire responsibility for their indebtedness, and that other missionary churches be under this care by mutual agreement of Church and Conference President. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches and shall be informed of the meetings of these boards with the agenda for the same. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these churches as often as necessary to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.

2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.

3. The Conference President shall superintend the more-established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year, presenting the needs of the conference and church missionary work.

4. He shall enforce the provisions of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church.

5. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangements of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.

6. His conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.

7. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two evangelistic meetings per year outside the bounds of the conference.

8. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.

We further recommend that all appropriations cleared by the Pastoral Relations Committee be referred to the Finance Committee.

It is recommended that the details of the local Policy Committee, including chairmanship, be referred to the Conference Policy Committee, with authority to act for this year. They in turn to present recommendation to the 1966 annual conference.

The Pastoral Relations Committee has studied the question and possibility of using district leaders as counselors as suggested by Rev. Mack and it is not advisable to do so at this Conference session.

The president and secretary of board of trustees be authorized to send out pertinent information to the pastors and that board minutes be read as has been the policy as annual conference.

REPORT NO. 19

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1965-66 the expenditures for Conference Administrative work be approximately \$6,400 as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at the rate of \$87.50 per week.
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed Expense at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The Conference is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities of the President.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer to be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the \$20. minimum for Mutual Aid.
- E. That the Conference President receive \$300. for secretarial work.
- F. We recommend appropriations of:
 - (1) \$100. to Mrs. A. J. Shea
 - (2) \$50. to Mrs. Exa Rathbun
 - (3) \$600. to Onondaga Reservation
 - (4) \$75. to Chaplain expenses at Syracuse University

In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:

1. The Conference Budget shall be \$9. per member of which 75¢ will go for the Chambers Camp expenses.
2. The Mutual Aid Budget shall be 60¢ per member.
3. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference, \$50. per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$24.40 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of the Conference.
3. The Conference Officials shall receive the following salaries:
 - President - \$20.00
 - Vice-president - \$10.00
 - Secretary - \$15.00
 - Treasurer - \$40.00
 - Y.M.W.B. Superintendent - \$20.00They shall receive their board and room during Conference.
4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following her election. She shall be the Chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose members of the said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of the Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference Treasurer by June 3rd. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 3rd.
6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial reports and records for the year, May 31st.
7. To receive credit, all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent by June 3rd. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE WMS PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference WMS, gathered for their 60th annual session greetings!

We gather each year to give an accounting to one another concerning our labors in God's vineyard. Time slips by so rapidly, that it won't be long until some of us will be giving our final accounting - not before you, our fellow laborers - but before the Master. Will we hear His "Well done" or will we be ashamed? Will we have sheaves to lay at His feet, or stand empty handed? How delighted the enemy of our souls is, when he can get us "side-tracked", and we become interested in selfish pursuits - rather than things eternal.

We have endeavored to keep our own vision clear and to promote our Conference Missionary program in such a way that you might be well informed and thus keep your vision clear also. Hence, we arranged the tour of Miss Marie Evatt (Africa) last fall; contributed to each issue of the Conference News; sent five form letters of introduction, information and items of interest to pastors and local WMS presidents; arranged to have Mr. Robert Stowell (Puerto Rico) and Rev. Harris Earl (S. America) in our Spring conventions, which were held in Kirkville, Boylston, Avon, Buena Vista and Berrytown; engaged the two missionaries for services in Baldwinsville, Odessa,

West Jasper, Canisteo, Chambers, Corning, Alpine and Cayuta churches on the two week-ends. Scheduled Rev. and Mrs. Robert Lytle to be with us for our Conference Missionary service; and we are planning on Rev. Joe Neyman (Africa) for deputation during October 12 - November 14.

Miss Edna Eaton, Secretary of WMS, and myself attended the five conventions; presenting Conference WMS news, meeting the people of the districts and offering books and other helps for sale. We greatly appreciate the excellent work of the District Chairman and the hospitality of the entertaining churches. The total attendance was 738, cash offering \$727.92 and pledges \$519, total of \$1,246.92.

Houghton Area Convention will be at our conference grounds August 31 - September 2. This has entailed considerable correspondence, planning and work. We are anticipating rich blessings personally and for our people.

Through the efforts and cooperation of every local society, we are able to report a gain in finances of about \$550. and a substantial gain of 123 in membership. The pledged support of \$1500 for Johnsons (Japan); \$1000 for Dekkers (Africa) and \$1000 for Swaugers (S. America) has been raised in full. We gave \$383 for the Jamaica Churches through "White Gift"; \$737.25 for the missionaries on the Onondaga Reservation; \$166.87 for a new church in Hartford, Conn. and \$1,941.68 for Conference Missions. Sandy Creek Church has been supporting Dr. Edling for some time. It is a delight to report that Canisteo has pledged the support of Mrs. Robert Stowell and \$500 for the missionary on our Indian Reservation for the coming year. Certainly God will bless their hearts in this new venture.

Penfield church organized a Wesleyan Missionary Society this spring with 5 active and 5 honorary members.

Our hearts are full of praise to God for a full year. Many lessons have been learned at the Master's hand and we have rejoiced to know He loves and cares. Let each of us move forward with faith and courage - knowing that our trust is in One who "never fails".
